INTERNATIONAL LEADER SCATHES ONE BIG UNION

GOVERNMENT LIQUOR IS LIABLE TAX

Mr. Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance, says will not affect Purpose

OTTAWA, May 21.—The minister of finance, Mr. Henry Drayton, has today in the House of Commons, announced the question of the liability of the provinces of British Columbia for taxation of the provincial liquor stocks.

Mr. Henry Drayton, minister of finance, admitted that the liquor business in the province would be an ordinary trade, but would be liable for an attempt to promote temperance. He pointed out that the additional taxation would not interfere with the functions of the liquor business in the provinces of British Columbia and Quebec where the governments were not in the business to make money. Mr. Drayton stated that the liquor business was most seriously subject to the new tax in this year's budget.

RIGHT BETWEEN POLICEMEN AND STRIKE PEOPLE

Trouble in New York When Big Gunader Aquitania Docked Yesterday.

NEW YORK, May 21.—The police and marine strike sympathizers clashed here yesterday when the Canadian line steamer Aquitania docked. Stone throwing provoked the fire of the police and a negro fireman was taken up before the crowd dispersed.

AGAINST SELF DETERMINATION MEET HALIFAX

British Empire Alliance Taking Steps to Prevent Convention Next Month.

HALIFAX, May 21.—A meeting of the British Empire Alliance held here last night strongly opposed permission being given to the self-determination League of Canada to hold a convention in Halifax in June. Action is being taken to prevent the gathering.

INSPECTED AT THULME RIVER

Mayor and Aldermen Back; Plan of Reconnaissance.

Mayor Rochester together with Aldermen Parker and Dybbavn returned from their exploration trip to the Thulme River yesterday, whither they journeyed accompanied by General Utility Superintendent T. G. Duncan to look into the matter of obtaining power for additional electrical purposes for the city.

They report a very pleasant time as regards weather, with not a little strenuous exertion indulged in, climbing the precipitous banks of the head waters of the river in pursuit of information and knowledge in furtherance of the objects of their visit. While the country is of a decidedly rough nature and many obstacles are to be contended with, they have quite sanguine expectations of the feasibility of the proposition. Superintendent Duncan did not return yesterday, but it is expected he will be back on Tuesday, when he will proceed to Woodworth Lake and start in from there to meet the party working from the Thulme river and on the preliminary survey.

BIG INVESTMENT IN LIVESTOCK

Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture, Talks in Big Figures.

OTTAWA, May 21.—Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie, federal minister of agriculture, stated in an address here last night that no less than \$100 million and seventy-six million dollars was invested in livestock in Canada.

RECORD CROWD AT TURF CLASSIC

Duke and Duchess of Devonshire Grace Jockey Club Gathering in Toronto.

TORONTO, May 21.—Indian boys are that there will be a great crowd in attendance at the opening meeting of the Ontario Jockey Club at Woodbine. The King's Plate mile and a quarter race, which is acclaimed the oldest turf fixture run continuously on this continent, will be the feature classic.

It is expected that nine horses will start in this race which is confined to three-year-olds bred in Ontario. Fifty guineas has been donated by King George and this has been supplemented by \$7,500 given by the Jockey Club. The Duke and Duchess of Devonshire will be among those present.

WELL KNOWN BISHOP IN CITY YESTERDAY

After Spending Several Months in East, Bishop Stringer is Returning to Yukon.

Bishop and Mrs. L. O. Stringer were among the passengers northbound on the Princess Mary yesterday afternoon. On their arrival here they were met by Archbishop Du Vernet, of Caledonia diocese.

Bishop Stringer, who is in charge of the Canadian Yukon diocese, is one of the best known church men of Canada. He has spent the past several months in Toronto and other parts of eastern Canada for his health which is now quite improved.

He is now going into the north country to resume his work. In July he will be joined by a number of new assistants for his immense field of Christian endeavor.

Oriental Question Will Be Subject of Test Cases in High Courts, Says Farris

VANCOUVER, May 21.—The Orientals and their rights in the province of British Columbia will shortly be made a legal issue in the federal courts according to a statement made yesterday by J. W. deB. Farris, provincial attorney-general.

Test cases will be made on the orders-in-council passed from time to time by the provincial government and the Validating Act passed at the recent session of the legislature.

The local Japanese consul has protested to Ottawa against the passing of the act in March.

POPE APPEALS IRISH PEACE

Writing to Cardinal Logue Suggests Basis of Settlement.

DUNDALK, May 21.—Pope Benedict has written to Cardinal Logue, the primate of Ireland, with an appeal that both English and Irish abandon the violence in Ireland. It is proposed that the question be settled by a body selected by the Irish nation.

