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Creditors Lose in the Shipyard Case

GREENWOOD TELLS BRITISH PARLIAMENT OF POSSIBLE INVASION OF ENGLAND

Government Wins Out Against Creditors in Drydock Case

Covers Material as well as Ships, All of Which Goes to Dominion and Must be Returned

Appeal to be Entered on Behalf of the Assignee

Justice Murphy Hands Down Judgment This Morning at Vancouver Against People Who Supplied Goods

(Special by Government Wire.)
VANCOUVER, B. C., February 22.—Mr. Justice Murphy's decision handed down in the Prince Rupert Dry Dock case represents a sweeping victory for the Dominion Government. The decision which the Government holds for the steel and materials is recognized as coming first on the ships and on all the material required to finish them, which would include the material still unpaid for, which was removed by the assignee from the yards and stored uptown in Prince Rupert. This material is to be returned.
The creditors of the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Company, who are thus left out in the cold by this decision of Justice Murphy, intend to appeal the case.

POLITICAL CONDITION AT OTTAWA

Affairs in a Turmoil With Return of Rogers' Machine Methods and Possibility of An Election.

OTTAWA, Feb. 22.—(Special.) Political affairs are in a tangle here. Premier Meighen has come under the sway of Robert Rogers and the Manitoba political system is being adopted.
During the period of Union Government patronage was supposed to have been abolished. Everybody was treated alike, friend or foe. There was no political machine. Although attempts were made from time to time to create a Unionist machine, the people were not in the humor for it and it was given up.
With the advent of Mr. Meighen as premier, things have changed. Once more the patronage system is in full swing, the Conservative machine is being well oiled and everything possible is being done to prepare for an election, if not this year, at least early in 1922.
Bring in Loot.
The opinion has been held by the Meighen followers that his government would be strong enough to last out this session and carry on until after redistribution. Much as the Government dislikes the idea of larger representation in the west, they like less the idea of an appeal to the country with the people in the present critical mood. Possibly before an election is held there will be a short period of spending in order to get the people in the constituencies in a good humor. Members will return to their districts with a sound of trumpets heralding the coming of a conqueror who is bringing in the loot. Liberal Unionists who have refused to bolt from the present Conservative government will try to justify their actions on the ground of expediency. The people will be asked to forget the past and look forward to a glorious future, under the benign influence of high protection and party patronage.

The murder is supposed to have been the aftermath of a recent sale of twelve illicit liquor bottles to the chief.

OTTAWA HOUSE DEBATE IS ON

Prohibitive References to Lato Capt. Tom Wallace in Parliament.
OTTAWA, Feb. 22.—The debate on the speech from the throne in the House of Commons yesterday, the speakers Peter McGibbon, Dr. H. S. W. D. Cowan, H. M. Mowbray, A. Fortier, LaBelle, and amendment to the Dominion Prohibition Act with reference to the prohibition of references to the annual report of the wheat was tabled.
The speakers were sympathetic references to the death of Capt. Tom Wallace by Premier Meighen, the King and T. A. Crerar, which was laid on the dead speaker's desk.

Lobby on Liquor Bill is Starting

Unseemly Fuss over Introduction of Moderation Bill; Effort Being Made to Pass Beer Amendment

VICTORIA, February 22.—With the near approach in the Legislature of the bill providing for government control and sale in sealed packages of liquor to be introduced Thursday or Friday, it is becoming more apparent that a keen fight over the contentious point of the sale of beer in hotels, restaurants and dining-rooms and in bars and clubs will be waged. A canvass of the members of the House shows that should the beer clause manage to get through, it will be by a narrow margin. In fact present indications point to a majority against it and the opposition is not political for all the parties are split.
The lobby for and against a "liberal" measure is starting in earnest. Hotelmen, jitney bar proprietors, as well as "antis" will be here in force before the end of the week.

