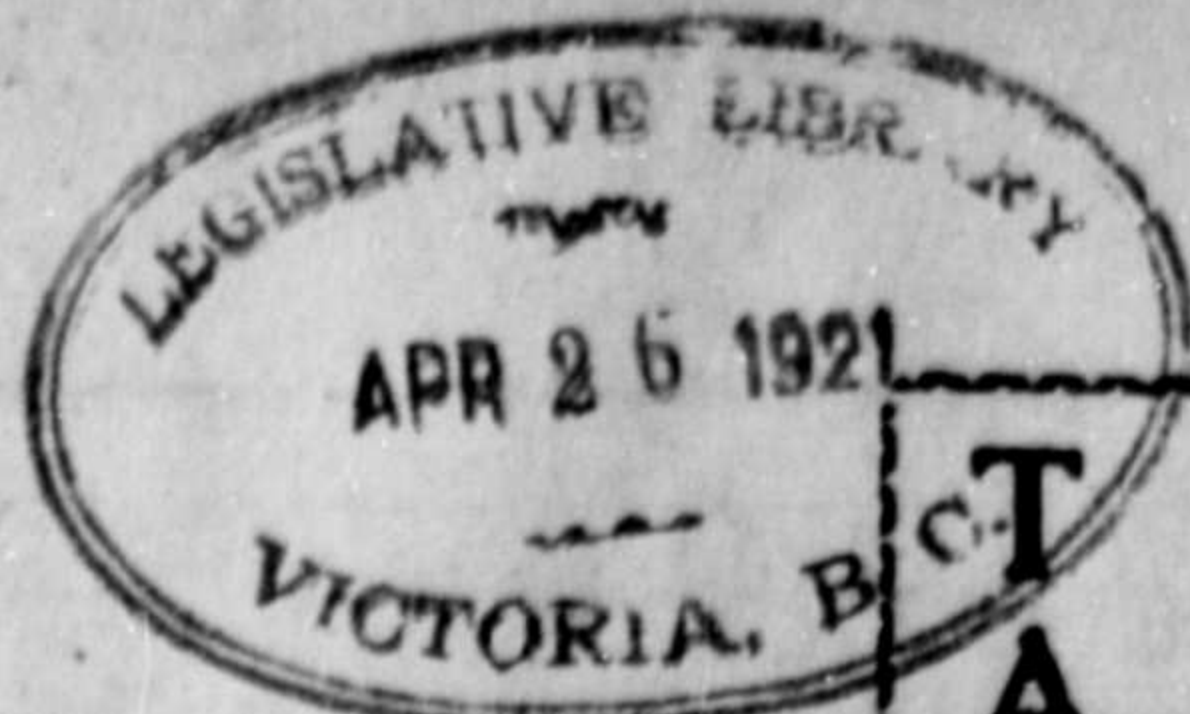

ANYOX SETTLEMENT COAL STRIKE IS YET IN SIGHT ANYOX NOW THOROUGHLY ORGANIZED FOR SUMMER SPORTS AND GAMES

Miners' Federation Declares No Settlement Possible under Lloyd George's Proposals

April 19.—Demands for establishment of a national pool has been re-affirmed by a large majority by the committee of the throughout the country, by the Herald, the newspaper.

The statement made by the Miners' Federation declares that Lloyd George's address in the House of Commons on Monday did not carry with it the possibility of a settlement of the questions at issue between the miners and the colliery owners.

THE BIG STRIKE WAS CALLED OFF

Parliamentary Committee Down Opposition to Negotiations.

April 20.—According to special despatches received from London, it was at the private residence of the Prime Minister that the strike in England which will settle the coal strike, possibly this week, was called off under its own name under J. H. D. transport workers and general strike, while the miners were led by Frank. Everything was ready for the strike to come off on Monday night and there were many among the men who saw in this attempt yet a possible settlement of the Government, the very least the result of Lloyd George and the formation of a constitutional government.

At this time a group of Parliament met at the miners and at the owners and by means of questions got to the bottom of the trouble and explained that further negotiations would be tried before the strike was called. The revolutionaries became cause of a crisis. In the end it had the opposite effect. The sympathetic strike was called off and the miners were to further consult the union leaders and this takes place on Friday. The meantime every effort is being made to try to find a satisfactory solution so that work may proceed. The strike of the movement is still and it remains to work out the terms of the settlement.

