Hudson's Bay Prince Rupert Route FROM THREE TO FIVE DAYS SAVED BY KEEPING TO THE NORTH

Proposed Fast Route From Europe to Orient by way of Hudson's Bay and this Port

To connect up Europe with the Orient by way of Prince Rupert and the Hudson Bay Railway to Port Nelson is the plan which many people of the North have in mind, according to G. E. Rice, editor and proprietor of The Pas Herald, who has been visiting a few days in the city and who left for home this morning.

According to Mr. Rice, Port Nelson is about the same distance from Liverpool as Quebec, 2000 miles, and there is all year round water access to that port, thus giving it a great advantage over the St. Lawrence route. To the centre of the wheatfields of the prairies Port Nelson is from 600 to 700 miles while Quebec is 2,000 miles. This is a great advantage in distance.

WAS SHOT BY RAVING LUNATIC

Slain at Lund on Thursday
Night When Alex. Johnson
Ran Amok.

ROSEBURY, Dec. 17.—Struck and killed by a raving lunatic, Alex. Johnson was shot on Thursday night. Inhabitants of the little village were terrified and further casualties are feared. The slayer of Johnson, who appears to be a local man, barricaded himself in the house with plenty of ammunition. A party of provincial police headed by Provincial Officer Adley of Powell River, went to the house to capture or kill the raving man.

Johnson was lost in the bush for two days and suddenly appeared at Campbell River on Friday and shot Dango dead.

On Dec. 17, (noon).—With a knife part of his face shot off by the body of Alex. Johnson, who was found at the door of his house this morning by the provincial police and a posse of local men. By killing him, Johnson put an end to the reign of terror he exercised over the district for two days when he roamed from the woods and shot his best friend, Ralph Dango.

It is said Johnson had been drinking for the past year under the impression that some one was going to shoot him.

CONCLUDING SESSION OF ASSIZES WAS HELD LATE LAST EVENING

Remainder of Business Was
Cleaned Up by Mr. Justice Macdonald Before Leaving.

The fall assizes of the Supreme Court here were concluded before Mr. Justice Macdonald last evening.

In the civil action of William Norman and Lewis T. Vig vs. the Anglo-British Columbia Packing Co., judgment was given in full for the plaintiff. The case involved the failure of the defendant to accept a shipment of salmon and the claim was \$2043.25. L. W. Patmore, of Patmore & Fulton, appeared for the plaintiff and A. M. Manson, of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, for the defendant.

The case of Daniel F. Moore vs. John Lapadat and Anna Lapadat of plaintiffs over the default in payment by an agreement of sale was traversed to the spring assizes and may in the meantime be settled out of court.

Decrees absolute were granted in the Shackleton vs. Shackleton and Serlingour vs. Serlingour divorce cases. Decree nisi was granted in the Geil vs. Geil divorce action, which involves Indians. The Peacock vs. Peacock separation action was traversed on account of a recent death in the family.

Under the Lunacy Act, W. O. Fulton, of Patmore & Fulton, applied to sell real property of Emily Tassan. This was granted.

In the Gurvich vs. Gurvich divorce suit, decree nisi was granted. L. W. Patmore represented the petitioner.

IS AWARDED DAMAGES COLLISION FISH BOATS

Charles Wallace, of D. C. F., Gets
Judgment Over George Fritz
of the Thelma.

In the case of Charles Wallace vs. George Fritz, in which the plaintiff claimed \$585 damages as a result of a collision between his boat, D. C. F. No. 1, and the defendant's Thelma, Judge Young this morning handed down his decision in favor of the plaintiff, awarding damages of \$265. The collision which caused the case occurred on the waterfront last February. W. O. Fulton, of Patmore & Fulton, had the case for the plaintiff, and Milton Gonzales, of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, for the defendant.

ALLIED COMMISSION WANTS INFORMATION BEFORE EXTENSION

PARIS, Dec. 17.—The allied reparations commission has refused to consider Germany's request for an extension of time on her January-February reparations payments until the German government tells just what they can pay on these instalments and give other information demanded.

VICTORIA AGAIN WINS AT HOCKEY

Aristocrats Beat Vancouver Millionaires Maintaining Lead in League.

VICTORIA, Dec. 17.—The Aristocrats of this city defeated the Vancouver Millionaires by a score of four to three in the arena rink here last night, thus maintaining the leading place in the Pacific Coast Hockey League.

