CITY STREETS ARE TO BE IMPROVED AT ONCE

IMPROVEMENT IN PRICE OF RAW FURS AT NEW YORK AUCTION YESTERDAY

Work of Surfacing City Streets with Rock Commencing

The city council has decided to carry on the street surfacing work discussed in the dying hours of last year's council. Instead of using tarvia, the streets will be surfaced for their width with the hard rock from the Smith Island quarry which the city recently acquired. The cost of the work will be on the plan of 65 per cent taxation of the property. The taxes will amount to about \$1.50 per front foot of property abutting and will be paid in five yearly payments. Streets concerned are Second and Third Avenues between McBride Streets, Eighth, Sixth, Second and McBride along First Avenue from McBride to Manson Way, down Manson Way, on Second Street from Third to Pacific Place and on McBride Street from First to Fifth Avenue. Sixth Street will be surfaced to Fraser Street.

WILL FINISH THE WALK TO SALT LAKES

Work by the provincial government on the completion of the walk into the Salt Lakes from the landing will likely commence in a few days and will be completed before the swimming season commences. The department intends to spend a few hundred dollars on improvements there but the replacing of the float will not be done by the province for this does not come under its jurisdiction. The swimming club has already asked the Federal Government to do this but the request has been turned down. It is estimated that it will take \$1,000 to put things in shape across the harbor, besides the work that is being done by the provincial government.

Three carloads of halibut sold this morning for eastern shipment and there were also a couple of salmon boats in. H. & R., 7,000 pounds; Thorberg, 5,000 pounds; Alliance, 4,000 pounds, and Ringleader, 8,000 pounds, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 13.9c and 5c. Mercy L., 300 pounds; Thelma, 9,000 pounds; D. G. F., 10,000 pounds, and Clara N., 1,500, sold to the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co. at 13.6c and 5c. Spot, 1,500 red salmon and 285 whites, and Carl, 420 reds and 80 whites, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 18-1-2 cents and 5 cents.

