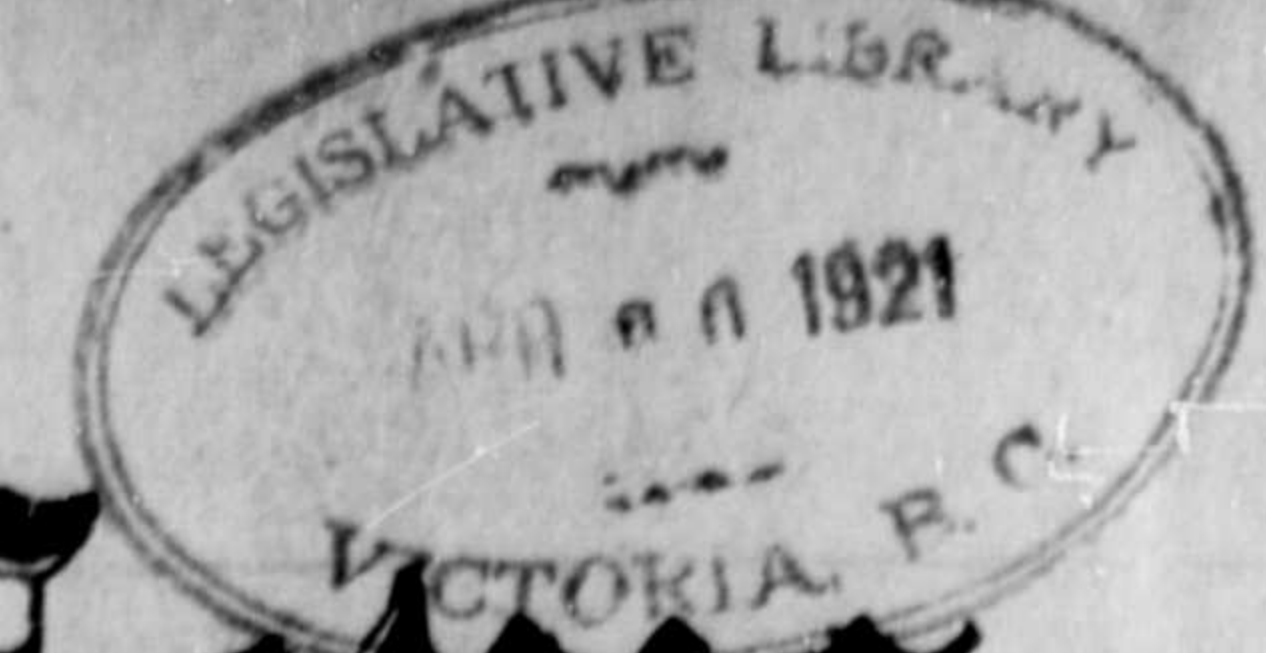

No Hope Now of Strike Settlement REFRIGERATOR FISH CARS ARE NOW UNDER CONSTRUCTION IN THE EAST

Industrial Conflict Seems Inevitable in Great Britain Since Negotiations Failed

LONDON, April 13.—Britain's triple alliance of labor will leave members from their posts at ten o'clock on Friday night, it was announced this morning. The decision follows the inability of the National Miners' Federation to reach an agreement with the mine owners and the Government in regard to a settlement of the miners' strike. The transport men including tramway and railway and tube railwaymen will all come out and the railwaymen. The miners are already out.

Prospects Yesterday.
LONDON, April 12.—Both sides of the mine owners and miners met Lloyd George and the miners' representatives will report late today to the triple alliance. The prospects of settlement, it is generally believed, are not impossible, although union officials said: "We get to come to grips on the proposal."
Measures to insure the safety of mines from floods have proceeded without hindrance in Fifeshire where 100 of the 61 pits are being worked.

COL. WINSBY TO ENFORCE LIQUOR ACT

Brother of Local Man to Act With Johnson and Falconer.

VICTORIA, April 13.—Deputy Attorney-General Archie Johnson, J. Falconer of Vancouver, and Colonel Winsby were this morning officially appointed to the liquor board to administer the Moderate on Act.
Colonel Winsby is inspector of schools at Victoria. He served overseas during the war and has always taken an interest in military affairs. He is a brother of Sid Winsby of Prince Rupert.

RAILWAY COMMISSION HEARS ISLAND CASES

Argument as to Whether Differentials in Lumber Charges Should be Abolished.

