Irish Treaty Was Ratified To-day

FRENCH PROPOSAL THREATENS THE NAVAL REDUCTION PLANS

Britain, United States and Japan Agree Relative Navies Each Retain Big Battleships

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—It is officially announced that Great Britain, United States and Japan have agreed upon a naval ratio of five, five, three, Japan to retain the Mitsu, making ten capital ships; United States to retain two big ships instead of the smaller ships originally conceded, making a total of eighteen capital ships, and Britain to continue building two super-dreadnaughts of greater tonnage than the Mitsu, scrapping four old battleships of the original conceded list, making a total of twenty capital ships.

Fortifications on the Pacific are to remain unchanged.

NO DECISION JAPANESE CASE

Charles Tupper Pleads Cause of Orientals Before Supreme Court.

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—The supreme court of Canada has reserved judgment after hearing the application by the Federal government for an opinion as to the right of British Columbia to pass a bill prohibiting the employment of Japanese on its lands.

Mr. Charles Tupper, who represented the Japanese interests and Hon. J. W. Bell, attorney general of British Columbia appeared on behalf of the province.

BEER PURCHASE IS RESTRICTED

One Person May Only Get Two Dozen Pints Daily From Liquor Vendor.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 16.—Commissioner Falconer announced that an order-in-council was passed yesterday restricting the quantity of beer purchasable under a single permit to two dozen pints daily. This has been done in an effort to curtail the activities of the beer clubs.

A total of 31 club stewards have been charged with illegal distribution of beer. Each paid a bail of the amount of \$100 and eight forfeited the bail by their failure to appear in court to answer the charge. Twelve have lost their licenses.

DRIFTED IN MIDDLE PACIFIC OCEAN FOR FORTY-EIGHT HOURS

PANAMA, Dec. 16.—The crew of fifteen of the American barque, Harvard, which was wrecked while on the way to Honolulu from Tahiti, has been rescued by the British steamer, Baron de Meunier, after having drifted in life-boats for forty-eight hours.

TAKING STEPS FOR DEFENCE OF ULSTER

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Preliminary steps in an extensive movement for the development and re-organization of Ulster's defence movement have been taken in Belfast according to the Morning Post.

GHANDI IS IMPRISONED

Seventy-Three Indian Non-Co-operationists get Six Months.

Calcutta, Dec. 16.—Mahatma Gandhi and seventy-three of the participants in the non-co-operationist movement in regard to the British Rule in India have been sentenced to six months imprisonment with hard labor as a result of their activities in connection with the national volunteers.

Ghandi has been working for some months in an endeavor to promote an anti-British policy. His program included the refusing to recognize the Prince of Wales at various points including Allahabad, which he recently visited in the course of his tour of India.

RUMOR UNFOUNDED

Fred Stork Denies There is Any Likelihood of His Resigning Position.

Fred Stork is getting many inquiries as to the truth or falsity of a rumor that he was likely to resign to make way for some mysterious person who is sometimes Premier Oliver, sometimes Hon. Frank Oliver and sometimes someone else who might be taken into the Ottawa cabinet. Mr. Stork says he has no intention of resigning in favor of anybody since the people here have been good enough to elect him. No such suggestion has been made to him and if it were made it would not be acted on.

MUTILATED HEAD OF WHITE-HAIRED MAN FOUND IN ASH DUMP

MONTREAL, Dec. 16.—The mystery of the mutilated head of a white-haired man which was found in an ash dump above Mount Royal Street yesterday was cleared up here today when it was ascertained that it was probably a specimen lost or thrown away by some medical student.

BOMBS IN BELFAST

BELFAST, Dec. 16.—There was much firing and bomb throwing in the Newtownards district in which three persons were wounded. The soldiers and police replied to the fire at one stage.

ACTION OF STATION AGENT AGAINST NEW SETTLER DISMISSED

Judge Young Handed Down Judgment in Favor of W. F. Duke as Against P. V. Tallon of Burns Lake.

Judgment was handed down by Judge Young in the County Court yesterday in favor of the defendant in the action of P. V. Tallon, station agent at Burns Lake, vs. W. F. Duke, a settler at that point. The plaintiff's claim was for \$200 freight charges which it was alleged the defendant had not paid. The latter is a new settler and recently arrived from the east at Burns Lake. He had paid freight charges on his effects in advance, but on arriving at Burns Lake he was confronted with an extra \$200 charge, which he refused to pay. In the meantime he got his effects from the station and the suit followed.

