PRAIRIE PROVINCE GIVES OLD ADMINISTRATION ENDORSATION AT POLLS

Vancouver Excursion Reached This City on Steamer Prince George; Gets Warm Welcome

With spirits not a bit dampened by a slow, steady rain which started before they left Vancouver and had followed them all the way up the coast, the Vancouver Board of Trade excursionists arrived on the Prince George last night at 10 o'clock and today they are seeing the city. The party numbers 140 persons and everyone is full of enthusiasm. Although their trip is supposed to be merely a pleasure tour, they are all taking stock of Prince Rupert today and gathering information and facts which they will use in the many lines of business which they represent. There was a large crowd of citizens at the dock last night to meet them and they were accorded a hearty welcome by all Prince Rupert.

PRINCIPAL OF LOCAL SCHOOLS HAS RESIGNED

A. L. Campbell, of Esquimalt, appointed on year's probation to succeed Macdonald. The resignation of A. M. Macdonald, principal of public schools in this city for three years, was formally accepted at the meeting of the school board last evening and H. L. Campbell, now assistant principal at Esquimalt, was appointed as his successor on one year's probation for which time the appointment will be made permanent if satisfaction is rendered. Mr. Macdonald's resignation has been in the hands of the board for some time past and the new appointment was already ready for adoption at the meeting last night. Mr. Campbell comes here highly recommended.

GREEK VESSEL FOUNDER AND LOSS OF LIFE

Many People Believed to Have Lost Lives in Aegean Sea. ATHENS, June 10.—Many people are believed to have been lost in the sinking of the Greek steamer Boukolina which struck a rock and foundered in the Aegean Sea. The vessel had 150 passengers on board besides a crew of 25. Two passengers have been picked up.

CANADIAN RAILWAYS FOLLOW THE U. S.

MONTREAL, June 10.—The Canadian railways, following upon the action recently taken by the roads in the United States, to day took preliminary steps to cut wages twelve per cent on July 1. Later the working conditions will be revised.

SYNOD CLOSED LAST EVENING

Much Important Business Was Transacted and Church Work Promoted.

After partaking of a delightful lunch, provided by the Women's Auxiliary of St. Andrew's Church, the Anglican Synod resumed its sessions at 2:30 yesterday afternoon. The election of the executive committee having taken place, Archdeacon Collison moved a resolution of deep regret at the death of Rev. James Benjamin McCullagh, a former missionary of the Church Missionary Society, who for thirty-eight years labored among the Indians of the Upper Naas River, where he was instrumental in breaking down heathenism and winning the natives to Christ and the Church. The Synod expressed its great sympathy for the widow and family.

A most interesting vote of thanks was expressed by Archbishop Du Vernet, on behalf of the Synod, to the Venerable Archdeacon Collison, who has worked among the coast natives since 1873. Heartfelt and deep affection and a warm appreciation of his faithful work was voiced. Thanks were duly expressed to the Church Missionary Society of England, which society has most generously assisted the work of the Church in Canada for the past sixty-three years by sending men of the finest Christian type and also means for their support. The society is now withdrawing from the field and the work will, in future, be maintained by the Church.

LONG STEP TAKEN TOWARDS SETTLEMENT COAL STRIKE

LONDON, June 10.—The conference of coal miners' delegates has decided that a ballot be taken in all the coal fields on the proposal that have been offered by the mine owners for a settlement of the strike which began on April 1. This is generally considered as a long step towards peace in the coal industry of Great Britain.

OFFICIAL OF SOLDIERS' BO'RD IS NOT GUILTY

Ernest A. Robinson Discharged on Charge of Uttering Forgery.

OTTAWA, June 10.—Ernest A. Robinson, former assistant director of the administration department of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment board, has been found not guilty of uttering a forged cheque for \$2,311 in connection with the fraudulent obtaining of money from the department of Militia and Defence.

Mr. McKelvie is one of Prince Rupert's warmest friends in the south and knows the local needs and aspirations better than most people, having lived here himself for a considerable length of time, and having a keen interest in the upbuilding of the city in its earlier days. He is one of the leading public men, and journalists in the province, and can be depended upon to do his utmost towards furthering the interest of the north during the course of his multifarious activities in the promotion of the big work he is at present engaged upon.

CHICAGO WILL HAVE CHURCH SKYSCRAPER

Building Will House both Cathedral and Offices—Cost \$4,000,000. CHICAGO, June 10.—This city is to have the first church skyscraper in the world. Rev. John Thompson, past of the First Methodist Church, got the idea for a combined cathedral and office building to be built on the church's loop property. The building will be 24 stories in high and will be surmounted with an immense spire. It will cost \$4,000,000.

PREMIER MINE RESPONSIBLE

Court of Appeals at Victoria Gives Judgment Against Stewart Company.

VICTORIA, June 10.—By unanimous judgment of the Court of Appeals it is affirmed that the Premier Mine, of Stewart, is responsible for the wages of miners it had induced to go from Prince Rupert to work in the mines in January, 1920 on the specific agreement that the strike then in progress at the mine would be settled to the satisfaction of the miners. Twenty-two other cases of a similar nature are to be taken up against the company here.

