Canadians have reason to be proud of their country and the celebration of the anniversary of their natal day is an annual event of great importance. That the people here entered fully into the spirit of the occasion was matter for congratulation.

Business With Great Interior.

It is important to hear good music, see fine pictures, and witness graceful dancing, but after all it is the effort of self-expression along these lines that counts. Expression in art is just as important as expression along the line of utility. Anyone that encourages such expression is improving the status of the community and making life better worth living.

There seems to be a desire on the part of both Irish and British to settle the unfortunate state of affairs that at present exists. As long as efforts are being made to confer, there is hope of a settlement. It is a crime against civilization to see the people of two neighboring islands killing each other and destroying property. Everyone will rejoice to hear of a settlement being made, as long as it is a settlement consistent with the safeguarding of the rights of the people on either side.

INVESTIGATING LEAGUE COSTS

Committee Reports League of Nations' Conduct Extravagant.

GENEVA, Switzerland, July 2.—Obligatory use of two languages, French and English, in all its transactions and the high cost of living at the headquarters in Geneva are given by the special committee investigating the workings of the League of Nations as an explanation of what has been considered in some quarters as the excessive cost of the organization. The expense for last year, as already reported, was about \$1,500,000.

"There can be no doubt," says the committee's report, "that, rightly or wrongly, the League of Nations has the reputation of costing too much." The report then goes on to explain how the complexity, diversity and novelty of the work undertaken necessarily costs heavily, particularly since it is in the hands of a comparatively young institution that lacks experience.

Dual Languages.
 The dual language of the League requiring translation and duplicate publication of all documents alone accounts for one-third of the entire expense, the report says, then points out that the location of the headquarters of the League in Geneva accounts for a good deal of the excessive outlay.

"Since the main purpose of the Commission of Inquiry is to suggest every form of economy," the report says, "it feels bound to point out that, at the moment, Geneva is—and so far as it is possible to foresee will remain—a city in which the cost of living is comparatively higher than in almost any city in Europe, and where the rate of exchange is, at the moment of writing the most disadvantageous for the great majority of states members of the League."

The report suggests that were the League headquarters located at Brussels, Fontainebleau, Turin or Vienna, or almost anywhere else, an immediate economy would be effected that would be appreciated by all members of the League and particularly by those whose exchange is depreciated.



Member for Fort George Interviews Principals Regarding Proposed Big Venture.

H. G. Perry, member for the Legislature for the Fort George riding, has arrived in Prince George bringing to the people here the news that he has interviewed the principals in the proposed pulp and paper concern and that construction of the mill is likely to proceed without much delay. There are still a few matters to settle and these will be discussed with the provincial government early in August.

Mr. Perry says the depressing influence of the money market will not affect this project, as the men interested are financially able to carry it through.

Tenders are to be called by the Government for a large area of pulp timber near Prince George which it is expected the pulp concern will purchase and there will be a proviso attached to the sale that at least \$350,000 be expended within three years. To secure the carrying out of the contract a bond for \$50,000 will have to be put up.

TRANSPORTATION IS NECESSARY

Until Provided Gold and Silver Mining will Be Only Paying Proposition.

CALGARY, Alta., July 2.—The far north country contains a wealth of precious metals and commercial minerals and it only needs sufficient prospecting and vehicular communication to bring them out to the world, stated D. A. Lyon, a prospector of long experience who recently returned from the north. It was 100 miles east of Fort Norman when Indians brought him word that oil had been discovered at that place, and he was one of the first to get a filing in those fields. Mr. Lyon has been prospecting in the Copper Mine River district, which he declares is a very promising copper district.

Until better transportation facilities are available, Mr. Lyon states gold and silver mining is the only development that will pay. This prospector is going back for a four months' tour of the Great Slave country, which he believes is rich in gold and copper. On his way north he will also investigate prospects in the Peace River country.

NEW EXPEDITION INTO THE ARCTIC

Stefansson Will Investigate Reindeer and Fur Possibilities.

VANCOUVER, July 2.—Another expedition to the Arctic slope is foreshadowed under the direction of Mr. Stefansson, Canadian explorer of the northlands of Canada. Incorporation of a company with a capital stock of \$100,000 is under way in Vancouver. Stefansson, who is completing a lecture tour in the United States, is president of the new concern, which is named the Stefansson Arctic Exploration & Development Company.

A suitable vessel has already been obtained, and is now in the North, it is stated.

Stefansson has always been a great believer in the possibilities of marketing in vast quantities of reindeer meat, and it is to investigate and develop practical features of this and the fur trade, as well as to explore thoroughly the resources of the islands and country lying to the north of Canada that the expedition will be sent out.

