## Dominions Will All Stand Together

### ARRANGEMENTS FOR STEAMER TRIALS OVER MEASURED MILE

#### Canadian Scottish to Make Trial Runs Georgian Rock to Ellinor Rock Off Mouth Of Skeena River

H. A. Butt, representing the Dominion Department of Marine, announces that the Canadian Scottish will make her trial runs over a measured mile between Georgian Rock and Ellinor Rock within Rupert Harbor, although outside the landlocked part of the harbor. The rocks are off the mouth of the Skeena River and are to be exactly a mile apart, but before the trials the distances are to be checked by the Department of Marine officials at Digby Island. The vessel will run the mile six times, three times with the tide three times against it, and will in all steam for something like 18 hours. She will be taken out by Captain McCoskrie, harbor-master, and will be piloted by him throughout. The Canadian Scottish is built to make eleven and a half knots, and her trials are likely to do more than that, probably thirteen or more. It was at first proposed to take the Canadian Scottish to Vancouver for her trials owing to the absence here of a measured mile. This difficulty has been happily overcome and the trials will be run on or about August 17. Mr. Butt received word of the approval of the department this morning. It will be an interesting sight to the big vessel making the best speed possible on that occasion, and doubtless a number of local yachts will go out to witness the trials.

#### MUSICIANS TO STRIKE TONIGHT

Did Not Attend Rehearsals This Afternoon as Usual.  
NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—The mania of vaudeville and movies the first effects of the coming musicians' strike today, although not scheduled to commence at midnight, the musicians are to appear for the customary Saturday rehearsals. One hundred men are affected, and they are forestalling a cut by the managers to ensure a reduction in pay.

#### AUSTRIA IS ASKING AID

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Austria appeal to the Supreme Council at Paris on Monday for immediate financial aid because the national scheme for the reparation of the remnants of Austria failed to function. The Austrian minister here says Austria is faced with a critical situation owing to being unable to obtain loans.

#### JAPAN AGREES

OKIO, Aug. 6.—Japan has agreed to November 11 as the date for the meeting of the Disarmament Conference at Washington as suggested by the United States, the newspapers state.

#### SEND PHOTOS BY WIRELESS ACROSS ATLANTIC OCEAN

ANNAPOLIS, Aug. 6.—Transmission of photographs and written documents in facsimile across the ocean by wireless has been accomplished. Two successful tests of the epoch-making invention have been made, a photograph and written message being sent from Malmaison, France.

#### FARMERS TO PAY FOR RAIN NEXT SEASON

Have Re-engaged Hatfield to Produce a Sufficiency for Crops.  
MEDICINE HAT, Aug. 6.—The farmers of the district have confidence in the rainmaker, Hatfield, and have signed a contract for next year calling for substantially higher pay for each inch of rain produced above the normal rainfall of three inches.

#### BEER CASE ARGUED AT VICTORIA TODAY JUDGMENT WEDNESDAY

VICTORIA, Aug. 6.—After many preliminaries, the charge against the Victoria Army and Navy Veterans' Club for selling beer was argued in court today straight through and judgment will be rendered on Wednesday.

#### Most Unsuccessful Sockeye Season on Naas and Skeena Rivers Now Draws to Close

After the most unsuccessful season in the history of District 2, the sockeye fishing on the Skeena and Naas Rivers is drawing to a close. Very few of these fish are now taken, and many of the canneries are packing humps. The cohoes are now beginning to run in the river, and it is expected that the canneries will put up the usual pack of these. This depends on the orders from the head offices, and canning will not commence until orders are received to discontinue. At the present time many of the canneries are packing the last of the sockeyes and the first of the cohoes, while hump packing continues.

#### FUNGI CAUSES SEVEN DEATHS

Children Thought Were Gathering Mushrooms with Fatal Results.

#### ONLY BABY LEFT OF MANITOBA FAMILY

Neighbors Knew Nothing of Tragedy Until Too Late to Help.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 6.—Seven persons are dead at Staurtburn, Manitoba, as a result of eating poisonous fungi believing them to be mushrooms. The entire family consisting of Fred Huska, wife and five children was wiped out with the exception of the six-months' old baby. The children gathered the fungi, which were cooked and eaten and the tragedy was practically complete before the neighbors knew that sickness had touched the family.

