Signs Of Weakening In De Valera RELIEF WORK LIMITED BY PROVINCIAL FINANCES SAY MINISTERS

De Valera Will Negotiate With Lloyd George In Regard To Future Status of Ireland but Under Protest

DUBLIN, August 17.—De Valera, in addressing the Sinn Fein at its opening session, said that Ireland still demands independence and separation from the British Empire. He would negotiate further with Lloyd George only to save bloodshed. He remarked that there were people who would only to save their faces. Ireland would negotiate for a principle. De Valera promised to outline the negotiations already commenced with Lloyd George. Thereafter Sinn Fein will consider behind closed doors. Professor John McNeill, the retiring speaker, acted as chairman of the new speaker was appointed. He spoke in Gaelic, any of the other members, but finished in English because the language was known to few members. There was a complete attendance at the gathering except for Devlin and two or three Nationalists elected by Sinn Fein. The day in Dublin, but did not answer the roll call.

ALLEGED FOUL PLAY AFFAIR

Chief Minty, of Provincial Police, Receives Advice of Mystery Near Hyder.

News of a suspected foul play affair near Hyder, Alaska has reached the city through a telegram received yesterday by Chief Minty, of the provincial police, from Constable Searlett, of Stewart. The message which is rather vague reads as follows: "In a radio from Anyox to Hyder, the operator states that a prospector reports the finding of a body fifteen miles from Swamp Point probably that of a man from Hyder, Alaska. Yesterday, Charlie Smith, a prospector, reported the finding of a body on Portland Canal to Constable Dryden, of Anyox. Smith is now in Prince Rupert. Commissioner Reed, of Hyder, requests you to interrogate Smith and wire your findings to him as extradition may be sought. A coroner's jury at Hyder now suspects foul play." Chief Minty reported today that he had been unable, as yet, to locate Smith here.

Romance, Adventure and Crime Associated with Peter of Serbia, now Dead

BELGRADE, Serbia, August 17.—Ending a life of romance and adventure and one closely associated with many awful crimes, here passed away here yesterday King Peter, until recently ruler of Serbia, one of the outstanding figures of the European monarchies.

King Peter of Serbia, 76 years old, white-haired, deaf, ill from the infirmities of age and suffering from the wounds of three or more wars, relinquished the cares of state in 1919, when his second son, Crown Prince Alexander, succeeded him and became the ruler of the new state of Yugoslavia. He then declared: "My beloved Serbia is now free and its future, I believe, will be a great one. My work is over. I desire only the continued affection and devotion of my dear people and, finally, a grave on Serbian soil."

Despite his age, King Peter presented one of the most courageous figures of the war. On the day that Serbia rejected the Austrian demands, Peter renounced his temporary abdication of the throne and placed himself once more at the head of the country. He was then almost sightless and hard of hearing and was under the constant care of a physician. When the fortunes of war turned against the Serbians he remained with his armies till practically the last units had been driven from the country. He then effected an escape through Albania and went to Saloniki where he presided over the reorganization of his forces. Afterward he went to Corfu where he established headquarters and took an active part in the direction of his nomadic government.

Forced from his capital, Belgrade, and thence from Nish by the advancing army of the Central Powers in 1915, his country laid waste by fire and shell, Peter lived to return to Serbia and engage actively in the reorganization and reconstruction of his domains. From the beginning of the conflict, the aged King encouraged his troops and people despite the most depressing reverses and on several occasions personally led the Serbs into battle.

King Peter was tall, erect and muscular and in spite of his age had the appearance of a much younger man. He had all the rugged qualities of one sprung from from the soil. He took pride in referring to his humble origin and throughout his life lived modestly and unostentatiously. He was extremely democratic and affable. His tastes were simple to the point of severity. He was beloved by his people, particularly the peasantry, who called him "Father Peter." But his royal career was beclouded by a grave and terrible tragedy—the assassinations of his predecessor, King Alexander and the latter's wife, Queen Draga—in the palace at Belgrade on June 10, 1903. A suspicion that members of the Karageevitch family, of which Peter was a member, were implicated in the conspiracy which exterminated the rival ruling Obrenovitch dynasty of which Alexander and Draga were representatives, and which placed Peter (Continued on Page Six.)

