March Across The Rhine Tomorrow

SERIOUS REBELLION IN RUSSIA AGAINST SOVIET RULE; PETROGRAD IN FLAMES

Rebellion Against Russian Soviet Spreading in North

Petrograd in Flames and Troops being Despatched from Moscow to Restore Order; Will Get Friendly Reception

Road Supply is Cut Off for Government Troops

Fifty-five Soviet Commissaries Fly to Estonia; Most Serious Uprising Yet for Present Regime

LONDON, March 7.—News of a most serious character has been received from Petrograd. The residential and business areas are in flames and the Soviet Government is despatching troops from Moscow to Petrograd to restore order.

The rebels plan to accord these troops a friendly reception in hope of winning them over.

Many towns near Petrograd have been captured by rebels. Twenty-five Soviet commissioners having been abandoned by troops have fled to Estonia and 50,000 armed peasants constitute the Government at Tambov and Veronezh, preventing the re-taking of the northern sections of Russia.

The despatches indicate that the Soviet faces the most serious situation it has yet seen.

In Feiners' Mayor Shot In Home as Retrial for Murder of Gen. Cumming

LONDON, March 7.—General Cumming, commander of the Kerry regiment, was one of two officers killed in an ambush of the military at Glanham.

General Cumming was president of a court of inquiry investigating the shooting of railwaymen in Mallow.

One hundred men took part in the ambush and in addition to two officers, two privates were killed.

In Dublin a daring attack on a military lorry with bomb explosions and rifle fire caused a panic in the streets. Two civilians were wounded.

BLINN, March 7.—George Glancy, mayor of Limerick, was shot dead at his home and his wife seriously injured, and Michael Ashe, former mayor, was killed in his home by bands of men. Sinn Féin is greatly exercised over this latest shooting. The Sinn Féin believe it is in reprisal for the assassination of General Cumming.

WORK GOES MERRILY AT SHIPYARD

LONDON, March 7.—Confirmation has been received in Copenhagen of the reports that Russian Revolutionaries have taken possession of the fortress of Kronstadt and the seaport at the head of the Gulf of Finland, near the city of Petrograd.

OLIVER SAYS PATTULLO IS LIVE MEMBER

Member for This District Urges Inclusion of Skeena Road in General Policy.

In connection with the Government policy of road building, as expressed to a delegation, Mr. Pattullo recently took occasion to emphasize the need of including the Prince Rupert to Hazelton road in the program of construction. The Victoria Times report of the incident is as follows:

"The Provincial Government intends to carry out a broad policy of road construction and to press road work at different points in the province as fast as financial conditions will allow. Premier Oliver told delegates from the Good Roads League, who waited upon the Executive Council this morning and presented resolutions passed by the League convention here yesterday.

The Government is impressed with the necessity of road construction throughout the province," the premier assured the delegation. "We realize that if the province is to develop we must not only have better roads, but more roads. The Government intends to follow out a policy of road construction, and to press that work just as far and fast as the financial condition of the province will permit of it being done with reasonable safety."

And the North. "Including the north of the province," suggested Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, who pointed out that the resolutions presented made no mention of a road from Prince Rupert to Hazelton.

"It's all part of the province," agreed Mr. Oliver. "They know, anyway, that the north has a live representative on the job here!"

The delegation was introduced to the cabinet by the Hon. J. H. King, minister of public works, who had just concluded an address to the League convention. Mayor Gale, Vancouver, president of the League, was the chief speaker. He congratulated the minister of public works on his efforts to give the province good strom, Drexel Rooms, and Williams & Manson, and remarked, "I hope, Mr. Premier, that the Government will be as kind to Dr. King as possible and let him fulfill his desires as to road building."

Urges Prayers for Peace on St. Patrick's Day and Condemns Bloodshed and Attacks on Soldiers in that Country

BELFAST, March 7.—Cardinal Logue, in a letter to the Priests of Armagh diocese, makes a powerful appeal for a truce in Ireland and suggests the forthcoming birthday of the first national apostle offers an opportune occasion for an appeal to the Almighty for a return of peace in Ireland.

The cardinal deplores the disregard for human life and property shown on both sides. He denounces ambushing and attacking of soldiers.

Allied Troops Will March into Germany

German Counter Proposals Rejected by Allied Council and Activities Commence Tomorrow

LONDON, March 7.—(Latest)—Application of penalties on Germany for non-fulfillment of the reparations requirements was decided upon by the allies this afternoon.

LONDON, March 7.—(a.m.)—The new German proposals are stated in French circles to be unacceptable. They were submitted to the Supreme Council this morning.

The Germans told the allies that Germany had rejected the proposals formulated at Paris. They had decided to revert to the idea of a provisional arrangement calling for the payment of fixed annuities for the first five years and an equivalent of twelve per cent on German exports.

It is reported that the Allies will inform the Germans that penalties will be applied. The situation is said to be serious.

BERLIN, March 6.—After conferences between members of the cabinet, Reichstag leaders and technical advisers, it is authoritatively stated that instructions were sent to Dr. Simonds at London in which he was told the German Government would not permit him to exceed the counter proposals made at the repARATION conference.

