Government's Vote of Confidence

HARDING OFFICIALLY INAUGURATED AS PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES

Ottawa Government Sustained on Vote

Majority of 25 for Meighen against Mackenzie King on Motion of Want of Confidence; Other Amendments Dropped

OTTAWA, March 4.—The Meighen Government was sustained by a majority of 25 on the vote of want of confidence moved by Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, early this morning after a long session. There was a long drawn out debate and the number voting was not large—91 for and 116 against the Government. The address in reply to the speech from the throne was carried without a division.

The vote on the Campbell amendment to King's amendment was 35-5, it being defeated without a voice being raised in favor. Neither the mover or the mover was in the chamber when the question was put.

Will Hold On.
OTTAWA, March 4.—(Special.)—The King amendment to the Meighen Government, which has been prevalent here every day since the present Government, seen in an appeal to the House, will hold on to office as long as possible, probably for a year yet. There will be no change in the summer and it is expected by the passing of the session will fall next spring. The House should come in the summer of 1922 or there.

Tariff Issue.
The attitude of the Liberal House to the tariff question is not clear and it is possible they will change the floor and vote with the Government at that time. If so, the outcome may be the outcome.

ON TOOK LITTLE PART IN CEREMONY

Angling Alliances Says, But Association of Nations.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Ex-President Wilson took little part in the inauguration ceremonies of President Harding and Vice-President Coolidge this afternoon. He was accompanied by his doctor, he declined Mr. Harding from the White House to the Capitol building, and he declined to return to his home, in peace and friendship with the United States. He spoke hopefully of the establishment of an association of nations to bring about an "approximate disarmament" and said he wanted no "entangling alliances."

IA DOES NOT LIKE VOTING SYSTEM

Proportional Representation After Trial by Vote of Two to One.

OTTAWA, March 4.—The principle of proportional representation applied to municipal elections was defeated in a referendum here yesterday by a vote of two to one. The vote was 2,295 for, and 4,590 against.

Proportional representation was used at the recent election.

ALLAN SPEAKS WAGE QUESTION

Scale at Local Yard Governed by Government in Conformity with Southern Rates

As a result of the publicity given yesterday to the recommendation of operations at the dry dock and shipyards there was an unusually large crowd of men at the employment office gate this morning when work started for the day. Very few were taken on, however, owing to the fact that a great deal of preparatory work is necessary about the yards before a large force can be handled.

Same Scale as Below
Asked for a statement this morning in connection with the scale of wages to be paid locally, T. H. Allan, general superintendent, stated that the scale to be paid would be the same as that now prevailing for similar work in Vancouver.

"The scale in force is fixed by the Dominion Government," said Mr. Allan, "and is a condition of the contract under which the Wallace Company undertook the completion of the two ships now under construction. It is, in fact, the rate governing in all Canadian Pacific Coast shipyards."

"While the rates to be paid will be in some respects lower than those which prevailed here last year, as intimated in the Daily News some weeks ago, their uniformity with those of southern competitors places the Prince Rupert plant on an even competitive basis with her rivals."

Officials Supervise
The Department of Marine will have representatives at the plant from now until the completion of the contract. Their duties will be to keep a check for the government as the work progresses. Incidentally, these representatives will examine all pay lists and will insist that the scale laid down by the contract is maintained.

CONSERVATIVES ARE PLEASED WITH LARGE GOVERNMENT MAJORITY

OTTAWA, March 4.—The Government majority of 25 in the first division of the House since the advent of Hon. Arthur Meighen to the position of Premier greatly pleases Government supporters, who consider they now have a mandate to carry on until the census figures are available and redistribution has been effected. They say they had not expected so large a majority.

ANTI-MODERATIONISTS

Meeting Held in Calgary to Discuss Situation.

CALGARY, March 4.—A meeting of the social service council was held here for the purpose of considering the position in view of the efforts to obtain signatures favoring a moderation law in the province. It was shown that the moderationists were not unanimous in regard to any particular policy.

