BRITAIN WILL FIGHT TO SAVE CONSTANTINOPLE PREMIER TO OPPOSE ANGLO-JAPANESE PACT ON ACCOUNT UNITED STATES

Meighen will Fight Treaty with Japan At Big Conference

LONDON, June 16.—Hon. Walter Meighen, Premier of Canada, has announced that he will oppose the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese treaty as unnecessary and unfair to the United States, which country is now aiming for disarmament and a peaceful spirit in world conditions. The premier is unable to see where the alliance between Britain and Japan can be renewed without treading on the toes of the United States and he would risk possible ill feeling between the two great English-speaking nations by entering into such a treaty with Japan.

The Japanese question is one of the most important that will be taken up at the Conference of Overseas Premiers which will be opened here next week.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF POPULATION MADE OCTOBER

Field Work of Census Commissioners Will Be Made in July.

OTTAWA, June 16.—It is likely that the field work of the 1921 census commissioners will be completed in July. An announcement of the population of Canada will be made in October.

AUSTRALIA IS NOT PREPARED IMMIGRATION

Account of General Depression. Premier Hughes Does Not Encourage Influx.

LONDON, June 16.—Interview yesterday in regard to the rise of industrial depression was sweeping over the world, Premier Hughes, of Australia, said that the Commonwealth had also been affected. There was in order to prevent a difficult labor situation there he was prepared to encourage a larger number of immigrants at the present time than the country could absorb.

GREAT RECEPTION FOR BYNG OF VIMY


Ottawa Veterans Making Great Plans to Accord Him a Real Royal Welcome.

NEW COURT HOUSE BUILDING HERE



Here is a picture of the \$100,000 court house and government building, which the British Columbia Government is building at Prince Rupert and for which the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and member for Prince Rupert, had to put up such a strenuous fight when the vote for it came up in the legislature in the spring, and was bitterly assailed by members from southern constituencies.

This is the largest as well as the most pretentious public building attempted in British Columbia for years. Its construction now has been necessitated by the growth and increasing importance of Prince Rupert because of the rapid development of the whole north country through the influx of settlers, and the increase in public revenue from the north.

When the building is completed all government departments in the north will be centralized there. This, it is expected, will enable the government to economize.

This large Prince Rupert structure has been designed to accommodate all the different departments now housed in different buildings, and embraces the Police Department, Sheriff, Agricultural Department, and other offices in the basement. INDICATIONS ARE BRITISH MINES START

Early Forecast of Yesterday's Vote Looks Like Resumption of Work.

LONDON, June 16.—Early indications from the vote of the miners that was taken yesterday on the question of returning to work at the new terms offered by the owners, are that there is a heavy vote in favor of resumption. The miners have now reached a stalemate, with three months' unemployment, where they will have to work again and make wages on which to live. Both sides are virtually played out and seem intensely tired of the strike. Formal announcement of the result will be made tomorrow.

ORGANIZER OF UNITED VETERANS ASKED TO RESIGN—GOING HOME

TORONTO, June 16.—J. Harry Flynn, organizer of the Grand Army of United Veterans, has resigned on the request of the executive and is to return to his home in Massachusetts.

Turkish Nationalists Warned Attempt to Occupy Byzantium Will Mean War with British

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 16.—The British Government has warned the Turkish Nationalists that any attempt to occupy Constantinople will mean war with Great Britain. A brigade of British soldiers has been sent from Port Said to reinforce Greeks in Asia Minor where military operations between the two countries are now concentrating.

King Constantine is now in Asia Minor where he will direct the operations of the Greeks. On his arrival at Smyrna harbor, the allied warships went out in order to avoid saluting him.

Great Britain's main concern seems to be the safety of the straits region which she is now preparing to defend against occupation by the Turkish Nationalists.

RETURNED SOLDIERS TO CIVIL SERVICE

Dominion Made 29,084 Appointments Last Year of Which 8,448 Are Permanent.

OTTAWA, June 16.—The appointments of returned soldiers to civil service of Canada last year numbered 29,084 of which 8,448 were permanent.

KILLING AND AMBUSHES OF MILITARY STILL CONTINUING.

DUBLIN, June 16.—A military train was attacked near Limerick today and one constable was wounded and two civilians killed when the soldiers returned fire.

An elderly civil officer was killed near Cashel.

The military commander at Cork has warned civilians that they must stop when so ordered by the military. Ignoring of this order will be punished by death.

TORONTO, June 16.—Eight students have been expelled from the University of Toronto and five others have been suspended for varying terms. FIRST DAY OF GOVERNMENT SALE IS LIGHT

Importing Houses Offer Cheaper Prices—Veterans Still Sold Beer.

VANCOUVER, June 16.—The first day's liquor business yesterday under the Government Control Act was comparatively light. The prices at the newly opened vendors' stores were from \$1 to \$5 for Scotch whiskey in reputed quarts. Beer was selling at \$2 a dozen pints, or \$20 per barrel.

Private importing firms announced that they are continuing business, quoting Scotch whiskey delivered to the homes, 75¢ cheaper than the government price.

The various war veterans' clubs were selling beer all day and to last evening no action had been taken to close them up.

TOLMIE TELLS HIS MISSION

In London to Present Canada's Case to Cattle Embargo Inquiry.

LONDON, June 16.—Addressing the Empire Parliamentary Development Committee here, Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Canada's minister of agriculture, declared that the Canadian Government had presented its case for the removal of the cattle embargo so strongly and with such success that in 1917 its strength was conceded and the definite promise was given that the embargo would be removed after the war.

