REPORT OF COMMISSION IS RELEASED
LEGISLATURE SHOULD BE DISSOLVED, SAYS PATTULLO

Important Changes In Railway Administration Are Advocated; Three Trustees For "National"

Statutory Duty Would Be Imposed to Eliminate Duplicatory and Wasteful Services—Arbitral Tribunal to Settle Matters of Dispute is Recommended

Legislation Is Already Being Planned to Implement Report

Bennett Would Remove Canadian National System From Political Interference and Community Pressure—Hopes to Eliminate Deficits

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—Appointment of a commission of three trustees in whom shall be vested all powers of the present board of directors of the Canadian National Railways is one of the outstanding recommendations in the report of the commission on railways and transportation which was made public this afternoon by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett. The annual budget of the Canadian National would be under the control of these trustees, the appointments to which would be made by the Governor General in Council and vacancies filled from a panel of eight named by the remaining trustees.

The imposition of a statutory duty upon the board of directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway and also upon the trustees of the Canadian National that they adopt, as soon as practicable, such co-operative measures, plans and arrangements as shall be consistent with the proper handling of traffic and best adapted to the removal of unnecessary or wasteful services is also recommended.

Unwarranted duplication in services or facilities should be eliminated and the joint operation of all properties which may be conveniently or without undue detriment to either party be so operated is urged.

It is recommended that the board of trustees of the Canadian National Railways and an equal number of directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway shall meet at regular intervals for the purpose of discussing and agreeing upon co-operative measures and services.

In the event of failure to agree or for the purpose of settling disputes or details of any scheme, it is recommended that an arbitral tribunal should be set up for each occasion. This arbitral tribunal shall be composed of the chief commissioner of the board of railway commissioners and of one representative from each of the two railways.

In regard to subsidiary services such as hotels, telegraph systems and express services, the commission is of the opinion that aggressive competition should cease.

"Since the debt of the Canadian National, in the hands of the public, is now very large and more than the railway can carry from its earnings, even under improved conditions, sums which are required to meet deficits should be voted by Parliament annually and not raised by issue of railway securities as has been done in recent years," the commission states.

Enabling Legislation Is Being Planned
It is the intention of the government to introduce legislation that will give effect to those recommendations of the commission which it is considered in the national interest should be adopted. Prime Minister Bennett stated in com-

NEW GRAIN IS COMING

Local Elevator May Be Full Again in Course of Month, It is Announced

Possibly within a month, the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator will be filled up again with prairie wheat from this year's crop, it was stated this morning by Joseph Bennett of Vancouver, Pacific Coast superintendent of Alberta Wheat Pool elevators. No plans have yet been made for shipment from here of new crop grain.

Mr. Bennett stated that the Dutch steamer Flensburg had been definitely fixed to load wheat from here and was expected to arrive in port some time next week. The Maasburg, another Dutch ship, is chartered by the Pool for loading on this coast and is due about October 15. It is possible, however, that she may be diverted from Prince Rupert. Both the Flensburg and Maasburg will load full for United Kingdom or Continent.

Mr. Bennett arrived this morning from Vancouver and will return south tomorrow night or Friday.

PROGRESS IN PEACE

Government Official Returns to Victoria and is Very Pleased With Country

VICTORIA, Sept. 21.—News of building and general progress in the Peace River Block is brought back to Victoria by Cecil Tice, field crops commissioner of the provincial government, after a tour of the northern area.

Mr. Tice reports that he saw half a dozen new houses under construction at Dawson Creek, that there is a new flour mill there and that a new packing plant is turning out hams and bacon for local consumption. There is a flourishing new creamery, stores can be seen on every corner, new churches and garages are being built and everywhere one looks in this new town there are signs of progress.

Settlers are still rushing into the country around and beyond the present terminus of the Northern Alberta Railways. Relief work is being carried on in the form of road construction for the benefit of families unable to maintain themselves until their crops come in.

Mr. Tice went as far as Fort St. John and the Fort Nelson trail and found many settlers located several hundred miles away from the railroad.

Mr. Tice reports that there is a great demand for a highway into the Peace River Block from the Pacific Coast. Peace Canyon is the route that appears to be generally favored. Over such a road farmers believe they could transport much of their produce to the coast by motor truck.

