SHIP CONSTRUCTION UNDER WAY IN TWO WEEKS

MUNICIPAL POLICIES WERE DISCUSSED AT NICKERSON RALLY LAST NIGHT

Work for Everybody at the Shipyards Here Very Soon

H. A. Wallace says Construction should be again Under Way in about Two Weeks and then it will Hum

"Every man in Prince Rupert who wants a job will be able to get one when work starts up," said H. A. Wallace yesterday before going south. There should be plenty of work for everybody. I cannot say exactly how many will be employed, but we shall push the work ahead as fast as possible."

Mr. Wallace was then asked how soon he expected to have the work under way. He replied that in two weeks the sound of hammers should be heard at the shipyard. There were a few little things to be cleared up and put in order before a start was made, but two weeks from now should see everything ready and the work, if not in full swing, at least going ahead.

Mr. Wallace was rather reticent in regard to his plans. He told some of the Prince Rupert people, however, that one of the ships was about half completed and the other not more than 25 per cent complete. This means that there is an immense lot of work yet to be done and that it will last for some time.

Naturally Mr. Wallace was not in a position to say anything about the repair work, for it is impossible to tell beforehand what is likely to be done. Mr. Wallace is not likely to miss an opportunity to make money out of the dry dock, however, if there is a chance to do so. He is a practical ship-builder and Prince Rupert people will be only too glad to cooperate with him and will wish him every success.

Arrangements have been made with the local employment bureau for supplying the needs of the yard and before leaving Mr. Wallace told the agent that while a few men would be required within the next week or two it would be the first of February before the plant would be in full swing.

NEW PROCESS OF SMELTING

Efficiency and Speed Secured in Treating Coast Magnetite Ores

VICTORIA, Jan. 7.—Investigations into a new electrified process of smelting magnetite, iron in British Columbia are being conducted by the department of industries. It is declared that a successful furnace has been evolved that has reached high efficiency and speed in handling the magnetite ores of the coast.

Recently the president of the Canadian Collieries, in discussing the establishment of a smelter on the coast, made the statement that it was no longer necessary to use limonite or hematite in the smelting of magnetite, but that a new process of handling the coast ores had been discovered. The news given out by the department of industries here seems to bear out that contention.

TAKING OVER HIGH OFFICE

Lieut.-Gov. Nichol in Office Today Receiving Official Visitors.

VICTORIA, Jan. 7.—Hon. W. C. Nichol, the new lieutenant-governor, made his first entry into Victoria yesterday afternoon in his new position. He was met by the official secretary and taken to Government House.

Today he takes over his office in the Parliament Buildings and will receive General Ross, commanding Military District 11, Premier Oliver and the cabinet ministers.

Hon. Jan Hwo of the Teu Lee Co. is leaving next month on an extended tour of the Orient and will visit Japanese cities, Shanghai, Hongkong, Canton and other places. While there he will act as commercial agent for his firm, making shipments to this country of Oriental goods. He expects to be away a year or two.

POLICE REPORT FOR DECEMBER

Forty-two Convictions in Police Court With \$2,129.50 Collected in Fines.

The report of the chief of police submitted to the police commission at its meeting this morning showed that 44 cases were handled in the police court for the month and 42 convictions were made with \$2,129.50 collected in fines. Of this total \$150 goes to the Dominion police in connection with fines secured under the Indian Act.

For the month there were 25 cases of drunkenness, 3 breaches of the Prohibition Act, 2 cases of concealed weapons, 3 cases of vagrancy and two cases under the Indian Act. Coal and bread weights were found correct.

The inspection of the bars by the constables was found satisfactory except in the cases of the Empress Annex and the Royal bars. In the latter place Constable McGlinchy reported a fight. The police payroll for the month was \$1,629.86 with ten men on the force.

COMMERCIAL CLASS HERE

School Board Favors Starting it in Connection with High School

The School Board at its regular meeting held last evening decided to recommend to the incoming board the establishment of commercial classes at the High School.

The matter was brought up by Principal J. C. Brady, of the High School, who appeared at the meeting and explained the question at length, urging the starting of classes. Children are handicapped in Prince Rupert by the distance from larger centers where classes are already established and it was advised that the classes be opened here, so that training for business life may be readily given.

The course given under the Council of Public Instruction takes three years and adding it to the curriculum of High School work will necessitate another teacher here. The new board is to be asked to provide for it in the estimates.

