Germany Paying First Installment

QUALITY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA'S PRESENT TO OLD COUNTRY QUESTIONED

Arrangements Being Made by Berlin for First Payment Reparation Money to Allies

PARIS, May 28.—The first real payment on the German reparations account has been announced from Berlin. The payment will be in the form of twenty bonds for about ten million dollars each, totalling two hundred million dollars. Eighty million will be payable in New York and sixty million each on London and Paris. The payments are being made immediately as the Germans have but a few more days in which to meet with the Allied demands for indemnities arising out of the war.

ANOTHER MAN IS PROPOSING POWER SCHEME AT STEWART

STEWART, May 28.—Louis Johnson, of Seattle, is visiting Stewart and looking over the ground with a view to putting in a hydro-electric and power system. Lawrence & Workman, a local company, last winter proposed putting in a system here, but they were too late in filing their papers with the government and the proposition had to be left over for a year until the next session of legislature.

MINING ACTIVITY ON MARMOT RIVER

Some Doing Work and Others Preparing to do so.

STEWART, May 28.—There is considerable mining activity on the Marmot River and a number of prospectors and miners are doing work on their holdings in that section. Others are also preparing to do so.

Strikers at Stewart Have Now Returned to Work and More Men Wanted at Once

STEWART, May 28.—(Noon).—Dale L. Pitt, manager of the Premier Gold Mining Co., announces that all the mill construction crew, all the tramway workers, teamsters, tractor men and part of the mine crew have returned to work disgusted with the so-called strike. Two new camps are being opened on the tramway and the company is sending out for fifty men who will be paid at \$5 per day. A few of the men still claim to be on strike but the work of the company is proceeding without them. The mill is nearing completion, all the tram line is cleared and the construction lowers have been planted. There is plenty of work available here.

UNANIMOUS BILL OF COMMONS IS KILLED BY CANADIAN SENATE

OTTAWA, May 28.—The Senate has killed the government bill to create a national research committee after it had been endorsed unanimously by the House of Commons.

NO CH'NCE IN EGG DUTIES UNTIL U.S. TARIFF CONSIDERED

VANCOUVER, May 28.—Sir Henry Drayton, the minister of finance at Ottawa, has informed the parliament of B. C. that there will be no change in the egg duties until the government observes and considers the U. S. tariff policy.

SOVIET VOTES AID BRITISH STRIKERS

Allotment of £20,000 Made to Assist Coal Miners by Trades Union.

RIGA, May 28.—The Soviet trade union has voted twenty thousand pounds for the relief of the striking miners in Great Britain.

NORTHUMBERLAND NOT OFFERED POSITION AS GOVERNOR-GENERAL

LONDON, May 28.—The Colonial Office denies the rumor that the governor-generalship of Canada has been offered to the Duke of Northumberland.

Provincial Minister of Fisheries Denies Salmon Was in Rotten Condition

VICTORIA, May 28.—Charges recently cabled from London to syndicate newspapers that British Columbia "put out over" on England during the war when a gift of 25,000 cases of salmon made turned out to be so inferior that it had to be thrown away or fed to the Germans has been stoutly refuted by Hon. William Sloan, minister of fisheries, who declares that the statement is wholly untrue and that it was liable to injure the good name of the province and its salmon canning industry. The facts, according to Mr. Sloan, are as follows: The entire 25,000 cases of B. C. pink salmon were 1914 pack. No other variety was shipped. Before purchase and shipment the entire shipment was inspected, personally, by three of the foremost salmon authorities and inspectors in the world, Messrs. E. O. Cornish, representing Simpson & Roberts of Liverpool; W. P. Lowell, representing Dodwell & Co., and the late Frederick Hawkins representing R. B. Green & Co., Liverpool. These men inspected and bought the bulk of the B. C. pack for British firms that year. This salmon was further inspected by Col. F. H. Cunningham, then chief inspector of fisheries for the Federal government; D. N. McIntyre, deputy commissioner of fisheries for B. C., and C. P. Hickman, inspector of fisheries for B. C. On arrival in London, the entire shipment, at the request of the province of B. C., was again inspected by the government food inspectors. They pronounced the entire lot first class. On the strength of their report Lord Kitchener ordered ten thousand cases of the lot shipped to British troops in France.

