## Coal Strike Continues in Great Britain

### CONSERVATIVES HEADED BY BOWSER WERE SOLID AGAINST PRINCE RUPERT

#### Pattullo's Big Fight to Get Money for Court House Voted by the Legislature

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, had to put up a bill for the Legislature to get the \$200,000 appropriation for new buildings at Prince Rupert, including the court house, approved by the Legislature on Saturday last.

Mr. Ramsay, Liberal member for Vancouver, started the fight of the vote.

Hon. J. B. King, minister of public works, explained that the government buildings at Prince Rupert are not adequate for the employees and that government services are in rapidly in the north country. The \$200,000 vote is to be used for construction work for next year. Ultimate cost of buildings will be about \$300,000.

Mr. King said there should be a full order to spend at Prince Rupert for buildings," said R. H. Jones, Conservative member for Prince Rupert. He declared that the Government could not be accused of showing favoritism to the ridings of Liberal members, as in his district the public works appropriation this year is considerably less than it was last year when a Conservative represented the riding.

Mr. Jones moved that the Prince Rupert building vote be struck out altogether. The Conservatives voted with Mr. Jones with the exception of William Hunter, of Skeena, who with Thomas Menzies and Kenneth Duncan, Independents, voted with the Government.

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#### DEMPESEY MAY BOX AT HARRISON, N.J., MIDSUMMER DAY

SEATTLE, April 7.—It is rumored at Dempsey's headquarters here that the Carpenter-Dempsey fight will be held at Harrison, New Jersey, on Friday, June 24.—There are all sorts of difficulties to be overcome in arranging for the place to hold the bout. There are local prejudices to avoid and good communication with New York is important.

#### AUSTRALIANS LEADING IN BICYCLE RACE

Over Thirteen Hundred Miles in Eighty-four Hours.

CHICAGO, April 7.—The Australian team of Garry and McBeath are leading in the six-day bicycle race. They had covered 1,310 miles and seven laps at eleven o'clock this morning at the close of the 84th hour of the grind. They are a lap ahead of all opponents.

#### WOULD CONTINUE UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

Mayor Gale of Vancouver Discussing Matter With the Government.

VANCOUVER, April 7.—The mayor and city council officer are conferring with the Provincial Government in Victoria today. They are demanding a continuation of the one-third allowance in the Vancouver unemployment relief.

#### INTERNAL RUMBLINGS IN MOUNT VESUVIUS

#### SINN FEIN IS AGAINST TALBOT

Says His Appointment an Attempt to Use Religion for Propaganda.

DUBLIN, April 7.—Sinn Fein declares that the appointment of Lord Talbot to be Lord Lieutenant of Ireland is an attempt on the part of the British Government to turn the name of the appointee and his religion into propaganda. It declared that the Irish question is non-sectarian. A Catholic as an agent of tyranny will be repulsive to Irish Catholics, the statement says.

#### S.S. GOVERNOR HAS BROKEN UP

#### PROTEST AGAINST ACTION OF GERMANY

PARIS, April 7.—The council of ambassadors have drafted a note of protest to Germany against that country refusing access to the Kiel Canal to the British steamer Wembleton last charter to a French company month. The vessel was under with materials for Poland.

#### U.S. RETAINS RIGHTS IN YAP

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Declaring that the United States retains rights in the German colonies as the principal contributor to the victory over Germany, a Government note to the Allies presumes that they awarded the Island of Yap to Japan under a misapprehension which it trusts will be reconsidered.

#### SINN FEIN GET POWDER SUPPLY FROM STATES

LONDON, April 7.—Underground Sinn Fein ammunition was discovered yesterday in Dublin in boxes bearing the stamp of a powder works in Massachusetts.

There has been wireless communication between the Irish west coast and America.

#### CABINET STILL DELAYS CHOICE

Spent Session Yesterday Considering Applicants for Liquor Board.