BANK IN ENGLAND SUSPENDS PAYMENT

British American Bank Advanced Money on Produce on which it is Unable to Realize

LONDON, Jan. 7.—The British American Bank has suspended payment, the cause being attributed to the general financial situation. It is believed that the bank has advanced money on produce, mainly from Canada, on which it is unable to realize during the present trade stagnation.

Charles O. Oliver Makes Move Toward Peace River

Opens Negotiations with Province of Alberta with view to giving Railway Service to Interior

VICTORIA, January 7.—Negotiations with a view to co-operation between the provinces of British Columbia and Alberta in extending the line of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway to the Peace River section have been opened by Premier Oliver. He has written to Premier Stewart in this regard.

The purpose of the extension is to provide a rail outlet for settlers' products on the British Columbia side of the interprovincial boundary. Steel is already laid to within fifty miles of the boundary and Premier Oliver hopes that the intervening section, which is already graded, may be completed and the line carried down to the Peace River country.

Nickerson Rally Proves Effective

Hits Base Rumor a Clout using Glove of Truth to Silence his Traducers

"If elected I will see that the laws are enforced," said G. W. Nickerson at the rally in his support at the committee rooms last night. "I have been looked upon somewhat as a temperance man. No one has any right to think that anyone will receive any consideration from me beyond what the law allows."

There were over fifty people out at the meeting and M. P. McCaffery was voted to the chair. Every one seemed enthusiastic for the candidate and many expressed their desire to have him elected.

Called upon to address the meeting Mr. Nickerson said he wanted no one to try to elect him by belittling his opponent. If he could not win on his record he did not want to be elected.

While he did not believe in contradicting rumors, Mr. Nickerson said it had been whispered that the blind piggers were behind him. Personally he was not aware who the blind piggers were. He had been waited on by a delegation of hotel men who wanted to know if he was for an open or closed town. He told them that if he were elected the laws would have to be lived up to, and he assured the gathering that the laws would be enforced.

As an agent Mr. Nickerson said he had consistently refused to handle liquor, but after the prohibition law was passed he had been agent for a brand of two and a half per cent beer. He had written this firm many times telling them not to ship him intoxicating beer and during the past year he had not handled much of their product. Everything he had done was done openly.

Another report he wished to contradict was one to the effect that if elected he would fire everybody around the city hall and give jobs to his friends. He wished to tell them he was going to the city hall with an open mind. He had nothing against anyone.

No Strike Breaker.
There was a report being circulated that he had tried to break the strike last year. During the onshoremen's strike he had under his charge here a scow load of lumber. To get this unloaded he offered to pay the rate of wages demanded but could get no one to do the work. He had then advertised in the newspapers for men at that rate.

Mr. Nickerson said there was one thing he had omitted from his manifesto. At the present time there was a man doing business on the waterfront who was being turned out of his location and who wanted a temporary lease from the railway company. In cases like this he would certainly try to use his influence as mayor with the railway company to try to secure temporary locations on the waterfront for those so desiring them.

Interested in Fishing.
He had been told he was trying to drive the fishermen to Port Edward. The men who said that were only interested in making political capital whereas he was personally interested in the fishing business. He had an interest (Continued on Page 5.)

DENIES RUMOR OF BIG DEAL

H. S. Munro, General Manager of Granby Co., Says Sale to C.P.R. is False Report.

DESPITE REDUCTIONS OUTPUT LARGE AS EVER

"No examination of the plant at Anox has been made by Canadian Pacific Railway interests and the report that it is to take over the properties of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company is unfounded," stated H. S. Munro, general manager of the Granby Co., who was in the city last night southbound on the Prince George. Mr. Munro is on his way to a meeting of Granby directors at New York and will not be back north till about February 1. He will catch a fast train east immediately upon his arrival in Vancouver on Saturday.

Speaking of operations at Anox, Mr. Munro stated that everything is running very smoothly under the new reduced wage scale and the company did not lose a single man as a result of the reduction. Prior to the cut the number of employees was reduced from 1,300 to 1,050, but in spite of this there is a larger production of copper at Anox than there was before the staff was reduced. This also in spite of the fact that less coke is being used. The copper market is slightly improved now and Mr. Munro expects no change in the policy of the company. The conduct of operations will remain as they are at the present time.

MARTYN IS BACK AGAIN

Reappointed Deputy Minister of Industries in Provincial Government.