VICTORIA, April 13.—The question as to whether the differentials in lumber rates from points on Vancouver Island should be abolished, making the rates the same as from mainland and coast points was argued here yesterday before the board of railway commissioners.
A number of other cases of local application were also heard.

ESMONDE CASE WAS ADJOURNED TO FRIDAY

VANCOUVER, April 13.—The case of Gratton Esmonde, the alleged Irish envoy charged with sedition, has been adjourned until Friday.

Cars Are Being Built for Prince Rupert Fish Trade and First One Completed

James J. Lee, secretary of the local branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association, received a letter this morning from Secretary Wallace of the head office as follows:
"We are advised by our Mr. Thompson at Toronto that a number of our staff went over to the National Steel Car Company's plant at Hamilton on April 1. He interviewed the works superintendent and reports that a sample refrigerator car has now been practically completed and all the others have been started and are being put through the shops.
The company state that they expect to have the whole of the order completed within a month or six weeks at the latest. It is trusted this will prove good news to your colleagues in Prince Rupert."

"PUSSYFOOT" CHASED OUT

Prohibition Advocate Met with Hostile Reception in Border City of Windsor

WINDSOR, April 13.—"Pussy-foot" Johnson, the well known prohibition advocate, was not allowed a hearing by a hostile audience which faced him when he attempted to address a meeting on Monday night.
It was necessary to provide a police escort to accompany him to the American border which he lost no time in crossing. He was a target for all kinds of missiles from rotten eggs to cabbages.

RAILWAYS ARE CRY OF BATTLE

Opposition Member From Nova Scotia's Clashes w/ Minister of Marine in Debates.

OTTAWA, April 13.—The Canadian Government merchant marine was again the gauge of battle in the House of Commons on Monday. The prime minister accepted the personnel of the standing committees which are to inquire into the government-owned railways and shipping. Subsequently the house went once more into supply on the marine estimates.

John H. Sinclair, the opposition member from Antigonish and Guysboro, Nova Scotia, argued that the connections with the government owned tramp steamers should have ceased with the signing of the armistice.
Hon. C. G. Ballantyne, minister of marine, resented the charge that the steamers were too slow for co-operation with the government railways and declared that Canada had done only what other countries had done.

NICHOL'S CONDITION QUITE SATISFACTORY

Lieutenant Governor is Restless, but Not Serious—Six Weeks in Hospital

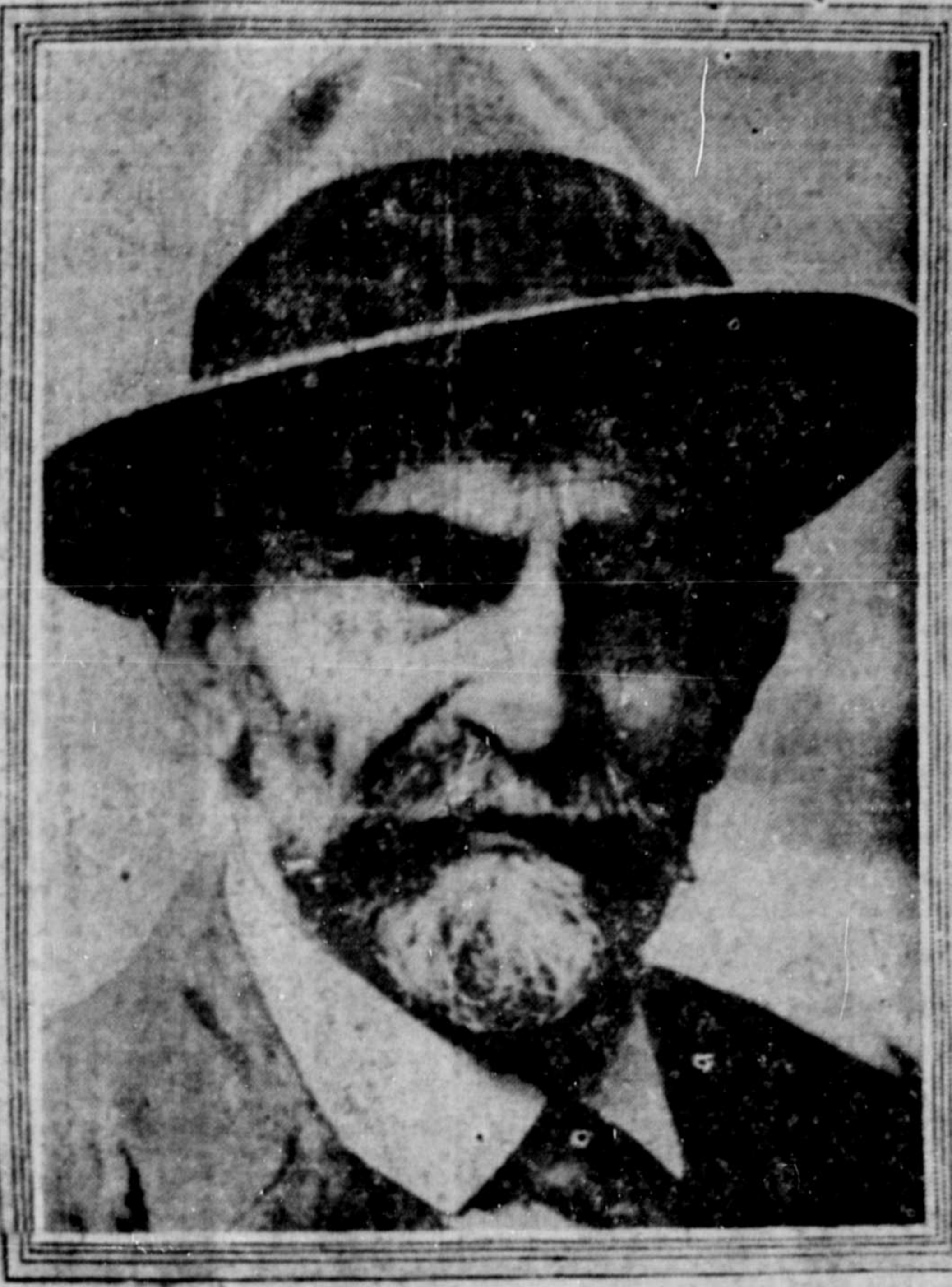
VANCOUVER, April 13.—Lieutenant Governor W. C. Nichol, who was operated on for abdominal trouble last week, will be confined to the hospital here for five or six weeks. Although he is somewhat restless his general condition is considered very satisfactory.