SCHEME IS APPROVED

Government Plans to Place Families on Small Tracts of Land Near Large Centres

VICTORIA, Sept. 21.—Hon. Nelson S. Loughheed, minister of lands, received word on Tuesday from Ottawa that the Dominion government has signed a land settlement scheme which provides for the placement of suitable families on small tracts of land near large centres in British Columbia where they may become self-supporting.

Word has been received in the city of the death in Montreal of M. Garon, brother of Joe Garon of this city, and also of the passing of M. Mercier of Laurierville, Que., brother of Mrs. Garon, in Quebec Hospital on September 15 as a result of injuries sustained three weeks previous in an accident on his farm.

Both the late Mr. Garon and the late Mr. Mercier are survived by widows, small children, aged mothers and brothers and sisters in Quebec.

Mr. and Mrs. Garon will have the sympathy of many local friends in their bereavement.

Leader of Opposition Declares Election Is Needed to Clear Air

Protests at Needless Continuation of Governmental Debitity—Tolmie Administration Has Lost Confidence of People

VICTORIA, Sept. 21.—"All I need to say is that dissolution of Parliament should take place forthwith," declared T. D. Pattullo, Liberal leader for British Columbia, yesterday in commenting upon Premier Tolmie's suspension of union government plans. "Premier Tolmie has admitted the failure of his government and yet it is proposed to drag along a further few months of government debility. It is very much against the public interest and I take the stand also that this discredited administration has no right to bring in measures of major importance at another session. The government has lost the confidence of the people and only an election can clear the atmosphere."

PLOT TO SUICIDE

Two Unemployed Ex-Service Men Drowned at Ottawa and Six Under Arrest

Fought Police

Sensational Combat Staged Last Night on Banks of Locks of Rideau Canal

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—Two men are dead and six others are held by the police following what the authorities believe to have been the plan for a mass suicide attempt by eight unemployed ex-service men here last night.

The dead are Daniel McLean and John Clark. Both were drowned in one of the Rideau Canal locks near Parliament Hill.

Before the six other men were taken into custody they put up a terrific battle against the police. Several of the men after time attempted to jump from the banks of the locks into the water but were beaten back by the constables.

HANGMAN SUICIDES

John Ellis, Who Sent Numerous Murderers To Their Doom, Cuts His Throat

LONDON, Sept. 21.—John Ellis, the world's most famous hangman, ended eight years of brooding retirement yesterday. He was found dead with his throat slashed and a razor by his side.

In January 1923, when he retired after twenty-two years service in his sinister task, Ellis bore the reputation of being the hangman who had sent more condemned murderers to their deaths than any other living man.

HOLD-UP IN VANCOUVER

Foreign Exchange Bureau on Georgia Street Robbed of \$1000 Cash Yesterday

VANCOUVER, Sept. 21.—Held up by a lone bandit yesterday afternoon, the Foreign Exchange Bureau on West Georgia Street was robbed of more than \$1000 in cash. The bandit escaped in a car in which two other men were waiting at the curb.

IS THE NEW-BORN INFANT STILL ALIVE?

Says the Victoria Times:
While some optimistic souls claim that the union government infant is still breathing, there are many indications to support the belief that the babe has perished in the throes of childbirth, leaving its parent in a politically precarious condition.

The Premier's procedure from the start made the success of his proposal doubtful. In the first place, it was inadvisable for him to announce his desire for a union government in the press before consulting with the leaders of the other parties, particularly with Mr. Pattullo, and Mr. Bowser—who appears to have a party of his own nearly ready for incubation.

In the second place, Dr. Tolmie's invitation to both Mr. Pattullo and Mr. Bowser to join a union government 'under his leadership' without any reservations instead of leaving this vital consideration open, made it virtually impossible for at least the leader of the Liberal opposition to continue negotiations without placing himself in an anomalous position.

In the light of that record it is hard to see how Mr. Pattullo could now give a blanket endorsement of that same leadership by accepting the condition bluntly defined by the three words we have quoted, without reflecting upon the honesty of his own course in the Legislature.

With all of these complexities, it is no wonder that the atmosphere of the operating room has become so thick that the operator has been unable to see the patient, and that this Caesarian operation has left the baby in extremis and its parent in a grave political condition.

ROOSEVELT ACCLAIMED

Seattle Gave Great Reception Yesterday to Democratic Candidate For Presidency

Monster Meeting

Thousands Failed to Gain Admission to Auditorium—Is In Portland Today

SEATTLE, Sept. 21.—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic candidate for president of the United States, spent yesterday in Seattle in the course of his western campaign tour and was accorded a great reception. The feature of his visit here was a public meeting last night in the Civic Auditorium at which Governor Roosevelt gave a brief address.