VICTORIA, April 7.—The cabinet was in session yesterday until 2:10 without a break discussing applicants to the liquor board preliminary to making the appointments. The probability is the announcement will not be made until next week. A. M. Johnson, deputy attorney-general, as chairman; W. T. McArthur, hardware merchant of Vancouver, and Col. H. I. Tobin are names being mentioned.

#### MADE BIG HAUL

Stole Loot From Mail Sacks and Got Away With Half Million.

CHICAGO, April 7.—Bandits who stole mail sacks from a truck yesterday are believed to have secured from \$500,000 to \$750,000 in loot.

#### Prevent Pumpmen Keeping Mines Free From Being Flooded

LONDON, April 7.—(Noon)—Reports received from the mining centres intimate that the strikers have adopted a more aggressive attitude in order to make volunteers cease work at keeping the mines free from water. Force is being used in some instances.

At Borrowstounnes, Scotland, bombs were thrown at the pit-head to intimidate the workers.

LONDON, April 7.—The complete breakup of the conference between representatives of the miners, the coal owners and the government with a view to settlement of the coal strike was announced in the House of Commons by Lloyd George yesterday afternoon.

The National Union of Transport Workers today unanimously decided to support the coal miners in their strike.

Leaders of the miners union who conferred with Lloyd George yesterday refused to order the pump men and engineers to resume work pending negotiations with the owners.

#### LIQUOR LAW POSTPONED

Operation Not Possible by May 1, and May be Delayed.

VICTORIA, April 7.—The Premier expects the preliminary work facing the Liquor Control Board will be such that it may necessitate the postponement of the operation of the Moderation Act until as late as July 1. He thinks it is hardly possible to be in readiness by May 1 anyway.

#### RUMOR REGARD TO COURT HOUSE

No Official Announcement Yet as to Contract Being Let.

A rumor reached the city yesterday afternoon that the contract for the erection of the \$100,000 provincial government buildings here had been let to McDougall & McNeill, the Calgary contracting firm. This report is, however, entirely without confirmation and quite possibly may be untrue.

Mr. Speaker Manson, who returned yesterday from the capital, stated that it was his understanding on leaving Victoria that the contract was to have been let some day this week but had since heard no definite word as to its being awarded.

A. C. McDougall, E. G. McDougall and J. H. McNeill, of the Calgary firm, were in the city early in February looking over the site for the new building with a view to their possibly securing the contract.

Announcement as to the final awarding of the contract is, up to the present time, entirely unofficial.

#### CHARLES ONCE MORE BACK IN SWITZERLAND

LONDON, April 7.—Charles, former emperor of Austria-Hungary, reached Lucerne last night. He was very ill and was met by his wife.

#### LABOR MINISTER IS ATTACKED BY FRENCH MEMBERS

Resignation of Senator Robertson Demanded But He is Defended By Premier Weighen.

OTTAWA, April 7.—In the House of Commons yesterday the French members of Parliament demanded the resignation of Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor. They claim discrimination against the Catholic national unions which are barred from representation at the Building Trades Conference.

Premier Weighen disclaimed that the Government influenced his veto and praised Senator Robertson.

The matter was allowed to drop after a heated discussion.

#### ASK SURVEY FOR HALIBUT FISHING BANKS

Memorial to United States Department of Commerce Requests Use of Vessel.

JUNEAU, April 7.—The territorial legislature has asked the department of commerce to assign a survey vessel to try to locate new halibut banks in the Behring Sea or Kotzebue Sound. The belief is expressed here that there are halibut banks yet to be discovered more extensive than any yet found and that the United States Government should interest themselves in the matter and try to aid the fishermen by locating them.

Representative Charles Brown, who introduced the motion, expressed the opinion that the fishing industry of Alaska could be very generally extended if the survey were made.

#### ESMONDE COMES BEFORE COURT

Tried Today Before Police Magistrate After Being on Bail.

