United States May Have Similar Navy To Great Britain

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Delegates to the disarmament conference have not recovered from the shock of Secretary Hughes' blunt presentation of Saturday's proposal for the immediate reduction of the fleets of Great Britain, the United States and France for a ten year naval holiday. The concrete terms of the United States plan are still in the hands of the naval experts of the other two powers chiefly concerned. Pending their conclusions no further step is probable.

Called at Action of Interior Ministers in Suggesting Irregularity of Convention.

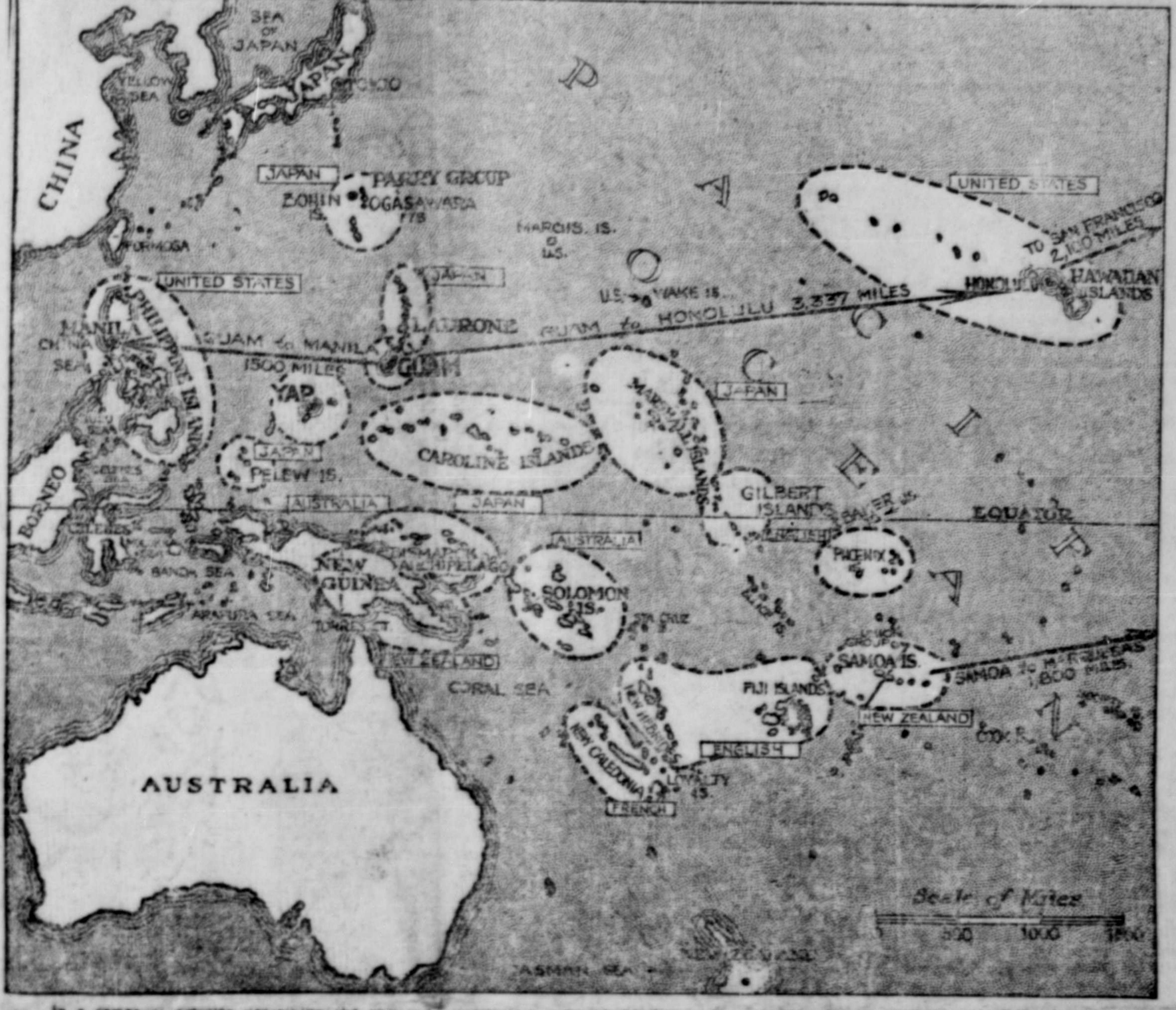

TO ACCEPT PROPOSALS

Stork Has Great Reception Throughout the Interior and Expects Big Majority

Fred Stork, the Liberal candidate for the forthcoming federal election, returned to town on last night's train, highly pleased with the reception that had been accorded him at many places he visited up the line and confident as to his election next month. He was away exactly a fortnight and addressed one or more meetings every day he was gone. Among the places visited were Hazelton, Smithers, Burns Lake, North Francois, Colleymount, Grassy Plains, Wistaria, Oolisa Lake, Endako, Houston and Telkwa.

BEGINS WORK ON STATION

Expected Construction Will Be Completed in About Three Months.

Work on the new Grand Trunk Pacific depot commenced with a swing this morning. J. Graham of Moosejaw, who was allotted the contract, is on the job with a dozen men laying out the ground plan. There are eight carloads of material for his work on the siding awaiting discharge.