British Minister Suffers Defeat in By-Election

Labor Wins in Cudley, Strongly Supported by Lord Beaverbrook; Canadian Cattle Embargo Used Against Government Candidate

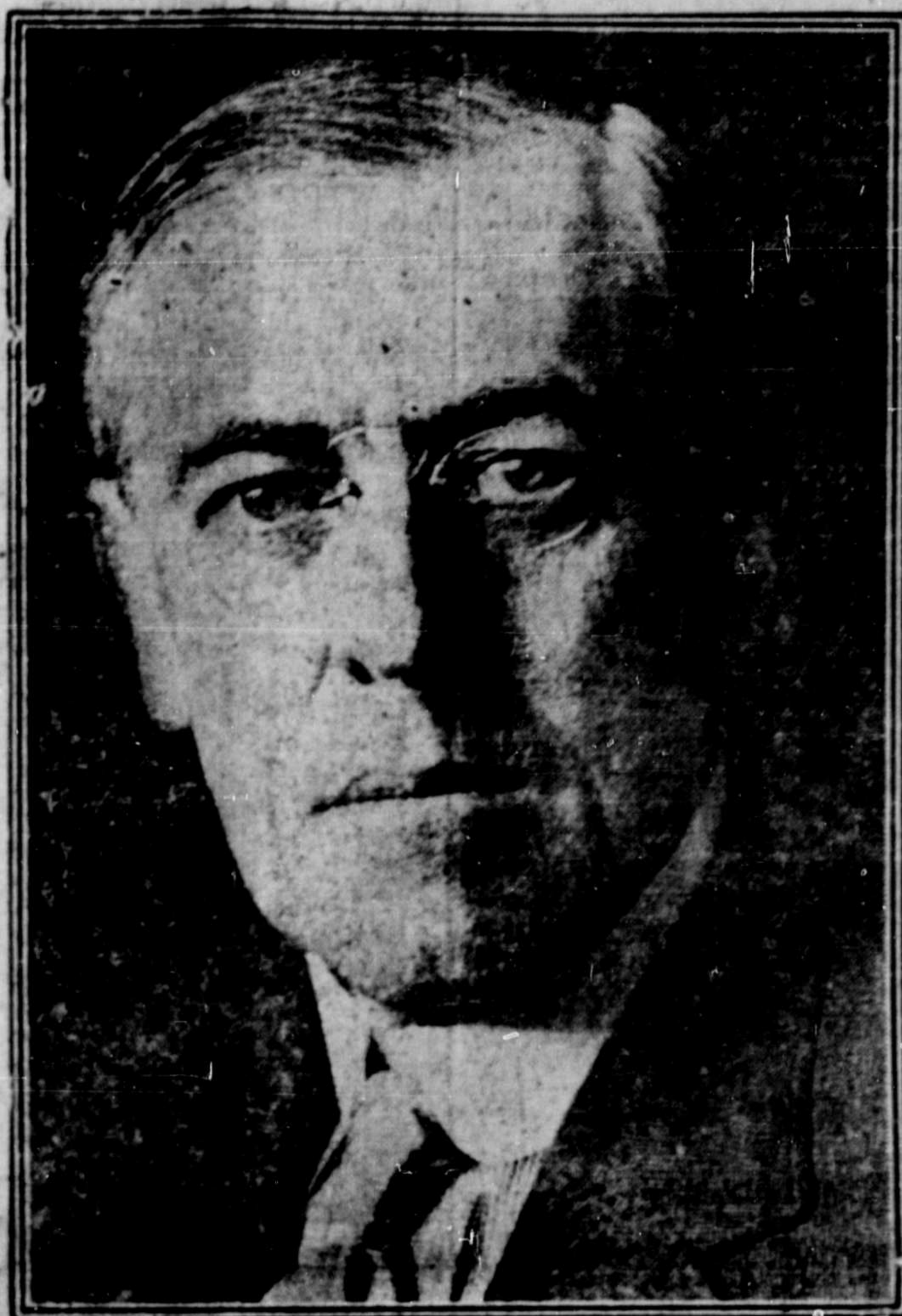
LONDON, March 4.—Sir Arthur Griffiths-Boscawen, the newly appointed minister of agriculture in the British Government, was defeated in the Cudley by-election by J. Wilson, a labor candidate.