The game was a fast one and was even until the last ten minutes. Lehman was out of the Vancouver goal owing to an injured eye. Tommy Burns of Portland substituting for him.

BRIAND GOVERNMENT WAS SUSTAINED ON PAPAL RELATIONS

PARIS, Dec. 17.—The Senate passed a vote of confidence in Premier Briand and his government on the question of the resumption of diplomatic relations with the Vatican. The vote stood 174 to 129 for the Government.

SHOOTING AT BELFAST.

BELFAST, Dec. 17.—There was continued shooting in the Newtown Ards district. Two bombs were thrown and six wounded in two days, one of which died yesterday.

LOCAL CANNERIES GET TINPLATE FROM MILLS AT SWANSEA

SWANSEA, WALES, Dec. 17.—The Welsh tinplate trade is reviving. Orders from abroad are coming in more freely and Welsh makers are beating American and German competitors in neutral markets. This is possible by reason of the recent heavy price cuts. Welsh makers have just secured a large order (running many thousands of boxes of tinplates) from British Columbia packers. This was secured in the face of the keenest American competition. The first cargo of this consignment has already left Swansea.

FORDNEY BILL HAS BAD EFFECT ON TRADE

Canadian Exports Decreased as
Result of United States
Tariff.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—In the six months since the Fordney Bill has been in effect with its high tariff against Canadian goods there has been a considerable falling off of business. From June to November of this year exports were valued at \$25,928,959 whereas for a similar period last year the value of the exports was \$35,454,442.

LINER STUCK TO DESTROYER

Vessels Collided off New Jersey Coast and Will Likely be Towed to Port.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—The liner Panama crashed into the American destroyer Grahame and stuck fast in the starboard side of that vessel. Six of the Grahame's men were injured. The Panama stayed set and both ships are likely to be towed ashore together. They collided off the New Jersey coast.

LABORITES TRY TO START STRIKE AGAINST TREATY RATIFICATION

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The Dublin correspondent of the Daily Mail reports that the extreme laborites are trying to start a general strike or a least a railway strike as a protest against the ratification of the treaty between Britain and Ireland.

IRISH DECISION IS EXPECTED WEDNESDAY

DUBLIN, Dec. 17.—The final decision of Bill Egan in regard to the Peace Treaty with Britain is not expected to be given Wednesday.

ANOTHER BIG BANK MERGER

Merchants Bank Absorbed By
Bank of Montreal Result
of Financial Difficulties

MERGER MUST BE RATIFIED

Reserve of Smaller Institution
Had Been Seriously Impaired Says Report.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—An announcement was made yesterday officially that because investigation showed that the rest or reserve of the Merchants Bank of Canada had been seriously impaired, an offer from the Bank of Montreal to absorb it be recommended by the directors. The announcement was made by Sir Montague Allan, president of the Merchants Bank.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—Sir Henry Drayton gave Sir Montagu Allan preliminary permission to merge the Merchants with the Bank of Montreal, commenting that it was the only thing to do in the public interest. Ratification of the merger by the shareholders of the Merchants Bank and final Government sanction are necessary.

SOLVE MYSTERY WALL ST. BOMB

Arrest of Lindefeld in Warsaw
Said to Be Key to the
Situation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The arrest in Warsaw, Poland, of Wolke Lindefeld will clear up the entire mystery of the Wall Street explosion of September 16, 1920, it was stated today by W. J. Burns, the head of the department of justice bureau of investigation.

Lindefeld is the key to a solution of the mystery. He himself is not implicated but is so close to the radical element that he knew all about it. The Third Internationale is said to be the moving spirit behind the plot.

RIOTS CONTINUE AT BELFAST, IRELAND

One Killed and Six Wounded Following Intense Firing.

BELFAST, Dec. 17.—Fierce firing broke out in the Newtown Road section of East Belfast this morning. So intense was the firing that the tramcar service was suspended and Lewis guns were used against the rioters by the crown forces. An employee of the tram service was shot dead and at least six persons are known to have been wounded.

SISTER OF MAN WHO KILLED HIMSELF IS COMING FROM 'FRISCO

Mrs. M. Lloyd of San Francisco, a sister of Jack Harrington, who committed suicide by cutting his throat on Thursday, has wired to the city police asking that the remains be held until she arrives in the city. It is expected that she will be here on the Prince Rupert Wednesday morning. In the meantime the funeral arrangements have not been made and the corpse is in charge of Hayner Bros., undertakers.

