Budget Provides for Local Building QUARTER MILLION POUNDS HALIBUT IN FOUR BIG BOATS IS FORCED OUT

Minister of Finance Sets Aside \$200,000 for Court House; But has yet to Pass Sessions

VICTORIA, March 19.—In the estimates as tabled yesterday John Hart, minister of finance in the provincial legislature, has appropriated \$200,000 for the construction of the new court buildings on Market Place at Prince Rupert. This comes as a result of the promise of Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and mines for Prince Rupert, to the electors of that town last November that construction would be begun as soon as possible.

The set of plans was prepared some time ago and is now ready for approval. The appropriation will likely be successful in the house and the next step will be the calling of tenders for the awarding of the contract if the work is to be done on a contract basis. With the substantial appropriation going to the town it is likely that the actual work of erection will commence at Prince Rupert.

Another Practical Example of Catastrophic Effect Shortage of Refrigerator Cars on City

As a result of the shortage of cars, the Panama with 92,000 pounds of halibut and the Polar with 55,000 pounds left this morning on Thursday night, while yesterday the Liberty with 60,000 pounds and the Seymour with 65,000 pounds took their way to Ketchikan. This makes a total of 252,000 pounds of fish had to be turned out of the port because the railway could not handle the traffic. 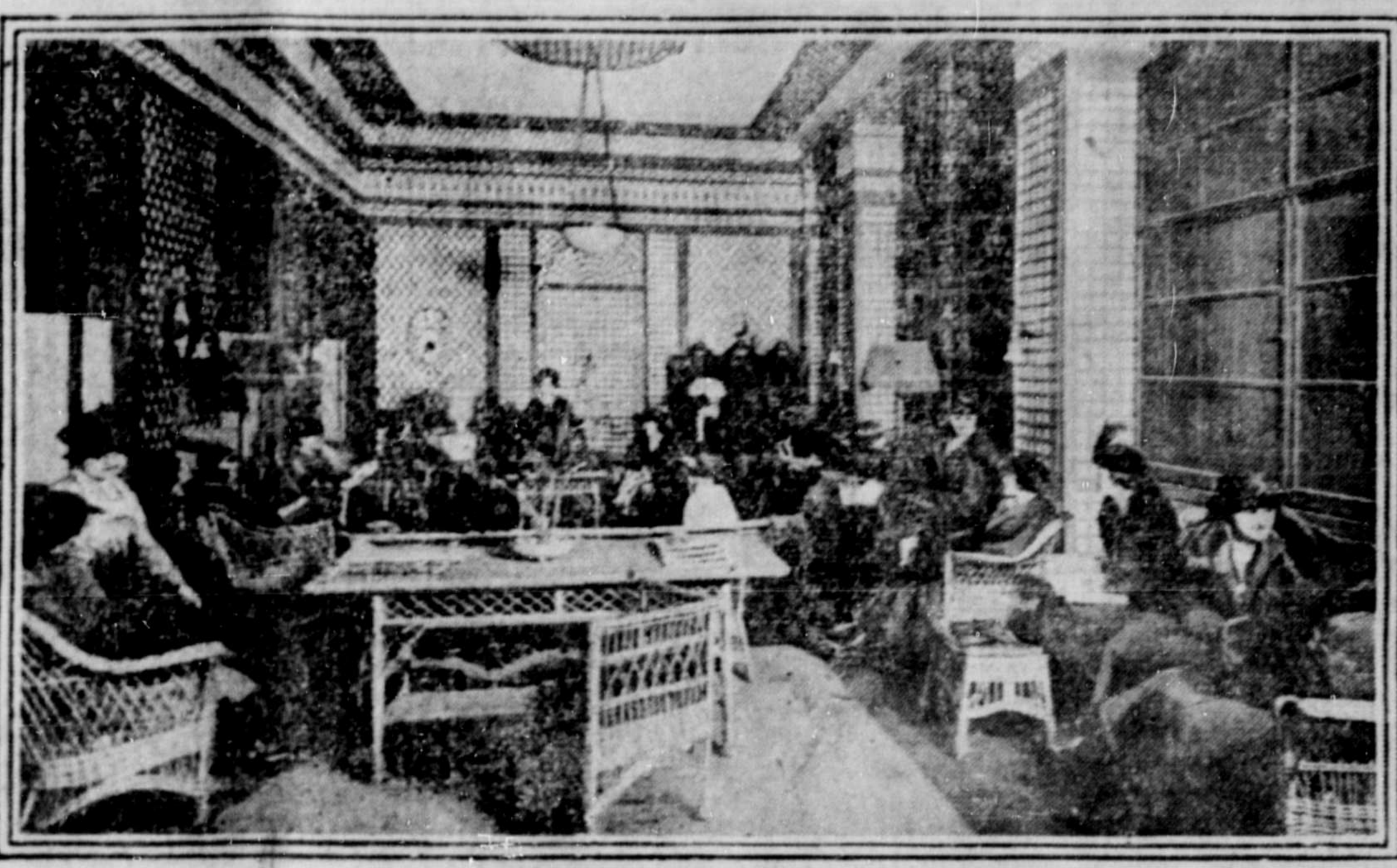
GRANDE PRAIRIE Big Departmental Store Destroyed by Fire Yesterday—Loss \$100,000.

