#### Churchill Should Tour Dominions.

The London Times suggests that Right Hon. Winston Churchill should tour the Dominions. Such a trip would have a broadening effect on the Chief Secretary of State for the Colonies and would enable him to gauge the public sentiment of the overseas dominions with which he will have to deal. We should like to meet Mr. Churchill. He would certainly get a hearty welcome in the far west, even from people who may not agree with much of what he says in his public speeches.

#### Scotland's Day Was Yesterday.

Scotland's Day was yesterday. It was the anniversary of the birth of a famous poet who has left a lasting impression on the whole English speaking world. St. Andrew may be the patron saint of Scotland, but the memory of Burns is the memory they love to keep green. Burns was the great democrat and because of that he is held in great esteem by all true Canadians, no matter what their nationality. Burns brought music into the world. He showed that the little things of life were often the great things.

#### Crosby School And the Loss.

The loss of the school at Port Simpson is a serious one in that it interferes with the education of a number of Indian girls who promise to make good citizens. The girls and teachers are left without any of their personal belongings except the clothes in which they escaped, and the teachers did not even rescue their own clothes. To come to the aid of the institution at such a time is the natural thing, and Prince Rupert will not be behind hand in such good work. Already offers of help have been made and the pupils and staff of the school will soon know that they have good neighbors.

#### Premier Mine Again in Limelight.

The Premier mine is again in the limelight. Another strike of rich ore is reported and active shipping and development is going on. Also there is litigation in progress to define the actual ownership of the mine. Pat Daly, apparently sets a high value on the property judging by the claim based on ten million dollars for less than a half interest. Whether or not this estimate is correct, no one could say unless the property had been thoroughly drilled, but it is certainly rich and if any other mines there prove to be anything like it, the country will soon get a world-wide name.

## UNITED STATES ANXIOUS FOR DISARMAMENT

Three Resolutions Before Congress Looking to Some Move to Lift Load of Expenditures

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Disarmament has focussed the attention of both houses of the United States Congress recently and the general public as well and there appears to be a well-defined desire in the United States that the nations should take a step in that direction to relieve the people of the heavy burden of taxation which it entails. Three resolutions on the subject have been introduced in Congress and are under discussion by the various committees to which they were referred before going before either the Senate or House of Representatives for definite action. The policy of the incoming Republican administration under President Harding with respect to disarmament has not been definitely determined and it is not likely those will take shape until the new administration has taken charge.

The movement started just over a month ago with the presentation of a joint resolution by Senator Walsh of Montana, one of the ablest legal minds in the Senate and a Democratic leader, who expressed the earnest desire of the United States government to cooperate with the League of Nations through its council or commission appointed for that purpose in the formulation of plans looking to a general reduction in armaments. Senator Walsh expressed regret that President Wilson had not accepted the invitation of the Council of the League of Nations to appoint a United States member of the commission created to deal with international disarmament. He undertook to demonstrate that the invitation might well have been accepted without in any way committing the United States to support of the League itself, which thought was in the presidential mind. His resolution was referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations where it now is being considered with others on the same subject.

Borah's Resolution  
Not long afterwards Senator Borah, the pugnacious Republican "bitter-ender" from Idaho, who has been fighting the League at every turn, introduced a resolution directing the President to take up with the governments of Great Britain and Japan the question of disarmament with the purpose of securing an agreement to reduce their naval building program fifty per cent within a period of five years. Senator Borah said he was impelled to offer this resolution because Premier Uchida of Japan had publicly stated that "The Japanese government could not even consent to consider a program of disarmament on account of the building program of the United States."

International Convention.  
Representative Brooks of Illinois, Republican, also introduced in the House a resolution authorizing the President to call an international convention to consider projects for the limitation and reduction of armaments. There also have been received by Congress a number of petitions from women's organizations, and peace elements begging Congress to forward this great object.

