TORONTO, February 26.—Something approaching a "blue sky" is to be incorporated in the new Consolidated Companies' second reading of which was moved yesterday by Hon. G. B. Farris.

A new bill, in respect to home incorporated companies, prospectuses setting forth in detail the facts concerning company including full particulars of the plan of operations. In the case of extra-provincial companies, no one may offer for sale unless such companies are registered in the

### MUCH LOOTING YET IN CHINA

Bandits Plunder Rich and Often are in League with Soldiers

PEKING, Feb. 25.—Looting by robbers and levies by soldiers add to the distress of famine-ridden people of southern China, says a report by a missionary engaged in famine relief work at Wei-hsien, near the Honan border.

The troops, with their demands for "contributions" of grain, fodder and clothing, are said to be a worse affliction than the robbers. The latter as described as emulating Robin Hood in some respects in a recent raid at Fang Chia-ying, eight miles from Wei-hsien, where the homes of the wealthy were invaded.

"As the robbers went from house to house, stores of grain were opened up, chests of clothing broken open and the poor were dressed and fed beyond the style even of better days. Copper coins and small cash were heaped up in the streets and bartered at considerable discount for silver dollars, for, like their distinguished prototype, the Chinese Robin Hoods are not impelled by purely philanthropic impulse, but are after plunder in the most transportable and convertible form. ### Prince John Will Have Annual Overhaul Here

Prince Albert Ready to Leave Dock Thursday when New Shaft is Installed; Lorne is Still Tied Up at Dock

The new shaft for the Prince Albert will arrive at the local shipyard tomorrow and by Thursday that vessel will be ready to leave Wallace's local yard and resume the run of the Prince John which will go into the dry dock on her return from the Island sailing. The Prince John will undergo annual overhaul, which will not be very extensive, as she was completely renovated and put in shape last summer after her wreck in Skidegate Narrows and has since been in no trouble outside of the usual wear and tear of a rather busy season.

The tug Lorne is still tied up at the Bays Creek dock and has not yet been overhauled. Steam has been down in her boilers for months since the cessation of the bringing of logs from Buckley Bay after the closing down of the local sawmill.

### NO FISH CARS FOR TOMORROW

Sixteen West of Winnipeg May Arrive on Monday or Tuesday.

All available refrigerator cars were used yesterday for the dispatching east of halibut bought at the Fish Exchange in the morning and today there are none on hand against tomorrow's arrivals and apparently there will be none arrive for it.

There are no cars west of Prince George but sixteen reported to have left Winnipeg a couple of days ago are probably now in the vicinity of Edmonton and may arrive by Monday or Tuesday.

### OFFICIAL RESIGNS

VANCOUVER, Feb. 26.—Capt. F. C. Brown, district superintendent of the Soldier Settlement Board, tendered his resignation to the Dominion Government at Ottawa. Friction with the head office and lack of support is alleged to be the reason for this action.

### Three Killed and One Injured in Snowslide This Side of Jasper

EDMONTON, February 26.—Three men were killed and one seriously injured in a snowslide on the G. N. R. forty-six miles west of Jasper at Mount Respondent on Thursday night. The lead are Operator Meunier, Fireman Berry of Jasper, and Roadmaster Willis of McBride.

Brakeman Fortune of Jasper was injured.

The rotary snow plow was sent to clear the line after a slide and was buried in a second slide of snow and ice.

### TEN THOUSAND IS PAID OUT

Capt. Saunders Pays Big Portion of Assigned Checks—Finish Job by Monday.

Captain F. C. Saunders was unable to get started yesterday afternoon on the paying off of the assigned dry dock pay checks at the Fisheries Office as the lists were not checked over in time but this morning a good start was made when \$10,000 was paid out.

There yet remains about \$20,000 to be paid out and the captain expects this will keep his office busy until Monday. The work will be carried on this afternoon. This will cover all the assigned pay checks, the payment of which has been delayed by the government for some months.

### NEW LIQUOR HOUSE OPENS

Middle West Wine Co., of Calgary, Starts Branch in Prince Rupert.

A third liquor warehouse for the export of spirits from Prince Rupert to points outside of the province is being established here. The new warehouse is at 712 Fraser Street and goes under the name of the Middle West Wine Co., the head office of which is at 219 Ninth Avenue, East, Calgary. Application for a license from the city is being made and it is understood the new company has already been licensed by the provincial government. M. Druxerman is the local manager of the concern.

The two other warehouses already established here are those of Olier Besner, First Avenue, and Jack Miller, Fraser Street. These warehouses are required under the B. C. Prohibition Act to make a weekly report of the goods passing through their premises to the prohibition commissioner of the provincial government.

Manitoba Has  
Prescription Trouble.

Manitoba is afflicted with the same prescription disease that once afflicted the people of British Columbia. The doctors of that province have been selling permits to drink under the name of prescriptions. They have proved themselves just as human as the bootleggers and indeed on exactly the same plane.

