New Plans for Station Are Discussed

J. BOWSER ATTACKS GOVERNMENT FOR EXTRAVAGANCE IN SALARIES

New Station to be Handsome Brick Building on City Side of Track with Approaches

council of the Board of Trade was called together yesterday in response to a request from President Hanna of the National Railways who wanted to know which side of the track they would like to have the station built. President Orme brought in a plan of the yards and explained the difficulties of putting the station on the wharf side, it would be more convenient there for the steamships. After some discussion it was decided to recommend to Mr. Bowser that the building go on the side opposite from the wharf. A telegram was sent advising the president of the railway of the decision.

The station is to be 99 ft. by 10 ft. wide, two storeys of brick construction, a single unit to which can be made as required and devoted wholly to station uses.

A present driveway to the station will be done away with and approach will be from a front of the present railings, formerly the G. T. P. of passengers will reach a corner of the station by a covered way from that. The driveway will slope at a convenient grade.

Board of Trade asked a telegram to Mr. Hanna that a passageway in front of wholesale warehouses be made as far as Wayne Place, at the foot of Sixth Street would give a direct route of the holds of the city, and that the new station be a pretty little building able accommodation for needs, and as it is to be in such a way that it can be easily added to a addition to the permanent buildings of the city.

BALLANTYNE CANNOT SEE DELEGATES

Minister is ill at Montreal But McCaffery Remaining at Ottawa.

VANCOUVER, March 23.—(Special) — W. E. Hodges, liquidator for the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., has received a telegram from M. P. McCaffery at Ottawa saying that Hon. C. C. Ballantyne is ill at Montreal and this is delaying negotiations in connection with the Government taking over the equipment from the creditors.

Mr. McCaffery is remaining in the east but McIlroy is likely to return soon without seeing the minister owing to pressure of private business here.

RODE SINK FEINERS OFF WITH SHOTGUNS

Brothers Were Besieged in Their House by Two Hundred.

BELFAST, March 23.—Two brothers named McLean were besieged in their house by 200 Sinn Feiners. The besieged drove off the attackers with shotguns.

IRISH POLICY

Attack to be Made on Government Today by Labor and Liberal.

LONDON, March 23.—Independent Liberals and Laborites expected to make an attack upon the Government's Irish policy today in the House of Commons. Lloyd George, it is said, is prepared to reply to addresses by Asquith and Clynes.

FINANCIAL RELIEF FOR MUNICIPALITIES

VICTORIA, March 23.—Representatives of the Union of B. C. Municipalities met the members of the Legislature last night and placed before them their case for financial relief of municipalities. As a result Premier Oliver promised that the cabinet would meet the representatives again on Saturday morning.

SIX CARS SOON GO EAST AGAIN

Were Not Quite Sufficient to Fill Demands This Morning's Arrivals.

Six cars arriving last night from the east for the local fishing business are being filled up today with six carloads of fish bought at the Exchange by the various companies this morning. There are no others on hand and none reported as yet. All the boats selling today were accommodated by these cars with the exception of one Mars, with 14,000 lbs. The following were the arrivals and sales:

Venus, 6,000 pounds, and Taftosch, 24,000 pounds, to the Pacific Fisheries at 10.2c and 5c.

National, 18,000 pounds; H. & R., 5,000 pounds, and Ellen, 3,000 pounds, to the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Co. at 10.3c and 5c.

Democrat, 46,000 pounds; Fremont, 4,000 pounds, and Helena, 9,000 pounds, to the Pacific Sea Products Association at 10.2c and 5c.

Albatross, 47,000 pounds, and Spencer, 10,000 pounds, to the Royal Fish Co. at 10.5c and 5c.

Orient, 24,000 pounds, and Catolen, 6,000 pounds, to the Pacific Sea Products Association at 9.6c and 5c.

Lansing, 10,000 pounds; M. & S., 4,000 pounds, and Fanny F., 1,000 pounds to the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Co. at 10.2c and 5c.

The first salmon to be sold at the Exchange this season arrived on the Skeena Gt. Twenty-seven red springs of 18.5c each, and 10 whites at 5c were sold to the Pacific Fisheries.

GENERAL STRIKE IN SECTION OF GERMANY

Communists Give Ultimatum that Troops First be Withdrawn.

LONDON, March 23.—A general strike has started in the industrial district around Halle, Germany, a strong communist stronghold, with chemical, nitrate and power works.

