## Japanese Cabinet Resigns Following The Assassination

PRINCE RUPERT, Nov. 5.—Premier Hara, stabbed at 2:55 Friday, died afterwards. Cablegrams expressing horror over the assassination of the Premier poured into Tokio from the capitals of the world. The attack was made by a demented youth. There is no definite knowledge yet that it had its origin in political ambition which was actuated by bitter assaults upon Hara and his cabinet recently.

The Japanese cabinet has resigned office after a meeting of the cabinet held this morning.

## AMERICAN IS NOMINATED FOR IRELAND

Barbour of Patterson, N. J., appointed Uster Finance Minister.

Barbour, member of a New Jersey family, is regarded as temporary finance minister coming to the aid of the regular incumbent.

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## ENDING ON CANADA

Post Service Says Ammunition Got Busy with Paper Business.

PRINCE RUPERT, November 5.—The Post Office Service has issued a warning of a resubversion of the mail and more mills on the coast and in Alaska to the needs of the United States for pulp wood and paper.

PRINCE RUPERT, Ont., Nov. 5.—A man excited when he saw a deer and allowing his gun to go off while he was taking aim at the deer yesterday shot and killed a boy named Homer Callahan, aged 14, of Berleville, 12 miles east of Prince Rupert.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Charged with slaying Frank Passing, a former friend, Alex. Slavin said: "Passing had been contemplating suicide and offered me five dollars if I would shoot him. I murmured and passing threatened to take my life. Then I fired four shots into him."

## MONTREAL POLICE WILL SHOOT FIRST

MONTREAL, Nov. 5.—Members of the police force here have announced that in future they will shoot first in the case of a criminal trying to shoot at them or resisting arrest. A policeman here killed an escaping thief a week or so ago and the next week got a raise in pay.

## PROPOSAL FOR BOOKLET ON STEEL PLANT

A. G. Garde Asks Board of Trade to Publish Document Under His Direction.

The publicity and mining committees of the Board of Trade were last night instructed to report on a proposal to print a booklet from a summary of the reports which an iron and steel plant should be erected in this neighborhood. The matter was laid before the Board by A. G. Garde and briefly discussed and the committees will report on its feasibility. Mr. Garde read the preface to the proposed booklet, which he had prepared and he said he had compiled a vast amount of data on the subject which he thought should be placed in the hands of those likely to be interested. He showed pamphlets dealing with the south and thought the north should also have the data available in suitable form.

After a short discussion it was referred to the committees for report and if favorable will go to the Finance Committee, also for report. The preface which was read, follows:

**Preface.**

The establishment of an iron and steel industry within the Province of British Columbia is a national subject of much moment.

Prior to the war it received support from the Provincial Government, the Associated Boards of Trade and the press as a problem of the Pacific deserving attention; but, as the necessary capital for the enterprise failed to materialize, British Columbia's opportunity to assist the Empire with steel and armor in the great struggle that followed was temporarily lost.

Other minerals and products that were furnished during the war, such as gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc, coal and timber however, drew the attention of the world to the wealth of the province at a time when all the resources of the British Empire came up for classification and since that time the subject of basic industries for British Columbia, the hidden treasure-house of all useful minerals, has received serious consideration in Great Britain and elsewhere.

**Steel is Needed.**

Recently this Province has received "special" attention on account of its geographical position on the Pacific and proximity to the Far East and has been mentioned with particular reference to Imperial protection of the Coast.

Steel ship construction, which was started a few years ago in Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert, cannot possibly be of permanent nature when the essential material will have to be carried from the Atlantic coast at high freight rates. The present condition of this industry is a conclusive proof hereof.

Other important industries and manufactures which depend upon iron and steel as the vital material, are suffering in a similar manner.

The necessity of an iron and steel industry is therefore admitted by all unbiased observers of national economy, and that a start will be made during the ensuing year there is but little doubt. If so it would be the dawn of a new industrial era for this province and would make it independent of the Far and the Near East.

**Selection of Site.**

The selection of a site on the Coast, where facilities for shipping by rail and water are favorable and the supply of raw material plentiful will be a feature of the greatest importance to the proposed industry.

Several cities on the southern coast have already made bids for preference. This is not to be wondered at since the south has the support of a greater

**LEVEL CROSSING AT COW BAY NEXT WEEK**

Forty men, mostly carpenters, will start work on Tuesday morning on the superstructure of the new ocean dock here which is to be built by the Simmons Construction Co., of Winnipeg. Materials are already on the ground and the work will proceed with dispatch.