#### RUSSIAN PREMIER TO VISIT IN SCOTLAND

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 6.—The Russian Premier, Lenin, subject to British permission, plans to leave soon for Scotland for a holiday, says a Reval despatch.

On Thursday, August 4, at St. Patrick's Church, Vancouver, the wedding was celebrated of Louis Amadio, of Prince Rupert and Miss Elisa Garofani of Vancouver, B.C. Father Forget officiating. After the ceremony the wedding party was entertained at dinner at the home of the bride, 315 Nineteenth Avenue East and later at midnight the newly wedded couple left for their home in Prince Rupert, arriving here this morning. Mr. and Mrs. Amadio are today receiving the congratulations of the occasion, Mr. Amadio having a host of friends in the city, he being an old timer, his genial disposition having made him deservedly popular with all he came in contact. Mr. and Mrs. Amadio will make their home here.

#### NO REDUCTION IN CANADIAN FARES ON LINERS TO EUROPE

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—The notice of a ten per cent reduction in steamship rates sent out from New York does not apply to Canadian lines and is only the usual winter reduction. There has been little reduction in the cost of operating ships and until the cost comes down the passenger rates will remain the same. Steamer business is very poor owing to immigration restrictions.

#### Naval Deputy Minister Visitor to City After Inspecting Along Coast

After having spent the week visiting wireless stations along the coast, G. J. Desbarats, deputy minister of naval service, Ottawa, reached Prince Rupert on the Malaspina yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, accompanied by E. J. Haughton, superintendent of wireless stations. Mr. Desbarats is on a trip of inspection of wireless stations and vessels of the department on this coast, and is also looking over the affairs generally. This morning on the launch "Rhona" he visited the Wallace Shipyards, where the "Canadian Scottish" and "Canadian English," vessels under construction here for the Dominion Government were inspected. Yesterday with Captain Newcome, of the Malaspina, the fisheries protection steamer Givenchy was inspected and tomorrow the hydrographic survey steamer Lilloet will be in to be examined by Mr. Desbarats. The plant of Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. here was visited this morning. The deputy minister will be here until Monday morning when he will return to Ottawa. Captain Newcombe, with the Malaspina, returned to Victoria today clearing at noon.

#### BROTHERHOODS UNITE FORCES

Will Demand Arbitration Board to Adjudicate on Claims.  
TORONTO, Aug. 6.—The big four railway brotherhoods have united and pooled their resources to fight the proposed wage cut to railwaymen. David Campbell has been appointed general representative of the joint unions and he will demand on behalf of the men that a board of arbitration be appointed to adjudicate the matter.

#### IRISH MEMBERS ARE TO BE RELEASED

Only Convicted Murderer to Be Kept in Custody Pending Meeting Republican Parliament.

DUBLIN, Aug. 6.—All members of the Irish Republican Parliament now in custody will be released with the exception of John McKeown, convicted of the murder of Inspector McGrath in anticipation of the meeting of the Republican Parliament, which has been called for August 16, it is officially announced.

#### Empire Is Behind United Kingdom on Foreign Policies

LONDON, August 6.—The summary of the work of the Imperial Conference recently concluded shows that there was an original misconception of President Harding's intention in inviting the nations to a disarmament conference. When it was understood that the scope of the conference could be decided in the opening discussions, the British Premiers willingly abandoned the scheme for a preliminary meeting in London in regard to the British side of the disarmament question. The conference summary states that the greater part of the conference was devoted to affairs of naval and other confidential character. These are not published, but the conference, it is shown, revealed unanimous opinions in regard to the main lines of policy of the various sections of the Empire and the deep conviction that the whole weight of the Empire should be concentrated behind the United Kingdom and that there should be common action in regard to foreign affairs generally. More frequent meetings of the conference are believed to be necessary and the principle of Dominion autonomy should be agreed upon.

#### BANDITS TAKE \$50,000 FROM EXPRESS TRAIN

Hold-up Baltimore and Ohio Passenger and Got Away With Sealed Packages.  
GREENVILLE, Ill., Aug. 6.—The sum of \$50,000 was obtained by two bandits who boarded the Baltimore and Ohio passenger train at Beecher City, held up the express messenger and escaped with sealed packages of express containing the cash.

#### SPANIARDS ARE MASSACRED

Twenty Soldiers Surrendered to Moors and Were Massacred.  
MADRID, Aug. 6.—Further tragedy has overtaken the Spanish army of occupation at Nador, in Northeastern Morocco, where it was reported yesterday that 5,000 Spanish troops had been captured. The latest news says that the last remnant of the troops to escape consisting of twenty men were massacred after having surrendered to the Moors.

