# SHIPBUILDERS GET AWAY WITH HUNDRED MILLION

## IMPORTANT JUDGMENT OF THE APPEAL COURT ON COUNTING OF BALLOTS

### Must Place Cross in Square Opposite Name

That is Decision of Court of Appeal in Grand Forks Election Case; Liberal Retains Seat; Victoria Civic Election Possibly Affected

VICTORIA, Jan. 20.—By a court of appeal decision in the Grand Forks election appeal yesterday afternoon, H. G. Henringer, the Liberal candidate, stands elected by six votes. The court held that the Elections Act clearly required the placing of the cross in the white square opposite the name of the candidate on the left hand side of the ballot paper.

Henringer was declared elected by the returning officer with a poll of 393 as against 384 for McKie, his Conservative opponent. The recount appeal has changed the figures slightly but not the result.

Victoria's civic election may be upset by the decision of the Court of Appeal in the Grand Forks case. In the Victoria election the ballots on which the numerals are marked to the right of the candidate's name were counted as valid. A large number of such were cast.

### INTENSE COLD CAUSES DEATH NEW YORK MAN

Tom Ward, Manager of Copper Company, Froze to Death in Alaska.

NOME, Jan. 20.—Tom Ward, general manager of the Ward Copper Co. of New York, was found frozen to death a few miles from Teller, Alaska, on January 14, according to word which has reached here today.

It seems that Ward must have got lost in the trail and wandered around and overcome by exhaustion when the frost did its deadly work.

### BIG FIGHT MAY BE STAGED IN THIS COUNTRY

Rickard Says Has Been Given Big Guarantee for Place Near Montreal.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—The last development in connection with the proposed Carpenter Supply bont has turned attention to Canada as a possible scene for the encounter. Promoter Tex Rickard says that the withdrawal of his partners, Brady and Cochane, from the promotion of the battle would not deter him from immediately attempting to stage near Montreal where, he says, he has been guaranteed the sale of 50,000 seats at from \$5 to \$10. New York, as the scene for the fight, is out of the question as new law prevents more than 815 per seat being charged.

### AIDED SIND FEINERS DISCOVERED DOCUMENTS

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Extensive bids on alleged Sinn Fein quarters both in the east and west ends of London were made by Scotland Yard police last night. Many houses and other premises were searched and important documents are said to have been found.

#### PATERSON CHOSEN BY LIBERALS TO CONTEST DELTA

CLOVERDALE, Jan. 20.—A. D. Paterson was unanimously chosen by Liberals here at a convention yesterday to contest Delta constituency in the byelection for the legislature.

The Conservatives hold a convention today and it is probable that F. A. MacKenzie will be chosen. He was formerly member for the district.

#### BOARD OF TRADE RESOLUTION FOR PAYROLL REFORMS

Was Endorsed by Great War Veterans Last Night—Submitted Provincial Command.

The resolution of the Board of Trade providing for the appointment of a payroll inspector and the safeguarding of the payment of employees by the depositing of funds by employers was last night endorsed by the Great War Veterans' Association and will be submitted to the provincial command and other branches in British Columbia.

This resolution was brought in at a recent meeting of the Board of Trade and it is to be submitted to the provincial government with a view to the enactment of legislation which will further protect workers in industrial concerns.

#### KILLED IN FRACAS IN VANCOUVER LAST NIGHT BY ITALIANS

VANCOUVER, Jan. 20.—Peter Baell is dead and his body is lying in the hospital morgue. His death was caused by knife wounds received in a fracas last night at Gore Avenue. His assailants are believed to be Italians for whom the police are searching.

Baell was going with a companion to the house of a woman with whom he had had trouble, when he was attacked by Italians. Before dying he made a statement at the hospital.

#### IRONWORKERS WALK OUT AT YARROW'S YARD

Refusal to Accept Reduction of Fifty Cents a Day in Their Wages.

VICTORIA, Jan. 20.—The wages of the iron workers at Yarrow's shipyard, Esquimalt, were cut fifty cents a day and, as a protest, 200 men went on strike there yesterday. In addition to the ironworkers, 25 electricians joined in the walkout.

Yarrows are now employing 700 men, a number of whom are working on the repairs to the wrecked G. T. P. steamer Prince Rupert, which came here recently and on which over \$200,000 is to be spent.

#### TIMBER SALES MUCH LARGER THAN IN 1919

Prince Rupert District Comes Second to Vancouver Island in Value.

VICTORIA, Jan. 20.—The value of the timber sold from crown lands last year was nearly three times that of 1919, according to figures given out today by Hon. T. D. Paitullo, minister of lands. The 1920 sales are placed at \$1,799,039.

