## FIRST LAUNCHING THIS PORT

### C. SCOTT OF QUEBEC GIVES EVIDENCE REGARDING SKEENA RIVER COAL

#### Canadian Scottish Takes Water Under Auspicious Circumstances Everything Contributing to Very Successful Event

The launching of Prince Rupert's first steel steamer, Canadian Scottish, marking a most important epoch in the history of the city, yesterday afternoon was a highly successful event in every respect. The weather was beautiful and towards 3 o'clock the vessel took on a holiday appearance. With flags floating from every building in the city, business was practically suspended and the streets were thronged with people. The launch was made for the shipyard and other vantage points to witness the big 8,100-ton freighter take her initial ride into the deep blue waters of the harbor.

At 2:30 the Great War Veterans' band lined up on Third Avenue and marched to the shipyard followed by a great procession of people from the youngest to the oldest. By the time of their arrival there was a great crowd assembled both inside and outside the gates of the plant, all awaiting with interest the big event.

Shortly ahead of the band, Mrs. C. W. Peck and the launching party arrived on the scene and official photographs were taken before they moved to the launching platform, escorted by the guard of honor from the Sixteenth Canadian Scottish regiment and the band.

**Registered Here.**  
Mayor Rochester, from the launching platform, then read a sheet of telegrams that had been forwarded to himself by the company during the course of the day. Possibly the most interesting of these was one from Col. G. W. Peck, P. to himself announcing that the Canadian Scottish and Canadian Thrasher would be registered at Prince Rupert and that the name of this city would appear on the stern. The Scotchman shows Montreal as her port of registry but this will be changed.

**Member Wishes Luck.**  
There was also another telegram from Col. Peck to H. J. F. Turney, general manager of the ship, which read as follows: "I would like to have Captain S. Manson, M. C., of my office, who is the senior officer of the Canadian Scottish, represent me at Prince Rupert today. I wish you all sorts of good luck and also good luck to the ship. If she makes as successful voyages on the sea as the Sixteenth Battalion makes successful assaults on the battlefield she will have to go some. The department here is highly satisfied with your work."

A message from E. Hawkins, deputy minister of marine, was also read offering best wishes. There were also a number of telegrams from other parties including the Lieutenant-Governor, W. P. Hifton, and W. E. Dufferin, thanking the company for the invitations extended to be present and extending good wishes.

**The Christening.**  
At 4:18, Manager Turney gave the signal for the workmen to move from underneath the vessel and Miss Alice Du Vernet released the steam valve which set the vessel in motion down the ways. As she commenced to move, Mrs. C. W. Peck threw the bottle at the hull, officially announcing the christening.

In the evening there was a grand ball under the auspices of the Navy League which was a well attended and dressy affair. The general arrangements were in the hands of J. F. Maguire assisted by members of the executive of the Navy League. The Westholm orchestra provided the music and supper was served soon after midnight. Among the guests were Mrs. Peck of Vancouver and Miss Mary Izard of Victoria. The pipe band played one or two selections and gave an exhibition of highland dancing.

**RUSH WHEAT INTO STATES**  
DULUTH, May 12.—Shipments of Canadian wheat are being rushed into the United States through Duluth and Rainier free of duty by shippers who anticipate the signing of the emergency tariff measure by President Harding.

#### IRISH PEACE NOW IN SIGHT

Dublin Castle Optimistic as Result of Meeting Craig and Valera.

DUBLIN, May 13.—It is announced from Dublin Castle that the mere fact of a meeting between Sir James Craig, Viceroy of Ulster, and De Valera is the most significant development in the Irish controversy in years. The prospects for peace are materially improved, although definite results cannot yet be perceived.

#### SHOT MAY BEEN INTENDED FOR SINN FEINER

VANCOUVER, May 13.—Was the shot that killed W. F. Salisbury, Jr., on the night of April 12 on Georgia Street here intended for Osmond T. Gratton Esmonde, the alleged Sinn Feiner? This startling new clue the police are working on today. Interviewed, Esmonde told the police he had previously been accosted at night by ruffians and was within a few yards of Esmonde unknowingly about the time Salisbury was mysteriously murdered.

#### GUERRILLA WARFARE IN WEST VIRGINIA COAL MINING REGION

WILLIAMSON, West Virginia, May 13.—Guerrilla warfare is raging between the police and ambushed coal strikers in the towns of this region. The towns are terrorized by bands of miners and others who have taken advantage of the strike condition to commit many lawless acts. The police are unable so far to dislodge the snipers from the hillsides.

#### P. & O. STEAMER IN COLLISION

Patella with 1,000 on Board Beached at Entrance to Straits of Dover.

LONDON, May 13.—The Peninsular and Oriental liner Patella from London bound for Sydney, Australia, with 1,100 passengers and crew beached near the entrance to the Straits of Dover following a collision with the British tank steamer Patella. It is stated that all passengers will be safely landed.