The vote for the labor man was 10,244 and the coalition Liberal 9,068.

The defeat of the Government ministerial candidate is attributed mainly to the controversy over the question of the embargo on Canadian cattle. This cry was used by the opposition who ascribed this cause for the high cost of meat in Britain.

Lord Beaverbrook took an active part in the campaign against the Government candidate.

Harding President of United States

Inauguration Ceremonies Simple to Conform with Wishes of New Incumbent of Office; Throngs of People

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Warren Gamaliel Harding was inaugurated President of the United States today with ceremonies almost as simple as those customarily attending the opening of a session of the Canadian Parliament at Ottawa.

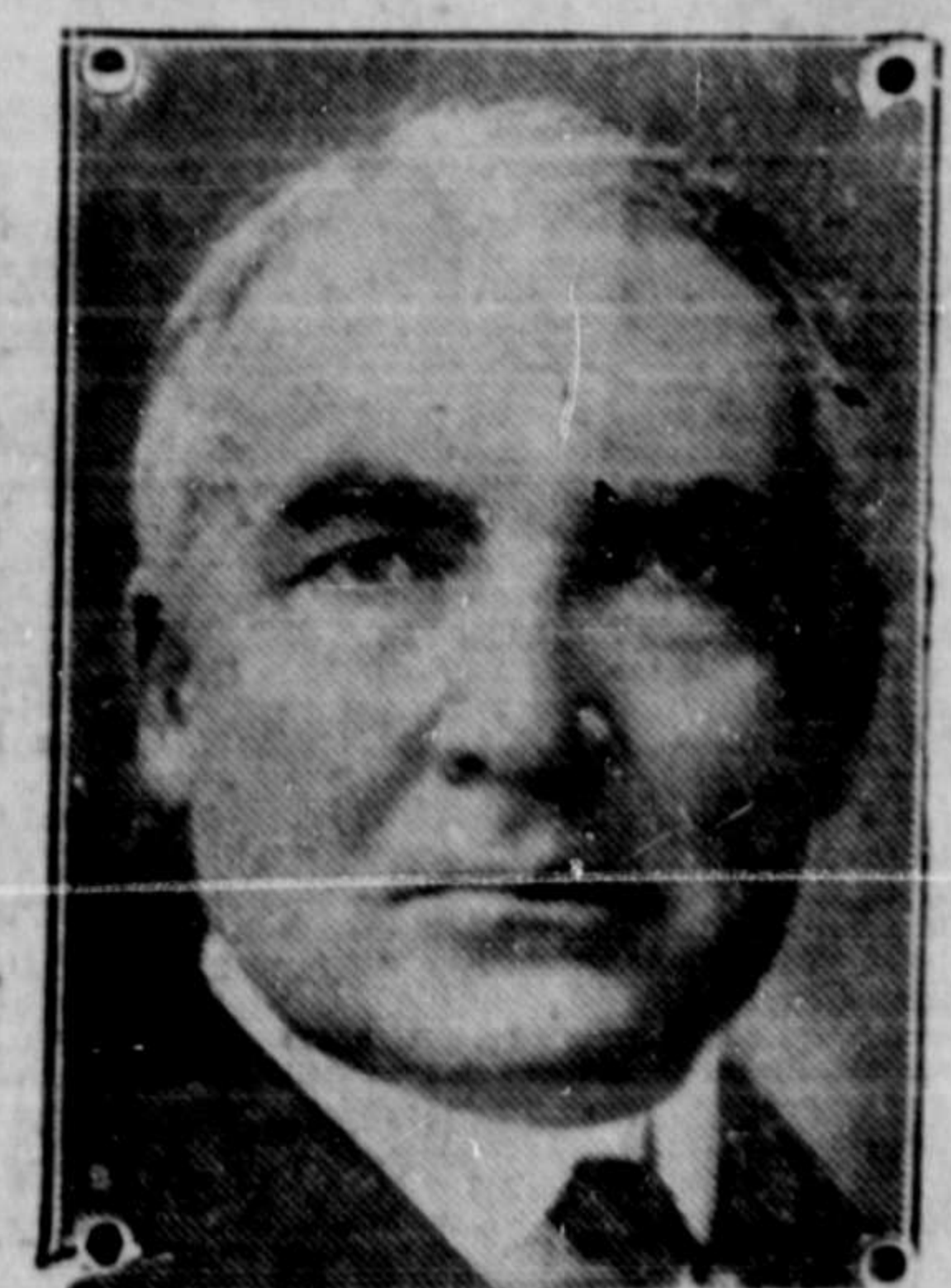
Had Mr. Harding's personal wishes been adhered to strictly, the ceremonies would have been more simple, but the Congressional Inaugural Committee made some arrangements on its own account. These included a cavalry escort of four troops for the President in his ride from his hotel to the Capitol and thence to the White House.

