## March Across The Rhine Tomorrow

### SERIOUS REBELLION IN RUSSIA AGAINST SOVIET RULE; PETROGRAD IN FLAMES

#### Rebellion Against Russian Soviet Spreading in North

Petrograd in Flames and Troops Being Despatched from Moscow to Restore Order; Will Get Friendly Reception

#### Food Supply is Cut Off for Government Troops

Twenty-Five Soviet Commissaries Fly to Estonia; Most Serious Uprising Yet for Present Regime

LONDON, March 7.—News of a most serious character has been received from Petrograd. The residential and business quarters are in flames and the Soviet Government is despatching troops from Moscow to Petrograd to restore order. The rebels plan to accord these troops a friendly reception and hope of winning them over. Many towns near Petrograd have been captured by rebels. Twenty-five Soviet commissaries having been abandoned by their troops have fled to Estonia and 50,000 armed peasants controlled by the Government at Tambov and Veronezh, preventing the re-arming of the northern sections of Russia. The despatches indicate that the Soviet faces the most serious situation it has yet seen.

#### In Feiners' Mayor Shot in Home as Reprisal for Murder of Gen. Cumming

BRK, March 7.—General Cumming, commander of the Kerry regiment, was one of two officers killed in an ambush of the military police at Glouhamin. General Cumming was president of a court of inquiry into the shooting of railwaymen in Mallow. One hundred men took part in the ambush and in addition to the two officers, two privates were killed. A Dublin daring attack on a military lorry with bomb, machine gun and rifle fire caused a panic in the streets. Two civilians were wounded. LONDON, March 7.—George Clancy, mayor of Limerick, was shot and killed at his home and his wife seriously injured, and Michael O'Sullivan, former mayor, was killed in his home by bands of men. Limerick is greatly excited over this latest shooting. The Sinn Féin believe it is in reprisal for the assassination of General Cumming.

#### WORK GOES MERRILY AT SHIPYARD

Work is proceeding as usual at the shipyard. The same number of men are working as were there last Saturday and unless conditions improve, the men will continue to work until the appeal is decided. Mr. Patmore this morning received a copy of the order of the court and this states that in event of appeal the material removed from the shipyard will not have to be returned until the appeal is settled. There is nothing Mr. Patmore sees to prevent work at the yards continuing.

#### CAFETERIA LEFT FOR OTTAWA SATURDAY

VANCOUVER, March 7.—M. P. Kelly and J. E. McCreary left on Saturday for Ottawa to attend a conference with Hon. J. G. Macdonald, minister of marine fisheries, in the protection of the interests of the creditors of the shipyard company. The situation remains unchanged.

#### REVOLUTIONARIES TAKING KRONSTADT BEEN CONFIRMED

LONDON, March 7.—Confirmation has been received in Copenhagen of the reports that Russian Revolutionaries have taken possession of the fortress of Kronstadt and the seaport at the head of the Gulf of Finland, near the city of Petrograd.

#### FISH ARRIVALS LIGHT

Small Number Boats in at Yesterday's Fish Sale.

Arrivals were light at the Fish Exchange yesterday morning and the following were the only boats selling: Reliance, 7,000 pounds; Hippo, 9,000 pounds, and Inez H., 8,000 pounds to the Booth Fisheries Canadian Company at 14.3c and 6c. Speculator, 4,000 pounds; Fannie F., 2,000 pounds, and Crescent, 7,000 pounds sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 13c and 6c.

#### OLIVER SAYS PATTULLO IS LIVE MEMBER

Member for This District Urges Inclusion of Skeena Road in General Policy.

In connection with the Government policy of road building, as expressed to a delegation, Mr. Pattullo recently took occasion to emphasize the need of including the Prince Rupert to Hazelton road in the program of construction. The Victoria Times report of the incident is as follows: "The Provincial Government intends to carry out a broad policy of road construction and to press road work at different points in the province as fast as financial conditions will allow. Premier Oliver told delegates from the Good Roads League, who waited upon the Executive Council this morning and presented resolutions passed by the League convention here yesterday. "The Government is impressed with the necessity of road construction throughout the province," the premier assured the delegation. "We realize that if the province is to develop we must not only have better roads, but more roads. The Government intends to follow out a policy of road construction, and to press that work just as far and fast as the financial condition of the province will permit of it being done with reasonable safety."

