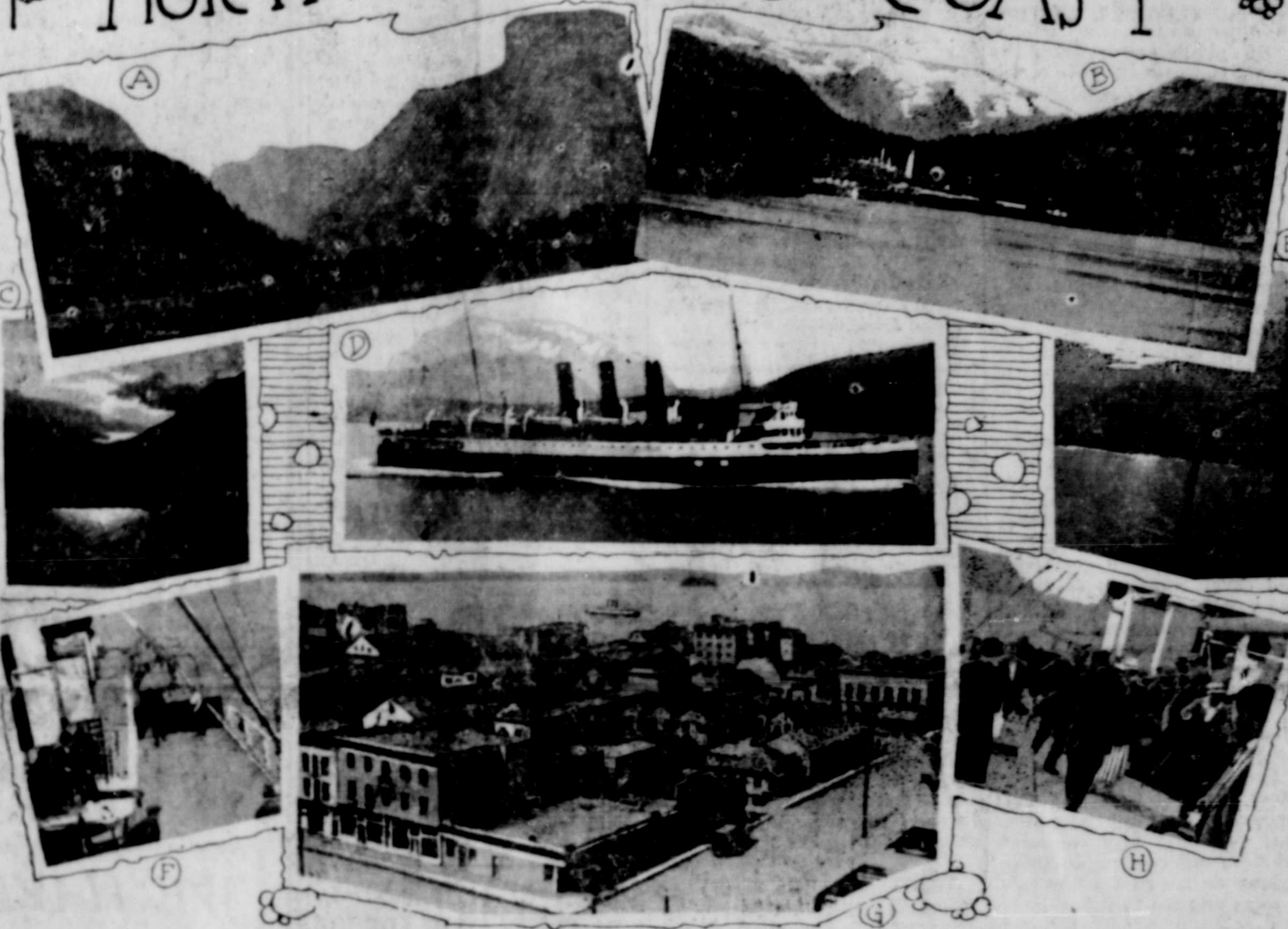

POULTRY CLUB FORMED HERE

Enthusiastic Meeting Last Night
Took Up Suggestion of W.
James, Government Judge

At an enthusiastic meeting of local poultry men in the council chamber last evening, the Prince Rupert Poultry Association, the first organization of its kind in the city, was established. Members were enrolled and officers were elected and the club was given a good start. W. James, editor of the Poultry World and T. M. Anderson, who were judges at the Exhibition sent by the Department of Agriculture, addressed the meeting and joined the newly formed society each putting up silver cups for competition in the poultry classes at next year's fair. It was decided by the meeting to join the B. C. Poultry Association so that the advantage may be taken of yearly grants of not less than \$150 which are made by the provincial government.