MILLIONAIRE'S WIFE ARRESTED FOR THEFT

Mrs. Joseph Heil Taken Into Custody by Chicago Police.

CHICAGO, May 21.—Mrs. Jos. Heil, wife of the millionaire banker and investment broker, has been arrested at her home by the police charged with robbing half a dozen homes where she obtained employment as a maid.

BIG FUND TO HELP IRELAND

Ten Million Dollar Fund Being Raised in America to Re-establish Business.

DUBLIN, May 21.—A thousand Irish protestants of twenty-seven counties have sent a message to America telling of their appreciation of the efforts to raise a ten million dollar fund. They promise that the money will be used in restoring the business life of Ireland. The assertion was made that the damage to property in Ireland as a result of the trouble there is many times that amount.

RE-ESTABLISHMENT REPORT THURSDAY

Parliamentary Committee Will Then Present Findings to House of Commons.

OTTAWA, May 21.—The report of the parliamentary committee on soldiers' re-establishment will be presented to the House of Commons next Thursday.

One Big Unionists Howl Down Moore Winnipeg Meeting

WINNIPEG, May 21.—Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, was howled down by One Big Union sympathizers at a meeting here last evening.

Moore abandoned the meeting alleging that the One Big Union was hampering the cause of labor with dissension from its ranks at the time that unity was most needed.

He characterized the conduct at the meeting as typical of the policy of the One Big Union. They were living on the efforts of the trades unions and were seeking to get something for nothing.

COAL MINERS SETTLEMENT

Plans Again Under Way for Settlement—Fifty-First Day.

LONDON, May 21.—The British mine owners have reported that a new plan had been brought forward which may result in the settlement of the miners' strike which this morning entered upon its fifty-first day. The details have not yet been divulged but it is believed that a suggestion is being made whereby wages would be governed by the cost of living.

ADMIRAL SIMS GETS FURTHER BRITISH HONOR

Is Most Honored American Officer in Great Britain—Canadian Born

LONDON, May 21.—When Rear Admiral Sims, of the United States Navy and former commander of the American naval forces in the war zone, arrives in England tomorrow he will receive the degree of Doctor of Laws at Cambridge University.

Rear Admiral Sims is the recipient of more official honors in Britain than were ever before extended to a naval officer of the United States. He is a member of the Grand Cross Order of St. Michael and St. George, this honor having been conferred upon him by King George in 1918. He was also offered the Distinguished Service Medal in 1919 but this he declined.

The honors given Admiral Sims by Britain are in a measure appropriate for he was born in Port Hope, Ontario, so is a Canadian by birth. His co-operation with the Grand Fleet of Britain in the latter days of the war is well known.

BIG MINE NEAR JUNEAU CLOSES

Four Hundred Employees Will Be Thrown out of Work.

JUNEAU, May 20.—The Alaska Gastineau mine and mill will close down permanently at the end of this month, throwing out of work 400 employees, according to announcement made by Superintendent Jackson. Negotiations are under way for other interests to develop wood pulp and paper manufacturing with a view to using the Alaska Gastineau power development.

Mr. Jackson said that such machinery as could not be used in the paper and pulp mill will be assembled for shipment and will be sold.

H. L. Faulkner, attorney for the company, said he thought work on the pulp and paper plants would probably begin late in the summer or early in the fall.

BANDITS GET AWAY ROBBERY

Seventy Thousand Dollars' Worth Goods Taken from Freight Train Early Today.

BUFFALO, May 21.—Masked men held up a freight train near North Tonawanda early today and carried away silks, shoes, clothing, automobile tires and other freight worth \$70,000. The bandits escaped and posses are now on their trail.

MUCH RIOTING PAST FEW DAYS

Soldiers and Demonstrators Clash in Alexandria and Cairo in Egypt.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, May 21.—A fight between the police and demonstrators resulted in many deaths and the wounding of one British soldier. Arising out of political trouble there has been a great deal of rioting in Cairo during the past few days and numerous casualties have resulted.

Fish Payroll Is Large One.

There was a nice little payroll of five and a half million dollars here during the year ending March 31 last. While not all the money was spent here, a good deal of it was. The amount is equal to several ship contracts. In a ship contract a good deal of the money is sent away to pay for material. In the fish business a good deal of it is spent in wages.

In the salmon fisheries the Indians earn a good deal of the money spent for the fish that are caught and they spend it practically all in the neighborhood. The halibut is paid for here and much of it goes to local people. The other fish do not amount to much but the herring fisheries provide work for a few of the fishermen at a time when there is nothing else for them to do.

