Volstead Wants a New Liquor Bill

CONTINUATION MARINE STRIKE WOULD AFFECT ALASKA VERY SERIOUSLY

Commissioner Tells Rotary Club Details Regarding the Government Sale of Liquor

There will be no liquor stores opened by the liquor board but there will be liquor warehouses and offices. Orders for liquor will be placed at the office and delivery will be made from the warehouse to the person's home. That is the system of the liquor under the Moderation Act as outlined by Col. Winsby today at the Rotary Club luncheon. President Daby presided.

The delivery system is the backbone of the policy of the government. There will be no vendors, nor will there be any liquor stores. There will be a number of distribution points and not far away from these offices where the orders will be taken. The money will be delivered to any part of the city.

Orders will be called for the system, but if it is found that the board can do its own better and cheaper, they will call such a system.

Hours of Business
Orders will be called for the liquor, local points will govern. Roughly the board will have its office open from 8 or 9 in the morning until 5 or 6 in the evening. It would be better to have the office open later in the morning and later in the evening. There would always be open changes where conditions change.

Orders will be established in Prince Rupert at George, Kamloops, Grand Forks, Nanaimo, Victoria, and other points. From these centres orders will be sent to any part of the province. The board will be to the very best liquor at a reasonable cost.

Orders will be obtainable either by mail or by the keg direct from the breweries, where the board will have a representative at the brewery and that the shipments are made to the customers of the Kettle Valley Railway Company to start work shortly on the construction of a railway line in a southerly direction from the south end of Dog Lake near Penikese, with a view to serving the new irrigation block at Osoyoos which is being put on the market by the provincial government.

Previous statements in the press that this work would not be undertaken this year were incorrect, said Mr. Coleman.

Following Serious Riots Between Moslems and Jews—Troops on the Way.
LONDON, May 5.—Martial law has been declared in Jaffa following rioting between Jews and Moslems in which forty were killed and two hundred wounded. The troops are hurrying across Palestine from Jerusalem.

GOVERNMENT STEAMER ASHORE IS REFLOATED
MONTREAL, May 4.—The Canadian Government merchant marine steamer Canadian Explorer, which was ashore near Saloniki, has been refloated after 5,000 tons of cargo was removed.

EIGHT KILLED IN ONE AMBUSH
DUBLIN, May 5.—A sergeant and seven constables were ambushed and killed yesterday near Rathmore, County Kerry. One man only of the party escaped.

Funeral Procession Fired on by Police When It Refused to Halt.
DUBLIN, May 5.—A funeral procession of a Sinn Feiner who was killed on Sunday. The procession disobeyed the rules and refused to halt when challenged.

United States Tightens Up on Selling of Beer Non-Beverage Liquors

WASHINGTON, May 5.—An attempt is being made to increase the efficiency of the prohibition amendment to the Constitution by adding more stringent regulations which will make it more difficult to secure liquor and will tighten up on the doctors who have been issuing prescriptions broadcast in some communities.

The new bill has been introduced by Chairman Volstead of the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives embodying the program of the Anti-Saloon League and is framed to argue that there is any real necessity for beer as medicine.

The measure does not prohibit the use of wine, but it re-enacts in more specific language, if that is possible, the injunction that such prescriptions must be limited to the actual needs for medical use.

WINSBY SPOKE TO VETERANS
President of Victoria Branch Addressed Local Returned Men Last Night.

Col. W. N. Winsby, president of the Victoria branch of the Great War Veterans' Association, addressed the local branch last night and in the course of his remarks told of the new liquor bill in connection with which he is visiting the city. He appealed especially for the co-operation of the returned men and the citizens generally towards the successful operation of the act. Col. Winsby also dealt with subjects pertaining more specially to the work of the association.

Thirty Days Food Anchorage District Famine is Possible

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 5.—There is but thirty days' food in this district, which is threatened with famine if the marine strike is prolonged. Essential supplies are included in the cargoes held by the strike.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The marine engineers report that there is no hope of settlement of the strike after conferences with the Government and the strikers. The owners hold out on the main proposals and are willing to concede only minor changes in the working conditions.

GETTING READY TO TAKE COUNT REPUBLICANS ACCOUNT FOR THE LAST WEEK

John Flewin will Start His Enumerators in Skeena District June 7

The counting for the 1921 Dominion census will commence on June 1 and by that time all the enumerators will be in their fields, announced John Flewin, of Port Simpson, who is in charge of the census taking in Skeena riding, this morning. Mr. Flewin has been in the city a few days in connection with the arrangements for the census. He will be seen a good deal about the city during the course of the census taking.

All information of a personal nature taken at the forthcoming census will be received in strict confidence and will not be used for taxation purposes. The enumerators will make personal calls at all places and will fill out their schedules of information required on the premises. Among the questions asked will be sex, single or married condition, age, nativity of person and parents, year of immigration and naturalization, racial origin, education, occupation and total earning for year. There will be special schedules for farms and business calling for values and total production.

To avoid overlapping in the population count, a system of alternate cards is being used.

SASKATCHEWAN MAY FORECLOSE ON THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC
REGINA, May 5.—The Government of Saskatchewan may foreclose on the lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway in this province in order to protect their interests, following the payment of the interest on the bonds guaranteed by the province and defaulted by the Dominion Government. Premier Martin has the matter under consideration and a decision will be arrived at soon.

CANADIAN CATTLE ARE SHIPPED TO CARDIFF
The Port is Licensed for Admission of Beaves to be Slaughtered.

LONDON, May 5.—Cardiff is the only port on the Bristol Channel licensed for the admission of cattle for immediate slaughter and there are consignments of Canadian cattle due there in May.

DRAMATIC SOCIETY TAKES MOVIE HOUSE
VICTORIA, May 5.—The Victoria Dramatic and Operatic Society has taken over the Oak Bay Theatre, a brick movie house constructed just before the war which has never been a financial success. The building is being renovated and dressing rooms built and all arrangements for making this the permanent home of the society.

155 VESSELS IDLE OWING COAL STRIKE
LIVERPOOL, May 4.—In Liverpool and Birkenhead docks there are 155 vessels idle, due almost wholly to the coal miners strike.

Owing to the prevalence of mumps, the school attendance for April was not as high as for any other month this year. The number of pupils actually attending in the three schools, exclusive of the high school and Catholic School was 678. The daily average attendance was 612 and the percentage of attendance was 90.25.

The average for the present month is likely to continue low as the mumps are still keeping pupils at home.

SETTLE CASES WITH STATES

Washington So Satisfied with British Court, Asks All Cases Tried There

LONDON, May 5.—Within a few weeks the last of the cases resulting from wartime collisions between United States naval vessels and those of the British Ministry of Shipping will have been definitely settled, responsibility fixed and damages awarded. In October, 1919, the British and American governments agreed to the establishment of joint arbitration boards to adjudicate these cases, one to sit in Washington, the other in London. Cases relating to collisions occurring west of the 33rd meridian were to be heard in Washington; those east of this boundary, in London. From their decisions there was no appeal.

The object of their establishment was the speedy, equitable settlement of disputes without resort to the usual time-consuming and expensive battles before Admiralty courts.

U.S. Courts Disbanded

So satisfactory to both governments have been the decisions of the London board that the Washington tribunal has been disbanded and the cases awaiting its attention transferred to the London board for disposition. This was partly due to the belief that the London board possessed


