MARINES BROKE INTO JAIL AND RELEASED MAN

Serious Action of Men from the
Bremerton Naval Yard on
Saturday Night.

BREMERTON, Jan. 31.—A hun-
dred marines from the Puget
Sound Naval Yard, a good number
of them being armed with forty-
fives late Saturday night stormed
the city jail, broke down the
doors after backing two patrol-
men to the wall at the point of
their guns, and released their
fellow marine who was locked in
jail and two women, all of whom
are still at large.

Premier Meighen Urged to Provide Fish Cars for Port

Joint Committee of the City Council, Board of Trade and
Fisheries Association Sends Urgent Message Asking
for Relief from Present Situation

Following the reading of telegrams from Hon. J. D. Reid,
minister of railways; John Pullen, head of the Canadian Express
Co., and D. B. Hanna, of the Canadian National Railways, the
following night lettergram was despatched to Premier Meighen
by a joint committee of the City Council, Board of Trade, and
Fisheries Association on Saturday:

"The express refrigerator car shortage situation reported to
government and railway officials is so acute that immediate steps
must be taken by the Government to relieve it. The deep seas

fishing season is now open with
a fishing fleet twenty per cent
larger than in former years. A
tremendous demand is now on for
lent. This traffic will be diverted
to Seattle for shipment to eastern
markets of the United States and
Canada.

"We appeal to you for cars.
Conserve our fishing industry by
immediately securing express re-
frigerator cars. Millions of
pounds of fish that would be ship-
ped by rail from this port has
been compelled to go to Seattle.
Schooner Commonwealth called
yesterday with 90,000 lbs. halibut
but no cars here so forced to go
to Seattle. This is a daily oc-
currence.

"We need eighty additional ex-
press refrigerator cars. Thirty
were promised for last August,
but are not manufactured yet, we
are advised. They will not com-
mence to deliver them until March
15. This means ruin. Can you
not help?"

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—King Al-

make it an open event for cham-
pionship of the high seas.

Chinaman Burned to Death at Hazelton

Fire Destroys Ingenica Hotel and Resi-
dence of J. C. K. Sealy; Three
Chinese Have Narrow Escape

HAZELTON, January 31.—Sam Lee, a Chinaman, was burned
to death and three other Chinese had narrow escapes when fire
destroyed the old Ingenica Hotel at Hazelton and the residence
of J. C. K. Sealy which adjoined it. The fire broke out about four
o'clock Sunday morning and had made such headway before being
discovered that everything was destroyed. Sam Lee was pro-
prietor of the Royal Cafe in the hotel building and everything in
it was destroyed but part of the furniture in Sealy's house was
saved. It is estimated that the total loss will be not less than
\$8,000.

This is the second fire at Hazelton within the month. Both
buildings and furniture were partly covered by insurance.

Two Fish Boats Cleared For Seattle Last Night

Car Shortage Continues and General Feeling of Dis-
gust Prevails in Waterfront Fishing Circles

Four fish boats are waiting till tomorrow for sale and two
with 33,000 pounds cleared for Seattle last night on account of
the continuing car shortage. There was but one car available
for the week-end arrivals and this was despatched east by the
Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. Fifteen cars are reported
to have left for the west but there are none this side of Prince
George. It is likely some days before the fifteen will reach here.
In the meantime fish is being turned away.

The following are the arrivals and sales for the week-end:

Caroten, 16,000 pounds, and
Yellowstone, 8,000 pounds, sold
to the Cold Storage yesterday
morning for shipment east at
18.1c and 7c.

Lincoln sold to the Cold Storage
for freezing at 11c and 7c.

Defence, 14,000 pounds; Spen-
cer, 15,000; Alii, 7,000, and
Tramp, 10,000, are awaiting sale.

Agnes, 16,000 pounds, and Pel-
ican, 17,000 pounds, cleared for
Seattle.

A general feeling of disgust
among both fish companies and
fishermen prevails along the
waterfront. One fisherman re-
marked this morning: "This is a
hell of a port; we'll get out of
here this time and never come
back."

WOUNDED IN IRISH AMBUSH

Collingwood House Wrecked by
Black and Tans Who Were
Searching for Rebel.

BELFAST, Jan. 31.—An officer
and one man were seriously
wounded and five others slightly
wounded when a lorry was am-
bushed on Saturday night in the
vicinity of Tarnare on the south
side of Dublin. A bomb was ex-
ploded and shots were fired at the
lorry, to which the soldiers replied
vigorously. The assailants es-
caped.

Collingwood House in Ranelagh,
a Dublin suburb, was wrecked on
Saturday night by the military.
It was owned by the mother of
Patrick H. Pears, once provisional
president of Ireland, who was ex-
ecuted after the 1916 rebellion.