With all that money spent in the city, the wonder is there are not more people living here. A city of ten or twelve thousand people should be able to live easily on the amount of money spent in the district on fish alone. And then there are the other industries.

Present of Chair to House of Commons.

The presentation of a speaker's chair to the House of Commons by the members of the British House was an act of kindly courtesy which tends to make a friendly feeling between the people of Great Britain and Canada. It was one of those little acts of courtesy between countries which resemble the little acts of courtesy which commonly take place between individuals.

No person was better qualified to make the presentation than Former Speaker Lowther, a man with a fine sense of humor and with a love for his work and a respect for the office he held—a spirit which is worthy of emulation. The newspaper account of the leave taking, when the speaker resigned his position in the British Parliament after a long term of service, was most touching. Mr. Lowther said he resigned at this time rather than at a time when the government changed so that there should not be a change in speakership and change of government simultaneously, thus giving the new man a chance to get some experience before a new government took charge. It was a considerate act.

The people of Canada will value the new chair. It will be one of the things to point out to visitors as the one which is exactly the duplicate of "the one"—the seat of which is made from the famous stone of Scone on which all kings of Scotland are crowned.

Everyone is interested in Oil.

Everyone is more or less interested in oil. The finding of a gusher at Fort Norman has given an impetus to prospecting throughout the north. In almost every district there are spots which give oil indications. Possibly from some of these oil may be obtained if wells are put down.

Drilling is an expensive operation. There is no line of prospecting so difficult as prospecting for oil. It is to be hoped that some of the efforts will be successful and that oil will be found, either on Queen Charlotte Islands or on the coast and that before very long.

A find of oil at any point in the neighborhood would have a stimulating effect on business. It would mean that there would have to be a refinery, that cheaper fuel would be obtained on the Canadian side of the line, that the fleet of local boats would be able better to compete in the fishing and carrying business and that there would be greater prosperity for all.

LIQUOR WAS FROZEN IN BLOCKS OF ICE

NEW YORK, May 21.—In the contest to discover the most ingenious means of deflecting attention of prohibition enforcement agents, customs officers here believe this contrivance deserves at least honorable mention:

In their search of the steamship Glendora, the inspectors obeyed a "hunch" and rummaged through the ship's cold storage plant. Frosting on the large cakes of ice, rendering them quite opaque, whetted their suspicions, and they scraped off the coating. An improvised "X-ray" made by attaching reflectors to electric light bulbs, revealed bottle-shaped black spots within the translucent blocks. More than 200 bottles of whiskey had been thus frozen into these glacial hiding places, they said.

KEWANEE, May 20.—One hundred exhibition animals, including racehorses, cows, sheep, perished in a fire last night which destroyed the barn in the Bradford Fair grounds.

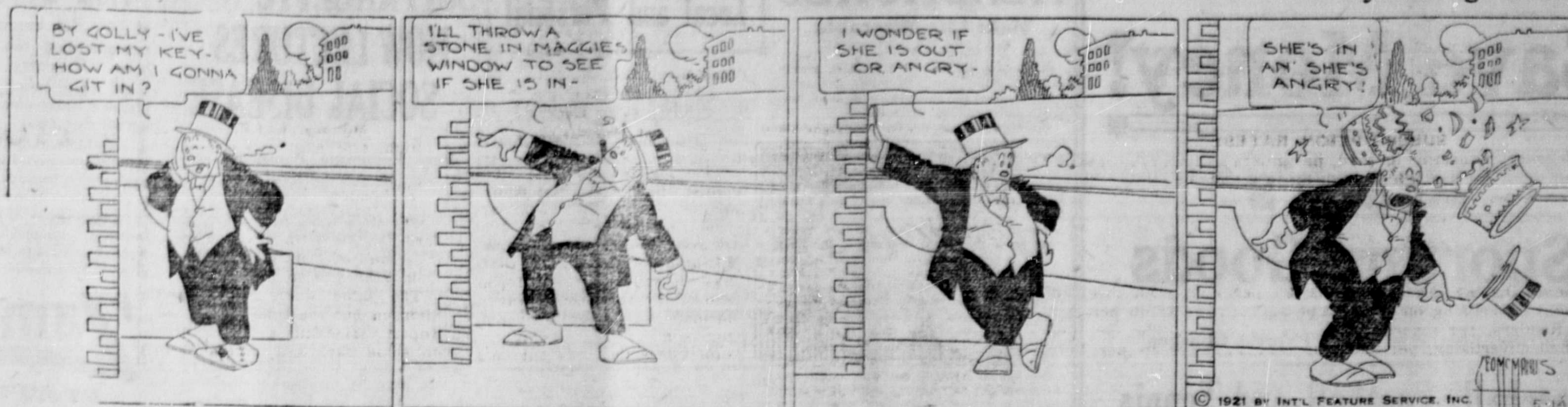

COOK ON MALASPINA FED UP ON HIS JOB

Brought into Police Court For Leaving Service Without Notice.

