Miners Accept Terms of Premier

FRANCE PREPARING TO GIVE GERMANY BIG JOLT IF NO SETTLEMENT MAY 1

German Soldiers in Upper Silesia Ready for Action

PRINCE RUPERT, April 11.—Despatches from the allied commission in Silesia declare that a complete German military organization with a full battalion in each district has been discovered. There are twenty battalions with a full equipment of machine guns ready for action.

It is understood in well informed circles that France will, alone or with the allies, take radical action against Germany, as such will impress the German people as they have not impressed since the armistice, if assurances regarding reparation are not forthcoming by May 1.

WASHINGON, April 11.—The Supreme Court of the United States has refused to revise the conviction of Wm. Haywood and more than 38 other members of the I.W.W. on charges of conspiracy to obstruct the Government in its war activities.

ASSIZES DATE SET FOR EARLY JUNE

Holmes Murder Case is Only One
of Any Importance Yet Listed
Here

The date for the criminal and civil assizes here has been set for June 2 according to the provincial gazette.

At the present time it appears that there would be a light docket. The main case will be that of Rex vs. Holmes, charged with the murder of a man named Booth at Thurston Harbor. Alex. Manson, of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, will appear in the defense.

Harry Ross, who elected jury trial on charges of jail breaking and theft some months ago and is now doing time in Okalla, will also come up at the assizes.

No civil cases have yet been set for the session, although there are some entered.

The Prince George assizes will be held on June 14, the presiding judge going from here to that town.

IRISH BOYCOTT ON ENGLISH GOODS

Consignment Burned at Railway
Station by Sinn Feiners.

BELFAST, April 11.—A special Ulster constable was shot dead and three were wounded when returning from church in Crossmaglen. The first attempt to enforce the Sinn Fein boycott against English goods occurred today at Kitmarlock when goods from Manchester were burned at the railway station.

NEW DEVICE MAKES IT POSSIBLE TO DROP MILES FROM SKY.



Major W. S. Schauter, Jr., equipped with two parachutes, and illustrations showing how he uses them.

Simple apparatus devised to protect flyers, a medium of performing sensational stunts.

The pictures show how army aviators make parachute jumps safely. Note the two men flying on the top plane with parachute packs awaiting the signal to let go. In one of the circles the parachute is seen open about 1,000 feet from the ground; a second parachute is used, lessening the speed of the descent. The lone figure in the centre is Major W. S. Schauter, equipped with two parachutes. Arrows point to the releasing rings, which must be pulled to open the parachute. A four-mile drop was recently accomplished, two parachutes being used.

LLOYD GEORGE MAN

LONDON, April 11.—Sir Arthur Griffiths Boscawen, minister of agriculture, has been elected in Taunton. A labor candidate was running against him who used the Canadian beef cry, but was not backed by the active participation of Lord Beaverbrook, as in a former election.

THIRD PARTY IS WIPE OUT

Liberals Win in South Australian
Elections and Remain in
Power

LONDON, April 11.—Gardes announce that in the South Australian elections the Liberal Government has been elected with 21 members to the Labor Party 20, each winning three seats from the country party, leaving the latter only two members.

The Government's ability to carry on is now assured.

APPOINTMENTS TO LIQUOR BOARD ARE TO BE DELAYED

VICTORIA, April 11.—All reported appointments to the liquor board are off, it is officially announced. It is not likely that the appointments will be made for some time owing to the large number of candidates and the fact that all applications have not yet been considered.

FORMER EMPRESS OF GERMANY DIED TODAY

DOORN, April 11.—The former Empress Augusta Victoria of Germany, wife of the former emperor, died this morning. William Hohenzollern and former Prince Adalbert were at her bedside when she passed away.

An Effort Is Being Made to Settle British Coal Strike; Owners and Men Confer

SHIPFITTER FOUND DEAD

Discovery of Death Made by Room
Mate Yesterday Morning—
Was Married Man.

Edward Dunn, a shipfitter at the Wallace shipyards, was found dead in bed at 7 o'clock yesterday morning by his room mate, W. Kelly, in room 39 at the dry dock commissary. Death had preceded the discovery by some hours for when the deceased was found he was cold and rigid. His hands were crossed over his breast.

