Volstead Wants a New Liquor Bill

CONTINUATION MARINE STRIKE WOULD AFFECT ALASKA VERY SERIOUSLY

Commissioner Tells Rotary Club Details Regarding the Government Sale of Liquor

There will be no liquor stores opened by the liquor board but there will be liquor warehouses and offices. Orders for liquor will be placed at the office and delivery will be made from the warehouse to the person's home. That is the system of the liquor under the Moderation Act as outlined by Col. Winsby today at the Rotary Club luncheon. President Daby presided.

The delivery system is the backbone of the policy of the government. Continued Mr. Winsby. There will be no vendors, nor will there be any liquor stores. There will be a number of distribution points and not far away from these offices where the orders will be taken. The money will be paid through the office and the liquor will be delivered to any part of the city.

There will be called for the liquor, local commission will govern. Roughly the system is that the office will be open from 8 or 9 in the morning until 5 or 6 in the evening. It would be better to have the office open in the morning and later in the evening. The office would always be open where conditions are such.

The liquor will be established in the city of Prince Rupert at the George, Kamloops, Grand Forks, Penikese, Victoria, Nanaimo and other places. From these centres the liquor will be distributed to any part of the province. The office will be reached in a few hours. The office will be to the very best liquor at a reasonable cost.

The liquor will be obtainable either by order or by the keg direct from the breweries, where the board will have a representative at the brewery and the shipments are made to the customers of the Kettle Valley Railway Company to start work shortly on the construction of a railway line in a southerly direction from the south end of Dog Lake near Penikese, with a view to serving the new irrigation block at Osoyoos which is being put on the market by the provincial government.

Previous statements in the press that this work would not be undertaken this year were incorrect, said Mr. Coleman.

KETTLE VALLEY ROAD EXTENDED

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED PORT JAFFA

Following Serious Riots Between Moslems and Jews—Troops on the Way.

LONDON, May 5.—Martial law has been declared in Jaffa following rioting between Jews and Moslems in which forty were killed and two hundred wounded. The troops are hurrying across Palestine from Jerusalem.

TROUBLE CONTINUES IN UPPER SILESIA

Italians Led by British Officers Hold Poles at Bay.

OPPELN, Upper Silesia, May 5.—Two hundred Italians under British officers are holding off 3,000 Poles, who are attacking the city.

The Italian forces opposed artillery fire to the Poles who were attempting to occupy Gross Strelitz, the Poles replying with field guns.

GOVERNMENT STEAMER ASHORE IS REFLOATED

MONTREAL, May 4.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Exporter, which was ashore near Saloniki, has been refloated after 5,000 tons of cargo was removed.

VICTORIA, May 5.—Among the incorporations of the week is Corless Limited of Prince George, capitalized at \$10,000.

EIGHT KILLED IN ONE AMBUSH

Funeral Procession Fired on by Police When It Refused to Halt.

DUBLIN, May 5.—A sergeant and seven constables were ambushed and killed yesterday near Rathmore, County Kerry. One man only of the party escaped.

LIMERICK, May 5.—One civilian was killed and one wounded when the police fired on the funeral procession of a Sinn Féin man who was killed on Sunday. The procession disobeyed the rules and refused to halt when challenged.

United States Tightens Up on Selling of Beer Non-Beverage Liquors

WASHINGTON, May 5.—An attempt is being made to increase the efficiency of the prohibition amendment to the Constitution by adding more stringent regulations which will make it more difficult to secure liquor and will tighten up on the doctors who have been issuing prescriptions broadcast in some communities.

The new bill has been introduced by Chairman Volstead of the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives embodying the program of the Anti-Saloon League and is framed to argue that there is any real necessity for beer as medicine.

Leading doctors everywhere deny that it has any value for that purpose; besides, everything in beer except the alcohol can be had in the so-called near-beers without any prescription. Thirty-eight States prohibit beer from being prescribed.

The measure does not prohibit the use of wine, but it re-enacts in more specific language, if that is possible, the injunction that such prescriptions must be limited to the actual needs for medical use.