The grand lodge rejected a proposal to admit to membership all pioneers of Alaska and rejected a motion to change the name of the organization to Alaska and Yukon Pioneers because they said the Yukon applies to all who pioneered the Yukon River or its watershed before 1900.

SPEED BOAT WITH SCOTCH WAS SEIZED

VICTORIA, Aug. 17.—The American speed boat Venture enroute from Vancouver to Seattle with 30 cases of Scotch whiskey was seized by a customs boat and found wanting clearance papers. The boat is held at Ganges and the liquor at Victoria awaiting an inquiry. H. Markenson and J. Joselson who were aboard were released and returned to Seattle.

ANCIENT LAW IS INVOKED

In Trial of Chief Fry of Victoria
Magistrate Delays Proceedings.

VICTORIA, Aug. 17.—At the close of the prosecution of Chief of Police Fry on charges of failing to enforce the law against Chinese lottery houses the case was adjourned until Thursday to permit the magistrate to consider the point brought by counsel for the defense to the effect that the prosecution failed to prove an indictable offense. The ancient law was invoked from the days of George III and hitherto unpealed, providing a maximum penalty of a fine of forty shillings for a constable failing to perform his duty.

MOISTURE FOR A DRY YUKON

DAWSON, Aug. 17.—The Yukon Government has been notified that the United States has lifted the embargo on liquor shipments through Alaska to Yukon territory. This will allow liquor to reach here from the outside and will put out of business the private stills which have been in operation since the shortage began to be felt.

Possibility of General Election.

Following the suggestion made in this paper yesterday that the general election would not be earlier than next spring, attention has been drawn to an article on the front page of Saturday Night in which the writer suggests that the election will come before the census results are known.

From Ottawa I learn, quite unofficially of course, that the census figures when published will show some quite astonishing results. One outstanding feature is the growth of Quebec, not only in relation to population but also to the increase of wealth. Unless I am very badly misled there are going to be some heart-burnings in other provinces in respect to seats in the House of Commons.

During the ninth Parliament, 1900-04, there was but one change in the representation, a seat being added for the Yukon Territory. This made 214 members and the distribution was as follows: Ontario, 86; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 18; New Brunswick, 13; Manitoba, 10; Northwest Territories, 10; British Columbia, 7; Prince Edward Island, 4, and the Yukon, 1.

In 1905 provision was made for the creation of the new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta out of part of the Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan with 10 and Alberta with 7 members, making a grand total of 221 members.

During the session of 1914 a redistribution bill was passed providing for an increase of members to 234, divided as follows: Ontario, 82; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 16; New Brunswick, 11; Manitoba, 15; British Columbia, 13; Prince Edward Island, 3, and the Yukon, 1.

It will be noted from the above figures that the older provinces have steadily lost membership in the House of Commons (all except Quebec, of course), and it is more than likely that the redistribution, which will be based upon the census now being completed, will see these changes continuing.

The Ottawa wisecrackers are of the opinion, however, that there will be no redistribution before another general election.

In a word, it is said that the government wishes to know the worst and is not disposed to hang in suspense until such time as the census figures can be utilized for redistribution purposes.

Disarmament Quite Possible.

Disarmament is quite within the realms of possibility. It may at first be only a restriction in the amount of money spent on armaments or a restriction on the number of ships built for use in the navy. In any case, it will be better than a race for supremacy such as was going on when Germany forced war on the world.

Dire Need of An Ambulance.

An ambulance is badly needed in the city. The Daily News has drawn attention to it before. Only recently events have occurred which have again brought the need to public notice. The News has been asked to give publicity to the need and to try to induce the authorities to come to the rescue.

It has been put like this: If a patient has to be carried to the hospital under conditions which cause him intense suffering, the authorities who fail to provide the necessary ambulance are the ones who are directly responsible for causing that suffering. They are just as guilty as if they stood over the man and tortured him when in that helpless condition.

BOOTLEGGERS JAIL SENTENCE

Six Ketchikan Men Given Both Fines and Imprisonment—One Fined.

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 17.—Sentences aggregating nine months in jail and fines of \$2,250 were imposed by Judge Robert W. Jennings in the United States district court for bootlegging. Six defendants were sent to jail for terms ranging from one to three months, while the seventh one convicted was assessed a fine of \$250.