#### NEW YORK MAY FINANCE THIS COUNTRY SOON

Preliminary Discussion Looking to Floating of \$40,000,000 Loan

NEW YORK, May 12.—Informal discussions in regard to Dominion of Canada financing in this market is going on in New York banking circles, it is stated. The Tribune says "the opinion is expressed that a loan of \$40,000,000 on a seven per cent basis will likely be arranged in New York before July 1 to take care of maturities and replenish the Dominion's United States balance."

#### USE AIRPLANES TO FIGHT FOREST FIRES

Sum of \$20,000 is Set Aside This Year for Purpose.

VICTORIA, May 13.—British Columbia will use airplanes to fight forest fires this year. The Provincial Government has set aside \$20,000 for this purpose. The machines will be used to locate the fire and rush fire fighters and equipment to the scene.

#### DEAN R. W. BROCK IS NOW LL.D. OF QUEENS LECTURED RECENTLY

KINGSTON, May 13.—The honorary degree of LL.D. was conferred on Dean R. W. Brock of the University of British Columbia on Wednesday.

Dean Brock lectured here in the Empress Theatre about two weeks ago.

#### DOUKHOBORS WANT RETURN TO RUSSIA

RIGA, May 12.—Canadian Doukhobors, a religious sect expelled from Russia about 1915 have applied for permission to return to Russia, says a Moscow despatch.

#### WOMAN ELECTROCUTED WHEN DRAWING PLUG

WINNIPEG, May 13.—Mrs. A. K. Reynolds, 39 years of age, was accidentally electrocuted yesterday when she attempted to withdraw the electric plug from a small heater in her home.

#### STUDENT KILLED BY A LIVE WIRE

TORONTO, May 13.—Arthur Richardson, eighteen years of age, a student at the technical school here, was instantly killed by the shock received when he grasped the end of a broken wire on the sidewalk last night.

#### BOMB IS HURLED AT POLICE LORRY

Panic Results and Several Persons Were Wounded—Republicans Shot.

DUBLIN, May 13.—Fourteen civilians were injured when a bomb was thrown at a police auxiliary lorry and a panic resulted. The police shot three republicans at Listowel and wounded several others following an ambush.

#### NOVA SCOTIA COAL GOING TO ENGLAND

Three Shiploads Leaving With 20,000 Tons—Reigning Coal Situation.

GLACE BAY, N.S., May 13.—Three shiploads of coal are being sent from here to England to help relieve the situation caused by the complete stoppage of the British mines as a result of the strike. These ships contained 26,000 tons and an effort will be made, it is understood, to distribute the fuel by means of voluntary workers who have enlisted in London for that purpose.

#### LLOYD GEORGE MAKES SPEECH

Says Action of Polish Insurrectionists Contrary to Treaty of Versailles.

LONDON, May 13.—Premier Lloyd George in a dramatic speech in the House of Commons concerning the Silesian imbroglio said the action of the Polish insurrectionists was a complete defiance of the Treaty of Versailles.

#### Skeena River Coal is of Fine Grade Suitable for Ships and All Other Uses

OTTAWA, May 13.—Before the parliamentary fuel committee J. C. Scott of Quebec, head of the company developing coal fields on the Skeena River, British Columbia, described the coal as of fine grade suitable for ships and all other uses, but the field was 150 miles from the railway and 100 miles from the nearest water.

Nova Scotia coal operators refused to produce coal sheets as directed by the committee.

The coal fields referred to are thought to be those in the Groundhog district, the railway being the G. T. P. at Hazelton and the water, the head of Portland Canal.

Ship Launching Great Success.

There never was a ship launching went off more successfully than that of yesterday. There may have been some just as successful but to improve on yesterday would have been impossible.

Congratulate Ourselves.

People of Prince Rupert can congratulate themselves not only on the establishment of a industry here, which it is very likely may be permanent, but also on the general condition of business at this point.

Bankers' View Of Situation.

The Bank of Commerce Review of the situation says: Normally in May the influx of immigration, and the resumption of inland water traffic, and of agriculture and other outdoor industries, create commercial activity.

In April and May the building trades generally absorb a substantial proportion of the available supply of casual labor, but so far this year this absorption has been below normal.

Condition On the Farms.

Wages for farm labor have dropped as precipitately as have the prices of agricultural products. Last year \$80 and \$90 per month and board were normal monthly wages in the western provinces; at the present time they are \$40 and \$50, as compared with so revolutionary a change in the chief industry of the country, the other changes which have taken place are insignificant, and that is in itself causing a delay in business readjustment.

Under the circumstances the extent to which the volume of retail trade has been maintained is surprising. Payments by retailers, however, and by those of their customers to whom they have given credit are not up to normal.