VANCOUVER, April 6.—Esmonde's trial will be proceeded with Thursday in the police court. He is now free on bail for \$7,500, the bonds being provided by Joseph Kennedy and James Connolly.

#### GOVERNOR IS ILL AT VANCOUVER

Was Seized When Aboard the Victoria Steamer and Will Undergo Operation.

VANCOUVER, April 7.—Lieutenant-Governor W. C. Nichol is ill and confined to his room at the Hotel Vancouver following an attack which occurred on the Victoria steamer. An operation for internal disorders will take place tomorrow or Saturday. Chief Justice Macdonald has been sworn administrator to act pending the recovery of the lieutenant-governor.

#### ANOTHER FIRE RAGING TOKYO

Seventeen Hundred Houses Destroyed, Eight Temples, a School and Police Station.

TOKYO, April 7.—Another fire is raging here. It has destroyed 1,700 houses, eight temples, a school house and a police station. Fifty persons were injured.

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA AT CONVENTION IN PORTLAND, OREGON

PORTLAND, April 7.—British Columbia mining interests will be discussed at this afternoon's session of the international mining convention. Hon. Coal Strike is The Big Question.

The struggle between the coal miners and the operators of the mines in the Old Country is the one supreme interest today. It overshadows Ireland, which is continually in the limelight. It is one stage in the big struggle between capital and labor in which labor is striving to get what it considers is its due and capital is either clinging to its old time privileges or in some cases is fighting for its very existence.

At this distance it is difficult to tell much about the right and wrong of the question at issue. Locally people line up according to their interests. As a rule labor men sympathize with the efforts of British labor and employers sympathize with the British employers. The matter of right or wrong is left for the people on the spot to settle.

As a labor dispute the present is a very important one, but it is more than that. The present British Government is beset with difficulties. In the first place there is an effort being made to force Germany to live up to the terms of the Peace Treaty and that country is taking advantage of the home difficulties of Britain and other countries to evade its responsibilities. In Ireland too there is trouble and the influence both of Ireland and Germany is used to stir up strife in the British coal fields and keep the spirit of unrest alive.

Miners Foolish in Destroying Mines.

In most of the coal fields, efforts were made by the miners to destroy the mines by allowing them to be flooded. The pumpmen went on strike but many of them returned. Then efforts were made to induce them all to leave the pumps and let the water do its work.

This constituted a deliberate attempt at "sabotage" as the French call it. It looks foolish to us, for if successful it would mean that Britain would be almost obliterated as a coal producing country and without her coal she ceases to exist commercially. Then if the miners should be successful, most of them would have to leave the country in order to secure a livelihood. Destroy Britain's commercial supremacy and half the population would have to emigrate.

Labor Solidarity Being Exemplified.

There is a lot of talk in labor circles about the solidarity of labor. That there is a strong tendency in this direction is shown by the action of the transport workers in deciding to join the miners in the present struggle. Labor is getting together in Britain and it would not be an unlikely possibility to see a labor government in that country in the near future. How radical such a government would be remains to be proved. In Australia they had a labor government years ago, but at that time socialistic thought was not so common as it is today. Social experiments have to be tried before the people will settle down again under any form of government. Whether they will be tried in Britain remains to be seen. Those of us who live at a distance where the government is more stable owing to the greater opportunities for individual activities, will watch with great interest the developments of the next few years. Much will depend upon what happens in Britain for that country has led the way for centuries in advanced legislation, which has been copied by other countries. In that country the population is largely industrial. Education has been free and compulsory for many years so that there is practically no intensely illiterate element to deal with. The workers can all read and write and have had some training in thinking for themselves. The future is full of possibilities.

CANADIAN IS NOT INSANE

Appeal Against Conviction on Murder Charge Dismissed by Judge

A Canadian soldier, Charles Tellett, applied to the Court of Criminal Appeal—Mr. Justice Darling, Mr. Justice Coleridge and Mr. Justice Shearman—for leave to appeal against his conviction of the murder of his sister-in-law and for leave to call further evidence, says the London Times.