There has been violence but the president of the district has received a communist ultimatum that troops must be withdrawn from the district.

Government Refuses to Produce Documents in Regard to C. N. Railways

OTTAWA, March 23.—A motion submitted by W. L. MacKenzie King asking for the production of all reports, correspondence and accounts in connection with the administration of the Canadian National Railways was defeated in the House of Commons by a vote of 117 to 79.

Premier Meighen objected to the production of the documents, arguing that their publication would place the government railways under a handicap with competitors who continue to handle the business secretly.

The opposition motion was technically a motion of no-confidence in the Government.

GERMANY SAYS WILL NOT PAY BILLION MARKS

PARIS, March 23.—Germany has replied to the recent ultimatum of the allied reparations commission to pay one billion marks in gold due on May 1.

TELEGRAPH WIRES ARE CUT IN IRELAND AND SHOOTINGS CONTINUE

BELFAST, March 23.—Telegraph wires between Belfast and Dublin have been cut, the authorities believe in preparation for possible Sinn Fein activity during Easter week.

Two brothers named Skelton, both ex-soldiers, were taken from their homes near Enniscorthy and shot. Their bodies were labelled "spies."

ELIMINATE FRiction

James Ramsay, M. P. P. for Vancouver, Would Have Council Represented on School Board.

VICTORIA, March 23.—With the idea of eliminating the friction which now prevails between the city councils and school boards all over British Columbia, James Ramsay of Vancouver suggested to the municipal committee of the Legislature and the Executive of the Union of B. C. Municipalities that two members from each city council sit on the school boards. In this way the two bodies might work together more harmoniously.

The idea was favored by President Loutit of the Union of Municipalities.

NEW BANK MANAGER

Mr. and Mrs. S. J. McLeod and three children arrived today on the Prince George from Winnipeg and will take up residence in the S. M. Newton residence on Fifth Avenue East. Mr. McLeod is the new manager of the Royal Bank.

Ruination Picture Drawn by Bowser Criticizing Finances

VICTORIA, March 23.—Criticism of the Provincial Government for what he charged was its failure to come to the aid of the municipalities was voiced by W. J. Bowser in the Legislature yesterday, as his contribution to the budget debate.

Mr. Bowser declared that nothing in the way of real relief had been granted. He condemned the system of introducing lump sum votes into the budget thereby, concealing the intention of the Government regarding expenditures. About one quarter of the total expenditure for the coming year figured in lump sums, he said.

Mr. Bowser claimed that the Government had been spending money recklessly and said that there was a two million dollar increase in the salary list this year which was unnecessary. He declared that municipal assistance was demanded by 90 per cent of the people of the province.

Referring to the increasing cost of education, Mr. Bowser said the old rate of a \$10 grant to teachers per capita. He closed his speech by saying that unless something was done to curb expenditures, the province would naturally drift into financial chaos with increasing taxation in sight next year and a dark outlook for the future.

WOULD TAKE RAILWAYS

British Labor Leader Introduces Motion in Parliament for Transfer.

LONDON, March 23.—J. H. Thomas, president of the railwaymen's union, introduced into the House of Commons yesterday a bill to provide for the transfer of the railways of Great Britain to the ministry of transports with a view to making them the property of the Government.

PRINCE OF WALES INSPECTED CHAIR

Visited Parliament Especially to See Present Coming to Canada.

LONDON, March 23.—The Prince of Wales visited the House of Parliament yesterday to inspect the replica of the speaker's chair which is to be presented to the Canadian House of Commons by the Empire Parliamentary Association, United Kingdom branch.

AUSTEN CHAMBERLAIN RESIGNS PORTFOLIO

LONDON, March 23.—Austen Chamberlain, new Government leader in the House of Commons, has relinquished his position as Chancellor of the Exchequer in the cabinet.

SOVIET WISHES TO TRADE WITH STATES

LONDON, March 23.—The Russian Soviet Government has appealed to the United States to resume trade relations with Russia. This follows the opening of trade relations with Britain.

DRAFT EVADER FIGHTS BACK

Secures Imprisonment in Germany of Men Who Tried to Arrest Him.

MORSBACH, Baden, March 23.—Carl Neuf and Franz Simmer, American detectives, have each been sentenced to prison terms by the German criminal court for illegal assumption of the power of attempting to arrest and abduct Grover C. Bergdolt, an American draft evader, in Eberbach last January. The former gets 15 months and Simmer six.

FRANCE STANDS WITH POLAND

Proposal to Partition Disputed Territory Meets With Favor.

