Russian Soviet Money Was Stolen

CONFERENCE TO DISCUSS MEANS DEALING WITH UNEMPLOYMENT

Charged with Stealing Much Money from Russian Soviet Fund at New York; Said Be Financial Acrobat

NEW YORK, August 2.—Jacques Roberts Gibrario, 32 years of age, a wealthy man who controls twelve corporations, was up before the criminal court today charged with grand larceny of \$1,000,000, a fund belonging to the Russian Soviet Government. He was released on \$10,000.

CHARGED WITH STABBING

Man Reached City This Morning in Custody Constable D. S. Cameron. A Japanese, a Jap from Somers, reached here this morning in custody of Provincial Constable D. S. Cameron, charged with the stabbing of a countryman in a quarrel which took place in a cannery over some fishing.

POWER SUPPLY IS DISCUSSED

Negotiations for power supply to the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. were again discussed at the meeting of the City Council last night, but owing to the absence of T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, the matter was laid over. The company, at the request of the committee now dealing with the question, has submitted a new proposition to the city. The company intimates that it is agreeable to entering into a contract at once for the supply of a maximum demand of 500 horsepower at \$25 per horsepower, the minimum charge not to be less than \$500 per month. In the meantime, between now and June 1, 1923, when it is proposed to have the sulphite mill in operation, the company asks that the total charge not exceed \$3,000 per year and that lighting rates remain the same as now charged by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co.

HALIBUT IS PLENTIFUL

Landed Here in July amounted to \$5,777,000 Pounds. Grand total of 2,577,000 pounds of halibut was brought to this port in the month of July by private and company vessels. Of this total 2,000,000 pounds was handled by the Fish Exchange and the various buyers. In the month there was a supply of express refrigerators and there was at no shortage. The highest price paid on July 27, it being for first class fish. The price paid for first class fish for Eastern shipment was several days.

COLUMBIAN COLLEGE LADY PRINCIPAL DIES

MISS ALORA, Aug. 2.—Miss Alora, lady principal of Westminster Columbian, a noted educationist, died today following an operation to go to New Westminster. She was for twenty years a lady in Japan.

CONSULATE CLOSES DURING AFTERNOON FOR ELKS' FLAG DAY

In view of the proclamation of Mayor Rochester declaring Wednesday afternoon a legal half-holiday on account of the Elks' flag and field day, the American Consulate will also close during the afternoon. For the purpose of entering and clearing ships the consulate will be open from 7 to 2:30 in the evening.

Prospectors Bring Out Samples of Fabulous Richness to Anchorage. ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 2.—Prospectors arriving from the new mineral fields in the Girdwood belt bring samples of fabulous richness. The rush to the new bonanza is now on in full swing.

SCHOONER TAKEN IN CUSTODY OFF COAST OF UNITED STATES

Henry Marshall Had Cargo of Liquor and Flow British Flag. NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—The schooner Henry Marshall, carrying a cargo of liquor, was taken in custody four miles off the United States by a revenue cutter and brought here. She was flying a British flag but had no papers indicating British registry.

ALASKA CANNERY AT KENAI WAS BURNED

Libby, McNeill & Libby Company's Cannery Totally Destroyed and 125 Men Out. JUNEAU, Aug. 2.—The Libby, McNeill & Libby cannery at Kenai was totally destroyed by fire last Friday night, according to a wireless message picked up at sea by Captain Glascock of the Admiral Watson. The big cannery plant is now a smouldering mass of ruins, all buildings and machinery being destroyed.

PACIFIC CONFERENCE DROPPED BY BRITAIN

Will Take Part in Washington Conference as Originally Suggested. LONDON, Aug. 2.—Great Britain has dropped the proposal to hold a preliminary conference on Pacific questions and has agreed to take part in the Washington conference as originally suggested by President Harding, according to news given out in official circles.

FIRE DESTROYS PLANT OF CANNING CONCERNS

Dominion and Western Cannery and Shepherd Fruit Products Limited Gons. KELOWNA, Aug. 2.—A big fire of unknown origin destroyed the plants of the Dominion Cannery, Western Cannery and Shepherd Fruit Products Limited, the loss amounting in all to \$150,000. Coming in the middle of the canning season, it deprives the growers of an important market.

RUSSIA IS SUSPICIOUS

Wants Aid But Fears to Take It Because of Political Influence. RIGA, Aug. 2.—While Russia's appeals for foreign aid for starving people, the executive committee of the Third Internationale today sent from Moscow by wireless an appeal to the world proletariat, charging that the Governments of England and America desire in exchange for a piece of bread an opportunity to organize counter revolutions on Russian soil.