Dunn was seen about midnight by a man named Gardiner. He had evidently retired shortly afterwards and it was only when Kelly was getting up for breakfast that the death was discovered. Dunn was deaf and sometimes failed to hear the breakfast bell so Kelly called him. Failing to hear a reply he went to the bed and started to shake the deceased, when he felt his hand was ice cold.

The police were notified and Sergeant Bailey despatched to the scene. Dr. Gade, on examination, announced death to have been from natural causes.

Dunn was about fifty years of age and is survived by a wife in Vancouver who has been notified. He came to Prince Rupert on March 21.

ANTI-GAMBLING CAMPAIGN BY THE AMERICAN LEAGUE

CHICAGO, April 11.—The American League will conduct a continuous campaign against gambling. President Johnson announces. Each umpire will serve as a special investigator, carefully studying every game.

LONDON, April 11.—The miners have yielded to the demand of Premier Lloyd George that the first thing to be decided in regard to the strike is the return to work of the pumpmen in order that the mines may be kept free from water and not be ruined. As a result of this concession, the big strike, which threatened to carry with it a general sympathetic strike of transport workers and railwaymen, seems now to be in a fair way toward settlement by negotiation.

Four mine owners and the same number of striking employees conferred this morning in regard to the possibility of a settlement. They adjourned at noon to meet again this afternoon.

SPEED WAS 107 MILES AN HOUR IN AUTO RACES

LOS ANGELES, April 11.—Jim Murphy won the national automobile race, taking the fourth heat of 25 miles in 13 minutes, 59 seconds, the average speed being more than 107 miles an hour.

SYDNEY FISHER DIED YESTERDAY

Former Minister of Agriculture
Was Prominent in Civil
Service Reform.

OTTAWA, April 11.—Hon. Sydney Fisher, formerly minister of agriculture in the Laurier Government, died on Saturday and the funeral is taking place today from the family residence here.

His name stands out particularly as the man who moved the resolution in the House of Commons providing for competitive examinations in connection with the civil service. He took a keen interest in agricultural matters and held many prominent positions in farmers' societies. He was 71 years of age.

PORT SIMPSON INDIANS DROWN

There have been two cases of drowning at Port Simpson within the last few days. Philip Morris, when returning to Port Simpson on William Dudoward's boat, fell overboard in the neighborhood of Jap Point. His body was later picked up and an inquiry is being held into the circumstances at Port Simpson today.

Joshua Stephens was drowned earlier in the week. He was returning from Findlayson Island with a load of wood. The boat being overloaded capsized and the native was drowned. His body was recovered.

Charles Wesley, a native, died at Port Simpson Hospital on Saturday morning.

Owing to the drowning accident Saturday evening, Dr. Sager and Constable Watkinson had to return earlier than they expected and Dr. Sager was unable to preach at the Methodist Church last night.

BIT OF A SCRAPPY

DUBLIN, April 11.—Civilians attacked and bombed a hotel which was quartering Government auxiliaries. In the fight, one of the attackers was killed, caused by a severe sleet storm and several wounded. A number of the auxiliaries were wounded for miles at a stretch.

PROVINCE WAS QUIET CORRECT SEIZING LIQUOR

Judgment Handled Down by Court
of Appeals Upholds Their Position.

VANCOUVER, April 11.—The Court of Appeal has handed down judgment to the effect that the province did not exceed its powers in seizing \$250,000 worth of liquor from the Canadian Pacific Wine Co. Mr. Justice Murphy dismissed the action of Morris Plant against the officials for alleged wrongful seizure of the stock of 40,000 cases of whiskey.

MAY TRANSFER THE RAILWAYS

New York Reports Proposal to
Hand Canadian National Over
to Syndicate

The Wall Street Journal says that the Canadian government is considering the transfer of the national railways to a Canadian and British syndicate which will also operate and perhaps own steamships in connection with the same.

The financial arrangements are said to under discussion.

The ministry is reported to be coming attacks on the railroad policy as providing an excuse for the move should it be definitely decided.