Was Non-Suited.

Milton Gonzalez of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, counsel for the defendant, on the conclusion of the plaintiff's case, applied for non-suit on the ground that at the time the action was commenced the plaintiff had no case. Judge Young reserved his decision at the trial and yesterday upheld the defendant's contention and dismissed the action. L. S. McGill of Smithers was counsel for the plaintiff.

CANNOT TOUCH CAUSE OF UNEMPLOYMENT IS LLOYD GEORGE'S VIEW

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Addressing labor deputations on the question of unemployment, Lloyd George stated that no government could touch the underlying causes for unemployment. He mentioned the fact that the British drew £200,000,000 yearly from investments abroad and also saved between three and four million pounds yearly for investment. The country could no longer do that.

MAJORITY INCREASED

Advance Poll at Smithers was Not Included in First Return—Stork Majority Now 63.

In the return for Smithers given out in the election figures already published, the advance polls was not included. Six votes were cast, five of which were for Stork and one for Peck. This leaves the Smithers vote at 125 for Peck and 213 for Stork, giving four more votes to the Stork majority which is thus 63.

C. P. R. SHOPS CLOSE FOR NINETEEN DAYS

MONTREAL, Dec. 16.—The Canadian Pacific Angus shops have closed for nineteen days.

MADE REGENT OF JAPANESE EMPIRE.



Crown Prince Hirohito has been appointed Regent to the emperor of Japan, who has been failing in health for some time. The Regency is expected to have the most far reaching consequences.

France Makes Large Demand for Ten New Superdreadnaughts to be Built in Ten Years After 1925

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (noon).—The French delegation today presented a proposal for so great an increase in the strength of the French navy that the British declare such a program, if carried out, would upset the whole plan for a 5-5-3 naval reduction.

It is understood the French plan provides for construction of ten 35,000-ton super-dreadnaughts in ten years subsequent to 1925. This would give France a capital ship tonnage of 350,000 as against 315,000 for Japan, and a preponderance of "post-Jutland" type of craft over all nations.

Italy, although indicating her disapproval of such a program, is said to have told the arms conference that if France constructed ten such ships Italy must do the same.

The British spokesman said that if the French proposals were acceded to it would "throw out the whole of the naval reduction program."

DANES PLANNED SEIZE CASTLE

* TWELVE CLUBS LOSE LICENSES AT VANCOUVER * VICTORIA, Dec. 16.— * There have been vigorous prosecutions by the provincial authorities for infraction of the liquor laws and following convictions the club licenses of twelve Vancouver clubs * have been cancelled by the government.

DAYS FOLLOWING CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR ARE HOLIDAYS

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—Owing to Christmas and New Year's day falling on Sunday this year, it is expected the Monday following each will be officially declared public holidays. An official announcement is likely to be made within a day or two. It probably would have been made ere this had it not been for the political mixup.

AUSTRALIA PLANS TO SEND QUANTITY OF MEAT TO RUSSIANS

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Premier Hughes of Australia is endeavoring to arrange to send £50,000 worth of meat as Australia's contribution to the Russian famine fund.

Bonar Law and Asquith Support Irish Treaty: Craig Strong Against

LONDON, Dec. 16 (noon).—Both Houses of Parliament ratified the treaty granting the Irish Free State by overwhelming majorities. The House of Commons adopted the reply to the speech from the throne, rejecting the Unionist amendment to the address by a vote of 401 to 58. The House of Lords took similar action a few minutes later, the Unionist amendment being rejected by a vote of 166 to 47.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—The surprise of the day in the Irish debate was Right Hon. Bonar Law's unexpected speech supporting the Irish treaty. The Ulsterite "die-hard" had depended on his support or at least on his neutrality.

Mr. Law discussed the treaty at some length, stating his fears that the treaty would not safeguard the interests of Britishers and the people of Ulster had proved groundless.

Former Premier Asquith, leader of the Liberal opposition in the House of Commons, spoke frequently in support of the treaty as did also Right Hon. Winston Churchill.

Lord Londonderry in the House of Lords denounced the treaty "heartily."

Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, is en route to London after writing Premier Lloyd George stating that the Government had broken its promise of safeguarding Ulster interests and of not coercing her into an agreement. His claims that Ulster has been dragged into the Anglo-Irish pact without being consulted.