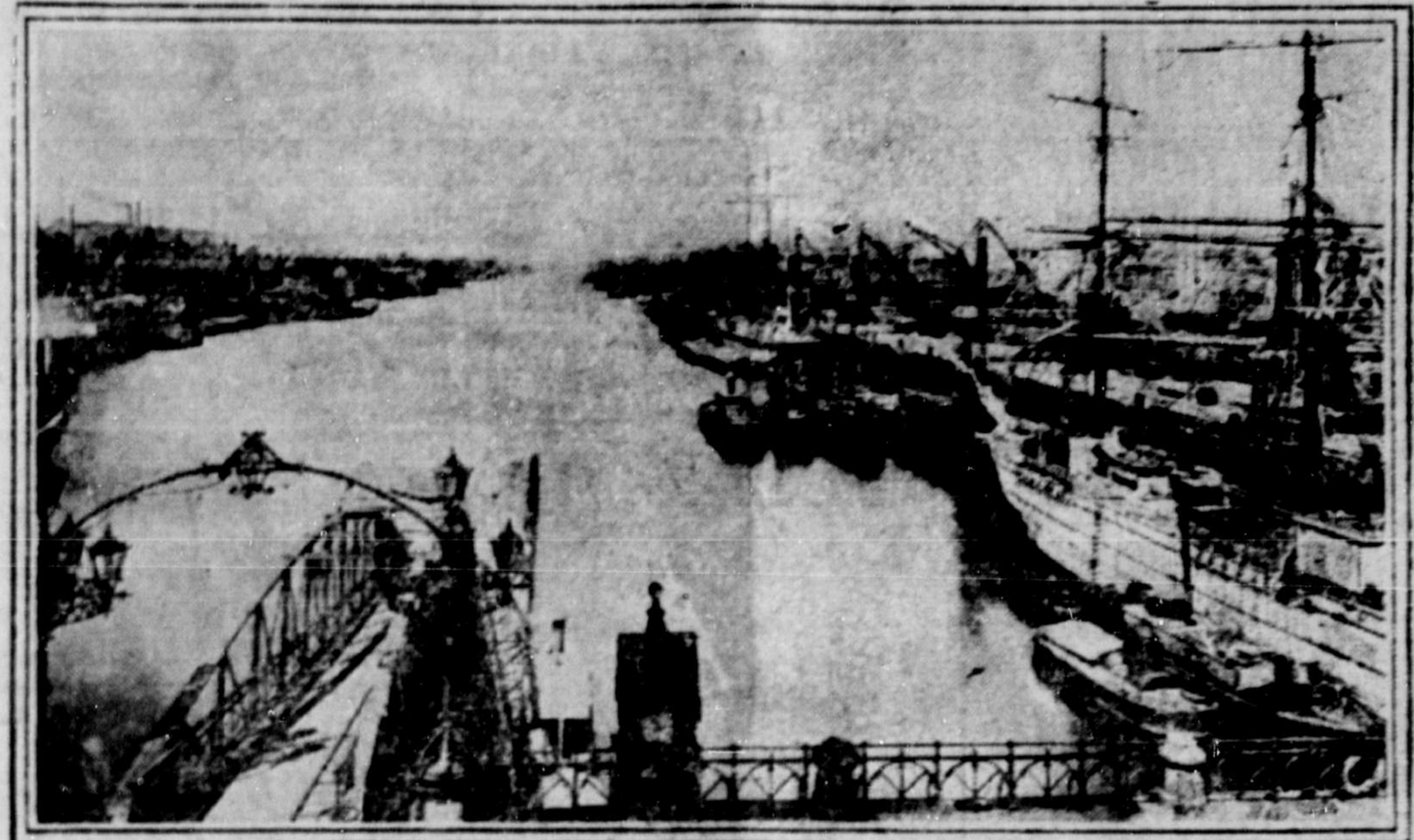
TEACHERS IN EDMONTON HIGH

According to the latest foreign despatches, the Bolshevik are raising havoc in numerous cities in Germany. They have seized shipyards in Hamburg and have hoisted the Red flag. Workers in the yards have quit work and are beginning to organize mass demonstrations. In many cities the Communists have directed their efforts against court houses, city halls, public banks and police headquarters. Bremen, which is a port of importance, is where violence may occur at any time. The picture was taken before the war and shows how the big vessels were crowded into the port.

BIG LINER HAS BEEN RAISED

French steamer Meduana salvaged at Wallsend by Use of Powerful Pumps. At the end of November a serious mishap took place at Wallsend, whereby the large French passenger liner Meduana, of nearly 500 feet in length, after having been on fire in the fore-cold, heeled over on her starboard side. The raising of the ship was undertaken by Lindsay, Watson & Hunter, salvage contractors, Sunderland. They began work shortly after the mishap occurred and continued for three months. Towards the end of last month, after they found that each compartment had become rendered watertight, pumping was undertaken along the whole length of the ship. Twelve motor-driven pumps placed on barges alongside were worked simultaneously discharging water at the rate of 2000 tons per hour.

LONDON, Ont., April 12.—Four armed bandits shot and killed Russell Campbell, a local citizen, when he attempted to prevent the robbing of the Home Bank at Melbourne village. Three robbers were captured and another escaped, but no money was obtained.