The quality of the salmon in this shipment when introduced to France resulted in France buying all the pink pack of 1915 which was available. The balance of the lot, 15,000 cases, were distributed to districts where there was distress in Britain. The agent general for British Columbia in London has many letters on file testifying to the excellent quality of the B. C. canned salmon so distributed.

SINN FEIN FOUNDER H'S BEEN ELECTED

BELFAST, May 28.—Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein movement, was elected a member of the Ulster parliament at the election just held, heading the poll in the Fermanagh and Tyrone Division.

OWEN SOUND, May 28.—Hon. John Oliver, Premier of B. C., was the guest of honor at a banquet given by the city last night.

Big Missouri Mine at Stewart Bonded Again in New York

STEWART, B. C., May 28.—The Big Missouri mine, held under bond by Sir Donald Mann for some time, has been bonded again and a substantial cash payment has been made on the deal, according to word that has just been received here by M. Jamieson from Pat Daly who is now in New York. There are no details to hand except that it is a working bond and a good deal of money is involved in the deal. The Big Missouri is one of the best known mines on the Salmon River and is owned by Dan and Andy Lindeborg of Hyder.

Another Bonding. Word was also received this week that Mr. Daly had closed another deal in New York for W. Fraser's property on the Marmot River known as the Fraser group, consisting of seven claims situated on the north fork ten miles from Hyder and at a low elevation. This deal also takes the form of a working bond and considerable work is to be done each year over a period of years. This is one of the old locations and considerable development has already been done on the property. It has a very large showing of a good grade of ore and gives great promise of making a mine.

London Times says New Measures To Be Taken Against Republicans. LONDON, May 28.—The British government has decided to send large reinforcements to Ireland. New measures, it is rumored, will be taken against the Republicans in the south and the west says the Times.

BLUE EARD PROVES POPULAR IN PRISON

Henri Desire Landru will be Tried on July 28

PARIS, May 28.—It now seems fairly certain that Henri Desire Landru, who for the past thirty months has been awaiting trial on charges of murder growing out of the disappearance, without trace, of 11 women to whom he had promised marriage, will come before the Versailles Assizes in July. Landru has become a great favorite owing to his unfaltering good humor.

GOVERNMENT MEN LOOKED OVER ROAD SITUATION IN NORTH

J. P. Futtier of the provincial government engineering staff, and road Superintendent G. A. Young returned to the city yesterday after spending some days together at Alice Arm and Stewart laying out the work for the coming summer in connection with roads and bridges. They report that there will be considerable work to be done at Stewart this season, chiefly on the Bear River road to the Redefin mine. Also the United States government will be active on the eleven miles of road up the Salmon River from Hyder to the boundary.

Stewart wears a fairly busy aspect, despite the fact that the Premier mine is still closed down on account of the strike. Many old timers are drifting back to the Portland Canal district to engage in prospecting this summer.

FINE CHURCH IN QUEBEC BURNED

MONTREAL, May 28.—Fire of unknown origin destroyed the Catholic church at St. Chry. It was built sixty years ago and cost \$100,000.

MORE MILITARY GOING IRELAND

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AGREEMENT IN MARINE STRIKE

Despite Refusal of Owners, Government and Representatives of Engineers Agree.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The representatives of the striking marine engineers have reached an agreement with the government regardless of the ship owners' decision not to enter into an agreement with the men. The Shipping Board, however, owns the majority of the shipping. The terms will be fifteen per cent reduction in wages with improved working conditions. It will be submitted to the vote of the unions on Sunday.

WEEK'S TOLL OF SLAIN IRELAND

Dublin Castle Issues Summary of Hostile Activities.

BELFAST, May 28.—A summary for the week issued at Dublin Castle shows that there were 25 deaths in the police and military during the week as a result of disturbances. Thirty-two were injured. Eight murders of civilians are attributed to the Sinn Fein. There were eleven attacks on barracks, forty-nine raids on the mails and four raids on coastguard stations.