MUCH HALIBUT ARRIVED TODAY

Seven Large Schooners With Catch of 340,000 Pounds Sold at Exchange This Morning

Seven large schooners, with a total of 340,000 pounds of halibut, the largest list for one day since the first of the month, sold their catches at the Fish Exchange this morning. The average price was 9c and 1c. Most of the fish will be sent to the eastern market, and there are plenty of fish refrigerator cars on hand. The schooners are not remaining in port for the holiday season but will clear again for the banks as soon as the fish have been discharged and supplies taken on.

BOLSHEVIKS PAY POLAND

Special Train With Fifty Million Marks Jewels Reaches Warsaw.

WARSAW, Dec. 16.—Gold and jewels estimated to be worth 50 billion Polish marks, the first payment of the Russian Soviet to Poland under the treaty of peace signed in Riga last March, have arrived here. They came on a special train and the diamonds, rubies, precious stones and gold bars filled one hundred cases.

DUGGAN AGAIN ELECTED MAYOR

Chosen by Huge Majority Over Alderman W. C. McArthur by Edmonton People.

D. M. Duggan is again mayor of Edmonton. He was elected by a huge majority, the figures being: Duggan 7,949; McArthur 3,227; Stimmel 255.

The aldermen elected were: Colonel C. V. Weaver 5,804; Ald. Jas. East 4,968; T. P. Malone 4,684; A. U. G. Bury 4,671; K. A. Blatchford 4,282; Mrs. W. J. Ross 3,311; Bickerton Pratt 3,256.

The vote was small this year only 10,500 voting for mayor as against 14,500 last year.

AMERICAN POACHERS WERE CONFISCATED TO BRITISH CROWN

VANCOUVER, Dec. 16.—Three United States fishing vessels, Grace-156, K-182, and Loveday K-156 were ordered forfeited to the crown yesterday by Mr. Justice MacIn, sitting as a judge in admiralty. The boats were seized by the Malaspina last July when caught fishing within the Canadian three mile limit. They will be sold by auction on behalf of the department of fisheries.

SNIPING IS BEING RENEWED IN BELFAST

One Man Dies—Another Wounded—Shop Wrecked With Bomb.

BELFAST, Dec. 16.—Sniping was renewed in the vicinity of Marrowbones and York streets on Wednesday night. One man was wounded in Tuesday's shooting, died yesterday.

King Will Get Good Support

The intimation received yesterday in regard to the member for Comox-Alin and his attitude toward the Mackenzie King administration is in line with what The Daily News has stated from the first. He was backed by the Liberals and undoubtedly elected by them and it is logical that he should support them. In a community where a candidate was backed by the Conservatives it would be expected he would incline to the Conservative side after election if he wished to represent the people who elected him. No announcement is likely to be made of the new cabinet until Mr. Meighen has resigned. Like other Conservatives, he holds on to the last, feeling doubtless that he has been deprived of a rightful privilege. So it was in this province after the general election when the Oliver Government was returned. Mr. Bowser then clung to office until the last moment. The Turner Government years ago was ignominiously dismissed by the Lieutenant-Governor for a similar delay.

Cannot Sell Liquor With Impunity

The Provincial Government is to be congratulated on its prompt action in cancelling the licenses of those clubs which contravened the liquor act. All sorts of efforts are being made to get around the act and nullify its effect. The clubs were warned that action would be taken and that they could not legally operate. The result was the natural sequence of their action. When the people voted for liquor control there was no intention of permitting retail selling, and if the matter were put up to them today we believe the result would be the same. The Liquor Control Act will work out well if the dealers and brewers will co-operate and not try to get around the law. If it is found that the present act is nullified and made of no effect by the efforts of certain parties to break it, the only recourse will be a renewed agitation for complete prohibition. It will come some day, but it will come much quicker if the control laws are not kept.

Powers Agree on Navy Limitation

Not only have the powers agreed on the principle of naval limitation but they have also agreed on the detail of carrying out the principle. The conference at Washington has exceeded all expectations in its successful dealing with the armament craze. There will yet be difficulties in the working out of the scheme and there will be some suspicion and possibly efforts to obey the letter without the spirit of the treaty. Human nature has not changed even though there has been an agreement that armaments are not beneficial.

In giving up the building of warships there will naturally be some dissatisfaction at the yards where the shipbuilding business has been carried on. There will have to be state efforts in the old country to divert the energies of the country in other directions. Ships are not needed at present, but other things are needed, and if there is a revival of general business, the situation will soon right itself.

