Budget Provides for Local Building QUARTER MILLION POUNDS HALIBUT IN FOUR BIG BOATS IS FORCED OUT

Minister of Finance Sets Aside \$200,000 for Court House; But has yet to Pass Sessions

VICTORIA, March 19.—In the estimates as tabled yesterday John Hart, minister of finance in the provincial legislature, has appropriated \$200,000 for the construction of the court buildings on Market Place at Prince Rupert. This comes as a result of the promise of Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and member for Prince Rupert, to the electors of northern town last November that construction would be started as soon as possible.

A set of plans was prepared some time ago and is now ready for approval. The appropriation will likely be successful in the house and the next step will be the calling of tenders for the awarding of the contract if the work is to be done on a contract basis. With the substantial appropriation going to the credit of the province, it is likely that the actual work of erection will commence at Prince Rupert.

Another Practical Example Catastrophic Effect Shortage Refrigerator Cars on City

As a result of the shortage of cars, the Panama with 92,000 pounds of halibut and the Polar with 55,000 pounds left this morning on Thursday night, while yesterday the Liberty with 60,000 pounds and the Seymour with 65,000 pounds took their way to Ketchikan. This makes a total of 252,000 pounds of fish had to be turned out of the port because the railway could not handle the traffic. These four vessels alone require ten refrigerator cars to handle their catches.

PECK SAYS CARS COMMENCE COMING EARLY IN MAY

The secretary of the Board of Trade was in receipt of a telegram this morning from Col. Peck with the information that delivery of refrigerator cars would commence on May 8 and would be finished by the middle of June. This is an advice from the car builders to Col. Peck.

BUSINESS OF LEGISLATURE

Various Bills and Amendments Before House Yesterday Afternoon.

VICTORIA, March 19.—A strong plea for the utmost consideration of returned men in the provincial civil service was last night made by Canon Hinchcliffe, Conservative member for Victoria, in the legislature. He cited cases where it was claimed that the veterans were not receiving the same or equal treatment with men who did not go overseas.

"American machine and ward politics" is the way M. B. Jackson, Liberal member for the Islands, termed the provision in the bill to amend the Elections Act to permit, in Vancouver and Victoria, the grouping of candidates of various political parties and bodies on the ballots at general elections. He said that it would mean the adoption of the very worst feature of American politics. Discussion on the amendment was deferred.

The principles of unlimited taxation involved in the amendments proposed for the Vancouver city charter have led the Private Bills Committee to feel that it would not be justified in recommending it to the house.

Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, was criticized by Thomas Uphill, Socialist member for Fernie, when the Coal Mines Regulation Act was spoken to by the minister. The amendments make it necessary for the mining companies to abolish the naked lamp and install newly approved lamps.

ALEX. MANSON ALSO DEBATES

Shatters Precedent in Legislature by Participating in Committee.

VICTORIA, March 19.—Alex. M. Manson, speaker of the legislature and member for Omineca, has shattered precedent in legislative procedure by participating in debates during committee.

He announced his intention early in the session of following this practice and his stand gives denial to the view expressed that, when he accepted the speakership, he would be eliminated from his usefulness on the floor of the house.

Mr. Speaker Manson is considered one of the best debaters in the assembly and his following the old procedure of non-participation in the debates would have been a distinct loss.

GAS FLOW REPORTED SOUTH OF THE PAS

THE PAS, Man., March 19.—The discovery of a flow of gas in the foothills of the Pasquia River southwest of here has resulted in a miniature rush of prospectors to the scene of the find. It is claimed that the gas is escaping from crevices in the ground at many points.

EXPLOSION OCCURS IN GERMANY, KILLS MANY

ERFURT, Germany, March 19.—Many persons were injured by an explosion which occurred yesterday in the munitions depot at Schmerhorn.

Private Use of National Credit.

Sir Henry Deayton stated in the House of Commons last Friday that Rumania has made no payment of interest on the loan from Canada, says the Montreal Star. The government placed 25 million dollars of national credit at the disposal of Rumania in the autumn of 1919. Similar amounts were also made available for Greece and Belgium.

The interest due from Rumania in October last amounted to over \$900,000. On April 1, 1921, the total interest due will be \$1,475,234. Of course, the interest is being paid, although the Rumanian traders or government are paying nothing. The Canadian people are paying it.

As the Canadian people furnished the loan, out of the national credit, it may seem peculiar that the Canadian people should also have to pay interest on it. But such transactions as the loan to Rumania furnish some interesting examples of this government's policy of placing national credit at the disposal of private interests.

The national credit is simply used as the security for issuing financial credit through the banks. Although the national credit is the basis of this financial credit, and it is issued for private use, the nation is made to agree to pay interest on it.

This is the Way It Works Out.