VICE REG'L PARTY VISITS VICTORIA

Duke of Devonshire Unveils Queen
Victoria Monument and
Tablets to Fallen
Heroes.

VICTORIA, April 20.—The Duke of Devonshire today unveiled the large Queen Victoria statue that will adorn the grounds in front of the Government Buildings. Two tablets were also unveiled under the dome of the Parliament Buildings, one in honor of the men of the 50th Gordon Highlanders who fell in the war and the other for the men of the 88th Canadian Fusiliers, a Victoria regiment.

The vice reg'al party was welcomed to the capital by Chief Justice Macdonald, administrator of the province during the illness of Lieutenant-Governor W. C. Nichol. Premier Oliver and Mayor Porter also took part in the welcoming functions.

MONTREAL, April 20.—The Church of the Nativity of this city has been destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at approximately \$800,000.

Lloyd George Defends Policy of British in Dealing with Ireland

LONDON, April 20.—In discussing the question of Home Rule, Lloyd George said "The Government of which I am head will never give way upon the fundamental question of secession."

The Premier defended the creation of auxiliary forces in Ireland, saying that "steps must be taken to protect the police and bring to justice those invoking the weapon of assassination."

CONTRACT TO LOCAL FIRM

Albert & McCaffery Successful Tenderers on Court House.

VANCOUVER, April 20.—It is definitely announced here that Albert & McCaffery of Prince Rupert have been awarded the contract for the construction of the Court House at Prince Rupert, their bid being slightly more than \$380,000. This was given out by Government Engineer P. Phillip who added that the Government was fully justified in awaiting the fall in prices.

ANYOX CHEERIO CLUB HAS SUCCESSFUL SALE

Sum of \$80 Raised in Social Affair
At Union Church.

ANYOX, April 20.—The girls' Cheerio Club of the Union Church held a very successful sale of home cooking and candy in the church on Friday afternoon. Tea was served and a large number of citizens attended.

The affair was continued in the evening in the form of a social, and a splendid program by local talent was rendered and refreshments served. The sum of \$80 was realized to be applied to the general funds of the church.

FEATHERSTONHAUGH MADE INSPECTION TRIP ALONG LINE

Has Nothing Definite on Station
or Wharf, but Expects Plans
will Go Through

W. S. Featherstonhaugh, C.N.R. district engineer, returned to town this morning after a trip of inspection along the line which did not take him East of Edson.

Regarding the new station, Mr. Featherstonhaugh had nothing definite to give out, but was inclined to discount the report that the plans for a brick structure had been abandoned. A wooden station, said Mr. Featherstonhaugh, would not be in the interests of economy.

The ocean dock substructure will be completed by the end of May and Mr. Featherstonhaugh expects that the company will soon be calling for tenders for the construction of the superstructure with a view to getting the work along as far as possible this season.

Anyox is Organized For Season's Sport Would Meet Rupert

ANYOX, B. C., April 20.—The sport outlook here this year is brighter than it has ever been in this town before. The Community League has been reorganized and has taken a new lease of life with Fred Brown as temporary secretary. Mr. Brown was formerly of Victoria and was prominent in all lines of sport in that city. Through his efforts here the Community League is taking charge of all the games and sports in town for the season. Football, baseball and tennis clubs have been organized; the ball grounds are being improved and rearranged and a bleachers' stand is being built to accommodate 200 spectators. The membership of the Community League has doubled in the two weeks Mr. Brown has been in charge.

Both the baseball and football teams are anxious for Prince Rupert to come here to play return games for those played last year during the time of the fair. They say they think it is the turn of the Prince Rupert boys to come here early in the season. They have good teams and would like to take a fall out of their old rivals.

The tennis club is going strong with two courts at the beach and one at the mine. Plans are under way for the construction of a new court near the smelter. The gun club had its first shoot on the range last Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Munroe take a special interest in this club and both are good shots.

A quail club has been organized and the members are ready to play exchange matches with Prince Rupert.

Get Away From Isolated Position.

One of the drawbacks to life in northern towns and camps has always been the isolation from other communities. The distances are great and costs of transportation heavy. It is difficult to overcome this.