Prince Rupert district comes second to Vancouver Island district in the value of the sales, giving \$264,061 revenue for the Government as against \$600,465 from the former.

#### B.C. TO FIGHT UNFAIR RATES

Premier Oliver Tells Vancouver Board of Trade Province Will Take Up Cause.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 20.—The British Columbia Government will wage a fight for the equalization of freight rates in the west and east, according to a letter to the Board of Trade from Premier Oliver. It is probable that not only British Columbia but the three prairie provinces will be behind the application of the Board of Railway Commissioners.

#### Senate Committee Favors Reduction Naval Armaments

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The Britain, Jaugh and the United Foreign Relations Committee of the United States Senate reports have apparently started on a race favorably on Senator Borah's resolution proposing negotiations. It is proposed that the negotiations with a view to reduction of the nations shall provide for such rebuilding of naval vessels by Great Britain as can be agreed upon.

#### Drugs Valued at \$20,000 Seized at Vancouver by Police During Night Raid

Believed to be Organized Traffic Illicitly Conducted; Two Rifles and Ammunition Taken in Chinatown.

VANCOUVER, January 20.—Drugs valued at nearly \$20,000 were seized here last night in a raid in Chinatown. Two Orientals were arrested and the police believe they have ample evidence that they are concerned in an organized traffic in drugs.

It is known that drug selling has been carried on by low class Chinese and denizens of the underworld and that many seemingly respectable people have been purchasers. In spite of the illegality of the traffic it has been found possible to elude the police. The raid last night was the result of information secured, which led to the belief that there is a regular supply being brought into the province illicitly.

During the raid the police seized two rifles and 200 rounds of ammunition which they found in one of the resorts.

#### HUNDRED MILLION "IMPROPERLY PAID TO SHIPBUILDERS

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—At least \$100,000,000 was improperly paid to shipbuilders by the United States Shipping Board will be disclosed through the audit now in process. It is declared. Already the discrepancies are very large.

#### TRAWLERS TO DOCK

Foster and Kelly to Go on Drydock Monday—Lloyd's Representative Coming.

Arrangements have been made for the two steam trawlers belonging to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., the Andrew Kelly and the G. E. Foster, to be docked on Monday next for annual overhaul and reclassification. Lloyd's representative is ex-

pected to be here at the weekend to survey the Prince Albert and he will also survey the two trawlers while he is here.

None of the boats of the Gold storage are now at sea. All are tied up awaiting better fishing conditions, and overhauling in readiness for the early spring work.

#### TRUSTEES CHOSEN FOR THE PROPOSED NEW BOARDING HOUSE

Major J. H. McMullin, D. G. Stewart and Dr. W. T. Kerigan have consented to act as trustees for the dehenture holders in the company being organized by J. F. McGuire for the erection of a first class boarding house at the junction of Second and Atlin Avenues in Section 2.

A number of applications for rooms have already been received and a great deal of interest has been aroused in the proposal, it being generally felt that such an institution is needed here.

#### RUPERT STILL HOLDS HER OWN

Fish Marketed Here in December Almost Equals All Other Ports Combined.

Prince Rupert still leads in the halibut fisheries. In spite of the tendency of the big boats to go to Seattle and Vancouver for Christmas and take their catches with them there was marketed at this port almost twice as much halibut as at almost all other Pacific ports combined. The total amount marketed was 2,295,777 pounds and of this Prince Rupert contributed 1,065,000. Following are details of the catch:

#### CAMERON HEADS CONSERVATIVES

P. M. Miller Chosen Secretary-Treasurer—Other Offices to Be Filled Later.

#### LOVE FEAST FOLLOWS RECENT PARTY SPLIT

R. W. Cameron is the new president of the Prince Rupert Conservative Association and P. M. Miller is the secretary-treasurer. Both are returned soldiers and both are old time residents of the city. They were elected at the annual meeting of the Association last night, President C. H. Orme presiding, and with J. R. Beatty, secretary.

Following the break in the party ranks at the recent provincial election it was thought that there might be some fireworks at the annual meeting, but none developed and all the speeches were of a conciliatory nature. After the election of the president and secretary, it was decided to hold over the election of vice-president and executive until the next general meeting.

On the election of Mr. Cameron by acclamation that gentleman spoke briefly, referring to the recent election campaign and urging that the conflicting elements forget their feuds and get together in the interests of the party.

#### Refuses Nomination

In choosing a secretary, two names were put in nomination, that of Percy Miller and J. R. Beatty. The latter expressed himself as highly honored by the nomination, but in view of the fact that there had been some dissension and for the sake of unanimity and in the interests of the party, he decided to withdraw. Mr. Miller was then elected by acclamation.

There was a good deal of enthusiasm and the meeting though not very large was quite representative of the Conservatives of the city.

