Conciliation Board Under Memieux Act to Hear Case For Reduction of Wages

ONTARIO, August 18.—The Minister of Labor has granted a board of conciliation to hear the objection of the five big railway roads against wage decreases in Canada. David Campbell is chosen to represent the men, and the railways will be given 10 days to choose their representative on the board. If no choice is made, the government will name one, and the government and the men will name the third member of the board.

OR TROUBLE IS LESSENING

Labor Gazette Reports
Strikes in July This
Year.

WA, Aug. 18.—The loss of working days due to industrial disputes in July this year was less than in July of 1920, the Labor Gazette for the month there were 103,554 working days lost, 8,083 workers were on strike, 1,910 working days were lost and 59 strikes in July.

Lloyd George Refers to Question

LONDON, Aug. 18.—Lloyd George in a statement in the House of Commons in regard to the recent conference of Imperial premiers said the conference unanimously recognized that Japan had loyally observed the alliance with Great Britain during the war, and he asked if it was right that Britain should now turn about and say to Japan, "Thank you for the trouble you have taken, but we don't want you any longer."

The statement was received with cries of "no" from members.

PROMINENT CLERGYMAN OF LONDON COMING TO PRINCE RUPERT SOON

Arrangements Are Being Made to
Have Prebendary Gough of St.
Paul's Address Canadian Club.

Honorary Canon A. W. Gough, F.R.S.L., of Brompton Square, London, prebendary of St. Paul's Church, one of England's leading churchmen will arrive here next Wednesday on the Prince Rupert and will stop over until Saturday before going to Edmonton. Prebendary Gough has been touring the United States and Canada for some time in connection with a campaign for the English-speaking Union. Recently he has been in Victoria and Vancouver, and yesterday in the latter city spoke in the Hotel Vancouver.