This little cavalcade contrasted strangely with the great military and civil processions which have attended inaugurations for half a century or more.

Besides the cavalry escort, the Congressional Committee also had arranged to have several companies of marines at the Capitol as a guard of honor and for the presence of the United States Marine Band—"the President's Own"—which played the "Star Spangled Banner" immediately after Mr. Harding had taken the oath of office.

The very simplicity of the ceremonies on the east portico of the Capitol added to their impressiveness. Simple and impressive also were those in the Senate chamber, where Calvin Coolidge was sworn in by Vice President Marshall and where Mr. Coolidge in turn swore into office the new senators elected last November.

The day's ceremonies began with the formal calls on the President-elect and Vice-President-elect at the New Willard Hotel by the Congressional Committee headed by Senator Knox, of Penn-

sylvania. The presidential party and the Congressional Committee then left the hotel for the Capitol, Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House to the Capitol, a distance of one mile, was lined with throngs of people.

British Liberty Asked By Parson Member When Discussing Liquor Measure

Rev. Canon Hinchcliffe, Conservative Member for Victoria, Claims We Are Harking Back to Middle Ages

VICTORIA, March 4.—Rev. Canon Hinchcliffe, Conservative member for Victoria, continuing the debate on the moderation liquor bill yesterday in the Legislature, claimed that many improvements might be made to the measure, especially in regard to present undoubted infringements on the principles of British liberty.

The Canon stated that public opinion would have been more strongly back of the Government if it had seen fit to submit a skeleton of the bill at the time of the referendum. The secrecy of the Government prior to the introduction of the measure was a clear cause for public uncertainty and suspicion.

British Liberty.

The speaker attacked the Government for alleged infringement of British liberty by giving the right to search premises and persons without a search warrant. He said this was harking back to the middle ages. A clause whereby a person is forced to give evidence which might incriminate him he condemned, saying that such a provision was on a par with German oppression in Belgium, a thing the Britisher looked on with disgust.

The member for Victoria urged a really independent board of commissioners to have charge of the administration of the act after it was passed and more consideration for the needs of the municipalities.

Dick for Beer.

Major Dick Burde of Alberni moved the adjournment and will continue the debate. It is understood he will strongly advocate the inclusion of a "beer clause" along lines suggested by Ian Mackenzie of Vancouver.

NOTICE OF APPEAL IN SHIPYARD

Government Gives Instructions to Commence Action This Afternoon.

