investigation. Pilchard oil has been successfully refined for use in paint manufacture and extended markets for this product may be obtained in the future. This oil has also been used for varnishes and Japans. Board workers also found that this oil contained quantities of vitamin D and some vitamin A. Refrigeration research has been concerned with improving methods \$1.90 of storage and the board now has discovered improvements which 15c make possible the storage of packaged goods which cannot be glazed 25c in ordinary cold storage rooms. It is still felt that more research work could be done, especially in view of the tremendous importance of this method of preservation to the industry of the Pacific Coast, which is so far from the large consuming

Work is to be undertaken on the 400 design of refrigerator cars and it is hoped that the industry will be enabled to utilize the freight services for the transportation of ma-25C terials during the summer. This is, at present, very difficult on account 80c of the hot prairies but it is felt that mprovement in insulation and design will overcome these difficulties.