#### C. N. R. MANAGER TAKES OVER GRAND TRUNK OFFICES IN LONDON

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Another C. N. R. man gets the lead over a Grand Trunk official. William Phillips, European manager of the Canadian National Railway has assumed control of the Grand Trunk offices here and Fred Salter, the former manager, will return to a position in Canada.

#### GERALDINE FARRAR IS BEING SUED FOR DIVORCE BY HUSBAND

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Lou Tellegen, an actor filed a suit for divorce from his wife Geraldine Farrar on grounds of desertion. No details have yet been published.

#### PRELIMINARY CENSUS RETURNS FOR TWO CITIES

OTTAWA, Aug. 6.—Preliminary figures issued by the census bureau give the population of Victoria as 38,775 and of North Vancouver as 9,987. Vancouver's figures are not yet complete. The above figures should give the population of Greater Victoria as over 60,000.

#### FORCE RECEIVERSHIP OF ASSISTED COMPANY PROTECT GOVERNMENT

VICTORIA, Aug. 6.—The Provincial Executive Council has decided to take legal action to force a receivership for the British Columbia Yacht and Boat Builders, Ltd., an industry assisted under the Government loan policy to the extent of \$10,000. The Government finds the present financial condition of the company unsatisfactory as security for the loan.

#### CABINET IS TO GREET GOVERNOR

Will Attend Inauguration Ceremonies at Quebec Next Week.  
OTTAWA, Aug. 6.—The majority of members of the cabinet will go to Quebec next week to attend the ceremonies attending the arrival and installation of Canada's new Governor General, General Byng. Premier Meighen will go direct to Quebec from Halifax.

#### NOVEMBER 11 IS SATISFACTORY TO FRANCE FOR MEET

PARIS, Aug. 6.—The French Government has notified the President at Washington that November 11 is satisfactory to France as the date for the Disarmament Conference of the great world powers. The ball game scheduled for this evening between the Elks and the Sons of Canada has been called off.

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### DESPERATE ATTEMPT TO MAKE GETAWAY WAY TO WESTMINSTER

NEW WESTMINSTER, Aug. 5. - In a desperate attempt to escape at the very moment when he was about to enter the portals of the New Westminster penitentiary, Joseph Payne, colored, who was convicted in the Victoria police court and sentenced to a term of two years in jail on a charge of burglary, nearly killed himself. He is now in the hospital ward at the New Westminster penal institution recovering from his injuries.

Payne was taken over to the Mainland by Sergeant Boulton, of the Victoria department. From Vancouver to New Westminster the trip was made by motor and it was when the officer and his captive were approaching the penitentiary entrance that Payne, without warning, attempted to jump head first out of the car. Sergeant Boulton, though taken by surprise, succeeded in grasping the prisoner by a coat-tail and he hung on while Payne was dragged some distance.

**Insecure Grasp.**  
The grasp the officer had on the garment was not a secure one and he lost his hold, Payne falling to the roadway. Within a few feet the car was brought to a stop by the driver, and Sergeant Boulton made haste to alight and run back. Payne was lying on the roadway in a dazed condition bordering on unconsciousness, the result of his head coming into contact with the hard road. He was again secured and taken to the penitentiary where medical attention was rendered. His injuries were not at all serious.

Payne has had a lengthy police record, most of which was accumulated in Vancouver. On one occasion, when he was caught redhanded in an attempted burglary, he broke from police officers who had been telephoned for and was making a fast getaway when a bullet from the revolver of one of the police officers brought him down, shot through the hip. He was in the hospital for several weeks before he could be arraigned in court.

### THE WONDERFUL POWER IN MINE AND IN QUARRY

Without Recoil or Noise Now Being Applied to Industry.

LONDON, AUG. 6.—Sir Edgar M.P., who is interested in the new long range noiseless gun which experiments have been made in the United States in an interview here in regard to the gun, said that he had seen it and took a great interest in it when I was in New York. But I am not interested in it as a gun, but in its application to industry, particularly to coal-mining and quarrying. It is a very small instrument that will make blasting powder unnecessary. These experiments are proceeding, and in a few days I think we will have a very considerable development. It is true that as a gun it is not so good as the gun which has no recoil and makes noise. The inventor is not at all in applying his device to destruction but in making them applicable to production. And it is from that point of view that I am interested in it.