#### And the North.

"Including the north of the province," suggested Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, who pointed out that the resolutions presented made no mention of a road from Prince Rupert to Hazelton.

"It's all part of the province," agreed Mr. Oliver. "They know, anyway, that the north has a live representative on the job here!"

The delegation was introduced to the cabinet by the Hon. J. H. King, minister of public works, who had just concluded an address to the League convention. Mayor Gale, Vancouver, president of the League, was the chief speaker. He congratulated the minister of public works on his efforts to give the province good roads, and remarked, "I hope, Mr. Premier, that the Government will be as kind to Dr. King as possible, and let him fulfill his desires as to road building."

#### The speakers.

The resolution concerning the construction of various roads in different parts of British Columbia were explained to the cabinet by Noble Binas, Lorne Campbell, Rossland, J. R. Akar, New Westminster, Mayor McHardy, Nelson, and F. L. Rowe, Penticton.

About forty couples attended the dance given by the Central Labor Council in the McIntyre Hall Saturday evening. Music was provided by Arthur's Orchestra, Frank Bain was master of ceremonies and R. C. Knight was on the door.

#### RUPPRECHT MAY BE MONARCH ONCE MORE.



Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria and Princess Charlotte his wife, photographed a short time ago in Berlin. A cable to the New York Times says that Bavaria is awaiting an opportunity to declare herself as a separate kingdom. If there is any truth in the despatch, Prince Rupprecht would then be proclaimed the King of Bavaria.

#### Cardinal Logue on Trouble in Ireland

Urges Prayers for Peace on St. Patrick's Day and Condemns Bloodshed and Attacks on Soldiers in that Country

BELFAST, March 7.—Cardinal Logue, in a letter to the Priests of Armagh diocese, makes a powerful appeal for a truce in Ireland and suggests the forthcoming birthday of the first national apostle offers an opportune occasion for an appeal to the Almighty for a return of peace in Ireland.

The cardinal deprecates the disregard for human life and property shown on both sides. He denounces ambushing and attacking of soldiers.

#### FELL FROM STAIRWAY SUING FOR DAMAGES

Judge Young Has Only One Case Slated for This Month.

The only case slated for the County Court before Judge Young this month is an action for damages, totalling \$815, entered by Perry Warner, a Surf Inlet engineer, against Mrs. Marie Dahlstrom, Drexel Rooms, and Williams & Manson.

The action arises out of the plaintiff falling from a broken stairway leading to the basement of the Drexel Rooms building on Second Avenue. Negligence of the tenant, Mrs. Dahlstrom, and the owners, Williams & Manson, is alleged. The claim is made up of \$300 time lost, \$15 doctor's fees, \$500 damages and the costs of the action. The defendants claim that the staircase in question did not come under the terms of the occupancy of the plaintiff as the basement, to which it led, was at the time rented to Harry Hanson.

W. H. Johnson has the case for the plaintiff, Milton Gonzales, of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, appears for Williams & Manson, while W. O. Fulton, of Patmore & Fulton, is defending Mrs. Dahlstrom. The date of the hearing has not yet been set.

#### SCOTLAND SENDS A LABOR MEMBER TO WESTMINSTER

KIRKCALDY, March 7.—The Government suffered defeat in the by-election caused by the resignation of Sir James Dalziel, member for Kirkcaldy Borough. The vote gave the following result: Tom Kennedy, labor, 11,674; Sir Robert Lockhart, coalition, 10,499.

#### Allied Troops Will March into Germany

German Counter Proposals Rejected by Allied Council and Activities Commence Tomorrow

LONDON, March 7.—(Latest)—Application of penalties on Germany for non-fulfillment of the reparations requirements was decided upon by the allies this afternoon.