R. W. Hearn, Phil Warren, J. B. King and Chic Patten on each were sentenced to one month in jail and a fine of \$500. C. D. Gellie was sentenced to two months in jail; E. G. Grabbe to three months in jail; O. D. Velie was assessed by \$250 without any jail sentence.

Counsel for the accused persons asked for leniency in all cases as none of them had been before the court before.

Must Pay Price. Judge Jennings, before imposing sentence, told the defendants that the juries had found them guilty, that they had all had fair trials and that they must now pay the penalty. He reminded them that anyone who knowingly takes his chance of getting by in violating the law, imposing on the weaknesses of other men, must pay the price, as everyone in the world must pay the price for every act on which there is a price. He also said he would impose sentences which they would feel, and not nominal punishments which they would not feel.

SCHOOLS FOR PALESTINE

LONDON Aug. 17.—So comprehensive is the education plan of the government of Palestine that, at the present rate of progress, the whole country will be provided with schools within four years, it is announced here.

Since January, 34 new village schools, providing elementary education for 1,360 children, have been opened, while 46 state-wide schools provided in villages by the inhabitants have been taken over by the government. An additional 35 schools will be opened during the current financial year, it is announced.

Measures also are being taken for the development of the two training colleges for teachers. Teachers are also being appointed to live among the Bedouin tribes and teach their children. A central education committee has been formed, consisting of four Moslems, three Jews and three Christians.

Under the arrangements now in force the people of the villages provide the buildings and furniture and keep them in repair, while the government pays the salaries of the teachers and other costs of maintenance.

ALICE ARM

Speculation is rife as to the possibility of the Boly Varden mine changing hands on account of the recent visits of experts to the property. It is reported that shipping will cease this week and the railroad will be closed again. All ore taken out this summer has been done by the creditors of the Taylor Mining Co. under the name of the North Trust Co.

The Alice Arm real estate market is showing signs of activity. A McGuire last week purchased Austen Henderson's house and lot for \$1000 and also a couple of lots from J. Lullie for \$600.

The old telegraph office is being jacked up and braced by George Beandin and is also to have a new verandah and stairway. It has been sinking for some years and was recently getting in bad shape.

Mining activity on the Hlanece River lately has been very noticeable. Another good lead has been opened at the Bellevue, and Bone & Hodgson have five men at work on the Monarch. Morely & Clary are preparing to work their claims on Copper Creek all winter.

