CITY STREETS ARE TO BE IMPROVED AT ONCE PROGRESSION IN PRICE OF RAW FURS AT NEW YORK AUCTION YESTERDAY

WORK OF SURFACING CITY STREETS WITH ROCK COMMENCING

City council has decided to carry on the street surfacing lines discussed in the dying hours of last year's council. Instead of using tarvia, the streets will be surfaced for their width with the hard rock from the Smith Island quarry recently acquired. The cost of the work will be on the plan of 65 per cent taxation of the property. The taxes will amount to about \$1.50 per front foot property abutting and will be paid in five yearly payments. Streets concerned are Second and Third Avenues between McBride Streets, Eighth, Sixth, Second and McBride along First Avenue from McBride to Manson Way, down Way, on Second Street from Third to Pacific Place and McBride Street from First to Fifth Avenue. 

BIG LINER HAS NEW YORK FUR BEEN RAISED SALE BROUGHT HALF MILLION

French Steamer Meduana Salvaged at Wallsend by Use of Powerful Pumps

At the end of November a serious mishap took place at Wallsend, whereby the large French passenger liner Meduana, of nearly 500 feet in length, after having been on fire in the fore hold, heeled over on her starboard side. The raising of the ship was undertaken by Lindsay, Watson & Hunter, salvage contractors, Sunderland. They began work shortly after the mishap occurred and continued for three months.

Towards the end of last month, after they found that each compartment had been rendered watertight, pumping was undertaken along the whole length of the ship. Twelve motor-driven pumps placed on barges alongside were worked simultaneously discharging water at the rate of 2,000 tons per hour.

From the first the ship began to right herself until the starboard edge of the bridge deck was above water, leaving the vessel reeled to starboard at about 50 degrees. The upper parts of the hatch covers were then removed, and Smith, Hunter and Wigman Richardson's floating crane Titan lifted some of the pumps and placed them in the holds of the Meduana. The water in the lower holds was extracted in this way and eventually the ship righted herself. On March 10 the Meduana was placed in one of the graving docks at Wallsend for examination and repairs.

ORMISTON TO HAVE CHARGE OF THE NEW LIGHTHOUSE TENDER

Boat to Operate From This Port Has Had Trial Run at Victoria.

VICTORIA, April 12.—Captain H. Ormiston, chief officer of the lighthouse tender Newington, is to have command of the new lighthouse tender to be operated out of Prince Rupert with headquarters at Digby Island. The second of the two craft just completed by the B. G. Yacht & Boat Builders here has just had her trial run with Col. A. W. R. Wilby, agent of marine, on board accompanied by the designer, Chris Shulberg.

NO ELECTION FOR A YEAR

Supporters of Ottawa Government Declare Must be Redistribution Before Appeal to Country.

OTTAWA, April 12.—While there is no certainty until the railway estimates are passed and other contentious subjects are settled, the general impression here is that there will be another session of Parliament before an appeal to the country is made. There is no evidence of preparations for an election campaign.

The Government supporters still declare there must be a redistribution measure following the census before an election takes place.

FARM LABOR FOR PRAIRIES

Plenty of Demand But Men Have Not the Price.

There is plenty of demand for workmen on the prairies to help put in the crop, but the local men who are unemployed have not the price to get there. Those who are now without jobs are men who have come here recently in the hope of getting something to do.

Wages on the prairies are somewhat lower this year than last but there is still good money to be earned on the farms.

Only two men have so far been sent east by the local labor bureau but others may follow.

INCOME TAX FOR PROVINCES

Manitoba would Like to Have It and Hand It Over to Municipalities.

WINNIPEG, April 12.—A conference of provincial governments with the federal minister of finance immediately was suggested by Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer, at the taxation conference proceeding at the parliaments. Representatives of over 70 towns and cities of Manitoba attended the gathering held at the parliament buildings under the chairmanship of Premier T. G. Norris.

The main point up for consideration was the question of a provincial income tax to be levied by the province, with proceeds to go to the municipalities from where collected.

Favors Principle

Little diversity of opinion was shown to the principle of the income tax, but the question of who should get it proved the greatest bone of contention as the conference proceeded, it appears.

In advocating the conference of provincial and federal governments, Hon. Edward Brown declared the income tax field rightfully belonged to the province and should not be taxed by the Dominion treasury. He disproved the idea of two income taxes, and said the provincial tax should be the only one in existence.

No Gross Profits

Premier Norris made the statement that the government had abandoned the idea of a provincial gross profits tax and now intended imposing a net profits tax. The question of abolishing the present business tax would be discussed by the meeting, he said.