VICTORIA, Jan. 7.—Major Don B. Martyn, who resigned to run in Dewdney for the provincial election, has been reappointed deputy minister of industries.

STRIKE TIES UP AUSTRALIAN SHIPS

MELBOURNE, Jan. 7.—Sixty-two vessels, aggregating 200,000 tons, are idle here in consequence of a deadlock in a dispute concerning working hours between the marine stewards and the owners.

Impossible to Know Condition of Affairs.

From the statement issued by the official receiver it is impossible to tell exactly the financial condition of the drydock company and what may be expected for the creditors. Just what stand the Dominion Government will take in regard to it is not very clear. What seems certain is that there will be a very substantial loss. Perhaps when the receiver has made his promised trip to Ottawa he may be in a better position to say what will be done, and what the prospects for payment of the outstanding accounts are.

Good Meeting. For Nickerson.

There was a large and enthusiastic rally in support of the candidature of George Nickerson at the committee rooms last night. Among those present were a number of fishermen and boat owners, all of whom are interested in the waterfront development schemes. Mr. Nickerson was frank in his statements and as a result of the meeting he certainly has gained strength. He effectively disposed of many of the rumors set afoot for the purpose of defeating him. One of his supporters emphasized that Mr. Nickerson would have no selfish interests to serve and that he would go to the new duties with an open mind and without bias.

Orme's Retirement Is Regretted.

General regret was expressed last evening and this morning when it was learned through the medium of the Daily News that C. H. Orme was unable to qualify as a candidate for alderman. It was generally expected that he would lead the polls and his enforced retirement from the field is a loss to the community. Next year, however, he will be ready, it is to be hoped.

Good Weather Here Compared With Outside.

In Prince Rupert there have been stormy days such as are experienced everywhere. Compared with other places, however, there has been a good season so far. Recent visitors to the south complain bitterly of the treatment accorded them by the weather man and have welcomed their return to the more northerly clime where Boreas, Jupiter Pluvius and the other weather gods are moderate in their demands on the attention of the people.

Price Decline Discussed by Bank.

Discussing the price decline, the monthly letter of the Royal Bank says:

"The Canadian official record shows that the increase of wholesale prices reached in May of 1920 over the average prices of the year 1913 was 163 per cent, and that, as between the figures for May and December, a decline of almost fifteen per cent, was recorded. The decline was especially noticeable in the prices for grains, fresh vegetables, breadstuffs, tea, coffee and sugar; certain items in the textile group—cotton, silks, jutes, etc., also show declines.

"Results of a more advanced character are shown in Bradstreet's table of United States prices. The period from February to May, 1920, marks a decline of 10 per cent, while the period from February to 1st December, 1920, indicates a decrease of no less than 35 per cent. British prices are down 16 per cent; the decrease in French prices amounts to 13.9 per cent.

"Here and there are found people who cannot believe that the old levels are definitely gone, and who expect higher prices in the future. The better opinions are against this view. Only war could make demand outrun supply to the extent that it has in the last few years. Disregarding minor fluctuations, there are few commodities whose sale can be deferred to advantage. Those who have a market for their goods, but will not sell, are in most cases showing doubtful business judgment."

NICKERSON RALLY PROVES EFFECTIVE

in three boats and, looking at it from the fisherman's point of view, he believed the outside of Cow Bay was of more interest to them than the inside. He had helped to get the floats built where they were today. He had stayed with the proposition until it was completed.

The candidate said no great port could be built up on one industry. The fishing industry was of great importance but they should also encourage the whole-sale houses. These should be on the car tracks in order to save the cost of handling and make it possible to compete with Vancouver. His proposal was to get a piece of waterfrontage for the city and try to get the provincial government to construct floats on their property at Cow Bay. He would like to see the fishing industry centred at Cow Bay and was not in favor of filling the bay unless the other improvements went through. There should be a hard and fast contract.

Seal Cove.

The harbor here was not a place to tie up in for the winter, said Mr. Nickerson, but only for temporary purposes. The place to tie for the winter was at Seal Cove. Many boats were there now. Of course if Colonel Peck could get the bay dredged he was willing to agree to it, but he did not believe there were any plans prepared and did not think the government would make the necessary expenditure.

Speaking on the matter of salary, Mr. Nickerson said he did not think he was bound to work for less than he was worth. If the city did not pay him \$3,000 a year, however, he would not take it from any other source.

Whiskey Running.