The military were seeking Richard
Mulcahy, a member of the Daile
Eireann and rumored chief of
staff of the republican army. Ac-
cording to Mrs. Pears, the place
was wrecked by the Black and
Tans.

ALEX. MANSON ORDERED OUT POLICE COURT

Magistrate Objects to Remarks of
Counsel Resenting
Insinuation.

Alex. Manson, M.P.P., was this
morning ordered from the police
court by Police Magistrate Mc-
Mordie for making remarks con-
sidered derogatory to the dignity
of the bench.

In the case of Rex vs. Rutland
the member for Omineca had been
cross-examining a witness at
some length and apologized to the
magistrate for taking so much
time. He said the peculiar case
demanded it. The magistrate in-
terjected "and the size of the
gallery."

Mr. Manson resented the re-
mark and said: "Your Worship. A
man of your brains and education
should not be guilty of making an
insinuation that my cross-exami-
nation was dictated by the size of
the gallery. It is quite immaterial
to me if your worship clears the
courtroom."

Magistrate McMordie requested
Mr. Manson to apologize, which
the latter refused to do.

The magistrate then requested
Mr. Manson to leave the court
room.

Mr. Manson did not do so but
said that he had sent for his part-
ner to take over the brief and
without waiting further the mag-
istrate adjourned the court.

Urgent Need of Government Action.

There is urgent need of Government action in regard to the supply of fish cars for this port. There is every indication that this will be a big fish year. The catches made so far have been good and there will be at least a twenty per cent larger fleet operating from this port than last year, if only cars can be obtained to handle the product. Unfortunately the railway officials and Government do not seem to realize the gravity of the situation. They have not taken action as they should, knowing the conditions that exist here.

Must Be Fair To the Railway.

There is every desire to be fair to the railway company. There is nothing to be gained by hounding them, but we must have their co-operation in our legitimate endeavors to expand. The Daily News has been careful not to exaggerate in giving the news of the car shortages and in other matters in which they are concerned. We gave the cargo of the Commonwealth, which had to go south, as 80,000 lbs. whereas the general opinion is that she carried 90,000 lbs. We put the express charges on the 80,000 lbs. of fish as \$2,400 whereas we have been since informed that the express charges on most of the fish shipped from here would amount to a thousand dollars more than that for the same amount. The rate on fish to points west of Detroit is \$3.93 per cwt. and for points east of Detroit \$4.28. Most of the cars go to points east of Detroit. The railway company therefore loses immensely by every car load of fish that goes south. It seems as if it should be in their own interests for the railway to handle the business we offer instead of consistently turning it down for years.

Campbell Resignation Much Regretted.

The resignation of E. E. Campbell, manager of the Anyox mine, will be regretted, especially by those interested in sport in this part of the country. No one was keener than Mr. Campbell to see that a ball team was sent here for the fair or that a racing boat was on hand to make an effort to carry off the speed boat cup. He was always a good sport, and while he tried to win, did not mind losing. He will be much missed in the north.

Settlement With Germany Satisfactory.

It is satisfactory to know that there has been a settlement with Germany over the matter of reparations. Had there been serious disagreement among the powers, Germany might have escaped to some extent the duty of restoring the damage which she caused in Europe. While other countries were suffering Germany escaped. None of the fighting was on her territory. None of her homes were destroyed. Now she must pay for the restoration of the places which she has laid waste. It is inevitable. It may be hard on the people but they must know what it is to suffer for the wrong they did, just as the people of the other countries suffered only in immensely less degree.

Interest in Girl Who Was Drowned.

Everyone seemed interested in the death of the hobo girl, who jumped from the Fraser bridge Saturday afternoon and was drowned. The Daily News published the story of her trip south on the Prince George and within little more than an hour of her death this paper was being sold on the street telling the story. Few of us saw the girl but all sympathized with her and deeply regretted her death.

PROGRESSIVE MINING YEAR

Production Much Greater in North Account Granby and Dolly Varden

LARGE OUTPUT OF DOLLY VARDEN MINE

"This year has been, in the northeastern mineral district, without a doubt a most progressive one for the mining industry," says George A. Clothier, resident mining engineer, in his report to the government. "Increase in the number and activities of prospectors has been apparent, and the number of field engineers in the district throughout the year is evidence that the larger mining companies are alive to the possibilities of this portion of the province."

A greatly increased amount of development work has been done by the owners of claims, the small mining operators and the large companies and there has been an encouraging percentage of favorable results. The "broken" mining operator has not been active to a great extent and the public are wisely preferring to back up the properties investigated and reported upon by competent engineers and being developed by reputable mining men.