ALEX. HENDERSON IS TO INQUIRE COAL SITUATION

VICTORIA, Feb. 22.—Alexander Henderson, K.C., one of Vancouver's leading barristers, has been appointed commissioner to inquire into the coal situation. His report must be in by March 26 so as to be available for the use of the Legislature before adjournment.

LEGISLATURE GETS TO WORK

Change in Land Registry Act—A. D. Paterson Introduced to House.
VICTORIA, Feb. 22.—The time of the House is being taken up in committee with consideration of a new consolidation and revision of the Land Registry Act. It has been the established practice when women signed a conveyance of property to refuse to permit the husband in the same room lest there might be a suggestion of undue influence. By the new bill this disability will be removed.
Yesterday, A. D. Paterson of Delta took his seat for the first time. He was introduced by the Premier and Mrs. Ralph Smith. A report submitted to the Legislature showed that the cost to the province of printing the voters' lists throughout the province last fall was \$70,000.

SPRACKLIN IS BEING TRIED

Person who Shot Innkeeper while Acting as Liquor Inspector is Before Jury
SANDWICH, Ont., Feb. 22.—A true bill has been returned against Rev. J. C. L. Spracklin, who is charged with manslaughter following the killing last November of Beverly Trumble, an innkeeper.
Spracklin shot and killed Trumble while acting as a liquor license inspector. The trial is proceeding today.

Sinn Fein Urged to Operate in England

Rich Americans Advance Funds for Foreign Operations with Liverpool Suggested as Suitable Point

LONDON, February 22.—In the House of Commons here, Sir Hama Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, warned the House that the Sinn Fein conspiracy was spreading to England. He read a memorandum captured at the Sinn Fein headquarters dealing with an appropriation to Sinn Fein of thirty thousand pounds, mostly from rich American citizens, emphasizing the importance of large scale operations "abroad," suggesting Liverpool as holding out the greatest hope.

SOLDIERS TAKE OVER STORES

Success of Returned Men Under Land Settlement Board Encouraging.

VICTORIA, Feb. 22.—Soldier settlers under the provincial land settlement board have done so well that the general stores now operated by the board are to be transferred to the settlers' management.
Since the inception of the scheme 319 loans amounting to \$665,640 have been granted, of which \$36,550 has been cancelled or withdrawn.

LITIGATION IS OVER BIG MINE ATLIN COUNTRY

Attorney-General of B. C. Takes Part in Case Against Executor of Estate.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 22.—Litigation for the purpose of delving into the real history of the famous Engineer group of mineral claims in the Atlin district has been launched with the Engineer Mining Co. and the Attorney-General of British Columbia named as plaintiffs.
The claims in dispute are eleven on the east side of Takla Arm on Lake Tagish and are valued conservatively at \$2,500,000.
J. A. Fraser, administrator of the estate of the late James Alexander, who was drowned on the Princess Sophia, and other nominal defendants have to defend an allegation that there was fraud in obtaining crown grants to the claims which now stand in the name of the late Mr. Alexander. It is alleged that the latter staked the claims in 1907 after they had been staked by other parties and assigned to the Engineer company.

WANT A STOCKYARD ON PACIFIC COAST

Vancouver, Feb. 22.—The United Farmers opened their convention this forenoon, Ald. McTear giving the address of welcome. They will consider the establishment of a half million dollar stock yard on the Pacific coast.

IRRIGATION COST Large Sum Paid Out in Loans or to Municipalities.

VICTORIA, Feb. 22.—A total of \$675,757 was paid out, either in loans or direct outlays to municipal corporations in installing irrigation works throughout the province, Hon. T. D. Pattullo states in a report submitted to the Legislature.

MORTALLY WOUNDED Party of Armed Men Set on Ten Soldiers Near Famous Cat Town.

KILKENNY, Feb. 22.—A party of armed men attacked ten soldiers near Capuchin Priory. Two of the attacking party were mortally wounded and one soldier was wounded.

OUT ON STRIKE

VANCOUVER, Feb. 22.—Two hundred electrical workers employed by the B. C. Electric Ry. Co. struck this morning, rejecting the arbitration board award.