NEW YORK FUR SALE BROUGHT HALF MILLION

Prices of Many Pelts Advanced But Several Declined at Auction. NEW YORK, April 12.—The prices obtained for Russian sable, Canadian marten, baum marten and other furs for summer and early use featured the opening sessions of the sixth annual spring fur sale in the Masonic Hall here yesterday. Despite the comparative lateness of the wholesale season for the furs mentioned, they brought advances ranging from 15 to 35 per cent over those paid for similar pelts at the winter sale here in January. An interesting thing about the offering of Canadian marten was that it was larger than any collections of this fur to be put up at the forthcoming London sales, excepting for wild cat and other, both of which declined. All the skins sold yesterday brought higher prices than those obtained for similar furs at the January sale of the New York Fur Auction Sales Corporation here. The actual percentages of increases were: Wolverine, 25 per cent. Fisher, 15. Russian sable, 15. Canadian marten, 20. Baum marten, 35. Stone marten, 15. Alaska seal dressed and dyed, 10 per cent. Northern wild cat dropped 25 per cent and southern wild cat declined 50 per cent. The drop in other amounted to 7-1-2 per cent in northern skins and 10 per cent in southern. The total sales for the day exceeded \$500,000.

ORMISTON TO HAVE CHARGE OF THE NEW LIGHTHOUSE TENDER

Boat to Operate From This Port Has Had Trial Run at Victoria. VICTORIA, April 12.—Captain H. Ormiston, chief officer of the lighthouse tender Newington, is to have command of the new lighthouse tender to be operated out of Prince Rupert with headquarters at Digby Island. The second of the two craft just completed by the B. C. Yacht & Boat Builders here has just had her trial run with Col. A. W. B. Wilby, agent of marine, on board accompanied by the designer, Chris Sholberg. The tender, which is going to Rupert, is propelled by a 100-horse-power Canadian Fairbanks engine of the semi-diesel four-cylinder type burning crude oil. The fuel tank has a capacity of 2,000 gallons. The boat is 75 feet long, 17-ft. beam and 9 feet deep.

BUCKLEY BAY MILL TO OPEN THIS SUMMER

Logs Already There are Likely to be Cut in Near Future. VANCOUVER, April 12.—It is understood here that the mill managed last year by F. L. Buckley at Masset Inlet is to be reopened soon in order to cut up the logs which are already there. Last year a large quantity of logs were left in the woods and they are to be cut this summer. It is not known whether the concern will open under the same management as last year or will be leased by some Vancouver lumbermen who have been negotiating a lease.

NO ELECTION FOR A YEAR

Supporters of Ottawa Government Declare Must be Redistribution Before Appeal to Country. OTTAWA, April 12.—While there is no certainty until the railway estimates are passed and other contentious subjects are settled, the general impression here is that there will be another session of Parliament before an appeal to the country is made. There is no evidence of preparations for an election campaign. The Government supporters still declare there must be a redistribution measure following the census before an election takes place.

FARM LABOR FOR PRAIRIES

Plenty of Demand But Men Have Not the Price. There is plenty of demand for workmen on the prairies to help put in the crop, but the local men who are unemployed have not the price to get there. Those who are now without jobs are men who have come here recently in the hope of getting something to do. Wages on the prairies are somewhat lower this year than last but there is still good money to be earned on the farms. Only two men have so far been sent east by the local labor bureau but others may follow.

INCOME TAX FOR PROVINCES

Manitoba would Like to Have It and Hand It Over to Municipalities. WINNIPEG, April 12.—A conference of provincial governments with the federal minister of finance immediately was suggested by Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer, at the taxation conference proceeding at the parliament buildings under the chairmanship of Premier T. G. Norris. The main point up for consideration was the question of a provincial income tax to be levied by the province, with proceeds to go to the municipalities from where collected. Favors Principle Little diversity of opinion was shown to the principle of the income tax, but the question of who should get it proved the greatest bone of contention as the conference proceeds, it appears. In advocating the conference of provincial and federal governments, Hon. Edward Brown declared the income tax field rightfully belonged to the province and should not be tapped by the Dominion treasury. He disapproved the idea of two income taxes, and said the provincial tax should be the only one in existence. No Gross Profits Premier Norris made the statement that the government had abandoned the idea of a provincial gross profits tax and now intended imposing a net profits tax. The question of abolishing the present business tax could be discussed by the meeting, he said.

