## Increase City Building Month Of October; Total Was \$54,939; Thirty Permits

Building permits for the month of October totalling \$54,939, and a healthy and notable increase which is pleasing indeed the total is a larger one for an individual month than has been for over a year except in May, 1921, when the new court house was taken out. There were 30 permits issued last month and many of them were for residences. Work for November is also good, and it is expected that the month should see a good many more permits taken out. A favorable comparison of this month with others is shown in the following table for October last year and September this year. For October last year, building permits totalled \$17,200. September's total was \$7,030. For the year up to October 31, 1921, the total of building in the city for the year up to October 31, 1921, is \$54,939. The permits for the new station, superstructure and other waterfront work will still further swell the total and will likely constitute a record big year.

Registration Closed Yesterday  
Afternoon with 209 Declared—

## Oratory Of Lloyd George Sways British House Of Commons on Question Of Irish Negotiations

### DRY FARMING IN HEAVEN

Warden Bailey, of City Police  
Offered Plan To Make Quick  
Easy Money.

A man named Charles Merritt is in the custody of the police and today was examined by Dr. Gade, medical health officer, as to his sanity. Merritt walked into the station yesterday afternoon and informed Sergeant Bailey that he had been trying to get in touch with him for 48 hours by mental telepathy. The night before he said that he had the pleasure of sleeping with ex-President Roosevelt and had found him a bad bedfellow and he had been unable to get to sleep until early in the morning. However, his present requirement was food and he said he was hungry.

A meal was procured and Merritt stated that he wished to recompense the officer for his kindness. On Sunday he had been in communication with Heaven where a number of his relatives were dry farming. As a reward to the officer he wanted to inform him of a quick money making proposition. The scheme was dairy farming in heaven where there was offered great opportunity for quick returns on small investment. In the meantime he would have to get a reply from Theodore Roosevelt.

Examined by Dr. Gade, Merritt said that he came from Rupert, Idaho, but had been across the bay for four weeks. He would not have come to town but his spirits had not been working well. The heavens, he says, are suffering from lack of food. He has an aunt in Jupiter.

## CITIES TO GET SERVICE TAX

Amount Payable to Province Will  
Be Deducted as at Present.

VICTORIA, Nov. 1.—Hon. John Hart told the Chamber of Commerce here that the Provincial Government proposed to give the municipalities the power to assess a service tax based on the stocks in trade. The merchants to deduct the amount from the profits taxable by the provincial government. The Government now takes one per cent in such tax where profit is shown.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The greatest oratorical feat in Lloyd George's career in the House of Commons resulted in the defeat of the Unionist vote of censure on Irish negotiations by a vote of 339 to 43. The Premier prophesied that it would be the greatest disaster in British history if negotiations broke down at this all-important and critical stage. If the nation had to face such a disaster it would be imperative that the British should be able to say that everything possible had been done to prevent it.

The defeat of this vote of censure practically means the same thing as a vote of confidence in the Government, and the majority was enormous. The conference may now proceed with both the Government and the Sinn Fein delegates knowing that the former are strongly backed up by the representatives of the people. Public opinion as reflected in the press has commended the course taken by the Government. The conference reopens very soon.

## PRESIDENT OF PORTUGAL IS STANDING PAT

LISBON, Nov. 1.—President Almeida, speaking from the palace to a great throng, which congregated to urge him not to resign, declared he would retain his post and exhorted everybody to stand by him and aid in upholding Portugal.

## ORIENTALS IN LEGISLATURE

Matter of Fisheries West Van-  
couver Island Discussed by  
Major Burde.

VICTORIA, Nov. 1.—Major Dick Burde, member for Alberni in the Legislature supported a motion of George Hanes of North Vancouver asking that Asiatic restrictions be imposed in British Columbia. Major Burde said the Japanese number twenty to one white man in the west coast fisheries and in the event of war British Columbia would lose her fishing industry.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo adjourned the debate until Tuesday when he will speak on the subject.