Meeting Called at Vancouver to Discuss Unemployment and Means of Finding Winter Work

VICTORIA, August 2.—In a bold attempt to ward off unemployment which is threatening next winter, Attorney-General Farris sent out a call to fifty great employers of labor in the province and also to financial men and the mayors of the cities to meet the government in conference and see if something can not be started in the way of business and industry. The conference will be held in Vancouver on August 10. In the invitation the Attorney-General said that many men faced the winter without work and without being fortified with summer earnings. Premier Oliver and other ministers will attend the gathering.

UNITED STATES WILL RELIEVE RUSSIA FAMINE

Points Out However This Does Not Involve Change Relation with Soviet. WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Following the release of American prisoners, the United States is preparing to spend a million and a half dollars monthly to relieve the famine in Russia. The Government announces that this action does not involve recognition of the Soviet or a change in relations with Russia.

Skipper of Fishing Boat Diamond T. Missing Since Last Friday at Midnight

Clouds of smoke swept into the main exchange at 11:30 o'clock.

ENRICO CARUSO SINGS NO MORE

Wonderful Tenor Passed Away Today Following an Operation Sunday. NAPLES, August 2.—Enrico Caruso, world-famous tenor, died today following an operation on Sunday. Heart weakness developed, necessitating an injection of camphor every two hours. The singer had a relapse a week ago from which he failed to recover.

MANY KILLED WHEN POST OFFICE FALLS RESULT EARTHQUAKE

ROME, Aug. 2.—Eight bodies have been recovered from the ruins and more are said to have lost their lives as a result of an earthquake here which caused the postoffice at Bari to collapse.

Cannery Tender Oceanic Recently Installed with Crude Oil Engine by Akerberg & Thompson.

The new engine is a Kalenberg semi-Diesel of 30-horsepower. The Kalenberg is coming more and more into favor on the Pacific because of its outstanding economic and powerful qualities. PARKING BYLAW IS BROUGHT IN

Proposed Regulations for Traffic On City Streets Introduced.

The City Parking bylaw came up for its initial reading at the meeting of the council last night and after long discussion, in which several criticisms were made and the city fathers wrangled about how they were going to get around certain points, progress was reported and the committee of the whole asked leave to sit again.

The bylaw has been prepared on recommendation of the Fire Chief and the Chief of Police and provides for regulation of traffic on all city streets especially in regard to car parking. It rules that on Third Avenue on Sixth Street between Second Avenue and Third Avenue on Comox Avenue and on Eighth and Ninth Avenues for a distance of two blocks of the junction with Comox Avenue, cars will not be allowed to park for a time exceeding ten minutes. On all other city streets, with the exception of certain streets noted, cars will not be allowed to park for more than thirty minutes. The streets where cars may park indefinitely are as follows: The south side of Second Avenue between Sixth and Seventh Streets; the East Side of Sixth Street between Third Avenue and Fraser Street; Fifth Street between Second and Third Avenues; Fifth Street between Third Avenue and Fraser Street; the east side of Third Street between Second and Third Avenue; the west side of Second Street between Second and Third Avenues; the North side of Second Avenue between McBride and Sixth Streets.

Fire Protection.
No vehicles will be allowed to stand within 25 feet of a fire hydrant or alarm box or within 10 feet of the street corners or public buildings or entertainment houses. On the approach of fire equipment all vehicles will be required to come to a stand immediately on the right hand curb of the street until all such equipment has passed. Careless, heedless or reckless drivers shall be prosecuted. The bylaw shall not apply to fire or police department vehicles, ambulances or hearses.

SEQUEL OF ACCIDENT

Ald. Perry Asks Board of Works Consider Protection at Dangerous Places.

In view of the calamity at the corner of Third Avenue and Eighth Street on Sunday evening which resulted in the death of little Buddy Rood, Ald. Perry, at last night's council meeting, pointed out that there had been two accidents of a similar nature to children at the same place before and asked that the Board of Works give consideration to the better protection of the public at such places. There were other places in the city streets that were dangerous. On McBride Street last year an extra guard rail had been put on. Ald. Perry moved that the Board of Works take the matter up.

Ald. Silversides, in seconding the motion, pointed out a similar danger at the corner of Second Avenue and Second Street. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Ald. Frizzell felt that it was little use putting up extra rails. Children would only climb over these and the results might be even worse. At the particular place where this last accident occurred, the ducks swimming in the pond below had proved an attraction to children.