DIED FROM APOPLEXY

Former Member for Saskatchewan Found Dead in Snow Not Far From Residence.

SASKATOON, March 19.—Geo. McCroney, K. C., former member of parliament for Saskatchewan riding, was found dead in the snow a short distance from his home yesterday afternoon. Apoplexy is believed to be the cause of death. Senior partner of the law firm of McCroney, MacKenzie & Hutchinson of Saskatoon, the dead man was widely known throughout the province, which has been his home since 1902. He came from Milton, Ont., in that year and four years afterwards was elected member for Saskatchewan. He was re-elected for the constituency of Saskatoon in 1906 and 1911.

FIGURES HIGH COST OF LIVING

OTTAWA, March 19.—The tremendous advance in the cost of living and the corresponding, though slightly lower increase in wages, in Canada during the period between the years 1913 and 1920 will be shown in a statement to be published by the Department of Labor.

In July, 1920, when the cost of living was at the peak and had reached a figure 104 per cent higher than 1913, an increase in hourly rates of wages paid in 1920 over 1913 is recorded although the weekly scale had increased at that time only 79.3 per cent.

INDIAN PATIENT IN HOSPITAL ROBS SICK MISSIONARY OF WATCH

Abel Derriek, an Aiyem Indian, appeared in the police court this morning charged with the theft of a gold watch from his missionary, J. B. McCulloch, who is lying seriously ill in the General Hospital.

Yesterday at noon Mr. McCulloch discovered that his watch had disappeared from his bedside and the police were informed. Warden Bailey was detailed to investigate and within a couple of hours had found that the watch had been sold and Derriek, who was about to be discharged from the hospital, was placed under arrest.

The case has been adjourned until Monday morning.

PECK SAYS CARS COMMENCE COMING EARLY IN MAY

The secretary of the Board of Trade was in receipt of a telegram this morning from Col. Peck with the information that delivery of refrigerator cars would commence on May 8 and would be finished by the middle of June. This is an advice from the car builders to Col. Peck.

BUSINESS OF LEGISLATURE

Various Bills and Amendments Before House Yesterday Afternoon.

VICTORIA, March 19.—A strong plea for the utmost consideration of returned men in the provincial civil service was last night made by Canon Hinchcliffe, Conservative member for Victoria, in the legislature. He cited cases where it was claimed that the veterans were not receiving the same or equal treatment with men who did not go overseas.

"American machine and ward politics" is the way M. B. Jackson, Liberal member for the Islands, termed the provision in the bill to amend the Elections Act to permit, in Vancouver and Victoria, the grouping of candidates of various political parties and bodies on the ballots at general elections. He said that it would mean the adoption of the very worst feature of American politics. Discussion on the amendment was deferred.

The principles of unlimited taxation involved in the amendments proposed for the Vancouver city charter have led the Private Bills Committee to feel that it would not be justified in recommending it to the house.

Hon. William Sloan, minister of mines, was criticized by Thomas Uphill, Socialist member for Fernie, when the Coal Mines Regulation Act was spoken to by the minister. The amendments make it necessary for the mining companies to abolish the naked lamp and install newly approved lamps.