Vice-President—J. R. Murray.
Secretary-Treasurer—H. M. Daggett.
Committee—J. Unwin, D. Scott, H. R. Smith, R. M. Clarke, W. H. Melliar and J. Lettis.

Expected Better.

Mr. James gave a highly interesting address to the meeting. He had been surprised to see so much apathy to poultry breeding in the city. He had expected a better show at the Exhibition than he had seen both in number of entries and the quality of the fowl exhibited although he admitted there were several good birds. It was no use blaming the executive of the Fair Association and the fault was with the poultrymen themselves. The only way to make headway was to co-operate with the Fair Board and by forming a local poultry association weight could be brought to bear. Individuality always fell by the wayside.

"The prospects for poultry culture in Northern B. C. are bright," said Mr. James, "but what is wanted is a barrel of pep and two cases of enthusiasm."

Combat Oriental.
The speaker explained how an executive committee consisting

of five members had been formed to combat the use of the Oriental egg. This committee comprised Rev. McDermott, of Mission City, Professor Lloyd, of the University of B. C., H. M. Rutledge, of Sardis, Richard Wilson, president of the B. C. Poultrymen's Association and himself. They had in view the drafting of an act to be presented to the federal government entirely excluding the Oriental egg. There was one weakness which was undermining the work of the association and that was the fact that there are not enough eggs produced to meet the demand in this country. There was only one thing to do and that was for poultrymen to co-operate and breed sufficient poultry to supply the demand. There was not a better market to be found than right in British Columbia and the people were always willing to pay the price for a good article.

Mr. James then suggested the forming of a local association and the suggestion was received with a great deal of enthusiasm and it was immediately decided to organize one then and there. The first member enrolled was Mr. Anderson, followed by Mr. James and then the rest present at the meeting. An immediate meeting with the Fair association was then proposed by Mr. James with a view to improving the Exhibition building especially in regard to the poultry coops.

Co-operation.
Mr. Anderson gave a brief talk dealing with the importance of co-operation and the benefits to be gained thereby. He gave some interesting figures to back this up.

The meeting closed with a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. James and Mr. Anderson.

LOOKS LIKE NEW YORK IN NATIONAL

Must Win Ten of Fourteen to
Tie Cleveland for
Americans.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—The New York Americans were pulled from first place when St. Louis won from them yesterday, putting Cleveland, who beat Washington, two points in the lead.

The New York Giants increased their lead to three and a half points by winning from Pittsburgh, their nearest rivals. It was the Giants' ninth straight victory, also the ninth straight over Pittsburgh. New York has eleven games to play, and by winning five and losing six would finish the season with a percentage of 610. To equal this Pittsburgh must win ten of the fourteen remaining games.

LARGE CROWD WAS AT DANCE IN RINK

One Hundred and Twenty Couples

There was a larger crowd than usual at the rink dance last evening, the attendance numbering about 120 couples. After the carnival at the Exhibition building many went to the rink, where they spent the rest of the evening. The Westholme Orchestra provided high-class music. L. J. Marren was master of ceremonies, Mrs. Stilwell and George Corke were on the door, and Mrs. Carrall had charge of refreshments.

VALERA EXPRESSES SURPRISE AT PREMIER NOT UNDERSTANDING

LONDON, Sept. 17.—De Valera telegraphed Lloyd George last night expressing surprise that the Premier did not see that Ireland's position would be irreparably prejudiced if she entered the proposed conference without making her position quite clear.