The bill aims to head off the issuance of regulations for the prescription of beer under the Palmer opinion, and reflects the determination of the prohibitionists to entrust the Commissioner of Internal Revenue and other administrative officials with the least possible discretion. The organization, which accounts this Congress as dry as the last, if not dryer, is confident of early passage of the bill.

Exclude Beer.

"The principal object of the bill that I have introduced today is to supplement provisions of the National Prohibition Act so as to meet the situation created by the opinion of former Attorney-General Palmer in regard to the use of beer and wine for medicine," said Representative Volstead. "That opinion in effect holds that the Commissioner of Internal Revenue has no power to limit the quantity of such liquors when prescribed, though the law expressly provides that the commissioner shall limit all permits."

Limit Doctors' Power.

Thirty Days Food Anchorage District Famine is Possible

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 5.—There is but thirty days' food in this district, which is threatened with famine if the marine strike is prolonged. Essential supplies are included in the cargoes held by the strike.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The marine engineers report that there is no hope of settlement of the strike after conferences with the Government and the strikers. The owners hold out on the main proposals and are willing to concede only minor changes in the working conditions.

GETTING READY TO TAKE COUNT REPUBLICANS ACCOUNT FOR THE LAST WEEK

John Flewin will Start His Enumerators in Skeena District June 1

The counting for the 1921 Dominion census will commence on June 1 and by that time all the enumerators will be in their fields, announced John Flewin, of Port Simpson, who is in charge of the census taking in Skeena riding, this morning. Mr. Flewin has been in the city a few days in connection with the arrangements for the census. He will be seen a good deal about the city during the course of the census taking.

All information of a personal nature taken at the forthcoming census will be received in strict confidence and will not be used for taxation purposes. The enumerators will make personal calls at all places and will fill out their schedules of information required on the premises. Among the questions asked will be sex, single or married condition, age, nativity of person and parents, year of immigration and naturalization, racial origin, education, occupation and total earning for year. There will be special schedules for farms and business calling for values and total production.

To avoid overlapping in the population count, a system of center cards is being used.

SASKATCHEWAN MAY FORECLOSE ON THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC

REGINA, May 5.—The Government of Saskatchewan may foreclose on the lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway in this province in order to protect their interests, following the payment of the interest on the bonds guaranteed by the province and defaulted by the Dominion Government. Premier Martin has the matter under consideration and a decision will be arrived at soon.

DRAMATIC SOCIETY TAKES MOVIE HOUSE

VICTORIA, May 5.—The Victoria Dramatic and Operatic Society has taken over the Oak Bay Theatre, a brick movie house constructed just before the war which has never been a financial success. The building is being renovated and dressing rooms built and all arrangements for making this the permanent home of the society.

The society is to put on "Erminie" on Monday evening next.

Claim Three Killed and Thirty-one Wounded Altogether; Many Raids.

DUBLIN, May 5.—Four policemen were killed and two wounded as the result of an ambush at Tournakedy.

Fifty-three revolutionary attacks were made during the week ending April 30, says the Republican Review which claims that the total casualties were two crown agents killed and thirty wounded while the republicans lost one killed and one wounded. There were 472 arrests and the crown forces are said to have destroyed seventeen premises.

GOVERNMENT IS SUPPORTED

Coalition Candidate Gets a Big Majority Over Labor at Hastings.

LONDON, May 5.—Lord Eustace Percy, a supporter of the coalition government led by Lloyd George, was elected to the House of Commons yesterday in a by-election in the Hastings constituency. The opposition candidate was a labor man who was defeated by a 2,250 majority. The result of the election is rather significant in view of the tense situation caused by the coal strike.

CANADIAN CATTLE ARE SHIPPED TO CARDIFF

The Port is Licensed for Admission of Bees to be Slaughtered.

LONDON, May 5.—Cardiff is the only port on the Bristol Channel licensed for the admission of cattle for immediate slaughter and there are consignments of Canadian cattle due there in May.