ALEX. MANSON ALSO DEBATES

Shatters Precedent in Legislature by Participating in Committee.

VICTORIA, March 19.—Alex. M. Manson, speaker of the legislature and member for Omineca, has shattered precedent in legislative procedure by participating in debates during committee.

He announced his intention early in the session of following this practice and his stand gives denial to the view expressed that, when he accepted the speakership, he would be eliminated from his usefulness on the floor of the house.

Mr. Speaker Manson is considered one of the best debaters in the assembly and his following the old procedure of non-participation in the debates would have been a distinct loss.

GAS FLOW REPORTED SOUTH OF THE PAS

THE PAS, Man., March 19.—The discovery of a flow of gas in the foothills of the Pasquia River southwest of here has resulted in a miniature rush of prospectors to the scene of the find. It is claimed that the gas is escaping from crevices in the ground at many points.

PAID VISIT TO HOMELAND

Theo. Collart says Belgium Recovering Rapidly from Germany's Ravages

Theo Collart returned yesterday on the Princess Mary after having spent a six months' visit in England, France and Belgium, his native land. Mr. Collart did not cross to the United States during the course of his trip, but went by way of Montreal last October and returned to Canada at St. John's, N.B., the winter route. Mrs. Collart also returned with her husband, but is spending a fortnight in Winnipeg and will then return to Prince Rupert. The house in Section 2 will again be occupied. Mrs. Collart is accompanied to Canada by her mother, Mrs. Gardner, a Scotch lady who makes her home in Folkestone.

In the course of his long trip Mr. Collart saw many interesting sights and places. He was on the go all the time and says that he stayed in no one place more than three weeks. While on the continent he spent the time visiting places between Brussels and Paris. Many of the cities in Belgium that were under the German occupation during the great war, including his own home town of Wavre, were visited and great progress is being made in the work of reconstruction and reorganization.

Belgium's Great Recovery.

Mr. Collart served with the Belgian army from 1915 until 1919, when he returned to Canada. In the year that elapsed between his return from the war and his visit to the homeland again a great change has been wrought. A great deal of the machinery that was removed by the Germans has been returned and the little nation is actually back to a 65 per cent standard of efficiency as compared to its condition when its borders were crossed and the ruthless work of devastation commenced in 1914. The coal mines are producing now on a larger scale than ever before. Among the places visited were Brussels, Liege, Antwerp, Bruges, Ghent, Charleroi and Namur, all of which had been occupied.

Speaking of conditions generally in the three countries he visited Mr. Collart says that prices are gradually coming down although he does not expect they will ever reach the low level of 1913 and 1914. England is facing a most serious situation caused by unemployment which has not struck Belgium and France so badly. The only remedy in England, says Mr. Collart, will be a general reduction in wages.

Mr. Collart's trip was not all on pleasure bent but he returns with a number of new Belgian agencies to set up with his business already established here. Shortly he will commence a general importation and exporting business.

Sir Percy Scott Discusses Pros and Cons of Subject in London Times

In a letter to the Times, Admiral Sir Percy Scott says: I have been able publicly to ask the question, 'What is the use of a battleship?'

Subs. and Planes

In trying to arrive at the utility of the super-dreadnoughts we must bear in mind that the earliest date on which the first one could be completed is the summer of 1923, and we must consider what improvements will possibly be made in the new weapons during that time.

Immense Size

During the war I was for a time head of the Anti-Submarine Department in the Admiralty. I had to consider two things—

1) Means to destroy the submarine; 2) means to strengthen the battleship's submerged part against torpedo attack.

This wonderful combination of talent and invention did produce improvements in the design of battleships, which gave them a better chance of remaining on the surface if holed by a torpedo of that date; but we found that the modifications in design would necessitate a great increase in the size of the battleship.

Then a man came along with a design of torpedo that would undoubtedly sink the clever designers' ship, so the Admiralty decided to build only one of the four ships on their program.

Thus was produced H.M.S. Hood. It is our latest attempt, I think it will be our last; she is obsolete, she can be sent to the bottom by a submarine.