LONDON, March 7.—(a. m.)—The new German proposals are stated in French circles to be unacceptable. They were submitted to the Supreme Council this morning.

The Germans told the allies that Germany had rejected the proposals formulated at Paris. They had decided to revert to the idea of a provisional arrangement calling for the payment of fixed annuities for the first five years and an equivalent of twelve per cent on German exports.

It is reported that the Allies will inform the Germans that penalties will be applied. The situation is said to be serious.

BERLIN, March 6.—After conferences between members of the cabinet, Reichstag leaders and technical advisers, it is authoritatively stated that instructions were sent to Dr. Simons at London in which he was told the German Government would not permit him to exceed the counter proposals made at the reparation conference.

LONDON, March 7.—The penalties for non-compliance with allied demands are occupation of Duisberg, Dusseldorf and Ruhrort in the German industrial area beyond the Rhine by allied troops.

The imposition by each ally of such tax as he deems fitting on German imports.

The establishment of a customs boundary under allied control along the Rhine.

Lloyd George told the Germans their proposals were unacceptable. They did not even justify the postponement of the penalties. There can be no peace, he said, until the allies get their proposals, which mean a permanent settlement.

The allied troops will march into Germany tomorrow.

#### INDIANS COMMITTED ASSAULT ON OFFICER

Joseph Wells and David Wells Brought to Town to Appear Before Judge Young.

Joseph Wells and David Wells, Port Simpson Indians, were brought to the city on Saturday afternoon committed for trial by John Flewin and Dr. W. Sagar, justices of the peace, on the charge of assaulting a peace officer. They appear before Judge Young this afternoon for election.

The assault is alleged to have taken place when one of the men was being taken to the lockup in Simpson and the other interfered. The witnesses in the case are Constables Watkinson and Campbell and James McKay, another native.

#### NEW LIFE BOATS FOR WRECKED RUPERT

Schooner Just Finished for the Mackenzie River Service.

VANCOUVER, March 7.—A. Linton & Co. here is building lifeboats to replace those damaged in the Prince Rupert wreck.

The Vancouver Shipbuilders have finished a 33-foot schooner for the Hudson's Bay freight service on the Mackenzie River.

Development of Cow Bay.

The Daily News would like to see Cow Bay developed if it is of use to the people of the city. As it stands at the present time it is a menace to the health of the city and a disgrace to the whole community.

Capt. Freeman says he has ascertained the probable cost of the work of dredging and excavating the bay to make it of value to the smaller boats. The cost, he says, would be \$200,000.

The interest on an investment of \$200,000 would amount to \$12,000 a year at the low rate of six per cent. If that much money is spent, the Dominion Government will expect to get sufficient returns to pay that interest.

Fish Dock Brings Dividends.

The new fish dock is expected to bring dividends. That is why it is being built. It will pay a much higher rate of interest than six per cent, if it is completed soon and is used as it should be.

The provincial dock, owing to faulty construction, has not, up to the present time, paid interest on the investment. It has been impossible to load it with heavy material for fear of collapse.

The floats at Cow Bay were a free gift from the province to the fishing fraternity and the boat owners of Prince Rupert and some of those who have been doing most of the kicking in connection with Cow Bay are those who have paid no rent for the accommodation they now use.

We are looking to the Dominion Government to do a great deal for us. We want a lumber assembly wharf, coal bunkers, fishermen's docks at Seal Cove, bars dredged, round house, station, fish cars and a lot of other things. We are finding it difficult to get any of these things.

Not Advocating Filling Cow Bay.

The Daily News is not advocating the filling of Cow Bay. At one time there was an opportunity to exchange the bay for waterfront outside. Whether such an offer is still good nobody seems to know.