The work on the Cow Bay level crossing which is to be put in by the provincial government will also start next week and about a dozen rockmen and bridgemen will be employed.

Excavation gangs will soon start work on the railway station. Some of the men will come from Prince George.

In the near future 40 tie cutters will be sent to Williams & Morgan's tie camp at Burns Lake. Mr. Morgan left for Burns Lake on this morning's train.

## PIONEER BUSINESS MAN OF THIS CITY LEFT FOR FAR SOUTH

William P. Lynch on route Today for Buenos Aires, via New York.

W. P. Lynch left this morning's train for New York on his way to Buenos Aires, Argentina, where he plans to remain permanently. It was reported for some time that Mr. Lynch had intended going to South America but it had been thought that he had given up the idea and his departure this morning came somewhat as a surprise to many of his friends and business associates.

Mr. Lynch is one of the real old timers of Prince Rupert, having established in the grocery business with his brother, the late J. M. Lynch, in 1909. Later he branched out into other lines of business and was associated in recent years with J. G. Scott and G. W. Nickerson in the Graham Island Lumber Co., he having promoted the company. He disposed of his property at the junction of First, Second and Third Avenues recently and also severed his connection with the grocery firm of Lynch Bros. & McMeekin about six months ago. He is still interested in the Graham Island Lumber Co.

Mr. Lynch always took an active part in public affairs and was a member of the city in the first council of 1910 when Fred Stark was mayor. His departure from the city will be regretted by a large circle of friends who will wish him success in South America.

## WOULD CANCEL ALL WAR DEBTS

International Chamber of Commerce Urges Steps Be Taken To That End.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Steps toward reaching an adjustment of the war debts between the Allied nations were urged in resolutions forwarded to the Chancellor of the Exchequer by the British National Committee of the International Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

The resolutions which were unanimously adopted by the committee advocate the "desirability of negotiations in order to obtain the benefits which in the opinion of the committee would result if the war debts of the Allies to Great Britain was reduced or cancelled on terms to be agreed upon."

The committee comprises leading representatives of financial, commercial and industrial interests.

## SEPARATE PARTY GREAT BRITAIN

Irish Unionists Break Away from Coalition and Birkenhead Also Wavers.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The recent rumor that Lord Birkenhead, British Lord Chancellor, is not unlikely to break away from the coalition Government on the Irish question is now more definitely crystallizing. The Saturday Review says that forty-three Unionists, who supported Col. Gratian's recent motion of censure of the Government for negotiating with the Sinn Fein have decided to form a separate party.

## BEREAVED FAMILY LEFT FOR FRANCE

Mrs. A. Portet and Four Children Went Out on This Morning's Train.

Mrs. A. Portet and family of four children left on this morning's train for France. They will go to Montreal and from there will embark for Le Havre. From that port they will go by train to Bordeaux, near which city is the family home. The sending of the family, the breadwinner of which was killed some time ago in a logging accident, was made possible by the generosity of various charitable institutions and the public at large. Before departing Mrs. Portet expressed her deep appreciation for sympathy and assistance that had been extended to herself and family.

## RUSSIANS SHOT FOR STEALING

From Government Stocks of Confiscated Jewelry Since Bolshevik Regime Started.

MOSCOW, Nov. 5.—Nineteen men have been shot and forty women have been imprisoned by a Moscow court martial for thefts of jewelry from government stocks. The jewelry stolen had been confiscated from individuals and shops since the beginning of the Bolshevik regime.

## AUSTRIA PRESS SAYS EXCLUSION ACT IS FAILURE

VIENNA, Nov. 5.—The Hapsburg Dethronement Act in Hungary is declared by the Austrian press to be inadequate from the viewpoint of Austria and the Little Entente nations. It is claimed that it has failed expressly to exclude Ex-King Charles and other Hapsburgs from being elected to the kingship. Therefore, it is declared that neither Czechoslovakia or Jugo-Slavia armies will be demobilized.

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## VICTORIA VETS AMALGAMATION

The Meeting Last Night Launched Movement Towards Uniting Them All.

VICTORIA, Nov. 5.—The matter of amalgamating the war veterans' associations has been launched here. A committee has been appointed consisting of three members of each ex-service association in Victoria with a view to promoting the amalgamation of all the associations. Five hundred attended the meeting last night when the matter was opened here.

## BRITISH NEWS MAN GOES TO CONFERENCE

Lord Riddell Will Be in Charge of British Statements Given Out at Washington.