QUEST LEAVES FOR ANTARCTIC

LONDON, Sept. 17.—The Quest, the small ship on which Sir Ernest Shackleton will explore the uncharted regions of the Atlantic, Pacific and Antarctic seas, left the Thames today on a start of her two years' voyage. A large crowd gathered to wish the party a successful voyage.

CAPTAIN JANNEY IS STILL HUNGRY

LETHBRIDGE, Sept. 17.—The forty-second day of Capt. Janney's hunger strike in protest against his arrest charged with illegal sale of stock found his condition unchanged. He still refuses food.

ANOTHER SENATOR DIES AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Sept. 17.—Senator William Cameron Edwards died here this morning aged 77. He had been ill for two weeks and two days ago he collapsed.

CANNOT BE SEPARATE

Lloyd George Sends Reply to
De Valera's Latest Move.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—Premier Lloyd George today, replying to a communication of De Valera, says to receive the Sinn Fein delegation to the proposed conference as representatives of an independent sovereign state would "constitute a formal and official recognition of Ireland's severance from the King's domains."

Lloyd George further says that so long as De Valera insists the Irish confer as representatives of an independent state a conference is impossible.

FRANCOIS LAKE LADY GETS NICE LEGACY

Will of Late Mrs. Holmes Probated in Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 17.—Elizabeth Ethel Beach of Francois Lake and Elsie Holmes of Vancouver with a quarter and three-quarter shares respectively got \$4925 from the estate of their mother, Lavinia Francis Holmes, who died in December last and whose will has been probated here.

LOTTERY FRUSTRATED BY ST. LOUIS POLICE

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 17.—A lottery on the attendance at the forthcoming world series of baseball was frustrated when the police arrested three men and confiscated ten thousand tickets.

DR. THOMPSON NOT CANDIDATE

Refuses to Accept Nomination
As Financial Sacrifice Too
Great.

DAWSON, Sept. 17.—Dr. Alfred Thompson, member of Parliament for Yukon, has formally announced his intention of retiring from public life on the expiration of the present term. He told his supporters he would not be a candidate at the forthcoming election. He had served for fourteen years and the reason he would not run again was that the sessional indemnity was too small and the financial sacrifice too great for so remote a constituency. He left here for Ottawa.

PECK MAY LEAD NEW LEAGUE OF RETURNED MEN

TORONTO, Sept. 17.—Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V.C., member of the federal house for Skeena, has been formally invited to take the presidency of the Canadian Legion, a new soldier body which was officially launched at a conference of soldier heads here on Tuesday.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 17.—At a mass meeting of ex-service men of all organizations here it was decided unanimously to press for amalgamation of all returned soldier organizations. A Victoria meeting took similar action.

Manslaughter Charge Set Over to
September 26.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—The arraignment of Roscoe Arbuckle in the Superior Court on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe was today continued until September 26.

Wonderful Scenery
Throughout the North.

The scenery of the great north country is one of the great attractions. To everyone who visits Prince Rupert the mountains and sunsets and unusual cloud effects are most attractive. To make side trips up the rivers or into some of the natural canals or inlets is a revelation. A run up Gardner's Canal cannot be beaten from a scenic point of view. Everywhere one goes there are things to see that are not only attractive but fascinating.

A resident of the north country in discussing the outdoor life of the district went into ecstasies over the opportunities for hunting and fishing. Everywhere were opportunities, and amidst surroundings that cannot be beaten. He said he had travelled the Naas, he had been up and down the coast and into all sorts of out of the way places, and wherever he went there was good fishing, goat hunting, bear occasionally, and birds and deer. In what other part of the world is it possible to strike into the woods almost anywhere during the season and pick up a fine buck? This north country has all the others beaten when it comes to outdoor attractions.

Go Carefully
With a Camera.

The modern hunter carries a camera. Some hunters take nothing more dangerous, but whether they also take a rifle or shotgun, they take a kodak too. The thing to avoid is under-exposure, especially in winter or spring or autumn. Often it is necessary to speed up, but the lens should be as wide open as possible, consistent with common sense. Most photographs are spoiled by under-exposure.