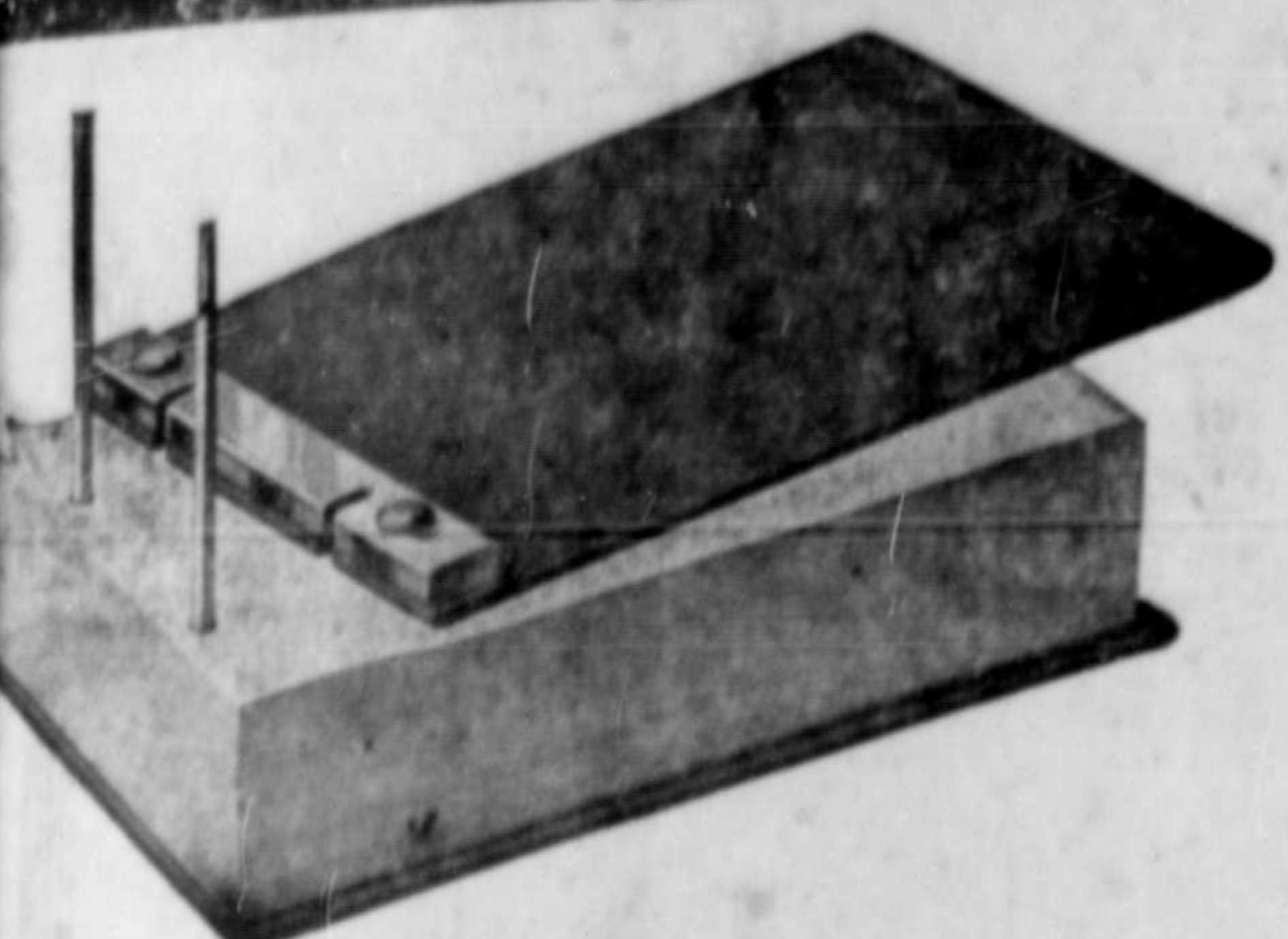

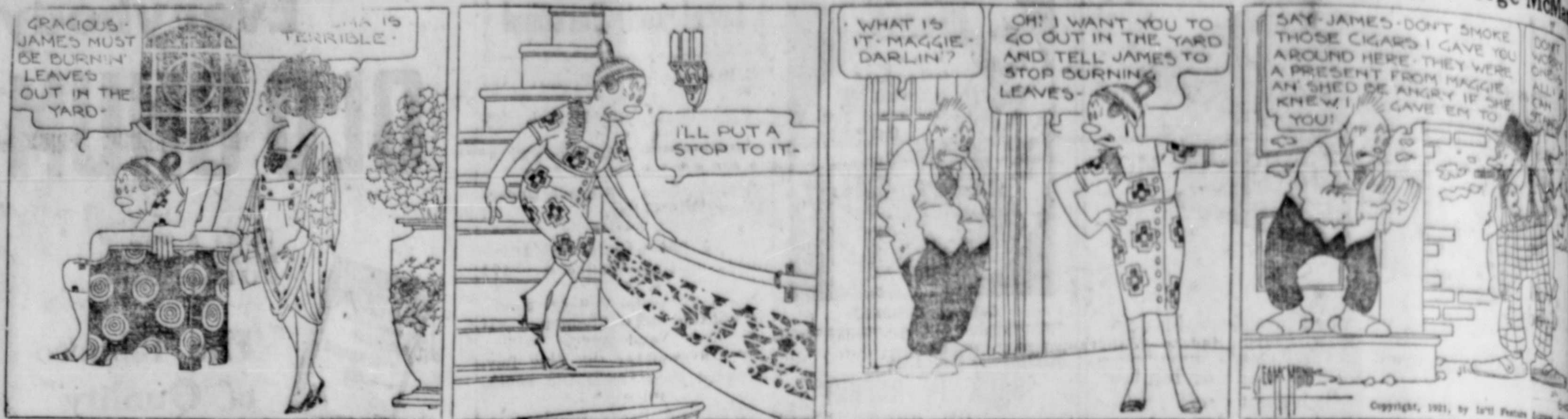

Effort Made to Increase Production by That Means—Printing Money.
RIGA, Latvia, July 17.—Many experiments are being introduced in the management and supply system of Russian factories in order to obtain products to exchange with the peasants for food. Some time ago a piece work scale was introduced in the hope that this would incite individual workmen to increased efforts. According to a Moscow dispatch,

all factory managements have been ordered to carry it into effect urgently and immediately.