CHINESE ARRESTED FOR DRUG TRADING

Alleged Wong Way Ran Wholesale Business which Ran into Half Million Dollars

VANCOUVER, April 13.—Wong Way, a prominent Chinese merchant, has been arrested here charged with trafficking in drugs. It is stated that his turnover in opium, cocaine and other drugs in the last year was over half a million dollars.

World's Most Famous Anarchist a Hunger Striker.



Enrico Malatesta is the most famous anarchist in the world. He is the recognized leader of the anarchist brood wherever it rears an evil-minded head. Half a dozen countries the world over have a price upon his head, and he has escaped them. He has been in prison times without number and has always been released after serving a short sentence. He is in prison in Milan, Italy, where he has been confined since last October, and will probably never leave the prison alive. He is on a hunger strike, and despite his sixty-six years of age he kept himself in perfect health until he went on the hunger strike a few days ago. Malatesta is becoming weak and his condition is becoming critical. Hope that the celebrated anarchist will soon recover is being abandoned, and now the death of the recognized leader is expected momentarily.

Road to Galloway Rapids May Be Built This Year If City Constructs Part

It is quite probable that a road may be built this year to connect Prince Rupert with Galloway Rapids as the first section at this end of the trans-provincial motor road between the coast and Alberta by way of the Skeena, Buckley and Nechaco valleys. The matter was discussed at a meeting of the council of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon and was referred to the civic committee consisting of George Tite, T. H. Johnson and H. E. Pullen to take up with the city council and with Mr. Pattullo.

W. E. Williams, president of the Board of Trade, said he had received an intimation that if the city would build their portion of the road to connect with the provincial road at the city limits, the provincial government would very probably build from there along the waterfront past Bulze Rapids to Galloway Rapids, a distance slightly over five miles, and the work would probably be done this year. He suggested that a committee meet the city council and find out if they would do their share providing the provincial government does its. They could then take it up with Mr. Pattullo who was expected in town within the next few weeks and there was a possibility that they would get the road built.

Matter of Route.