## PAT DALY HAS TIME OF LIFE IN NEW YORK

Says Jazz Music Originated in Ireland and Demonstrates Fact

### REFUSES TO STRETCH NECK AT SKYSCRAPERS

Stewart Miner is Star Provider of Copy for Metropolitan Papers

NEW YORK, May 13.—(By Canadian Press)—Patrick Daly, of Nelson, B. C., miner and prospector and one-time candidate for legislative honors in British Columbia, is in New York in connection with a suit for \$1,960,000, which he has started against Neil, Trite, Wood, and Wilson, mine operators at Fernie, B.C. The complaint in the suit now pending in the Superior Court of the State of Washington, alleges the firm promised him one-fifth of the stock of the Premier mine which the operators sold to the Guggenheim mining interests for about \$10,000,000, and that they did not give him his share. The mine is at the head of the Portland Canal, near Stewart, B.C. Daly and his lawyer, Judge Frederick C. Robertson of Spokane, Washington, claim that he is the discoverer of the mine.

Daly asserts that he worked for ten years of the sixty-four of his life in developing the Premier and he said something like \$2,000,000 worth of ore, gold and silver, was taken from it in the past winter.

**Seeing New York**

When not busy conferring with Judge Robertson, Mr. Daly has been very busy seeing New York. This, he told an interviewer recently is his first trip east of the Rockies in thirty-six years—since he started prospecting in the Canadian northwest—and he is much impressed with New York and New Yorkers. Many New Yorkers have also been much impressed with Mr. Daly, for he is credited with having succeeded in demonstrating several things which were hitherto unknown to them.

One of these, according to the local newspapers, is that jazz music really originated in Ireland. Another is that a visitor can go about viewing New York's skyscrapers without experiencing a sore neck.

**Plays His Flute**

Daly visited a cabaret the other evening and carried with him a tin flute which he loves because it has "been good company in lonely spots." He played this flute at the cabaret and the orchestra had to stop. The instrument cost him ten cents in Nome. Later he played it for New York newspaper men who went to interview him. He vowed that jazz music originated in Ireland and demonstrated it by playing an Irish air. "I proved that to them."

at the cabaret," he said, according to the interviewers.

One newspaper reports that Daly told him in all seriousness that when he first arrived he hired a cart and lying in the bottom of it, was driven through the skyscraper districts. "A man couldn't be expected to set up and stretch his neck all over New York," he explained.

**Prohibition**

Another reporter secured Daly's views on Prohibition. The Nelson miner had made a friend in the lobby of the Pennsylvania hotel, where he is staying, and the friend being in a rather helpless condition on account of prohibition went to sleep that night in the centre of the only bed. So Daly got a couple of blankets and went to sleep on the floor in real prospector fashion.

"Prohibition," he philosophized to the reporter, "is much better as we have it in British Columbia. A man can't buy more than a barrel a day there."

### "IF I WERE KING" AT WESTHOLME TONIGHT

## DEVELOPMENT AT STEWART

D. B. Morkill Talks of Premier Mine and Other Properties in the North.

D. B. Morkill, the mining engineer, who is on his way to Stewart for the season, and who addressed the Rotary Club yesterday, spoke of the spirit of optimism which was the spirit of the north. The progress of the Portland Canal country depended on the progress of mining. The bulk of the trade of the district centred in Prince Rupert. On that account the business of the district was the business of this city.

"Things on the surface may look quiet," said Mr. Morkill. "There is, however, a gradual and steady development and Prince Rupert will share in the advance."

## Price of Silver.

"Mining activity depends largely on the price of the metals. The price went down last year but this condition will soon be corrected. The price of silver a little over a year ago was \$1.30 an ounce and people said it would never go below a dollar. It dropped to fifty cents and now there are people who say it will never get back to a dollar, but it is steadily moving up and I look to see it go to eighty or ninety cents in the near future."

Discussing the Premier mine, Mr. Morkill said it had turned out bigger than anybody expected. He thought in ten years from now it would be bigger yet. Last season they shipped a million dollars' worth, getting the ore out on sleighs. This was not a silver mine, as many people supposed, but a gold mine. There was rich silver mixed in the high grade. The installation of the huge tramway would make it possible to ship much more ore and lower grade. This mine is the leading property of the district simply because more work has been done on it than on other properties.

## Several Premiers.

The season was short at Stewart, that is why it was difficult to get ahead with development fast. No doubt several other Premier mines would be found in the district. Several properties were to work this year on the Salmon River. The Leckie and Tubman and other prospects would be developed on the Bear. The Redcliff mine had been sold and would be developed. Everything pointed to a busy season.

Mr. Morkill urged his hearers to think provincially instead of locally. There was too much thinking only of localities. What was wanted now was not a boom but steady development. He hoped all would try to visit the camp when the Vancouver excursion went there early in June.