Ghandi Finds Himself in Jail.

Ghandi finds himself in jail. He is a very clever man, old and shriveled, according to what one reads of him, and yet he was able to move his fellow countrymen as no man ever before moved them. He urged the policy of non-co-operation. It was an unarmed resistance, almost a passive resistance, but not exactly that. He travelled over the country and roused the ignorant people, with the result that the British prince has not always had a good reception from the populace. Yet in some places he has had such tremendous ovations as have made up for the lack of it at others.

On such a campaign as that Ghandi was sure to break the law eventually, and he seems to have broken it by interfering with the enlistment of national volunteers in the militia. For this he has been sent to prison to dream over his lost opportunities.

The natural geniality of the young prince has done a good deal to counteract the influence of the old agitator. Where the people of India have met him he has made friends, and his visit will do a great deal to foster a better feeling in that country.

Power of One Man Great as Ever.

Even in these democratic days the power of one man of strong will and fixed endeavor in a community is as strong as ever. That is seen in the case of Ghandi. The old man is able to go through the country and rouse the people and control them to such an extent that he can almost cause a revolution, or at any rate sow the seeds of revolution.

People often wonder why it is that Britain should bother about India. There is no financial gain to Britain from having India dependent on it except perhaps that a few people get jobs in the civil service, which usually ruins their constitutions and sends them to early graves. Should Britain withdraw today the country would again break up into principalities and small nations. By holding on and gradually educating the people and teaching them self government the time may come when they will be able to carry on without being a danger to the rest of the world. Today India is far from being ready for handling her own affairs. There is no homogeneity, although that unity of spirit and action may come in time. The various religions of the country are a source of danger.

Some day a young man with power such as has Ghandi may arise who will weld together the heterogeneous groups and form them into a nation. Should such a time come, Britain's work will be completed and it will be time for her to withdraw and leave the country to govern itself.

France's Demand Should Be Modified.

The demand of France at the armament conference is likely to be modified when the condition of affairs is placed squarely before her. Naturally there is a feeling of jealousy between the powers, each making demands which are not likely to be fulfilled. First it was Japan, now it is France. Each country thinks itself just as important as any other, if not more important.

Everyone will sincerely wish that there may be no break in the proceedings, but that arrangements may be made for a satisfactory solution of the armament question. Co-operation will be much better than competition in the armament line.

Drilling for Oil May Yet Succeed.

Drilling for oil in this neighborhood may yet succeed. Some people are sceptical, but there is a good chance of getting results. Either in the Skeena or Kitsumkalum valleys or on Queen Charlotte Islands there are indications which are said to be good. If success is attained it will be a great thing for this district. It means such a development as could not be attained in any other way. Anything that Prince Rupert can do in a legitimate way to help on the work should not be neglected.

NORTHERNERS ON PRINCESS MARY

About One Hundred Passengers on C.P.R. Coaster Which Called Here Last Evening.

The Canadian Pacific coaster Princess Mary, Captain Ormiston called at this port last night south bound for Vancouver from south-eastern Alaskan ports. The ship arrived at 11 o'clock and pulled out again at midnight.

The steamer had on board about one hundred out-going Yukoners and Alaskans who are going to spend the holiday season in the south. The trip down the coast to Prince Rupert was delightful and the weather was almost of the mildness of summer. So warm was it that many of the passengers sat outside while the boat was steaming south without either wraps or overcoats.

When the Princess Mary left Skagway she had only a handful of Yukoners on board but after the calls at Juneau, Wrangell, and Ketchikan had been made the number was increased to about a hundred.

Two families of mother, father, and half a dozen kiddies were among the passengers. One Skagway family is on the way to far away Italy for a winter trip. Another family of Alaskan kiddies, who were never before south and had never seen a street car, were very excited at the prospect of seeing a big city for the first time.

The most of those going south on the ship from the Yukon were old timers of the '98 stamp and some of them were well known to Prince Rupert people.

Fox Farmer.

