Bond Market Reflects B.C. Standing

First of Series for Stanley Cup Hockey Games Goes to Vancouver

C. Bonds Sell at Highest Price Yet On Open Market

VICTORIA, March 22.—British Columbia bonds, amounting to \$2,000,000, sold today at a new low cost to the province—4 per cent. Fourteen tenders were received by the minister from syndicates of bond houses and banks in all parts of Canada and United States. The highest bid was from the Canadian Securities Corporation of Toronto which offered \$103.60 per year six per cent bonds. This works out slightly over 4 per cent.

Last lot of five-year bonds sold three months ago cost 5.84 per cent and the one before that 6 per cent. The money raised under this latest loan is to be used under the Settlement Act and for main trunk roads.

INDIAN REPORT WAS CAUSE OF ALARM

Reported Wreck Was Nothing but An Old Derelict on Frederick Island.

A wireless message was received from Dead Tree Point last night that Indians had reported a wreck on the east coast of Dead Tree Point and that it was the cold storage boat Grier Starratt. This was proven incorrect this morning when another message arrived stating that an investigation had been made and it was found to be an old derelict that the Indians had reported. The report caused considerable alarm along the waterfront for a few hours.

DIED IN LONDON.

LONDON, March 21.—Sir Alexander West, secretary to W. E. Gladstone, when the latter was prime minister of Great Britain, died today.

SINN FEINERS BOYCOTT ULSTER

Also Forbid Irish Census in April As Invasion of Rights.

GELFEST, March 22.—The Sinn Fein parliament has decided to tighten the boycott on Ulster until "British war aggression on the Irish people ceases." It has also decided to forbid the Irish census as an invasion of Irish rights.

DUBLIN, March 22.—Seven members of the crown forces, including one officer and twelve men, were wounded by revolutionaries in an ambush near Headford Junction, County Kerry, when a train was held up there yesterday.

MINE AT STEWART CLOSES FOR PRESENT

Work Suspended on the Spider Pending Reorganization of Company.

News received from Stewart is that work has shut down, temporarily at least, on the Spider group operated by the Algonian Company and that the men have filed bills on the mine and equipment for the amount of their wages during the past few months.

W. A. Meloche has been away for sometime trying to organize the Northern Light Exploration Syndicate to take over the Northern Light, Spider, Cobalt, and Lake and O'Leary properties and develop them. It was proposed to spend close to two million dollars in exploratory work if necessary. The officers of the new concern were to be Jules Bolin, president; A. Muylde, vice-president, and Nicholas Van Muylde, treasurer. What success they have met with is not known.

J. Howland, mine manager at the Spider, asked regarding the mine, said there were some good showings and the property was not yet fully proved, but they had not struck the ore body just as soon as they had expected. The Algonian Company has spent a lot of money in the Stewart district, something like \$150,000, and felt sure the present little difficulty would be straightened out directly.

The same concern was interested in the Georgia group up the Bear. This was a copper quartz and was said to be a very good prospect.

VICTORIA, March 22.—The Dominion Government department of marine is to replace the light-house tender Leechie with gasoline propelled 75-foot boats built here for the Federal Government.

Vancouver Wins at Hockey In Stanley Cup Series by Score of Three to One

VANCOUVER, March 22.—The first Stanley Cup game in the series for the professional hockey championship resulted in a win for Vancouver by a score of three goals to one. Brilliant rushes featured the game with comparatively little combination play. The goal keeping of Lehmann for Vancouver was a feature.

Vancouver had the advantage of speed in the first two periods but brilliant rushes by Gerard, Nighbor and Dennehy for the Ottawas kept the home team keyed up. Goals were scored in the following order: Skinner and Duncan in the first period, Harris in the second for Vancouver, and Dafragh for Ottawa. There was no score in the third period.

The ice was good and play was fast throughout. Ten thousand spectators cheered themselves hoarse as they watched their home team holding down the visitors and carrying off the final victory.

SILESIA MAY BE DIVIDED

French Reading of Treaty of Versailles Allows This.

PARIS, March 22.—The French Government intends to support the theory that Upper Silesia may be divided between Germany and Poland as a result of the plebiscite of Sunday last. It is held here that the Treaty of Versailles indicates a new frontier for Poland. Germany may follow as nearly as possible the expression of will of the voters of Upper Silesia.