ROBERTSON AND FRANK CARVELL

Minister of Labor Said Government Not Responsible For His Utterances.

CALGARY, Alta., July 2.—Addressing a meeting of railwaymen in Medicine Hat, when the men were asked to state any grievances which they might have, Senator Robertson, minister of labor, said that he was sorry to find that many railway employees were under the impression that Hon. F. B. Carvell is a member of the government, and that the government is responsible for any utterances he may have made.

"No government could ever have expected that a man in Mr. Carvell's position would have gone out and publicly discussed matters that were properly dealt with in his court alone," Senator Robertson said, according to a report in the Calgary Herald. "The railwaymen have a right to feel aggrieved at the statements he has made with regard to railway work or wages, some of which were not correct. When I found that the railwaymen were being so unfairly attacked I took the matter up in parliament and I might point out that there have been no more of the speeches referred to, because Mr. Carvell is now convinced that he was wrong in the stand that he took."

VICTORIA BUILDS NEW TYPE OF BOAT

"Hydro Glider" Can Travel With Great Speed and Land in Shallow Water.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 2.—The "hydro glider," which is being launched here soon, is something entirely new in the shallow-draft boat construction line. The boat is propelled by an airplane type petrol engine with an air propeller. The hull is of the hydroplane type which skims the surface up to a speed of 85 miles an hour. Eight passengers can be carried by this novel craft which differs greatly in construction and method of propulsion from the American "sea-sco" which demonstrated its speed off this port last year. The boat will be used to reach almost inaccessible places in exceptionally shallow water.

OIL TO TAKE PLACE OF COAL

Recent British Strike Caused Many Plants to Change Fuel.

LONDON, July 2.—British public services and industry will never again be wholly dependent on coal.

This is one certain effect of the mining dispute which has just ended. Oil is going to play a part that was undreamt of a few weeks ago. Thousands of works and factories, as well as public services, will be fitted with oil fuel plant in a few weeks, and will then be less at the mercy of coal strikes and lockouts.

The substitution of oil fuel for coal in industry is rapidly becoming an accomplished fact, and 1921 is likely to be the year of oil power.

The experimental stage is passed. Wherever the conversion of boilers has been carried out, the results have proved satisfactory.

OWNER FAILED TO KEEP APARTMENT WARM SO TENANT GOT DAMAGES

WINNIPEG, July 2.—A case of the wide interest to tenants in apartment blocks was decided here recently when Henry H. Pigott, a tenant, brought suit against W. W. Gross, owner of a local apartment block for failure of the janitor to provide sufficient steam heat. The plaintiff claimed that his lease entitled him to enough heat to keep his suite at a comfortable temperature. Evidence showed that the janitor was negligent on numerous occasions in this respect, one night the temperature dropping to 45 degrees.

A verdict for the plaintiff of \$150 damages and costs was returned, the jury contending that the defendant was liable because he did not personally see that the janitor kept the suite at a proper temperature.

WOMAN 110 YEARS OLD TOO DRUNK FOR TRIAL

SIoux CITY, Ia., July 2.—Mary Lowe, 110 years old, is the oldest person ever arraigned in Police Court here on the charge of intoxication. She was still so much under the influence when brought into court that her case was continued. She is an Indian from the Winnebago, Nebraska Reservation.

WAGE REDUCTIONS GENERAL ACCORDING TO LABOR GAZETTE

The June number of the Labor Gazette shows a number of wage reductions in different parts of the country. According to the reports published therein, skilled labor in British Columbia has been reduced from 10 to 25 per cent and in some cases hours have been increased. Laborers have been reduced from 50c an hour to 40c.

Except in New Brunswick and Alberta, wage schedules in the building industry in all the provinces show declines. In Prince Edward Island there is a reduction of five cents an hour while bricklayers earn \$1.05 an hour instead of \$1.25. Ontario "solds" show declines ranging from 10 to 20 per cent and the same is true of the important centres in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia.

In the metal trades New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, has reduced blacksmiths, machinists and molders up to 25 per cent. Similar reductions have been made in Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia.

In the Yukon gold miners earn \$5 a day and board instead of \$5.50 and in mining districts in the east there have been reductions.

Lumber camps in New Brunswick have reduced wages, one firm dropping laborers from \$25.50 a week to \$15 a week.

FLIN FLON COPPER MINE FOUNDER DEAD

THE PAS, Mon., July 2.—Isadore Dion, one of the six original prospectors who discovered the Flin Flon copper mine, died here. Dion disposed of his interest in the mine for \$25,000.

WINNIPEG PUTS TAX ON CATS OF CITY

Reason That City Infested With Too Many Toms and Tabbies.