VANCOUVER, March 4.—Hodges stated in an interview this morning that yesterday's report from Prince Rupert that he would turn over equipment of the dry dock to the Government to enable them to complete the vessels was premature. Everything depended on the Government. Today is the last day on which the Government has the right of appeal against the recent judgment permitting the creditors to retain the equipment. If no appeal is lodged the yard would probably open on Saturday or the first of next week.

VANCOUVER—(Later.)—R. T. Reid, K. C., at two o'clock announced he has been instructed by the Government to enter notice of appeal and will do so this afternoon.

AMENDMENT TO FORESTRY ACT

Conservation of Timber Supply is Feature of the Proposed Change in Law.

VICTORIA, March 4.—The policy of timber conservation to insure a perpetual supply of raw material for milling and pulp and paper manufacture are the features in an amendment to the Forestry Act brought down yesterday by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, under whose supervision the timber interests of the province come.

MILD WEATHER IS CAUSED BY JAPANESE CURRENT ON PACIFIC

Professor Does Not Believe Moon Affects Climate nor Instincts of Birds.

TORONTO, March 4.—Canada's comparatively mild climate this winter has been due to the Kuro-siwo or Japanese current, which affects the climate of the Dominion, Sir Frederick Stupart, director of the meteorological observatory, Toronto, told an audience at Trinity college here Saturday afternoon in an address on "Weather and Weather Changes." Sir Frederick said that when the current in question was warmer than usual it set up disturbances of the atmosphere in the north which changed the course of the winds. Sir Frederick said rain could not be produced by artificial means. The idea that the moon influenced the weather was a fallacy, he said, also the idea that birds or beasts could tell by instinct the kind of weather that was coming. Sir Frederick said he had little confidence in the Indian forecast of the weather.

ALBERTA'S COAL.

Only one and four-fifths per cent of the coal mined in Alberta came to British Columbia last year, according to a report to the Alberta Legislature. The total output of the Alberta mines was nearly seven million tons.

SOVIET ORDER TO FREE INDIA FROM ENGLISH OPPRESSORS

LONDON, March 4.—Information has recently been received of an "Order of the Day" which was issued on October 10 last year by the Chief Commissioner on the Turkestan front to a Red division ordered from Tashkent to the Pamir. The order runs as follows: "Comrades of the Pamir Division, you have been given a responsible task. The Soviet Republic sends you to garrison the posts on the Pamir on the frontiers of the friendly countries of Afghanistan and India. The Pamir tableland divides a revolutionary Russia from India, that with its 300,000,000 inhabitants is enslaved by a handful of Englishmen."

"On this tableland you, the signallers of the revolution, must hoist the Red Flag of the army of liberation. May the peoples of India, who fight against their English oppressors, soon know that friendly help is not far off."

EXPERIMENTAL AIR FLIGHTS TO LONDON

Series Being Carried Out From Brookland's Aerodrome to Parliament Houses.

LONDON, March 4.—The air ministry has begun a series of trial flights from Brookland's Aerodrome to Westminster with the object of ascertaining the practicability of establishing a station for hydroplanes or similar craft on the Thames in the heart of London.

In the first flight the Viking, an amphibian, fled from Brooklands in fourteen minutes, circled the houses of parliament and alighted opposite the House of Commons terrace. One or two short flights over the river were also made to demonstrate the rapidity with which they could rise from the water. The average time taken to rise was nine seconds.