In every country there is plenty of scope for the energies of the people. The building of roads, development of electric energy and all sorts of public works are needed. Instead of spending money on instruments of destruction we shall have to spend it on things which make for human development and happiness.

Canadian Lumber in the Orient

Says the Bank of Commerce monthly commercial letter: Logging is more active, owing to reduced stocks and firmer prices. The improvement noticeable in the demand for lumber is evidenced by the fact that at Vancouver, early in November, the export orders on hand were sufficient to keep the mills fully occupied until the end of the year, beyond which time the operators are unwilling to make contracts, apparently for fear of a rising market. Exports of lumber from British Columbia for the first nine months of the year amounted to 106,000,000 feet, of which Japan took 65,000,000 feet. The latter country, according to trade advices, is likely to provide a large and permanent market for certain classes and sizes of lumber, in manufacturing which a residue of yard stock is left to be disposed of locally. China has also recently come on the market for Canadian lumber.

Matter Will Be Taken Up Later By Rotary Club With View to Accomplishment.

CHILD HYGIENE WAS UNDER DISCUSSION

Vancouver Island Council Formed with Comox M.P. as President.

Victoria, Dec. 14.—The Vancouver Island Child Hygiene Council was formed here at a meeting of delegates from Women's Institutes throughout the island and representatives of all organizations interested in child welfare and public health, which took place in the board room, Belmont House. There were over thirty delegates present.

Rev. Thomas Menzies, M.P.P. for Comox, who presided, was chosen president of the council by acclamation. In acknowledging the honor, Mr. Menzies spoke of the necessary work that the council could do to improve the health of the children and the communities in which they lived. He urged every member to work earnestly to secure the co-operation and support of all who considered that present health conditions could be improved.

THREE YEARS AND TWENTY LASHES FOR BREAKING INTO HOUSE

WINNIPEG, Dec. 15.—Three years in the penitentiary and 20 lashes was the sentence imposed upon Joe Duitch by Mr. Justice A. C. Galt in the assize court. Duitch will be given ten lashes on each of two occasions under the supervision of a medical officer.

He was found guilty of breaking into the home of John Kozar, 765 Aberdeen Avenue, Oct. 1, and stealing \$21.

Evidence stated Duitch ordered Kozar back to bed and threatened him with a revolver when he was found rifling Kozar's pockets. Accused will be tried today on another indictment.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

LAND PROBLEMS ARE DISCUSSED

G. R. Naden Told Rotary Club Some of the Problems of His Department.

SURVEYS ARE NEEDED

Small Salaries in Department Cause Loss of Many of the Best Men.

Some of the problems with which the Lands Department has to deal were outlined by G. R. Naden at yesterday's luncheon of the Rotary Club. He told of the lack of knowledge of such an immense country and of the difficulty in securing funds to pay salaries which would compare with private enterprises.

Mr. Naden said there were three sub-departments in their department. There were the lands, forests, water and surveys. They had on the staff something like 250 permanent employees and twice that number in the summer.

One of the first big problems with which they were faced was the need of taking stock. In connection with this there should be a land classification scheme to find out not only how much land they had and know what was its value, but also what kind of crop it was suited for. They should know whether the land was useful for farming, timber growing, grazing, mining, purposes or just for scenic purposes as an attraction to tourists. A scientific policy of land classification was desirable, but not immediately possible for they had 250,000 square miles of land in the province, most of which is more or less settled.

Old Policy and New.

Under the old policy it was possible for a man to settle anywhere. All he had to do was to stake the land and apply for a record, which was given him. Then the next step was to apply to the Provincial Government for a road. The result was that the roads cost the districts more than the total output of farm produce would amount to in 25 years. This it would be plainly seen was not a good thing. One of the matters they had had to deal with was the prevention of settlement before a survey was made. They had already made a start in the right direction.

Another policy they had adopted was that no land should be surveyed unless they were reasonably sure a man could make a living from it. Under the old system much of the land had been surveyed by contract and the surveyors had tried to cover as much of the easily accessible lands as possible.

They tried to survey the land where the settlements would be large enough to enable the erection of schools and churches and other community conveniences.

Must Have Survey.

