# Signs Of Weakening In De Valera

## RELIEF WORK LIMITED BY PROVINCIAL FINANCES SAY MINISTERS

*Sinn Fein Will Negotiate With Lloyd George In Regard To Future Status of Ireland but Under Protest*

DUBLIN, August 17.—De Valera, in addressing the Sinn Fein at its opening session, said that Ireland still demands independence and separation from the British Empire. He would negotiate further with Lloyd George only to save bloodshed. He remarked that there were people who had only to save their faces. Ireland would negotiate for principle.

De Valera promised to outline the negotiations already completed with Lloyd George. Thereafter Sinn Fein will consider closed doors.

Professor John McNeill, the retiring speaker, acted as chairman of the new speaker was appointed. He spoke in Gaelic, any of the other members, but finished in English because language was known to few members.

There was a complete attendance at the gathering except for De Valera and two or three Nationalists elected by Sinn Fein, present the day in Dublin, but did not answer the roll call.

### BIG LOSS ON CANNERRIES

Estimated Total Will be About \$300,000 This Year on Skeena.

The canneries are closing for the season. In addition to Bayport which was mentioned yesterday, Oceanic closed yesterday. Carlyle is closing today and Claxton tomorrow. Most of the others will have shut down before the end of the week. Indians are returning to their reserves and the season may be said to be over.

One of the cannery managers who was in the city this morning, said he estimated the loss on the river this year by the canneries would amount to something like \$300,000. Rivers Inlet he thought would about break even. There had been several years when the cannery had lost money and last year there was little or no profit owing to the high cost of fish and operation and the low price at which the product was sold.

### SMUTS ON VESSEL WITH BUNKERS AFIRE

LONDON, Aug. 17.—A dispatch from Sierra Leone tells of the arrival there of the steamer Saxon with three bunkers afire. General Smuts and other passengers are awaiting transfer to another vessel.

### MILLION DOLLAR FIRE IN CITY OF NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Ten factory buildings were destroyed by a fire which took place there this morning. The loss is estimated at a million dollars.

### LIVING COSTS RISE IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Aug. 17.—The Labor Gazette, commenting on the cost of living in England being on the upgrade, says it is due chiefly to the cost of farm produce consequent on the drought.

### JIMMIE MELVILLE IS TREASURER OF BIG COAL CONCERN

J. B. F. Melville of New York is the treasurer of the United Electric Companies of Danville, according to an article in the Danville Commercial News. He has already removed to that town and commenced his new work.

A final payment of approximately a million dollars has been made on some coal properties, the purchasers of which Mr. Melville is connected with. They are big men and the concern is to be operated in a big way.

Mrs. Melville and family will join Mr. Melville at Danville. Jimmie Melville was formerly in the employ of the G. T. P. at this port as chief clerk to the general superintendent.

### Romance, Adventure and Crime Associated with Peter of Serbia, now Dead

BELGRADE, Serbia, August 17.—Ending a life of romance and adventure and one closely associated with many awful crimes, here passed away here yesterday King Peter, until recently ruler of Serbia, one of the outstanding figures of the European monarchies.

King Peter of Serbia, 76 years old, white-haired, deaf, ill from the infirmities of age and suffering from the wounds of three or more wars, relinquished the cares of state in 1919, when his second son, Crown Prince Alexander, succeeded him and became the ruler of the new state of Yugoslavia. He then declared:

"My beloved Serbia is now free and its future, I believe, will be a great one. My work is over. I desire only the continued affection and devotion of my dear people and, finally, a grave on Serbian soil."

#### Courageous Figure.

Despite his age, King Peter presented one of the most courageous figures of the war. On the day that Serbia rejected the Austrian demands, Peter renounced his temporary abdication of the throne and placed himself once more at the head of the country. He was even then almost sightless and hard of hearing and was under the constant care of a physician.

When the fortunes of war turned against the Serbians he remained with his armies till practically the last units had been driven from the country. He then effected an escape through Albania and went to Saloniki where he presided over the reorganization of his forces. Afterward he went to Corfu where he established headquarters and took an active part in the direction of his nomadic government.

Forced from his capital, Belgrade, and thence from Nish by the advancing army of the Central Powers in 1915, his country laid waste by fire and shell, Peter lived to return to Serbia and engage actively in the reorganization and reconstruction of his domains. From the beginning of the conflict, the aged King encouraged his troops and people despite the most depressing reverses and on several occasions personally led the Serbs into battle.

#### Father Peter.

King Peter was tall, erect and muscular and in spite of his age had the appearance of a much younger man. He had all the rugged qualities of one sprung from the soil. He took pride in referring to his humble origin and throughout his life lived modestly and unostentatiously. He was extremely democratic and affable. His tastes were simple to the point of severity. He was beloved by his people, particularly the peasantry, who called him "Father Peter."

But his royal career was beset by a grave and terrible tragedy—the assassinations of his predecessor, King Alexander and the latter's wife, Queen Draga—in the palace at Belgrade on June 10, 1903. A suspicion that members of the Karađorđević family, of which Peter was a member, were implicated in the conspiracy which exterminated the rival ruling Obrenović dynasty of which Alexander and Draga were representatives, and which placed Peter

VICTORIA, Aug. 17.—The American speed boat Venture enroute from Vancouver to Seattle with 30 cases of Scotch whiskey was seized by a customs boat and found wanting clearance papers. The boat is held at Ganges and the liquor at Victoria awaiting an inquiry. H. Marken and J. Joselson who were aboard were released and returned to Seattle.