Hunting Days Are
Days of Danger.

The fool with the gun is the most dangerous fool there is. There are some who go out into the woods and when they hear something blaze away before making sure that it is not another hunter instead of game. Every year sees shooting accidents, usually caused by the excitement and carelessness of so-called sportsmen. Before going out, as many will do tomorrow, it is well to think carefully of the danger some other hunter may possibly run through your carelessness.

Bylaws Vote
Taken Next Week.

While this has been a week of festivity, we must not forget the serious business of voting on the bylaws which are to come up next week. There is a letter in another place in this paper explaining what they mean. The school has been built and must be paid for; water extensions are necessary with the growth of the city; the proposed new pulp industry should be encouraged, especially when such encouragement does not cost us anything. We ask consideration for all these bylaws on the part of the rate-payers who, by the way, are the only ones eligible to vote.

Ball Teams
Cannot Go South.

Ball teams cannot go south to play any of the amateur teams because they have not amateur standing. All the baseball clubs in Victoria and Vancouver and at most other centres, with the exception of the regular professional teams, are affiliated with the B. C. A. A. U., and as there is no such affiliation here games can not be played.

There is no reason why outlying places should not develop good baseball teams, just as Cumberland and Ladysmith developed good football teams. The question of amateur affiliation will have to come up, however, before any attempt can be made to take a team south to play in Vancouver.

It was explained that the contract was let for the new station and that next time he came it would probably be ready for him right here.

The traveller went on to tell of the wonderful Jasper Park, a place almost unknown to the multitudes of the East, of that mecca of the discerning few, the playground which has seldom been heard of beyond the confines of Western Canada and to the thousand and one beauties along the line of the Canadian National between Edmonton and Prince Rupert.

Speaking of the Skeena Canyon he said: "There is nothing in the world just like it. The C.P.R. has nothing to offer that can equal it. Those gorgeous snow capped mountains with the splendid reaches of river are simply wonderful. Give me the Skeena every time. I want to make the trip in the opposite direction so that I can see it from a different angle and at a different time of day. 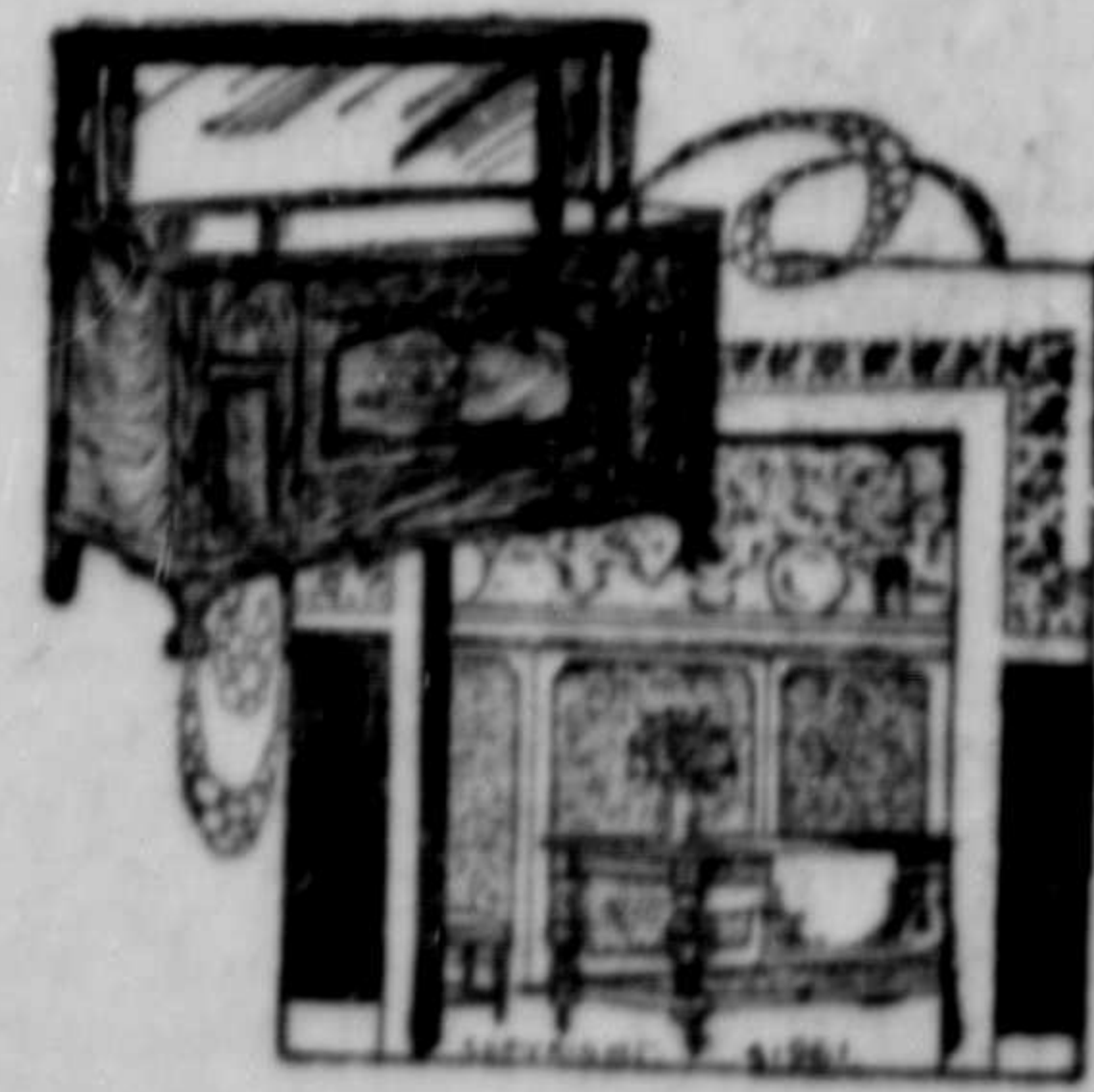

