Asking Legislature For Relief.

Some of the municipalities of British Columbia have gone into debt to such an extent that they now find it impossible to extricate themselves. They then apply to the Provincial Government for relief. The Government had had no check on the spendings of the municipalities except such as are provided for in the Municipal Act. When it was proposed that there should be some form of control, the municipalities objected, perhaps rightly so. Objection to Government control, however, they can hardly expect Governmental aid and we think the Provincial Legislature would not be justified in extending it.

When individuals or corporations get into financial difficulties, a receiver is put in charge. When the municipality of South Vancouver got into financial difficulties, a receiver was put in charge with very good effect, so good that he has brought the affairs of the municipality into a much better condition. That is the remedy. There is no reason why Prince Rupert, which has conserved its resources, more or less, should have to pay for the financial debacle of other cities or municipalities. Let them take the consequences if they have gone too far. It is best for them and for the rest of the province.

B. C. Credit is Steadily Improving.

The credit of this province is steadily improving. A careful handling of the finances is bringing results. Every loan raised of late has been obtained on better terms than the previous one. The latest sale of bonds to a Canadian firm at a price well above par is an indication that the financial men of the country look with favor on the method being adopted in this province for bringing the finances into good order.

Proposed Tax On Workingmen.

The Union of Municipalities would place a further tax on workingmen to increase the income. This proposal comes, it would seem, as a result of the recent wage increases which places the average workingmen on a better financial basis than most others in the community. At the same time we cannot agree with the plan. We think there are taxes enough on the day laborer and the artisan. Much of the liquor profit will come from these and there is no reason why any further tax should be placed upon them. We believe in every man paying his share and doing his part in the country. We have no use for the man who whines about his sad lot and we do not believe the yarn about wage slaves being worse off than chattel slaves. We do not either believe that the municipalities should whine because they have got themselves into difficulties. They should certainly not try to place the burden on the workingmen who create the wealth of the community. Let them instead use the same business acumen in civic affairs that they do in their own business and carry on along business lines. They know what their income amounts to. This they should spend and no more just as the rest of us do. If we spend more than our income we are liable to get into trouble.

There are certain sources of income which the municipalities might well claim. One of these is a portion of the automobile licenses. We also believe the Provincial Government should pay taxes on their property in a municipality, if such property is held for speculative purposes. Doubtless there are other claims the municipalities might justly have against the province. These things may be adjusted from time to time, but until they are adjusted, the municipalities have no right to spend the money over which they have no control.

Stewart Expects to Have Biggest Year in History

Much Real Development Expected without any Booming of Prices or Artificial Inflation of Values both on Bear and Salmon Rivers

The idea is prevalent around Stewart and Hyder that this season is to be the best they have had yet from a development point of view. The building of the aerial tramline to carry the ore from the Premier has given the people everywhere confidence in this district that the mine is really a big one and that there are possibly many other properties nearby which will soon develop into mines. When the concentrator is in they will melt to bullion on the ground all the metal recovered by the cyanide process.

The development will take place both on the Bear and the Salmon rivers. The Bayview only about four miles from the town of Stewart is to be worked

Pat Daly says the International is going to work this year and the B.C. Development Co. is to open up their property near the Spider.

There has been a good deal of disappointment over the failure of the Algonquin Mining Co. to continue operations, but there is a possibility they will yet continue at the Spider.

General R. G. Edwards Leckie is said to be preparing to do great things this year on the Hercules. It is one of the most hopeful of the properties up the Salmon River. There are good showings and it is not unlikely some shipments will be made over the snow next winter.

There are sorts of rumors in connection with the Forty Nine. The most likely of these is that it is controlled by the American Smelting & Refining Co. and that it will be held as a reserve. The Unicorn is reported to be optioned and is likely to be developed.

Now Alaska

One of the interesting mines is the New Alaska. It is on the American side, and is the property in which Goldwell, head of Dorey-ites is interested. It is said that he has interested members of his sect in the property and that money will be forthcoming this year to make a mine out of it. The Lucky Boy on Fish Creek owned by the Behnsens of Victoria is to be worked this year. Clementson, the Prince Rupert sportsman, is working on this mine and already the bunkhouses and other camp appointments have been erected. It is on the Alaska side of the boundary. It is said the showings on this property resemble the Premier.

Red Top up the Bear is the property on which Gus Seiffert had an option last year, and it is said he is to go ahead with work this year.

Rupert Owners

Royal Irish, in which Percy Miller and F. S. Clements are interested, may possibly be worked this season. The owners have planned to do some crosscut work this year. There is a gold-bearing quartz.

There are a number of other properties on which work is planned, but in many cases development will depend upon the amount of money available.

Other properties that it is expected will be worked this year are the Fitzgerald's, Dan Lindeberg's at Seven Mile, the Premier-Alaska, Texas Creek and Outland Silver Bar.