FORMER HEAD OF CANADIAN DOCK YARDS IS DEAD

Captain Edward H. Martin Dies in Yokohama—Loaned During War.

VICTORIA, May 28.—Captain Edward H. Martin, who was in charge of the Halifax and Esquimalt naval dock yards during the war, is dead in Yokohama. He was loaned to Canada by the Admiralty for the war period.

Primary Reason
For Census.

The census of Canada to be taken next month will be the sixth comprehensive census taken since Confederation. The fundamental reason for it is to determine the representation in our Federal Parliament. As is well known the British North America Act gave the province of Quebec a fixed number of seats (sixty-five) in the Dominion House of Commons. The number assigned to the other provinces is pro rata with an arrangement that the readjustments should take place after each census. Therefore, the primary reason for the census is to enable a redistribution bill to be passed by Parliament.

Nothing Less
Than Stock Taking.

The census, however, has far wider uses than to fix electoral representation. It constitutes, in fact, under the modern system nothing less than a periodical stock taking of the Canadian people. The well being of the state—physical, moral and economic—including such various phases as birth and death rates, education, transportation facilities and financial conditions, can be apprehended only through the medium of population statistics. Without the census it would be the literal truth to say that legislation and administration would be carried on in the dark, and there would be no means of knowing whether the country was on the road to success or disaster.

Success Depends
On Co-operation.

Never before has there been such a need for a census as there is at the present time. Since the last census the war has left hardly a branch of the national life untouched. It has violently upset some of our most stable measurements and at the same time it has set up new strains and stresses and generally created conditions of the utmost consequence to our national future. The success of the census will depend largely upon the co-operation of the people. Without general appreciation of the ends in view, and without the cordial assistance of individual citizens, a good census will be impossible. One requirement demanded of the enumerators is that they be civil in their dealings with the public and it is expected that the people will be likewise civil and willing in giving the necessary information.

Rotary Club
Good Organization.

That the Rotary Club, lately established in the city, is here to stay and will fill an important niche in the business affairs of the city is now patent by the spirit that is being evinced by the members. It is not a gathering of pompous, middle aged plutocrats who gorge themselves with a seven-course banquet and congratulate themselves on their business successes. The members are ordinary business men and the luncheons served are of the simplest nature. The idea is, as expressed by Fred Stork at this week's luncheon, to never miss an opportunity of gathering in visitors of note in the public eye and exchanging views with them. This is bound to have a beneficial effect, and the Rotary Club should be boosted and encouraged in every way so that the membership will increase to capacity even this season.

The material is coming from Vancouver and upon its arrival Mr. Johnson will employ an expert shipbuilder to construct the hull, which will be a development of the hydroplane principle which lifts the hull out of the water as the boat gathers speed.

LIVING HARD IN GERMANY

Clerical Men Going Deeper and Deeper into Debt.

BERLIN, May 27.—The high cost of living, coupled with the deterioration of the mark and low salaries, has hit German government employees such a blow that a number of them say frankly the only way in which they can exist is "to go deeper into debt every day." Some of them have borrowed money on their salaries for months ahead, and must borrow more.

One government official, on a salary of 2,000 marks a month, which before the war was a reasonable wage, said he had been unable to buy any clothes for four years, that his garments now were threadbare, his shoes worn out and he had contracted debts with his grocer which he could not pay.

Deeper and Deeper.

"There is nothing to do but keep on going deeper and deeper into debt," he said. "I do not know where it will end, nor what will become of me. I earn 2,000 marks a month; a suit of clothes costs me 3,000, a pair of shoes 500, a good meal nearly 100—cigars, cigarettes, wines—they are out of the question."

Why He Smokes.

Another official said he had set aside one-fifth of his salary for tobacco, but that this only permitted him a few cigarettes daily. "I feel justified in spending this money for tobacco because smoking keeps the appetite down," he declared.