WINNIPEG, July 2.—In spite of furious protests from cat-lovers the Winnipeg city council has decided to impose a license upon all toms and tabbies of the town. Cat-owners must in future pay an annual license of one dollar a year, and pussy must wear a small aluminum tag properly numbered or run the risk of extermination.

Among the reasons given for this action is that Winnipeg is infested with hordes of cats and the city bird life is suffering in consequence.

The suggestion should receive support from the bird lovers in the city, also the Fish and Game Protective association.

JUDGE SYMPATHIZES WITH YOUNG BRIDE

Then Has to Sentence Her Just-Wedded Husband to Three Years.

ST. CATHARINES, July 2.—Frederick Masten of Brantford was sentenced to three years in the Provincial Penitentiary by Judge Campbell after having been convicted by a jury last week of attempting to enter the house of W. J. Elliott. Before going before the Judge Masten was taken into the Grand Jury room, where he was married to Miss Irene Pearcey of Brantford by Rev. Canon Broughall. The Judge extended his sympathy to the young bride. Masten is also wanted at Simcoe for theft, a bail bond of \$6,000 having been exstated last week because of his failure to appear in court there.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for six years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emption in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, providing applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 4 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 3 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land exceeding 10 acres, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 10 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 10 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural gas, petroleum, or minerals by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The rights which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 30, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original purchase price remission of taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Act, 1921, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may lease owners for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for summer campers or vacation, up to 100 head.

WELCOMING OF NEW GOVERNOR

Ambitious Ceremonies at Quebec and Ottawa Proposed for Lord Byn.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(By Canadian Press).—Once every five years the people of Canada bid an affectionate farewell to a governor general, and with a great warm heartedness, immediately welcome the incoming representative of His Majesty, the King. In that welcome there is much of form and ceremony, curiosity and red tape, but under it all there lies a tremendous desire to assure the new governor general that he is right welcome. Perhaps history will never record a more determined attempt to make a governor general feel "at home" than the welcome that will be extended to Baron Byng of Vinny, soldier and statesman and the popular and honored leader of the Canadian Corps in France and Flanders.

The ships bearing His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire to England and Lord Byng to Canada will, as is usual, pass in mid-ocean. With the arrival of Lord Byng at the port of debarkation—Quebec, the serious business of installing the new governor general will commence. The docks will be lined with troops; flags will fly; guns from the harbor forts will thunder forth their salutes. It is not a simple ceremony; it is governed by the table of precedence and the table of precedence.

Swaninne In.

Leaving the boat the Governor General will be taken to the provincial legislative chambers where he will be "sworn in," sign the Oath Book, issue his proclamation bidding the government continue to function, after which he will board a special train for Ottawa to be again welcomed and cheered before proceeding to Government House.

During the ceremony of installation at Quebec, guards of honor will stand outside the building and as in the past the streets will be lined with soldiers. This serves the double purpose of doing honor to Baron Byng and keeping the curious along the route by jamming the roadways. A salute of 19 guns will also be fired.

has been customary for the mayor and civic officials of either Halifax or Quebec to tender the incoming Governor General a welcome reception. This function is attended by those on the table of precedence and by such others as the municipality sees fit to invite.

Immediately after the ceremonies, both national and civic, Baron Byng will be escorted to his private train and will proceed to the Capital. It is fair to say that at the port of debarkation along the route and in Ottawa he and Lady Byng will be showered with good wishes and bouquets of flowers. At Ottawa it is probable that the train on which the train will come in will be covered with a canopy while a guard of honor from the Governor General's Foot Guards will meet the train in addition to government and civic officials. The Capital, itself, will be en fete. Flags will be flown, banding displayed and thousands of citizens will jam the thoroughfares to "catch a glimpse" of His Excellency.

Special Train.

The special train, on which Baron Byng will travel will undoubtedly be worthy of notice. In the past railway officials have "sold up nights" making sure that no hitch would occur. That they have been successful is testified to by letters of appreciation which several leading Canadian railwaymen have handed in their offices. The train from the seaport to Ottawa will be preceded by a pilot engine and every possible care will be taken to see that the journey is accomplished in complete safety and comfort. One of the old features of this journey is that the trainmen connected with it are solemnly and duly paid \$5.00 as a gratuity.

Formal Greetings.

In Ottawa formal greetings will, it is expected, be extended by the prime minister, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen and by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition. It is also likely that a state dinner, probably at the Country Club, will be included in the welcoming ceremonies. While Baron Byng is not expected to come to Canada for some weeks, yet the officials of the Department of State are already scanning old files, brushing up on procedure and in fact laying the ground work for one of the most important ceremonies in the history of Canada.