COUNCIL NOT RAISING PAY

Showed Attitude on Salary Increase Last Evening When Engineers Ask.

The city council showed definitely last night that city officials were not going to have raises in salary this year. The matter came up as a result of a joint letter from T. G. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, and F. S. Clements, city engineer, calling attention to the fact that the schedule of wages for the professional engineers' union called for higher wages than they were receiving from the city. The figure for the utilities superintendent's salary was \$3,000 per month while the city engineer's salary was not given. At present Mr. Duncan is getting \$2,750 per month and Mr. Clements \$2,500.

Ald. Perry explained that the request for a raise in salary had already been lost in a vote of the utilities committee. This had not been any reflection on Mr. Duncan for he was doing excellent work.

Opposed to Raise.
Ald. Dybbahn said that the union of engineers had no authority under the act of its incorporation to set a scale of wages. He was absolutely opposed to the increasing of salaries under the present living conditions when prices were dropping.

Ald. Parker stated that he held the same view as Ald. Dybbahn. This was no time to be considering advancing wages.

Ald. Silversides said that Superintendent Duncan was showing results and an advance in his salary would be justified.

Mayor Agrees.
The mayor also seemed to hold with the aldermen who opposed the raising of wages. He pointed out that Mr. Duncan had already had three increases in salary and the last one had been a \$50 increase.

It was moved by Ald. Dybbahn that the council go on record as not favoring the granting of increases at this time. This was seconded by Ald. McNeill and carried unanimously.

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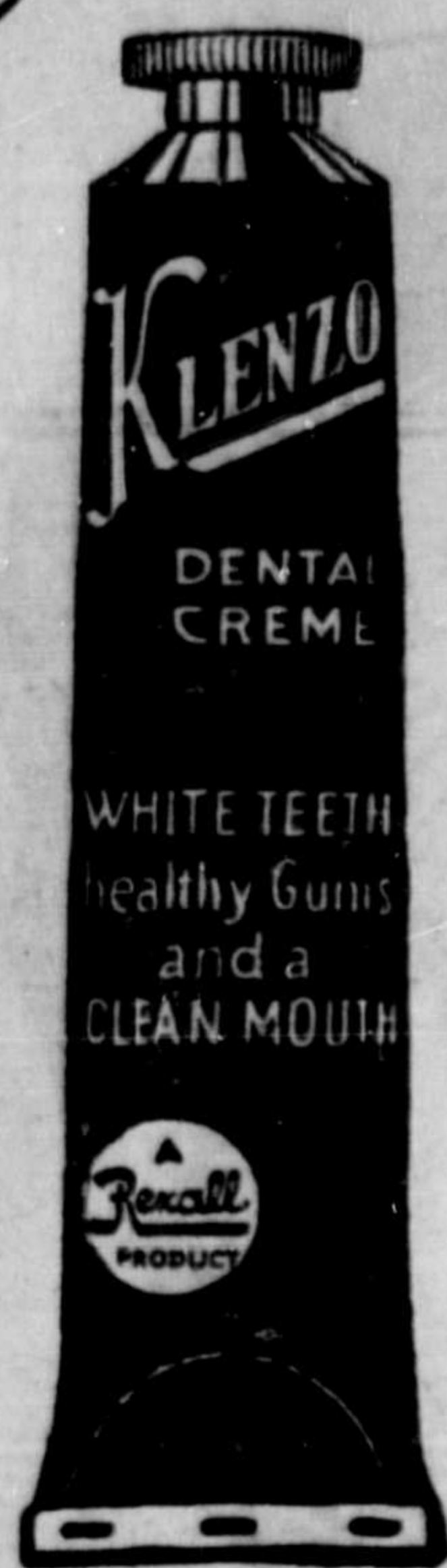

DEAN CLAIMS DEMOCRACY HAS FAILED

Debate Before Cambridge Union Gives Interesting Old Country Viewpoint

Dean Inge took part in the debate at the Cambridge Union this week on a subject suggested by himself, "That democracy as a form of government has no future." The motion was proposed by L. Macpherson (Trinity College) and opposed by A. Henderson (Trinity Hall), son of the well-known Labor leader, who made a thrust at the principal speaker of the evening by declaring that the motion was "a counsel of gloom and pessimism."

Destroyed Debats

Dean Inge observed that democracy had virtually destroyed real debate in the House of Commons, and societies such as the Cambridge Union continued to be among the few places where real and good debating could be heard. He did not agree that where ultimate sovereignty belonged to the mass of the people there was democratic government. The French people in 1852 by a plebiscite placed supreme power in Napoleon III. He did not call that democracy.

Abdicates in Crisis

In almost every crisis it was found necessary for democracy to abdicate. No one could say that we were living under a democracy in this country now. Parliament had abdicated in favor of the Cabinet and the Cabinet in favor of the Prime Minister (Laughter). We were living under a democracy tempered by blackmail. Anything

like a class war was absolutely incompatible with democratic government, and powerless in the face of anti-social conspirators.