MEN ARRESTED FOR HIGHWAY SHOOTING

Alan Robinson and Alex Paulsen Suspected Connection Murder W. F. Salsbury.

VANCOUVER, June 10.—Alex Paulsen and Alan Robinson have been arrested here charged with the murder of William F. Salsbury, a prominent business man, who was shot to death on the night of April 12 while on his way home.

Martin Government in Saskatchewan Is Returned to Power

Regina, June 10.—Incomplete returns in the Saskatchewan elections indicate that the Martin Government will be returned to power with a decreased majority. Opposition groups in the house, divided into various factions, will total from twenty to twenty-five members out of the sixty-three. The return of independent candidates is larger than had been expected.

Premier Martin and his running mate, Col. Cross, carried Regina City by a large majority. Harris Turner, the blind veteran running as an independent, has been elected in Saskatoon.

Regina, June 10. (Later).—Saskatchewan yesterday decided not to experiment with group government and returned the Martin administration to office for another term. The government supporters will number about 15 in the legislature out of the 63 seats when the three deferred elections are held according to the views held by political authorities.

NEWSPAPER MEN IN VANCOUVER

Three Hundred Delegates from All Parts of Canada at Editors' Convention

VANCOUVER, June 10.—More than three hundred delegates from all parts of Canada attended the convention of the Weekly Newspapers' Association which opened here yesterday. President W. R. Davies, of the Renfrew Mercury, said that out of 750 weeklies in the Dominion of Canada, 475 were now members of the association. Owing to the problem of getting competent printers, the president urged that special printing courses be given in the technical schools of all provinces.

E. Roy Sales, manager of the association, said that a great saving could be effected by free zone postal rates.

WHAT VISITORS ARE DOING HERE TODAY

Went to Seal Cove This Morning; Came Back on Train and Saw Dry Dock.

This morning the Vancouver Board of Trade visitors to the city were taken in cars to Seal Cove where they were shown the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company's plant, the Prince Rupert sawmill and the site of the proposed pulp and paper mill. Met by an engine and two passenger coaches at Seal Cove, they were brought back to the dry dock which they inspected in a body. Later they were shown other points of interest on the water front.

PIONEER LUMBERMAN IS DEAD AT FERNIE

D. V. Mott Founded Elk Lumber Co. in Crow's Nest Country. FERNIE, June 10.—D. V. Mott, an old timer here and a pioneer of the West, is dead at the age of 72 years. He founded the Elk Lumber Company here.

LLOYD GEORGE AND BIG STRIKE

Summary of His Attitude on the Situation.

LONDON, June 10.—Following is a summary of Mr. Lloyd George's attitude on the coal strike as prepared by a London newspaper writer and based upon the British Prime Minister's recent speeches on the strike situation.

The first thing is to get rid of the notion that there are huge profits in the mines and that the grasping capitalists are trying to rob the miners of their share.

The mines are not paying because prices tumbled down suddenly.

If the price of home coal were increased the cost of every article would go up.

There is no conspiracy to reduce wages, but the taxpayers cannot be asked to contribute to keep up the wages of one industry.

Government control has done more to destroy the case for nationalization than a million speeches could have done.

The principle of the national pool is a premium on inefficiency. It would mean a gigantic army of inspectors.

If we surrender to the threats and starvation and make an imprudent peace, we may be irretrievably damaging the industries of the country.

IMPROVEMENTS ABOUT JAIL ARE TO BE MADE

Was Authorized by Police Commission Some Time Ago But Work Not Done.

Various improvements about the city jail, which were authorized by the police commission some time ago but which have not been made, are to be attended to at once. The necessity for a grating inside the cell room door so that visitors cannot have immediate access to prisoners and the better protection of some of the windows were mentioned at the police commission meeting last night and it was decided that the work will have to be given to outsiders if it cannot be done locally.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

June 10, 1911. There was a bad shooting affray at the Cold Storage at noon today, when Homer Wood, crazed with drink, used a gun on Alexander Mathieson, brother of his former partner. The latter, who escaped injury, was unarmed and attempted to escape, tripping, fell on his head and lay stunned for a few moments. Wood, thinking he had killed Mathieson, turned the gun on himself and tried to blow his brains out. The wound is not thought to be serious and, when he recovers, he will face a charge of attempted murder.

The agreement between the city and the G.T.P. on assessment matters was signed yesterday by President C. M. Hays, of the G.T.P. The city seal has been affixed, but it has yet to be approved by the citizens of Prince Rupert, and ratified by the Legislature.

NO MORE BEER OR SIGNS OF IT AFTER MIDDLE NEXT WEEK

Government Control Will Then Be in Effect and Bars Will Be Out of Business.

After midnight of June 14 it will be illegal to sell or offer for sale any liquor, beer or near beer or to display signs bearing the words, "bar, bar room, saloon" or any other words signifying the sale of malt or brewed beverages. The officers of the police force were warned of this at the police commission meeting last night following the reading of a letter from A. M. Johnson, chairman of the liquor control board on the matter.

