Vessel Exceeded Speed Specifications OTHER GOVERNMENT STEAMER WRECKED; FOUR IN FEW WEEKS

Canadian Scottish Gave Fine Account of Herself Yesterday Very Satisfactory Trial Runs

trial runs of the new Canadian Government Merchant steamer Canadian Scottish, now about completed at the shipyards here, were highly satisfactory yesterday, T. A. Butt, representative of the Dominion Government, viewed by The News this morning. Everything went well, and the big freighter gave a good account of her construction. Final adjustments and the finishing are now being carried out, and towards the end of the vessel will be handed over to the Government by the builders.

Mr. Butt last night received a telegram from Ottawa giving instructions that the vessel be registered at Prince Rupert and today the same Montreal, on the built, will be changed to Prince Rupert.

The speed specifications for the Canadian Scottish are 12.75 knots but out of the six trials over the measured mile yesterday afternoon the vessel made an average of 14.16. Tests of the anchors and windlasses, wireless equipment and refrigeration plant were also made.

Tested Compasses.

At 9 o'clock the Canadian Scottish left the shipyard and for about an hour lay in the stream while her anchors and compasses were tested. One anchor was put down 100 fathoms and the other, 75. Captain G. Eddie, F. R. A. S., was in charge of the compass adjusting.

Following this at 10:30 the steamer sailed out of the harbor to make her trial runs between Georgian and Holland Rocks. The exact speeds for the six runs were as follows: 12.35; 13.14;

SALMON SHIPMENT BY CAN. SCOTTISH FROM THIS PORT

At the Rotary Club luncheon this afternoon T. H. Johnson stated that his company had sent a good consignment of canned fish to Australia on the Canadian Scottish. This he believed was the first shipment that had gone to Australia and was made possible owing to the fact that she was sailing from here and gave the same rate given any other port.

It showed the advantage of having a ship sail from the port.

Refrigerator Tests.

Returning to port final compass adjustments were made off Digby Island and the vessel reached the new G. T. P. dock at 5:30 where some of the guests disembarked. When she had been moored, the trials of the refrigerating machinery commenced. These take about 18 hours and early this morning a temperature of 20 degrees above zero had been reached. The specifications call for 15 degrees above zero, so it is likely that this will also prove satisfactory.

Wireless tests were also made while the ship was out yesterday these being in charge of L. S. Hawkins, of the Marconi Company. The steamer was in communication with the Digby Station several times.

**People Look to
Newspapers for News.**

People look to the newspapers for news of events which are about to take place as well as in regard to things which have already happened. Advance news of events is advertising. This has to be paid for. By charging for this kind of news the newspapers manage to carry on and give their customers service. There is no other way they could do it.

Because people have the habit of looking for advance notices of events in newspapers the advertising is doubly valuable. Take this paper as an instance. Most of the people in Prince Rupert read it, and a great many people in the mining camps and mill towns on the coast and at all points between Prince Rupert and Prince George. We have spent a lot of money in building up the circulation of the paper that it may be valuable to advertisers.

Because of the position The News holds in the community, it cannot be ignored in matters of publicity. There is no other way the people can be reached. Attempts are often made to conduct various affairs in the city without the aid of the newspapers, but they almost invariably fail. Window cards and handbills are seen by a few people, but the mass of the people do not see them. Men, women and children read the newspapers to a great extent, and they watch for notices of concerts and dances and games and outings and other entertainments. They also look for the church services, which they invariably find.

Advertising in The Daily News is not expensive considering its circulation, although it costs a lot to publish a newspaper here. We are a long way from the sources of news and telegraph tolls are expensive. It costs around three thousand dollars a month to publish this paper, and it takes a lot of advertising to cover that expense. The members of the staff all work hard and there is very little waste time. It is difficult to make more economies. Newsprint is still very high when purchased in small quantities such as must be done in publishing a small paper. We like to explain this to the people here because we set out to make the best paper possible considering the income, and we are doing that. There is nothing to be gained from hiding things. With a circulation almost three times as large as any other paper in the North, we have set a pace which it will be difficult to follow, and the end is not yet. We are constantly giving more value for the money. Today we are giving several columns more reading matter on the average per day than we gave three months ago. The next step will be an eight-page paper all the time, and that may come soon. All depends on the amount of business offering.