There was a somewhat novel case before Magistrate McMordie in the police court this morning, when the cook on the C. G. fishery protection cruiser Malaspina named McKinney appeared to answer a charge of refusing to go on duty.

This was the technical and official way of stating the fact that the gentleman in question was fed up, wanted to quit and did not care whether the crew had any dinner or not. The case occupied the entire morning, being finally adjourned till next Thursday for the decision of the magistrate.

From the evidence of Captain Newcombe in command of the Malaspina it appeared that the

whole matter hinged on the fact as to whether the accused had the power to leave the government service upon the giving of forty-eight hours' notice. The captain said he had not, but was under contract for a year. McKinney is out on bail and will not return to the ship, but will merely await the arrival of next Thursday, to learn whether he has to suffer duress, vile for his arbitrary decision to let the captain and crew of the good ship Malaspina go without the undoubted advantages of his skill and ability as a master of the culinary art. L. W. Palmer appeared for the defendant.

SELF-SACRIFICE AMONG LEPROUS OF INDIA

LONDON, May 21.—A story of heroic self-sacrifice and devotion has reached England from the leper village of Chhandag, India, where Mary Reed, a solitary white woman missionary, is giving her life to ministry to the suffering of her fellow lepers.

News of her isolated life was brought back by Mr. Oldrieve, organizing Secretary of the Mission to Lepers, who has just returned from a 70,000-mile journey, visiting all the leper colonies in India.

Thirty years ago Miss Reed went into this desolate spot in the Himalayas, 6,000 feet above the sea level, offering herself to the leper cause. Although a victim of the malady, she is still able to carry on her spiritual work among those afflicted like herself.

Miss Reed seldom sees white people for her station is eighty miles from the nearest railway line. There are 46 women lepers in the community and 49 men in the men's refuge a short distance away.

According to Mr. Oldrieve, there are 200,000 lepers in India. "At present," he declared, "it is not right to say that any cure for leprosy has been found."

NETWORK OF AERIAL TRANSPORTATION

LONDON, May 21.—Almost daily extension of passenger and mail service by air is rapidly making Europe a network of aerial transportation lines.

Negotiations are now nearing completion for an airway from Berlin via Riga to Moscow, and when this service is completed it will be possible to travel by air from London to Moscow, a distance of nearly 2,000 miles.

Berlin already is connected with London by the Dutch service through Amsterdam. This Dutch branch also has inaugurated service between Paris and Amsterdam.

The existing London-Paris service connects at Paris with the airway to Warsaw which goes by way of Strasbourg and Prague.

The Franco-Rumanian Air Service Co., which is responsible for this airway, has obtained concessions from the Austrian and Rumanian governments and hopes shortly to open an airway that will connect London through Paris to Constantinople.

MEXICO PROPOSES BIG EXPENDITURE BUILDING OF NAVY

MEXICO CITY, May 21.—A naval building program calling for an expenditure of a sum equivalent to \$100,000,000 spread over a period of ten years has been outlined by the Department of Army and Navy. It will be submitted to congress soon.

POSSIBLE TO CHANGE THE HUMAN SEXES

French Scientist Has Succeeded in Metamorphosing a Male Frog.

PARIS, May 20.—French scientists have just propounded a most extraordinary theory. They express belief, although it is not strong yet, that it would be possible soon to change sexes at will. That is, that any woman who yearns to be a man or any man who wishes to be a woman will be able to effect the change with comparatively little difficulty. M. Georges Charpy, a member of the Academy of Science, of the Institute of France has succeeded in metamorphosing a male frog into a female frog, according to a report made Tuesday to the Academy of Science. This truly remarkable change was made by starving the male frog and then nourishing it again. M. Charpy expressed belief that change of sex is possible with other animals, perhaps with human beings.

SPANKING IS SUBJECT OF LEGISLATION

Amendments to Criminal Code Brought Down in Bill Before Parliament

A number of amendments have been made to the criminal code at the present session of the Legislature, some defining more particularly the offences in regard to the possession of firearms or offensive weapons. In a good many of the offences the onus of proof is left with the accused and not with the crown. The following are among the provisions of the bill:

Stealing

"Every one who is found guilty of stealing any automobile or motor car shall be sentenced to not less than one year's imprisonment. The provisions of subsection one of section one thousand and thirty-five shall not apply or extend to any such person, and sentence in any such case shall not be suspended without the concurrence of the Attorney General or his agent, or of the counsel acting for the Crown in the prosecution of the offender."