In his address, Governor Roosevelt dealt with many of the more important issues facing the electorate in the present campaign. He charged the Hoover administration with failure to cope with many of the major problems including unemployment and farm relief.

Restore Oriental Trade
Of special appeal to the Pacific Coast was Governor Roosevelt's proposal that an international conference be held to counteract the "abnormal depreciation of buying power of Oriental countries."

His special train having made up time after having been delayed on the way from Great Falls, Montana, Governor Roosevelt arrived at 10:35 yesterday morning. During the day he visited Puyallup to attend the State Fair, also making a brief call at Tacoma.

The Roosevelt train passed through Spokane at 2 o'clock yesterday morning. The presidential candidate was asleep but his son, James Roosevelt, briefly addressed a large crowd which was present at the station during the train's short stay.

Governor Roosevelt is in Portland today and will speak there tonight.

PASSING OF MRS. GARNER

Mother of Democratic Candidate For Vice-President Died in Texas Yesterday

DETROIT, Texas, Sept. 21.—Mrs. Sarah Jane Garner, mother of Speaker John Nance Garner, Democratic candidate for vice-president of the United States, passed away here early yesterday afternoon at her home at the age of 81 years. All five children were at her bedside when she died.

Mrs. Garner was the widow of John N. Garner, who died some years ago, and came from pioneer farming stock in the Red River county.