PARIS, March 23.—The proposal that the districts of southeastern Poland which voted in favor of Polish control should become Polish territory is receiving general support here.

Of southeastern Poland, five districts voted to join Poland, two to join Germany and one is still in doubt.

ASK TIME TO SUBMIT TENDER

Board of Trade Request Extension on Court House Until May 1.

The council of the Board of Trade last night wired the minister of public works asking for an extension of time for the submission of tenders for the new court house until May 1. It was stated at the meeting that there were several firms that would wish to tender but only one set of plans was available. These were already out. Accordingly the minister is being asked for additional sets of plans.

The building is an elaborate one and the work of tendering, it was pointed out, is quite heavy and expensive. It is estimated that it would take a month to submit a complete tender.

The resolution asking for delay was moved by John Dylbahn and seconded by D. G. Stewart and carried unanimously.

EXPEL GERMANS.

PARIS, March 23.—The expulsion of nearly 400 undesirable Germans residing in Strasbourg has been decided upon.

Must Prepare Soon
For Season of Sport.

It is now time to begin preparations for the summer sports. Yesterday's warm sunshine brought out many ball players with their gloves and balls hardening their hands a little in preparation for the early games. Announcement has been made of a football match for Friday and from now on, whenever the weather is suitable, there will be young people enjoying outdoor sports and games.

With the shipbuilding proceeding apace and with the opening up of other work in the early spring, there should be no difficulty in getting a number of teams in every line of sport and the summer games should, as a result, be just as successful as those of the past winter.

Austen Chamberlain
Leader of Commons.

The appointment of Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain as leader of the House of Commons in Great Britain is significant of the trend of the times. Chamberlain is a commoner without any signs of blue blood in his veins. His father made his money from manufacturing screws at Birmingham and for many years had strong radical tendencies. His son Austen is 58 years of age and has for many years been one of the leaders of the Unionist party. Latterly he has held the position of Chancellor of the exchequer under Lloyd George, a position he held also from 1903 to 1905. He has held other important cabinet positions such as civil lord of the admiralty, financial secretary to the treasury, postmaster general and secretary of state for India.

Austen Chamberlain resembles his father in personal appearance and he also affects a monocle, a habit which rather sets him apart from the common people and tends to harm him in his political career. He is, however, an able man and should make a mark in his present position, which is acknowledged to be the most difficult in the Government of the day.

All Anxious for
Work to Proceed.

All are anxious for work on the new government buildings to proceed as quickly as possible, but time must be given for the contractors to make up their figures. Undoubtedly the rushing of the contract was a departmental error, for it is evident to everyone that tenders could not be made up in ten days on a building as large and complex as that to be erected here. Some opponents of the present administration fancy they see in it an attempt to do slight of hand work but in this they are undoubtedly mistaken. The Board of Trade has taken the matter up and it will certainly be righted as soon as attention is drawn to it.

The work on the court house will be most important and will give quite a flip to building here this year. It, along with the new school building, will make for stability, and will show those who may have been hanging back, that this is really an important centre and that it will be in order to build for the future.

Daylight Saving
Being Adopted.

Daylight saving is being adopted by many of the cities of Canada in order to get in line with the railways which have decided to adopt the scheme. In Prince Rupert those who are interested in sport would like to have the clocks put forward a hour in order that matches might be played in the evening. Others argue that in this northern latitude there is enough daylight anyway and if the clocks are put forward, the children lose much of the sleep which should be theirs.

We are inclined to favor daylight saving, but it is a debatable point and is worthy of careful consideration before being adopted.

In the Letter Box

LIQUOR QUESTION.

Editor Daily News:-

In respect to the use of liquor, the world seems to swing from one extreme to another, consequently those who wish the enactment of a so-called bone dry law could employ no better method for attaining this end than by advocating the free use of liquor and without proper restrictions.

In the recent plebiscite the alternative to prohibition contained what seemed to be two distinct conditions—government control and sale in sealed packages. Government control now seems to mean anything that suits the purpose of the party interested, and it looks as though this time it did not find its way into the proposals inadvertently. The sealed package was an unknown quantity and the sale of liquor for profit was not hinted at before the election.

Outside Pale.

There is no doubt many took it for granted that the sale of intoxicants would be by the government only, in sealed packages, and without profit, except that sufficient to carry on the operation and enforcement of the act. Along such lines it might be considered a temperance measure, but when the element of profit is added, which virtually means a lack of proper restrictions and pushing the sale thereof, it can then be placed outside the pale of moderation.