British Inventor. He is the inventor? He lives outside London, and is coming away to the United States to apply the invention to industrial purposes. He is a gun I think our own people are getting ready to use when the war ended. The inventor is a very clever man. He is a member of the Invention Society, and has several important patents all over the world. Arrangement for the trials of the cables speak now made when I was in New York.

Applied to Mining. Here is the instrument. It is a space of about a foot long, and the man with it goes into the face of coal. He is the instrument, and "blows" the whole face of the coal out. Then all he has to do is to go to the coal out. It is not a dangerous operation. It is just the blowing of a blow at a terrific pressure on a small patch which is the whole piece. It will be granite or slate or any rock. It is very small but complicated and very effective. There is no contact with the rock and therefore no sound

and no recoil. It is based on new mechanical principles absolutely.

No Noise or Recoil. Sir Edgar added that it was too early yet for experiments underground. As to the invention's qualities as a gun, he said the difficulty with big guns hitherto had been that huge guns required large carriages and a great foundation of concrete. But in this invention there was no noise or recoil. Fired on board ship there would be none of the tremendous percussion which there hitherto had been.

### ANOTHER WELL DOWN THIS SUMMER AT FORT NORMAN, SAYS WEST

EDMONTON, Aug. 6.—Another well will be down to the oil strata at Fort Norman this summer, says Willis J. West, general manager of the Alberta & Arctic Transportation Company, who has returned to the city from the far north. All the drilling apparatus and machinery for the Fort Norman Oil Company was delivered to the scene of operations by the company's steamer "Distributor," second trip of the big boat completing the shipment. Stover, the driller, knows his business, says Mr. West, the company's derrick is in, and they are losing no time in punching a hole down to the precious fluid.

Gusher Still Spouting. The gusher on the Imperial holdings is still spouting on when released. Mr. West turned the lever and a stream of oil shot into the air, while evidence abounds on every side, pointing to the fact that oil is to be had in abundance.

Much freight has been taken down stream for the Imperial Oil Company by the A. & A. line, but there are still two full cargoes of supplies and machinery awaiting the "Distributor" at Fort Smith, destined for the oil fields, intermediate points, and further north.

Whole Valley Staked. The whole valley in the vicinity of the Norman well is now staked, says the visitor, but there was no great rush of stakers to the north apparent, despite the fact that the big steamer carried full passenger lists. The "Distributor" made a fast passage to and from the well consuming but fourteen days for the round trip, despite the fact that considerable difficulty was experienced in obtaining supplies of wood fuel for the boilers.

## RUSSIANS ARE ODD PEOPLE

Quite Ready to Trifle Away Their Money and Then Ask Aid.

MANY KILL SELVES WHEN NOTHING LEFT

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 6.—The Russian temperament is proving a serious obstacle to American and other relief and charitable organizations here. Individual Americans trying to help Russian refugees often give up in despair.

The Russian may be described as money blind. He is careless with his own money and with that of others. Thousands of Russian refugees arrived here with plenty of gold money, furs, jewels and portable valuables. Without a thought for the morrow, they lived for a time in the best hotels until the money was exhausted, and the valuables pawned.

Then the hotel proprietors asked them to leave—and they went cheerfully to live in a squalid by-street, not only expectant but confident the Americans or some other good souls would care for them. And often it is done.

Tragedy-Comedy.


One of the tragedy-comedies of the foreign colony here is the story of the attempts of a Russian general to get his seven daughters to Paris. Dozens of persons have spent much time and money in his effort and so far three of the daughters are here and starving. The father has himself spent 75,000 francs trying. The general, a good and capable father, got himself as far as Paris through the kindness of United States Consul General Moser, then in Tiflis.

In Paris the father mortgaged his estates for 100,000 francs and sent 25,000 francs to his wife and seven daughters to join him. They got as far as Constantinople, bought a lot of new dresses, attended the season's dances, loaned the rest of their money to needy friends and asked father for more.

The general sent another 25,000 francs and after various difficulties about passports, the mother and four of the daughters departed. New loans and expenditures made it impossible to take three of the daughters. Another 25,000 francs was sent to the three daughters by the father through a Russian general who pocketed it, or thoughtlessly spent it, and the daughters are still here, their clothes held for board and lodgings and they and their family in Paris are cheerfully waiting until the American relief organizations do something about it.