SOUTHAMPTON, Nov. 5.—Lord Riddell, the newspaper owner, sailed today on the Aquitania for New York. He will act as general press representative for the British Government at the Washington Conference which is to open next Friday. Lord Riddell was in charge of the British press statements issued at Paris during the Peace Conference. He is the mouthpiece for the government in all important conferences in England.

Fishing Privileges in This Port.

Some fishermen have asked The Daily News why American fishermen should be allowed to sell their catches in the open market at a Canadian port when Canadian fishermen are not allowed similar privileges on the American side.

In answer we would say that restrictions on trade are seldom beneficial. It may sometimes look as if the prices received were not as good because of the American boats coming, but it must be remembered that if these boats did not come here there would be fewer buyers at the port and very soon the demand would be less.

During the recent discussions on the subject it was semi-officially announced that if the privileges to American fishermen were withdrawn the cold storage plant would close down; other concerns would go out of business and the port would be less attractive in many respects.

In all experimental legislation there are causes and effects which we do not anticipate. It is almost impossible to foresee all the eventualities. To cut off privileges to Americans just because they have cut us off from similar privileges on their side would in this respect be to cut off the nose in order to spite the face.

Answers Given to Mr. Casey's Letter.

George Casey asks what would be our solution of the unemployment problem. In reply we would say that we have no solution to offer. We do, however, offer this suggestion that as a matter of principle every man has a right to a decent living if he is willing to work.

The second question in regard to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police is a difficult one. The Royal Northwest Mounted Police, of which the present force is the successor, did excellent service, and in many cases the present force is doing good service in outlying parts of the country.

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SMITHERS IS GROWING FAST

R. B. Warner of Interior News Tells of Growth and Prosperity of Bulkley Town.

L. B. Warner, editor and publisher of the Interior News, centred at Smithers, was in the city yesterday on the way south and took the opportunity of spending a few hours here boosting for Smithers, which he considers to be the hub of the Bulkley Valley and the very centre of the universe.

Mr. Warner says that Smithers is growing fast. It is getting there because of the spirit of the people and the richness of the country which it serves. He says it is today the best town west of Edmonton and every man there is an optimist.

Speaking of the building going on at Smithers, Mr. Warner says they have recently expended in building about \$200 for every man, woman and child in the place. They were thought foolish when they erected the hospital building, and doubly foolish when they built the community hall.

Work commenced on Tuesday on a new hotel to replace the Royal, which was burned down. It will have 23 bedrooms besides the usual dining room and offices, and is built in such a way that it can easily be added to later.

Among the other buildings is a rooming house which was opened last week by Frank Conway, known as the Evelyn Hotel, Duncan McRae, formerly lessee of the Royal Hotel, has leased Cook's building and is using it as a rooming. The accommodation is back to what it was before the fire and there is plenty of prospective business for all.

ELECTRIC LIGHT FOR SMITHERS

Contract Let for Erection of Poles and System to Be Complete by Christmas.

SMITHERS, Nov. 3.—Work commenced on the new electric light system which is being installed here. The poles are on the ground and the contract for erecting them has been let to H. L. 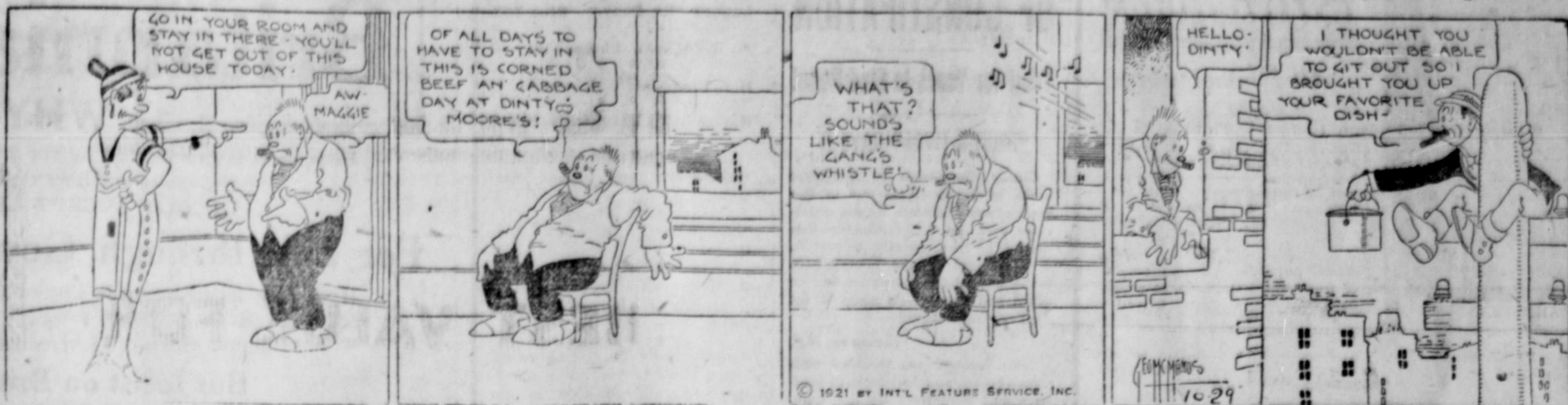