SUPPLYING LIVE BAIT

N. M. & R. Fish Co. are Operating Largest Pound Ever in North

One of the most interesting industries in this district is the pounding of live herring bait at Captain's Cove, Pitt Island, fifty miles from here, which is now being carried on full swing by the N. M. & R. Fishing Co. Two hundred tons of the fish are already impounded and two boats "Malumute" and "N. M. & R. No. 1," are steadily seining the fish from the outside waters and taking them into the pound where they are released and will be held until sold.

The halibut boats requiring the bait will proceed to Captain's Cove and take their stock of the live fish on their way to sea. American boats as well as Canadian will be supplied and authority for the sending of a custom's man to the location has just been given from Ottawa.

Two Weeks More

The taking of the herring will continue for at least two weeks longer and before the run is done the company will have another pound established and filled closer to Prince Rupert. When the herring run is over the two boats will be used in serving the halibut vessels and it is expected that the stock of bait will last out till well into the month of May or later.

Herring pounds have been operated before in the North, but never on such a large scale as this one.

CHELOHSIN SAILING MINUS HER FOREMAST

Fouled the Alice Arm Wharf a couple of Trips Ago—Venture Coming Next Week.

The Union steamer Chelohsin is making her last trip this week before lying up in the south for annual overhaul and will be replaced next week by the Venture. Among the repairs that are to be made to the Chelohsin is the putting on of a new foremast. At present she is sailing with her mast sawed off a few feet above the bridge as a result of having it torn badly when fouling the Alice Arm wharf a few weeks ago.

The Venture on her return next week will look much different from what she did when last seen here. Extensive changes to her decking and cabins have been made on her recent overhaul at Wallace's shipyard, North Vancouver.

March 7, 1911 Chris Christiansen and his crew had a narrow escape last evening when a gasoline can exploded on their launch, the Agnes, and threw one man overboard and scroached the others.

Alderman Hilditch states that the city steam electric plant cannot be operated economically and that soon it will be necessary to establish a water power system.

The city council has granted the request of the liquor interests for permission to keep bars open until midnight instead of 11 o'clock as at present. Bishop Du Vernet, L. W. Palmore, Dr. W. T. Kergin and D. McLeod appeared at the meeting last night opposing the granting, while J. Y. Rochester and S. Corley represented the liquor men.