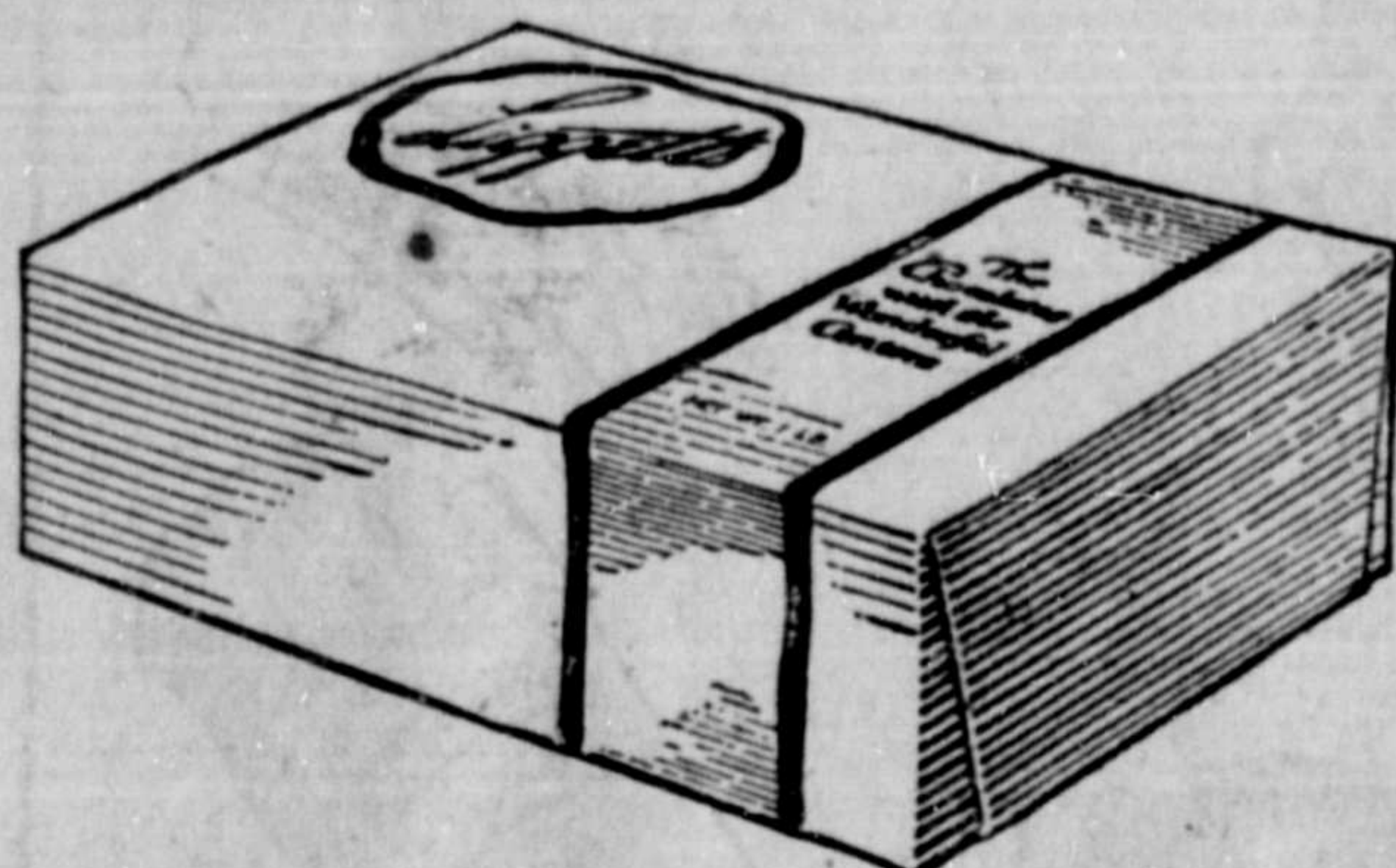

HARDING PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES

thronged with people from all parts of the United States anxious to catch a glimpse of the new and retiring presidents. There were no reviewing stands as in former years and most of the spectators were forced to stand along the sidewalk or in windows facing the avenue for which high prices were the rule.

At the Capitol the east plaza, with its standing room for thousands, was packed with a dense throng of people and the crowds overflowed but over the park spaces and avenues which converge there. Most of these thousands of people were able to hear the inaugural address as Mr. Harding's voice was carried out by means of sound-amplifying devices installed over the platform where he stood.