The sale of liquor in sealed packages only, containing a quart or more, must fail because such practices disregard the most essential principle of temperance, namely, placing in the hands of the individual at any one time a quantity not in excess of that which he can properly control, and it is a well understood fact that many persons could not come into possession of a quart of liquor without becoming the victim of an uncontrollable appetite. Yet this is exactly what sale in sealed packages only means. The vote against prohibition cannot be construed to mean a repudiation of the principles of temperance, yet many proceed on this theory.

Source of Misery.

The bottle has in the past been the most fruitful source of misery—today, and nothing better can be expected in the future. It has broken the back of prohibition and is likely to destroy the Liquor Control Act, and perhaps its supporters.

Knowing, then, that the bottle contains a greater amount of liquor than many persons should be in possession of at any one time, there is only one practical method to pursue, that is, to limit the quantity to one glass at a time, and to require that the person be free from the influence of liquor and alone, in order to obtain it.

One Glass at Time.

The advantage of this plan can be easily seen as it could be practically applied, without the aid of freakish and unjust enforcement clauses, which have only one effect—that of disgusting the people and thereby rendering the act inoperative, because of no voluntary evidence being forthcoming. A government could at once exercise the exclusive right of sale irrespective of the importation problem and, from the standpoint of profit, would be more successful than by selling in sealed packages; and, as a comparison, it might be asked whether it would be more conducive to the cause of temperance to sell one glass at a time, than twenty or perhaps thirty enclosed in packages.

Discriminate.

But even in bone dry communities the sale of liquor in packages is resorted to, as it would have to be here in a limited sense for there are also many persons who are perfectly safe with the package, and such should not be denied this privilege, but the discrimination should be by reason of habit and ability to control the appetite, yet this method of sale should be discouraged as much as possible and no profit should be extracted therefrom, so as to make it possible to undersell the imported goods, thereby solving the problem of importation to a great extent. The amount sold under this plan should not exceed ten per cent of that under the scheme for exclusive sale in sealed packages, and the advantage of properly supervising such should be apparent, from the proportional amounts disposed of.

BOWSER VERSUS T. D. PATTULLO

Charge of Favoring Prince Rupert
Dealt with by Minister of
Lands

In connection with the brief report of charge made by W. J. Bowser against Hon. T. D. Pattullo of favoritism in the treatment of Prince Rupert, the Victoria Times report of the incident is as follows:

Mr. Bowser detected the provincial dusky gentleman in the woodpile when clause 8 of Mr. Pattullo's Forest Act amendments came up for discussion in committee. The clause provides that the Minister of Lands may enter into an agreement with any corporation which has power to operate a pulp mill by which all moneys in arrears for annual fees, taxes and other sums in respect of timber licenses held by the company may be aggregated and made payable in installments with interest at six per cent. Last night the Minister presented an amendment to this clause which makes no mention of any interest.

What was the reason of this? Mr. Bowser demanded. The clause, he held, would favor new pulp licensees over older concerns which were in arrears on tax payments.

Mr. Pattullo declared that the clause in question would provide relief for all who deserved it, and it was to make the provision Province-wide in its application that he proposed an amendment to a general act instead of bringing in a special bill. He was prepared to waive the interest on the arrears of any concern which would erect a proper mill, he said.

No Apology to Make

"I have no apology to offer the House for something that will help Prince Rupert and the Province at large," he affirmed.

"Mr. Pattullo has listened to the tempting voice of the Premier," Mr. Bowser suggested.

The Premier sprang to his feet to observe with some warmth, "Surely the time must come when members of this House must have recourse for truth and decency!"

"I have never had to appeal to the chair to protect myself and if I had the Premier's brute majority behind me that would be the last thing in the world I would do," Mr. Bowser went on. "I take these sneers and insults and hit back as well as I can."

Mr. Bowser suggested that Mr. Pattullo, in making the relief clause a general one, had been guided by the advice of the Premier. Mr. Pattullo denied this assertion and said that he had been advised by the Legal Department.

"Well, what's the difference?" queried Mr. Bowser mildly as he waved his hand in the direction of the Premier amid a loud outburst of laughter from the members and the galleries.

"How much legislation have I brought down for the benefit of the Okanagan?" Mr. Pattullo demanded. "Millions of dollars worth. And now when we help Prince Rupert a little there is a great howl."