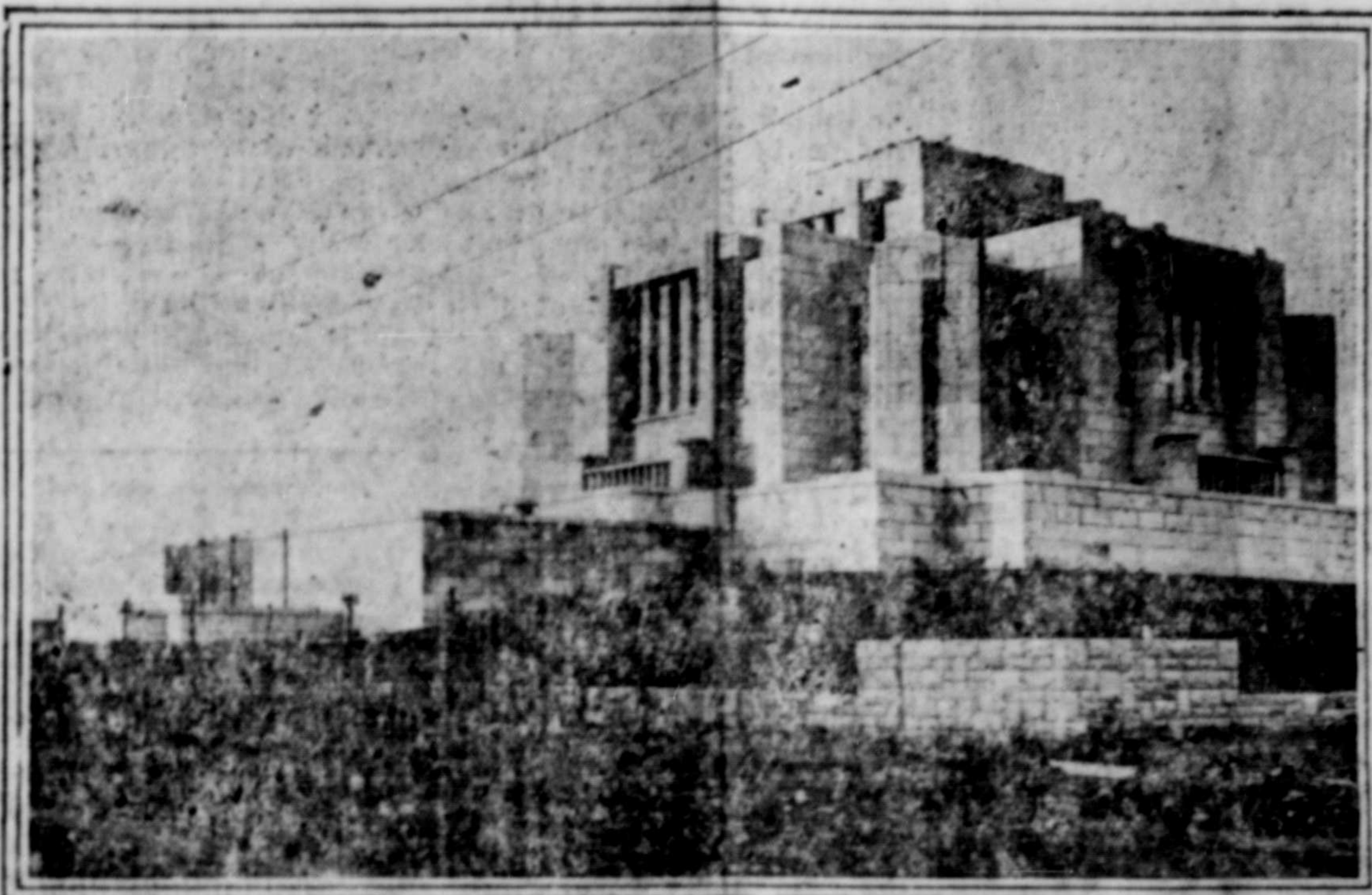

MORMON TEMPLE IN ALBERTA TO COST MILLION.



A Mormon temple which to date has cost nearly a million dollars is being built at Cardston, Canada, a place practically unheard of. The town, which is in southern Alberta, on a branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway, is now beginning to attract visitors from all parts of the continent. Cardston has been a centre of Mormon faith since 1887, when a company of Mormon immigrants from Utah, attracted by its agricultural possibilities, made it their home. The temple occupies the highest point in this settlement. The photo shows the temple. The lines of the building are all straight, no curved lines being used in its construction.

British Are Optimistic; Not Yet Convinced That Republicans Will Definitely Refuse Offers

LONDON, August 18.—Optimism in regard to the Irish situation still prevails at the British headquarters, where this attitude is being justified by the lack of definite rejection of the government's terms by Dail Eireann. Eamonn de Valera, the Irish republican leader, has not yet convinced the British of his sincerity in his uncompromising statements of the past two days, and the officials are reluctant to believe that the offer which appears so generous to them would be rejected outright.

The cabinet leaders and members of both the House of Lords and the House of Commons are keeping in close touch with developments at Dublin. It is believed that the King's speech regarding Parliament tomorrow will be largely concerned in Irish affairs.

DUBLIN, August 18.—Peace negotiations between the British Government and the Irish republican leaders were not mentioned at this morning's session of Dail Eireann.

GREAT HOME RUN SEASON

With Much of Year Still to Go,
Big Leaguers Away Ahead
of 1920 Records.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—With nearly one-third of the season yet to be played, the National League baseball sluggers have already rolled up 102 home runs more than were made in the entire 1920 season. The total to date is 363.

Despite the hard work of Babe Ruth of the New York Yankees, the American League is one behind the National batters with 362 homers.

PARIS, Aug. 12.—One thousand houses are reported to have been destroyed by fire in the Scutari section of Constantinople on the Asiatic bank of the Bosphorus, says a despatch received here.

REPORTED ATTEMPTED MURDER AND SUICIDE

Provincial Police Officer to be
Despatched to Ocean Falls
Tonight.