If happened disarmament was thus forced upon the attention of Congress at the time the committees of the two Houses were engaged in drafting the great annual army and navy appropriation bills. It soon became evident that it was powerfully influencing Congress in its treatment of these appropriations. Naturally it was argued that if there was any reasonable chance to secure limitation of armaments, these expenditures might be greatly reduced. It's possibly quickly engaged the interest of the ways and means committee of the House and of the finance committee of the Senate, which committees are now struggling with the problem of devising new means of taxation to meet the deficiencies resulting from the war. Naturally the military and naval committees of Congress also were drawn into consideration of the disarmament project as it affected their own plans for army and naval reorganization which devolves upon the present Congress.

## National Fish Day

A few facts in regard to value of Fish as a Diet.

February 9 has been set aside as a national Fish Day. This is for the purpose of bringing strongly to the attention of the people of Canada that they own a great natural resource that has not been receiving proper attention; and that they stand responsible for a great economic waste by not making more use of fish in their diet.

The per capita consumption of fish in Canada is approximately 19 pounds per annum. In Great Britain the people eat an average of 58 pounds a year. Does it not seem strange that Canada which possesses the greatest fisheries in the world should pay so little attention to the fact? Local consumption of fish is increasing very slowly, and it is the hope that by various means impetus will be given to its expansion. Too much fish is moving now in less than carload quantities and as the overhead charges in small business are proportionately greater than in business of larger volume, fish is dearer than if the demand were greater. A larger appetite for fish would not only mean a cheaper article, but it would remove many of the transportation difficulties which confront the industry today.

Following is a table showing the percentage of protein, the most important food element, to be found in various varieties of sea foods as compared with meats and other articles.

Eminent authorities agree that fish is quite a necessary element in diet. We have only to regard the history of those races which have been fish-eaters for centuries, to be convinced. The Japanese give a striking illustration of the virtue of a fish diet.

**BURNS BANQUET AGAIN SUCCESS**

Memory of Scottish Bard is Kept Green by Prince Rupert St. Andrew's Society.

**LIST OF EXCELLENT AFTER-DINNER SPEAKERS**

St. Andrew's Society, Prince Rupert, again did its share in keeping green the memory of Scotland's immortal bard, Robert Burns, at a splendid banquet given in the commodious dining room and the Central Hotel cuisine department scored another success in the spread that was set out. S. D. Macdonald was the toastmaster and around him at the head of the table sat the speakers of the evening and many of the artists. Of course, the feature of the banquet was the serving of "the haggis" which was borne into the hall behind Alex. Macdonald's pipes and to which Joe Brown recited the famous Burns poem. At the commencement of the supper a telegram was read from Fred Stork and Dr. H. R. Grant said grace, using the well known verse "Some ha' meat."

**Immortal Memory.**  
The first toast "The Immortal Memory" was responded to by Roy, Dr. H. R. Grant. In opening, Dr. Grant said that this was his seventh time to respond to this toast at a Burns banquet here. He hoped he would be spared to again answer to it in Prince Rupert for it was his ambition to remain in Prince Rupert until his congregation had erected its new church to the glory of God and the memory of the heroes. He referred to Robert Burns as a poet, who though writing of the traditions of Scotland and animating them for posterity, pressed upward to the Throne of Parnassus held by Shakespeare, the peer of all Britain's poets.

In many ways Burns had been a rebel but rebels of today often became the patriots of tomorrow. He had been a rebel in his poetry and had forgotten formality, but had spiritualized his works. He had also rebelled against religious formality and in his "Holy Willie's Prayer" had hurled an anathema of ridicule against those whose religious formality was far from paralleled by their actions. No more beautiful picture of pure home life could be wished for than that presented in "Cotter's Saturday Night." In his personal conduct he also rebelled and many said that "The Jolly Beggars" was the most obscene poem in the English language. In this he had, however, shown that the governing factor of a man's life was his conscience. Perhaps, too, Burns had not been well edited, certainly this poem should not have appeared among his works for in it he had gone a little too far and forgotten the social standards. Burns had also been a rebel politically and had done much for the coming generations in aiding to break down the caste privileges of the times. His poem "Scots Wha Hae," showed the highest conception of patriotism.