It is not uncommon for men who were once wealthy or held high-salaried positions to ask foreign acquaintances to remember them in case they have an old suit of clothes or a pair of shoes "to throw away."

PRESIDENTS MAY MEET AT DALLAS

Both Oregon and Harding Invited to Attend Texas State Fair

MEXICO CITY, May 28.—Presidents Oregon and Harding may meet next October at Dallas, Texas, where both have been invited to visit the Texas State Fair.

According to local newspapers President Oregon, who was cordially received last fall at Dallas, will repeat his visit this year and it is said here that President Harding has expressed a desire to be present at the same time.

BIG SAVINGS COULD BE MADE OPERATION BRITISH RAILWAYS

LONDON, May 28.—In moving the second reading of his Railroad Bill in the House of Commons, Sir Eric Geddes, Minister of Transportation, outlined a system of grouping the principal railroads of Britain. He claimed certain economies in working the lines would bring about a saving of twenty million pounds sterling a year.

His Wife is Ardent Campaigner and Often Takes Platform

LONDON, May 28.—Mrs. David Lloyd George, wife of the British Premier, prides herself on the personal management of her home at No. 10 Downing Street, but she can also make a political speech with telling effect.

Few by-elections of recent date have failed to lure her, and her numerous political activities have furnished interesting copy for the newspapers of all shades. Not only has she campaigned in Wales, the bailiwick of the Lloyd Georges, but she has invaded opposition territory uninvited by the hostile gestures of strong labor sections.

Perhaps her greatest personal triumph was her tour of the Bedford district where a hard fight was waged between Coalition-Liberal and Labor candidates. She was acclaimed everywhere.

The Labor party sent cars and speakers in her wake, but they had a chilly reception. At Ebtow, the birthplace of John Bunyan, Mrs. Lloyd George received a gift of a copy of "Pilgrim's Progress."

School children at Willington gave her a huge lock, emblematic of Wales and she promised to hold it for her husband on election day.

The tour was completed by a visit at Willden to a father one hundred years old and his son, aged 81, both staunch Liberals and now supporters of the Coalition.