Chief Minty, of the provincial police, was notified this morning by wireless from Ocean Falls of an attempted murder and suicide by a Chinaman there. The victim, it is understood, is in critical condition and may not recover. An additional officer will be despatched from the local office tonight to go south on the Prince Rupert.

BOTTOMLEY WANTS BILL

Says Holland Should Deliver
ex-Kaiser to Allies for
Punishment.

LONDON, August 18.—A declaration that Holland should be called upon to surrender the former German Emperor was made today in the House of Commons by Horatio Bottomley, the famous writer and Independent member, who raised the question in connection with the recent trials in Leipzig of Germans accused of violation of the rules of organized warfare. Bottomley said that if Holland refused to give up William Hohenzollern and the British Government were unable to deal with the matter efficiently, the members should make way "for men of sterner stuff."

Unemployment Insurance Forecasted by Attorney General Farris, Vancouver

VANCOUVER, August 18.—Unemployment insurance was forecasted yesterday by Attorney-General Farris as a possible policy of the present government in dealing with the question of unemployment. It was at a meeting of the members of the government with representatives of the workers and returned soldiers for the purpose of trying to work out a scheme for solving the unemployment problem for the coming winter. Mr. Farris expressed the opinion that some insurance system against unemployment was bound to develop in Canada as a result of the experience through which they were now passing.

Unemployment insurance has been in vogue in Great Britain since several years before the war. Its enemies claim that it has been much abused and has caused idleness and aided strikes. On the other hand, there are many who claim it has been one of the greatest laws ever passed in that country and has been an aid in stabilizing industry and improving the condition of the workers.

FAIR PROSPECTS SILESIA AGAIN LOOKING BRIGHT BEFORE PUBLIC

Work of Preparing Grounds for
Sideshows at Exhibition
Building Under Way.

At the meeting of the Fair Committee last night it was reported that the permanent improvement of the grounds adjoining the exhibition buildings was under way under the personal supervision of W. E. Thompson. Already considerable work has been done and something like \$1000 will be spent on this improvement. This will include the erection of 250 feet frontage of outside booths for sideshows.

Applications for concessions for sideshows are already coming in, in addition to the merry-go-round and shooting galleries.

Bids are being called for inside and outside refreshment concessions, and for this a schedule and classification is being worked out. At the meeting last night a representative of the Football League was present and arrangements are under way with a view to suitable matches during fair week.

Preparation of the inside of the building is under way, and the committee in charge of that department announced last night that all the booth spaces would be taken up.

Committee Reports.

Committees are all working hard and arrangements are well under way for the big event next month. George Bryant had a report from the Sports Committee showing that there is going to be no dearth of attractions in that section. Publicity is being attended to by the committee under John McRae, while H. Pattinson, chairman of the Exhibits committee, reported that department in better shape than ever.

Two local companies, the Edson Coal Company and J. G. Weston, have offered prizes of coal for competition. The Malkin Co. of Vancouver will present several hampers of goods running in value in the neighborhood of \$5 each to exhibitors. They will be suitably allotted by the prize committee.

IRISHMAN LATELY MADE KNIGHT DEAD

Sir Samuel Davieson Passed
Away at His Home in Bangor.

BELFAST, Aug. 18.—Sir Samuel Davieson, who was knighted when King George opened the Ulster Parliament in May, is dead at his home in Bangor.

Fight Between Poles and Germans—Peace Agreement is Signed.

BERLIN, Aug. 18.—Twenty-four Poles were killed and many wounded in a fight between Poles and Germans in Upper Silesia. The frontier of the Poles was driven across the border.

KATTOWITZ, Upper Silesia, Aug. 18.—"Co-operation in the interest of their common motherland" was pledged in an agreement signed by representative German industrial and political leaders and labor representatives of the Polish parties in Silesia. Several members of the German Reichstag were among the signatories and the conference pledges itself to secure the support of the Polish people.