TEACHERS AT EDMONTON OUT

Staff at High School Strike as
Protest Against Treatment

EDMONTON, April 11.—Seventy-five High School teachers have gone on strike here as a protest against the refusal of the school board to allow teacher representatives to attend the trustee meetings, and refusal to negotiate the salary question.

ANOTHER NEWSPAPER OUT OF EXISTENCE

Toronto World Sold to Mail and
Empire and Publication is
Discontinued.

TORONTO, April 11.—After being published for forty years the World newspaper has been purchased by the Mail and Empire. The publication of the World will be discontinued but the Sunday edition will be published by the purchasers.

TELEGRAPH WIRES AGAIN OPERATING

Winnipeg Was Isolated Several
Days as Result of Steel.

WINNIPEG, April 11.—Winnipeg now has telegraphic communication to all parts of the country, the press wires east and west being in operation for the first time yesterday since last Wednesday. The trouble was caused by a severe sleet storm which carried down the wires for miles at a stretch.

Toronto Financiers

Hear of Prince Rupert.

The Financial Post has an editorial note referring to the lack of fish cars in Prince Rupert. This paper is published in Toronto and is devoted to financial affairs. It tries to take an impartial view of things. Between Mr. Duff of Lunenburg and the newspapers of the east the Prince Rupert fish question is steadily becoming a national one.

Progress Slow
But It Is Certain.

Progress in the building up of the city is slow but it is going on steadily. The new school adds much to the appearance of stability in the city and the court house will be another important landmark. The city building on Fraser Street is quite an extensive one and the new concrete block being built by Frank Clapp on Third Ave. is another permanent structure. The new wharf is assuming a very imposing appearance and there are new houses being built, although as yet not very many. It is expected, however, that progress along that line will be greater during the next few months. Many people are planning to build since prices are becoming more reasonable.

No Recent News
Regarding Bunkers.

While there is no news in regard to the possibility of securing coal bunkers for Prince Rupert, the matter has not been dropped. Efforts are being made to get the Dominion Government to act, but the revelations in regard to railway losses are having the effect of preventing the Government from looking with favor on new work. No one seems to know what they will do about the railways. No one knows what they will do about appealing to the country, but it is possible there may yet be a political upheaval before the end of the present session.

Colonel Peck is
Being Criticized.

Colonel Peck is being very severely criticized by many people in this city for continuing to support the Government contrary to the wishes of the vast majority of his constituents. It is pointed out that if the Government went to the country today it would not get the support of more than ten per cent of the people of Prince Rupert and district. In spite of this the colonel continues to line up with them and it has remained for an outsider to voice the views of Prince Rupert on the floor of the House of Commons and to publicly plead the cause of the fishermen here.

Those who criticize the Colonel say that he can spend his time dealing with the trivial subject of tipping, when on every side the Dominion Government is putting the screws on Prince Rupert and that without protest from the Federal member. They say they do not see how he can expect any support at the next election when he is consistently voting to keep in power the worst enemies Prince Rupert ever had. It is not the permanent officials who are our enemies, but the members of the Government who formulate the policies.

Everyone recognizes the splendid services of the Colonel in the war and because of his fine work there, people have been indifferent in saying anything which would seem like opposition to his political career. The time has now come, however, when those who are not for us are against us. Colonel Peck cannot continue to run with the hare and hunt with the hounds. There have been several occasions this session when he has gone on record as favoring the continuation in power of the Meighen Government. He has made no public protest in regard to the deliberate attempts of the Government to crush this port and wipe it off the map. Others have deserted the Government because of their misgovernment, but not so our member. Yet there is not a place in the country that has as many grievances as has this city.

The News has on more than one occasion protested actions of the Provincial Government in its dealings with this city during the present session. Now it takes occasion to lay before the community this complaint of the treatment they are getting from their Federal member. We do not think the Colonel can justify his support of a railway policy such as that just made public, of a fish car policy, of the policy of boosting the Canadian Northern at the expense of the G. T. P. and of Prince Rupert, and of a good many other actions of the present Dominion Government.



OBJECTION TO
MILITARY NAMESWorkmen Threaten Strike in
Germany If Custom Continues

BERLIN, April 11.—Workmen engaged in construction of ships in several German seaports have petitioned the German government to abandon the policy of naming new ships after famous generals in the war or men who won renown for military service before the war. The petition says the principles of democracy are undermined by such "glorification of military characters" and that such procedure illbecomes the servants of the new republic. The unions have threatened to quit work unless the practice ceases.