### In the Letter Box

#### DEFENDS COLONEL PECK

Editor Daily News:

In a recent issue of the Daily News Louis Forkrud raises the question of the wisdom of selecting Colonel Peck as our Federal representative "on account of his limited abilities as a speaker and logician."

I regret that I have never had the privilege of hearing Mr. Forkrud speak, but in the latter part of his statement he unfortunately confounds himself with his own argument. Any person who had the privilege of hearing Colonel Peck address his meeting a few nights ago in the Westholme Theatre, and heard him outline step by step his entry into Federal Politics, and his reasons for following the clear cut course which he pursued while our representative in the House of Commons, can not but admit the logic of his argument and the logic of his position today.

It is possible that Colonel Peck and Mr. Stork, have not that rare gift of eloquence which enables an orator to play upon his audience as a maestro wields his bow upon a violin and sway his hearers to laughter or tears at will, but Mr. Editor, the gentlemen in the House of Commons who are so gifted are to be numbered on the fingers of one hand, and their ability to change a single vote on the floor of the House is, it is to be regretted, not commensurate with their ability as orators.

**Served Apprenticeship.**

Mr. Forkrud's illustration of the bricklayer and pipefitter, is most apt. He is unquestionably correct when he says that what we want at Ottawa is a journeyman and not an apprentice. Colonel Peck has served his apprenticeship and from the Atlantic to the Pacific he is known and esteemed as the efficient Journeyman Parliamentarian that he is.

In regard to the "Fisheries Question" I should like Mr. Forkrud to point out any man who has done more than Colonel Peck has done to restore the salmon fishing industry to the white man. It is common knowledge that he has "jolted" the cannery combine severely and the cannery license has ceased to be a monopoly. It is to be regretted that Mr. Forkrud objects to this policy.

The final objection which Mr. Forkrud raises against Colonel Peck is that he failed to secure a larger cash bonus for the returned soldier. Mr. Editor, if the value of services rendered in the battlefield could be measured in dollars and cents there is no doubt but that the country owes much to a returned man, and to none could it owe more than to Colonel Peck. This question has been threshed out time and again in Parliament and elsewhere, and only a week ago at the convention of the various returned men's associations a "bonus" question was voted down because—as David Loneragan, editor of the "Veteran" said: "We have to face the cold financial facts." That convention decided that the most useful service the Government can render the returned men is a sound and sane policy of re-establishing him in the industrial activity of the country and that in its entirety has always been Colonel Peck's policy.

**Immense Deficit.**

Louis has concluded his letter with a pathetic reference to the railway situation, and it is with deep regret that we point out that the worst is still to come. According to M. A. Macdonald, Canada is to have a Liberal Government after December 6. He told us fearfully that the railway deficit this year was seventy million dollars. Waterfront Whiffs

Doings of the Mosquito Fleet Which is the Chief Source of Prince Rupert's Prosperity

The Admiral of the Mosquito Fleet returned to port, with his escort, early Thursday morning, and an interview was obtained with this distinguished personage on board the flagship of the fleet. Extremely dirty weather is reported during the past week which has not been conducive to very heavy catches in the deep sea fisheries. It is reported that a number of boats are still out of port, and as the Admiral explained, if the weather is found to be too rough for remunerative fishing, the boats would anchor in a handy anchorage and remain until the storm abated sufficiently to make the fishing worth while.

In referring to the party that went out recently on the Flora S and caused some local apprehension by being considerably overdue, the Admiral explained that in nautical circles "no news is good news" and that the only real danger existed in the event of a fire breaking out aboard. If very severe weather were encountered and a boat was driven ashore, it would, in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred, be thrown up high and dry on shore when a safe landing could be made. In political circles among the fishermen it is the general opinion that the Meighen administration is going to get an awful jolt on December 6 when the Government goes to the mat. The behavior of the crews is reported excellent and they are busy rustling up a little loose change to enable them to get a piece of turkey for Thanksgiving.