COUNCIL AGAIN WILL DISCUSS CAMERON COVE

Carvell Asks City What Attitude; Hanna Taking no Chances.

HANNA THINKS BAY MUST BE FILLED

Parker Thinks Level Crossing Separate Question Altogether From Railway Yards.

The question of filling Gow Bay was resurrected at last night's council meeting when a letter was read from F. B. Carvell, chairman of the railway commission, asking the city to state its attitude on the proposed filling. The letter will be dealt with in committee of the whole at the next meeting of the council. Mr. Carvell's letter stated that the railway commission did not intend to allow the filling of Gow Bay until a special hearing was held to hear all sides of the question unless the city council and the provincial government, in formal resolution, agreed to the filling. A letter from D. B. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, was enclosed with Mr. Carvell's letter. Hanna's letter. In Mr. Hanna's letter it was said that there were two applications in regard to Gow Bay at present before the railway commission. The first was the application of the G. T. P. to fill the bay and the second was an application from the Provincial Government asking for permission to put in a level crossing. With certain transgressors of land the Provincial Government had assented to the filling of Gow Bay. At the present time it did not look as if the railway would be going ahead with its proposed yard development at Gow Bay and it would place no hindrance in the way of the level crossing. It was the opinion of Mr. Hanna, however, that it would be inadvisable for the Provincial Government to put in the level crossing for the railway would reserve the right to put in its track and yardage there at any time and then the Provincial Government would have to abandon the level crossing and go back to the present overhead crossing. Would Fill Bay. Future development at Prince Rupert would necessitate the filling in of Gow Bay, said Mr. Hanna, but the railway company would approve the level highway crossing on the condition that all the cost be paid by the applicant for the crossing and that it be abandoned when the development scheme of the railway company demanded. If the present plan of July, 1917, on which the application for the filling was being made, the railway company would be pleased to submit a new plan. There was little discussion last night on the question but Ald. Parker pointed out that there seemed no necessity for the filling of Gow Bay and the level crossing depending on each other as Mr. Hanna had suggested. Don't forget the L. O. Was It Instinct and If So What Was That?

Gals are supposed to become attached to places and dogs to people, but there was a dog that lived in Morden, Manitoba, recently, that became so attached to the place that on being removed to Telkwa he set out for home and got there. This dog seems to have mushed the whole distance of something like two thousand miles, according to the *Orpington Herald*.

There is one thing the *Herald* did not tell and that was how the dog knew its way back to Morden. He had been brought to Telkwa presumably by rail and there certainly was no scent to aid him in his wanderings. Yet he got there. How did he do it? What was the guiding impulse that took him for that two thousand miles? He probably passed through Edmonton and other cities. He had to choose between rival railways or roads in making his way out of these cities. A man, if he had thought of it, would have watched the stars, but the dog would not know in what direction he was travelling when coming west. We dismiss this sort of thing by saying that it was instinct that guided the animal, but that explains nothing. Instinct we are told is inherited experience. What experience of the past could the dog have inherited that would teach it to find its way to its former home two thousand miles distant? If some of us could use that dog sense in finding our way through the world, we should be able to pilot much better than we do at present.

Coal Bunkers The Big Question.

It is understood that the coal bunkers proposal has been turned down by the Dominion Government. There is a good business offering if the railway will only take it. Ocean Falls needs ten car loads of coal a day and Anyox ten car loads. At \$100 a car this means a daily revenue to the company of \$2,000. All this could be secured with the outlay of \$25,000 for small bunkers so that the coal may be handled profitably.

The railway company it is understood already has the rolling stock and some time ago a promise was given that the bunkers would be built. Now the matter seems to be dropped. Happily the Alberta Government is not dropping it. They want to sell the coal and even if the railway can do nothing, there is hope that the bunkers will yet be built. It seems curious that nothing can be done which helps this port. What is described as a palatial suite of offices is being opened at Victoria. In the United States there are expensive offices in many cities. Here where there is business knocking at the doors and clamoring to be handled, the company turns it down and refuses to move hand or foot to encourage it.