EXCESS OF WOMEN MENACE TO SOCIETY SAYS A PROFESSOR

LONDON, Sept. 17.—"The pre-
ponderance of women in the
world as a result of the war
threatens a social debasement
perhaps worse by far than any
previous historic disaster," says
Professor Patrick Geddes, the
eminent sociologist. "Civiliza-
tion," declares the professor, "is
high or low according as women
are at a premium or a discount."
"The war has left Europe with
at least ten million maidens then
growing up, who must now be
mateless; hence a coming dis-
count of women is imminent
threatened, and is indeed in ac-
celerating progress."

The result of the recent census
will probably show a preponder-
ance of women over men in Great
Britain of close on two million.
This, brings the problem close
home to us.
Professor Geddes believes these
facts constitute a menace to our
society; if steps are not taken to
give these women special educa-
tion and training for the new con-
dition of life a period of whole-
sale demoralization may set in
which will shake our civilization
to its foundations.

"It needs," he said, "a move-
ment in every land no less intense
than that of recent years for
women's suffrage; it needs, too,
to be far more deeply and fully
organized. Yet, with all their good
ideas and intentions, our educa-
tional bodies and conferences,
even that of the universities just
closed, are missing the situation.
Yet here is an opportunity as un-
paralleled as is the danger, hence
what scope there is for vital and
educational initiative, for saintly
and heroic founders, for new sis-
terhoods of social service."

COHOE RUN ON NAAS LARGE

"Mexico to Siberia via Prince
Rupert," Painted on Wings
of Polar Bear.

When the biplane Polar Bear
flies away from Prince Rupert
next week to Wrangell on the
next lap of the Mexico to Siberia
flight she will carry Prince Rup-
ert's mark with her for on the
wings sign "Mexico to Siberia"
has been changed to read "Mex-
ico to Siberia via Prince Rup-
ert." As everyone knows the
Polar Bear is the first flying
machine which ever visited
Prince Rupert and, as far as
this place is concerned, Aviator
C. O. Prest and Mechanician L.
M. Bach, are the pioneers in the
business.