When the official party arrived at the Capitol it was escorted to a room off the Senate chamber and the Vice President and Mrs. Coolidge went to the Vice President's room to await the beginning of the ceremonies in the Senate chamber. President Wilson was in his room at the Capitol signing bills which had been passed during the closing hours of the Sixty-sixth Congress.

Galleries Filled

Senate galleries were filled long before this hour. Invited guests of the new President, Vice President, Speaker and Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States supplied with coveted cards of admission, were assigned to the east galleries, while other galleries were set aside for guests of Senators and Congressmen. In the diplomatic gallery, facing the Vice President's chair, the families of the diplomatic corps, representing some forty odd nations, were seated.

While the Senate was assembling for its special session, the first of the Sixty-seventh Congress, the diplomatic corps was assembling in the marble room, to be escorted into the Senate chamber. Gorgeous in the colors and gold of their court uniforms, the corps entered headed by its dean, the Ambassador of France, Jules J. Jusserand. Other ambassadors followed in the order of their length of service at

Washington, with His British Majesty's ambassador, the Rt. Hon. Sir Auckland Geddes, K.C.B., tenth in line. Following the ambassadors came the ministers of the smaller countries.

Next came the Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States, in their sombre black silk gowns, moving slowly to seats in the front row facing the Vice President. Immediately after, the members of the House of Representatives filed in with Speaker Gillett at the head.

Harding Enters

President-elect Harding, escorted by the committee on arrangements, entered the chamber at the main door and was escorted to a seat on the right of the main aisle facing the rostrum. Vice President Coolidge was seated on the presiding officer's platform.

After a prayer by the chaplain, Vice President Marshall called the session of the Senate to order. As silence settled over the chamber, Vice President Coolidge stood beside Mr. Marshall. Both men raised their right hands, Mr. Marshall slowly spoke the Vice President's oath, the new Vice President repeating his words, and afterward delivering his address.

While the new Senators were being sworn in the remainder of the party began moving out of the chamber toward the east portico of the Capitol. All of the party on the Senate floor and the guests in the galleries, by pre-arranged directions, moved along the rotunda in lines which converged at the main entrance and then out to the portico and steps. The guests were in their places before Mr. Harding appeared upon the speaker's stand, a small structure 30 feet square, built with iron girders and with a covered canopy above housing the sound-amplifying instruments. The whole was profusely decorated with flags and bunting.

Mr. Harding emerged from the Capitol entrance accompanied by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Edward Douglas White, and the Congressional Committee. They all were seated on the platform.

Sea of Humanity

Then before a great sea of humanity, official and unofficial, invited and uninvited, Mr. Harding took his place at the left of Chief Justice White. With Bible in hand the Chief Justice stepped to the foot of the platform and Mr. Harding with upraised right hand slowly and solemnly repeated after the Chief Justice the oath of office as President, prescribed in the constitution. At the conclusion of the oath President Harding kissed the open Bible and the ceremony was over save for the delivery of the inaugural address of the new President.

Stepping toward the vast throng Mr. Harding then began his carefully prepared address outlining the policies of his administration.

Cavalry Escort

At the conclusion of the address the Senate returned to its chamber to resume its special session, while the new President to the cheers of the throng entered his automobile and with a cavalry escort moved through the Capitol grounds and slowly along Pennsylvania Avenue. Everywhere along this thoroughfare the masses of people on the sidewalks cheered themselves hoarse. The simple procession along the famous avenue moved slowly, the President bowing and raising his hat almost constantly through the mile ride.

Reaching the White House, the new President entered and found awaiting him there a large company, including his father, who had been one of the most interested spectators throughout the ceremonies.

The ceremonies this year, devoid of the long and tiresome inaugural parade, were looked on with much relief.

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Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made pre-emptive improvements, he may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transferred his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements of \$10 per acre, including 1 acre cleared and cultivated, 40 acres of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown-granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For granting and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mills, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased on conditional upon construction of a road to them. Release of one-half of road of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 28, 1918.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town, city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, on fee basis.

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