Several of the aldermen were present and the matter of route was discussed. It seemed to be the general opinion that the city section of the road would go out from Eleventh Avenue by way of Frederick Street, Prince Rupert Boulevard and Shawatlans Road, meeting the provincial road close to the waterfront at the city limits. This section of the road is nearly a mile in length but part of it already has a trail wide enough for the city tractor to use and with a good grade. There is no intention of bridging Galloway Narrows this year but it is understood that will be done in the near future after the road is constructed. The road will then be built along the Skeena to the canaries.
The trans-provincial road will in all probability not go by way of the Skeena, but it is possible it may go by way of Clowah Bay to the head of Wark Canal and through a good grade to the Klutzevmaaten valley and the Kitsumkalum River and Terrace. This route has not yet been surveyed but it is said to be much more feasible than the Skeena River route.

States Should Keep To Reservations Is Opinion of Harding

WASHINGTON, April 13.—President Warren G. Harding, in his initial address to Congress, announced that he would approve the "declaratory resolution" by Congress "with qualifications essential to protect all our rights." Thus "the technical state of war against the Central Powers" would be ended.

The president added, however, that "it would be idle to declare for separate treaties of peace when one would be adequate. Because the situation is so involved our peace engagements cannot ignore the relationship with the Old World and the settlements already effected. Neither is it desirable to do so in preserving our own rights and contracting our future relationships." The president declared that, at the same time, he was unreservedly opposed to the existing League of Nations.
The provisions made for the confirmation of American rights and interests achieved by reservations framed already should be maintained. Absolute freedom from inadvisable commitments should be also reserved.

FREIGHTS ON LUMBER ARE DOWN

Drop of \$4.30 a Thousand to Enable B. C. Mills to Compete.

VANCOUVER, April 13.—A reduction of freight rates on lumber and shingles shipped from British Columbia to eastern Canada amounting to about \$4.50 a thousand will become effective on April 21 as a result of a decision of the Canadian Railway Association. The reduction is made for the purpose of assisting the British Columbia lumbermen to compete with the lumbermen of the southern states.

DISARMAMENT RESOLUTION IN CONGRESS

Senator Borah Makes First Move in Authorizing President to Negotiate

WASHINGTON, April 13.—The first move of the present Congress looking to disarmament came today with the introduction by Senator Borah of his resolution authorizing the president to open negotiations with Britain and Japan for a reduction of naval building.

CONFIDENCE GAME PLAYED AT VICTORIA SASKATCHEWAN MAN

SEATTLE, April 13.—Comrade Emde of Imperial, Sask., lost \$5,000 in a fake mining stock deal, according to word to the police from Everett. The man is supposed to have met two confidence men at Victoria, who promised to let him in on a "rich mine" on the ground floor.

ESTIMATES UNDER FIRE IN COMMONS

Closure to be Applied Today to Force Vote on Navy and Shipbuilding

OTTAWA, April 13.—The House of Commons adjourned at midnight after 33 hours' continuous session. The naval estimates, it is announced, which have been subject to opposition, will be forced through under closure today, the vote coming automatically at two o'clock on Thursday morning.
The bitterest debate was over the shipbuilding program.

SHOT TO DEATH ON THE STREET

W. F. Salsbury, Son of C.P.R. Treasurer, Killed Last Night at Vancouver

BELIEVED VICTIM TWC HOLDUP MEN

VANCOUVER, April 13.—William F. Salsbury, accountant for Balfour, Guthrie Co. and son of W. F. Salsbury for years local treasurer of the C.P.R., was shot to death last night on Georgia Street west near Burrard Street by an unidentified man who escaped.
Salsbury was shot through the heart, dying a few minutes after. It is believed that he resisted two holdup men.
Mr. Salsbury was 43 years of age, unmarried, and was prominent in the commercial life of the city.

CHIEF JUSTICE GREAT BRITAIN

Sir Alfred Lawrence Gets Appointment Succeeding Earl Reading.

LONDON, April 13.—Sir Alfred Lawrence has been appointed Lord Chief Justice to succeed Earl Reading. He is an old man, being now 78 years of age. Fifty-two years ago he was called to the bar and since that has been actively engaged in study of law either as a practising lawyer or as judge.

Lumber Business May Improve.

As a result of the decision of the railways to lower the rate on carrying lumber from the Pacific coast, there may be an improvement in the lumber business of this district. Last autumn the railway commission advanced the rate very considerably and as a result the business was cut off completely, and the railways were idle in so far as that business was concerned. After waiting a long time to see if there would be a revival the railways have decided that they must drop the prices in order to induce business. This was not done by the railway commission but by the railway association which is an organization that includes representatives of all the Canadian railways.