Back for Funds.

A certain baron, member of the Imperial Guard, eleven times wounded during the war, was all but adopted by a Chicago dentist who met him in Russia. The latter arranged for his passage to the United States, sent funds for travel expenses and waited. The handsome baron pocketed the funds and turned up at the American embassy within a few days describing how his pocket had been picked. A cable was sent the dentist and fresh funds arrived. These funds were dissipated and still the baron did not sail. He is now waiting

## SOME ABUSE LIQUOR ACT

Board Notifies Victoria City That Hotels Selling and Individuals Abuse Permits.

Victoria is the first city to receive a public reprimand from the Liquor Board in regard to the manner in which it is carrying out the spirit of the Moderation Act. The Daily Colonist of that city says:

"Whose duty it should be to take action because certain individuals in the city, both male and female, have been found purchasing liquor from Government stores in excessive quantity, is a question which local police officers are asking themselves, following notification from the Liquor Control Board that some twenty-six individuals, names and addresses stated, have been indulging in 'excessive buying.'

Eight Hotels. "The Board's notice set forth the names of eight hotels and bars which, it is alleged, have been illegally selling liquor, and also the twenty-six individuals who, if the Board's notification is correct, have been working their permits overtime.

"The police assume that the information as to excessive buying is merely information for their guidance. If it in any way constitutes notification that the Department is to be held responsible for such excessive purchasing, then they suggest the remedy lies in the hands of the board which sells the liquor.


Intention Evaded. "Experience with the present provisions of the Liquor Act indicate that in some respects the intention of the Legislature is being evaded. For instance, in the case of the non-resident \$5 permit which all non-residents are supposed to take out before being allowed to purchase, it has been found that visitors are evading this requirement. By the simple expedient of giving a local address when applying for a permit, such non-residents have been securing advantage of the single permit provision allowing a resident to make a single purchase of the fifty-cent permit. 

## RACING TODAY VICTORIA MEET

### Many of Best Horses at Willows Track—Totalizer Being Used.

VICTORIA, Aug. 6.—The latest innovation in connection with the race track, the totalizer, is being introduced to Victoria fans at the opening Summer race meet at the Willows, which opens today. This contrivance which was adopted with phenomenal success on the big New York tracks recently, eliminated the pari-mutual machines and one glance at it is sufficient for the public to know approximately the odds of all horses starting in a race.

All bets made on every starter are registered on the totalizer and as several expert calculators have been engaged the fans will receive three and four bulletins concerning the betting before each event. A small board has also been constructed in front of the grand stand where the odds will be posted so that those fans who do not desire to enter the ring are kept informed of all the racing news exactly as it happens.

### Met with Approval.

The Totalizer was not utilized at Brighouse this summer, but Hastings Park officials introduced it last week. Vancouver fans immediately gave it their unqualified approval with the result that the meet on the half mile track at the exhibition grounds on the Mainland proved to be the most successful ever conducted there.

A remarkable feature about the racing on the Mainland this summer at both Brighouse and Hastings is the fact that the attendance at both places increased each day. The final gathering at Lulu Island attracted close to ten thousand fans.

Herb Fullerton, of Victoria, who attended these events speaks highly of the sport, and attributes the sensational support accorded the sport of kings in British Columbia this summer to the calibre of the horses and the ability of the riders, particularly the apprentices. Two of the youngest boys, Neal and Williams, are regarded as the most promising riders who ever appeared on the coast and Judge Robert F. Leighton, one of the best known racing officials on the continent predicts that Neal will be the star rider of America within eighteen months. Williams is leading the percentage list to date with winners, but he has had twice as many mounts as Neal. **ALASKA HAS**  
**FUR LICENSE**

List of Taxes Paid by Adjacent Territory on Pelts.

JUNEO, Aug. 5.—The fur tax and license schedule enacted into law by the Territorial Legislature in session last spring, is now effective. Licenses are paid to and taxes collected by United States Commissioners of the several recording districts in each judicial division in the Territory. Under the terms of the law, no person shall engage in the business of fur-farming or of the buying or dealing in furs without receiving first from the Commissioner and ex-officio Recorder a license to do so. Three classes of licenses are provided for, \$10 for fur-farming, \$25 for "stationary" buyers and \$150 for itinerant fur buyers.