LONDON, March 7.—The penalties for non-compliance with allied demands are occupation of Duisberg, Dusseldorf and Ruhrort in the German industrial area beyond the Rhine by allied troops.

The imposition by each ally of such tax as he deems fitting on German imports.

The establishment of a customs boundary under allied control along the Rhine.

Lloyd George told the Germans their proposals were unacceptable. They did not even justify the postponement of the penalties. There can be no peace, he said, until the allies get their proposals, which mean a permanent settlement.

The allied troops will march into Germany tomorrow.

Joseph Wells and David Wells, Port Simpson Indians, were brought to the city on Saturday afternoon committed for trial by John Flewin and Dr. W. Sagar, justices of the peace, on the charge of assaulting a peace officer. They appear before Judge Young this afternoon for election.

The assault is alleged to have taken place when one of the men was being taken to the lockup in Port Simpson and the other interfered.

The witnesses in the case are Constables Watkinson and Campbell and James McKay, another native.

VANCOUVER, March 7.—A. Linton & Co. here is building life-boats to replace those damaged in the Prince Rupert wreck.

Development of Cow Bay.

The Daily News would like to see Cow Bay developed if it is of use to the people of the city. As it stands at the present time it is a menace to the health of the city and a disgrace to the whole community.

Capt. Freeman says he has ascertained the probable cost of the work of dredging and excavating the bay to make it of value to the smaller boats. The cost, he says, would be \$200,000. That is a large sum to spend on a little bay which will never amount to much. In most public works it is found that the cost of construction exceeds the estimated cost so it is safe to say the work will not cost less than the sum mentioned.

The interest on an investment of \$200,000 would amount to \$12,000 a year at the low rate of six per cent. If that much money is spent, the Dominion Government will expect to get sufficient returns to pay that interest. In order to do so the toll charges for wharfage and other uses will have to be high in order to pay for the cost of collecting and the interest. Would Capt. Freeman rent the Bay, after it is constructed and pay \$12,000 a year for it in addition to a charge for depreciation and repairs.

Fish Dock Brings Dividends.

The new fish dock is expected to bring dividends. That is why it is being built. It will pay a much higher rate of interest than six per cent, if it is completed soon and is used as it should be.

The provincial dock, owing to faulty construction, has not, up to the present time, paid interest on the investment. It has been impossible to load it with heavy material for fear of collapse.

The floats at Cow Bay were a free gift from the province to the fishing fraternity and the boat owners of Prince Rupert and some of those who have been doing most of the kicking in connection with Cow Bay are those who have paid no rent for the accommodation they now use. If the merchants who have waterfront leases could get off that easy, they would soon become rich.

We are looking to the Dominion Government to do a great deal for us. We want a lumber assembly wharf, coal bunkers, fishermen's docks at Seal Cove, bars dredged, round houses, station, fish cars and a lot of other things. We are finding it difficult to get any of these things. If we add to that the spending of \$200,000 for the dredging of a little creek crossed at its mouth by railway tracks and with the probability that more railway tracks, up to the number of six, may cross it before long, we shall find that the Government will consider we are joking with them or playing politics. It is wise to ask only for those things we are likely to secure. To ask things which it is improbable will ever be granted, is foolish.

Not Advocating Filling Cow Bay.

The Daily News is not advocating the filling of Cow Bay. At one time there was an opportunity to exchange the bay for waterfront outside. Whether such an offer is still good nobody seems to know. We favored that proposal. We do not think Cow Bay should be allowed to stand in the way of needed development, but on the other hand, it should not be filled without good reason, and the provision of a substitute. To allow it to remain as it is today is not good policy for it is a menace to the health of the community and is an eye sore and an objectionable nuisance.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

SUPPLYING
LIVE BAIT

N. M. & R. Fish Co. are Operating
Largest Pound Ever in North

One of the most interesting industries in this district is the pounding of live herring bait at Captain's Cove, Pitt Island, fifty miles from here, which is now being carried on full swing by the N. M. & R. Fishing Co. Two hundred tons of the fish are already impounded and two boats "Malamute" and "N. M. & R. No. 1" are steadily seining the fish from the outside waters and taking them into the pound where they are released and will be held until sold. Captain James Neville is in charge at Captain's Cove and there are nine men in all engaged with the two boats in catching and taking care of the fish.

The halibut boats requiring the bait will proceed to Captain's Cove and take their stock of the live fish on their way to sea. American boats as well as Canadian will be supplied and authority for the sending of a custom's man to the location has just been given from Ottawa.

Two Weeks More

The taking of the herring will continue for at least two weeks longer and before the run is done the company will have another pound established and filled closer to Prince Rupert. When the herring run is over the two boats will be used in serving the halibut vessels and it is expected that the stock of bait will last out till well into the month of May or later.

Herring pounds have been operated before in the North, but never on such a large scale as this one.

CHELOHSIN SAILING
MINUS HER FOREMAST

Fouled the Alice Arm Wharf a couple of trips ago—Venture Coming Next Week.