The conference was known by British representatives to be taking place and one member for Poland consulted the British Military Commander of Silesia afterwards.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—A special meeting of the council of the League of Nations has been called for August 29 at Geneva to consider the question of Upper Silesia.

CAUGHT WITH COUNTERFEIT

Two American Citizens Tried to
Pass Bad U. S. Bills Pay-
ment for Liquor.

FERNIE, Aug. 18.—T. E. Clarke and C. F. Johnson, United States citizens, were arrested here charged with passing counterfeit United States bills said to have been tendered to an employee of a liquor dealer in payment for a consignment intended for export.

The men are held pending the arrival of United States treasury officials and the automobile in which they were riding has been confiscated.

OTTAWA, Aug. 18.—Hon. G. J. Doherty and Sir George Perley have been chosen to represent Canada at the meeting of the League of Nations to be held at Geneva during the coming autumn.

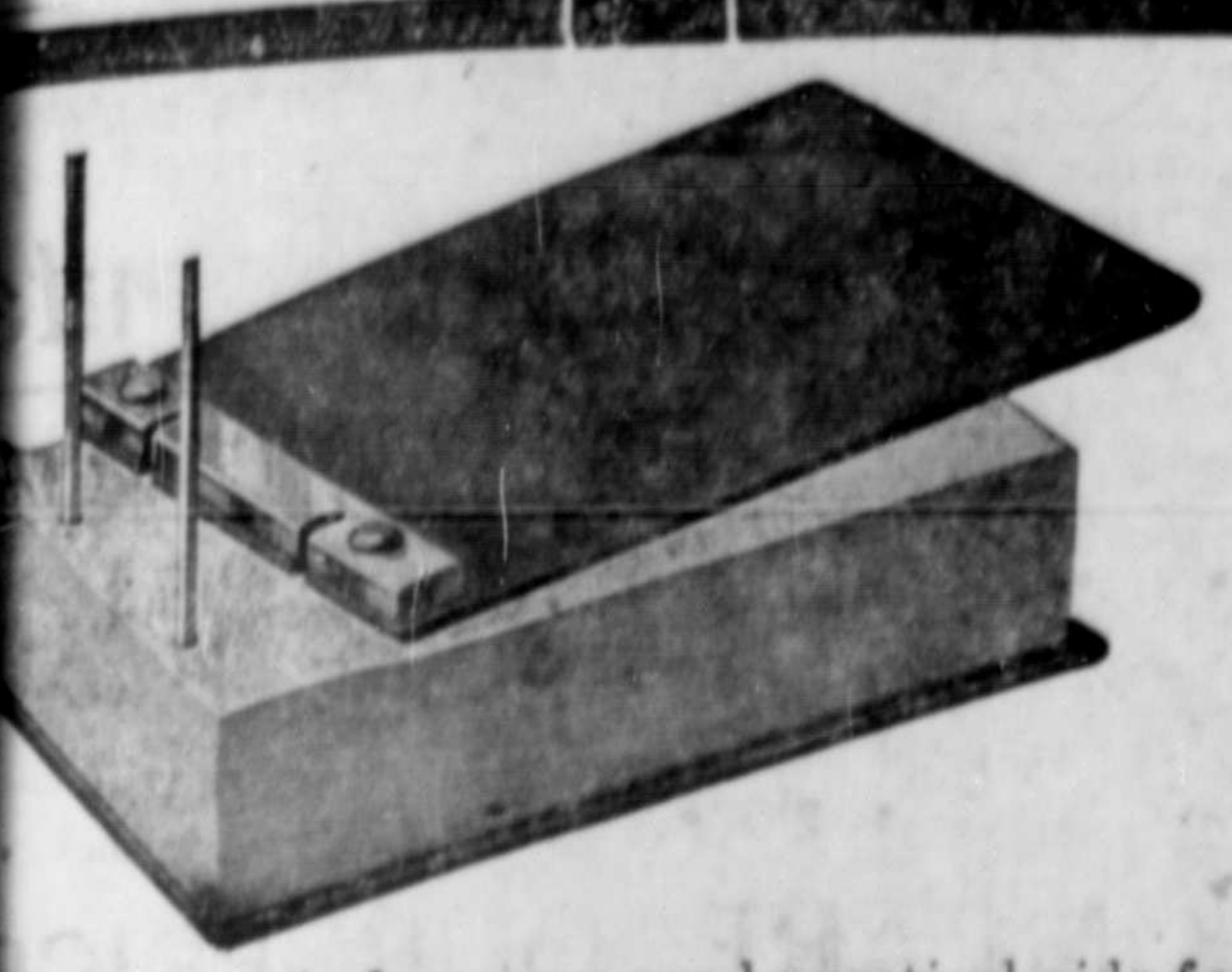

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POLITICS IN BRITAIN TODAY

Coalition Is Strong Because of Weakness of Opposing Forces.

LABOR WITHOUT ANY LEADERS IN HOUSE

Both Conservative and Liberal Broken by Lloyd George.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—(Canadian Press).—The present condition of British politics is more interesting and more momentous than at any time in the last hundred years. Thus writes Lord Beaverbrook in the London Express, and no one who discerns the powerful currents of the times, or notes how trivial were the issues of a century ago compared with the prodigious problems of today, can question the assertion. Practically all parties, and their salient personalities are seeking some new orientation which will bring them into closer contact with the currents of opinion and the realities of the age. Nor can this fact be ascribed, as so many in all countries will have it, to mere self-seeking on the part of politicians. What is going on is that Britain, which, despite what took place during the war is still suspicious of coalitions is looking for a regrouping and an escape from the rigidity which party fusion is charged with having imposed on the free flow of ideas.