ATTACKED TROTSKY.

RIGA, Feb. 22.—A train carrying Trotsky was attacked by Cossack troops. Several ministers and trainmen were wounded.

PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION

People of Victoria Do Not Like Method of Voting in That City.

VICTORIA, Feb. 22.—The people of this city do not like proportional representation as a method of electing aldermen, school trustees and police commissioners. They have tried the system and the claim is made that it has failed.
Through some technicality there is to be another election for police commissioners here, and a petition has already been largely signed asking for a referendum in regard to the method of voting. The people decided by vote that the system should be adopted. They have tried it and now they will have a chance to set it aside.
The election is to be held about March 10.

Basketball Season Great Success.

The basketball season which is just drawing to a close has been a great success. It has more than justified the originators of the Athletic Association in the action they took to bring the institution into existence.

Unfortunately just as the season opened, there was trouble at the shipyard and the work there was suspended with the result that many of the local athletes left town. It caused a setback from which there was no recovery. In spite of that, however, good use has been made of the building by the young people, especially for basketball. A splendid series has been carried out very successfully and great credit for this is due the members of the basketball association that kept everything moving.

Daughters of Empire Have Been Active.

A good deal of activity has been shown during the year by the Daughters of the Empire in carrying out their various projects, all looking to the betterment of social or other conditions and providing an outlet for the energies of a number of groups of women, all with the unselfish idea of helping on some good cause.

For over ten years the Daughters of the Empire have been organized here and since the inception of the order it has never ceased its good work. It is proposed in the near future to erect a permanent home with community facilities which will benefit the whole city. It is to be hoped that it will be found possible to proceed with the work this year. The society has the land paid for and considerable money on hand set aside for the purpose of erecting a substantial building.

Air Flights Comparatively Safe.

The Manufacturers' Aircraft Association announces that air travel is just as safe as any other travel. They have an enviable record, certainly. According to their figures, 115,163 passengers were carried a total distance of 3,136,550 miles in commercial airplanes and there was not a single life lost. These figures are based on the performance of 425 planes out of an estimated number of approximately 4,000 planes throughout the country.

When we look back but a few years and remember the advent of the automobile and the difficulties attendant upon its introduction, there is every reason to believe that air travel will soon become very popular.

Coal Situation To Be Investigated.

The Provincial Government has granted a commission of inquiry into the coal situation in the province with a view to ascertaining whether or not the public are being over charged. This is an admirable move. The Daily News strongly favored such an appointment and it is to be hoped that it will have the effect of either reducing the price of the product or allaying public feeling which is undoubtedly strong in regard to the matter.

Dealings in connection with commodities which everybody uses and which are natural resources of the province, are always of public interest and all such should be open to the public.

CHOPS HEADS OFF CULPRITS

Chinese Using Drastic Measures to Rid Country of Bandits

SHANGHAI, Feb. 22.—Reports brought to Shanghai by river craft from the upper Yangtze are that the Chinese authorities, in seeking to quell outlawry and suppress disorders, following the looting of the city of Ichang by mutinous troops have adopted the most drastic methods. All captured bandits, say the reports, are executed with little or no formality.

A scene characteristic of descriptions of the working of Chinese justice was described by Captain T. F. Doyle, of the steamer Mai Shun which recently came to Shanghai. When his steamer was at Wahsien coaling Captain Doyle said those aboard saw 28 culprits led to the river bank. These were forced to kneel in a line and then the executioner with his heavy two-handed sword proceeded slowly down the line, a head falling with each swing of the sword. Such wholesale executions, the captain said, became almost a daily event in the winter months at centres on the river like Wahsien.