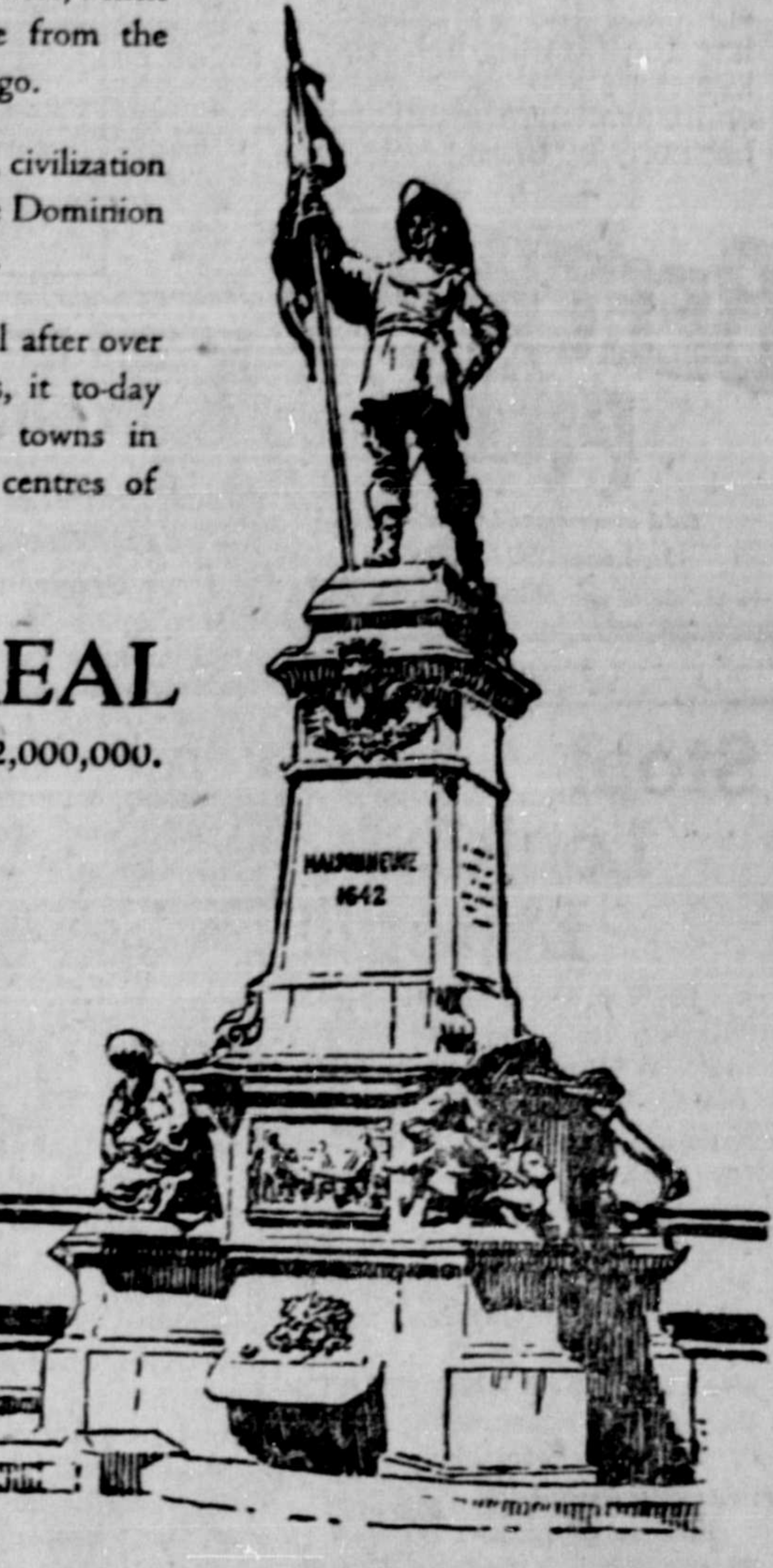
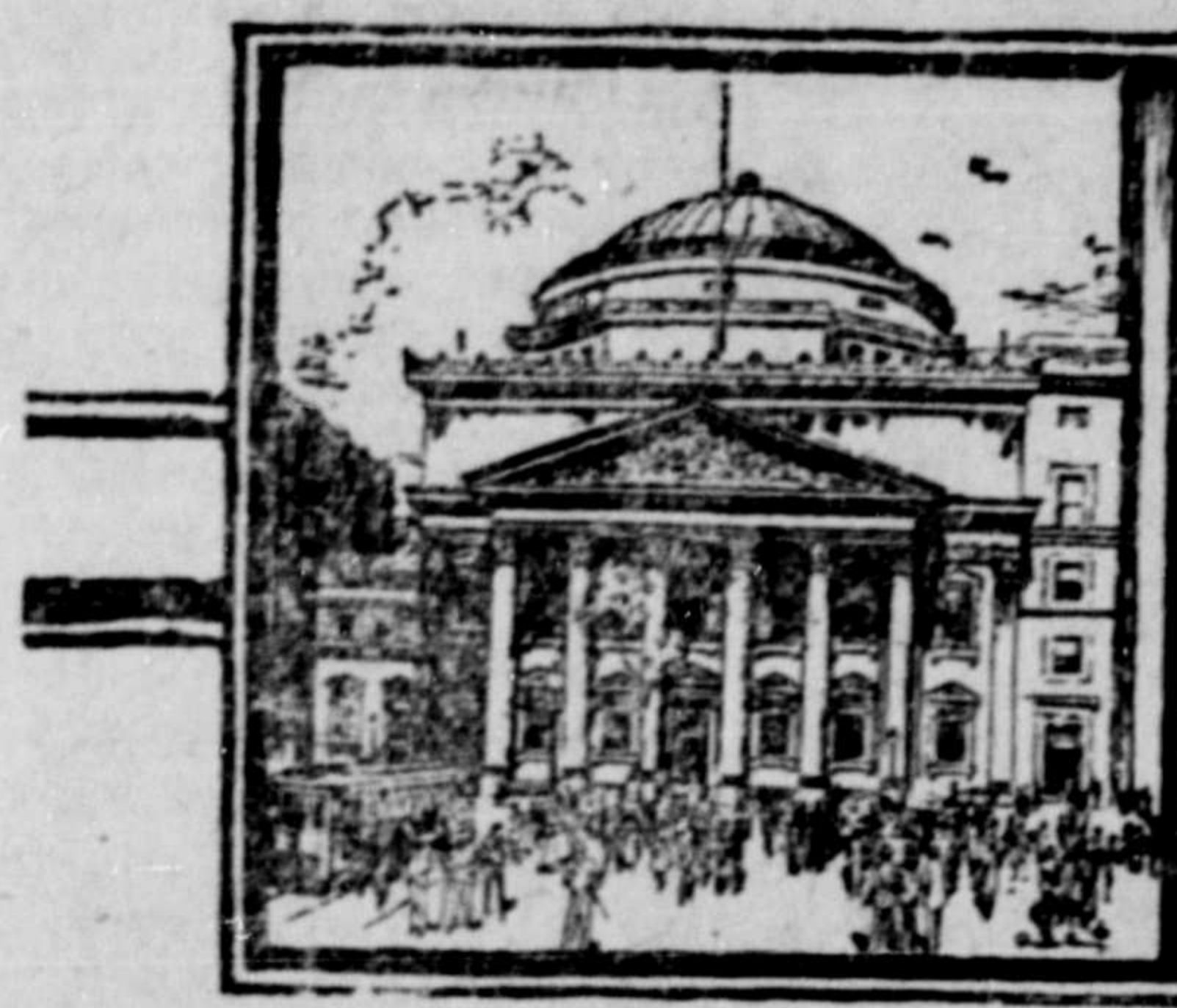