The sad thing seems to be that the railway commission did not use better judgment than to order such an advance in rates as to kill the business. The railways also seem to have been so anxious to extract the last dollar from the business that they injured themselves in doing so.

Strike Settlement Failure Regrettable.

It seems regrettable that there is to be industrial war in Great Britain as a result of the failure of the negotiations between the Government and the miners. The outcome will certainly be injurious to everyone. If the big strike goes into effect there will be all sorts of hates engendered and it is not improbable that actual bloodshed will follow. This industrial warfare is real war and might is apt to win just as often as right.

Good News Regarding Cars.

It is good news in regard to the refrigerator cars and those who have given so much of their time and energy to getting the matter under way will feel elated over the outcome. The government, yielding to the pressure of public opinion, seems now to realize that fish cars must be provided and the work is going on. We shall all welcome the sight of the first of them here, after the strenuous time we have had in trying to make the authorities realize the necessities of the business.

Road to Skeena Is Next Move.

There seems to be a possibility of getting a road built to the mouth of the Skeena River in the near future, this to be the first section of the road to connect Prince Rupert with the interior of the province. It is a momentous move and if we can get it going this summer it will be a great thing for the city.

It is difficult to realize just what it would be like to be able to drive or walk to the back end of the island over a good motor road. We have become so used to the panned in condition that it will be a wonderful change to be able to drive out into the country.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

NO MONEY IN VLADIVOSTOK

Plenty of Necessities But Little Cash With Which to Pay.

TOKIO, April 12.—Residents of Vladivostok have plenty to eat and plenty of clothes, but no money, according to a correspondent of the Kokusai News Agency who has just returned from that city.

"Good beef can be purchased for 20 cents a pound," he says, and continues: "A good suit of clothes costs about one-third what they do in America and other things in proportion. The only thing the people lack is money to spend. Coin has virtually disappeared from circulation and nobody will accept the paper notes. Wages, even of government employees, are paid in food, clothes and tickets for use with the public utilities.

"The plenty of these necessities is explained by the fact that huge stores have been imported into Vladivostok for shipment into the interior and are being held there indefinitely. These stores are being drawn upon.

Outsiders Starving.
"A few miles out of Vladivostok to the north conditions are very different. There the population has neither money nor supplies, and hunger and cold have taken liberal tolls of the Russians. The Chita authorities have been sending clamorous demands that Vladivostok share her supplies with the rest of Siberia, a call to which the local authorities have shown no disposition to respond, even if the Japanese would let them.

"These latter have been taking the stand that until it is certain that Japan will not have to fight China they will not permit the exportation of anything that may later be used against the Japanese forces.

"The lack of acceptable money in Vladivostok is resulting in business stagnation. Anyone with good money can buy anything he wants and cheaply but in its absence nothing can be sold. Business houses are fast closing their doors and factories are shutting down."

SURVEYORS TRICKED BIG BLACK BEAR SO NOW HAVE HIS HIDE

New Westminster Surveyor Kills Bruin with Axe while Assistant Attracts Attention

EDMONDS, April 13.—Without the aid of gun, capturing a bear weighing 200 pounds and putting him to sleep within fifteen minutes of their unexpected meeting, was the feat of Roy Horie, surveyor, and C. L. Latimer, his companion, within a mile of New Westminster's city limits recently. Bruin happened to cross the surveyor's lines. While Latimer attracted his attention with a pole, Horie cautiously advanced with an axe and now has a fine black, glossy hide.

BRING FARMERS INTO COUNTRY

Effort Being Made by Colonization Concern with Aid of Governments

BRANDON, Man., April 13.—In addressing the Canadian Club here recently M. A. Brown, vice-president of the Western Canada Colonization Association, said that organization would bring thousands of settlers to the prairie country and that the governments of the day might well be expected to co-operate heartily in the great task. Just as a wide-awake merchant spent money in attracting new business to his store, so governments should spend reasonable sums in promoting agricultural colonization, he said. Without more people on the land Canada could not carry its huge national debt, eliminate the deficit on the national railways, or get back to a prosperous business basis. If the national railways would expend two per cent of their annual deficit for the next five years on the settlement of vacant lands along their lines, the serious transportation problem, which now confronts the country, would soon be solved. If the national and western provincial governments would expend one-half of one per cent of their annual budgets on the encouragement of land settlement the country would soon overcome its grave financial difficulties, he declared.