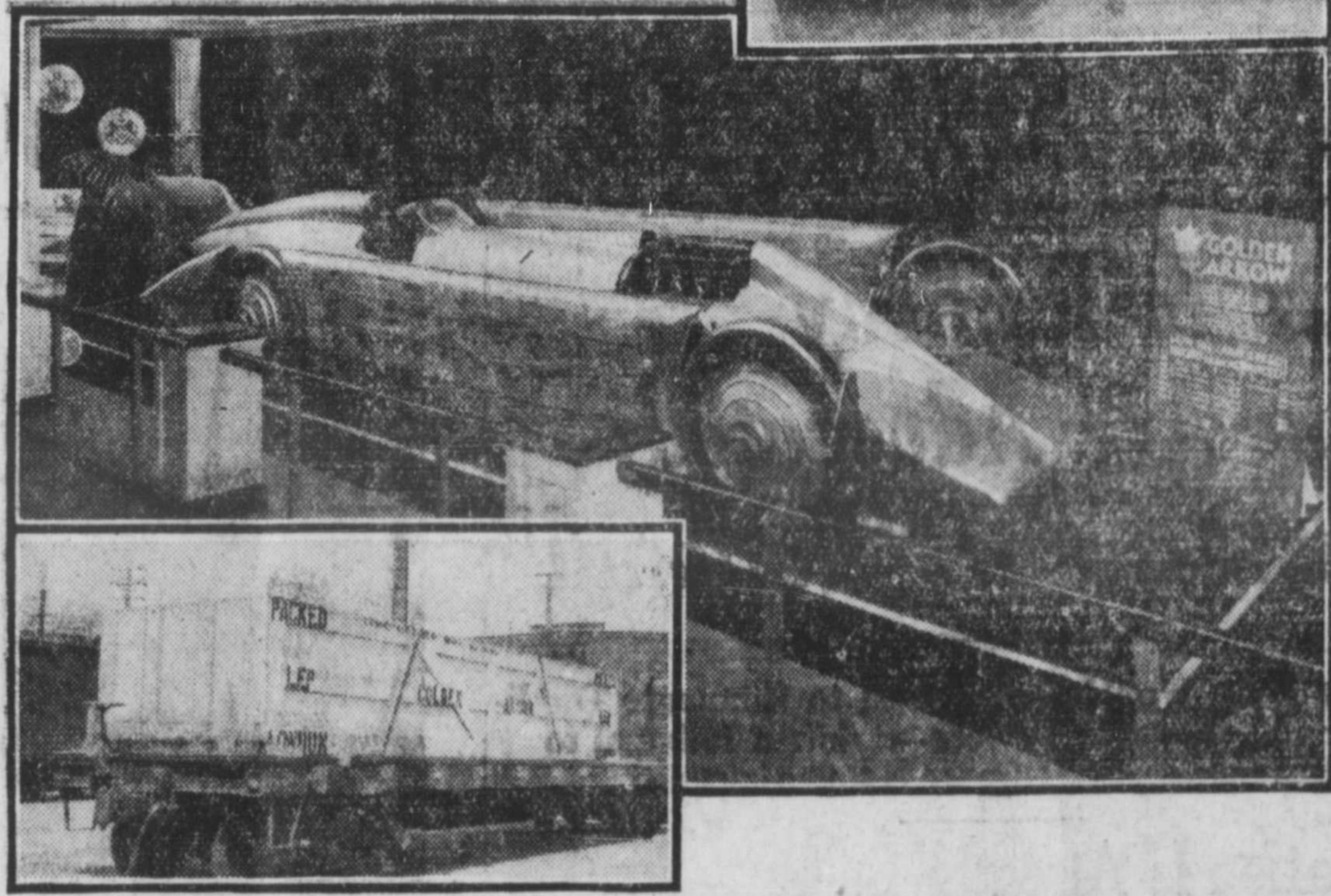