It was found that not only was it necessary to survey the land into blocks but a contour survey was necessary and also a survey by agricultural experts. This meant a big expense. So much information was needed but there was not enough money for the purpose. They had to fight for appropriations for reimbursement of the unalienated timber and in this there was necessarily much guess work. It was impossible to outline a forestry policy if it was not known how much timber they had.

To take a specific instance, at Ocean Falls there was a plant that cost \$15,000,000 and the company was supposed to get a

thirty year supply of timber but so far it had not that much. If they had a thirty year supply and then had to scrap the plant it meant that in order to provide a sinking fund it would cost the company half a million dollars a year, all of which would have to be taken from profits. This meant an immense drain and yet it was necessary if the plant could work only thirty years.

Big Business.
 Instead of having the estimates cut down in his department, there should really be a capital of a million dollars provided to take stock. This could then be followed by a policy of development. It would take many years to get sufficient money to complete this stock taking. The forest branch had an income of about \$3,000,000 a year so it could be seen that it was a big thing and should be properly looked after.

There would be no difficulty in getting good work if they could pay good salaries but the Legislature would not stand for big salaries. Instead of a four thousand dollar man for chief forester they should have a twenty-five thousand dollar man. The department was badly handicapped because of this matter of low salaries. Any private enterprise would pay a man what he was worth.

Mr. Naden then spoke of the grazing policy of the Government. They had called in an expert from the United States and had got the cattle and sheepmen together and the expert had addressed them. As a result the stockmen had agreed on a line of policy they wanted carried out and there was no difficulty in getting the legislation through the House. As a result they would be able to keep twice or three times as many cattle and sheep on the same amount of land.

The deputy minister said the department was honestly trying to develop the resources of the province on commonsense lines. They were trying to administer it in the best interests of the people and knew nothing about the political side of it.

At the conclusion Mr. Naden was thanked by President Duby for his interesting address.

BANK RESPONSIBLE FOR ENDORSED CHEQUE

Even if Payable to Bearer Signature on Back Changes Effect.

HAMILTON, Ont., Dec. 16.—An interesting cheque case was decided in the division court. J. J. Hunt, a lawyer, received a Bank of Commerce cheque some time ago for one of his clients for \$32.50, made to himself or bearer. Mr. Hunt endorsed the cheque, made it payable to his client's order, and sent it to his client, but it was lost, and the person who found it cashed it at a branch office of the Bank of Hamilton. Mr. Hunt's client and the person who signed the cheque were given judgment today.

The bank's contention was that a bearer cheque could always be paid to bearer, no matter what the restrictions or endorsements, but Mr. Hunt showed that the banking act had been amended in 1906 so that restriction could be placed on a bearer cheque, and judgment was given against the bank.