Much Interest  
In Coal Bunkers.

Much interest was taken last evening in the further announcement made in regard to the building of coal bunkers here, the preliminary steps in which were mentioned by the Daily News before the Christmas holiday, on Mr. Stutchbury's former visit to Prince Rupert and backed by an interview with Capt. Nicholson and Mr. Walton who also have taken a keen interest in the matter.

The erection of bunkers means a good deal to this town. It means that boats will call here, which otherwise would stay away. It means that a great deal of money will be spent here, which otherwise would go elsewhere. It means more employment on the waterfront and is one of the important steps in inducing industries to come here and in making this an industrial and shipping centre.

One of the arguments against making this the headquarters for ocean steamships was that coal was too expensive. With the erection of bunkers and the delivery of good steam coal here at about eight dollars a ton suitable for bunkering or general industrial purposes, there is every inducement for the northern boats to call here to purchase coal and for the industrial concerns to purchase their supplies at or through this port.

The fact that the Alberta Government is backing the proposal will give it strength and it is now practically assured that the bunkers will be erected this spring.

## When Shall We Be

## An Important City?

We shall be an important city when we make it such. Everything depends on the citizens. If they are petty in their outlook, we shall have a peanut city with a tribe of peanut politicians who will play petty politics. We have to get away from such a condition. We cannot look to governments or to other outsiders for our success. We must get busy ourselves and make things move. Each citizen should ask himself what he is doing to make this a bigger and better city, rather than to stand at the street corners and criticize others who are trying to do something.

Are you doing anything? If you are not, why not? We are not going to have a city built for us and be made rich in spite of ourselves. We must get down and dig and try to see the brighter side of things. There is a great future for the port, but it will not be tomorrow. The mills of the gods grind slowly and a city to be built permanently must be built slowly and with much tribulation.

## Ride on Crest of Prosperity Wave.

It was hoped at one time that someone would build a city here and all would ride in on the crest of a wave of great prosperity and every man would be a Croesus. This has been proved to be a myth. We have to work out our own salvation and sometimes doing so feels like drudgery. There will be no more high prices for real estate until the city is big and prosperous enough to warrant it. Prices here today are twice as high as in bigger cities, in so far as residential sites are concerned. If they go much higher, people will be prevented from coming here to locate. We are probably at a basic price. It is useless to look for any return of the fabulous prices which obtained during the boom days. They have fallen to almost nothing in other cities and this city cannot expect to be an exception to the general rule. Victoria and Vancouver cannot sell a good deal of property for enough to pay the taxes. The same is true on the prairies. Some day it may come back, but it will be a bad day for any city when real estate prices get beyond reach of the workingman who wishes to own a home.

Waiting for someone to make us rich is foolish. Look at things as they are at present and not as they maybe if something wonderful happens. The condition to be met is the one which now obtains and, while we expect better things, it is useless to think they will come unless we all put a shoulder to the wheel and help move them along.

## GREEK PREMIER DEAR OLD MAN

Hates Venizelos and Not Admirer of Monarchs.

ATHENS, Jan. 14.—Demetrios Rhalis, the new Greek Premier, who succeeded Venizelos when the latter was defeated in the elections last autumn, hates the sight of Venizelos and has by no means always been an admirer of Constantine, who now has been recalled as king.

Rhalis regards Venizelos as a political adventurer. This in part may be due to the fact that when Venizelos came from Crete to Athens and gained the political ascendancy, Rhalis' reputation as a politician was somewhat damaged.

In his long political career, the new premier has generally been at loggerheads with the crown. He often had disputes with the late King George and it was not until Constantine was deposed by the Entente powers that Rhalis really regarded him seriously. This action of the Entente, however, converted Rhalis to become a supporter of Constantine's cause and since 1916 he has been devoted to that ruler.

Rhalis is one of the most interesting characters in Greece. He is a polished statesman and is often referred to as a "dear old man." (He is about 80.)

His favorite pastime is goats and fowls, which he owns in great numbers, and feeds with his own hands. When not in public office he practices his profession of the law. In his younger days he spent a considerable fortune in politics.



NEW BATTERIES FOR  
TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

Old Set, Which Has Been in Use Since 1910, is Replaced.

New storage batteries for the municipal telephone system are being charged at the city hall today and tonight will be switched on to operate the exchange. The new set, which arrived a short time ago, consists of 22 storage cells, 11 of which are always in operation while the others are being charged.

The installation of the new set marks the first change since the original set was installed in the old exchange in August, 1910. The new set will be capable of carrying the city board up to its full capacity, including the new switchboard panel which is now on its way to the city.

## New Panel

On the arrival of the new switchboard panel the system will be able to accommodate 200 new subscribers. This will eliminate the congestion that has been in evidence in the past few months. Although the new panel has been shipped, advices as to the date of its arrival here have not yet been received.