Traders in Rumania order Canadian goods and produce. The Canadian manufacturers and produce dealers are furnished with the financial credit from Canadian banks to pay wages and salaries, buy the raw materials and products and deliver the goods to Rumanian consumers.

The manufacturers and dealers are in turn paid out of the \$25,000,000 created by the Canadian government for the benefit, ostensibly, of Rumania. The manufacturers and dealers are thus enabled to pay off their indebtedness to the banks.

But, in spite of everybody having been paid, apparently, Canada remains in debt to the controllers of financial credit in New York or Montreal or wherever the issue against the national credit is recorded. The interest has to be paid—for ever presumably—unless Rumania decides some day to pay up.

But the interest paid on the Rumanian debt, although it is collected from the people of Canada by taxes on home life, is merely a bagatelle. As Sir Thomas White could explain (vide the report of the parliamentary committee on civil re-establishment) the issuing of securities by the government causes credit inflation. With this credit inflation, Sir Thomas testified, there must necessarily be an increase in prices. Increased prices are followed by increased wage demands and increased costs. But increased costs mean decreased purchasing power. The people as consumers tend to buy less. Merchants find themselves compelled to clear their shelves and warehouses at sacrifice prices—in some instances, at a loss. Manufacturers find themselves denied the necessary financial credit to keep their workers employed. Consequently, there is unemployment, with still further reduction of purchasing power.

Another Instance of Giving Credit.

The \$25,000,000 of credit inflation to finance the exporting of goods to Rumania is merely one example of the quandary into which the present business of exporting is plunging the industrialized nations. Last session the parliament of Canada voted \$20,000,000 of national credit for the use of private shipbuilding contractors, on the understanding, apparently, that some French shipping interests wanted to order ships from Canadian contractors. In this instance, parliament voted the money without actually knowing what would become of it. Nobody seems to have needed it.

This lavish generosity on the part of the government for the benefit of privileged interests at the expense of the people of Canada is in remarkable contrast with parliament's attitude when credit facilities are asked for the re-establishment of Canadian ex-service men in productive industries.

No Sympathy with Peck's Scheme.

When Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., member for Skeena, advocated loans to ex-service men to buy fishing boats to engage in the Canadian fishing industry he received very little support in the House. Why is it that the national credit can be made available in votes of \$20,000,000 for special privileged interests? The effect is rather to cause unemployment than to relieve it. For genuine productive proposals, such as the re-establishment of ex-service men in employment on Canadian natural resources, there is nothing but free advice to the former Canadian soldiers to develop more self-reliance. Does parliament control credit power, or merely serve private controllers?

CENSORING IS STRICT IN PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

Many Movies were Condemned—Why Movies are Banned at Edmonton

EDMONTON, Mar. 19.—One hundred and seventy-four moving picture films were condemned by the censor in Alberta last year; 112 other films suffered eliminations. These figures were given to the public accounts committee of the legislature by Howard Douglas, chief censor, who said that 40,000 feet of "rough stuff" clipped from films and stored in his archives represented only the unclaimed portion of censored shockers.

Mr. Douglas submitted to the committee copies of the standard which the Alberta censor employs in judging films. This is the standard adopted by the four western provinces. It puts under the ban pictures portraying "white slavery" unless a true moral lesson is conveyed; gruesome scenes involving bloodshed and corpses, offensive drunkenness and exploitation of notorious characters.

The censorship standard disapproves of pictures dealing with the drug habit, of scenes showing the methods of criminals in murder, house-breaking, poisoning, robbery, pocket-picking, lighting and throwing of bombs, use of ether, chloroform, etc., and other methods of persons employing violence against the law. The disapproval extends to pictures dealing with counterfeiting, with brutal treatment of children and of animals and with scenes dealing with ridicule of races, classes or social bodies, as well as irreverent and sacrilegious treatment of religious bodies or things held to be sacred.

Vulgarity of a "gross" kind also are disapproved such as sometimes appear in slap stick comedies, such as burlesquing morgues, funerals, insane asylums, hospitals, etc.

Other things under disapproval of the censorship are bathing scenes "which pass the limit of propriety," immodest dancing, needless exhibition of women in night dresses and lingerie, and studio and other scenes in which the human form is unduly exposed. Sensual kissing scenes and lovemaking and vampire scenes also come under the censor's frown.

PREPARING ARRIVAL AVIATORS IN PEACE

Fleet of Seaplanes to Operate between Peace River and Mackenzie

EDMONTON, Mar. 19.—The Royal Canadian Mounted Police are now making preparations for the arrival of the Dominion government's aviators at Peace River and the inauguration of the proposed aerial service to the north. The intention of the federal authorities, as previously announced, is to put a fleet of seaplanes in use between Peace River and Mackenzie River points. Government geologists, surveyors and other field workers will be transported in this way, together with their supplies.