An interesting passenger was J. Audrey Simmons, whose father was the first Canadian Customs officer at the Summit and who was later stationed at Carcross. Young Simmons went to Carcross when he was a very small boy. Today he is a tall strapping young man and saw service in France. He and his brother have a fox ranch at Carcross which they have run for some eight years. Mr. Simmons is going south to Vancouver with this season's crop of fox furs. Six silver greys and four cross foxes, all stowed away in a modest suitcase, which he carries along as if it contained a few personal effects, are worth from three to four thousand dollars.

Pioneer Fisherman.

There was also on board the Princess Mary, Kenny Melvor, the pioneer fisherman of the northern interior fresh water lakes. He catches trout and white fish in Lake Labarge and supplies fish to the cities of Dawson and Whitehorse also having a contract for the White Pass boats which run to Dawson in the summer months. Mr. Melvor is going to spend a month in Victoria before returning north again to engage in his business.

The arrivals from the North tell of good conditions prevailing there. All is cheerfulness and optimism and all have the same favorable story to tell of Alaska, Yukon and Northern B.C. Everyone is happy and care free and there is lots of grub, plenty of wood, comfortable houses, hotels and hospitals. All are satisfied that at the present moment to live north of 53 is perhaps the greatest good fortune that any one could have. The most of those who left last night for the south are returning north in the spring.

J. A. Macdonald, who was engaged in the accounting department of the Wallace Shipbuilding Co. here, sailed last night by the Princess Mary for California. Mr. Macdonald will be gone at least three months.

