Giants Win Baseball Championship

TENS OF THOUSANDS UNEMPLOYED ACCOMPANY DELEGATION TO PREMIER

York Nationals Win Today's Game and World Series by Score of 1 to 0

PRINCE RUPERT, Oct. 13.—The New York Giants won the world series today by defeating the Yankees in today's game by a score of 1 to 0. Hoyt, the Brooklyn schoolboy who pitched the best of his career in the week's series, was unable to stop the Yankees, while Neff, the Giant hurler who lost two games yesterday, put up one of the finest exhibitions of his skill the Americans at bay throughout the contest. The Yankees had a double handicap. They were bereft of their offensive weapon, Babe Ruth, whose sudden sore throat had led him to refrain from pitching yesterday without McNally, who was hurt yesterday's game when he was hit by a line drive from the Yankees. The only run scored by the Yankees in the first inning was scored by Neff. The rest of the game was a close struggle. The Yankees made six hits to the Giants' four and the Americans had only one error.

SILESIAN QUESTION HAS BEEN DECIDED LEAGUE OF NATIONS

GENEVA, Oct. 13.—The League of Nations Council has decided the Upper Silesian question, prescribing a new frontier line based neither on the plebiscite nor on economic conditions and guarantees against the dislocation of existing economic conditions. The text of the decision has not yet been made public.

ATTENDANCE RECORDS ARE NOW SHATTERED

At End of Seventh Game Total Exceeded That of Other High Series by \$2,367.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—A new record in world series gate receipts was made yesterday when the grand total to the end of the seventh game reached \$804,791 or more than \$2,367 better than the previous high mark. Yesterday's receipts were \$118,974. The total for the entire series will run about the \$900,000 mark.

YOUTHFUL BANK ROBBERS FAIL TO MAKE GETAWAY

Are Arrested Two Hours After Occurrence When Automobile Breaks Down.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 13.—Five men implicated in the robbery of a bank at Elie yesterday were arrested within two hours following a breakdown to their automobile. The money taken did not amount to more than \$4000 or \$1200. The robbers were all young men about 20 years of age. One of them is believed to have escaped.

Heavy Police Garrison Watches When Workless Go to Downing Street

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Thousands of England's unemployed assembled at the Embankment this afternoon for the purpose of accompanying a deputation to Premier Lloyd George at Downing Street to demand "work or maintenance at the trade union rates of wages or relief scales." The deputation was allowed to proceed to its destination and was admitted to the Premier's residence. Elaborate police precautions were taken to cope with a possible demonstration. Thousands of police were stationed early this morning within a radius of one mile of Downing Street. Entrances to that thoroughfare were barred under heavy guards, while mounted police occupied the approach to Buckingham Palace and other vantage points.

FOUNDATION STONE TO BE TRULY LAID

Ceremony to Take Place Tomorrow Morning with Hon. T. D. Pattullo Officiating.

Arrangements have been made for the laying of the corner stone of the new Government Building at Market Square tomorrow morning at ten o'clock. The big stone arrived yesterday and on it is the inscription: "This stone was laid by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, October 15, 1921." Owing to transportation changes it has been found impossible to have the ceremony on Saturday hence the change to tomorrow morning.

OFFERED BIG MONEY LOAN IN AUSTRALIA

Treasurer of New South Wales Says No Intention of Borrowing in U. S.

SYDNEY, Oct. 13.—Americans are trying to obtain investments as high as one hundred million pounds in New South Wales and are offering a loan of that much if the state has difficulty in renewing its loans in England. Sir Joseph Cook, treasurer for Australia, told the Melbourne House of Representatives yesterday that the Commonwealth has no intention of borrowing money in America.

WOULD SEND UNEMPLOYED OVER OCEAN

Emigration Said to Be One of Measures of Relief Proposed in England.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Emigration and overseas settlement within the Empire is said to be one of the proposals considered by the government for the relief of unemployed. The scheme would probably involve Government grants to assist emigrants in getting to the lands of promise.

ANOTHER RUSH TO STAKE OIL LANDS