Chief Vickers stated that his men had already notified all persons and places concerned of this and the proper steps were being taken.

It is expected that after June 15, when government sale of liquor comes into effect, many of the local bars will close their doors permanently as far as their present business is concerned. Mayor Rochester intimated at the meeting that the Hotel Prince Rupert would take this course.

PLAN EXCURSION FLIGHTS TO FORT NORMAN OIL FIELD

TORONTO, June 10.—Round trip excursions from Toronto to Fort Norman in the Mackenzie river oil fields, in fourteen days, \$1,000 for the trip, are said to be contemplated by a company which proposes to run six or eight big naval seaplanes capable of carrying twelve passengers each as well as about 3,000 pounds of freight. The idea is to travel between Toronto and Edmonton by train, this consuming ten days of the fourteen for the round trip, and by seaplane the 1,780 miles from Edmonton to Fort Norman, thirty-six hours each way of the 1,780 miles.

Consent of the federal and Ontario governments is necessary before the scheme can be carried out.

SOLDIERS' CONVENTION FOR RUPERT POSSIBLE

Alderman Kelly Put Up Fight to Have the Next One in This City.

Ald. J. H. Kelly returned to the city last night on the Prince George after attending the annual provincial convention of the Great War Veterans' Association which was held at Chilliwack. Mr. Kelly, who is president of the local branch and whose jurisdiction extends from Ocean Falls to Alaska and east as far as Prince George, in an interview with the Daily News, reports that the convention was the largest and most enthusiastic so far held by the association. There were 66 delegates, including several from eastern Canada, six members of the provincial legislature attended.

It was unanimously decided to actively support the movement for the amalgamation of all soldier organizations under one head on a strictly non-political basis. The G. W. V. A. has at the present time 80,000,000 worth of property which will cause quite a little adjustment to settle upon the amalgamation.

Decisive action in the matter will be taken next month at the Dominion convention to be held at Port Arthur.

Mr. Kelly made a strenuous fight to have the next annual convention of the association held in Prince Rupert and, on account of the closeness of the vote, with Pentelton says he is confident it will be held here the year after.

George W. Durham was the other delegate from Prince Rupert representing the local association.



BRINGING UP FATHER



Nechaco Valley with Vanderhoof as Centre

By the Editor.

The valley of the Nechaco differs from the Bulkley in that the mountains have disappeared and in place of the picturesque settings for the farms there is little but utility. People who go to the Nechaco valley do so to make homes where the land is level, the soil good and conditions favorable for their purpose.

Vanderhoof is the centre of the Nechaco valley and in the country around that busy little town are many farmers who are doing well. Let me tell of one of them.

F. C. Borhaven, a Norwegian by birth but an American by training, purchased a half section of wild land near Vanderhoof and already has 180 acres of it under cultivation. He calls it the Columbia Guernsey Farm and as may be expected he features Guernsey stock. He has introduced a number of registered cows and a fine bull from the States and now has a herd of 35 animals.

Mr. Borhaven's farm is flat and every inch of it is good land. He uses a tractor for cultivating and with it he can plow ten acres a day, using three plows. He says his cows pay him well and very soon he expects to be making good dividends on his investment after paying himself a salary.

Scientific Work.

One of the two-year-old heifers on this farm gave last year 100 pounds of butterfat, worth \$240 at the current prices. Other cows have done very well and Mr. Borhaven knows what each does. Being a graduate of the agricultural college at Wisconsin, he carries out all his operations scientifically and keeps books carefully. He is a keen, bright businessman, quite the opposite from the old conception of a farmer. His barns and other buildings and appliances are all of the latest type and he studies his soil and its needs.

Alfalfa a Success.

On this farm may be seen an acre of alfalfa that is a complete success. It is Cossack alfalfa and is well inoculated. The nitrogen bearing nodules may be seen in large numbers on the roots of any plant that may be dug up. He dug one up to show us. It is sown in drills with space to cultivate between each row, but from now on Mr. Borhaven says he will sow broadcast. This was a test acre and he wished to give it every chance. He says that the use of clovers will be the salvation of the farmers. He does not regard timothy as good cattle feed but expects to make a success of several clovers.

The Creamery.

Most of the farmers of Vanderhoof send their product to the creamery. This is a new institution installed by the provincial government and last year, the first in which it was operated, 13,000 pounds was manufactured. This year Mr. Valentine, the manager, says the output will be three times as large. The farmers have taken it over and will operate for their own benefit. J. Barnishaw is president of the association and George Outram secretary. Vanderhoof is a prosperous little town. On Saturday afternoon, when we were there, the street looked very busy with farm wagons in front of the store.

Pattinson and Ling, electricians, were present and gave a demonstration of the efficacy of totally enclosing hanging lights. After some discussion it was decided by the board that, as this was a most important matter, they would not take any definite step in the matter until a visit to the school had been made and actual experiments conducted as to the best lights to put in.

EDMONTON JAP IS OFF FOR ARCTIC

Juzrio Wada Will be Gone Until Next Fall.