The work of installation is being done entirely by the electrical staff of the light and telephone departments under the supervision of superintendent of utilities, T. C. Duncan.

JUDGE YOUNG LETS  
INDIAN BOYS OFF

Restitution Made of Money Secured on Forged Time Check and Promise to Behave

Robert Sankey and Joseph Wright, the young Indian boys from Port Simpson charged with forgery, appeared before Judge Young yesterday afternoon, and pleading guilty were released on suspended sentence after Indian Agent Perry had appeared on their behalf and pointed out their tender years and their responsibility at Port Simpson, their home.

"Apparently you did not appreciate the seriousness of the offence you committed," said the judge, "and I am going to let you off on suspended sentence. A long term might well have been imposed on you if I had thought that you fully realized the importance of the crime."

The boys promised to be on their good behavior and restitution has been made of the money they secured on the strength of the forged time check.

**COOPERAGE FOR PRINCE RUPERT**

W. E. Denning and William Wilson have Plans in Hand for New Industry

Plans for establishing a cooperage, the missing link in the local fish business, are now well underway and in a short time a plant will likely be in the course of erection at Cow Bay, its temporary site. This announcement was yesterday afternoon given to the Daily News in an interview with W. E. Denning, one of the principals in the proposed venture.

The need of such an establishment here to supply barrels, kegs and tierces for the local fish industry has long been felt and arrangements are now in such shape that the new plant will likely be able to supply the demands of this coming season.

**Domestic Requirements**

Besides supplying the fish business the establishment will also enter to domestic requirements in Prince Rupert. It will supply all the Northern fish business and will also manufacture kegs and boats for the fishing boats.

In the construction of these articles B.C. fir and spruce are mainly used and these woods are easily obtainable. It will be possible to supply to the northern business at a figure much lower than at present, the lower prices being made possible largely by the elimination of freight rates, which are necessarily high with the bringing in of such bulky articles from the south, the present source of supply.

**Returned Soldiers**

The principals in the new venture are W. E. Denning, a well-known old timer here and now secretary of the Longshoremen's Union, and William Wilson, government inspector for the herring pack at Alberni. Both are returned soldiers and highly capable men. They are backed by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., various northern cannery interests and the fish business generally. Government support is to be given to the concern and with favorable word from the Industrial Commission expected in a few days, the actual work of establishment will shortly commence.

**SCHOFIELD INQUEST REOPENS TOMORROW**

**Widow, Now Recovered, Seems to Be at Loss to Account for Cause of Tragedy.**

The Schofield inquest is to be reopened tomorrow by Coroner McMullin. Three weeks ago the hearing was adjourned in order to have an autopsy examination made and also to give Mrs. Schofield, the principal witness, an opportunity to recover from the sad Christmas affair.

Mrs. Schofield is now up and about but she seems to be somewhat at a loss to account for the cause of the poisoning which resulted in the death of her husband and her own narrow escape. **HUTTON MILLS CLOSED DOWN**

With No Logs and Glut of Lumber in Yards Plant Suspends Operations

The Hutton Mills, 58 miles east of Prince George, closed down last Saturday and most of the employees have left the place, some of them coming west, but most of them going to Edmonton where new mills are about to open up. There are two reasons for the shutdown. First the supply of logs has run out and second, the yards are filled with unmoved supplies of lumber. Loggers are still working in the woods and will continue to do so, but the removal of the lumber from the yards is indefinite. At the present time freight rates have made the transportation of lumber for long distances almost prohibitive.

In the spring the Hutton company will likely make a drive for the sale of lumber in the nearby farming districts. Although the reopening of the lumber mill is uncertain it is likely that the planing mill resume before long. The Hutton mill is one of the last mills on the line of the Canadian National to suspend operations. In the last season the local Provincial Bureau sent a number of men to this point.

**SCOTLAND IS MAINLY AGAINST PROHIBITION**

Majority of Over 200,000 Votes Favor of Continuing as at Present

EDINBURGH, Jan. 20.—Scotland has definitely decided to remain mainly wet. Voting on prohibition under the Scottish Temperance Act has been concluded with this result:

Polls were taken in 572 areas, with the result that 496 voted for no change in the present regulations, 41 for abolition of saloons and 35 for limitation of drink licenses.

As a consequence, out of a total in Scotland of 9,371 licenses, 447 will be withdrawn.

Of 1,453,978 individual voters, 692,222 were for no change; 442,530 for prohibition and 19,226 for limitation.

SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—The power schooner Olga of the Seattle Arctic fleet is now three weeks overdue from a voyage from Unalaska to Seattle. It is feared here that she has foundered. She carried a crew of six.