Increased Tonnage
The tonnage mined in the year has increased by 200,000 tons in this district due to the Granby and Dolly Varden mines. Granby's gold production has nearly doubled and silver has increased by 500,000 ounces on account of the splendid output of Granby and the Dolly Varden. Copper production is greater by about 5,750,000 pounds, the Granby Company again being responsible, while the smaller shippers were about the same as last year.

Atlin
The Atlin, Strathcona and Liard placers produced 6,300 ounces of gold during the year. The Granby Consolidated had an output of 9,160 ounces of gold, 339,238 ounces of silver and 25,304,400 pounds of copper. From the Golskeish mines, at Anyox, came 585 ounces of gold and 1,625 ounces of silver and from the Esperanza at Alice Arm, 4 ounces of gold and 3,788 ounces of silver. The Dolly Varden made an output of 870,000 ounces of silver. The Premier, at Stewart, mined 2,701 ounces of gold and 92,183 ounces of silver, while the production at Surf Inlet is placed at 50,000 ounces of gold, 30,000 ounces of silver and 800,000 pounds of copper. Other small producers were: Patterson Group, Porcher Island, 50 ounces of gold and 30 ounces of silver; Ikeda Mines, 26 ounces of gold, 290 ounces of silver and 21,098 pounds of copper; Drum Lummon, 31 ounces of gold, 540 ounces of silver and 39,600 pounds of copper.

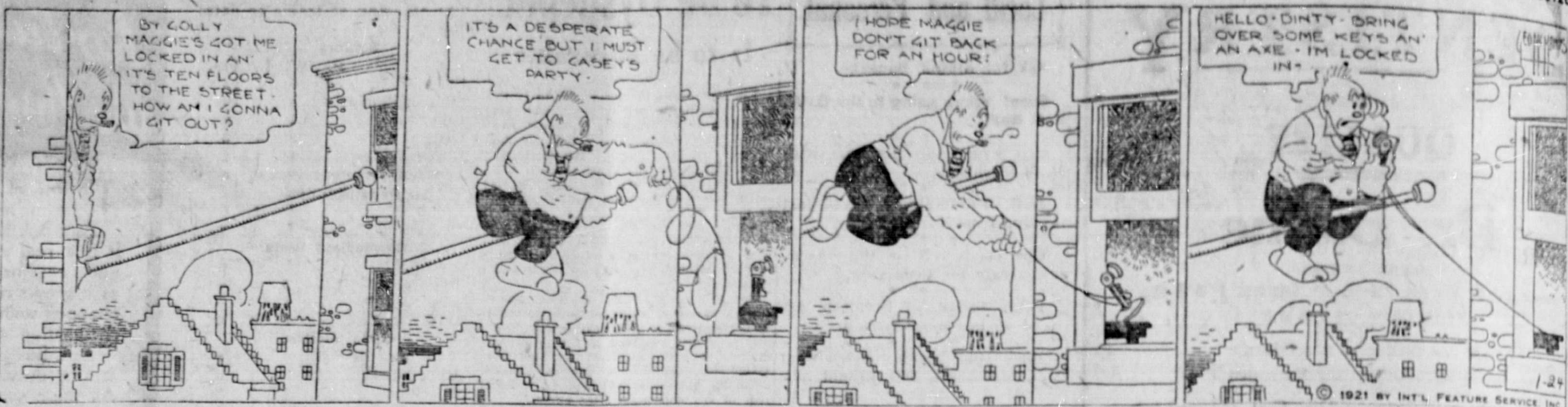

KETCHIKAN MAN OPPOSES TREATY

Would Have Legislation Enacted to Kill Fish Business at Prince Rupert

That the American-Canadian Fisheries treaty which grew out of the American-Canadian Fisheries Conference two years ago is inimical to the interests of Alaska and that its ratification by the Senate should be prevented if possible is the opinion of H. C. Strong, Ketchikan business man who has been spending two or three days in Juneau, and who, with Mrs. Strong, left for their home at Ketchikan last night, says the Juneau Empire.

"Canada's interest in this treaty lies in the fact that it would bar the United States for at least seventeen years from enacting tariff or other legislation governing these fisheries. It would give her control of the fish taken from Alaskan banks through the vessels operating from her ports, and American markets would be required to pay Canada for this catch. Will our statesmen be so blind as to permit the ratification of such a treaty?"

On Fresh Fish

"On account of the geographical position of Canada, lying between Alaska and our States, and possessing conditions fostered by her government, it has become absolutely necessary for our government to enact legislation if the Pacific fisheries supported by the American markets are to be an American resource. Let us consider what the following measure would mean for Alaska and America as a whole—either a reasonable tariff measure affecting fish prepared for shipment at a foreign port or a legislative act as follows:

"On and after ninety days after the passage of this act, no fresh or frozen fish taken from the North Pacific Ocean or tributary waters shall be admitted to the United States through any foreign country except when the same shall be admitted in bond from an American port."