The execution was fixed for March 1, but on the receipt of representations from the Canadian Government it was postponed. The feeling was so strong among men who had served with Tellett in France with the Canadian Contingent, that he was not responsible for his actions, that the Canadian Government instructed Sir Charles Russell to act in the matter.

Counsel for Tellett said that the real defence, namely that of insanity, had not been raised at the trial because nobody was acquainted with the evidence which might have been called. Since the death sentence was announced in the newspapers a large quantity of evidence became available from Woolwich Arsenal. There were also witnesses in Canada who could give cogent evidence that Tellett, owing to shrapnel wounds received at the first Battle of Ypres, had never afterwards been responsible for his actions. The evidence collected in Canada was contained in telegrams from the Attorney-General, the Minister of Justice and the Prime Minister of the Dominion.

Tellett went with the 3rd Canadian Overseas Battalion to France. He was hit in the head at Ypres, but he recovered, and then he fought at Festubert and Givenchy. At both places he was knocked over by a shell and buried. He was invalided, but later he joined the 216th Battalion and in 1916, when he was a dispatch rider, he was blown over by a shell. Recovering from concussion he was placed with a transport with which he was serving when he was blown into a shell-hole and a large box in the wazon fell on his head.

Home Secretary

Mr. Justice Darling, in delivering the judgment of the Court, said there was no evidence given at the trial which would indicate that Tellett was insane. He had been drinking a good deal and had used threats to the woman whom he killed. Evidence had since been obtained which tended to show that Tellett was insane two years before the commission of the crime. The Court thought it best to refuse the application and to leave the case to be dealt with by the Home Secretary, who could act more freely and more in the interests of the prisoner.

LOWER CAR FARES FOR WORKMEN AND WINNIPEG CHILDREN

WINNIPEG, April 6.—Lower street car fares for workmen and children will most likely be put into force some time this week.

These lower fares have been offered by the Winnipeg Electric Railway Company as concessions precedent to the opening of negotiations between the company and the city to settle outstanding differences and end expensive litigation.

Important developments in connection with proposed negotiations have transpired during the past two days.