GERMANY TO STAND PAT

BERLIN, March 22.—Germany's reply to the demand of the Entente for payment before March 23 of a billion marks in gold to apply on the reparations obligations will be in the negative, it is stated.

SEATTLE, Mar. 21.—After a battle in which two autos were wrecked and a policeman and civilian slugged, Ed. Hagen, policeman and prize fighter, was arrested on charges of bootlegging and captured on Sunday with two cases of whiskey in his possession.

LONDON TIMES ON GRAND TRUNK DEAL

Thinks Canada Will Buy the Road Cheaper Now Than at Future Date.

LONDON, March 22.—The financial editor of the Times, referring to cables suggesting that Canada may abandon the scheme to take over the Grand Trunk Railway, says he thinks it will cost the Government less to purchase the road now than at a future stage of development.

3.C. Municipalities Plead Danger of Going Broke if No Help from Government

VICTORIA, March 22.—Unless given immediate financial relief many of the larger cities and towns of British Columbia will be in the hands of receivers before they can obtain their share of the liquor profits, the municipal committee of the Legislature was told by the executive of the Union of B. C. Municipalities yesterday. The delegation urged a tax of five cents a day on all workers, \$15 a year on others, and \$15 on all corporations to pay the cost of schools and hospitals.

The committee was asked to bring the whole question of municipal finance before the Legislature in order that it might receive full consideration.

CITY WILL BUY SAND DREDGING ISLAND QUARRY FROM McNICHOLL CREEK IS DONE

Decision was Made for Supply of Rock for Local Streets.

The city of Prince Rupert is to purchase the rock quarry and equipment at Smith Island for street rock supply from T. J. Davidson for \$2,400. This decision was made last night by the city council on the recommendation of the board of works. Payment will be made one third cash now and the remainder in October.

280,000 PRISONERS

These Were Taken Out of Russia By Baltic Routes.

NEW YORK, March 22.—Two hundred and eighty thousand war prisoners were taken out of Russia or sent back by various Baltic routes up to the middle of March, according to a statement of the League of Nations news bureau here.

TWO KILLED.

DUBLIN, March 21.—Two policemen were shot dead and three policemen wounded on Sunday in various parts of the country.

Before leaving Sir Philip said the possibility of another war exists that would ruin Europe. The next five years would show whether Europe would make progress or fall into decay.

DEAN CLAIMS DEMOCRACY HAS FAILED

Debate Before Cambridge Union Gives Interesting Old Country Viewpoint

Dean Inge took part in the debate at the Cambridge Union this week on a subject suggested by himself, "That democracy as a form of Government has no future." The motion was proposed by I. Macpherson (Trinity College) and opposed by A. Henderson (Trinity Hall), son of the well-known Labor leader, who made a thrust at the principal speaker of the evening by declaring that the motion was "a counsel of gloom and pessimism."

Destroyed Debates

Dean Inge observed that democracy had virtually destroyed real debate in the House of Commons, and societies such as the Cambridge Union continued to be among the few places where real good debating could be heard. He did not agree that where ultimate sovereignty belonged to the mass of the people there was democratic government. The French people in 1852 by a plebiscite placed supreme power in Napoleon III. He did not call that democracy.

Abdicates in Crisis

In almost every crisis it was found necessary for democracy to abdicate. No one could say that we were living under a democracy in this country now. Parliament had abdicated in favor of the Cabinet and the Cabinet in favor of the Prime Minister (Laughter). We were living under a democracy by blackmail. Anything

like a class war was absolutely incompatible with democratic government, and powerless in the face of anti-social conspirators.

High-minded and self-respecting men would not consent to be mere delegates. The different ways of creeping into power in democracy were repugnant to any self-respecting man, and accordingly as governments became more democratic they got the better class of men withdrawing more and more. He thought history would say that democratic constitutional government committed suicide in 1906 by the Trades Disputes Act which exempted trade unions from the law of conspiracy, and thereby handed over this country, bound hand and foot, to sectional and anti-social conspiracy. Ever since then the Government had been increasingly impotent in the face of raids made by various sections of the community.

Militarism May Return

The impotence and futility of democratic government were now recognized not so much by Conservatives or Liberals as by everyone of the new extreme and revolutionary parties. History seemed to show that the natural course was not from sectional anarchy to democracy, nor from Socialism to democracy. He

should say that the natural course was through sectional anarchy to bankruptcy and from bankruptcy through some form of strong—generally military—government.
