# Great Coal Strike Is On In Britain

## FIRST OF LOCAL BUILT STEAMERS TO BE LAUNCHED IN MIDDLE OF MAY

### British Coal Miners Are All Out on Strike; Some Mines Flooded, Pumpmen Deserter

LONDON, April 1.—The coal mines of Britain are idle. 900 men went on strike at midnight as a protest against reduction of wages. The pump men struck, except in four cases, one in Yorkshire, one Northumberland, one in Scotland and one in Wales. Elsewhere the mines are threatened with flooding.

Coal increased in price two shillings a ton today. Some transport workers were tempted to strike in sympathy with the miners, and the employees of various Government departments were ordered to stand by for transport work if necessary.

London factories are forming a special police force to protect plants in an emergency. Other centres have several weeks' supply of coal on hand.

There is a million tons of coal on hand in Great Britain. Export is good. A flood of orders has been sent to Europe and others.

### THREE MILLION DOLLAR FIRE

Outbreak in Native Quarter at Manila; 3,000 Houses Destroyed

MANILA, April 2.—Fifteen thousand people are homeless here as the result of a fire which destroyed three thousand houses in the native quarter of the city. Two bodies have been found in the ruins. The financial loss is estimated at \$3,000,000.

### TEN MEN LEFT HERE THIS MORNING FOR FORT NORMAN WELLS

Ten men left on this morning's train bound for the Fort Norman oil fields via Edmonton and Fort McMurray. They all came from outside points and were strangers in Prince Rupert and only one of them had ever been in the Fort Norman country before.

Despite this they are all confident that wealth is in store for them in the Far North. Two of them were armed with certificates of land ownership in the oil belt, one of them for land that had been staked a couple of years ago before the strike was reported and the boom had commenced.

### TEN MISSING STEAMER CREW

Lists Carefully Checked Show Seven Passengers and Three of Crew Gone.

SEATTLE, April 2.—Seven passengers and three of the crew of the wrecked steamer Governor are missing after all the lists have been checked. Those missing are all Americans. The search goes on.

### RETURN OF CHARLES PROVES A FIASCO

Army of 15,000 Men Cannot Be Found, It is Said.

PARIS, April 2.—The attempted return of Charles to the throne of Hungary is believed to be a failure. The army of 15,000 men which was supposed to be marching on Budapest cannot be found.

#### CRIME FOR WEEK

Relief Not Exactly a Desirable Place to Live Yet.

DUBLIN, April 2.—The official bulletin of the total crime statistics for the week in Ireland gives five police killed, fourteen wounded, thirteen soldiers killed and fourteen wounded, nine civilians assassinated in twenty-two ambushes.

#### TROUBLE AT BELFAST

BELFAST, April 2.—Serious disorders occurred in Londonderry last night. Constable Higgins was shot and killed by assailants. Bombs were thrown and several soldiers wounded.

#### MURDER AND SUICIDE

SYRACUSE, April 2.—J. Herman Wharton, dean of the business department of Syracuse University, was shot and killed by Holmes Beckwith, a professor. The latter committed suicide.

#### AID FOR MUNICIPALITIES

VICTORIA, April 2.—David Whiteside, member for New Westminster, proposes to urge further financial assistance to municipalities before the Legislature prorogues.

Thomas McGlynn and J. C. Gavigan were last night elected to membership in the Prince Rupert Board of Trade.

### GET LIQUOR MAY FIRST

Deputy Attorney-General is Likely to Be One of Commissioners.

VICTORIA, April 2.—It is announced that the Liquor Act will come into force on May 1. A. M. Johnson, deputy attorney-general, and J. H. Falconer, prohibition commissioner, will probably be the commissioners under the new act. The third commissioner will be a returned soldier.

### SEARCH PARTIES ARE LOOKING FOR BODIES OF WRECK VICTIMS

SEATTLE, April 2.—Search parties left here today for the vicinity of the wreck of the steamer Governor in an effort to recover the bodies of the victims of the disaster. The list of ten missing still stands. It is believed that all are drowned.

Agents of the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice are investigating and it is expected they will make a report on the disaster late today.

### ESMONDE DENOUNCES BRITISH OFFICIALS

Irishman at Vancouver Addresses Private Meeting of Irish League.

VANCOUVER, April 2.—Esmonde addressed a private meeting of the Irish League here, urging organization in the cause of Ireland. He condemned the "drunken viceroy" and "the murderous gang of the British administration in Ireland."