"This in effect would automatically move across the line from British Columbia to Alaska the buyers representing our Eastern wholesale fish houses. Alaskan ports would become the home and base of supply for the fishing fleet. American markets would be required to pay for this supply of fish instead of to British Columbia as they now do."

Would Give Population

"This effective legislation will do more to give the coast towns of Alaska a permanent population than any act within the power of our government and it can be brought about without doing injustice to Canada or even Canadian fishermen, for we are only regulating our own supply and our ports would be open to free entry of fish to either Canadian or American vessels when discharging at an American port by the vessel catching the same, and the Canadian railway system which has the shortest and quickest route between Alaska and our Eastern markets would, to get this great volume of business, co-operate in the establishment of a ferry service from its terminus at Prince Rupert across to Alaska, permitting our products to move in refrigerator cars direct

from Alaska to our Eastern centres of distribution as freely as shipments now move from the State of Michigan through Southern Ontario, via Canadian railroads into the State of New York.

Still Unratified.

"The treaty now in the hands of our Department of State, but as yet unratified by the United States Senate, would strike a terrific blow to the existing and future development of the fisheries of the North Pacific, from an American standpoint," said Mr. Strong.

Continuing, Mr. Strong said: "American harbors in Alaska are the refuge for the vessels operating on the most extensive fishing banks in the world which are tributary to the Alaska coast. The American consuming public is the logical and only existing profitable market for the product, yet the treaty which has been drafted prohibits our Government from enacting any legislation affecting these fisheries or their products for a period of fifteen years, and then only upon giving Canada two years' notice."

Prince Rupert Would Benefit.

"This in effect gives the Canadian port of Prince Rupert every advantage, it being the closest port to the Alaska fisheries possessing direct connections with eastern markets of the United States, and with the support of the Canadian Government, Alaska and our American ports would forever lose the opportunity of becoming the home port, and of obtaining the benefits derived from this industry and the operation of the principal fleet catching the fish."

THE TRAGEDY OF AUSTRIA

Terrible Privations Suffered by Inhabitants of Vienna

VIENNA, Jan. 30.—An American business man who has just revisited this city was so surprised at the changes that had taken place in the once gay Austrian capital that he declared the "panorama of misery" he witnessed here was the greatest shock of his life.

Henry Barna, of St. Paul, Minn., last visited Vienna ten years ago when, as he said, there was "great fun" here. Now he has returned and spent about two weeks, long enough, he says, to know what he is talking about.

"I never dreamed," said Mr. Barna to an American Red Cross representative here, "that Vienna would show such tragic effects of the war. I have been in nearly every capital of Europe since the armistice, but nowhere have I seen such wholesale misery. Everything is out of joint. Everything is uncertain. Food is scarce, and fuel still more difficult to obtain. I don't suppose anyone can be happy in a sea of misery like this."

Not a Smile

"Why," he went on, "there isn't a smile, much less a laugh, in that crowd," referring to the people passing the hotel in the Ringstrasse. "They seem so sad and dull-eyed, these Viennese, who were so gay when I was here before."

"Everybody seems to be carrying something. These little bundles are scraps of food which they have been given by some more fortunate neighbor or the relief agencies. There's a man in a fur coat carrying a handkerchief full of food. He wouldn't be seen doing that when I was here last. He would be too proud."

Carrying Wood

Mr. Barna told of a visit he had made a few days before to the Wienerwald, a great forest, an hour's street car ride from the centre of Vienna where he saw a sight which he likened to a nightmare. The people were allowed to go there for wood, were emerging from the forest, their backs heavily laden with the packs of fuel.

"There were hundreds of men, women and children," he said, "their clothing soaked with the cold rain, and they were filing along the roadside in an almost unbroken line, all headed for Vienna, stooped from the weight of 60 or 70 pounds of wet wood. Sixty pounds was their allowance, but I was told that many slipped by the inspectors with more than that."

Hear Water Ooze

"There were many sorts of people in that line which has been stretched along that road for more than a year. I saw a woman of evident gentle birth, in a fur coat, probably the last vestige of her wealth, bent over under the weight of her pack, trudging along beside a former officer in the Austrian army who still wore his great grey coat and cap. Then came children of the very poor with their little feet protruding from their worn shoes. It was very wet underfoot and at their every step one could hear the water oozing from their shoes."

The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about at the head of Lowe Inlet, and will be used for power purposes upon the land described as kum-ow-wah Indian Reserve No. 2 and Crown lands.