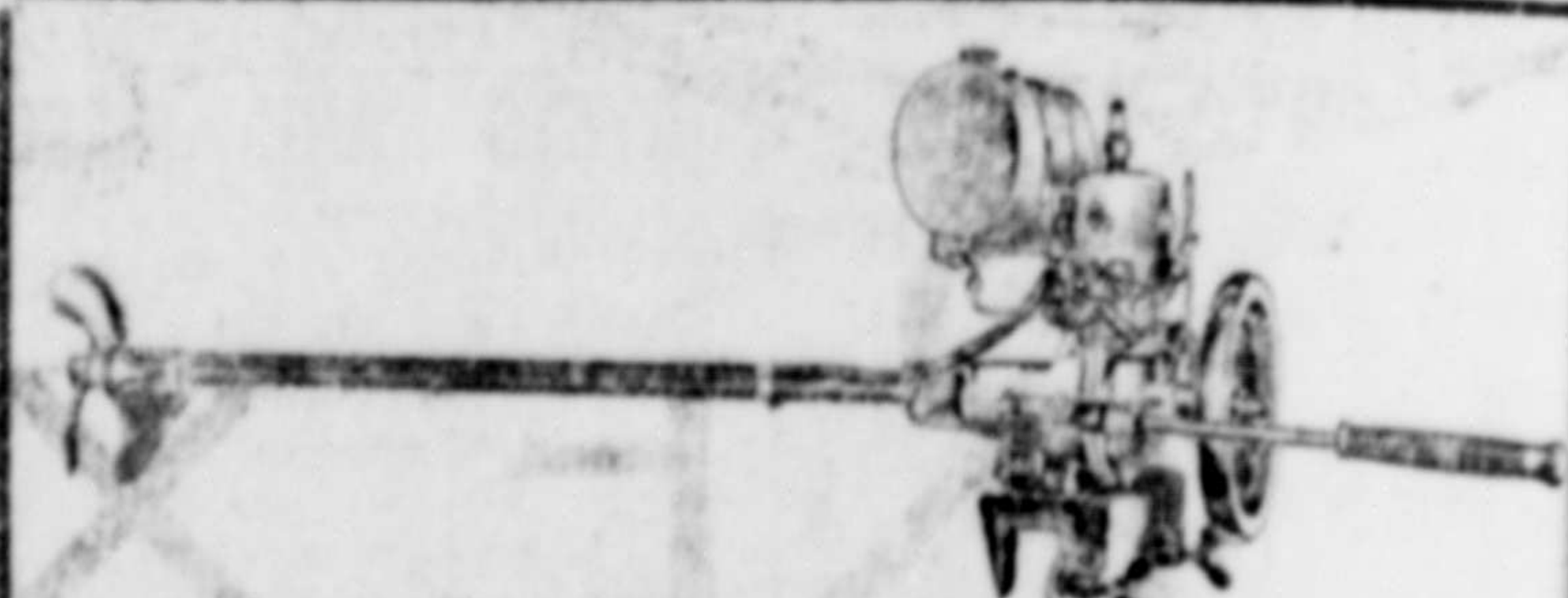

ASSIZE HEARING IS NOW NEARING END

Judgment in Ketchum vs. Babington Case Given Yesterday in Favor of Defendant.

The case of William Norman and Lewis T. Yig vs. the Anglo-British Columbia Packing Co., in which plaintiff claims damages amounting to \$3013.75 through the failure of defendant to accept delivery of fish, was commenced at the Supreme Court Assizes before Mr. Justice Macdonald and is proceeding today.

The case of C. G. Ketchum vs. H. B. Babington, in which the plaintiff claimed \$5000 damages through the defendant not observing a contract, was dismissed yesterday afternoon by the judge following a long oral address on the case. He said he believed the plaintiff actually thought he had a contract but there really was none. The plaintiff will be required to pay the costs of the case. B. O. Oughton, of Fisher & Oughton, appeared for the plaintiff and T. H. Hooper for the defendant.

There are a number of minor cases, including divorces, coming up this afternoon and it is expected that the sessions of the Assizes will be finished late this afternoon. Mr. Justice Macdonald and his stenographer, D. F. Saunders, expect to return to Vancouver by the Princess Mary tonight.

SAVE TOLSTOI HOUSE FOR A UNIVERSITY

YASNAYA, POLYANA, Russia, Dec. 16.—Miss Alexandra Tolstoy the favorite daughter of Count Leo Tolstoy, the novelist and chief literary figure in Russia during the half century preceding his death in 1910, is the leader of the movement to save the great writer's home from ruin and to make here on the estate a popular university where lovers of Tolstoy's writings and creed may come study and even settle indefinitely.

FOUND DEAD THROAT CUT

John M. Harrington, of Empress Hotel, Committed Suicide Yesterday Morning.

With his throat cut from ear to ear, John M. Harrington, of the Empress Hotel, was found dead on the floor of his room in the hotel yesterday afternoon by the city police. The deceased apparently came to his death through suicide and Coroner J. D. McMullin decided that was the case at an inquiry which he held yesterday afternoon. No inquest was deemed necessary. The remains are in the hands of Towner Bros., undertakers.

At 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon George Ross, manager of the Empress Hotel, telephoned to the city police station saying that he suspected something had happened to Harrington. He had knocked on the door and there had been no reply. The door was locked on the inside. A man named Turner had been seen to climb the fire-escape and look through the window and had reported that a man was lying on the floor in the room.

Lying on Floor.

Warden Bailey and Constable Logan went to the scene and finding it impossible to open the door sent a man named Dunn to climb through the window and unlock the door from the inside. This being done the officers entered and found the man lying on the floor with his feet to the window and his head towards the door. He was recognized by Warden Bailey as Harrington. His throat was cut practically from ear to ear and behind him was a vessel half full of blood. On the dressing table near the window and about three paces away was found a partly opened razor covered with blood. There was blood on the cloth of the table and on the floor leading from it to where the man had fallen, apparently having leaped over the vessel until he dropped.

Death Earlier.