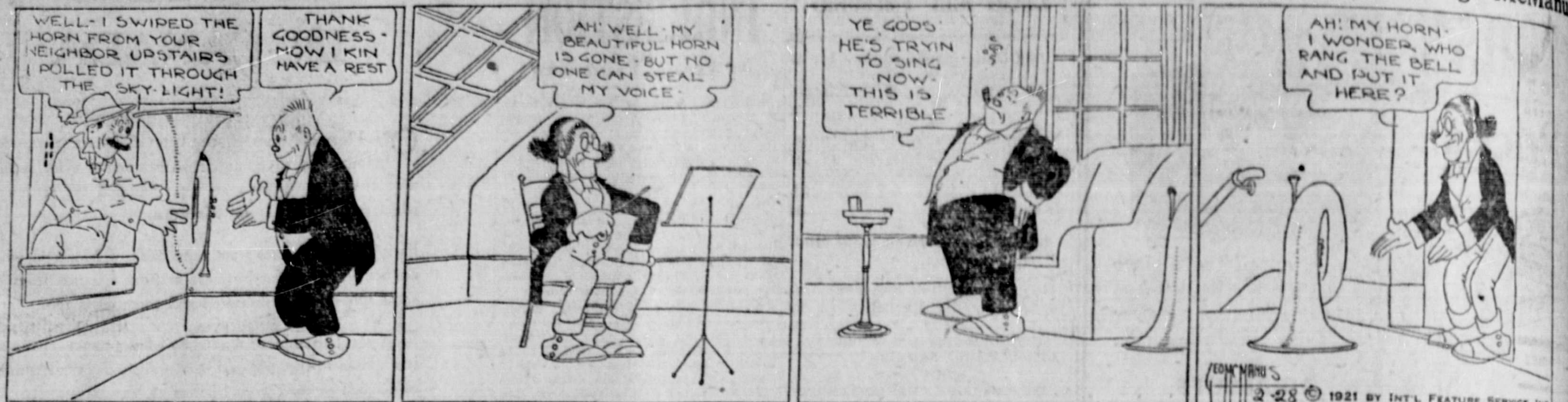

# LABOR OUTLOOK IS PROMISING

**James Campbell, Government Employment Agent, Predicts Everybody Working by End Month**

That by the end of this month all the 200 or more unemployed in Prince Rupert will be at work again is the opinion of James M. Campbell, government employment agent, who sees a very hopeful outlook ahead in the employment situation in this district.