## FELL FROM CAR AND DIED FROM INJURIES

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—Falling from the top of the British Columbia Electric Railway baggage car yesterday Charles Elliott, was so seriously injured that he died a few minutes later. He was 35 years of age.

## SOME HALLOWEEN SYMPATHY FOR TRICKS SERIOUS SUFFERERS IN THE DISASTER

Childish pranks of more or more or less seriousness characterized Halloween night. In the residential sections of the town there were more youngsters out than ever and the most of them were specially garbed for the occasion. Some streets presented regular fancy dress displays and some of them were clever, showing the assistance of elders.

It was reported to the Fire Chief this morning that a fire hose had been cut across Hays Street. The stream of water on Second Avenue gave forth many tools in the course of the evening. Youngsters scrambled about. The police dispersed them. Telephone poles were rolled across the street at McBride and Sixth Avenue while a lumber wagon made its appearance in the centre of the street at McBride and Third. Knocking down of lumber and brick piles were also among the pranks.

## PARLIAMENT IS SOLID FOR GOVERNMENT

Only 43 Support Want of  
Confidence Motion on  
Irish Affairs.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The British Government obtained the expected mandate from the House of Commons yesterday to proceed with negotiations with the Irish leaders. The motion of the Irish Unionists censuring the Government for initiating the negotiations was voted down by 439 to 43.

## P. G. E. MUCH DAMAGED BY BIG FLOODS

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—Nine miles of the grade of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway from Squamish northward is under water and twenty miles of the line is damaged as a result of the floods in the Squamish valley, according to a statement issued by A. B. Buckworth, general manager. It will take one to two weeks to reopen the line as pile and trestle work will be necessary to construct a temporary track.

\$u mol \$70,000 to Be Raised in

at Britannia.

VICTORIA, Nov. 1.—At the meeting yesterday afternoon the British Columbia Legislature passed a resolution of sympathy with the sufferers in the British Columbia disaster. VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—A committee of the Board of Trade and businessmen and women of the city has been formed with the object of raising the sum of \$70,000 this week to relieve the Britannia sufferers. The committee will also seek clothing which the Red Cross will distribute. Small contributions in other parts of the province are also sought.

VICTORIA, Nov. 1.—Lieutenant Governor Nichol has received a cable from Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, expressing sympathy with the flood sufferers at Britannia.

## DRIFTWOOD COVERED BABY

Two Year Old Child of Frank  
Braidwood Discovered on

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—The death list in the flood which wiped out the residential settlement of Britannia Beach Friday night was reduced to 35 yesterday when it became known that the two year old daughter of Frank Braidwood was found asleep and unharmed in the eradic Sunday under a pile of driftwood. Mrs. Braidwood is still missing and an older child is among the identified dead.