The officers took possession of the body and immediately notified Dr. J. P. Cade, medical health officer, and J. H. McMullin, coroner. The doctor stated that death must have taken place some hours previous for the body was stiff.

Search was made through the effects of the unfortunate man and the only clue that was found towards establishing the location of friends or relatives was a letter addressed to M. Lloyd, San Francisco. A telegram was immediately despatched to his address with a view to locating relatives.

Harrington was quite well-known in the city and had been connected as an employee with the Empress Hotel for some four years having managed the place for a few weeks. He was also bartender before the enactment of the Moderation Act. He came to Prince Rupert from the Alton country. He was about 41 years of age and is believed to have been of Irish origin.

HOW RUSSIA SPENDS CASH

Millions on Payroll and Fads in Educational System.

MOSCOW, Dec. 15.—(Staff correspondent of Associated Press).—There are 7,000,000 on the Russian government's civil payroll, says a report just made by Yourey Larin, the former Social Revolutionist leader and chairman of a committee selected by the Central government to reduce the number of institutions supported by the government and to eliminate unnecessary bureaus.

Karl Radek, Bolshevik leader, stated in a recent article that the strength of the Soviet army is 5,000,000 men. The size of the navy is not known.

Granting that the figures of Radek and Larin are correct the Bolshevik government has at least 12,000,000 persons on its civil and military payrolls, or one person out of every ten in what constitutes Soviet Russia.

In the civil list 2,970,000 persons are engaged in industries, according to Larin's statement and 1,500,000 are in transport service. The employees in government offices and institutions number 2,100,000. Timber work

and farm work under government control employ 100,000.

Sweeping Reductions.

Larin says the most sweeping reductions will be made in the Department of Education which is headed by Lunacharsky and has 1,200,000 employees. At least one-third of these will be discharged. Teachers in the ordinary schools will be unaffected but Larin says his commission intends to lop off all sorts of museums, dramatic academies, dancing studios and various side institutions which, he declares, are sponging the life from the educational system and squandering money which should be devoted to strengthening free schools and paying better salaries to teachers of ordinary subjects.

By reducing the number of employees, an public payrolls, Larin says it will be the purpose of his commission to afford more food for the workers in essential industries which have starved to support superfluous and faddish institutions.

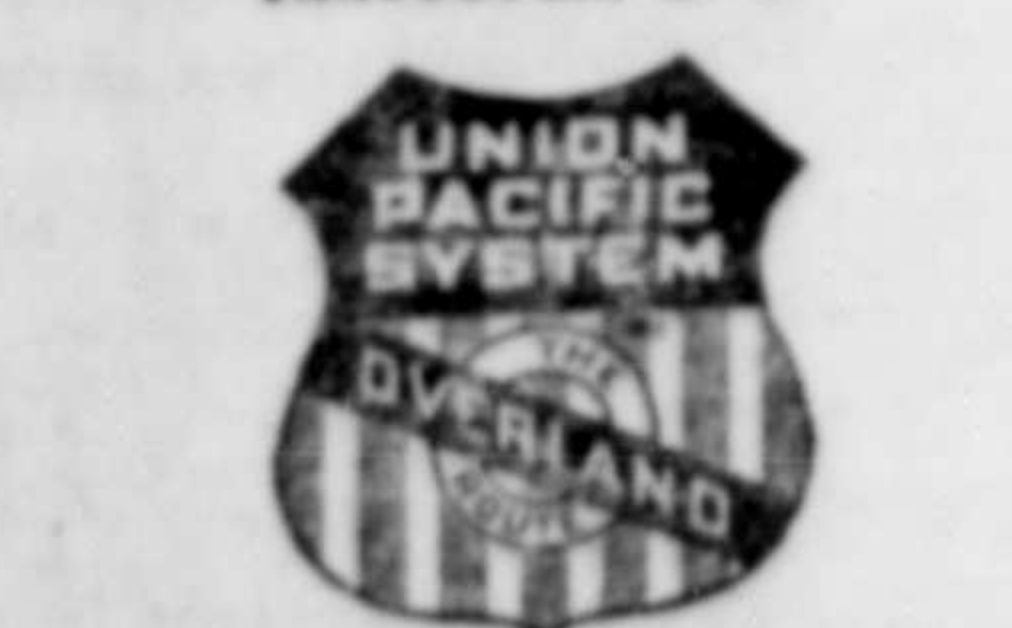

AMAZON ARMY DRIVES MINERS FROM WORKING

Threw Red Pepper, Bricks and Stones and Acted Like Tigresses.