In addition to the licenses required, licensees are required to pay license fees on various pelts taken by a trapper when not sold to a licensed fur buyer as follows: Polar bear, \$2.50; brown bear, \$1; grizzly bear, \$1; black bear, 50¢; beaver, 50¢; fisher, \$2; silver fox, \$3.50; black fox, \$3.50; cross fox, \$1; blue fox, \$1.50; red fox, 50¢; white fox, \$1; lynx, 50¢; marten, 50¢; mink, 25¢; muskrat, 50¢; otter, land, 50¢; otter, sea, \$1; weasel, 50¢; wildcat, 25¢; mouse trophy, \$10; caribou trophy, \$5; deer trophy, \$2.50; sheep trophy, \$5; goat trophy, \$5; other pelts not mentioned specifically, 10¢.

The party embarked in the roomy cockpit of the Tortoise, and settled down for a comfortable cruise at fifty miles an hour or so, around the waters of the Esquimaux Harbor. After enjoying this form of aqua-aviation for some time the Premier and the Finance Minister regained the shore, and stood on the end of the wharf while Norman A. Yarrow put the Tortoise through her best paces, and ably demonstrated that the name of his ship did not reflect a true indication of its ability to move over the water. The Tortoise, seen from the shore gives a clear idea of her wonderful speed and the exhibition manoeuvres that followed the landing of the party were thoroughly enjoyed by the distinguished party.

At the conclusion of the trials the Premier and the Hon. John Hart expressed themselves as delighted with the general speed facilities of the Tortoise and the expertness of her master.

"My it's a wonderful boat," said the Premier.

He explained that it was the first zip-ride he had ever been on. The boat went around Esquimaux harbor a couple of times and made around 40 miles an hour. The Premier was delighted, and Mr. Yarrow stepped on the gas to the limit. The boat shot ahead with such speed that the pressure of the air broke the windshield. No one was hurt, however.

**Never Up in Air.**  
The Premier was asked how he would like to own a hydroglider, so he could take a zip-ride before breakfast on fine summer mornings.

"I would if I had the income on which I could afford to own one," replied the Premier. "And I would put in a good deal of time on the water if I did own one, that's one thing certain. 'Have I even been up in an aeroplane? No, I've never been up in the air, and I'm not going up."

# BAKER URGES KILL EAGLES

Says Absolute Proof of Great Destruction to Young Game Animals.

The question of the bounties on eagles was discussed with Dr. Baker during his visit to Prince Rupert. The Doctor says there is no idea of exterminating the birds but only of reducing their numbers to such an extent as to give the wild game a chance.

The chairman of the game conservation board says that they have undisputed evidence of the rapacity of the eagles during the late spring and early summer seventy per cent of the food of the bald eagle is meat, consisting chiefly of young lambs, young deer, old and young grouse, and young goat.

Other thirty per cent of their food is clams and fish. Later in the season, at this time for instance, they eat probably 80 per cent fish, because the other food is more difficult to secure.

### Examined Stomachs.

Dr. Baker says they sent out and killed one hundred eagles in different parts of the county and examined their stomachs. The results was as stated. The young wild things were the chief food but grouse and other game birds taken when sitting on their nests or when protecting their young are also eaten in large quantities.

The bounty on eagles is one dollar each bird, the heads being taken to the Government agent as proof of the bird having been killed. As a result of the bounty, hundreds of heads are coming in and the effect in reducing the number of eagles is bound to prove beneficial.

# HAND PICKED MEN GOING TO PRAIRIES

VICTORIA, Aug. 5.—Men to be sent to the harvest fields of the Prairies are to be picked, according to their ability to work, J. D. McNiven, Deputy Minister of Labor announced.

"We want to send real, honest-to-God workers from British Columbia this year so that the Prairie farmers will want men from this Province next year," said Mr. McNiven.

"There will be no clerks or other soft jobs in the harvest fields. The jobs will be for horny hands."

The Government employment bureau in Vancouver and Victoria has already started registration of men for the Prairies, who will leave for the East after August 13. The men are to be all hand picked by labor expert of the bureaus. This, it was explained here today, will be an advantage to the honest harvest workers as it will give B. C. workers a reputation for being uniformly good.

**Discourage Applicants.**  
Labor officials are trying to discourage all applicants in the idea that the cheap fares the Government obtained from the Coast to the harvest fields are to be taken advantage of in the way of a pleasure excursion for men who want to go on a trip to the Prairies.