Selling Resources
There was no difference between selling merchandise and selling the resources of the country. He was thankful to say that the Association was now assured of the fullest co-operation from both governments and railways. The speaker said that under the driving force of Major-General McEwen's personality, the Western Canada Colonization Association was certain of achieving the object for which it was organized.

WIVES FOR LONELY PRAIRIE BACHELORS

Salvation Army to Bring Thousands to Canada to Become Housewives

WINNIPEG, Man., April 13.—"What Canada needs is population," declared General Brainwell Booth, of the Salvation Army, here recently on his way home from an extended tour of Canada and the United States. "Thousands of men in the west have no opportunity of marrying, men who need good wives to help them make homes. Canada needs more than anything else, women who are willing to marry and raise families, to be brought up with a full understanding of Canadian ideals."

So for the thousands of men who are lonely the Salvation Army has plans afoot to bring thousands of British girls to western Canada to become "prairie housewives."

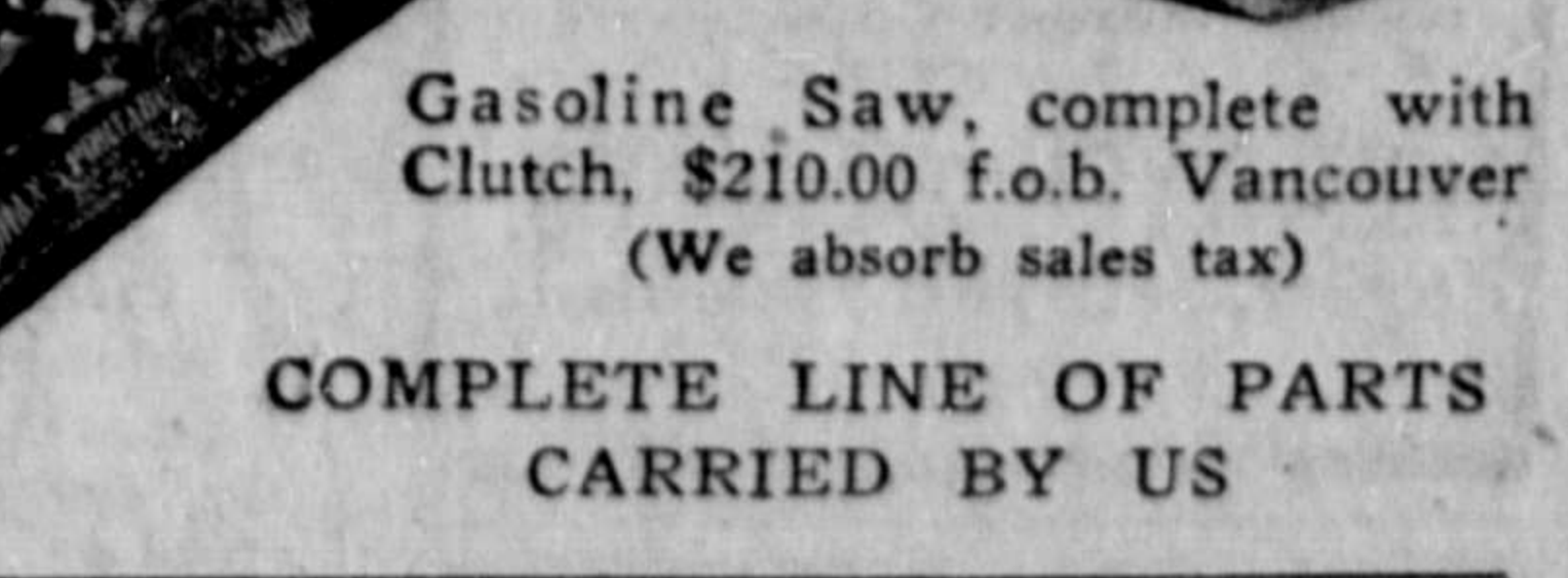

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FOX DAY AT FUR AUCTION

Average Prices Realized Yesterday Were 30 per cent Advance.

NEW YORK, April 13.—Today was "Fox Day" at the annual spring fur auction in the Masonic Hall here with blue fox easily the star of the proceedings. The quantity offered was small and the quality was such that active bidding drove the average prices 30 per cent above the levels obtained at the winter auction in this city last January. The fresher and better grades of silver fox advanced 25 per cent over winter prices but the black, steel and poor skins showed a decline of that amount. Cross fox also brought good prices but the average figures obtained for it were practically the same as in January.