TOPEKA, KANSAS, Dec. 16.—The Grand correspondent tells of riots in the coal fields near that city. An "Amazon army," throwing red pepper, bricks, stones and lumps of coal, swept through the southern Kansas coal fields, mobbing five mines and forcing miners to quit work. Skirts and shawls flying, the women, wives and relatives of "rump" strikers, swept down upon the mines and in to any instances put miners to flight with their fists.

Fiercely, like tigresses, the women clawed and in some instances used their teeth on miners who failed to heed their warning cries of "Get out of here, you dirty traitors."

Several miners were bruised by missiles, others were almost blinded by the shower of red pepper. Between three and four hundred men working at the mines were driven from the shafts by the fierce onslaught of the women who shouted threats, sang, and used bricks and stones effectively whenever a miner was reluctant about dropping his tools.

Men Watch Wives Hundreds of strikers, husbands and relatives of the women, watched the attacks, warning the working miners not to "hit or shoot back."

The women mobilized before dawn at Franklin and other "radical" mine centres. They were organized in three groups under three leaders. Each group of from between 100 to 500 militant feminine fighters, waving fists, descended upon the miners. Sheriff Gould and his deputies were powerless to stop the onslaught on the mines, where as a rule miners dropped their dinner pails and tools and fled. At Gould's office today it was said

no extra deputies would be sworn in in an effort to stop the attacks, as "You can't get men to go into this sort of thing."

That state troops may be asked for or called out was also regarded as doubtful. Any attempt of a body of men to stop the militant women would bring onslaughts from husbands and fathers in force, with bloodshed, it was feared.

Strikers Jubilant "Rump" miners who are striking because Alexander Howat, Kansas mine chief, who has been ousted from the United Mine Workers of America for refusing to halt outlaw strikes, is in jail for violating the Kansas industrial court, were jubilant over the success of the women in keeping men from work.

The women are counted on to stop work in every mine in the Pittsburg district, it was openly declared. Provisional mine union district headquarters set up by International President Lewis when Howat was ousted estimated that about fifty per cent of the 12,000 miners in the district had returned to work before the women started marching.

KING OF DENMARK IS DECEIVED BY CONVICT

LONDON, Dec. 15.—An amusing story of the King of Denmark's recent visit to Greenland, was recently told by M. Aagaard, of the Danish legation, to members of the Danish Club in London.

As the royal yacht was approaching Greenland a dark speck became visible on the open sea. It proved to be a solitary Eskimo in his little kayak (native canoe). The Eskimo came on board and his loyalty in having braved the perils of the sea in such a frail craft assured him, needless to say, the warmest welcomes. BUFFALO HERD IS VERY VALUABLE NOW

Robes Worth \$100 Apiece and Heads More Valuable Still.

WAINWRIGHT, Dec. 15.—With the buffalo in the government park numbering more than 5000, and with prospects of the herd, now the largest in the world, eventually outgrowing the 100,000 acre park, the Canadian Government is seeking ways to commercialize the surplus animals.

There is an excellent market for buffalo meat. All the buffalo the government cares to kill can be sold at fine prices in both Canada and the United States. Some of the surplus bulls, it is said, will be killed this winter for the market.

Buffalo robes, the Dominion park commission says, command a price of \$100 apiece. They are remarkably durable, and even with the hardest service will last for years. Buffalo robes were in common use fifty years ago when the remnants of the once great herds were still in existence. Now with the source cut off by the almost complete extermination of the bison, they are rarely seen.

Market for Heads. Mounted heads sell for \$125 to \$250. The latter price was obtained for several recently in Montreal. If several hundred buffalo are killed annually, however, the head market will soon become over-stocked.

Experiments have been made in tanning buffalo hides. This may be developed, it is thought, into an important industry, as the leather is tough, pliable and, it is claimed, practically waterproof. The wool which the animals shed every spring has been manufactured into a strong cloth fabric which has industrial possibilities, although of a restricted kind. The wool is gathered up from about the park but it is believed it may be practicable to shear the buffalo annually like sheep.

Wainwright Park is in the heart of a region once roamed by trappers of the Hudson's Bay Company, now selling the last remaining lands of its old empire to farm settlers. The park was stocked twelve years ago with 210 animals purchased in Montana from Michael Pablo, a Flathead Indian.