When the work gets a little farther advanced there will be employed between fifteen and twenty men, and the contractor expects to have the work completed within three months.

GOOD PROGRESS ON COURT HOUSE

Work Commences Today on Second Storey of Building.

The work on the structure of the new court house is making good progress now that the shipments of stone and tile are enabled to get here regularly. Severe rain storms recently with the consequent washouts on the railway has prevented the stone, etc. reaching here in time to keep the workmen fully employed. A carload of stone reached Rupert on the last freight train which will enable the work to proceed without interruption, and additional carloads are following closely.

The stonework is complete on the first floor of the court house and the brickwork of the second story is being started today. Up to date 100,000 bricks have been put in place, and a gang of bricklayers is being put on the work today. Weather permitting there will be approximately 25 or 30 men employed on this work all winter, and the completion of the outside brickwork should be completed by the New Year.

A scow load of 25,000 tiles is expected to arrive from Vancouver in the near future, which will be used for backing of the brickwork.

At Ocean Falls a meeting was held on Saturday night presided over by Mr. Nister, chief engineer of the Pulp and Paper Plant at that point. It was well attended.

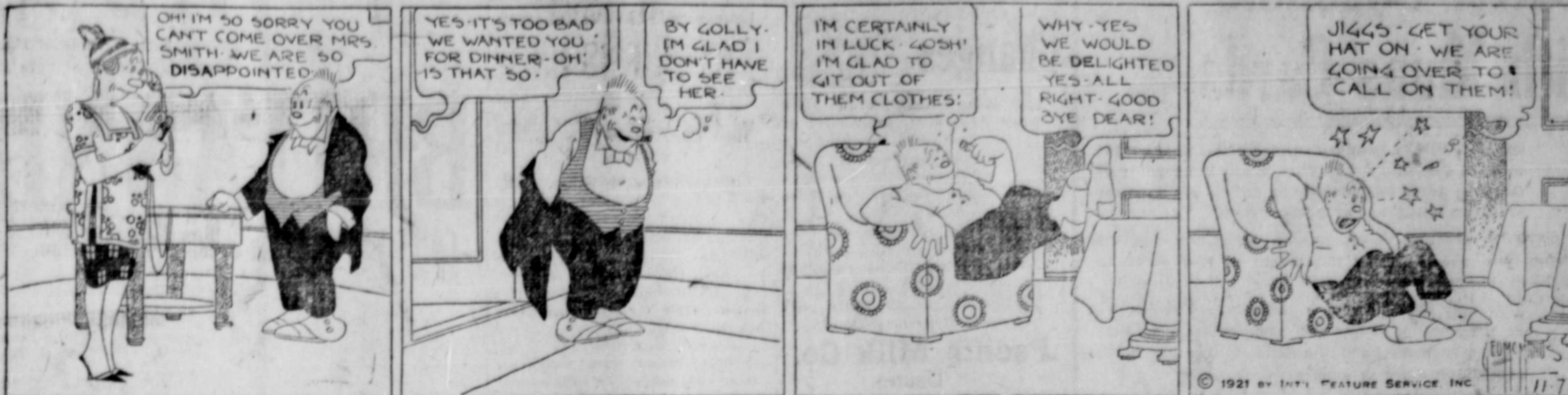