Spanking

"Whenever spanking may be awarded for any offence the court may sentence the offender to be once, twice or three spanked within the limits of the prison, under the supervision of the medical officer of the prison, or if there be no such officer, or if the medical officer be for any reason unable to be present, then, under the supervision of a surgeon or physician to be named by the Minister of Justice in the case of prisons under the control of the Dominion, and in the case of other prisons by the attorney general of the province in which such prison is situated."

Cruelty to Animals

There are also special provisions against cruelty to animals, making this a criminal offence, and also against playing "three card monte."

Tables of fees in criminal cases and a new set of prescribed forms are included in the new act.

Montreal Is Enthusiastic About Big Boxing Classic

NEW YORK, May 21.—(By Canadian Press)—While the world championship heavyweight bout failed to go to Montreal, sportsmen at the Canadian city apparently are going to make up for it by coming to New York. That the sporting world of eastern Canada is intensely interested in the forthcoming championship struggle between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier at Jersey City on July 2 has been proved by the number of applications for tickets received at Madison Square Gardens. A few days after the sale opened receipts from Montreal, Toronto and other Canadian cities totalled \$5,000 and those in charge of the advance sale predict that, judging from the inquiries received, the amount will be increased well into five figures.

Among a number of well known Canadian sportsmen who will come to Jersey City is George Kennedy of Montreal. Other centres from which applications for seats have come are Toronto, Sherbrooke and Hamilton. United States business men in Canada are taking precautions against missing the fight and an application for a seat came from a New Yorker who was at Calgary when the sale opened.

Seats Selling Fast.

The total daily average sale for seats during the first week was \$30,000, and if the average is maintained all reserved accommodation will be sold three weeks before the date set for the fight. The sum of \$900,000 will be realized if all reserved accommodation is sold.

Due to the difference in exchange, Canadian sportsmen are paying a considerably greater amount for their tickets than are U. S. fight enthusiasts. The rate has been fluctuating between 10 and 11 per cent and as a result the best reserved seats, selling at \$50, will cost a Canadian in the neighborhood of \$55, Canadian money. Despite this the majority of reservations secured from across the border have been for the best seats. Considerable confusion has prevailed as a result of the exchange difference and, in some cases, delay has resulted in the securing of reservations.

From Old Country.

Tex Rickard, promoter of the contest, announced recently that he had received a cable to the effect that a party of ten sportsmen writers representing London and Paris dailies will arrive in New York early in June to keep an eye on the champions during the final training period. Rickard declares that he is also confident that the Prince of Wales will accept the invitation tendered him to be present at the scrap. The Prince according to information which Rickard says he has received from Great Britain, is displaying great interest in the fight arrangements.

Montreal on Job.

That Montreal sportsmen are

very much on the job despite the setback they received in their plans to have the fight staged in the Canadian city, was indicated recently when Tex Rickard received a letter from the syndicate which had previously made a bid for the fight. Word to the effect that a limit of \$15 might be placed on the price to be charged for fight tickets in New Jersey had reached Montreal and the syndicate officials immediately wired stating that their offer is still open. Rickard is confident that no difficulty will arise over the price to be charged for admission, and that arrangements will remain as they are at present.