**Westview Suggested
Section Two Name.**

Many people, visitors especially, ask why we do not get a better name for Section Two. It is neither artistic nor descriptive. New people coming to the city know nothing about the old real estate map and care nothing about it. They are directed to Section Two as a place to get a fine view and as something to be seen, but on account of the name do not want to go there.

There is no need of a civic enactment to make the change. All that is necessary is for residents and others to call it Westview and it will soon be named. Fairview is the cemetery district, and Westview seems very appropriate for the district that gives a fine view westward across to Metlakatla village.

**Interest Taken in
Alice Arm Mine.**

Alice Arm is again coming into the limelight with a new silver strike that bids fair to revive interest in silver mining in that camp. There are several good looking properties around the Dolly Varden, including the North Star, the Wolf and the Toric. If the properties amalgamated they would make one good mine that it would pay a company to work. The difficulty with all these newly discovered properties is that the owners ask figures which are too large to make operation profitable. Usually it is not the discoverer of the mine that runs the price up, but the man who buys and sells, or in other words the middleman.

From reports received, both from the Kinsault and Iliaance rivers, there is every reason to believe that Alice Arm will yet be one of the big silver camps of the coast, if not the largest of all.

**BRITISH LABOR IS
CRIPPLED FOR FUNDS**Neil McLean of Glasgow Tells
Winnipeg People of Condi-
tions in Old Land.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 24.—Organized labor in England and Scotland is so financially crippled as a result of strikes and lockouts that it is unable to offer much strong opposition to wage reductions which manufacturers are putting into effect generally," said Neil McLean of Glasgow, Labor member for the Govan division in the House of Commons, who is attending the annual convention of the Trades Congress of Canada, which opened in the Royal Alexandra Hotel Monday morning.

Mr. McLean will visit various centres throughout the west, upon conclusion of the Trades Congress meet here, studying trade union conditions in general and devoting considerable time and study to the Japanese question as it affects the western portions of Canada and the United States.

Reserves Used Up.

"During the war, when unemployment was almost unknown in the British Isles, labor organizations piled up huge reserve funds for use in an emergency, but these funds have been totally wiped out as a result of heavy drains during the first six months of this year," said Mr. McLean. "Millions of pounds were expended to provide funds to workers out of employment, and many of the unions had to mortgage war stocks and premises in an effort to secure money to enable their members to fight the proposed wage reductions. The reductions were fought on the ground that the cost of living was proved by labor organizations to be 20 points higher than figures prepared by the Board of Trade showed, and the workers had they submitted to them, would have been actually at a loss. Feeling among millions of workers in Scotland and England is very bitter over the outcome, and if the necessary finances were available every worker in England would strike."



NO CATASTYLSM BUT PROGRESS

**Samuel Gompers Says Labor
Must Not Sell Her
Sacrifices.**

"We want no cataclysm either in Canada or the United States. We shall work out our destiny slowly — advancing epoch by epoch, bettering ourselves with the years," said Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in an address to a huge audience of labor men in Massey Hall, says a Toronto paper.

As he stopped on the platform of Massey Hall Mr. Gompers was accorded a great ovation, the large audience rising to its feet as a man and cheering to the echo the king of labor. For the past forty years Mr. Gompers has controlled the destiny of labor on the other side of the line, and the tremendous applause that greeted him testified to the place that he has won in the hearts of labor here.

Not for This Continent.

In his opening words Mr. Gompers made it clear that the catastrophe foretold by Karl Marx has no place in the advance of American labor according to his program. "The world is divided into two classes, and two only," he said. "They are employers and employees. There are no others. There can be no others. And this is the first truth that we must realize." With all the persuasive eloquence of which he is master he exhorted his hearers to hold fast to the first principles of their great federation.

Will Never Fall Back.

Speaking of the meaning of the war and of the contribution that labor had made to the winning of it, Mr. Gompers said:

"The war was sacrifice. We sent an army of men to the plains of Flanders with one common purpose—namely, that military and political autocracy might forever be wiped from the face of the earth." He described the accomplishment of that purpose and the advance of democracy which had followed. People, he said, feared some of these advances, and there were people who would put the toilers of this continent and the world back in the pre-war years.

"But," he said, "if I know the spirit of Canada and America, we shall never be driven back. We shall not betray our dead; we shall not sell our sacrifices. We shall press forward—never back!"