The railway has made a very good commencement by establishing cheap week-end rates to and from Terrace. Possibly similar round trip rates on the boats between Anyox and Prince Rupert might also be advantageous. Not only cheap rates for Prince Rupert people but also for Anyox people. This would benefit Alice Arm as well.

Anyox football and baseball teams are asking that Prince Rupert visit that camp in the near future. This is all along right lines. Intercommunication is for the benefit of all, and it would be a good thing to establish a northern community spirit by which we should all take pride in each other's achievements and at the same time be keen on winning in local contests.

What Do You Think Of Future of the North?

The question is often asked what do we think of the future of the north country. Is the development of a permanent character? Will the city of Prince Rupert grow steadily and develop eventually into a large commercial and shipping centre? Our answer is that we believe the north will eventually control the south. Northern nations are the powerful nations. The best wheat is grown in the fields of the far north for it is hard and full of nutriment. So the best people are developed in the north. The tang in the air keeps everyone on edge all the time and this makes for development.

It would be foolish just now to mention the matter of resources. So much has been written and said of the resources of the north that repetition is tiring. It is well, however, to keep in mind all the time that our mines are just touched, there is plenty of timber especially suited for pulp and paper manufacture, and the fishing business has yet scarcely commenced. As the halibut supply is reduced we shall devote our time to catching other varieties. Then there are the agricultural possibilities of the north which are beyond the imagination of most of us.

There is no doubt but we have plenty of justification for our faith in the north and in the future of Prince Rupert and the other towns on the coast and in the interior. Development has scarcely commenced. The next ten years will see immensely accelerated growth everywhere and there will be towns in the future at points which are today inaccessible.

Drydock Creditors All Are Pleased.

The creditors of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co. must be pleased to hear that they are to get at least a large part of their money. The holding back of close to half a million dollars has had a serious effect in this city. It has tended to injure our credit abroad and has made local concerns anxious. Now an assurance has been received that a settlement is to be made, although so far the terms of settlement have not been announced.

The creditors will be glad to give credit to all those who have worked to secure this settlement, even though it ought not to be necessary to use pressure to secure from the Government of the country that which is just and right.

GOLD FLOWING INTO THE UNITED STATES

Great Britain Ships Largest Amount, but France Comes Second

NEW YORK, April 20.—Gold appears to be flowing into the United States from all quarters of the world, especially Europe. Since the beginning of the year net imports are calculated at about \$150,000,000, and bankers expect a continuation of the movement, scarcely a day passes without the arrival of some shipment.

According to the Federal Reserve Board's figures \$28,795,000 was imported in the ten days ended March 20 and \$133,000,000 between January 1 and March 30. Against this there was an outflow of only \$1,319,000 in the longer period and \$338,900 in the shorter.

Since March 20 shipments of over \$22,000,000 have been reported as en route and arrived. Thus the total imports since January are over \$155,000,000. The bulk of the shipments are from Great Britain, but France makes a close second. The board's figures give \$13,588,000 as from London between Jan. 1 and March 20 and \$37,060,000 as from Paris. Since March 20 reports indicate a further \$9,433,000 from London and a further \$7,000,000 from Paris.

By continental divisions Europe accounts to date for nearly \$112,000,000, North America for \$11,690,000, including \$10,000,000 from Canada, South America for \$5,300,000 and Asia for nearly \$22,000,000.

NAZIMOVA IS HERE TONIGHT IN "BILLIONS"

Great Actress Stars in Play Dealing With Wealthy People at Westholme.

The great Nazimova in "Billions," her latest photoplay, is announced as the next big feature attraction at the Westholme Theatre tonight. Advance reports credit this as being the most fascinating screen drama that the incomparable Nazimova has ever appeared in.

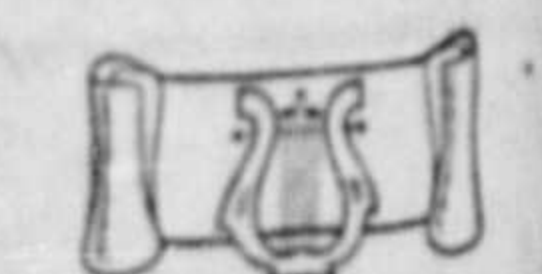

GAMBLING AND OPIUM OPPOSED

Members of Chinese Nationalist
League at Prince George
Taboo Drug

**RIVALS INTERVIEWED
PRINCE GEORGE PAPER**

In spite of a painstaking effort
to gather a comprehensive idea
of the underlying influences
which caused the opposing fac-
tions of Chinese to meet in a
lively long war just off Third
Avenue last Friday, the results of
which have placed about twelve
Chinamen in the local jail and
another in hospital with a bullet
through his leg, the Citizen is able
to gather only a sketchy idea of
the casual belli, says the Prince
George Citizen.

