Irish Situation Still Considered Hopeful

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT BUSY ON PLANS FOR EMPLOYMENT

Conciliation Board Under Lemieux Act to Hear Case For Reduction of Wages

TORONTO, August 18.—The Minister of Labor has granted conciliation to hear the objection of the five big railway unions against wage decreases in Canada. David Campbell will be chosen to represent the men, and the railways will be given two days to choose their representative on the board. If they do not make any choice, the government will name one, and the government and the men will name the third member between them.

An application for the board was made by the brotherhoods of the railways, including the government railway, refused to meet it.

DR TROUBLE IS LESSENING

Labor Gazette Reports
Strikes in July This
Year.

WA. Aug. 18.—The loss owing to industrial disputes in July this year was less than in July of 1920, the Labor Gazette for

the month there were 10 strikes involving 7,662 workers—an estimated loss of 103,554 working days. In 1920, 8083 workers had 910 working days in 21 and 59 strikes in July.

PROMINENT CLERGYMAN OF LONDON COMING TO PRINCE RUPERT SOON

Arrangements Are Being Made to
Have Prebendary Gough of St.
Paul's Address Canadian Club.

Honorary Canon A. W. Gough, F.R.S.L., of Brookfield Square, London, prebendary of St. Paul's Church, one of England's leading churchmen, will arrive here next Wednesday on the Prince Rupert and will stop over until Saturday before going to Edmonton. Prebendary Gough has been touring the United States and Canada for some time in connection with a campaign for the English-speaking Union. Recently he has been in Victoria and Vancouver, and yesterday in the latter city spoke in the Hotel Vancouver.

He has accepted the invitation of the Canadian Club to speak here at a luncheon which will likely be arranged for next Friday. It is possible that he may also address a public meeting. Such a prominent visitor in connection with church matters should receive a good reception in Prince Rupert.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—Lloyd George in a statement in the House of Commons in regard to the recent conference of Imperial premiers said the conference unanimously recognized that Japan had loyally observed the alliance with Great Britain during the war, and he asked if it was right that Britain should now turn about and say to Japan, "Thank you for the trouble you have taken, but we don't want you any longer."

The statement was received with cries of "no" from members.


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MORMON TEMPLE IN ALBERTA TO COST MILLION.



A Mormon temple which to date has cost nearly a million dollars is being built at Cardston, Canada, a place practically unheard of. The town, which is in southern Alberta, on a branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway, is now beginning to attract visitors from all parts of the continent. Cardston has been a centre of Mormon faith since 1887, when a company of Mormon immigrants from Utah, attracted by its agricultural possibilities, made it their home. The Temple occupies the highest point in this settlement. The photo shows the temple. The lines of the building are all straight, no curved lines being used in its construction.

British Are Optimistic; Not Yet Convinced That Republicans Will Definitely Refuse Offers

LONDON, August 18.—Optimism in regard to the Irish situation still prevails at the British headquarters, where this attitude is being justified by the lack of definite rejection of the government's terms by Dail Eireann. Eamonn de Valera, the Irish republican leader, has not yet convinced the British of his sincerity in his uncompromising statements of the past two days, and the officials are reluctant to believe that the offer which appears so generous to them would be rejected outright.

The cabinet leaders and members of both the House of Lords and the House of Commons are keeping in close touch with developments at Dublin. It is believed that the King's speech prolonging Parliament tomorrow will be largely concerned in Irish affairs.

DUBLIN, August 18.—Peace negotiations between the British Government and the Irish republican leaders were not mentioned at this morning's session of Dail Eireann.

GREAT HOME RUN SEASON

With Much of Year Still to Go,
Big Leaguers Away Ahead
of 1920 Records.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—With nearly one-third of the season yet to be played, the National League baseball sluggers have already rolled up 102 home runs more than were made in the entire 1920 season. The total to date is 363.