Siberia or Bust.
Their present flight, in fact
is supposed to be a pioneering
flight. As far as possible they
are taking routes that have not
heretofore been used by the one
or two planes that have visited
Northern B. C. and Alaska be-
fore. Mr. Prest is risking his
life in the venture but he is a
modern type of adventurer and
faces disaster grimly. It is a
case of "Siberia or bust" with
him. He does not know what is
going to happen but he is not
worrying about it.

From here he takes with him
a small rifle, a few provisions
and a stock of paraffin and
matches. This he does so that
if he is forced to land at any
desolate spot in the northern
wilds he will have a chance to
shoot small game and keep him-
self alive if he is disabled far
away from settlements. When
travelling over the ocean, as he
will do between here and White-
horse and between Nome and
Siberia, he will go alone. When
going overland from now on Mr.
Bach will accompany him.

Stopping Places.
The next stop will be at
Wrangell and from there on the
stopping places will be as at
first intended, Jitneau, White-
horse, Dawson, Fairbanks, Ruby,
St. Michaels and Nome. During
their stay in Prince Rupert, Mr.
Prest and Mr. Bach have met a
lot of warm admirers of the
spirit they illustrate. Everyone
will wish them success in com-
pleting their flight and will wel-
come them back if they ever
come this way again.

Only Two Sea Otter at New
York But \$37,000 Mole.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Raw
furs valued upwards of three
million dollars coming from all
parts of the globe were placed
on display here today in the
warehouses of the New York
Fur Auction Sales Corporation
prior to their disposal at the
sixth annual fall auction that
will begin in the masonic hall
on Monday next and continue
throughout the week. More than
seventy-five buyers, one of them
from China, signed the register
during the day. This is the
largest number of buyers that
has ever examined pelts on the
first show day and they were
unanimous in expressing the
opinion that the present collec-
tion is one of the best and
most evenly balanced ever of-
fered here.

While the quality of nearly
all the individual collections
was said to be very good the
Canadian marten or Hudson Bay
sable were said to take the
palm. About 8,500 of these pelts
will be sold. Other quantities
range from two sea otter which
is the rarest fur known to
over 837,000 mole.

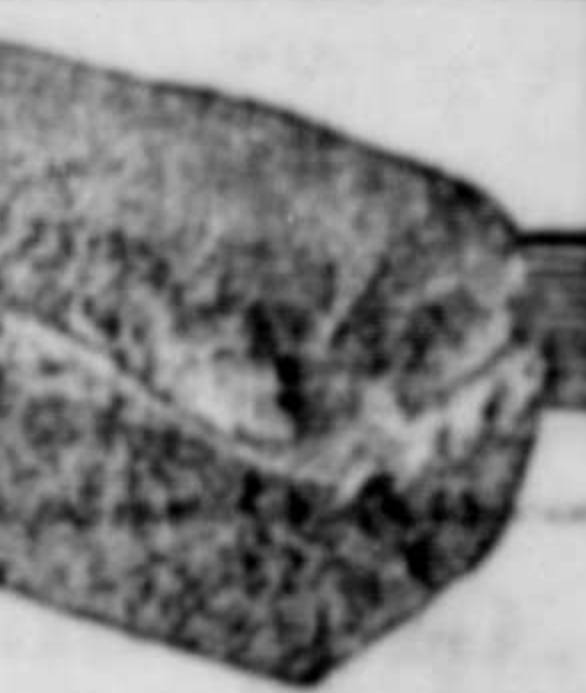

MEIGHEN AND NEW CABINET

Prominent Conservatives Do Not
Like Idea of Going Down
With Sinking Ship.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17.—The reason for Premier Meighen's delay in reorganizing his cabinet is the scurry of the rats to desert the sinking ship, and to get safely housed before she goes down. It is difficult to get men of the right calibre to take their places on the old bulk of state only to be submerged when election day comes.

Former Conservatives are counting on running as independents so that in any shuffle of parties following the fateful day there may be a possibility of their nosing in to some comfortable place rather than having to take their places in the cold shades of opposition.