After interviewing prominent
members of the Chinese Nation-
alist League, which is involved
with the Chee Kong Tong in this
feud, it appears that the fol-
lowers of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, but
recently re-elected as president
of China, are against opium and
gambling, which this organiza-
tion alleges are carried on and
encouraged by the Chee Kong
crowd. There is not one man, a
member of the Nationalist league,
according to a member of that
organization, who gambles or
smokes opium. Such practices
are strictly taboo, and to indulge
in them means expulsion, said
our informant.

Band of Pilgrims

There are about 400 Chinese in
this city, according to the esti-
mate of the Nationalists, and of
these there are but 70 members
of the league. They raise the
question as to the preponderance
against them in any possible
offensive and ask whether it is
likely that this little band of pil-
grims would "start anything"
with a long mustering 250
members to grab up a bundle
stick for the cause at any time
day or night.

That a member of the Nation-
alists is acting as interpreter in
the court seems to be a sore point,
according to the information
secured from that party. The
base suggestion has been made
that he favors his interpretations
with a tinge of Nationalism, and
this statement, given by the
Nationalists themselves, is a
cause for virtuous indignation.

Import Tough Guys

That the Chee Kong Tong are
importing "tough guys" from
Vancouver is a charge made by
the Nationalists, who appear to
be a little uneasy on the score of
these mercenaries. They are not
of the kind who seek to go down
of glory, but beat up the little
fellows as occasion offers. In
the melee on Friday the court
interpreter, a small, peaceful
looking individual, was badly
beaten up and he lost his gold-
rimmed glasses into the bargain.

The Tong's Grievance

Down in Chinatown, whither a
Citizen reporter went to interview
the Chee Kong Tong, the scene
was typically Oriental. In the
lodge room of the tong an ornate
altar stands. Before this the
members take their oaths and
murmur their prayers to the great
god, whose image is presented.
With perfect seriousness a
Chinaman related how the pres-
ence of any person present at
their rites was immediately de-
tected by the guttering of the
candles which flank their deity if
he were an enemy.

Beside Altar

Down there, in a little room
beside the altar, were related the
grievances of the great Chee
Kong Tong. The preamble was
that all of the assault cases
had come about by the ill feeling
which exists between the tong and
the league. This came to a head
when the Nationalists recently
secured the quashing of a con-
viction against members of the
Nationalists who beat up a Tong
man. The matter of patronizing
the Japanese was involved and a
letter was shown the Citizen re-
porter from the Chinese consul in
Vancouver which stated that there
was no boycott against Japanese
goods, but that a movement was
on foot to help the exploitation of
"made in China" merchandise.

Grossly Insulted.

That a member of their long
has been grossly insulted by the
Nationalists was related during
the interview. The Chinese have
a neat way of doing these things.
This is by the posting of "labels"
which are about the size of a
sheet of notepaper. One of these

labels was produced and read.
It was very libellous. Referring
to the Chinaman attacked, it said
in part: "Look at his appear-
ance! He has a head like an
orange and the same color! His
mouth is white like the rice! He
must be a mountain monkey!"
and many other choice insults.
This was signed in a manner
which thinly disguised the name
of the writer. It is only one of
many such labels which have
been posted to hurt members of
the tong.

Their Politics.

The Nationalists are ardent
supporters of Dr. Sun Yat Sen,
who is president of the league.
The Chee Kong Tong states that
the doctor used to be a mem-
ber of their order. They are not
in any way against him, but are
only against the Manchurian,
whose yoke was thrown off ten
years ago.

In the cases which are before
the court rising out of the long
war of Friday last, both sides
are mustering an array of friends
and advisors from outside points.
They are very much in earnest,
but it all appears very trivial
until the trouble ends in revolver
shots, as it did on Friday of last
week.