Esmonde agreed not to address public meetings in his passage through Canada and last night's meeting was announced as that of a private club.

#### DEEPENING COW BAY

Col. Peck Asks for Survey and Wants to Know Attitude of Province.

A letter from Col. Peck stating that he had asked the minister of public works to prepare a survey of Cow Bay with a view to having it deepened was read at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night. Col. Peck also asked that the attitude of the provincial government on such action be ascertained.

#### CENSUS POSTPONED

Opposition in Ireland Causes Putting Off of Official Count; Bomb Discovered

DUBLIN, April 2.—The May census has been postponed on account of Sinn Fein opposition.

A child was found with a bomb in the ruins of Roscarbery barracks which was wrecked yesterday. A policeman noticed that the pin was drawn and threw the bomb into the street where it exploded killing two people and wounding three.

H. M. Daggett of this city has received word of the death of his niece, Mrs. J. Brown, at Grand Harbor, New Brunswick. Mrs. Brown was here last year on a trip to the north by way of this city.

### Launching Canadian Scottish Will Take Place Middle May: Engined and Outfitted Here

#### LEAVE FOR EUROPE



The "Canadian Scottish," the first vessel to be launched by Wallace Shipyards, Ltd., from the Prince Rupert dry dock will glide down the ways and take the water about May 15 if delivery of materials is made without delay and weather conditions remain favorable at all. This was the announcement made by H. J. F. Turney, superintendent of the yard, to a Daily News representative this morning.

After the launching the ship will be outfitted and engined and the trials will be run in the harbor or at some nearby and convenient point where a measured mile may be set out. The vessel will sail under its steam away from this port and it is understood that the Canadian government would be very gratified if its first cargo could be loaded here.

The announcement of the changing of the name of the first ship from "Canadian Reaper" to "Canadian Scottish" was recently received at the Wallace office here in an official notification from Ottawa. As far as the second boat is concerned its name remains "Canadian Thrasher" for no word of change has been received.

At the present time there are 125 men employed in shipbuilding operations at the Hays Creek plant.

### NO LASHES FOR HOLD-UP MAN

Governor-General Remits Sentence on Joseph Kehoe at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, April 2.—The Governor-General has wired the United Soldiers' council here that the sentence of 24 lashes imposed on Joseph Kehoe of Vancouver has been remitted.

The ex-soldier who was convicted of holdups is said to have been acting under the influence of drugs.

### PROPOSE GERMANY ASSUME WAR DEBT BRITAIN TO STATES

WASHINGTON, April 2.—There is no confirmation of the London despatch to the effect that Germany offers to assume liabilities for part of the allied debt to the United States.

The administration will take the stand that Germany must fulfill her obligations to the extent of her powers.

A Berlin despatch says the proposal is popular in Germany.

This is the first occasion since the present management has had the Daily News on which the paper has issued with eight pages. It is more or less of an experiment and will continue on Saturdays if the support of the community warrants it. Further than that, it may become a regular daily feature. All will depend upon the amount of advertising which offers.

The Daily News office is now equipped with facilities for publishing any reasonable size. It has modern linotype machines and press and is as well equipped as any newspaper office in the country outside of the big cities. This is for the benefit of the people of Prince Rupert who are able to get a better newspaper than they otherwise would have.

The publishers of the Daily News are anxious to give the people of the northern part of the province the best possible news service but publishing is expensive. Paper, in the form in which we have to buy it, costs ten cents a pound, the highest wages are paid to operatives, telegraph tolls are high, the lowest rate paid being about three quarters of a cent a word and by certain routes double that amount. These things all make it difficult to publish a newspaper, but happily we have received good support and through the co-operation of an excellent staff it has been possible to carry on, even under difficult conditions.

Efforts are made from time to time to secure a better service with nearby points. At some of them we have correspondents, but, as it is impossible under existing conditions to pay for correspondence, interest is apt to lag. We consider that every community should have a correspondent for the newspaper circulating from the nearest city, for the advertising the community receives thereby. It is worth a good deal to any community to be continually figuring in the news columns.

## Prospects Warrant Improvements.

The prospects for this city warrant some improvements. We look for a good deal of building here this season. In addition to the erection of the new government buildings, which in itself will be a great thing, and the prospect that the pulp mill will be established, there will be a good many buildings erected by residents and others. There are a number planned for Section Two and other parts of the city will receive their quota. Taken all in all the outlook is encouraging and we look for a good season.