Some of the police buildings at Peace River are being renovated and put in order as living quarters for the air men, of whom about twenty are expected. Workshop accommodation will also be provided. It is understood that the planes are now awaiting shipment from Ottawa and that the service will begin early in the spring.

PAID VISIT TO HOMELAND

Theo. Collart says Belgium Recovering Rapidly from Germany's Ravages

Theo Collart returned yesterday on the Princess Mary after having spent a six months' visit in England, France and Belgium, his native land. Mr. Collart did not cross to the United States during the course of his trip, but went by way of Montreal last October and returned to Canada at St. John's, N.B., the winter route. Mrs. Collart also returned with her husband, but is spending a fortnight in Winnipeg and will then return to Prince Rupert. The house in Section 2 will again be occupied. Mrs. Collart is accompanied to Canada by her mother, Mrs. Gardner, a Scotch lady who makes her home in Folkestone.

In the course of his long trip Mr. Collart saw many interesting sights and places. He was on the go all the time and says that he stayed in no one place more than three weeks. While on the continent he spent the time visiting places between Brussels and Paris. Many of the cities in Belgium that were under the German occupation during the great war, including his own home town of Wavre, were visited and great progress is being made in the work of reconstruction and re-organization.

Belgium's Great Recovery.

Mr. Collart served with the Belgian army from 1915 until 1919, when he returned to Canada. In the year that elapsed between his return from the war and his visit to the homeland again a great change has been wrought. A great deal of the machinery that was removed by the Germans has been returned and the little nation is actually back to a 65 per cent standard of efficiency as compared to its condition when its borders were crossed and the ruthless work of devastation commenced in 1914. The coal mines are producing now on a larger scale than ever before. Among the places visited were Brussels, Liege, Antwerp, Bruges, Ghent, Charleroi and Namur, all of which had been occupied.

Speaking of conditions generally in the three countries he visited Mr. Collart says that prices are gradually coming down although he does not expect they will ever reach the low level of 1913 and 1914. England is facing a most serious situation caused by unemployment which has not struck Belgium and France so badly. The only remedy in England, says Mr. Collart, will be a general reduction in wages.

Mr. Collart's trip was not all on pleasure bent but he returns with a number of new Belgian agencies to set up with his business already established here. Shortly he will commence a general importation and exporting business.

In the Letter Box

"FOWL PLAY"

Editor Daily News.—In a recent number of your paper appeared an article under the heading "Fowl Play" in which some person, who hides his identity under the pseudonym of "Citizen," made certain allegations with regard to the preservation of game in Masset Inlet. This article has aroused widespread indignation among the settlers in the district, and a request for the true name of the writer, signed by practically every resident, is being forwarded to you by this mail.

Left Stranded

I presume that "Citizen" is in possession of the usual number of senses, except that sixth sense known as common sense. As a "citizen and taxpayer" he must know that owing to the failure last fall of two concerns operating in the district a large number of the residents were left stranded with nothing but a handful of worthless cheques to show for months of labor. Also that, with the exception of the Government road work on the new road to Tl-vil, which has so far been maintained as practically a close corporation for non-residents, there has been no work of any kind available. Under these circumstances, can he blame any man for trying to provide an occasional meal for himself and family from the abundance of wild fowl in the district. I have never heard of any instance of the "slaughtering" to which "Citizen" refers.

Poor Marksmen

Then again he may have estimated the slaughter by the number of shots fired, which is grossly unfair to our local marksmen, who often average one bird to two boxes of cartridges.

As regards the expression "in-shuffle to work," "Citizen" must know that members of that category are rarely found in lumber camps, sawmills and frontier districts generally. Such few specimens who happen to drift into the district and show an inclination to avoid a man-sized job, either drift out again or gravitate naturally into one of those minor government positions in which the minimum of physical effort is required.

Wishes to Know

May I enquire whether "Citizen," before ventilating his grievance on the public and asking "What are provincial policemen for?" had ever made any formal complaint to the provincial police or game warden on the matter? "Citizen" must know that the powers that be, in their wisdom, have appointed one solitary officer to take charge of the whole of Graham and McCreby Islands, with the duties of game warden in addition, and that it is physically impossible for one man to adequately cover this extent of territory.



NW LIFE BOAT IS INVENTED BY CAPTAIN

Pacific Coast Interested in Boats Operated from Dredge

VANCOUVER, Mar. 19.—An electrically launched lifeboat which its inventor, Captain H. Wright, of the Isthmian Line steamer, Steel Maker, claims will do away with delay and confusion attending the launching of ordinary lifeboats from vessels in case of shipwreck or accident, has created much interest in coast shipping circles.

All that will be required, the captain said, will be for the officer on the bridge to press a button causing the lifeboat to swing out and drop to a level with the deck, where the crew and passengers can board; the boat is then dropped to the water, self-releasing falls relax their grip and the boat is away.
