## New B.C. Liquor Act is Complicated PROPERTY ASSESSMENT IS REDUCED BY \$1,822,744 FROM THE ORIGINAL DRAFT

### Moderation Bill Introduced Into House by Government

Forms Strictly to Spirit of Plebiscite and Contains No  
Objectionable Beer Clause; Sealed Packages Only

### Municipalities to Get Half of Liquor Profits

Decision Made in Despatch that Amendments May  
Provide for Right to Serve Beer and Light Wines  
in Restaurants

VICTORIA, February 24.—The Moderation Act which was passed into the Legislature yesterday afternoon provides that malted and malt liquors be sold by the Government. There is in the measure no provision for the licensed sale of intoxicating beverage by private parties. It is understood, however, that the act is subject to most revolutionary revision by the Government, while in the committee stage. There is a probability that the bill will be amended to allow the sale of beer and light wines by agencies other than government stores. There is to be no drinking in a public place and drunkenness in a public place constitutes a punishable offense. A limit of one quart will probably be the limit placed on a single purchase and uniform price will prevail throughout the province. Consumption of intoxicants will be allowed in hotel rooms, provided a license is obtained from the government and an annual fee of five dollars. Non-residents will be required to pay five dollars for a license. Government stores will be open eight hours daily and closed on election days. No more Beer and Beer Signs. Signs bearing the words "Beer," "Brew" and "Liquor" and "Liquor" are disallowed. A tax of \$2.50 a quart on all liquor not bought from the Government will be imposed and all existing private stocks are to be marked with a Government stamp. Beer warehouses must pay a license fee of \$3,000 yearly. Excessive drinking means the cancellation of the permit and the license. No liquor will be sold to minors. Provision is made for inspectors to enter and search premises for illicit liquor in connection with the enforcement of the law. Municipalities Get Half Profits. An important feature of the bill is that municipalities are to get half the profits from the sale under the government monopoly. This will give the municipalities an interest in enforcing the law and will provide relief from the present high tax rates. It will be unlawful for a host to permit anyone to become intoxicated in his home. A host may sell liquor on prescription, but in the original package obtained from the Government store and at the Government price. A sealed package, it is explained, may mean anything from a barrel.

### TIME ON COAST STRICTLY LIMITED

The secretary of the Board of Trade received the following letter yesterday from Hon. C. C. Ballantyne in regard to the invitation sent for the navy to visit Prince Rupert: "With reference to the part of your telegram of February 11th, asking that the Canadian Naval Fleet visit Prince Rupert during its stay on the Pacific Coast, I should be very glad indeed to have the Canadian Naval vessels visit your port and have given instructions that this should be done if possible. "The stay of the vessels in British Columbia waters is, however, strictly limited owing to the necessity of the ships returning East in time for the combined exercises with the Militia and Air Services. As the vessels will no doubt need certain refit after their long cruise, it is just possible that they may not have time for the trip north and might have to leave without calling at Prince Rupert. This would be a matter of regret to myself and to the officers of the ships, but it would merely be a postponement of their visit which would take place on the next occasion of their being off the coast of British Columbia. ### GREEK AND TURK TO BE RECONCILED

Cessation of Hostilities and  
Independent Commission to  
Examine Claims.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—The solution of the near east problem relating to Turkey to be reached by the Allied Council will be to send an Allied commission to examine the claims of Greece and Turkey in Smyrna and Thrace. Meantime a cessation of hostilities between Greece and Turkey will be declared.

### COST OF EDUCATION WAS \$5,500,000

Government Contributed Forty per  
Cent of Total.

VICTORIA, Feb. 24.—The cost of education in the province of British Columbia was five and a half million dollars last year, according to a report tabled in the Legislature. Forty per cent of this amount was contributed by the government.

### Farmers Decide Against Direct Political Action

Individuals May Work for Farmer Candidate; Finan-  
cial Affairs to be Straightened Out; Increased  
Production is Aim

VANCOUVER, February 24.—The British Columbia Farmers' Convention at their meeting here yesterday decided not to take direct political action as a body. Any individual member or any local organization may, however, further the interests of any farmer candidate if so desired. To wipe out a \$2,500 deficit and get a surplus, the delegates decided to increase the fees and disburse with the official organizer. The sessions wind up today. At a luncheon the farmers and manufacturers agreed to cooperate in boosting manufacturing and production in British Columbia.

### Assessment Reduced Nearly Two Million

This Year's Gross Assessment is \$16,538,356 as against \$19,103,336  
for 1920; Railways Benefits  
from Action of Court

Reductions of \$1,822,744 made by the court of revision from the original draft of the assessment roll by the city assessor bring the total value of property on the roll from \$18,361,100 to \$16,538,356 which is the gross assessment for the year. This is considerably lower than last year's gross total which was \$19,103,336 and in general city property a reduction of 37 per cent is shown from last year's railway valuation, while railway property is, of course, valued at a higher figure, the ten year's agreement having expired. ### OLIVER WILL OPEN DEBATE LIQUOR BILL

Bowser Will Move Adjournment  
Until Monday, After Which  
General Discussion.

VICTORIA, Feb. 24.—Premier Oliver will tomorrow move the second reading of the bill which was introduced and read a first time yesterday. The debate which is expected to follow, will bring out an expression from members of the House. After Premier Oliver has spoken W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition, will move the adjournment of the debate until Monday afternoon. This will give him time to study the measure, get the consensus of opinion of the people who are backing him, and give his criticism the necessary political touches. After Mr. Bowser has spoken, the bill will be open for private members to discuss, after which it will be considered in committee when amendments will be in order.