## Must Carry Out Moderation Provisions.

Now that the people have asked for a Moderation Liquor Bill and it has been finally passed by the Legislature of the province, the next thing to do is to see that its provisions are carried out. We have had enough law evasions in this province in the past. It was that which brought the prohibition measure into contempt and the same will happen with the Moderation Act if a similar condition is allowed to obtain. What we want here is strict law enforcement in regard to these things. To pass a law and then unite to evade its provisions is what causes so much discontent. There must be a wholesome respect for the laws of the country or it is impossible to carry on decently.

BURIED CITY  
DISCOVERED  
IN MEXICOMust Have Had Population of  
100,000 Four Thousand  
Years Ago

San Juan de Teotihuacan, Mexico, April 1.—Prospecting for the habitations of a lost race in virtually the same manner as miners dig for gold, federal employees here have just started to uncover the remains of a city of at least 100,000 inhabitants which flourished 4,000 years ago. Here and there over the confines of the buried city have been sunk shafts to find streets, houses and temples known to exist below the level of the mountain valley in which lies the little village of San Juan de Teotihuacan, the name of which means in the Aztec tongue "City of the Gods."

The Mexican government has appropriated funds for this work of excavation which is in charge of Manuel Gamio, director of anthropology of the department of agriculture. The government hopes eventually to make the spot one of the show places of Mexico.

## Pyramids to Sun.

Dominating the area are the two pyramids, one to the Sun and the other to the Moon, which for centuries have defied the efforts of archeologists and historians to trace their origin. The pyramid to the Moon is still untouched, retaining an appearance to the lay eye of a huge mound of irregular shape, overgrown with grass and rubbish.

Senor Gamio says the city now under excavation at one time covered an area of 15 miles with a population of more than 100,000. Its builders are unknown to history but, Sr. Gamio believes they were a portion of an Indian tribe which wandered into Mexico from the north and finding the valley fruitful and the climate salubrious, decided to settle.

STALLION STAKE FOR  
TROTTING HORSES

CLEVELAND, April 2.—The American Association of Trotting Horse Breeders' championship stallion stake, valued at \$12,000, will be raced at the second Grand Circuit meeting at the North Randall track here the week of August 8. The association's Matron stake, worth \$9,000, will be contested at the Toledo Driving Club's Grand Circuit meeting the week of August 1. Secretary James Clark announced.

These stakes this season will be worth more than any futurities ever promoted by the association. Fifty-eight three-year-old trotters have qualified in the championship stake and sixty-five have been entered in the matron stake. The list of eligibles include practically every good three-year-old trotter in training.

TRADES AND LABOR  
REPRESENT WORKERS

So Says Frank Lafontaine, President of Ottawa Council

OTTAWA, April 2.—In a statement issued here, Frank Lafontaine, past president of the Ottawa Trades and Labor Council, Canadian organizer of the International United Leather Workers' Union and a prominent labor leader, commended the stand taken by Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor on behalf of the government, in refusing to give representation to the National Catholic labor unions at the forthcoming conference of representatives of the building industry in Ottawa.

After stating that the international movement was not fighting any church or religion, and was anxious to co-operate with them all, Mr. Lafontaine went on to say that the minister of labor had done a real service to all workers by making it plain that the government recognized the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada as the only body in Canada truly representative of workers of every religion.



OVER TWO HUNDRED  
MEN GIVEN WORK

Labor Bureau had Very Fair Report for Month of March

During the month of March there were 276 applications for work at the provincial labor bureau and there were 286 placements made. The applications for work do not include 209 held over from February many of whom found work elsewhere and whose names would also be duplicated. On the whole the figures for the month just past are very satisfactory and show that unemployment in the city at the present time is not a serious question.

The largest demand for men of course came from the dry dock where many were placed during the month, the preference being usually given to returned soldiers. There were men also sent to Anyox as miners, and also some loggers to the Queen Charlottes through the local office. In the course of the month of April it is expected that the Whalen and Kelly camps on Moresby Island will be working full blast again and word is expected soon as to the resumption of activity at the Buckley camps, Masset Inlet.