Men from British Columbia will not be sent farther East than the Prince Albert-Saskatoon-Regina line, it was announced today.

# CRERAR IS NOT NOW IN TALKING HUMOR

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—Hon. T. A. Crerar, M.P., leader of the National Progressive party in Canadian politics, has reached Toronto, but shook his head when asked for a newspaper interview.

"Why talk when you have nothing to say?" he observed. "Really, I don't give interviews, you know."

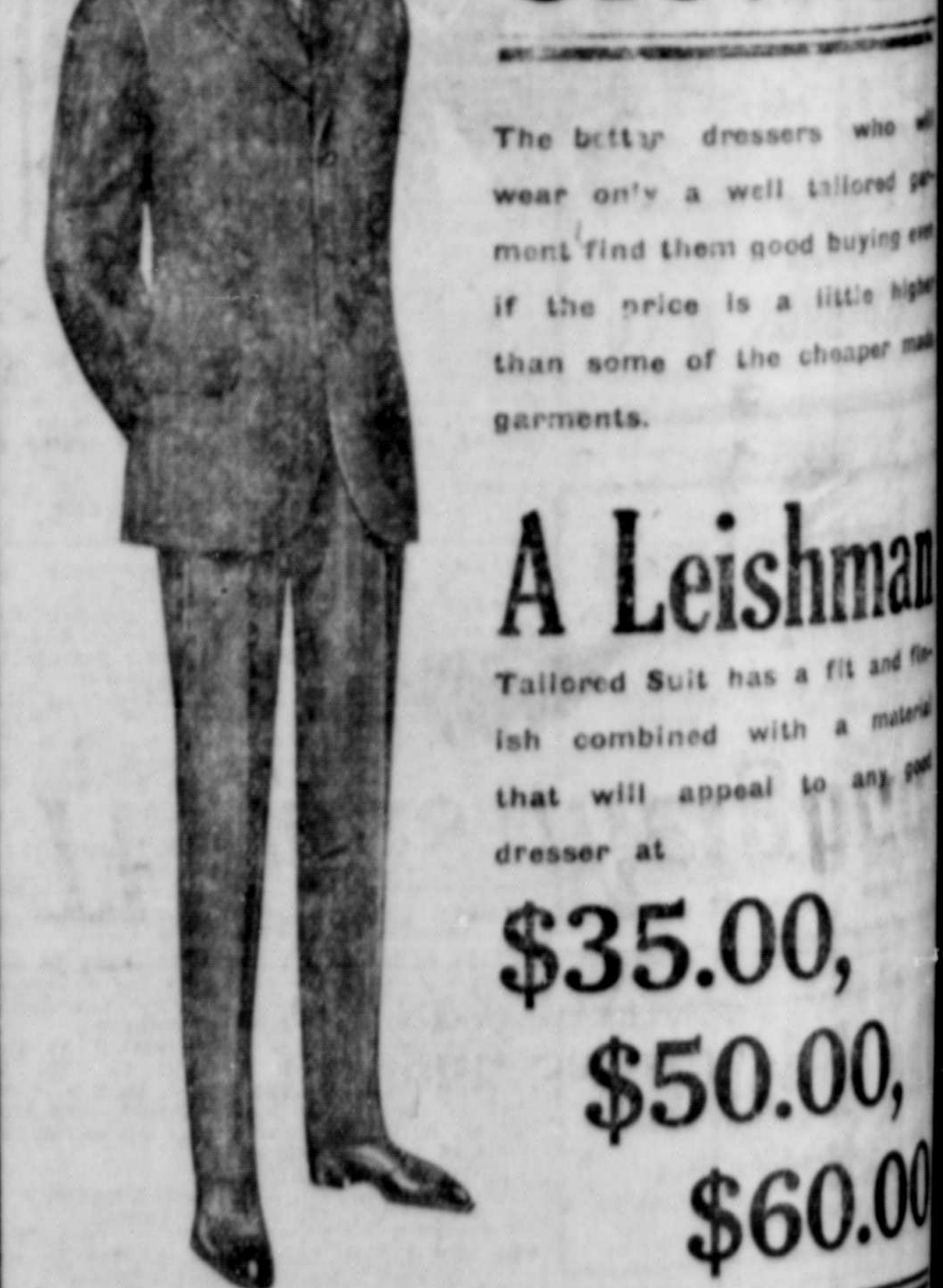