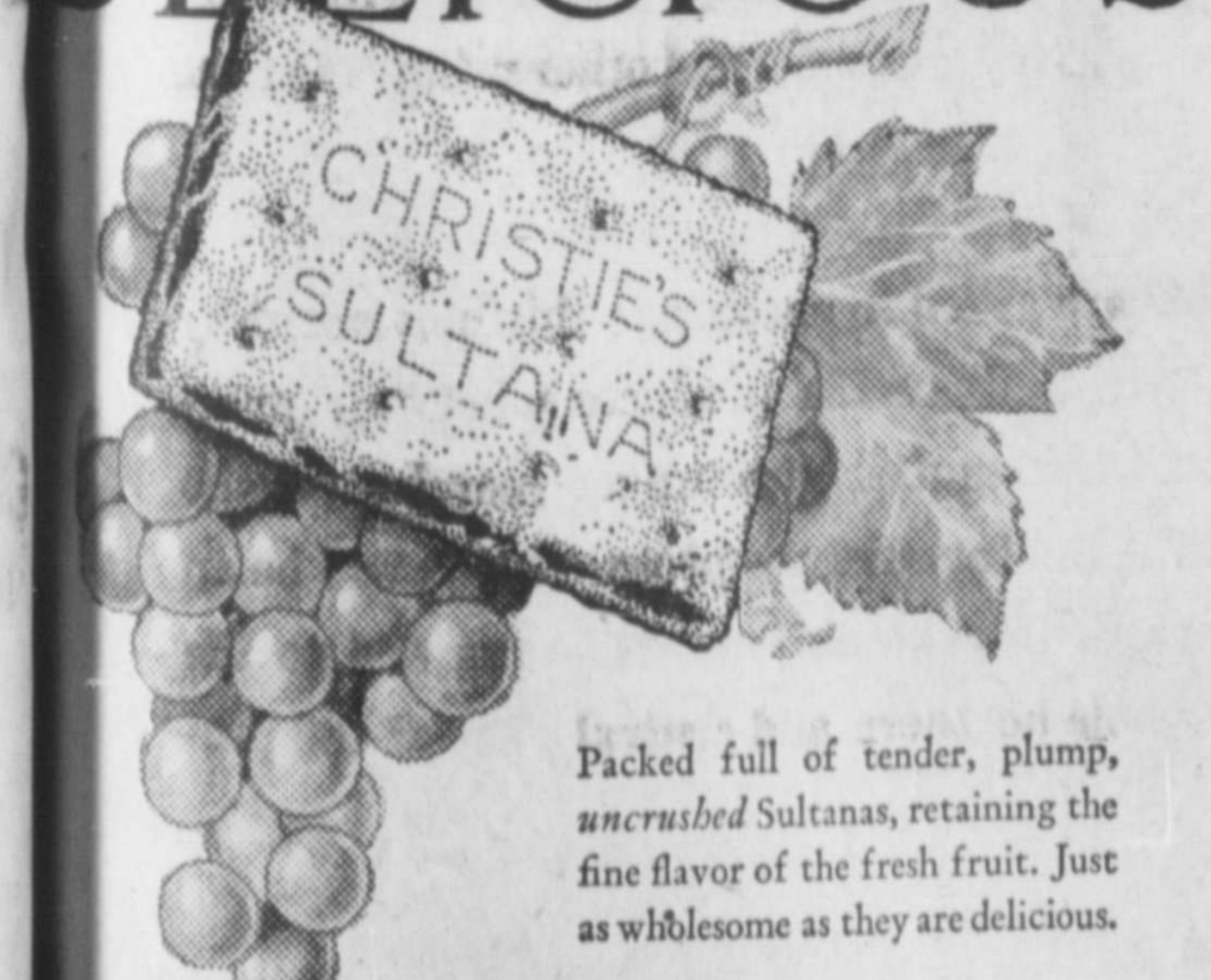

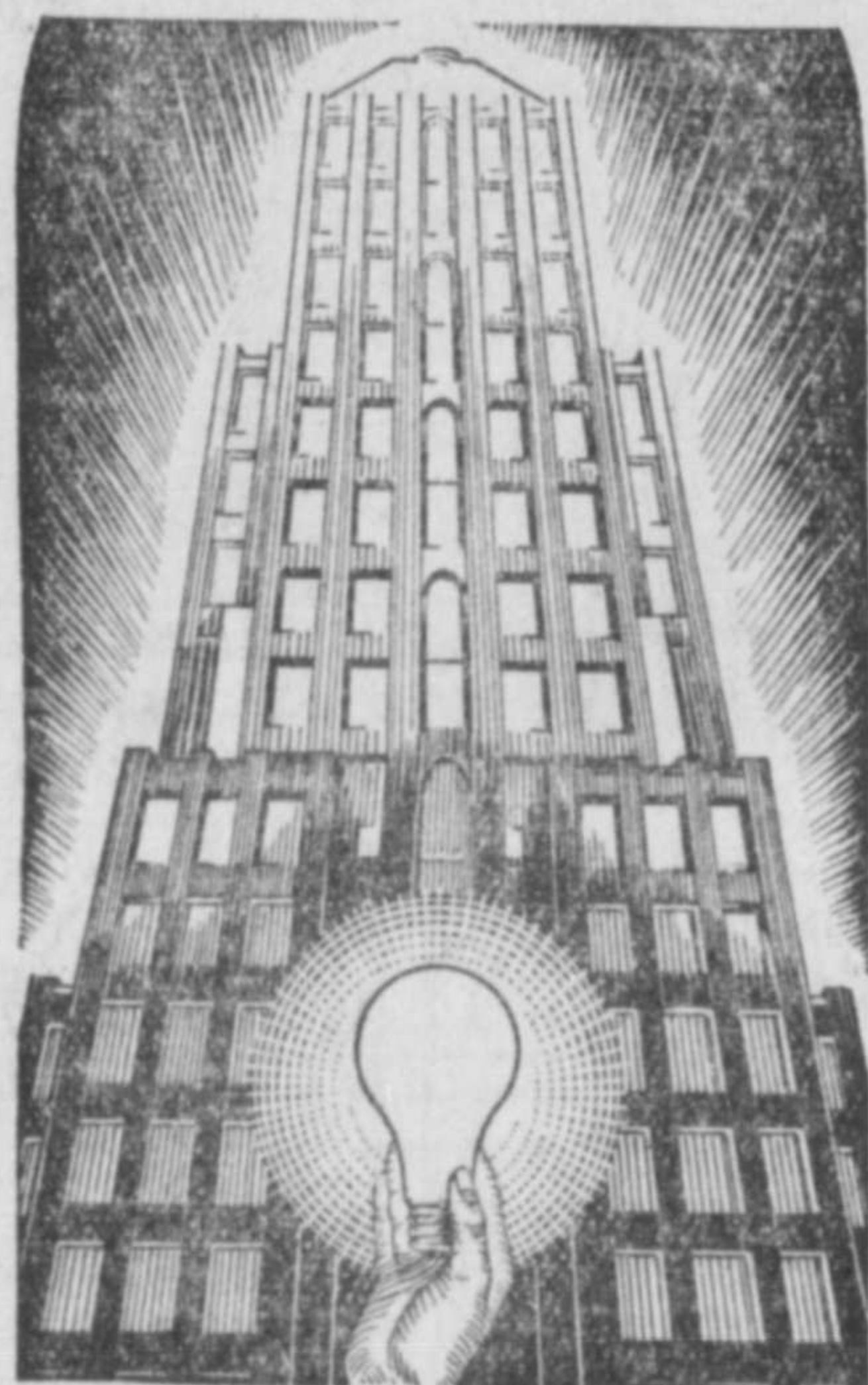