Despite the hard work of Babe Ruth of the New York Yankees, the American League is one behind the National batters with 362 homers.

BIG FIRE REPORTED FROM CONSTANTINOPLE

Thousands Houses Said to Have
Been Destroyed in Scutari
Section.

PARIS, Aug. 18.—One thousand houses are reported to have been destroyed by fire in the Scutari section of Constantinople on the Asiatic bank of the Bosphorus, says a despatch received here.

REPORTED ATTEMPTED MURDER AND SUICIDE

Provincial Police Officer to be
Despatched to Ocean Falls
Tonight.

Unemployment Insurance Forecasted by Attorney General Farris, Vancouver

VANCOUVER, August 18.—Unemployment insurance was forecasted yesterday by Attorney-General Farris as a possible policy of the present government in dealing with the question of unemployment. It was at a meeting of the members of the government with representatives of the workers and returned soldiers for the purpose of trying to work out a scheme for solving the unemployment problem for the coming winter. Mr. Farris expressed the opinion that some insurance system against unemployment was bound to develop in Canada as a result of the experience through which they were now passing.

Unemployment insurance has been in vogue in Great Britain since several years before the war. Its enemies claim that it has been much abused and has caused idleness and aided strikes. On the other hand, there are many who claim it has been one of the greatest laws ever passed in that country and has been an aid in stabilizing industry and improving the condition of the workers.

FAIR PROSPECTS SILESIA AGAIN LOOKING BRIGHT BEFORE PUBLIC

Work of Preparing Grounds for Fight Between Poles and Germans—Sideshow Building Under Way.

At the meeting of the Fair Committee last night it was reported that the permanent improvement of the grounds adjoining the exhibition buildings was under way under the personal supervision of W. E. Thompson. Already considerable work has been done and something like \$10,000 will be spent on this improvement. This will include the erection of 250 feet frontage of outside booths for sideshows.

Applications for concessions for sideshows are already coming in, in addition to the merry-go-round and shooting galleries.

Bids are being called for inside and outside refreshment concessions, and for this a schedule and classification is being worked out.

At the meeting last night a representative of the Football League was present and arrangements are under way with a view to suitable matches during fair week.

Preparation of the inside of the building is under way and the committee in charge of that department announced last night that all the booth spaces would be taken up.

Committee Reports.

Committees are all working hard and arrangements are well under way for the big event next month. George Bryant had a report from the Sports Committee showing that there is going to be no dearth of attractions in that section. Publicity is being attended to by the committee under John McLean, while H. Paterson, chairman of the Exhibits Committee, reported that department in better shape than ever.

Two local companies, the Edson Coal Company and J. G. Weston, have offered prizes of coal for competition. The Malkin Co. of Vancouver will present several hamper of goods running in value in the neighborhood of \$5 each to exhibitors. They will be suitably allotted by the prize committee.

ment for Liquor.

FERNIE, Aug. 18.—T. E. Clarke and C. F. Johnson, United States citizens, were arrested here charged with passing counterfeit United States bills said to have been tendered to an employee of a liquor dealer in payment for a consignment intended for export.

The men are held pending the arrival of United States treasury officials and the automobile in which they were riding has been confiscated.

**What Is Wrong
With Body Politic?**

What is wrong with the body politic? That is a question which is bound to be asked at a time like this when there is a certain amount of unemployment and consequent suffering in the world. It is a time when the faddist gets busy and tries to show that he has a remedy for all the ills. He will show how iniquitous is the present system and how the system which he advocates will bring the millennium.

And yet in spite of that we find an ideal republic, that of Georgia, swallowed up by a bigger republic, that of Soviet Russia, and in that same Soviet Russia the people are starving and the Soviet, which was to be the cure-all for the diseases of the body politic there, has to appeal to the nations of the capitalistic world for help. It is only because the rest of the world is capitalistic that it is able to help.