Crook Play, "Kick In," was Excellently Presented

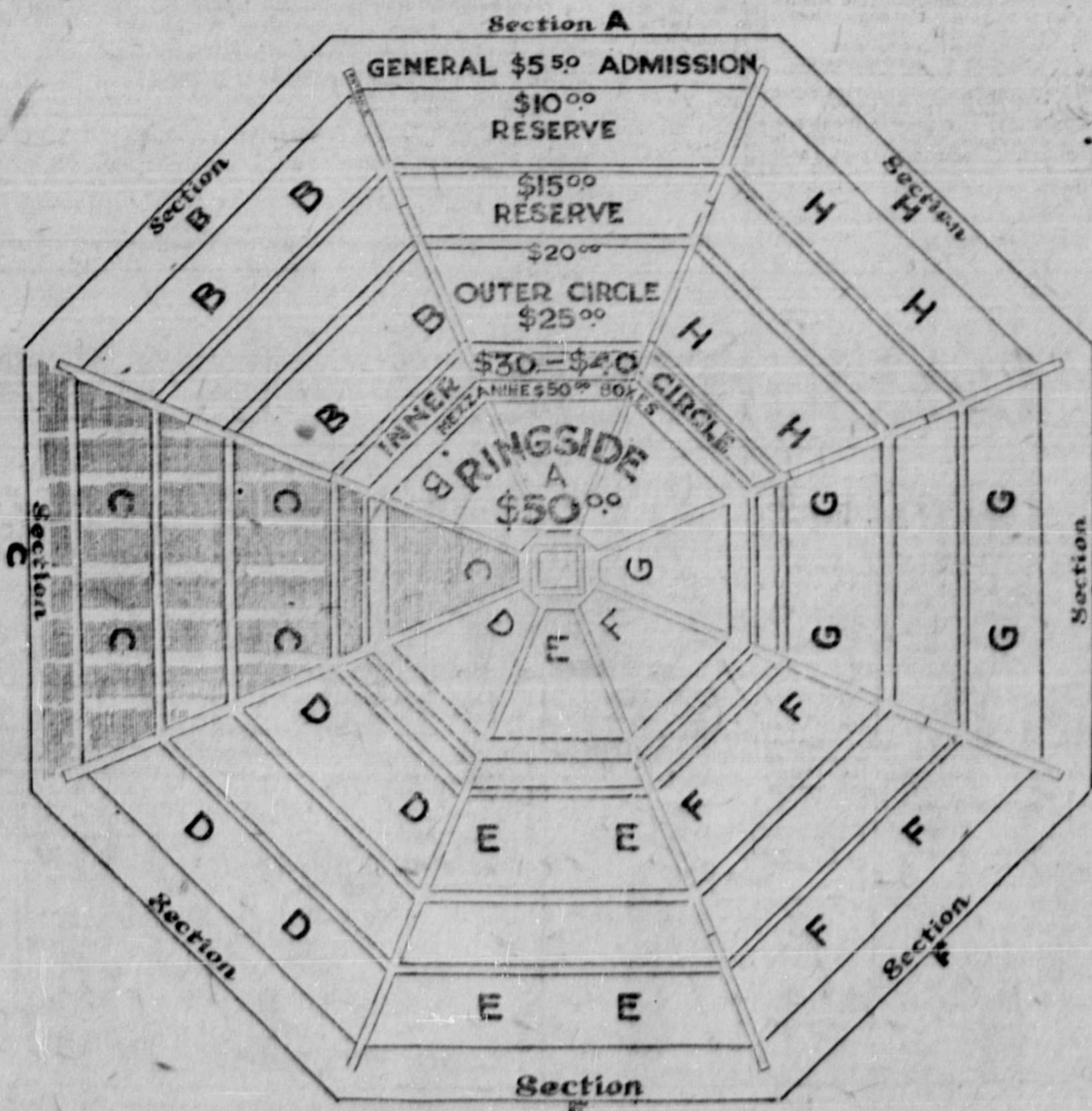

Dempsey Is Making Great Preparations for Big Fight

The fact that Dempsey started his training grind in preparation for the contest of July 2 two months beforehand must mean one of two things. Either the champion has badly retrogressed as to physical condition, or else it is the usual advertising dodge on the part of the promoters to give the newspapermen something to write of in order constantly to keep the match before the attention of the public.

To any one who knows anything about athletics and conditioning, it is ridiculous to presume that a man like Dempsey needs any more than a few weeks in which to get himself into trim if he is in anything like the condition he should be for a man who is in his particular line of making a livelihood. Assuming that he has not gone to the bow-wows physically, there is no need for this long drawn out siege of preparation. It is likely to pall on him and, in the end will defeat its own purpose in the chance of making him go stale.

Was He Stale?

It will be remembered that the alibi Dempsey put up for the comparatively poor showing he made against Brennan was the fact that he did not seem to be able to get "started." The reason for this was ascribed to Dempsey going stale. Now, Dempsey didn't train two months for Brennan, or anything like that length of time, so either his alibi for that occasion must fall to the ground, or he is deliberately repeating his mistake. Not only repeating it, but exaggerating it by undergoing an even longer session of training than he took against Brennan.

The writer does not incline to the opinion that Dempsey has gone to the bow-wows physically. Far from it. At the same time, it is not likely he is as physically fit as he was when he fought Willard, nearly two years ago. During that interval of time Dempsey has trod the primrose path to a more or less extent. Granting that he has done no dissipating, which usually means drinking in case of the athlete, we doubt if even Dempsey himself would deny that he has kept later hours in the matter of

Not Same as Before

Recent pictures show the fact that Dempsey is not the physical Dempsey of two years ago. The excess adipose tissue has filled out and smoothed over those little ridges of muscles which are so beautiful in the trained athlete. No question but what Dempsey will get rid of most of this excess filling, but it is always more difficult after it once gets in than it is to keep it out.