Building May be Placed on Either  
Side of Track—Double

The station plans are still under discussion and nothing definite has yet been done in regard thereto. The matter of site is also unsettled. There is divided opinion as to whether the new building should be on the dock, thus serving the double purpose of a dock and railway station and allowing for the removal of the present ticket office, or be built on the opposite side of the track. There are arguments for and against each site and the consensus of opinion seems to be for the dock site. It is understood that a decision will be made in regard to this in the near future.

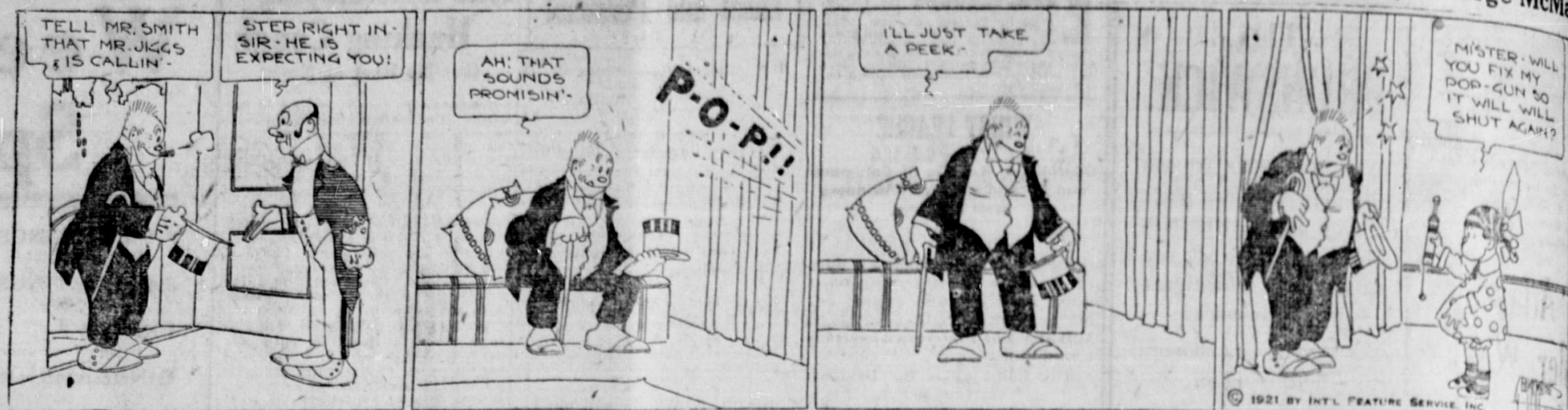
## Lashed by the Whips of Circumstance

## MISS HAYS IS GOING OTTAWA

**Former Teacher in Local Schools  
Gets Responsible Post**

Miss Olive E. Hayes, district director of the home branch of the Soldiers' Settlement Board, and formerly domestic science instructor in the Prince Rupert schools, has resigned, and will leave for Ottawa shortly to take charge of educational and publicity work for the department of agriculture. Her work in British Columbia for the benefit of wives of returned men settled on government land has received recognition throughout the Dominion and she will be a distinct loss to the home branch of the S. S. B. in the West, says the Vancouver Province.

Miss Hayes was largely responsible for the recent course in home economics given under the auspices of the board at the University of British Columbia, Point Grey. She saw the need for some training for women "going on farms for the first time" and her recommendations to Ottawa carried weight. When the course actually commenced it was her interest and assistance in the details of its carrying out that had much to do with its success.

**Understands Problems**  
She is a graduate of the Ontario Agricultural College in home economics, and possesses many other qualifications not common among women engaged in her particular sphere of work. Having a thorough understanding of the many problems confronting wives and mothers on the farm, she has been of very material assistance to those hundreds of women courageous enough to stand the rigorous life of a British Columbia farm with men who, by virtue of war service, were left with little else to do but take up farming. The help these women have, and are giving, their soldier-farmer husbands as a result of their training and the course of lectures they have received from Miss Hayes' department can not be estimated.

**Home Economics**  
Upon the eve of her departure Miss Hayes announces that the government will not consider further six weeks' courses at the university in home economics, but may conduct short four-day courses in special subjects, paying board and tuition for that period. If she were remaining in the province, she intimated, there might be a possibility of the longer term courses, but as a successor for her office may not be appointed for some time, there would be no one to supervise them.

**FINANCE PROVINCE BY SAVINGS BANKS**

Deposits Rapidly Increase in Manitoba Provincial Institution

WINNIPEG, Man., Feb. 24.—The majority of the undertakings of the province will ultimately be financed by the provincial savings banks, Hon. Edward Browne, provincial treasurer, states.

Announcement was made recently by E. A. Weir, chairman of the provincial savings banks, that deposits already exceed \$1,750,000. He predicted that the \$4,000,000 will be reached before the end of the fiscal year. A comprehensive plan for opening branches in every centre of the province is being drafted and will be carried into effect as soon as conditions warrant the extension of the service. Many new accounts are being opened daily at the six branches operating in Manitoba.

**Growth of Movement**  
The sum of \$31,000,000 was required for financing Manitoba during 1920. This included consolidated and capital expenditures, repayment of debentures falling due and payment of interest charges on treasury bills and provincial bond issues.

It is expected that the provincial banks will be able to finance all rural credits and farm loans during 1921. It is anticipated that over \$3,000,000 will be required for these two items during the present year. The growth of the rural credits movement has corresponded to that of the saving bank. Fifty-eight operated in Manitoba last year. It is expected over a hundred will be organized before the end of the year. Loans for 1920 totalled \$1,460,000.