Mr. Meighen has been surprised at the lack of enthusiasm among his followers and at the number of excuses given when men of prominence have been asked to take service under his banner. He is, however, getting the cabinet into shape and the announcement cannot be long delayed.

BYLAWS EXPLAINED.

Editor Daily News:
As you are aware the ratepayers of the City will be called upon, on Wednesday next, the 21st inst., to vote on certain Bylaws, and it is only right and proper that a few words of explanation should be given in order that the said ratepayers may be in a position to intelligently cast their ballots, and I would, therefore respectfully request the indulgence of a little of your valuable space in order to deal with the various Bylaws.

SECTION TWO SCHOOL

Very little if any explanation is needed in connection with this Bylaw. Anything in the way of Educational facilities in our City in order to be successful must have our moral and financial support, and the School Board was fully justified in requesting the City Council to provide the necessary space for a school in Section 2. I have therefore no hesitation in recommending this Bylaw to the favorable consideration of every ratepayer.

WATER EXTENSION BYLAW

The last time the ratepayers were called upon to vote monies for extensions to our water system, was at the Municipal Elections, held in January, 1914, at which time a Bylaw authorizing the raising of \$150,000 to meet the water requirements of Sections 1, 2, 7 and 8, was approved. In 1916 owing to financial reasons the city council passed a bylaw amending the original bylaw by reducing the amount proposed to be raised from \$150,000 to \$50,000.00, which \$50,000.00 was expended from time to time in constructing much needed extensions to the Water System. Notwithstanding this, our present distribution system is yet very incomplete, and needs constant attention in order to provide our citizens with the service to which they are entitled. The Bylaw to be voted upon calls for an expenditure of \$75,000.00, which amount is estimated will provide extensions to the system required at once, and those required in the immediate future. Water is an essential and in order to convey it to the various parts of the City it is necessary that money be provided for this purpose, and for that reason the said Bylaw is recommended to the favorable consideration of the ratepayers. One point which should not be lost sight of is that the monies which the ratepayers are asked to authorize is a re-vote of the Bylaw above referred to, but which was not raised for the reason stated.

WATER AGREEMENT BYLAW

This Bylaw is to confirm an agreement entered into between the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Company, Limited and the City of Prince Rupert and which agreement must be ratified by the ratepayers of the City before it can become operative or binding, and provides that the Company may use, free of charge up to 3,000 U. S. gallons of water per minute, which water it must at its own expense take from the City's water mains, and deliver to its proposed Pulp Mill to be there used. The whole Bylaw has already been published in the Daily News, and it is therefore unnecessary at this time to again go into the details of the same. In granting the Company the right to take the water mentioned, the City will be at no expense, nor suffer any loss whatever, as the water proposed to be taken is now and has been for several years, running to waste, but on the contrary the City will be the gainer by reason of the fact that the Agreement provides that the Acropolis Hill Reservoir shall be kept full to point of over-flow at all times, and what is still more important, in case of a sudden demand for water by the city, owing to the Fire needs of the City, the Company will shut off the supply going to the Pulp Mill and divert it to increase and better the fire protection of the City. By ap-payers will be doing their share proving of this Bylaw the rate-towards the upbuilding of the City as there can be no question but that the establishment of a Pulp and Paper Industry in the City will be to the advantage of the ratepayers individually and to the City as a whole. This Bylaw also is therefore recom-

When you realize that I got orders for corsets costing up to thirty-five dollars a pair, you may think this industry of suf-ficient importance to be men-tioned.

STUDYING FOOD FISH IS DR. MANN, WHO IS ON COAST JUST NOW

VICTORIA, Sept. 17.—Dr. A. Mann of Washington, D. C. spent the week-end in Victoria in the course of a journey along the Pacific Coast from southern California northwards for the purpose of studying the problems of foods available for fish, both in inland waters and on the sea coasts. After a long and distinguished career in the U. S. department of agriculture he was selected to study this problem by the Carnegie Institute.

"It is my idea that one side only of the question of restocking of the waters has been studied. It is well to find methods of hatching fry and turning them into the waters, but the problem is only half done if the questions of their food there-after is not given proper attention," he said in an interview.