CHURCH COLLECTION  
FOR DESTITUTE GIRL

Precedent Set by Central Congregational Church of Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, April 2.—Two brothers killed in the war, her fiance killed eight days before the wedding, her own health ruined from nursing during the influenza epidemic as a result of which she was ordered to New Mexico while a bad lung regained its normal strength—these are the tragic occurrences in the life of a well-known girl revealed in a letter read by Rev. Geo. Laughlin in Central Congregational church last Sunday morning.

**Ignored by Business.**



## DOMINION AID EASTERN ROADS

Forty per cent Contributed to Cost  
of Building Highways

OTTAWA, April 2.—A definite pronouncement as to the nature of the surface finish of the new Ottawa-Prescott highway has been secured by Mr. Fripp, M.P. Answering a series of questions put by the senior member for Ottawa in the house of commons on Wednesday, Dr. Reid stated that an understanding had been reached with the Ontario government that the surface finish of the road would be either cement concrete or bituminous macadam.

The estimated cost of the Ottawa-Prescott highway, according to figures furnished by the highway department of the Ontario government, is \$1,790,879. Of this amount the Dominion government will contribute 40 per cent, which the minister thinks is a reasonable contribution. The first payment from the parliamentary appropriation was made under authority of an order-in-council of February 25, and amounted to \$74,320.31.

From further questions submitted by Mr. Fripp it appears that the minister of railways has approved "project statements" for 45 highways in Ontario which will receive federal grants. In addition to the Ottawa-Prescott road the following are included: Ottawa-Pointe Fortune, Prescott-Brockville, Brockville-Kingston, Kingston-Belleville, Belleville-Whitby, Yonge Street, Toronto-Brampton, Dundas Street, Toronto-Hamilton, Queenston Road, Hamilton-Stoney Creek, Stoney Creek-Queenston, Hamilton-Jarvis, Hamilton-Brampton, Brantford-Woodstock, Woodstock-Ingersoll, Ingersoll-London, London-St. Thomas and London-Stratford.

## Narbethong Skipper Again After Marine D

The following is a copy of the letter being sent to Ministers of the Federal Parks Board, Hobart K. Freeman:

To the Minister of Justice and Members of Parliament,

Dear Sirs:

I hereby charge G. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, with malfeasance in that his subordinate, Mr. A. Farrow, did on November 6th, 1918, issue an order to his office to refuse my ship, the "Narbethong," a clearance, without first having proved me broken the law; without having first complied with the rules and regulations of the inspection service, Part VII, Section 2, Paragraph A. and B. Further, that Mr. Ballantyne's boat last fall did promise me the protection of our laws, and that we should all receive treatment.

Two boats are now being operated as passenger boats which are almost as large as the "Narbethong," and are not required to carry the equipment at present required of smaller boats in the same waters. Two boats have been granted licenses since the "Narbethong" was stopped with less than was required of the "Narbethong."

The inspector had a right to have me fined if he could prove I had broken the law, no right to issue his order to stop the "Narbethong" without complying with his own first inspecting and condemning the "Narbethong," which was not done. Further, Mr. Ballantyne has inspected and passed the "Narbethong" during the past two years without complying with Part VII of the regulations. The "Narbethong" is allowed 20 passengers in all directions Stewart during the winter.

Further, the Marine and Fisheries Department has not even equipped its own boats under the Minor Waters Act.

I have presented my case to the various branches of the Marine and Fisheries Department and to Mr. Ballantyne himself, and am still without license to operate my boat to Stewart. This business to Stewart was all mine and inasmuch as the officers have used their lawless manner to rob me of a business, which business is still legally mine and will until the officers of the Marine and Fisheries Department comply with the laws of God, therefore submit that G. C. Ballantyne is unfaithful to our laws, and until for his inasmuch as the officers of his Department have robbed me, I am entitled to just compensation for the injury done me by his lawless subordinates.

Therefore I petition you that I be allowed to sue the Government for the sum of \$100,000 in an honorable Court of Canada.

Please remember that no matter what I had done, your officers were not justified in breaking the law, and I further submit that it is a sad travesty of justice that Mr. Ballantyne and other members of your Cabinet should be making speeches advising our citizens to obey while the officers of our Government use their power to commit robbery.

I have obeyed the law, your officers have not.

## SMALL YEAR IN CUSTOMS DUTY

Collections at Local Office Smaller  
Than for Four Years—Hard  
Times Responsible.