### ANCIENT LAW IS INVOKED

In Trial of Chief Fry of Victoria Magistrate Delays Proceedings.

VICTORIA, Aug. 17.—At the close of the prosecution of Chief of Police Fry on charges of failing to enforce the law against Chinese lottery houses the case was adjourned until Thursday to permit the magistrate to consider the point brought by counsel for the defense to the effect that the prosecution failed to prove an indictable offense. The ancient law was invoked from the days of George III and hitherto unpealed, providing a maximum penalty of a fine of forty shillings for a constable failing to perform his duty.

### MOISTURE FOR A DRY YUKON

DAWSON, Aug. 17.—The Yukon Government has been notified that the United States has lifted the embargo on liquor shipments through Alaska to Yukon territory. This will allow liquor to reach here from the outside and will put out of business the private stills which have been in operation since the shortage began to be felt.

YUKON, Aug. 17.—This is the 25th anniversary of the discovery of gold in the Klondike and a grand celebration is being held here in honor of the event. The lead is being taken by the Yukon Pioneers, the grand lodge of which is in session here now.

## Possibility of General Election.

Following the suggestion made in this paper yesterday that the general election would not be earlier than next spring, attention has been drawn to an article on the front page of Saturday Night in which the writer suggests that the election will come before the census results are known. The article is as follows:

"From Ottawa I learn, quite unofficially of course, that the census figures when published will show some quite astonishing results. One outstanding feature is the growth of Quebec, not only in relation to population but also to the increase of wealth. Unless I am very badly misled there are going to be some heartburnings in other provinces in respect to seats in the House of Commons. As nearly everyone knows, the province of Quebec has a given number of representatives in the House of Commons, 65 in all, and the representation of other provinces is based upon their per capita population as related to Quebec. For instance, if the province of Quebec gains in population all out of proportion to the province of Ontario, Ontario will perform have less representatives in the House of Commons. From 1896 to 1900 the representation from the various provinces was as follows: Ontario, 92; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 20; New Brunswick, 14; Manitoba, 7; British Columbia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 5; Northwest Territories 4; total, 213.

"During the ninth Parliament, 1900-04, there was but one change in the representation, a seat being added for the Yukon Territory. This made 214 members and the distribution was as follows: Ontario, 86; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 18; New Brunswick, 13; Manitoba, 10; Northwest Territories, 10; British Columbia, 7; Prince Edward Island, 4, and the Yukon, 1.

"In 1905 provision was made for the creation of the new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta out of part of the Northwest Territories. Saskatchewan with 10 and Alberta with 7 members, making a grand total of 221 members.

"During the session of 1914 a redistribution bill was passed providing for an increase of members to 234, divided as follows: Ontario, 82; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 16; New Brunswick, 11; Manitoba, 15; British Columbia, 13; Prince Edward Island, 3, and the Yukon, 1.

"It will be noted from the above figures that the older provinces have steadily lost membership in the House of Commons (all except Quebec, of course), and it is more than likely that the redistribution, which will be based upon the census now being completed, will see these changes continuing. In other words, the Maritime Provinces, Ontario, and possibly British Columbia, will lose representation to a considerable extent. Indeed it is said that possibly Ontario may find herself with 75 members in place of 82 as at present.

"The Ottawa wiseacres are of the opinion, however, that there will be no redistribution before another general election. (I give that for what it is worth.)

"In a word, it is said that the government wishes to know the worst and is not disposed to hang in suspense until such time as the census figures can be utilized for redistribution purposes."

## Disarmament Quite Possible.

Disarmament is quite within the realms of possibility. It may at first be only a restriction in the amount of money spent on armaments or a restriction on the number of ships built for use in the navy. In any case, it will be better than a race for supremacy such as was going on when Germany forced war on the world.

## Dentist Need of An Ambulance.

An ambulance is badly needed in the city. The Daily News has drawn attention to it before. Only recently events have occurred which have again brought the need to public notice. The News has been asked to give publicity to the need and to try to induce the authorities to come to the rescue.

It has been put like this: If a patient has to be carried to the hospital under conditions which cause him intense suffering, the authorities who fail to provide the necessary ambulance are the ones who are directly responsible for causing that suffering. They are just as guilty as if they stood over the man and tortured him when in that helpless condition. These people would not like to be accused of such inhumanity, yet that is what it really amounts to. The person who through neglect or carelessness causes needless suffering is just as culpable as the savage who would stand over his victim and punish him until he at last could hold out no longer and expires under the hand of his persecutor.

## BOOTLEGGERS JAIL SENTENCE

Six Ketchikan Men Given Both Fines and Imprisonment—One Fined.

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 17.—Sentences aggregating nine months in jail and fines of \$2,250 were imposed by Judge Robert W. Jennings in the United States district court for bootlegging. Six defendants were sent to jail for terms ranging from one to three months, while the seventh, one convicted was assessed a fine of \$250.

R. W. Hearne, Phil Warren, J. B. King and Gheo Patterson each were sentenced to one month in jail and a fine of \$500. G. D. Celia was sentenced to two months in jail; E. G. Grabbie to three months in jail; O. D. Velie was assessed by \$250 without any jail sentence.

Counsel for the accused persons asked for leniency in all cases as none of them had been before the court before.

George Jennings, before imposing sentence, told the defendants that the juries had found them guilty, that they had all had fair trials and that they must now pay the penalty.



H. G. Breckenridge is the prime mover in a project for the building of another cold storage plant in the city valued at \$200,000. There will also be a sawmill in conjunction with it.


By courtesy of Chief W. B. Vickers, a comfortable press table has been installed in the city police court and was used for the first time today.