In regard to whiskey running to Alaska, something that had been mentioned, the candidate said Ald. Rochester had been on the council and had also been acting mayor for a month and was chairman at the time when ex-Constable Duff had been whitewashed, yet he had heard of no efforts to stop the traffic.

Short addresses were given by W. O. Fulton, George Frizzell, Capt. Formby, J. F. Maguire, Geo. Weddell and the chairman, all of whom expressed confidence that Mr. Nickerson would be elected. Committees were then chosen and the meeting adjourned.

APPEALING FOR AID STARVING CHINESE

Local Campaign will be Conducted in Conjunction with Rest of Canada

The Canadian Foreign Mission Boards of the various churches are sending out an urgent appeal to the people of Canada for monetary contributions to a fund to relieve the terrible famine situation now existing in North China and local persons already have the matter in hand.

The appeal was not launched until a thorough investigation of affairs was made and now it is found that, owing to the failure of rain for twelve months in China, from thirty to fifty millions in the northern provinces are facing starvation. Terrible distress prevails, thousands have died and hundreds are dying daily.

Recent rains have made possible the sowing of the fields, but awful agony will prevail if immediate relief on a large scale is not forthcoming. Aid is now being given by other countries and an energetic campaign is about to be launched here.

Officials of the B. C. PLANNING TO FORM PARTY

Vancouver World says Independents will Hold General Convention

There will be a convention in Vancouver shortly of all the independent members-elect of the British Columbia legislature, says the Vancouver World. Candidates who were defeated are also being asked to attend this convention as well as all the supporters of the independent stand. The exact date of the convention has not yet been decided upon.

It is felt that had a definite policy been agreed upon and placed before the electorate at the last election and some sort of organization been arranged the independents would have been a much more powerful, if not decisive factor.

A meeting of the Vancouver candidates, Dr. McIntosh and Messrs. Martin, Ashworth, Gotsworth and Major Thomas is likely to be held shortly to formulate plans. It is stated that a meeting of a similar character has already been held at Prince Rupert.

"It simply means that we must organize," remarked Dr. McIntosh to The World. "The people are sick and tired of the old parties. They are both tarred with the same stick, and a clean organization with a constructive platform would carry the country against the present bunch of professional politicians, with barrels of money."

PRAIRIE PROVINCES DRY FEBRUARY 1

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 7.—(Canadian Press).—The provinces of Nova Scotia, Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan will go bone dry on February 1. This, it is understood, is the actual date set, although the official proclamation will probably not be issued for a day or two.

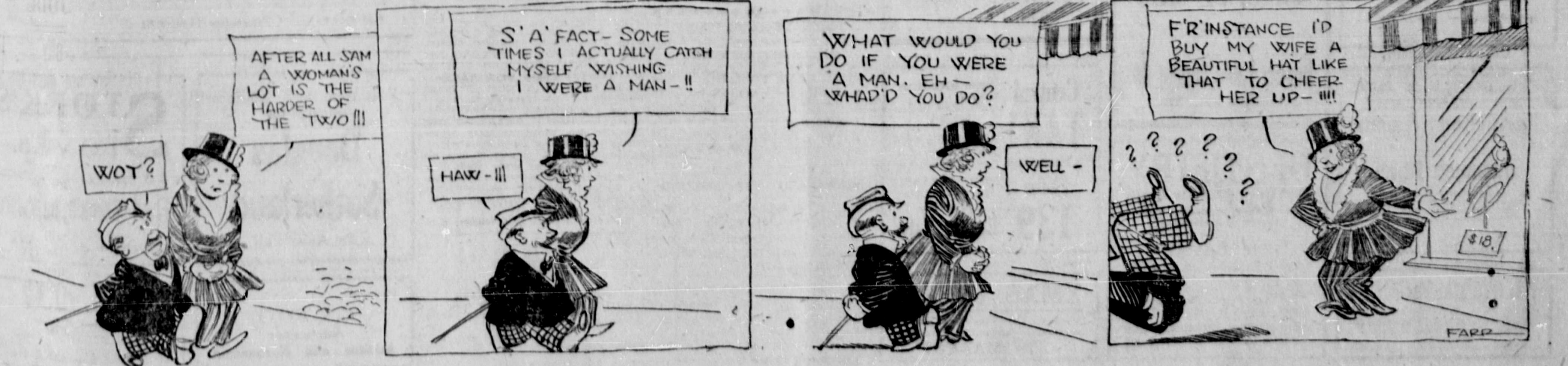