It is nearly fifteen years since Cardiff has received a cargo of Canadian cattle. The resumption of trade is the cause of great satisfaction.

155 VESSELS IDLE OWING COAL STRIKE

LIVERPOOL, May 4.—In Liverpool and Birkenhead docks there are 155 vessels idle, due almost wholly to the coal miners strike.

Right Policy Regarding Appointments.

The Dominion Government is to be congratulated on doing the right thing, in regard to the appointment of postmaster here. The policy of promotion is the correct one whenever possible. Mr. Morison had served faithfully in the position of deputy and his promotion to postmaster was the logical step.

There were a number of applicants for the position made vacant by the resignation of Mr. McLutsh and several of those applying would have made efficient postmasters, but in most cases they were without training in that particular line of work. They would have had to learn their duties from the assistant postmaster, who would, for some time at any rate, have been the real working head.

It would be no encouragement to members of the staff to work hard if the best positions were to be given to outsiders, as has been the custom in years gone by. The new system of promotion is the logical method of making appointments. We congratulate Mr. Morison on securing the position which is a very responsible one, in that it affects the life of the whole community.

Serving Public Is Unthankworthy.

The person who serves the public must usually expect little thanks for so doing. The people as a body are ungrateful and fickle. They change with every vagrant breeze. Today a man is a hero, tomorrow he is a rascal, possibly the next day he is again acclaimed as a public benefactor. Unhappy is the man who depends on public favor for a living or who can be seriously injured by a slight wave of unpopularity, for it is sure to come to him if he is much in the public eye.

The reward for service is in the act itself and in the consciousness of satisfaction in doing useful work. Sometimes work is recognized, but often it is not.

The man who serves the community in a business capacity is just as worthy of recognition as he who is to the fore in what is known as public life. Time was when civic, provincial or Dominion legislators served the people without pay. Then there was a measure of thanks coming to them. Today all are paid for their services, and the pay occasionally exceeds the value of the service rendered. Every man who serves well in ever so humble a position is deserving of the good will of the people.

Steel Corporation Big Wage Cut.

The wage cut one fifth made by the United States Steel Corporation, throughout their immense organization, is rather a drastic measure. Possibly, however, the big corporation feels that there will be further reductions in the cost of living and every reduction will be resented by employees so it is better to get it over at one fell swoop. Twenty per cent advance did not seem much during the advance in prices, but the twenty per cent cut does seem a lot. There is no intimation so far as to whether there will be a strike in the industry as a result. Possibly with the market in a bad condition, the corporation would rather welcome a shut down just now until there is a recovery in the business.

How Do You Spend Your Spare Time?

INGENIKA MINE TO BE WORKED

Is at Mouth of River West of Peace River Valley

EDMONTON, May 5.—After the expenditure of a large sum of money, and three years of pioneer prospecting, the Ingenika Gold Mining Company, Limited, is now in a position to prosecute an active mining enterprise during the coming summer. After overcoming tremendous difficulties in the way of transportation, the company's machinery is now located at the mouth of the Ingenika River, in the mountains west of the Peace River Valley, and everything is ready for active operation.

During the winter, two men were sent in to get everything in order and to overhaul the boats which will be used on the upper Peace and Findlay during the open season. Taking horses and supplies, the men went in during the sleighing season via the Spirit River route, and in consequence the bulk of the company's supplies are now at Rocky Mountain portage, ready for conveyance to the mouth of the Ingenika by boat.

HOME FOR MENTAL DEFECTIVES TO BE BUILT AT EDMONTON

EDMONTON, May 5.—Tenders will be called, in a few weeks for the erection of the Institution for Mental Defectives and the work will be rushed as fast as possible. Hon. George P. Smith, under whose department the new institution comes, states that they will build two units this year on the general plan as outlined by the provincial architect.