A Breaking Up. Not that the coalition is with out powerful friends. Lloyd George, who, despite periods of adversity, bestrides his age as only Pitt or Fox, Gladstone or Disraeli could do, is the foremost advocate of its maintenance. He has broken the official Liberal party, driven most of its chieftains, such as Mr. Asquith and Sir John Simon into eclipse, and (according to his enemies) is now setting out to shatter the Conservative party in order that he may use its wreckage as one of the principal ingredients in a new middle-class Centre Party, which, to all intents and purposes, would be a continuation of the coalition. The creation of such a party, a sort of "middle-of-the-road" group, would involve two things. It would involve the exclusion of the Asquithian Liberals—the "Wee Frees"—who remain irreconcilable, and also the shedding of the old Tories. These two sections would be left practically helpless: They would be so mutually antagonistic as to be incapable of even temporary union; they could form neither an effective opposition nor an alternative government, and would therefore degenerate into such feebleness as to cease being worthy of support. There would thus be left only a single middle-class or moderate party consisting of Conservatives, Liberal-Conservatives and some Wee Free Liberals under the complete domination of the Lloyd George.

Present Condition. The British political situation resolves itself into this: That most Englishmen appear anxious to get back to the old two-party system, but that those who want to continue the coalition are strengthened by the feebleness of the leadership of Liberals and Conservatives and Laborists, who, although they desire the destruction of the ministry, defeat their purpose by cutting each others throats in the constituencies. What the outcome of it all will be is difficult to predict. If either Liberalism or Conservatism possessed strong leadership, the coalition would be sundered tomorrow.

There would be an almost immediate return to the ancient two-party system, with the Tories resolved into a moderate Conservative democracy and Labor merging into Liberalism and weighing in to the left. But for the moment strong leadership is not in sight. Lloyd George stands without a foe worthy of his steel. His enemies multiply and his path becomes hard, but he is a political strategist of consummate skill and there is no telling what he may do next. Should he succeed in settling the Irish question, and then go to Washington as one of the great figures in a world disarmament conference, it is not easy to imagine any power, no matter how powerful, casting him from his throne.

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