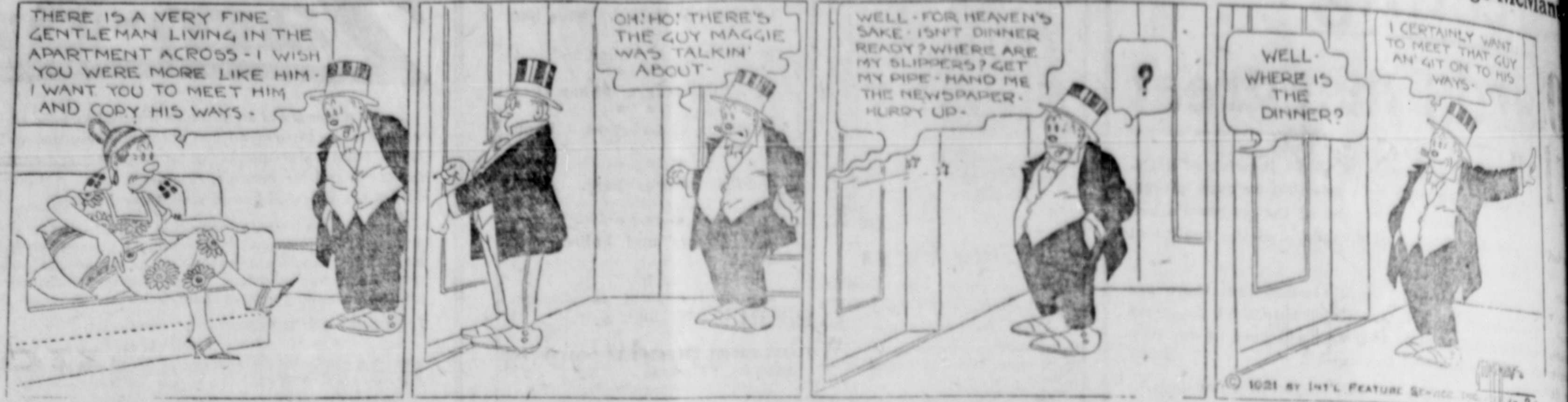

## RESIGNATION OF CITY ENGINEER

Affairs of Department Discussed in Council Last Night—Harmony Lacking.

The resignation of F. S. Clements, city engineer, was received by the city council last night and was accepted on motion of Ald. Dybbavn, seconded by Ald. Silversides. The resignation takes effect on November 30. Steps are to be taken at once with a view to obtaining a successor.

In his letter Mr. Clements stated that he had found it impossible to carry out his work under Mayor Rochester and the chairman of the board of works. The foreman of the department had been receiving instructions from both without regard to himself, the supposed head of the department.

Ald. McNeill rose to the defence of the city engineer, urging that the resignation be not accepted until the affairs of the department had been investigated and the engineer set right. In his experience of the council he (Ald. McNeill) had found that neither the mayor nor the chairman of the board of works had seemed to have confidence in the engineer. A lot of business had gone through his office in the past year. Many estimates had been called for and time after time they had been turned down on account of too much expense. If the mayor and the finance committee had been honest with the city council and had said they could not get money the city engineer could have been used usefully instead of having him waste his time getting out estimates to be turned down. He did not think his resignation should be accepted when it had been practically forced upon him.

**Mayor's Position.**  
The mayor defended himself and the finance committee. It was not true that they knew they could not get money for work. As far as the grading in Section 5, they did not know yet whether they could get the money, as the bank had not replied to the finance committee on the matter.

Ald. Silversides said it was quite evident there was not harmony in the engineering department. Lots of little things that had been ordered done had not been carried out, and he had come to lose confidence in some of the officials. That was why he had seconded the resolution to accept the resignation.

The resolution passed unanimously.

Speaking of the matter Ald. Perry stated that during the year it had been almost impossible to get funds for highly desirable expenditures where the safety of life and limb had been concerned. In cases like this there was a tendency to say "go ahead with it and think about the cost later. There had been too much slippish work, and the last year had seen a whole category of it. It was time that it stopped.

## STREET GRADING AND ACROPOLIS

Report Brought in Against Summit Avenue Work—Taylor Street Petition.

A petition from W. H. Sherman and twelve others asking for the grading of Taylor Street between Borden and Fullon Streets or a plank road on the same street, was laid over for a week by the city council last night. City Clerk Woods pointed out that it did not have sufficient signatures to be a proper petition so it must be considered more in the nature of a request.

Regarding the petition asking for the grading of a part of Summit Avenue, the Board of Works brought in a report in which it was deemed that this would not be well advised at the present time on account of the large expense that would develop on the city. There were only five houses there which were already served by a plank walk and a short piece of plank roadway.

Beckett won that bout despite the fact that he was knocked flat through the ropes on one occasion. It is said that he will have to show something more in his catalogue than he has yet made public before any careful promoter will again listen to his claims for a big match.