Ald. Kerr pointed out that the regulation rails were already in. Ald. McNeill was also of the view that more rails would prove of little use.

At Seal Cove.
Ald. Perry also drew attention to the unsafe condition of the walk on Immanuel Street leading from Sixth Avenue to the Seal Cove School. The mayor stated that this would be repaired as soon as the lumber was available.

Speaking of the condition of the streets in the vicinity of Seal Cove, the city engineer suggested that the citizens in that section of town petition the council for new streets under the local improvement plan. A plan brought forth was for the building of a street on Jeffery Street from Eighth Avenue to Fifth Avenue, thence to Seal Cove and skirting the reserve around Seventh Avenue to Immanuel Street. Later Seventh Avenue might be extended to the waterfront block.

NO STAMPEDE FORT NORMAN

So Says Transportation Man Visiting in Prince George.

TWO COMPANIES ARE OPERATING AT SCENE

Charles Millar, president of the Alberta and Arctic Transportation Company, operating a fleet of steamers from Peace River and Fort McMurray to the Fort Norman oil field, as well as a line of boats to Hudson's Hope in British Columbia has arrived in the city says the Prince George Citizen.

Mr. Millar is fresh from the scene of the oil excitement in the far north, and being a man who is not easily stampeded, his impressions of the new oil district have more than piqued interest. In discussing the Fort Norman field Mr. Millar said it would take another year to definitely ascertain whether the field would amount to anything in a commercial way or not. At the present time there is only one well down. The hole has been capped for some time, but from the indications it was a gusher of considerable size when the oil was struck, everything in the vicinity of the well having been covered with oil. When he visited the well Mr. Millar said there was a small gas pressure of about 50 pounds, and when the valve was opened there was a strong flow of oil from a two-inch pipe, but he would not hazard a guess as to what the flow would be if the oil was being drawn off steadily. The grade of the oil was admittedly very high as it was found necessary to take out the gasoline content before attempting to use it as fuel.

To Sink More Holes.
The Imperial Oil Company is the owner of the well and is carrying on operations with a crew of about forty men. During the coming winter the company will sink two or three more holes about five miles from the present well and the result of their

winter operations will have an important bearing on the future development of the district.

The Imperial company has a strong competitor, a Toronto concern of which a Mr. Shepard is the head. It is generally known the manager of the Fort Norman Company has no special knowledge of the oil business, but he is very prominent in eastern Canadian financial circles, and has gathered around him some of the best oil men for the work he has in hand. This company commenced sinking a hole some time ago and expects to get oil during August, or by September at the latest. There is not the slightest doubt but what the company will have the second well in the district. The Fort Norman company is already an extensive holder of oil lands, having bought out a number of locators and has the equipment now on the ground for a comprehensive winter campaign, including the casing for two additional wells. As soon as the drilling rig can be spared from the hole now being bored it will be moved over to other locations that have been selected and the work of demonstrating the district will go steadily on.

No Stampeds There.
Mr. Millar says there is nothing in the nature of a stampede into the country, and he was not impressed with an unusual number of men being in the country. The passport system adopted by the federal authorities may be responsible in a measure for this condition as any man in the country may be called upon by the police to produce his papers. try did not amount to much and the work of deporting men would be tedious and expensive. But the system has no doubt kept a considerable number of men out.

Conditions Not Good.
Conditions generally throughout the field can hardly be considered as satisfactory, but between now and next summer they may be considerably improved if the worth of the district makes it an object. The chief trouble lies in the fact that the early locations at Fort Norman were made under Arctic conditions by lantern light and in the snow and ice. The Dominion regulations governing the location of oil lands require the planting of a corner post and, if the country is wooded, the blazing of a line from one corner of the location to the other, and if the location is made in an open country the locator is required to plant his post and show his boundary lines by the erection of monuments of some kind. The regulations do not fit the Norman field very well, more especially if the locations are to be made in the winter.

Regulations Evaded.

The present situation is that most of the evidences of location of the earlier claims have commenced their journey to the Arctic with the movement of the ice and snow. It is now freely stated the provisions of the regulations with respect to staking were not complied with in many cases. It can doubtless be successfully maintained that the physical features of the country were such that the regulations could not be met, but it will remain to be seen if this would be a good defence should anyone decide to test the legality of a claim located in this manner by jumping it.

One factor which will have a tendency to minimize any general jumping is the consolidation which has taken place in the holdings of the Imperial and Fort Norman companies. The two companies are by far the largest holders in the field, and there is little prospect of either of them contesting the other's holdings.