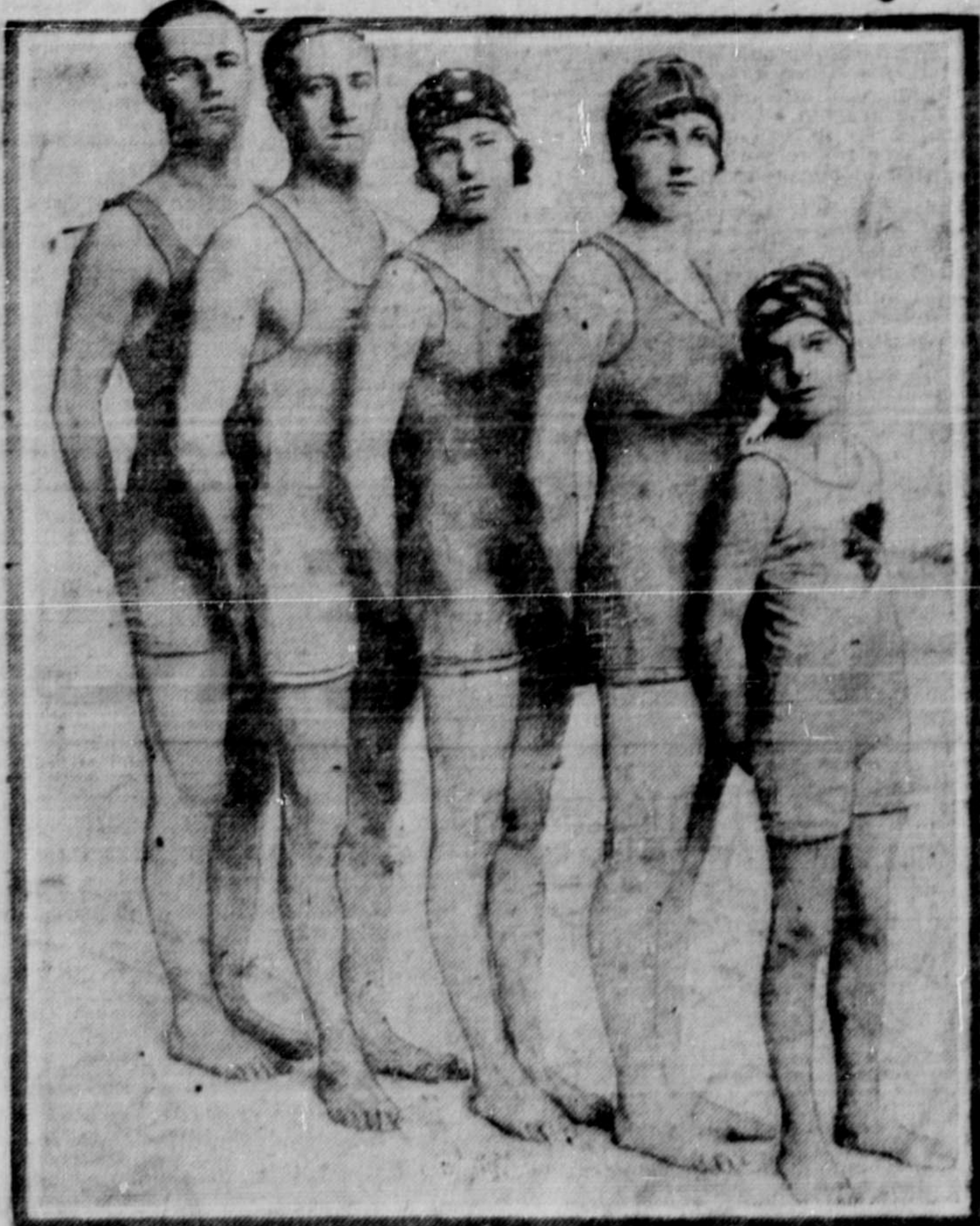

The play opened quietly, the Callies having the slope in their favor. They soon began to exert some pressure but to no avail. At the other end, Martin, the Callies' goalie, had to act quickly to stop some likely shots. Most of the play centered around mid-field with occasional bursts by the opposing forwards. From one of these attacks, Boote, receiving the ball in good position, beat Gorkle with a good shot and scored for the Callies. The Canucks' left wing continued to harass the Scots' defence and with a more enterprising centre, some of Lane's beautiful crosses might have been made to score. Willisroff and Kinghorn did effective work in the Callies' defence and the little get away from them. There was no further scoring during this half.

Good Goals.

The Sons of Canada opened in promising fashion in the second half and it was well for the Callies that Martin was playing at the top of his ability although he seemed to waste more time than was necessary at his goal kicks. Shakespeare, at the other end, after some nice combination on the left, met with similar luck after making one of the best shots of the game, Long missing a good scoring chance on the rebound. It certainly looked long odds on the Sons scoring and with the time flying interest became intense.

Goal in Time.

The attack of the Sons was consistent but score they could not. However, luck finally came their way and from a nicely placed corner—one of many—by Lane which just cleared the heads of a couple of Callie defenders, Long placed the ball in the net well out of Martin's reach, thus tying the game. Time was called about a minute afterwards and the game ended even which just about represented its value.

For the Sons, Gorkle was none too sure in goal, while the backs, opening poorly, played well in the second half. The halves played a good game throughout, while Lane and Shakespeare, on the forward line, were most effective. The former was always dangerous with his timely centres.

The Callies were best served by Martin, Willisroff, Kinghorn, Campbell, Wiggins, Boote and Sellars. Willisroff was the outstanding man of the side, being easily the best back on the field. Kinghorn also did a tremendous amount of work.