COUNCIL AGAIN WILL DISCUSS CAMERON COVE

Carvell Asks City What Attitude; Hanna Taking no Chances.

HANNA THINKS BAY MUST BE FILLED

Parker Thinks Level Crossing Separate Question Altogether From Railway Yards.

The question of filling Cow Bay was resurrected at last night's council meeting when a letter was read from F. B. Carvell, chairman of the railway commission, again asking the city to state its attitude on the proposed filling. The letter will be dealt with in committee of the whole at the next meeting of the council.

Mr. Carvell's letter stated that the railway commission did not intend to allow the filling of Cow Bay until a special hearing was held to hear all sides of the question unless the city council and the provincial government, in formal resolution, agreed to the filling. A letter from D. B. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, was enclosed with Mr. Carvell's letter.

Hanna's Letter.

In Mr. Hanna's letter it was said that there were two applications in regard to Cow Bay at present before the railway commission. The first was the application of the G. T. P. to fill the bay and the second was an application from the Provincial Government asking for permission to put in a level crossing. With certain transfers of land the Provincial Government had assented to the filling of Cow Bay.

At the present time it did not look as if the railway would be going ahead with its proposed yard development at Cow Bay and it would place no hindrance in the way of the level crossing. It was the opinion of Mr. Hanna, however, that it would be advisable for the Provincial Government to put in the level crossing for the railway would reserve the right to put in its trackage and yardage there at any time and then the Provincial Government would have to abandon the level crossing and go back to the present overhead crossing.

Would Fill Bay.

Future development at Prince Rupert would necessitate the filling in of Cow Bay, said Mr. Hanna, but the railway company would approve the level highway crossing on the condition that all the cost be paid by the applicant for the crossing and that it be abandoned when the development scheme of the railway company demanded. If the present plan of July, 1917, on which the application for the filling was being made, the railway company would be pleased to submit a new plan.

There was little discussion last night on the question but Ald. Parker pointed out that there seemed no necessity for the filling of Cow Bay and the level crossing depending on each other as Mr. Hanna had suggested.

Was It Instinct and
If So What Was That?

Gats are supposed to become attached to places and dogs to people, but there was a dog that lived in Morden, Manitoba, recently, that became so attached to the place that on being removed to Telkwa he set out for home and got there. This dog seems to have munched the whole distance of something like two thousand miles, according to the *Omineca Herald*.

There is one thing the *Herald* did not tell and that was how the dog knew its way back to Morden. He had been brought to Telkwa presumably by rail and there certainly was no need to aid him in his wanderings. Yet he got there. How did he do it? What was the guiding impulse that took him for that two thousand miles? He probably passed through Edmonton and other cities. He had to choose between rival railways or roads in making his way out of these cities. A man, if he had thought of it, would have watched the stars, but the dog would not know in what direction he was travelling when coming west. We dismiss this sort of thing by saying that it was instinct that guided the animal, but that explains nothing. Instinct we are told is inherited experience. What experience of the past could the dog have inherited that would teach it to find its way to its former home two thousand miles distant? If some of us could use that dog sense in finding our way through the world, we should be able to pilot much better than we do at present.

Coal Bunkers
The Big Question.

It is understood that the coal bunkers proposal has been turned down by the Dominion Government. There is a good business offering if the railway will only take it. Ocean Falls needs ten car loads of coal a day and Anyox ten car loads. At \$100 a car this means a daily revenue to the company of \$2,000. All this could be secured with the outlay of \$25,000 for small bunkers so that the coal may be handled profitably.

The railway company it is understood already has the rolling stock and some time ago a promise was given that the bunkers would be built. Now the matter seems to be dropped. Happily the Alberta Government is not dropping it. They want to sell the coal and even if the railway can do nothing, there is hope that the bunkers will yet be built. It seems curious that nothing can be done which helps this port. What is described as a palatial suite of offices is being opened at Victoria. In the United States there are expensive offices in many cities. Here where there is business knocking at the doors and clamoring to be handled, the company turns it down and refuses to move hand or foot to encourage it.

Many Newspapers
Are Going Under.

The past year or two has been very hard on the old-established newspapers, many having been going out of existence. The pressure of high prices has been having a bad effect and there has been a general process of amalgamation going on.

The latest newspaper to disappear is the *Toronto World*. It sold out to the *Mail and Empire*, which has absorbed it, keeping alive only the weekly edition.

There are many other cities where newspapers are having a hard struggle to keep going. Competition is keen and the one that does not keep up in the race for supremacy is the one that usually falls out. Publishing a newspaper is a nice hobby for those who have the money to spare, but as a money maker it is usually not there. It is difficult for most of the papers to keep their heads above water, and now and then one passes out as in Toronto this week.