It was said that Burns had lived a riotous life but he had certainly brought much laughter into the world and had presented beautiful pictures of his times. After all one should gently scan his fellow man and "be without sin among you cast the first

By bringing the merits of history here and becoming good citizens people might then say that the Scottish were a credit to the land of their birth and an asset to the country in which they lived.

**A. M. Manson.**  
A. M. Manson, M.L.A., was called upon to answer to the toast "The Land We Live In." Good citizenship was the secret of the success of the nation and good citizenship was obtainable only with pure morals, undivided homes—a virile church and strong education. If Canada followed the example of Scotland in these, then she would rise among the nations. Canada's natural resources gave ample scope to the use of good citizenship and all the resources were centred in honourable measure about Prince Rupert. It remained but to turn the hand to the plow and found a country that would be a comfort and a credit and an honor to the race.

**Mayor Rochester.**  
The mayor, in jointly responding to the toast of Canada, said that this was his first Burns banquet but he hoped it would not be the last. Insofar as the city was concerned he would say "hang on." The horizon was looking brighter and a change was due. He had pioneered it in other cities and Rupert had all the prospects of becoming a great city.

**The Forces.**  
Col. G. W. Peck, M.P., V.C., in

rising to respond to the toast to "The Forces," was greeted with a storm of applause. He had not been to a Burns banquet for seven years but he was optimistic like the rest and hoped to be attending them seven years hence. Last year he had heard a new definition for an optimist and it was, "A Jew who buys an article and hopes to sell it at a profit to a Scotchman." But the Scotch had come from a country where they had to be thrifty or die. He referred to his Scotch soldiers in the 16th Canadian Scottish. Never had there been truer men and the longer he commanded them the more he loved them. His regiment had become the religion of his life and the dearest thing to his heart. The colonel also spoke appreciatively of the use of pipers in warfare.

**Miss McLennaghan.**  
Miss McLennaghan in a well-considered address replied to the toast to the Lassies. It was a pleasure to see ladies at banquets now that John Barleycorn had disappeared. But that gentleman was shedding his graveclothes and it might be the last time. She challenged the statement that the political equality of women was making gallantry die out. It had not looked like that in the recent election in Vancouver when all the men had stepped aside to allow a woman to head the polls. Women of the 20th century may not be perfect but with the instinct of women added to the logic of man a better citizenship was arising.

**Kindred Societies.**  
The toast to Kindred Societies was responded to by E. R. Tabrum, Sons of England, and W. E. Thompson, Sons of Canada. The latter drew attention to the work of perpetuating the national ideals that the societies were doing. They should work together for the good of all.

**Musical Program.**  
Punctuating the program of toasts were many fine vocal and instrumental numbers. Mrs. Alston sang "The Star of Robbie Burns," and responded to an encore with "Bonnie Prince Charlie." J. N. Sinclair sang "O a' the Airts" and W. M. Brown, "Sons o' Bonnie Scotland," and "Bonnie Mary of Argyll." The duet, "Crookit Baybee," by Mrs. Alston and Robert Dowther was finely appreciated and was encored in "How Can Ye Gang, Laddie?" Mrs. Stanley Bennett sang the favorite "Land of Hope and Glory" and "Comin' Thro' the Rye." "Lassie o' Mine" was sung by Mrs. James Lee with a violin obligato by James Lee. "Nobody's Satisfied" by Robert Robertson evoked tremendous applause and he responded to two encores in "I'll Never Forget the Day," and "My Old Woman." A vocal duel "The Barks and Bees" by Mrs. Alston and Mrs. Day proved very sweet indeed.