J. Day Bell was referee and A. Clapperton and Harry Fanthorpe, linesmen.

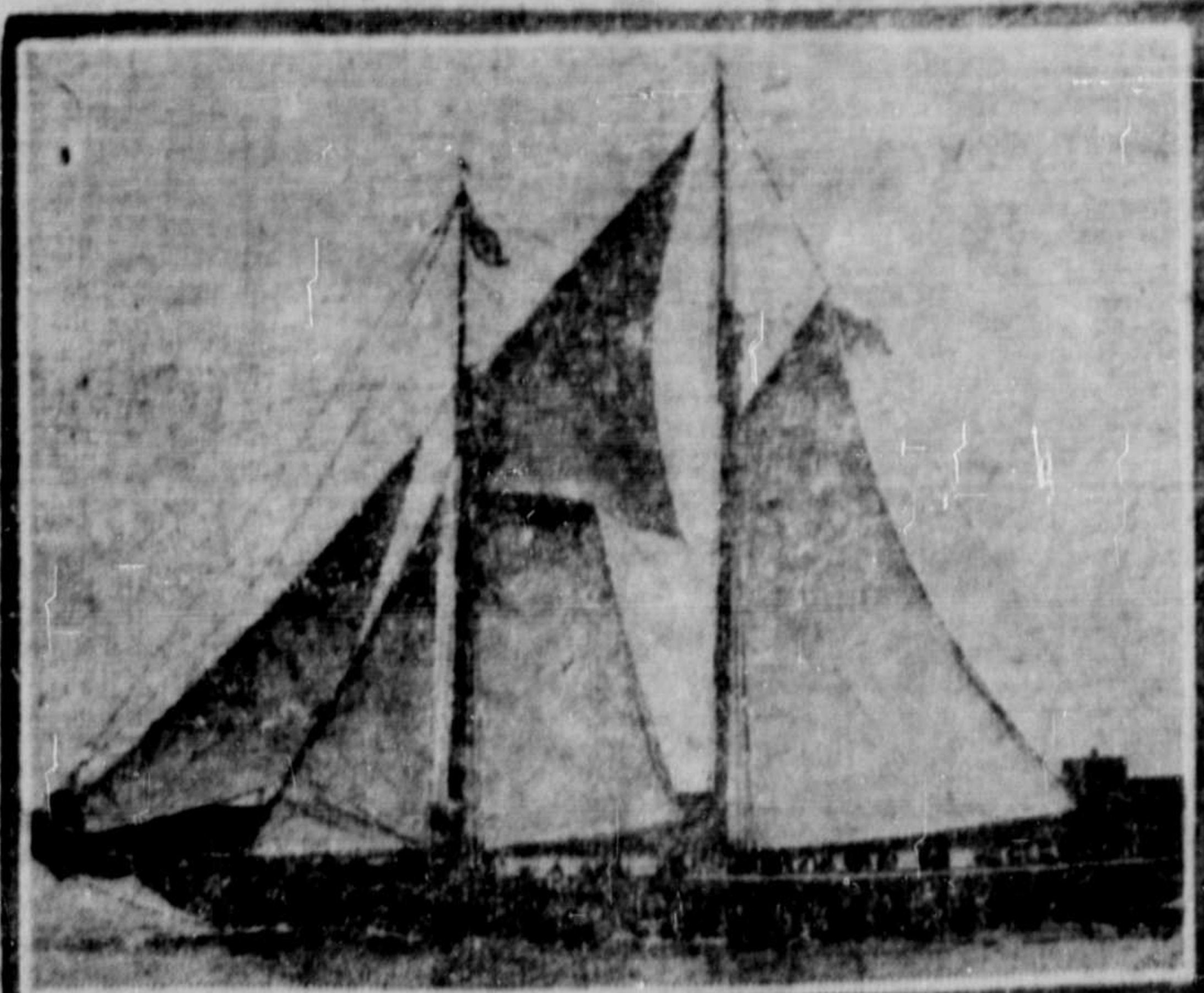

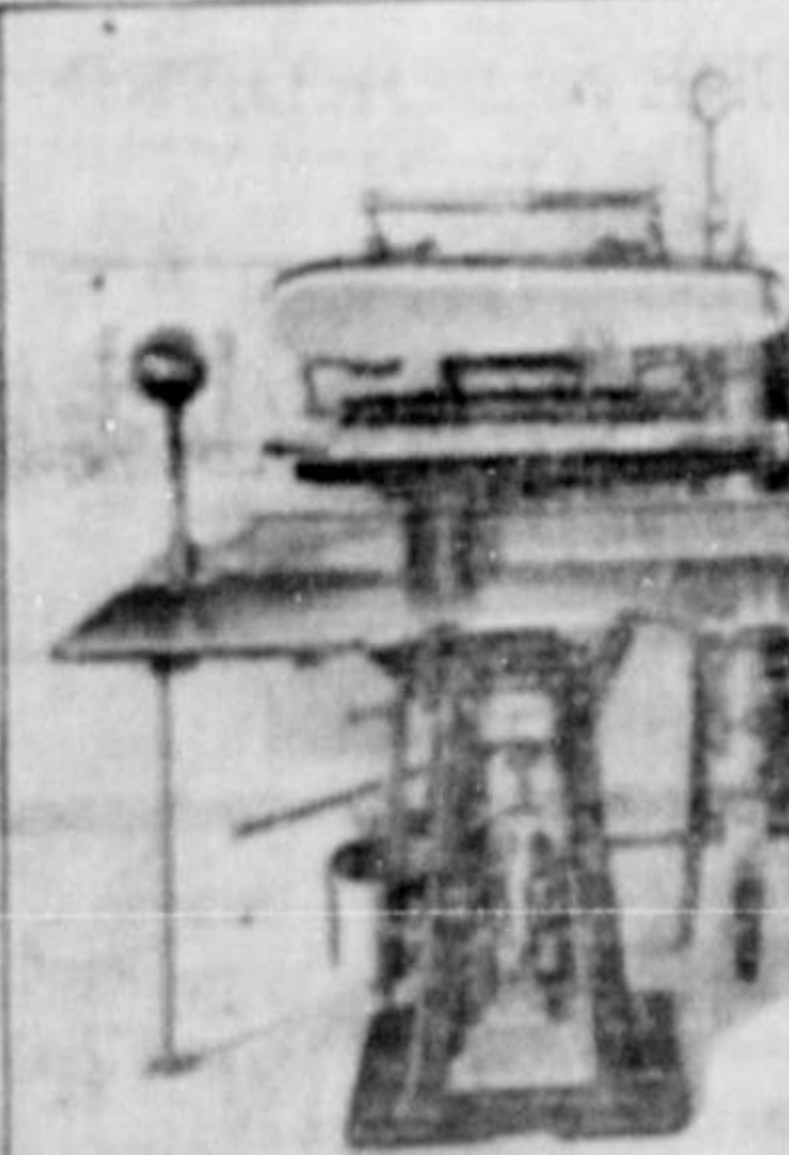

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre, second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to improved lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptor must occupy claim for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvement to value of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements valued at \$10 per acre, including 2 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 3 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emptor on the same land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homestead, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial site on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows (inaccessible by existing roads) may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers or sailors. Pre-emption recorded after June 18, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect remitted from installment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1918, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may apply for permits for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or vacationists to use land.

FRENCH LOSSES ON RAILWAYS

Large Deficits on All Lines of Business Handled by Government

PARIS, May 21.—Charges that the French government usually suffers a loss in its business ventures were made in recent debates in Parliament. It was asserted that the government's operation of the state railroad, post-office, telephone and telegraph lines, the gasoline monopoly and its sale of American and French supplies left over from the war, were all unbusinesslike and the cause of heavy balances on the wrong side of the ledger.

The State Railroad's estimated deficit for 1921 is given in the budget as the equivalent of \$59,450,000. "Every time the state railway received 100 francs," says the Senate Public Works Commission, "the taxpayer must take 57 francs out of its pocket to balance the railroad's accounts."

Operation of posts, telegraphs and telephones, calls, in the budget, for a deficit of about \$14,402,000.

Government trade in gasoline—a monopoly held over from the war—was said in the Chamber, has been costing the state \$1,123,000 monthly. The government has in hand, eight months' supply, bought on a higher market and worth now on the world's market, according to oil experts, about \$450,000,000 less than it cost.

Twenty thousand employees of the posts, telegraphs and telephones, according to a Senate commission's report, were ordered discharged after the war, at the insistent suggestion of parliament, in order to give their old places to war veterans. The government, the report continues, gave them from 400 to 600 francs each, when discharging them as temporary employees and then, according to an imaginative conversation recorded in the Senate by Senator Pellissier, the government said to the employees:

"What would you say if we were to keep you, beginning tomorrow, as substitute workers. You will get the same wages. Do you accept?"

"Yes," replied the discharged employee, "but must we give back the bonus?"

"Oh, no," answered the government, "that would not be generous. You have the bonus. Keep it. You are discharged, but remain with us."