General depression all over  
the country has had the effect of  
forcing people to economize during  
the past fiscal year and with  
the falling off of the buying of  
foreign goods and paying  
heavy duties and sales taxes the  
customs collections have dropped  
during the year. Prince Rupert  
is no exception for during  
this fiscal year which ended  
March 31 there was but \$170,-  
187.94 collected in import duties  
as compared to \$200,267.25 for  
the year ending March 31, 1920;  
\$278,211.40, 1919, and \$176,-  
603.02, 1918. The use of  
domestic products in place of the  
imported ones may also have  
some bearing on the rather large  
decrease in collection of customs  
duties here, but depression of  
trade, no doubt, the main reason.

was also collected here in luxury  
taxes on imports.

## ROBINSON CRUSOE'S ISLAND AS HEALTH RESORT IN FUTURE

VALPARAISO, March 31.—Juan Fernandez Island, 450 miles west of Valparaiso, widely regarded as the spot around which the story of Robinson Crusoe was written, is to be turned into a health resort according to present plans of the Chilean government.

The island is 13 miles long and four miles wide. Vegetation is abundant. Many kinds of fruits thrive there and the sea in the vicinity swarms with a species of codfish and quantities of seals, according to a recent visitor.

The actual original of Defoe's story of Crusoe was said to have been Alexander Selkirk, one of a crew of buccaneers, who quarreled with his skipper and was marooned at his own request on Juan Fernandez where he spent four lonely years. The grotto where Selkirk is supposed to have lived with his man Friday still is to be seen. A British warship visited the island in 1868 and members of the crew erected a tablet in memory of Selkirk.

Some years ago the Chilean government attempted to colonize the island and gave a free passage to emigrants, but the scheme was a failure and the island now has only 200 inhabitants.

## COMMERCIAL PLANE UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Monoplane Will Carry Over a Ton and Seat Ten Comfortably.

The improved, simplified type of commercial aeroplane, carrying a maximum load for any given horse-power, at a "cruising" or average speed of 100 miles an hour, which Captain de Havilland has in design, has now gone definitely into construction at the de Havilland aeroplane works at Edgewater, Middlesex, says the London Times.

The machine, a monoplane, which marks in several respects a new era in design, has been modified in the direction of greater power and weight-carrying capacity since the first brief description of it appeared in these columns. The engine originally chosen, developing 230 horse-power, has been superseded by one giving as much as 450 horse-power, and the machine generally has gained in its "performance." In the hull built up of three-ply wood, there is to be an exceptionally large and roomy saloon, seating in comfort ten passengers. When employed as a goods carrier, the monoplane will carry a load of 2,300 lbs. It had been intended to have a fleet of these monoplanes in service between London and Paris this year.

## THOUSANDS VISIT FRENCH UNKNOWN

Slab Piled With Flowers by Shop Girls and Statesmen

Paris, March 30.—Flowers are brought by an unceasing pilgrimage of mourners and placed on the slab that marks the grave of the unidentified French soldier under the great Arch of Triumph that dominates the western part of the city.

The pile of flowers and wreaths is fed with fresh contributions from early morning until late at night. There seems no end to the little ceremonies by organizations held at the grave to honor the war dead. Little shop girls bring small bunches of violets that cost 50 centimes; statesmen passing through Paris place their great wreaths as tributes from their countries.

### Thousands on Sundays

Since November 11, 1919, when the unknown soldier was placed under the arch, there has always been a group or crowd of mourners at the shrine of the dead. There has always been a huge pile of flowers. On Sundays thousands stream there from the twelve avenue that converges at the Etoile, as the circular open space surrounding the arch is called, and there is a procession of people with bared heads passing by the mound of flowers.

Many teachers bring their classes and there is a movement afoot to arrange that in each of the public schools of Paris a small contribution shall be collected on a separate day in each school to buy flowers to be placed on the slab by a delegation of honor pupils, so that there may be such a tribute of the children of France to the war dead every day of the year.

## CAN SWEAR IN SEVEN LANGUAGES AT TIFLIS

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Geographers suspect the ancients knew what they were doing when they named the capital of old Georgian Kingdom Tiflis. The word comes, according to the National Geographical Society, from a phrase meaning "Warm Town" and the review adds that the town produces seventy kinds of language, "the handsomest branch of the white race," particularly the women; is a great wine centre and much given to singing and dancing. Guides are useless in Tiflis, it says, unless they can "wheedle and swear in at least a dozen languages."