Doctors are privileged people. They have an organization that is supposed to be self-disciplinary. They are men who are trusted more than any other class in the community. The reputation of men and the honor of women is placed in their keeping and it is seldom confidences are broken or advantage is taken of the privileges. Here is a case, however, in Manitoba, as it was recently in British Columbia, where the doctors have fallen down on the job. They have succumbed to temptation and been carried away by the desire for gain. They have been issuing prescriptions wholesale on the prairies, just as they did some time ago in British Columbia. It is a pity the profession should have been degraded by the action of its members.

Giving Order of Precedence

Prior to the Drawingroom reception held by the Governor General in the Senate Chamber at Ottawa the following regulations as to order of precedence was issued by the military secretary:

Presentation will take place in the following order:

(a) Cabinet Ministers and those gentlemen having the private entrance with their wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters.

(b) Senators, the Speaker of the House of Commons, puisne Judges of the Supreme Court, the Judge of the Exchequer Court, puisne Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity, Retired Judges, Officials having seats on the floor of the Senate and the wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters of the above, and the wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters of the Hon. Aides-de-Camp.

(c) Members of the House of Commons, Officials having seats on the floor of the House with their wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters.

(d) Members of the Executive Council and the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assemblies, Deputy Ministers, the Commissioners of the Railway Commission, the Chairman of the International Joint Commission, the General Consulting Engineer to the Dominion Government, the Vicar General, the Sheriff of the County of Carleton, the Mayor of Ottawa, Consuls General and the wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters of the above.

(e) The other Ladies and Gentlemen attending the Drawing Room.

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



## FLESH EATING AND FERTILITY

Dr. Oldfield says Those who Live on Vegetable Foods Breed Best

### STERILITY RESULT OF WRONG FEEDING

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Dr. Josiah Oldfield, English physician and author, who believes that flesh-eating is a prolific source of disease and one of the worst enemies of the human race, is of the opinion that the wastage of life caused by the war might be speedily repaired by right feeding.

Dr. Oldfield is a strong advocate of the Fruitarian diet and has been senior physician of the Lady Margaret Fruitarian Hospital at Bromley. Writing from Jamaica he says:

#### In Jamaica

"My observations here confirm my views that food and fertility go hand in hand. The commission dealing with the grave problem of the steadily falling birth rate in Europe has failed to grasp the fundamental truth which applies to vegetable and animal and human life alike—that a right dietary means increased fertility and wrong feeding leads to increasing sterility.

"If a gardener wants more foliage he feeds the plant with one food; if he wants fruit or seed he feeds it quite differently. So does the stockfeeder and breeder. It is a difference in food only which transforms similar eggs, one into a dron and another into a queen bee.

#### High Birth Rates

"Whereas before the war in every European country the birth rate showed a steady fall, yet in Serbia, Bulgaria and Rumania, where the hardy peasants still live on rye bread, dried fruits, vegetables, cheese, oil and sour milk, there was a continuous high birth rate and no decrease.

"Here in the West Indies, where the dark races live on yams, sweet potatoes, cassava, Indian corn, sugar, milk, coconuts, bananas and oranges, with some salt fish, the birth rate is high and the fertility irrepressible.

"Owing to ignorance and want of sanitation the infant mortality is high, but when that is removed the black population will multiply at a far higher rate than the white unless the white population of the world learns that it is corn, oil and wine, salads, milk and honey which produce fertile race and that meat eating spells increased sterility."

## EASTER MUSIC BEING PREPARED

Church Choirs Practising for the Coming Festive Season Following Lent.

Considerable activity is being displayed among the local musicians in connection with the various churches these days. The penitential season is now well on, and the advent of Easter will be celebrated musically in a few weeks. Choristers are putting in lots of practice and from the enthusiasm being shown in various quarters, some very well rendered music may be expected. ## MOLTEN METAL IS WATERFRONT SIGHT

Recently Installed Foundry Proves Useful to Fisherfolk of This Port.

One of the interesting developments in the business of the waterfront is the recent installation of a foundry at Akerberg, Thomson & Co.'s shop. Although the foundry was intended for brass, other metals can be run as well. Hitherto this work was done at the dry dock plant or sent below, which in the latter case was troublesome and tedious. There are innumerable castings of brass required in the gas engine repair business and when they can be made on the spot, business is much facilitated. The alloy can be made as required in the crucible, whether bright brass or bronze. A sand specially suitable for moulding has been secured at Telkwa, whence it is shipped here.

Economy is the chief feature which interests local engine owners. In a recent instance a boat came to port with one of her propeller blades stripped. Not long ago this would have meant a new propeller. Nowadays, a mould is taken of the blade with the exact pitch, a new one cast and then welded on to the wheel by an oxy-acetylene flame.

Seeing the molten metal being run into the moulds is becoming one of the popular sights on the waterfront.