The Canadians were now relying on this and it was with the purpose of presenting Canada's case to the Board of Inquiry on the subject that he was now here.

MACHINE GUNS FOR IRELAND

Implements of War Alleged to Have been Found in Cargo of Ship.

NEW YORK, June 16.—The United States customs department yesterday seized nearly five hundred modern machine guns alleged to have been found concealed aboard a steamer loading for an Irish port. The Hoboken police and the customs clashed over the possession of the arms each claiming the first discovery.

CANADIAN RIFLE TEAM SAILED TODAY FOR OLD COUNTRY

MONTREAL, June 16.—The Canadian rifle team which will contest at Bisley this year sailed this morning on the Metagamou for Liverpool from this port. Lt.-Col. G. W. Peck, in command, was accompanied by Mrs. Peck.

Miss Helen Randall, the well-known British Columbia nurse, has been elected editor of the Canadian Association of Trained Nurses. Miss Randall, on several occasions, has visited Prince Rupert and paid her last visit here last fall.

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

British Columbia
And Its Pudding.

"The proof of the pudding is in the eating." This time-worn saying may be well applied in the province of British Columbia today. The pudding is the Moderation Act and the eaters are the people of the province. Yesterday the latter began to eat the pudding and in a short time they will know what it tastes like. What is yet to be found out is how they will like it. If it is good they will continue eating it and the law will be successful. If there are some objectionable features about it they will send it back to the legislative cooks and its composition will be changed by means of amendments. If they do not like the pudding at all it will be thrown into the political garbage can and the act will be repealed.

Moderation Act
Will be Opposed.

The people in their mandate of October 20 asked for a Moderation Bill. After much consideration and careful preparation the bill has been produced and was yesterday put in operation. No doubt, this act has been evolved to the best of the ability of the provincial government officials responsible for its framing. There have been great difficulties to surmount in making the new law and opinion has been many times divided on several of the many clauses. It would have been impossible to prepare such a measure and please everybody. The factions which opposed certain portions of it will continue to oppose the operation of these sections. The authorities at Victoria neither hope nor expect that the act as a whole will be unanimously popular. Political affiliations will not govern the support or opposition of it for these always fall where legislation regarding liquor is concerned. The law is about to be tested by actual application and, doubtless, many weak points will be found.

Two Attacks Are
Already Launched.

Already there have been two attacks launched against the Moderation Act. The first is from private liquor importers who object to the profits tax; the second, from the returned soldier associations who have announced their intention of openly violating the beer clause prohibiting the sale of near beer at their bars. These two attacks will soon resolve themselves into test cases which will be taken to the courts. Both sides will fight to the last ditch and the cases will likely reach the highest tribunals of the Empire before either give in. Some businesses which have enjoyed a large measure of prosperity under the B.C. Prohibition Act, will be killed by the Moderation Act. They will, however, fight for dear life and will not die without a struggle. Especially does this apply in the case of the beer business of the various war veterans' organizations at their canteens.

What Will the
Final Result Be?

These present attacks on the Moderation Act will not be the last ones, either. The enforcement of the act will not be an easy matter. If it is to be successful the opposition will have to be fought and will have to be beaten. Otherwise the law will become inoperative and when laws are not enforced it simply means that lawlessness prevails. This will not be permitted by any government, so the question arises: If the Moderation Act becomes inoperative what will the result be? There can only be one of two results, either open sale of liquor will again be allowed with all the curses it involves in the existence of bars and retail stores or prohibition will again be adopted. It is not likely that the voters of British Columbia would ever go back to the old system which the first result would mean. Therefore, that would leave but the course of prohibition and that is the course that would most likely be taken. The fact of the matter then is that if the Moderation Act cannot be made successful after some years' operation in which time amendments to it can be made, liquor sale in the province will be abolished altogether. And if prohibition ever comes again to this province, and we think it will, it will be here to stay.

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

reasonable rate, and with the advent of cheap power other industries should follow. Power is the key that unlocks the gate to prosperity and Prince George is forging the key.

Everything Big.

The city of Prince George is located at the junction of two mighty rivers. Everything there is big, including the rivers, the extent of country, and the vision of the people. Under these conditions there must follow a big city with wide ideals.

At present the population of Prince George is probably about three thousand or a little more. The property is assessed at a little over two million dollars and the tax rate is thirty-seven and a half mills on the dollar. The rate may seem high but it must be remembered that there is no local improvement tax in the city, all new work charges being taken from general revenue. This makes the rate a low one compared with many other centres.

Settlement Needed.

Prince George is just beginning to find herself. She suffered severely from townsite promotion and from the depression of the war period. She has also suffered from the fact that white lands in other districts have been settled and cleared, the lands of this district have, with a few prominent exceptions, been neglected.

What is needed now is a comprehensive settlement scheme to bring the lands under cultivation, especially those within easy reach of the city. The Board of Trade, it would seem, might well take this matter in hand. A sales bureau where these lands could be registered free of charge, accompanied by maps and descriptions might be useful.

Rupert's Greetings.

It was at Prince George we joined the Dairymen's Association and drove out with them as the guests of the Board of Trade to see some of the farms, places that gave promise of what might be done in the district. I met the Board of Trade on the night of our arrival and conveyed to them greetings from Prince Rupert and the desire of the coast centre to co-operate with the interior. The Prince George people were extremely hospitable and we took back to the visit with the keenest appreciation. We remember the splendid townsite, the excellent roads, the picturesque situation, but especially the optimistic people, with a wholesome discontent, anxious to improve, yet with a pride in the city and surroundings which will carry them a long way.

Prince George has a location similar to Winnipeg and in time should rival that city in importance.