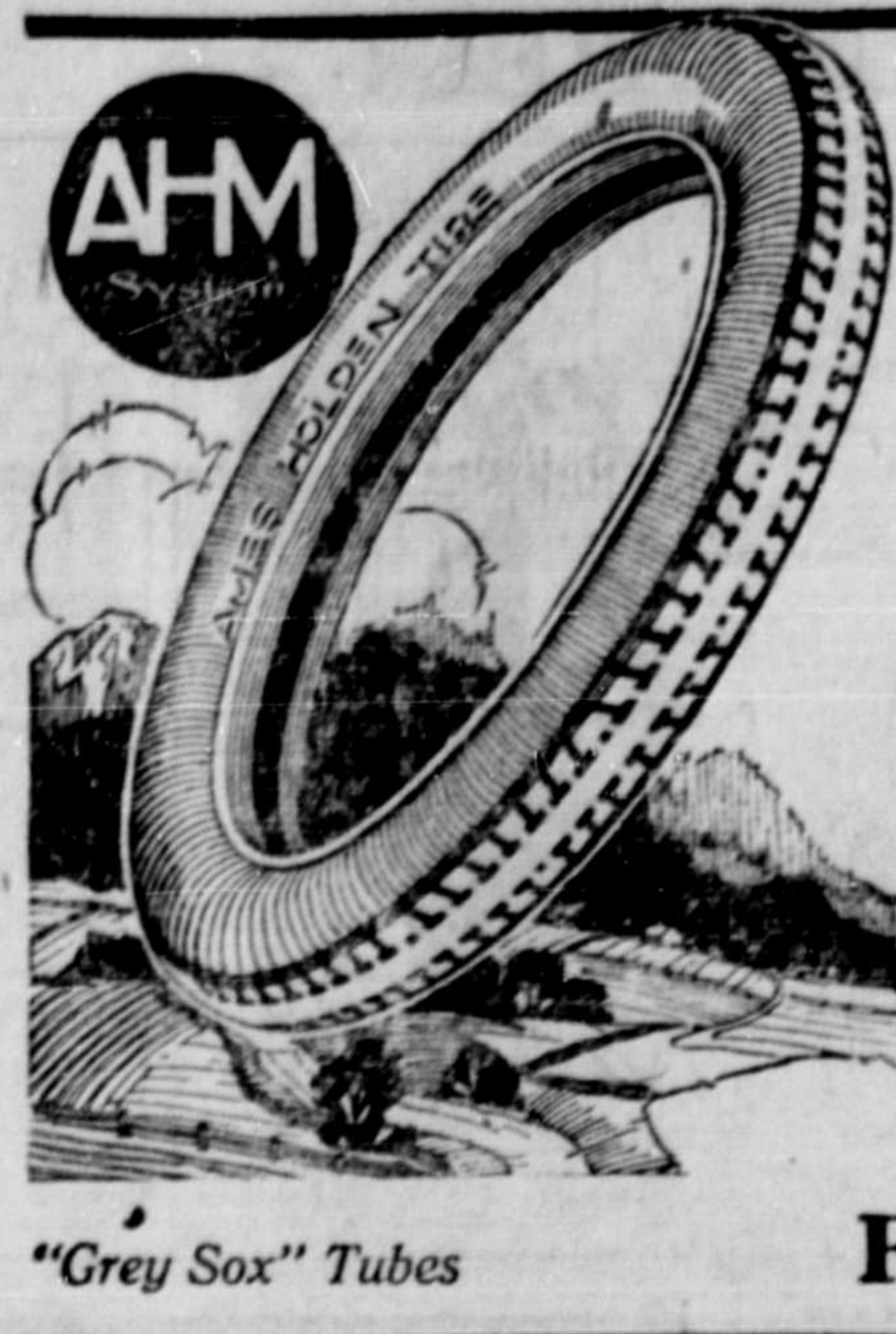

### Sport Chat

A. M. Mcdonald, principal of the public schools, saw the third and fourth games of the Stanley Cup hockey series while he was in Vancouver last week. From the performances he saw he is decidedly of the opinion that the Stanley Cup went this year to the best team, the Senators. In the third game, however, Vancouver was at a bad disadvantage. Two of her star players, Alf Skinner and Mickey Mackay, were out of the game, the former in the hospital suffering from injuries in an early game and the latter at home with his little daughter who was at death's door. In their place were "Cyclone" Taylor, whose prime is past, and Desreux, who played rather wild. Ottawa had no difficulty in winning, although Mackay was back on the ice for the third period.

In the fourth game, playing six man hockey, Vancouver was successful. The battle in the first and second periods was one of the most terrific contests ever seen at hockey and both Mackay and Skinner were back in their places. In the first period there was no scoring, in the second there was a goal for each team, but in the last period the Ottawa play seemed to slacken off and Vancouver had no trouble in getting two tallies to the visitors' one. It almost looked as if the Ottawas were not particular about winning at all.

Were the games in the Stanley Cup hockey series fixed? That is a question that is being debated almost everywhere where two or three followers of the puck game are gathered together. Those who think so, base their conviction on the way the games broke between Vancouver and Ottawa in the recent series. In the third and fifth games Ottawa was successful in seven man or Western hockey while Vancouver won the fourth game playing Eastern rules. These sceptics say that Vancouver was allowed to win the latter game by a slackening up by the Senators in the third period. It is true that the public mind is in rather a doubtful mood about professional sport especially since the revelations of last year in American League baseball, but it is a serious allegation to make that games are fixed.