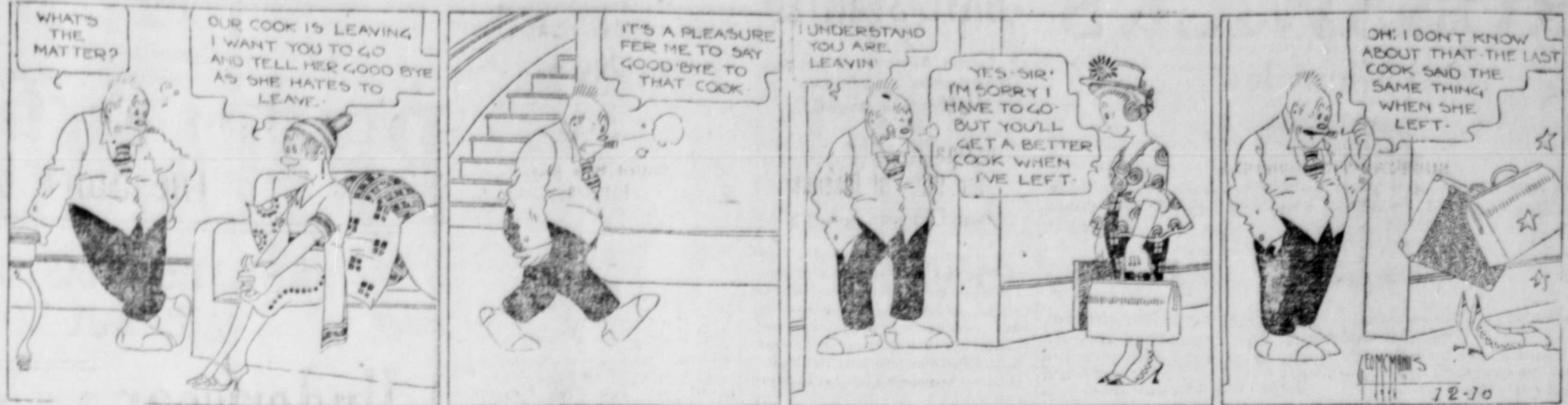

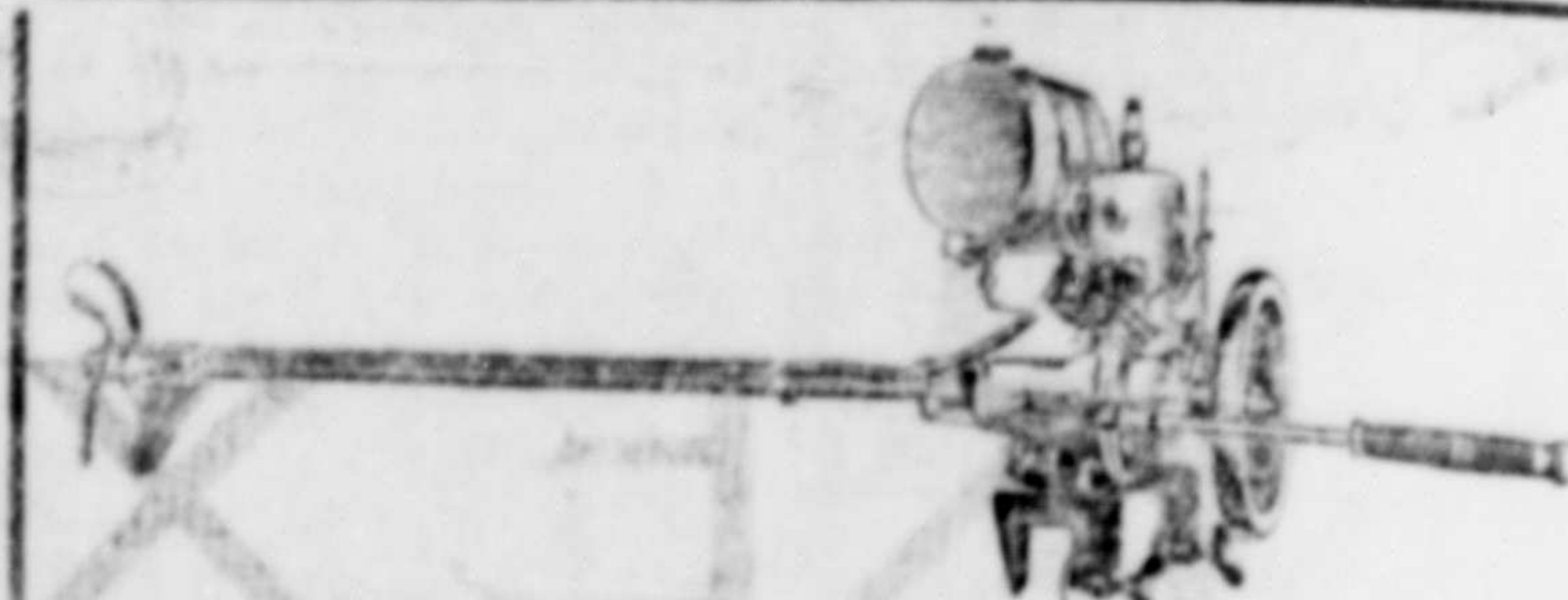

Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which Is the Chief Source of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

The storm, which struck the Mosquito Fleet lying in Cow Bay on Monday night and early Tuesday morning, has given the waterfront in that vicinity the appearance of a wreck strewn beach after a naval engagement. Wreckage is piled practically all along the floats around the Bay, and the skippers and owners of the damaged boats are busy trying to put 'their houses' in order. It is estimated that some thousands of dollars worth of damage was done to the various boats as a result of the storm. A spirit of comradeship prevails among the crews of the Fleet, and the distressed are being gallantly aided by the more fortunate. The worst case is that of Bill Shelim, owner of the Kelpie, which was sunk during the storm. Everything Bill had in the world has been contributed to Davey Jones' locker. Capt. Shelim is endeavoring to obtain the services of a scow to help raise the vessel. A diving outfit has been kindly loaned by Captain Babington, and Shelim will do the necessary diving, if a scow can be obtained to lift the craft. The Mariner's Club, with headquarters at the 'Mug Up,' is doing everything possible to aid the stricken mariner. All the fishermen are of one opinion that Capt. Selig of the Eagle rendered the greatest possible service to the stricken craft, and was untiring in his efforts to save everything he possibly could.

In spite of all their trouble during the week the morale of the crews is excellent. Everyone is making the best of a bad job, and are determined to have a happy Xmas.

Repairs of a temporary nature have been made to that part of the Provincial Government float which was swept away by the storm.

All the fishermen are agreed that something must be done to protect the boats of the Mosquito Fleet from future storms. They should have either proper docking facilities or a breakwater. At the present time the boats of the fleet are all huddled together and the least untoward swell sets them clashing against each other with consequent damage.

The Admiral of the Fleet has issued instruction to his Chief of Staff to get a design out for a medal, which will be struck and given to those of the fleet whose names are outstanding on the list of gallant deeds done during the storm. It is understood the design will be something in the nature of a clam running rampant in a bowl of cream, which will undoubtedly be a work of art, and will be much prized by the recipients, perhaps.