The Agnes B. Captain Bill Goodmansson, made port early Monday morning with a catch of 1000 pounds of halibut aboard which was sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. The weather experienced was in the words of Bill "absolutely impossible" and the catch was consequently a light one.

The new crank shaft for the Molly May arrived this week from Seattle which will enable the completion of the repair work to go on apace. It will be some few days yet before the work is completed and the Molly May is again in perfect shape to ply her trade.

The passenger boat Dixie-Rupert, Captain R. L. Newcomb, is in port after her recent private trip. The Dixie-Rupert is a snappy craft 35 feet long by an eight foot beam and is fitted with a 10-h.p. Frisco Imperial engine, and was built at the Wallace Yards, Vancouver, in 1910, has a carrying capacity of sixteen passengers and a speed of about seven knots an hour.

The Provincial Government is building a tool house across the track from Cow Bay ready for the work on the roadway at that point. There are already a number of men on the job and things are going to be pretty lively around the Bay for a while.

The Starston, Captain Ketchum, arrived in port on Wednesday night with a sew load of gravel for the city.

Capt. Freeman brought the Narbethong into port early Thursday morning from Port Simpson, to which point he had been with a party of three passengers returning from Prince Rupert. Bad weather was run into on both the outgoing and incoming trip.

The Fanny F., Captain Jim Bait, arrived in port Wednesday night and reported a real tough time on the deep sea fishing grounds. He encountered a terrific gale and as a consequence lost his anchor and cable, and had his work cut out to reach port.

Captain Jack Christensen of the Margalica, has just returned from the fishing grounds with his boat pretty badly smashed up, due to the awful storm. He lost one of his gear chutes and five or six skates of gear were washed overboard. The Margalica was caught in the storm while in the Beagle Straits and experienced one of the toughest fights with nature she has ever

had. Captain Christensen is resting on his laurels for the time being but is going to refit and take another chance in the near future.

The Pair of Jacks had a bad experience while out on the Whale Back fisheries, and returned to port Monday morning looking as though she had been through a severe naval engagement. The force of the strong sea breaking over the boat smashed the windows in the pilot house and it kept the crew fighting to keep the water away from the machinery and keep the power on, and the utmost difficulty was experienced in getting the gear back on board. In spite of these severe handicaps a medium catch was safely landed.

The Reliance, Captain R. Ringstead, is in port at Cow Bay undergoing some minor repairs and being refitted for sea. If the weather abates sufficiently the Reliance will be leaving for the deep sea fishing grounds early in the week.

The Lovera, Captain W. Norman, is still in port at Cow Bay not having been out the past week. The captain will probably be lying in port until December 6 as he has important private business pending until sometime in that month. The Lovera came from Ketchikan on October 30 and the port of Prince Rupert will be her home port in future.

The Athi, Captain Bryant Newcomb, arrived in port on Tuesday from the deep sea fisheries and had the fight of her life with the storm. However owing to the splendid seagoing qualities of the craft she weathered the storm remarkably well and there was no untoward damage done.

The Doreen, Capt. H. Doreen together with his brothers Stanley and Frank, are away on a hunting trip at Captain's Cove.

The D. C. F. I., Captain C. Wallace, is in Cow Bay refitting and will be leaving for the deep sea fishing grounds early in the week.

The following boats are at present tied up in Cow Bay: Clara, Chatham, Pioneer, Alma B. Monty, Birdie B., Bob, Silver Spray, Somme, Vixen of Vancouver, Karen, Annie May, White Lilly, Violet, Carl, Kobe, Jean, Lillian M., Ohio, Agnes B., Lovera, Scrub, Fanny F., Kenne Bee of Alaska, W. & F. N. & S., Helen D., Athi, E. Neilson, Samson and Oestaff.

The Wake, owned by Messrs. Ketchum and Newcomb is in port at Cow Bay, ready for charter, in perfect seagoing condition. She is a very roomy and excellently appointed craft, boasting of a bathroom, kitchen sink, stove, etc., in fact a regular home afloat. She is 16 feet long by 11 foot beam and is fitted with a 27 h.p. Kalenburg engine. She was originally owned by Bert Kergin, M.P. for Allyn, running between Granby and Alice Arm. The present owners purchased her last June.

Albert & McCaffery Ltd., are expecting the Prince Albert of Vancouver to dock at their wharf on Monday with a shipment of lath, lumber, sash and doors.

McHale brother-in-law of the Petersons went out Saturday with the Surveyor and brought in Mrs. Peterson. The two men stayed behind in an endeavor to salvage the engine and equipment of the Mallard. The Alta was a total loss.