## FRASER BOATS BEING REBUILT

B.X. and B.C. Express Being Taken from Prince George to Mackenzie

EDMONTON, April 6.—Powerful river steamers designed for battling with the rushing waters of the Fraser River are now undergoing re-construction at Fort Smith and Fort McMurray for the Alberta and Arctic Transportation Company, having been shipped in from the Pacific province in "knock-down" form, to be rebuilt at the northern river ports.

These ships, formerly the "B.X." and "B.C. Express" of pioneer fame on the Fraser are both powerfully engineered and when they take the northern waters are expected to rank as the Queen ships of the Athabasca, the Mackenzie and the Peace, along with their sister ships the "D. A. Thomas" and the "Distributor." The Alberta and Arctic Transportation Company was organized primarily to supply transportation to the oil fields of the north and other points throughout the Mackenzie River basin—its sole business is the carrying of passengers and freight and it possesses no interest in the fur trade. This company was organized by the owners of the British Columbia Express Company which concern operated in the northern interior of British Columbia from the time of the gold rush in the Cariboo in the early 'sixties," and up until a short time ago had in operation about one thousand miles of horse stage lines in the interior of the Pacific province as well as an extensive steambot service on the upper Fraser River.

## RIVER OF LAVA AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

In Addition to Mary Pickford Film There is a Fine Volcano Study.

The Westholme Theatre was last night packed to the doors to see Mary Pickford in "Pollyanna" a play full of human interest and catchy turns in which Mary stars as a little girl.

## FISHING ON NAAS RIVER

Eight Hundred Natives After Oolachans—Canneries Preparing—Springs Running

There are no less than 800 Indians at present at Fishery Bay, twenty miles up the Naas River from the mouth, fishing for oolachans, the run now being on in full force. This number includes natives from the Inuita tribe, of the Queen Charlotte Islands, the Nishkas, of the Naas River, and the Tsimpsons, of the district around Prince Rupert.

All the canneries on the Naas River and Portland Inlet are to operate this season with the exception of the Kumeon plant. Like the canneries of the Skeena and other districts, this year's pack will be confined exclusively to springs and sockeyes of the red varieties.

Already the fishermen have been meeting with good success around the Naas River trolling for springs. Fishing for the canneries has not yet commenced, although the most of the plants are now preparing for the season to commence.

## THE CANADIAN CARES NOTHING FOR BOOKS, SAYS A PROFESSOR

TORONTO, April 7.—"The average young Canadian of today cares nothing for books," said Prof. J. L. Morrison of Queen's University, in an address before the English and History Section of the Ontario Educational Association. Organized amusement, the automobile and the picture show were challenging the reading of books. The garage had displaced the library; golf clubs had taken the place of books.

The Public Library was the great weapon at the disposal of the school in the war against ignorance. The Universities could help by co-operative extension work, but they should not appear as rival tradesmen seeking customers.

### CAN'T LIVE ON FRASER BECAUSE OF MOSQUITOES

Must Pour Oil on Water to Control Them, Also Clean Up Swamps.

Investigations now being carried on by Dominion Government entomologists may result in the pestiferous Fraser Valley mosquito being conquered as successfully as the more famous but now less active New Jersey "skeeter" and his cousin in Panama, the Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, told the Legislature in dealing with the repeal of the Mosquito Control Act, says the Victoria Times.

"The present act is considered unworkable and in view of the information supplied by the Dominion entomologist we came to the conclusion that the money used under it is not well spent," said Hon. Mr. Barrow in reply to a question from Mr. Bowser as to what districts have taken advantage of the act.

Mr. Bowser's question as to whether there are many mosquitoes plying their trade at the present time, Hon. Mr. Barrow said:

"There are not many mosquitoes at present but there will be the usual number of them on the job when the weather gets warmer."

Hon. Mr. Barrow declared that he hoped for the best results in coping with the pest by cleaning up swamps and by dyking and draining.