Flossie Fliter, who is acting as chief sweet shifter to Jack Toner, rendered very valuable service in first aid work during the rough weather on Monday night. Several minor injuries were received by various members of the

crews, and a dressing station was improvised at the Mug Up with Flossie in charge. As soon as it became known that the late stenog, in chief to the Admiral was looking after the injured, it was hard work to keep any of the men at their posts and all were complaining of hurts in various parts of the anatomy. One husky fisherman complained that while rescuing a cage containing one small bird the bird had kicked him and broke his finger. This was tabulated in the log as a self-inflicted wound, and the victim will come up for trial before the Admiral later. For services rendered Flossie is getting a raise in wages, something like ten cents a year.

At the pinnacle of excitement on Monday night an urgent call came over the phone for Jack Toner, and after a frenzied hunt around the wreckage he was located and told that he was wanted on the telephone. Jack hurried off to the instrument and a voice of a very officious character sternly demanded how old he was. Jack, quick as a flash, replied "fifty-four years and one day," which is some thinking considering the conditions prevailing at that moment. After having given the reply the party who rang him up hung up the receiver, and Jack, whose middle name is Truth, pondered in his mind as to whether or not he had given the correct answer. On checking up his birth certificate he found that he was quite correct, having been born on December 12, in the year 1867, and the phone call came early on Tuesday morning, the 13th, accounting for the extra day. Now the query is, who wanted the information?

The Verna, owned by John Dybbhavn, which was sunk at the Oil Wharf during the storm has been salvaged and is now at the Dry Dock undergoing repairs.

The Pioneer of Seattle, which has a hole stove in her hull, is now at the Dry Dock undergoing caulking repairs, on completion of which she will proceed to her home port.

The D.C.F. Capt. Wallace, which was recently sunk at Newcomb Harbor by an ice flow, has been completely repaired and left for the deep sea fishing grounds on Wednesday night. It is anticipated she will not return to port until after Christmas.

The Billy Boy, Captain Smith, which was driven on the rock pile between Cow Bay and the Oil Dock in Monday night's storm, has been pulled off and is now beached at Cow Bay. The water has been pumped out and sufficient repairs made to enable her to be docked at the Dry Dock for permanent repairs.

Capt. S. Pierce of the Maud had a narrow escape during the storm. He was up town, the first time for months, and had a hunch that the wind meant mischief. With this hunch in mind he hit for the boat, which was tied outside the Verna. He just had time to get aboard and start the engine when the storm broke in all its fury. In trying to get away from the Verna a hole was punched in the Maud's hull just below the deck line, but was high enough from the water line to prevent any great amount of water from getting inside. Pierce managed, after a hard tussle, to get his craft around the floats into the annexe harbor of Cow Bay and thus out of danger. The damage will be repaired right away.

The Lancelot, Capt. Chas. Berg, had her guard rail torn away as a result of the storm.

The Provincial, Capt. Ed. Westerlund, arrived from Stewart on Wednesday night. The Provincial has been up to Stewart with a mining engineer of repute from New York to look over the Fish Creek and other Alaskan mining properties.

The Cape Spencer, Captain Larsen, got the side of her dory broken and some of the guard rail stripped off the side during the storm, also the forecabin was badly knocked about. The

boat is insured, however, and will be taken into the Dry Dock for repairs as soon as the fore-cabin is fixed up. On her previous trip the Cape Spencer had been out fishing for twenty-two days, and during this period, owing to the stormy weather experienced, did not get one complete day's fishing.

On her last fishing trip the Revelle, Captain Al. Nelson, experienced some very bad weather and as a consequence the side of the dory was taken off, seven scales of gear were stripped from the deck, and the heavy sea took the chute off her stern. Otherwise, as the Cap. puts it, every little thing was O.K.

The Joe Baker, Captain Fred Blonidin, had some damage done to her stern during the storm, and is undergoing repairs in Cow Bay.

The Fisher, Captain Dusty Miller, was scheduled to go out fishing but owing to damage received as a result of the storm it will probably be after Xmas, before repairs are completed.

The Pair of Jacks, Capt. Ivarsen, was driven astride the first pontoon of the Dry Dock on Monday night, and her hull was pretty badly knocked about, practically the whole of the side of the boat being stove in. She is on the docks now and repairs are being made rapidly.