While foxes brought prices 25 per cent above those paid at the winter sale of the New York Fur Auction Sales Co., with all grades of red fox unchanged, gray fox and Australian fox showed declines of 20 and 15 per cent respectively. Kolinsky showed no change.

Muskrats.
 The muskrats registered these percentage of increases over the winter auction levels: Brown, 20; black, 10, and southern, 25.

Sales for the two days were about \$800,000.

TRADES AND LABOR DISCUSS CITY LIGHT

Says They Think Rates Should Be Reduced—Demand Investigation Police Shooting.

At the regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night the matter of the city light and its profits was taken up and the council was of opinion that a municipal plant making money should be used to save money for the citizens and that cheaper light should be given to the people, believing that if the light was cheaper more would be consumed.

Letters were ordered sent to the city council, provincial police and attorney-general demanding a fuller inquiry into the recent shooting at the city police station and that immediate steps be taken in the matter.

A letter from Colonel C. W. Peck was read telling of his interview with Mr. Warren while in Winnipeg and thanking the body for a letter of thanks sent him on behalf of the workers at the drydock.

The council ordered that a letter be sent to the school board calling attention to the number of children under fourteen years of age working in local industries.

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TOM MIX HERE IN BLOODCURDLING STORY

Ferocity of Hate Between Warring Clans Illustrated in Picture at Westholme.

Kentucky's famous feuds and tragedies form the theme of "The Feud," the new Tom Mix feature at the Westholme Theatre tonight.

In this thrilling photoplay Mix plays the part of Jerk Lynch, son of a feudist family. Jealous, forgetful of the heritage of hate, falls in love with the daughter of the enemy, played by pretty Eva Novak. The feud breaks out with renewed intensity when the love affair is discovered. Jerk's father is shot down before his eyes. Jerk, stung into action, takes his father's revolver and slays the assassin.

Although these scenes verge upon the bloodcurdling, they do not exaggerate the ferocity of the warring clans. Many of the Kentucky feuds have been written in American history with letters of blood.

At midnight splendid refreshments were served in the supper room upstairs. R. G. Frizzell was master of ceremonies and H. Weber was on the door. Among those who assisted towards making the event such a success were H. Astori, L. Astori, S. Bazzett-Jones and V. Maxwell. It's likely that the Red Sox will put on another dance before long. The proceeds are to be devoted to the purchasing of uniforms and other supplies for the ball team.

