## Disarmament Conference on Nov. 11

### LONG LINE OF BANK DEPOSITORS ARE CLAMORING FOR MONEY

#### British Were Preparing Horrible Machinery of Slaughter at Time Peace Declared says Lloyd George

WASHINGTON, August 1.—It is understood that November Armistice Day, is generally acceptable as the date for the opening of the Disarmament Conference.

LONDON, England, August 1.—Premier Lloyd George told a luncheon here that the whole might of the British Empire would be thrown into the scales for peace at the forthcoming conference at Washington.

"Just before peace was declared," he said, "we had ready a horrible machinery than the world has seen. Doubtless these devices were being perfected on the other side. We must be lest we bequeath to our children a legacy of concentrated hatred that will some day explode, shattering their happiness and leaving the world a wilderness and man gaunt, wandering among ruins."

#### TRAGIC DEATH OF LITTLE BOY

Child of Road Fell When Playing and Fractured Skull.

Under very tragic circumstances, the death occurred this morning at 9:15 of Victor, the four year old son of Mr. and Mrs. K. A. Road, Steele Block.

The little lad was playing with other children on the street near the West End Cafe at the corner of Third Avenue and Eighth Street when he fell through the railing of the sidewalk and alighted in his head in the pond at that place. His skull was fearfully fractured, the brain being bared and the bones crushed terribly. He was rushed to the General Hospital where an emergency decompression operation was performed but without success in saving the lad's life.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers. The deepest sympathy of the community will go out to Mr. and Mrs. Road in their deep bereavement.

#### Run on Boston Bank Continues Anxious Crowd in a Line Eight Blocks Long on Street Outside

BOSTON, August 1.—There is a tremendous run on a Boston bank today. Despite reassuring statements by the officials, the run on the Boston Five Per Cent. Bank continues unabated. Depositors, anxious to get their money, are in line on the street for eight blocks, and mounted police are busy keeping order and seeing that no one breaks the line.

The president of the bank said the institution had assets amounting to more than \$30,000,000 and would continue to pay out the cash indefinitely.

The run on the bank has caused a good deal of excitement in the city among business people, and it is proving a nervous time for those connected with the financial institutions of the city.

#### VANCOUVER SHIP BANK OFF COAST

Canadian Exporter Struck Sixty Miles off Oregon—No Lives Lost.

NOTED VESSEL WILL BE REFLOATED.

VANCOUVER, Oregon, Aug. 1.—Canadian Government steamer, Canadian Exporter, ran aground and sank on a bank, 60 miles off the coast of Oregon. The crew were lost and it is believed the vessel can be refloated.

#### NO RADICAL COMMUNISM

Maryland Senator Enthusiastic After Visit to Russia.

RIGA, Aug. 1.—Senator Joseph France of Maryland, who entered Russia skeptical of the advances to be gained from diplomatic relations with the Soviet, but believing trade relations were advisable, returns enthusiastic for both. He said the Lenin Government was starting a new line of development in Russia which "cannot backslide into radical communism."

#### FURTHER BOND LOAN TO B. C. GOVERNMENT

Ten Millions Raised This Year Already for Public Works and Railways.

VICTORIA, Aug. 1.—A further loan of \$2,000,000 British Columbia six per cent bonds due in July, 1926, has been negotiated in New York. The price at which they were sold was 93 thus yielding the investors 7 1/4 per cent. This brings the aggregate bond issues discussed by the B. C. Government this year to \$10,000,000 to be used for public works and railway purposes.

#### OLDEST COUPLE IN KINGDOM PARENTS OF LOCAL OFFICER

"Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Minty, who reside in the Woodside district of Aberdeen, Scotland, have just celebrated the seventy-second anniversary of their wedding. So far as can be ascertained they are the oldest married couple in the Kingdom.

Mr. Minty is 96 years of age and Mrs. Minty, 94. There were nine children of the marriage, nine of whom survive, all in Canada.

The aged couple mentioned in the foregoing extract from a newspaper of Cork, Ireland, are the parents of A. C. Minty, chief of provincial police here. Mr. Minty says that his mother and father still enjoy the best of health and are both hale and hearty.

#### CANNOT TAX CHURCH SITES

That is Decision of Privy Council Regarding Victoria Case.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—The Privy Council today dismissed the appeal of the Corporation of the City of Victoria against the Bishop of Vancouver raising the question whether the land on which St. Andrew's Cathedral stands is subject to local taxation. The principle determines whether British Columbia cities can tax church site property or not under existing laws.

#### NICE PRESENT FOR LOCAL CLUB

Rotarians Recipients of Ornamental Bell Gavel From Vancouver Rotarians.

The local Rotary Club was on Saturday night the recipient of a handsome ornamental bell gavel from the Vancouver Rotary Club. It was of oak with a Rotary wheel of brass hanging in front, on which was engraved on the rim and spokes "Rotary Wheel, presented to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club by the Vancouver Rotary Club, 1921." Attached was a bell for use in connection with the duties of the presiding officer.

In making the presentation, Ben Miller, vice-president of the club, welcomed the local organization to the chain of clubs and said that history honored the men who did most for their fellow men. Rotary should train men to be better citizens. Individual responsibility was a great thing, and this Rotary tried to develop. Members of a Rotary Club should be better citizens, better members of the board of trade or chamber of commerce. He urged the local members to live up to their privileges.

President Duby, in receiving the gavel on behalf of the local club, expressed appreciation of the courtesy of the Vancouver club and asked the visitor from that city to convey the thanks of the Prince Rupert club for the fine present.