**One Way to Change
The Body Politic.**

There is only one way to bring about a permanent change in the body politic and that is to change the people. There has to be a growing away from the things which have made all governments bad and a movement toward those things which make for betterment. The growth is partly moral and partly intellectual, and the intellectual development has to be equally as great as the moral development. The time will come when it will be considered immoral for people to spend money on their own pleasures when there are other people hungry. The time will also come when intellectually people will be developed and their visions broadened so that they will be able to distinguish between the false and the true. They will be able to analyze for themselves and not allow the spellbinder or the agitator to carry them away. No one likes to think that he has not enough mental ability to weigh the pros and cons and think for himself, and yet it is true that very few have that ability. An adventurous voyage on the intellectual sea is very likely to prove disastrous, and it is only when we have that sea properly charted and danger marks put on the shoals, with safeguards against the storms of adversity and preparations to meet the dangers of tropical sunshine and the doldrums, that we can begin to use our intellectual faculties with advantage to ourselves and without danger to the rest of the world.

**Visionary Schemes
Are Attractive.**

There is no short cut to this development. Experience is the only teacher. We see all sorts of visionary schemes which are attractive, but which on being tried prove failures. We have to experiment in order to find out. The unknown is always attractive or else people could not sell oil stocks, neither could they sell stock in the world to come. Just as there are growing pains in youth, so in the intellectual growth of the nations there have to be these growing pains, sometimes convulsions and occasionally national extinction, all part of the process of intellectual development of the mass of the people. A little knowledge is dangerous. Safety comes with the wider education which gives power to see things in their relation to other things. Intellectual forces have to be harnessed, just as we have harnessed electricity and are beginning to harness radium and other physical forces.

**Nothing to
Cause Worry.**

Some people are worried because they think the world is going to the bowwows. There is no need to worry. The whole civilized world, as we call it, is becoming active. There is a gradual speeding up of all activities and in the working out there is bound to be a certain amount of suffering. To aid in the making of the inevitable changes and at the same time to prevent too great suffering in the process is the work of the great men of the day. Think what a great work Lloyd George has done in getting the various classes together and moulding them to accept changes, and that without friction. Think what other great men can do. There is a wonderful work to be done in the future.

BOSTON LEARNS OF BASEBALL ON ALASKAN COAST

ion Day, July 4, and the Prince Rupert team comes to Ketchikan for the Fourth of July.

This year Ketchikan has a city league composed of four teams, called the Chums, Gophers, Humpies, and Sockeyes, after varieties of salmon, the canning of which is one of the principal industries of Alaska. A team made up of the best players from these four teams visited Prince Rupert and was defeated in two games, the scores being 4 to 3 and 12 to 7, respectively, in favor of Prince Rupert. In turn, the Prince Rupert team played at Ketchikan on July 3 and lost by 4 to 2 to the Ketchikan team, the visitors not getting a run until the ninth inning. The playing of a second game was prevented by rain.

With Metlakatla.
Ketchikan also plays the Indians from Metlakatla every season, and the two games played so far this year resulted in Ketchikan being victorious.

Because of the long, light summer evenings, the games at Ketchikan are called at 6 p.m. on week days, which enables the young men from the offices, shops, and other employment to participate, and the enthusiastic townspeople to witness the games.

In former years the Ketchikan ball-fields were on the tide flats, and the stage of the tide governed the time of calling a game. This year the new grounds are being used. They are in the park provided by the centre of town, and for which considerable money has been spent in draining and clearing raw land. A substantial grand stand has been erected, and tennis courts are being provided. Other improvements will be made as funds are available, and Ketchikan will have an attractive pleasure ground.

New Park.
The park is beautifully located near the base of Deere Mountain. The park is skirted with a fringe of evergreen, and is reached by a good automobile road, which crosses and runs along Ketchikan creek, a pretty winding mountain stream. Later this road will be connected with another, shorter road, running along the other bank of the creek, and which will circle the park, making a sort of elongated horseshoe.