What retrogression there has been in the case of Dempsey should be only slight—the natural decline which comes of easy living and more or less irregular hours, and it is a condition which hardly requires a two months course of preparation to restore. Hence the conclusion is that whatever training stunts he now indulges in more for a matter of getting publicity than it is for any actual good it will do the man physically. Kearns has announced that he will take charge of the conditioning of Dempsey. Just what qualifications Kearns has as a trainer remains to be seen if he is working Dempsey now, when Dempsey is in the fine condition both men assert, then it would seem that he is starting off on the wrong foot.

SOLDIERS LAND SETTLEMENT BY THE PROVINCES

WINNIPEG, Man., May 28.—Administration of the Soldier Settlement Board in Canada should be in the hands of individual provinces rather than under federal control, for provincial government officials in charge of the department of agriculture have a much wider knowledge of provincial conditions than can possibly prevail in Ottawa, said Colonel Hameley, for many years a member of the British House of Commons, representing the Woodstock division of Oxfordshire, during an interview while visiting this city.

Colonel Hameley is interested in bringing out Imperial ex-service men to Canada to settle on the land, and is desirous of having them colonize in communities where they would be able to keep in touch with their friends. He is also deeply interested in bringing settlers to Canada from the old land to provide them with work.

"England is overcrowded," the Colonel said, "and the only thing that remains to be done is to transplant them to the overseas dominions. This soldier settlement is a splendid attraction for our people who can farm, but I feel sure that the administration could be better handled by provinces."

NEW MACHINE WOULD REVOLUTIONIZE COD FISHING ON ATLANTIC

BOSTON, Mass., May 28.—Revolution wrought in the salmon-canning industry by the "Iron Chink" is destined to be repeated in the great codfishing industry of the North Atlantic through a recently developed machine known as the "Iron Splitter." The new machine dresses cod or similar fish, for salting or smoking. Operated by two men, the "Iron Splitter" does the work of 60 to 75 men, who now wield sharp knives aboard the codfishing boats and in the salting and smoking plants of Labrador, Newfoundland, England, France, Norway and Sweden. The "Iron Splitter" will take a fish every second, 60 a minute, into one end and from the other sends it out perfectly dressed, with head and backbone removed, the fish split, thoroughly cleaned and washed, and the back napes removed, ready for salting or smoking.

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COLEMAN TELLS ABOUT ALASKA

Vice President of C.P.R. Tells About Conditions on Return to Winnipeg

Speaking of conditions in Alaska, where he spent most of his time while away, D. C. Coleman, vice president of the C.P.R., on his return to Winnipeg last week, said that the mining and fishing industries had suffered from depression in sympathy with general business conditions. The Alaskan mines produce a very low-grade gold ore and they can only operate at a profit in normal times by producing a large quantity daily and extracting gold very cheaply.

The price of gold does not vary, and with the high scale of wages prevailing these mines have found it difficult, if not impossible, to operate at a profit," said Mr. Coleman. "One of the largest mines in Alaska has been handling ore for some time with a gold value of only 35 cents per ton. When labor costs are back again the mines will resume operations on the same immense scale as in the past. A great deal of development work is going on in certain coal properties and oil prospects.

Yukon Excitement
In the Canadian Yukon there is considerable excitement over a new mining field which is being developed, in what is known as the Mayo district. It appears that there are very large and rich deposits of silver-lead ore and some consideration is being given to a proposal to build a railway line to provide transportation of the ore to the Yukon River so that it would be handled by water to White Horse and sent by rail to Skagway."

Against Jones Act
Mr. Coleman said he found an intense feeling of opposition to a new navigation law in the United States known as the Jones act, which seemed to have been designed expressly to restrict the activities of Canadian ships handling Alaskan coastwise traffic. The C.P.R. has provided a service to southeast Alaska ever since Klondike days, and on account of its direct rail connection this service is very popular. The citizens of Alaska have supplied funds to enable the constitutionality of the act to be tested in the courts and the legislature of Alaska without any solicitation from the Canadian shipping companies passed a resolution protesting against the Jones act and calling for its abrogation so far as Alaskan waters are concerned.