The Ring, Capt. E. Rosang, has been in port on a Xmas-shopping expedition, and left for Lewis island on Thursday morning.

The Pachena, Capt. A. Swanson, left for Stewart Friday morning, with several passengers aboard for other points. T. J. Shenton, Inspector of Mines is going to Stewart on this ment. There will be a number of passengers returning from the North on the Pachena for trip on business for his department. (Continued on Page Seven)

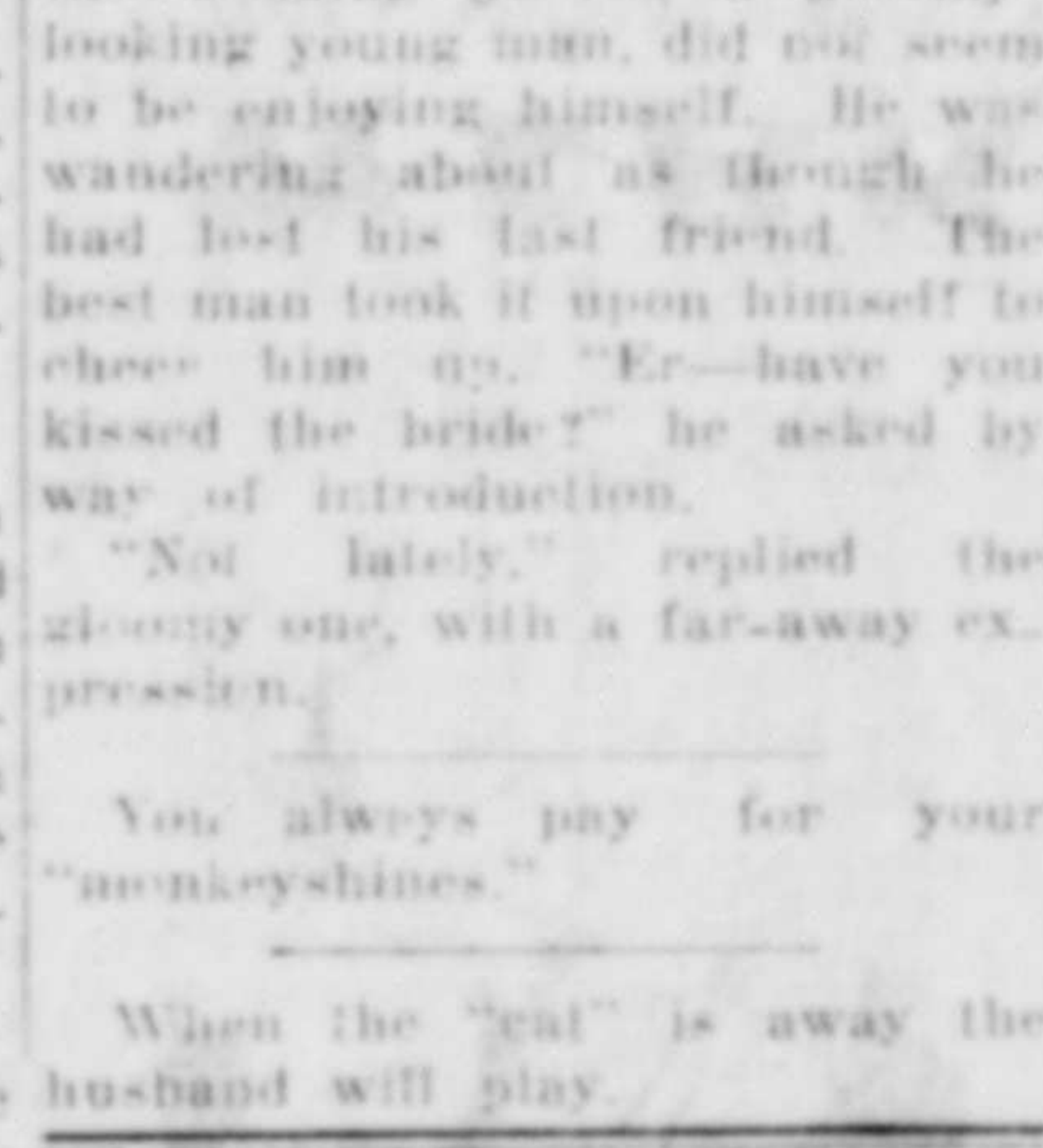