In many industrial concerns a collective rationing plan has been substituted for the old system of granting individual rations. Under the new method a whole factory is granted individual allowance of foodstuff and money on the condition that it turns out a stipulated amount of goods.
If the factory is able to produce this quantity with a smaller number of workmen than estimated, the surplus of foodstuffs and money can be distributed among the workmen as a premium.
Easy Money.
The All-Russian Council of Trade Unions has issued a circular pointing out that increases of wages in money payments are inadvisable at this time because this would necessitate an increase in the output of currency which the government is unable to print in sufficient quantities. The government is said to have been printing until lately about 200,000,000 of rubles of paper money a month. This amount has been increased to the maximum possible output of the printing machines.

on the throne five days later, was never entirely removed. In 1911, when King Peter made a tour of Europe, he received somewhat of a cold reception from other royalties.

The Awful Tragedy.

All told, more than 50 persons were killed or wounded in the palace at Belgrade when 10 army officers forced their way in with dynamite, shot down all who stood in their way as they pressed toward the apartments of King Alexander and Queen Draga, and murdered their majesties as they crouched in a corner of their room, clasped in each other's arms. Their bodies were cast through a window, glass and all, into the palace park. At the same time two cabinet ministers were assassinated in their homes.

Family Feuds.

The background of this coup d'etat has never been brought sharply to focus. There were two royal families claimants in Serbia—the Karageorgevitch and Obrenovitch families—during the past 100 years. The former, from which King Peter was descended, established itself in part when "Black George," the first conspicuous member of the family rose as leader of his people against the Turks. He had all but liberated them, when he was accused of being a traitor and Milosh Obrenovitch, a swineherd, rose in his stead, and carried the war against the Turks to successful termination. Thus the regal feud between the two families began. Milosh established himself as a Prince in 1817.

recognized even by the Sultan. Meanwhile "Black George" sought to reclaim his power and was slain.

The Obrenovitch family held sway until 1842, when Alexander Karageorgevitch, a son of "Black George," was elected Prince, mainly through the influence of Russia. But he came to grief in his relations with Russia and Turkey, and was driven out of the country by his rebellious subjects, who reinstated the Obrenovitch family. Michael, a son of Milosh, became King, only to be murdered at the instigation of the exiled Alexander Karageorgevitch, on June 10, 1868. Alexander failed in his attempt to seize the crown, and was forever banished. The Obrenovitch youth, Milan, who succeeded to the throne, was so notorious for his excesses that he was soon exiled to Paris.

Court Scandal.

His son Alexander Obrenovitch became King—and brought his profligate father back to Belgrade as Commander-in-Chief of the army. Meanwhile he astounded Europe by his infatuation for Draga, the divorced wife of a Colonel Masehin, who was lady-in-waiting to his mother, Queen Natalie. The Serbians resented the scandals of the court. After the marriage took place, in defiance of all that was said against it, the intriguing Draga was exposed in her efforts to palm off a bogus child as heir-in-law to the throne.

It was at this juncture that the butchery of the night of June 10 occurred. It was on the anniversary of the murder of Michael Obrenovitch. This time the Obrenovitch dynasty was wiped out. The pretender Peter Karageorgevitch, was then living in Geneva, supposedly removed from all of the political intrigues at Belgrade. When word was carried to him of the assassination he expressed his horror, and declared the crime had been perpetrated without his knowledge. Five days later he ascended the throne. The European nations broke off all diplomatic relations, and resumed them only upon promise that the new King would punish the conspirators. This, it is charged, was never done.

Despite this handicap King Peter accomplished many big things for Serbia and became the idol of his people because of his strong anti-Austrian and pro-Russian attitude.