High-minded and self-respecting men would not consent to be mere delegates. The different ways of creeping into power in democracy were repugnant to any self-respecting man, and accordingly as governments became more democratic they got the better class of men withdrawing more and more. He thought history would say that democratic constitutional government committed suicide in 1906 by the Trades Disputes Act which exempted trade unions from the law of conspiracy, and thereby handed over this country, bound hand and foot, to sectional and anti-social conspiracy. Ever since then the Government had been increasingly impotent in the face of raids made by various sections of the community.

Militarism May Return
The impotence and futility of democratic government were now recognized not so much by Conservatives or Liberals as by every one of the new extreme and revolutionary parties. History seemed to show that the natural course was not from sectional anarchy to democracy, nor from Socialism to democracy. He should say that the natural course was through sectional anarchy to bankruptcy and from bankruptcy through some form of strong—generally military—government.

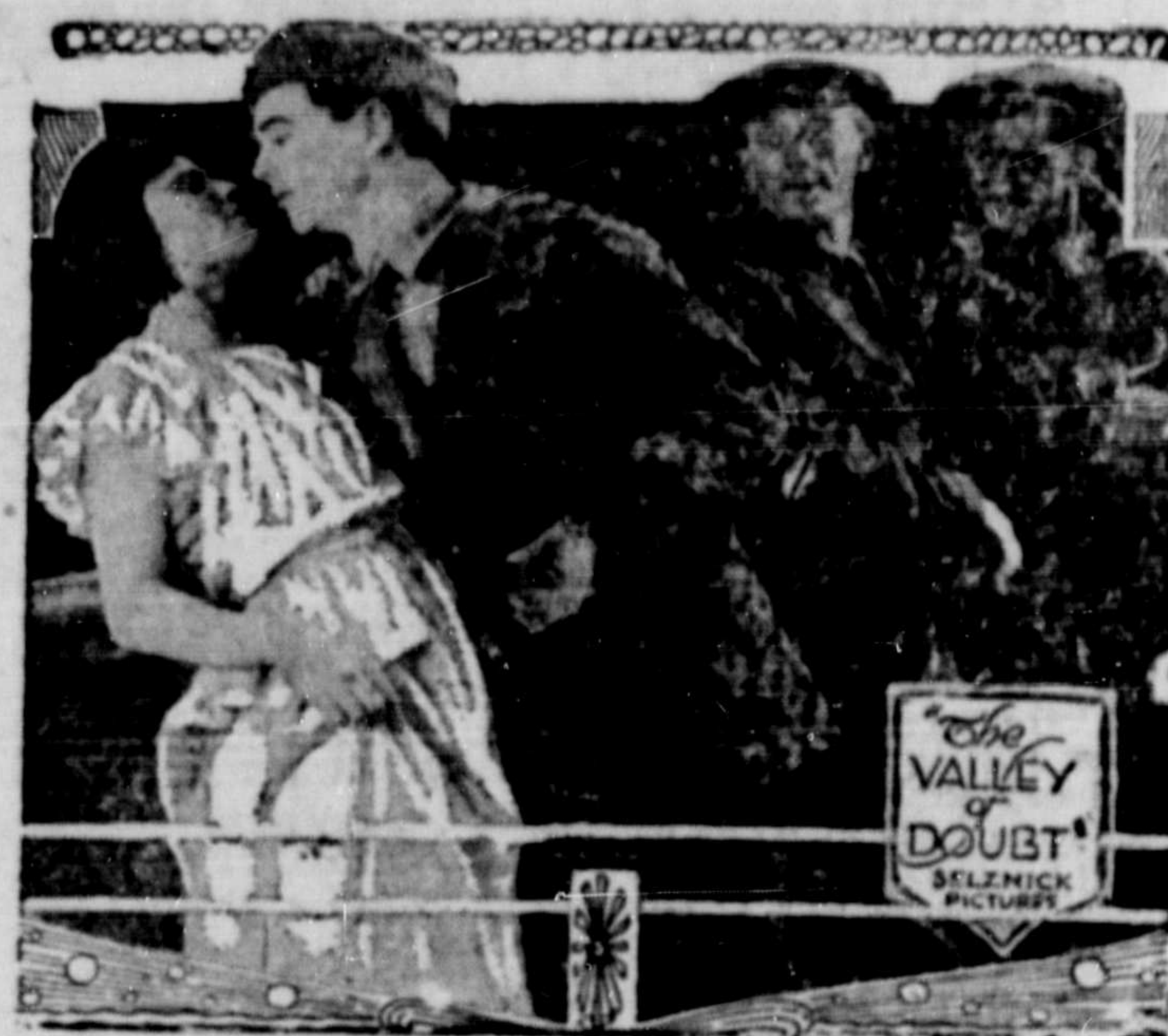