It was this feeling which caused workmen recently to stop the launching of the 42,000-ton ship "Tirpitz," named after the German admiral. Protest also was made against the launching of the "Ludendorff" and the "Hindenburg," although the former Field Marshal von Hindenburg still enjoys some popularity with the union workmen employed in the sea trades.

The dockworkers and shipyard workers' unions generally are bitterly anti-militarist and take advantage of every opportunity to demonstrate their allegiance to the principle of democratic government. They have frequently delayed shipbuilding operations or stopped them altogether by strikes involving "political questions."

Former sailors of the German navy and some former officers have been supporting the unions in their anti-militarist position.

ADDRESS BY INDIAN AGENT ON HISTORY OF INDIAN TRIBES

Dealt With Subject in Three
Periods: Exploration, Trading
and Missionary.

There was a good attendance in the McIntyre Hall last evening to hear the interesting address given by Ald. G. G. Perry, Indian agent, "Early Days on the North Pacific." The lecture was of a historical nature and dealt with the Indians under three periods, exploration, trading and missionary.

Commencing with a brief description of Indian customs and conditions before the white men came, the story of the British and Spanish explorations and the rendezvous at Nootka Sound was told. Then came the fur trade which, Mr. Perry stated, had been over exploited with the result that it had practically been discontinued.

Up to this period the Indians had heard little of Christianity and there were hostilities between the whites and the natives and also fierce feuds between the various tribes. With the coming of the missionaries they had learned the ways of civilization and peace. Their barbaric customs had also disappeared. The ultimate destiny of the Indians would be absorption into the white race, predicted the speaker.

Following the lecture there was a lot of discussion and many questions were asked, answers for which were readily given. S. V. Cox was chairman of the meeting.



U.S. CONGRESS AND CANADA

Number of Bills Relating to This
Country Up At Special
Session.

WASHINGTON, April 11.—A number of measures of interest to Canada are slated to come before the special session of Congress called by President Harding for April 11. In the list are the emergency tariff bill of unhappy memory and the bill to restrict immigration to the United States. Both of these bills were passed at the last session of Congress and both were vetoed by Mr. Wilson, among his final official acts as President.

Emergency Tariff

The emergency tariff measure, known as the Fordney bill, was designed to place so high a tariff on farm products entering the United States that such products would be virtually excluded altogether. The view taken by its promoters, or rather the view announced by them, was that this would be an effectual measure of protection for the farmers of the United States. Opponents of the bill, and their name was legion, declared that the measure would never become law, but was merely a political dodge to enlist the sympathy of the agricultural population for the new Republican

administration. These opponents said that it was only another plan to exploit the farmer politically, tried and true tactics employed on innumerable occasions by legislators of all time.

The Fordney bill had a lively time in both houses of Congress and ran the gauntlet of every tariff theory in Washington. It became considerably amended before its final passage, but still retained the feature to which Canadian farmers objected most, a duty of forty cents a bushel on wheat.

Young Bill

In its new incarnation the bill will be known as the Young bill, being named after Representative Young, Republican, North Dakota, chairman of the sub-committee which is to present it. Despite a flood of requests from senators, representatives, business concerns and farmers' organizations for elimination of some clauses and addition of others, the measure is to be presented to Congress exactly as it stood when it finally passed early in March only to be vetoed by President Wilson.

One of the many requests for new features in the bill came from the flour millers of the United States, who asked for a compensatory duty on flour. The Underwood law imposed a duty of ten cents a bushel on wheat and the compensatory duty on flour was 45 cents a barrel, being ten cents a bushel on the flour and one half bushels necessary to make a barrel of flour. In this case the millers asked for a special duty on flour that would meet the duty paid on a sufficient number of bushels of wheat to make a barrel of flour.

Anti-Dumping

It has been agreed upon by the leaders of the Congress, and approved by President Harding, that anti-dumping legislation will be brought in early in the special session. It is possible that the anti-dumping bill will be incorporated in the emergency tariff measure and that the operation of the latter will be restricted to