MET DEATH IN BURNING BOAT

Edward Brown of Ketchikan and Juneau Lost Life From Gasoline Explosion.

Edward Brown, formerly a well known resident of Ketchikan, who worked as a waiter in the Arcade and Poodle Dog restaurants, was burned to death at Juneau last Saturday morning. A Juneau paper gives the following account:

Following an explosion of gasoline on his gas boat, a 28-foot launch, T. 34, moored at the Willoughby Avenue, float, Edward Brown Harris, known here as Ed. Brown, was burned to death about 1 o'clock this morning.

Spilled Gasoline.

With Gilbert Lord, Brown was preparing to make a short trip over the bar to pick up a friend who had lost a skiff there. Before he went down to the boat he asked Harry Brown to get him ten gallons of gasoline. Harry Brown carried five gallons to the boat and emptied it into the tank. Ed. Brown was then working on the engine. Returning with the other five gallons he handed it to Gilbert, who was standing on the deck. Gilbert started for the pilot house, which also holds the engine, and in some way stumbled over the hatch, losing his hold of the gasoline, which was uncorked and spilled over the stove and a lighted lantern.

Explosion Follows.

An explosion immediately followed and the flames soared 25 feet in the air. Gilbert got out on the deck and called to Brown to "Dive out the back door."

"I can't," answered Brown. The pilot house was in flames and Gilbert ran to the front and called through the porthole to Brown, but received no answer.

Harry Brown jumped on the boat to assist Gilbert, and with an anchor they attempted to stave in the front of the pilot house. Their cries and the flames roused Bert Maycock, who was sleeping on his boat at the dock, and he succeeded in stabbing in the front of the pilot house with an axe. The flames were so intense it was impossible to reach Brown.

Pronounced Dead.

At this time the fire department arrived and it was about ten minutes before the flames could be extinguished enough to make it possible to reach the body of Brown. Dr. Sloan had been summoned and after a brief examination pronounced him dead. It is thought death was instantaneous after the first inhalation of the gasoline fumes.

Edward Brown was 45 years of age and was born in Montreal, Canada. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. George Harris, and three sisters, Mrs. George Shane, Mrs. Clara Hawkins and Mrs. Devlin Moore, all of Ottawa, Canada, and his widow, who resides here.

FOUND THEIR MAN HIDING IN TRUNK

J. M. Nelson Pleaded Guilty to Serious Charge in Police Court.

J. M. Nelson, who pleaded guilty in the police court this morning to vagrancy and supporting himself by the avails of prostitution, created somewhat of a precedent. The charge is a serious one and it is seldom a person accused of it pleads guilty.

Early this morning Sergeant McGlinchy and Constable Macdonald visited Comox Avenue, in pursuit of the accused. Searching a house he was eventually found hiding inside a travelling trunk. He asked for a chance and was told by the officers that they would leave it to Chief Vickers' decision. Later Sergeant Bailey and Constable Poustie were sent for him and arrested him and brought him to the station.

Accused comes up for sentence tomorrow morning.

Minnie Johnson, Indian, charged with drunkenness, and Martin Hanson, charged with supplying, were remanded until this afternoon on appearing before Indian Agent Perry this morning for trial.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and agricultural land \$5 an acre; second class to \$2 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agriculture or purposes and not timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must pay stamp duty for first-class and agricultural land \$1.25.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made no permanent improvements, he may be entitled to health, or other medical treatment, receiving Crown Grant.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided application made within 6 months of issue of stamp duty.

Pro-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, the term not exceeding 10 years, in connection with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown grant land.

Ungranted areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 100 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites up to 100 acres and not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased conditions include payment of stamp duty.

Natural bay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them.

Relief of one-half of cost of roads not exceeding half of purchase price is made available.

The one within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for the same under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the war.

This privilege is also made retrospective.

No grants relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1919.

Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of grants as crown lands and mines since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, etc., or taxes on soldier pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force required direct or indirect remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete a pre-emptor's fee simple, full fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes.

Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be apportioned proportionately over whole area.

Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING ACT, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration by Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

PEACE ARCH ERECTED RECENTLY AT BLAINE

Formal Opening to Take Place on September 6 Next on Pacific Highway.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 25.—The Peace Arch at Blaine, Washington, on the line which separates the United States and the Dominion of Canada, has been built to commemorate the fact that, for one hundred