**Pipe Band.**  
The St. Andrew's Pipe Band, consisting of pipers Alex Macdonald, James Sturgeon and T. Stephens, Cecil Brown, bass drummer, and J. N. Kelly, kettle drummer, was heartily encored and the opening and closing selections of the orchestra, comprising W. Vaughan Davies, piano, H. C. Peyton, cornet, J. L. Lee, violin, and J. Houch, were excellent.

The banquet was followed by a dance in St. Andrew's hall to the music of the pipes.

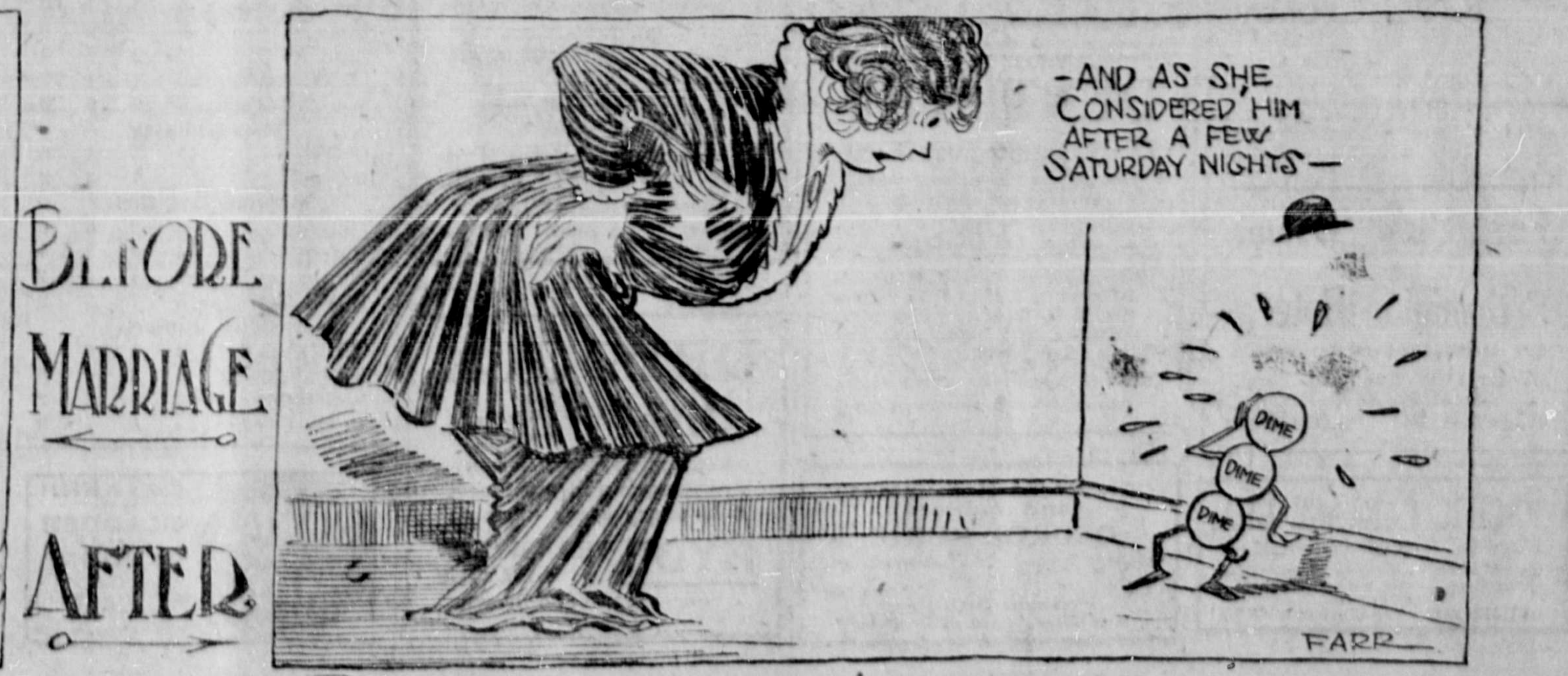
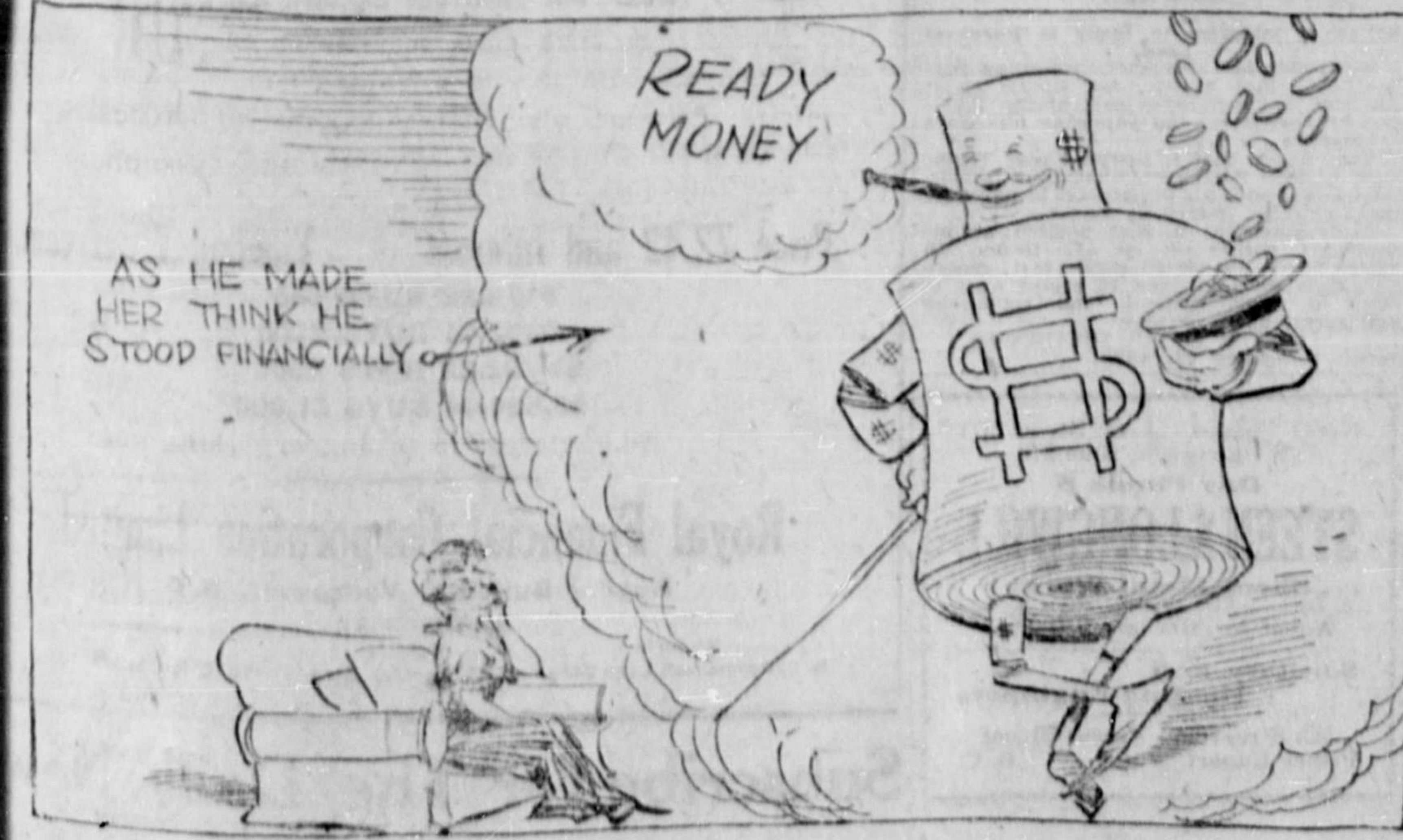