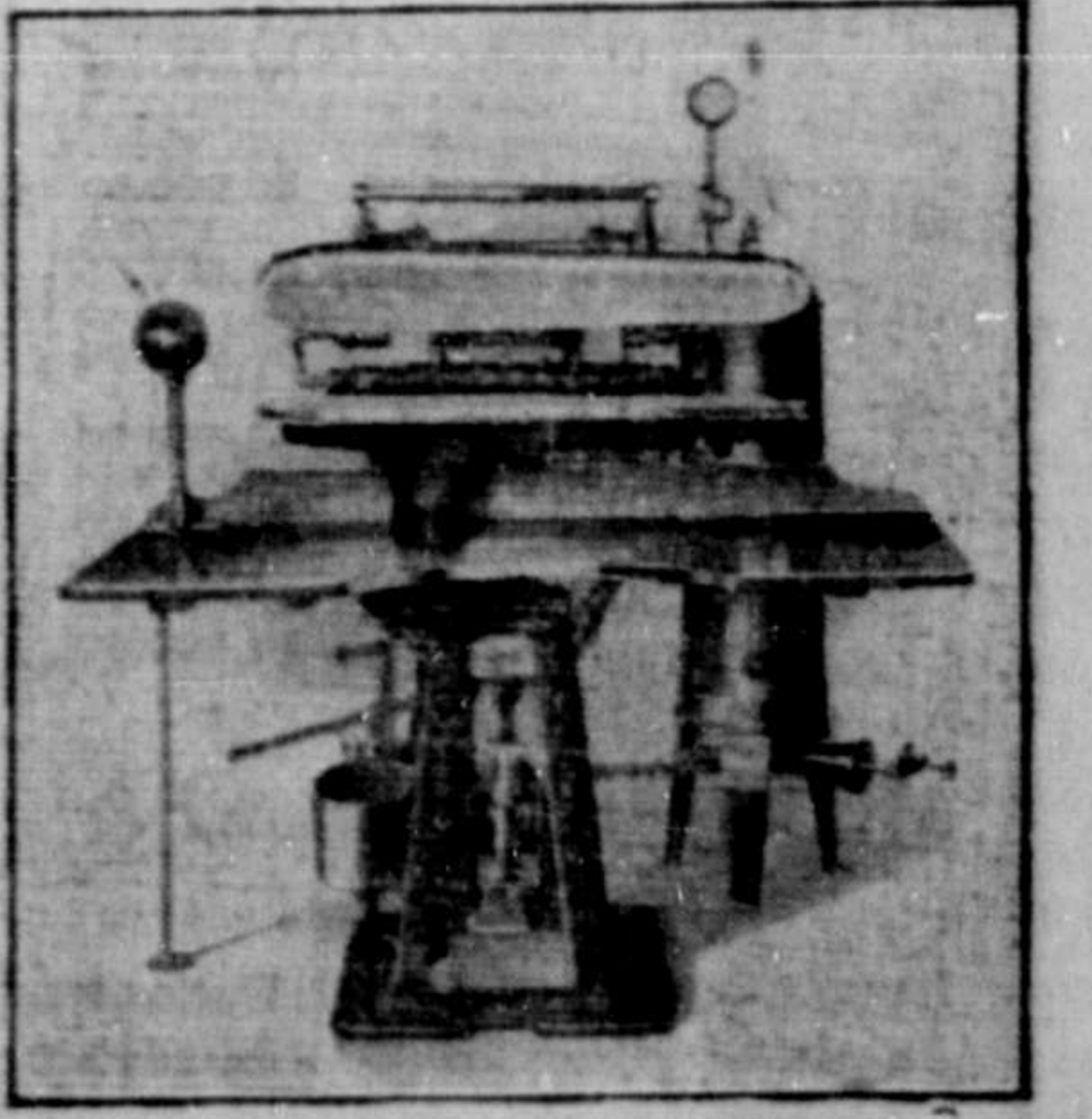

REFINE GASOLINE NEAR THE OIL WELLS

Small Plant to be Built Close to Fort Norman Gusher

Gasoline will be made at Fort Norman this summer, says the Prince George Citizen. It is not expected that any commercial quantity of the motor spirit will be produced until some means of transportation is within sight, but it is the intention of the Imperial Oil Company to manufacture enough for its own use in the north, with possibly some for sale to others doing development work down the Mackenzie.

A small plant will be built for the purpose at Fort Norman, the necessary material being already on the ground. The condensation process will be used, and the oil recently struck in the Imperial Oil well is known to be of sufficiently high petrol content to make the production of gasoline in this way feasible.

The aeroplanes on the northern route will thus have the gasoline problem solved for them, and power boats on the Mackenzie will use the home-made product. It is expected that the gas still will be got to work in the early part of the season.

CANADIAN LUMBER ON BRITISH MARKET

Spruce is Weak and Little Advance Buying is Done

LONDON, April 13.—Prices for Canadian lumber in the British market are still at a low level although there are indications of a bettering in the general demand for lumber in the near future and many dealers report that they are now able to move stocks laid in in 1920 prices, but there is little long term buying being done for 1921. The advice being given by the various lumber-trade journals to the British purchaser is not to buy or contract at the present time, but rather to dispose, even at less profit, of some of the stocks on hand.

The Timber Trade Journal thus reviews the market situation in a recent issue: "The spruce market is very weak. Even Quebec spruce of first and second quality does not bring anything like its reputed value; 3 by 9 first Quebec spruce at £18, 10s., 3 by 6 seconds at £27, 10s. and 3 by 5 seconds at £25, 10s. are certainly low sales. Halifax 2 by 6 unsorted spruce went as low as £20 while St. John 3 by 4 sold at £23, 10s. At the present time spruce is cheaper than anything else in the wood market.

RAILWAY TO TAP RICH MAYO MINES

Charter Granted by Dominion Government to Company Capitalized at \$750,000.

A bill has been passed at Ottawa incorporating the Mayo Valley Railway Ltd., with a capital of \$750,000 with head office at Dawson. It has power to issue securities and to borrow money.

The company may lay out, construct, equip and operate a line of railway commencing from a point at or near the junction of the Mayo and Stewart Rivers in Yukon Territory, in a northerly direction, following the valley of the Mayo River to its junction with

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments
Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2 an acre.
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-forest land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.
Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements valued at \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.
Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires same in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one purchaser or several. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions include payment of stumpage.
Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.
No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.
Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.
Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots paid by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1929.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Association for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to 100 head.