Many Newspapers Are Going Under.

The past year or two has been very hard on the old established newspapers, many having been going out of existence. The pressure of high prices has been having a bad effect and there has been a general process of amalgamation going on. The latest newspaper to disappear is the *Toronto World*. It sold out to the Mail and Empire, which has absorbed it, keeping alive only the weekly edition.

There are many other cities where newspapers are having a hard struggle to keep going. Competition is keen and the one that usually falls out. Publishing a newspaper is a nice hobby for those who have the money to spare, but as a money maker it is usually not there. It is difficult for most of the papers to keep their heads above water, and now and then one passes out as in Toronto this week.

WHAT SCOTSMEN DID IN CANADA

Fred Stork Delivered Interesting Address to St. Andrew's Society Last Evening

Fred Stork delivered a highly interesting address before the St. Andrew's Society last evening, taking as his subject, "The Scotsman and Canada." The great influence that the Scotch had exerted in the early development of Canada was referred to and the numerous distinguished Scotsmen who had come to the New World to settle. The address was mainly devoted to the three outstanding Scotsmen who had played such a great part in the early history of Canada: Sir Alexander Mackenzie, explorer, Lord Selkirk, colonizer, and William Lyon Mackenzie, reformer.

Organized Big Company

Sir Alexander Mackenzie was the organizer of the North West Company which competed with the Hudson's Bay Company in the fur trade. While acting as one of the directors of the fur trade he had discovered the great river which was named after him and had explored it to its mouth in the Arctic Ocean, opening up 2,000 miles of unknown territory hitherto untraversed by white men. On his return to the old land he reported the discovery of salt, coal and oil, the latter being particularly interesting at the present time, for Mackenzie's discoveries had been made near Fort Norman.

Fame for Author

On his trip into the Mackenzie, the explorer had discovered his lack of technical knowledge, so he took courses in astronomy and scientific development and returned to Canada a year later to make further explorations. He sailed down the Peace River from the Mackenzie, crossed to the Nechako and again to the Bella Coola and descended to tide water, arriving near Bella Coola on June 22, 1793. He returned to Canada and shortly afterwards retired from the fur business and went to Scotland, where he published a book telling of his explorations. This caused world wide interest and brought knight hood and fame to the author.

Lord Selkirk

Lord Selkirk at an early age succeeded to his father's vast estates and immense wealth. He devoted his life and fortune to the improvement of the conditions of the Highlanders and planted colonies at infinite expense to himself on Prince Edward Island, Western Ontario and the Red River district in Manitoba. His colonization schemes were not looked upon with favor by the British Government and met with the unrelenting hostility of the fur traders and Family Compact government of Canada. The venture was disastrous to Selkirk financially and his colonies were almost exterminated, but the tenacity of the Scottish colonists could not be overcome and from this have grown the prosperous Scotch colonies on the Red River.

William L. Mackenzie

William Lyon Mackenzie came to Canada during the period of discontent caused by the autocratic rule and methods of the government of the day, known as the Family Compact. To Mackenzie the system was a nefarious one. Many attempts for improvement, such as petitions and pilgrimages to London were made, but without avail. The situation went from bad to worse and finally an open breach occurred between Sir Francis Bond Head, the governor, and parliament. Conditions drifted into open rebellion, finally,

there was a collision between the factions near Toronto, where several were killed. The insurgents dispersed and Mackenzie sought refuge in the United States. He returned several years later and again figured largely in the political life of the country.

Durham Visit
Lord Durham was sent out from England to investigate conditions and his report to the

There is more required than that the council just vote the money and there is not an unlimited supply as some people would appear to think. However, the sport accommodation problem in this city is getting to such a state where, if it would seem, the council would be justified in spending some money on it.