The two buildings to be erected this year will be dormitories, and the architect is planning some sort of temporary power plant. The plant that will supply heat and power for the entire plant would be much too large and expensive for the present demands. It is planned to accommodate about two hundred persons in the new buildings. The present buildings on the South side accommodate some 35 and these have been confined to children. However, with the larger accommodation, older persons will be admitted as well as children.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes, on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

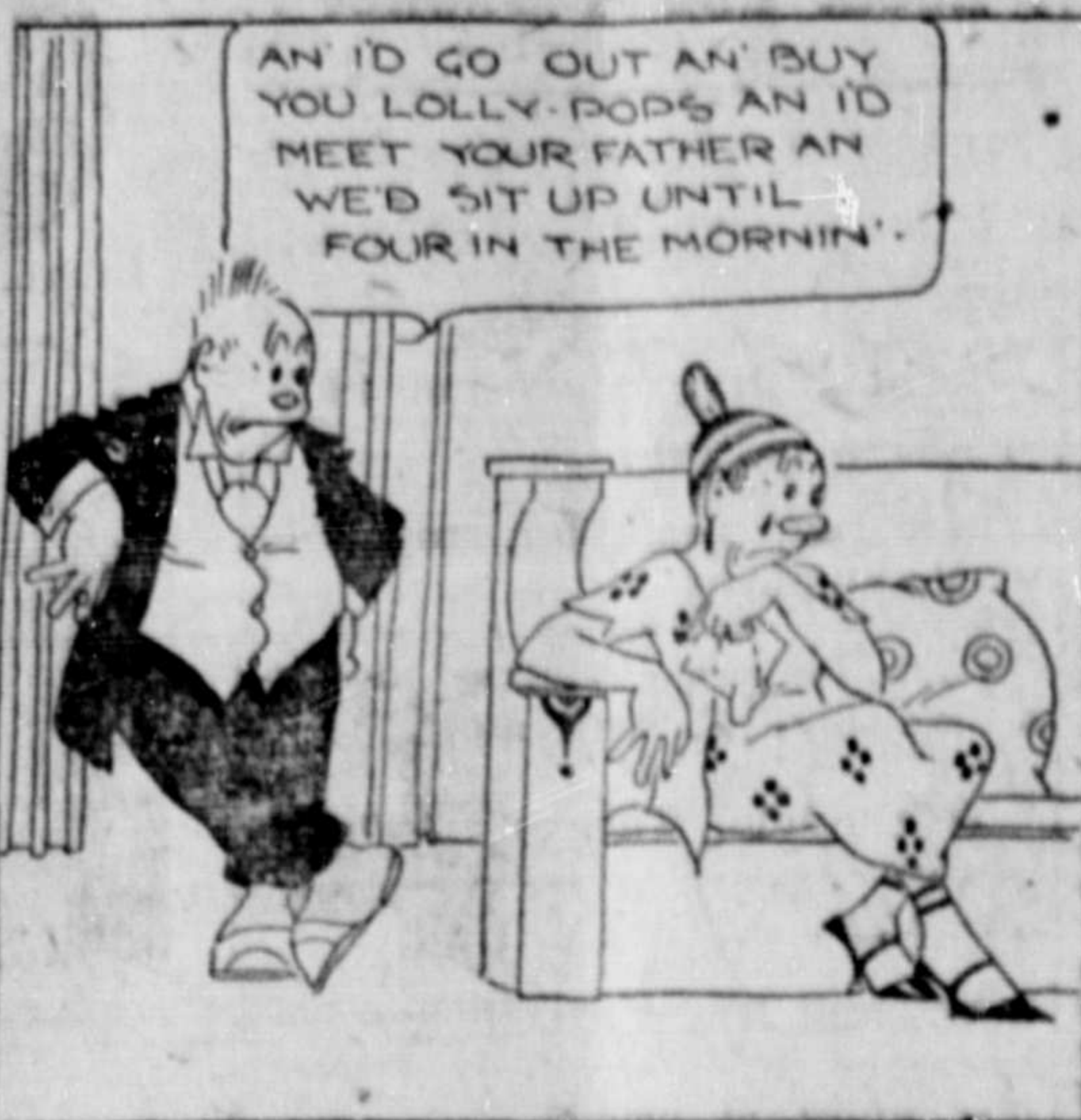