The Union steamer Chelohsin is making her last trip this week before lying up in the south for annual overhaul and will be replaced next week by the Venture. Among the repairs that are to be made to the Chelohsin is the putting on of a new foremast. At present she is sailing with her mast sawed off a few feet above the bridge as a result of having it torn badly when fouling the Alice Arm wharf a few weeks ago.

The Venture on her return next week will look much different from what she did when last seen here. Extensive changes to her decking and cabins have been made on her recent overhaul at Wallace's shipyard, North Vancouver.





LABOR OUTLOOK IS PROMISING

In the Letter Box

COW BAY AGAIN.

Editor Daily News:

James Campbell, Government Employment Agent, Predicts Everybody Working by End Month

That by the end of this month all the 200 or more unemployed in Prince Rupert will be at work in my opinion of James M. Campbell, government employment agent, who sees a very hopeful outlook ahead in the employment situation in this district.

Mr. Campbell reports that last week saw more men employed through his office than any other week since October and there is promise of a good demand for labor from now on. On the Prince John on Thursday there were 20 men sent to Sedgewick Bay for the Whalen Co., they having come from Vancouver on Wednesday. The chief placements last week were to the dry dock, Premier Mine and small numbers about town.

Porcher Island

Early this week W. T. Muse is taking about a dozen men to Porcher Island where he is reopening a logging camp. By April it is expected that most of the logging camps in the district will be reopened, as well as some of the sawmills, including the one at Benie, the foremen for which, it is reported, have already been appointed.

Within the week Olof Hansen will be sending a crew of 20 to 30 men up the line to commence work on a new pole contract which he has secured. Among the logging camps which are expected to reopen within the next thirty days is J. R. Morgan's at Surf Inlet.

Up to date 300 certificates for relief have been issued from the local labor bureau and Mr. Campbell estimates that this covers about 200 unemployed who will find work again with the opening of the dry dock and the resumption of the logging, mining and fishing industries.

Few Canneries

The salmon cannery business this year gives promise of being very slack. It is expected that no more than 6 or 7 of the Skeena canneries will operate and the equipment and gear from all the other plants will be centralized at the few. Only sockeyes will be put up as the market is glutted with all other kinds and there are huge quantities that will supply the demand for two or three years in storage at different places.

PRINCE EDWARD ISL. LEGISLATURE TO MEET

Sum of \$100,000 has been Expended on Roads Financed by Auto Licensees

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Mar. 7.—It is expected that the Provincial Legislature will meet here this month for the second session of the new Liberal administration headed by Premier John H. Bell. Although no definite information as to what legislation will be brought down for consideration is yet available, it is thought that business this year will be comparatively light. Last year the Government had a very heavy program on its hands, inclusive of increased taxation, roads and the establishment of an agricultural and technical high school.

A substantial increase in revenue was secured by the passage of the new taxation act last session and it is quite probable that the income and expenditure of the Province for the year will about balance, something that has not occurred for some time in Prince Edward Island. The opposition press since the last session has been persistently attacking the Government taxation measures which, they claim, were unequalled for. The contention of the opposition leader, A. F. Arsenault, was that with a special education tax the Government would be able to carry on without materially increasing taxes of other kinds. Taxation is never popular in any Province and in Prince Edward, which is no exception, a number of indignation meetings have been held since the House last met.

Under the 60-40 Highways arrangement with the Federal Government Premier Bell's Government has expended \$100,000 on roads, the automobile licence fees being funded to pay the interest on the money spent.



ONTARIO GOES INTO BANKING

Bill Introduced into Legislature
of That Province Provides
Rural Credits

**PROPOSAL TO PAY ON
DEPOSITS 4 PER CENT.**

TORONTO, Mar. 7.—The Minister of Agriculture has introduced into the Ontario Legislature three bills designed to provide for both short term and long term rural credits. In general, these proposed measures resemble the Manitoba Rural Credits Act, 1917, the Manitoba Farm Loans Act, 1917, and the Provincial Savings Act (Manitoba), 1920, but they depart from the legislation of the sister province in important provisions.

The Ontario Farm Loans Bill would authorize provincial incorporation of farm loan associations in any part of Ontario, with one-half the capital in every case subscribed by thirty or more individual farmers, each of whom must have subscribed to one share \$100 of stock; one-quarter the capital subscribed by the local municipality and the remaining one-quarter of the capital subscribed by the Government of Ontario. In Manitoba such participation by the municipality and by the province is permissive and voluntary only; in Ontario it will be compulsory if the bill is enacted in its present form.

Will Make Loans

The bill contemplates that such associations should receive applications for loans from individual members and that, as loans are approved by the local associations, the money should be borrowed on the collective liability of all the members. The rate of interest payable by the borrower must not exceed 7 per cent, and one-seventh of such interest must be paid to the local association to help to defray expenses, pay dividends of not more than 6 per cent on the paid up capital, and build up a reserve. Loans must mature on or before December 31 of the year in which they are made, but would be renewable at the discretion of the directors of the local association, apparently without reference to the lender. The association would have a lien on all property purchased in part