#### MORE REVENUE FOR THE MUNICIPALITIES

Every Likelihood that Considerable Relief Will Be Given This Year.

#### LIBERAL ORGANIZATION FOR ONTARIO WAS PLANNED AT MEETING

TORONTO, Aug. 1.—Ontario is to have a new Liberal organization. Party leaders gathered here and planned the new "Ontario Liberal Association," in which the existing bodies are to be merged.

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, federal Liberal leader, and H. H. Dewar, provincial leader, were both at the consultation. Mr. King stressed the urgency of getting all shades of Liberal thought merged into one organization.

The statement handed out at the close of the meeting was as follows:

"At a joint meeting of the executives of the General Reform Association and the Ontario Liberal executive, it was decided that a general association of Liberals of the province of Ontario be organized to be known as the Ontario Liberal Association and the present members of the Ontario Liberal executive be the provisional officers of the association with powers to draft a constitution and bylaws for consideration at a general meeting of the Liberals of the province to be called at some date to be agreed upon, in September or October of this year."

Hon. MacKenzie King and H. H. Dewar received a hearty reception from the members and approved of the proposed organization.

#### LUMBER CONTRACT FOR ESQUIMALT DOCKS

Puget Sound Lumber Co. to Supply Two Million Feet.

VICTORIA, Aug. 1.—The Canadian Puget Sound Lumber Company, of this city, has been successful in securing a two-million feet of lumber order in connection with the construction work of the new Government dry-dock at Skinner's Cove. The local mill is now actively engaged in cutting. The order will take about six weeks to fill, it is stated. Some of the lumber is of huge dimensions, 18x8 and 12x12, while a quantity of three-inch lumber is also required.

J. D. Kissinger, manager of the mill, stated that little profit was to be looked from operation at this time, but the new work would at least serve to keep the mill running and pay some of the overhead expenses that have to be met. "We had seriously considered closing the mill down," stated Mr. Kissinger, prior to getting this order, so that its continued operation means much to our employees, and to the business of the city as a whole." The average payroll of the mill is \$25,000 a month, it is stated.

ROTARY CLUB GIVES BANQUET

Delegates From Seattle and Vancouver Give Interesting Addresses.

INTERNATIONAL AMITY URGED BY VISITOR

"Before the war there was between the two countries often the brutal frankness of relatives. Now they stand together for world service. There is five thousand miles of international boundary line where vital interest meets vital interest and yet there is no fortress, battlement or sentinel. It is a line of international peace. With the two great democracies, the British and the American lies the future of the world and Rotary can do much to cement international amity."

Indefinable. No one could define Rotary, continued the speaker. It had been humorously defined as the inward inexpressiveness of outward aloofness. It was impossible to formulate. It was an expression of the better self and it was impossible to measure it with a yardstick. Outsiders often thought it was selfish origin for the purpose of promoting the business interests of its members, but if it did this, it was only through the associations the members formed, the friendships and cordial relationships. He urged the members to be live wires and make the club a factor in the community. The members could not expect to take out of Rotary more than they put in, the motto "He profits most who serves best" being always true.

Work in Seattle. Mr. Roberts told of the work Rotarians had done in Seattle where they had recently raised \$25,000 for an orthopaedic hospital for crippled children. At one time, said Mr. Roberts, the question asked of a man was "what has he got?" Later, the question usually asked, "where did he get it?" Now the main interest in the possession of wealth was "what is he doing with it?"

Mr. Roberts explained that the work of Rotary was not all serious. It was not necessary to be petrified in order to be dignified. Happiness and good fellowship should always be radiated. "You can depend on the people of America to the fullest extent in all good works" concluded the speaker. "Acting together the great Empire and the great Republic will work to save themselves and the world. That is the spirit of Rotary."

On behalf of the District Governor, Mr. Roberts then presented the charter to the club and President Doby received it. In doing so Mr. Doby said the local members appreciated the fact that they were a link in the chain of clubs and he felt sure the local club would be a factor in the affairs of the community. He thanked the visitors for coming and he asked them to carry with them hearty

thanks for their interest. Numerous Toasts.

Addresses were given by Tom Miller, Dr. Kergin, T. H. Johnson, Mayor Rochester and W. E. Williams. Mr. Johnson in proposing a toast to the president after "The King" had been drunk in silence, spoke of the cordial relationships existing between the countries and the hope that Rotary would further cement that friendship.

Mayor Rochester welcomed the visitors to the city. W. E. Williams proposed a toast to the visitors to which Mr. Miller responded. Fred Stork.

Fred Stork in proposing "The City We Live In," said he took a great deal of pride in this little city of the west where conditions were better than in any other and where the people were happy and contented. The city was in a healthy condition financially. Mr. Stork then spoke of the advantageous position of the city in relation to other ports. Those who came here to live did so after mature consideration. The location on the map was the great thing. He believed the city was on the eve of greater things. He told of the frantic efforts made by railways to the south to get the Oriental silk business. This city had all the advantages of transportation. She could afford to smile at the demonstration of effort. Here there was a flat track, a good grade and 500 miles advantage in distance. She had a strategic position. We should yet see this city second to none on the coast and Rotary could take a great part in that development.

Dr. Kergin said they all realized the world was in a state of flux. The world was changing so rapidly that no one could estimate what would take place in a few years. Old institutions were losing their force. With these changes in process, he felt Rotary could fill a great need. While the world was millions of years old, yet we were only in the morning of history. As a link in the great chain, the club should become a great force for peace and for everything making for betterment. He urged the members to develop the spirit of service.

**TO DEVELOP ALBERTA'S COAL RESOURCES UNDER POWERFUL SYNDICATE**