Interested in Diatoms.

"My particular attention is directed to the subject of diatoms, or as I call them, 'the grass of the sea.' Diatoms are a form of sea plant, micro-organisms which enter very largely into

practically all the foods of fish. In the depth of the ocean diatoms are the only form of sea flora which exist. In the live stock industry, having discovered that the plains can support great herds of cattle, people do not leave it at that, but they proceed to study best methods of feeding those cattle. That is what should be done in the waters as well as on land.

He travelled up from California, visiting all the U. S. biological stations en route. He has worked out a system of co-operation between them whereby his office in Washington will assist with their studies.

Visits Nanaimo.

Dr. Mann has visited Nanaimo recently, where he had conferences with Dr. C. McLean Fraser of the biological department, University of British Columbia, on the subject. He also met Professor O'Donoghue of the University of Manitoba. With both he will co-operate in his efforts to prove the need of more extended study of the foods available for fish.

HUNTING AND FISHING ARE GREAT ATTRACTIONS WHICH ARE OFFERED IN DISTRICT

(Continued from Page 1)

has more to offer the hunter or the angler. In every direction and within close radius of the town are to be found all kinds of game in great abundance. British Columbia is a great province for hunting and there is no part of the province better stocked with wild creatures than the northern and central sections.

All Species Close By.

There is hardly a species of game to be mentioned which cannot be found within easy distance of the place and the grounds are easily accessible by water or by rail. Mountain goat, deer and black bear may be hunted with success within a very few miles. Greenville Channel, Khatada and the Estall River are among the favorite places for mountain goat close at hand, while further afield are Stewart and Allee Arm districts. Deer and bear can be found almost anywhere in the woods.

The bigger species of game are not to be found so close to the city as the smaller. The prairie country around Giscome and Prince George has become popular for moose and caribou. Not so easily reached are the Stikine and Naas River valleys. The former is visited by the big game hunters from all over the world while the latter, as yet, has not become so commonly known. Grizzly and cinnamon bear abound in great numbers in all the higher mountains.

Fur Business.

The city has become the hub for a fur business and three dealers are established who pay out thousands of dollars each year to trappers, both white and Indian, that bring their pelts to the city. Fox, bear, wolf, ermine, skunk, mink, beaver, seal and other are among the varieties of skins that are handled here. The most of the skins that local buyers purchase are shipped to the Eastern markets although there is a profitable retail business carried on as well.

Wild Ducks and Geese.

Birds are as abundant here as are the wild animals. In every one of the thousands of lagoons and bays which indent the coastline in the vicinity of the city are plenty of wild ducks of good variety including mallards, canvas backs, butterballs, teal and other kinds. Besides there are others such as squaws which are not so desirable.

Geese are also abundant and in some districts are almost as plentiful as ducks. These are the "big game" of the bird hunter and are more difficult to obtain for they are more wary and wilder than the duck. Finding their haunts as they do on clean long beaches or flats they have to be approached with silence and as much concealment. Snipe are also common in the district.

For the Angler.

Every creek is filled with trout although a few of the streams nearby are said to be getting fished out. However, the angler will still have success in any one he tries and it is an easy matter to obtain a long string of speckled beauties in a short time if the fisherman knows the bait that will tempt them. With many trout fishing has become almost a science while with others it is a mania. In some streams such as Khatada and the Estall River there are so many trout that it seems almost a shame to take them out. All varieties are to be found.

Salmon Trolling.

Salmon trolling is also a favorite pastime which may be enjoyed in Prince Rupert harbor and other places. The fish run up to as high as 60 pounds in weight and one can imagine the fun which a person gets with one of these fellows, full of energy and strength, on his line. It requires skill and coolness to land him successfully. Bass fishing also makes good sport in and near the city.

Hunting and fishing, indeed, form one of the attractions of the district around Prince Rupert. They have become part of the normal life of some of the residents who take the prey of rod and gun with as much nonchalance as they do the berries and wild fruits which grow all over the country.
