### Reply Has Been Received by Lloyd George from De Valera Answer to Proposals of British Government

BRIS, Aug. 11 (p.m.)—The British delegation announced earlier Lloyd George, on receipt of the Irish peace proposals, has returned to London with his mission tomorrow. The French cabinet has been summoned to meet tomorrow. A meeting of the Supreme Council tomorrow forenoon will be held. A cabinet meeting was issued after a conference with Lloyd George on the Silesian question. The British government will meet its cabinet on Saturday to discuss the Irish proposals. In the meantime the reply will be discussed and preparation made for the more formal reply. It is believed the Irish reply is hopeful.

### TRAGIC DEATH WILLIAM BOOTH

Was Killed Yesterday Afternoon When Attempting to Stop Runaway Team.

While attempting to stop a runaway team yesterday afternoon in which several little children were riding, William Booth, a returned soldier and old timer of this city, was fatally injured and expired in the General Hospital shortly after the accident.

About 3:45, J. H. Shedden was unloading a load of coal near the King Edward School and, when he was just about finished, a group of youngsters got into his wagon and the horses bolted. Careening down Seventh Avenue they were met near the corner of Hays Cove Circle and Sixth Avenue as they were rounding the turn by Roy Walker and the deceased and a party of workmen. Mr. Walker and Mr. Booth attempted to stop the runaway, standing on either side, but they were unsuccessful and the latter was in some manner thrown beneath the wheels of the heavy wagon with the result that his chest was badly crushed.

Frank Morris, in the B. C. Undertaker's hearse, happened to be nearby and the runaway narrowly grazed his machine. He picked up the wounded man and rushed him to the General Hospital where he expired about 5 o'clock without having gained consciousness.

The runaway continued around Hays Cove Circle and up Fifth Avenue and was finally stopped by Huntley Tate in his automobile near the General Hospital. None of the children were hurt.

An Old Timer.  
Mr. Booth was a well known and highly respected old timer of the city. He came here before incorporation and was engaged in survey work. In 1911 he joined the city waterworks department with which he has been since, with the exception of a long period he spent with the Canadian Expeditionary Forces overseas. He enlisted with 62nd battalion here in June 1915 and was transferred to the 48th overseas. He was wounded with shrapnel at the Somme in June 1916, but remained in the service until the end of the war. He had a splendid record and was made a sergeant before he was discharged.

Native of England.  
He was a native of Derbyshire, England, and was about 47 years of age. His death is made even more tragic by the fact that he had recently completed a new and fine home near Seal Cove Circle and was expecting his bride out shortly from the Old Country.

The funeral will take place with full military honors on Monday under the auspices of the Great War Veterans Association and the Sons of England. He was a member of both organizations.

### Dominion Government Engineer Tells About Possibilities of Mining Mackenzie River Zone

"There is not the big rush to the Fort Norman oil fields this season that had been anticipated," stated F. H. Kitto, exploration engineer of the Natural Resources Intelligence Branch, Department of Interior, Ottawa, who reached the city last night after having visited the Great Slave Lake and other parts of the North since last April when he left Ottawa. "This seems but natural, however, when one realizes that the oil business there is essentially a game for the big companies. If oil is found in quantities the getting of it out will be a big undertaking for large interests to handle. This bars the smaller men."  
Mr. Kitto's trip this year took him only to the Mackenzie River and Great Slave Lake, and he did not get down as far as Fort Norman. Last year, however, he did visit Fort Norman and saw the drilling operation of the Imperial Oil Company before the gusher was struck. This year he says there are several companies drilling there besides the Imperial Oil Company.

Having visited the oil fields before and having an intimate knowledge of conditions, Mr. Kitto was sent north this year to assist in the organization of mining recording offices. The main office was established at Fort Smith and sub-offices at Fort Resolution, Fort Simpson and Fort Norman. He went in by way of the Peace River route and came out by way of the Athabasca River.

"There is a great increase in the number of prospectors in the North this year," Mr. Kitto said. "Indications of gold, copper and silver are very promising over a wide area and there are some excellent showings of zinc ore but, perhaps, the chief of all to draw particular attention is the placer mining. The most favorable placer field seems to be south of the Nahani River, a tributary of the Liard. Several outfits have gone in but none have yet come out with reports. One cannot tell as yet but it is possible that the district may be a potential mining field besides being an oil area."

Central B. C. Reports.  
Mr. Kitto is now on his way to Victoria where he will consult with the provincial government with a view to obtaining information for the revision of his well known Central British Columbia reports, the first issue of which was sent out last year. A second revised issue is now being prepared and it is in this connection that he is paying the present visit to British Columbia.

### STEWART AND BIG RAILWAY

Persistent Rumors that C.P.R. is to Build Line to Groundhog Next Year.

STEWART, Aug. 12.—There are persistent rumors here that the C.P.R. is to build a line into the Groundhog coal fields next year and that shipments of the coal will be made through this port. Mysterious visits of people supposed to be closely in touch with the C.P.R. interests are made here from time to time and there are other indications that outsiders are taking a more than ordinary interest in this little camp.

### RUM RUNNING WITH STATES

Business Being Carried on Between Ontario and Northern Michigan.

WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 12.—Rum running between here and the United States is to be carried on more freely than ever. Liquor enforcement officials believe. Huge orders have been received by local distilleries and it is stated that a score of speed boats will be operated, taking liquors to Michigan.

### SOURDOUGHS FROM NORTH TO CELEBRATE

DAWSON, Aug. 12.—Sourdoughs from Alaska and the Yukon are assembling to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the gold discovery in the Klondike on Wednesday next. A big parade and sourdough banquet is planned, at which only food grown in the Yukon will be served.

### NO MORE LOANS MADE INDUSTRIES JUST NOW

VICTORIA, Aug. 12.—No further loans will be extended by the Department of Industries to new projects until industrial conditions have decidedly improved. Probably this will be next spring.

### MONTREAL PRINTERS ACCEPT 48-HOUR WEEK

MONTREAL, Aug. 12.—Compositors on the French papers La Presse, La Patrie, and Le Canada have agreed to accept the same working arrangement as that signed by the men on the English papers some time ago, which call for a 48 hour week at \$36 per week, it is announced by the Employing Printers' Association. The new agreement is for one year from next September.

**BRINGING UP FATHER**



**FAST DRIVING AND CHILDREN RIDING TEAMS**

**Police Are Given Instructions to Take Action in Police Court if Necessary.**

By formal motion passed at the meeting of the police commission last night the police were instructed to give special attention to the matter of fast driving of automobiles and the riding of children on teams and other vehicles with a view to making an example of some parties.

Commissioner Macdonald referred to the tragedy which took place yesterday afternoon at Hays Cove and declared that the riding of children on wagons and cars was becoming a menace. It was remarkable that some had not already been killed. If the teamsters could not do anything, then the children should be dealt with by the police. The matter of fast driving appeared to be almost a "chestnut" and it was time some drivers were arraigned in the police court and fined. Even on Fulton Street near the police station one night recently he had difficulty in getting out of the way of a car that was being driven at a rate of speed far exceeding what must be lawful.

**JAP GETS TWO YEARS IN JAIL**

**Pled guilty of Wounding and Sentenced Yesterday Afternoon by Judge Young.**

C. Vatanove, charged with wounding with intent, appeared before Judge Young yesterday afternoon and, electing for speedy trial, pleaded guilty. He was sentenced to two years with hard labor at New Westminster penitentiary.