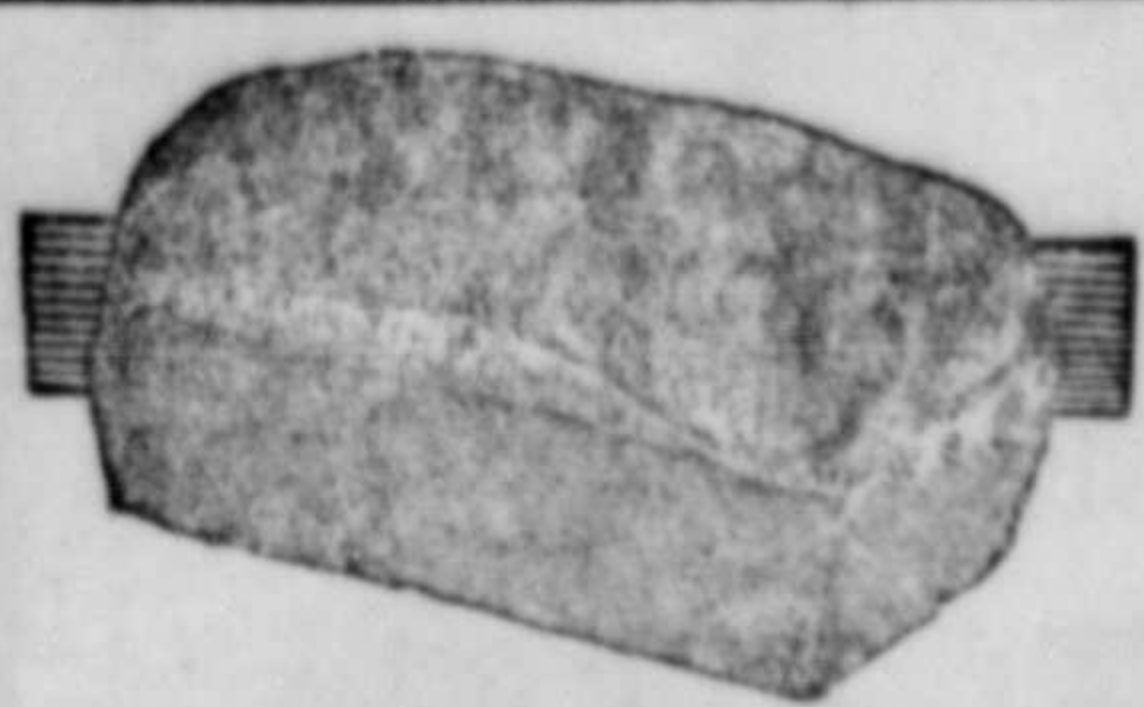

### MONTREAL HAS GROWN SINCE LAST CENSUS

Population Today Is 607,063 An Increase of 158,148 or 28.51 Percent.

### LAPOINTE IS FRENCH LEADER

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.—(By Canadian Press)—Ernest Lapointe, B.A.L.L.D., K.C., member of the House of Commons for Quebec East, the seat made historic by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, is regarded by many as the logical successor of that great statesman especially as regards the leadership of French Canadian representatives in the House. Since his entry into parliamentary life in 1904 he has won for himself a strong position in the Liberal ranks as an orator and clever politician.

Mr. Lapointe first went to the Dominion House of Commons in 1904 when he was elected by acclamation in the riding of Kamouraska, succeeding H. G. Carroll, solicitor general, who was appointed to the bench. He was elected at the general elections of 1904, 1908, 1911, and 1917. In 1919 Mr. Lapointe resigned his seat to contest the riding of Quebec East, made vacant by the death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and was elected by a majority of 3,939 over F. X. Gillibis in the bye election of October 27 of that year. He will again contest Quebec East in the forthcoming federal election and is regarded as one of the sure victors of the Liberal Party.

Mr. Lapointe is a Roman Catholic in religion and a barrister by profession. He was educated at Rimouski College and Laval University. He is town attorney for Fraserville, Quebec, and crown prosecutor for the district of Kamouraska. Mr. Lapointe was created a King's Counsel by the Quebec government in July 1909.

Mr. Lapointe is known in the House of Commons as one of the orators of the Liberal party, and his speeches, both in English and French, are usually the signal for a full house and crowded galleries. Mr. Lapointe made several forceful speeches last session especially those dealing with the status of the National Catholic Union. The feeling is freely expressed by members of all parties that he will go far in parliamentary life.