SPEAKER MANSON IS ASSERTING RIGHTS

Shows Independence by Ruling Against Premier Oliver in Legislature

Speaker Manson is "treating 'em rough" these days and on two successive days he has had occasion to call Premier Oliver to order, says the Victoria Colonist. In fact the second rebuff administered to the Premier appeared to take that gentleman's breath away for a minute. On Wednesday, when J. W. Jones, Conservative member for South Okanagan, was speaking, the Premier rose to a point of order, but Mr. Speaker reminded the Premier that his point was not well taken and that the member in making the statements to which the Premier took offence was quite within his rights.

Premier's Position

Yesterday Premier Oliver took occasion to inform the member for South Okanagan that certain questions of his—on the order paper would not be answered if the information desired was to be found in departmental reports, even if those reports were not brought down to the House.

Mr. Jones appealed to Mr. Speaker, who held there should be no hesitation on the part of a Minister of the Crown to answer all reasonable questions.

Private Members' Rights

"It is the right of a private member to obtain information. On the other hand, private members ought not to ask questions if the information can be obtained directly from some other source. I will let the matter stand, and if the report is not presented within a few days I think the member would be quite right in insisting." Major Burde, Alberni, expressed his appreciation of the attitude taken by Mr. Speaker that private members have rights that should not be forgotten.

ROCK QUARRIES ARE COMPARED

Ald. Perry Asks Questions Which Aldermen do Not Consider Are Justified.

A series of questions by Ald. Perry regarding the rock quarry negotiations in which the Board of Works has entered for the proposed surfacing of the streets brought down upon the utilities chairman's head the hearty objections of several of the city fathers at the council meeting last night. The questions which were exceeded in volume only by the answers provided by the city engineer, took up a good portion of the time at the meeting last night and were finally relegated back to the board of works for their information.

Aldermen Surprised.
"I am surprised that Ald. Perry would submit a bunch of questions like this to the council when he could have obtained the same information from the chairman of the board of works," said Alderman Kelly. "If Ald. Perry has not enough to do as chairman of the utilities committee I would suggest that he join the Board of Works and give us some of his valuable assistance which we could use very well."

Aldermen Dybhavn, Parker and McNeill also felt that the bringing of the questions into council was not justified and the resolution moved by Ald. Dybhavn and seconded by Ald. Frizzell that they be referred to the Board of Works was passed.

Price of Quarries.
According to the figures submitted by the city engineer it was shown that the Smith Island quarry of 61,433 acres could be purchased from C. Christiansen and T. J. Davidson for \$2,800, while the lease on the Tyee quarry of 47,966 acres was originally offered by A. G. Garde at \$7,500 with a subsequent quotation of \$2,700.

It was brought out in the answers that the city engineer considered the Tyee rock might have the most favorable appearance as a building stone but the more uniform grain of the Smith Island rock would make it a better road material. The crushing strength and weight of the Smith Island rock was greater than Tyee. Distance and transportation of the Smith Island rock was also in its favor, it being accessible by means of scows through a sheltered course, the quarry also being closer to town.

CONTRACT FOR NEW WORKSHOP AWARDED

McKinnon & Strome Get Job at Lowest Tender of \$3,214.

The contract for the building of the utilities workshop was let last night by the city council to C. A. McKinnon and J. T. Strome, their tender of \$3,214 being the lowest submitted. A resolution was brought in by Ald. Kerr and Ald. Perry for the work to be done by day labor but this met with short shrift when Aldermen Parker, Dybhavn, Silversides and McNeill pointed out that it would be unfair to the contractors. Ald. Dybhavn moved and Ald. Parker seconded that the lowest tenderer be awarded the work, it being but \$14 over the estimated cost.

The following were the tenders received:
John McKechnie, \$4,050; Mitchell & Currie, \$3,700; William Watts, \$3,950; McKinnon & Strome, \$3,214.

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GRADING ROCK AT ACROPOLIS GROUND

Board of Works Recommends the Starting of Work Under Government Relief Scheme.

A request from the Board of Works asking permission to commence the grading of the rock at the Acropolis grounds under the government relief funds, whereby the federal, provincial and municipal governments pay jointly to provide work for the unemployed, was laid over for a week.