Mr. Campbell reports that last week saw more men employed through his office than any other week since October and there is promise of a good demand for labor from now on. On the Prince John on Thursday there were 20 men sent to Sedgewick Bay for the Whalen Co., they having come from Vancouver on Wednesday. The chief placements last week were to the dry dock, Premier Mine and small numbers about town.

### Porcher Island

Early this week W. T. Muse is taking about a dozen men to Porcher Island where he is re-opening a logging camp. By April it is expected that most of the logging camps in the district will be reopened, as well as some of the sawmills, including the one at Berge, the foreman for which, it is reported, have already been appointed. Within the week Olaf Hansen will be sending a crew of 20 to 30 men up the line to commence work on a new pole contract which he has secured. Among the logging camps which are expected to reopen within the next thirty days is J. B. Moran's at Surf Inlet.

Up to date 300 certificates for relief have been issued from the local labor bureau and Mr. Campbell estimates that this covers about 200 unemployed who will find work again with the opening of the dry dock and the resumption of the logging, mining and fishing industries.

### Few Canneries

The salmon canning business this year gives promise of being very slack. It is expected that no more than 6 or 7 of the Skeena canneries will operate and the equipment and gear from all the other plants will be centralized at the few. Only sockeye will be put up as the market is glutted with all other kinds and there are huge quantities that will supply the demand for two or three years in storage at different places.

## In the Letter Box

### COW BAY AGAIN.

Editor Daily News:— Along our coasts with the unnumbered inland waterways, the small gas boat is our automobile, our farm wagon, our loggers' tele wagon, our prospectors' pack horse and our young man's buggy. The fishing fleet is not half the story. While the fishing fleet is the largest, I contend that it is only part of the largest industry on our coast.

The history of Prince Rupert is written in the story of the injustices, the hindrances, and actual crimes committed to prevent its growth. Look back along the line and you will see that every boat builder, every repair shop and every boatman has been driven from first one site to another.

### Take a Stand.

At Cow Bay we have taken our stand. We now hold it. "What we have we hold." The citizens of Prince Rupert have at last reached the fighting stage.

At Cow Bay by dredging, we secure a harbor 500 by 300 feet and by putting the waste rock from the dredging and wall building into a break water we secure another 500 by 300, giving us an actual wharfage surface of 4,000 lineal feet of solid rock at a cost of \$200,000 and use only 300 feet of frontage.

### Not Large Enough.

At Cow Bay we have the only place where the city would control any part of the waterfront and there we secure for all time 1190 feet of solid rock wharf with a city street at the water's edge. As time goes on, this space will not be large enough for the little boats which will come and go every day from outlying districts. This without counting a scow or fishing boat, for our gas boats will always exceed our steamer tonnage.

Our city has grown with and by our small boat fleet, has grown in spite of the difficulties thrown across its path. If our people would wake up to it, the growth of the fleet would be aided, which would add to the volume of business passing through our hands.

### Handle Real Estate.

The curse of our town is the railroad real estate gang. The transportation company has all it can attend to in the transportation end. Its real estate holdings should be put in the hands of a harbor commission or put up at public auction or turned over to the city. And remember, we are talking business now. We never have asked something for nothing. We have paid our way. We have paid our taxes, your salary, and your folly. We are now asking you to aid us to secure an opportunity to better yourselves as well as us. Compare the cost of \$200,000 for 400,000 feet of solid rock wharf with the new fish dock cost, and I think you will agree with me that we are entitled to have that much of our own taxes spent for us.

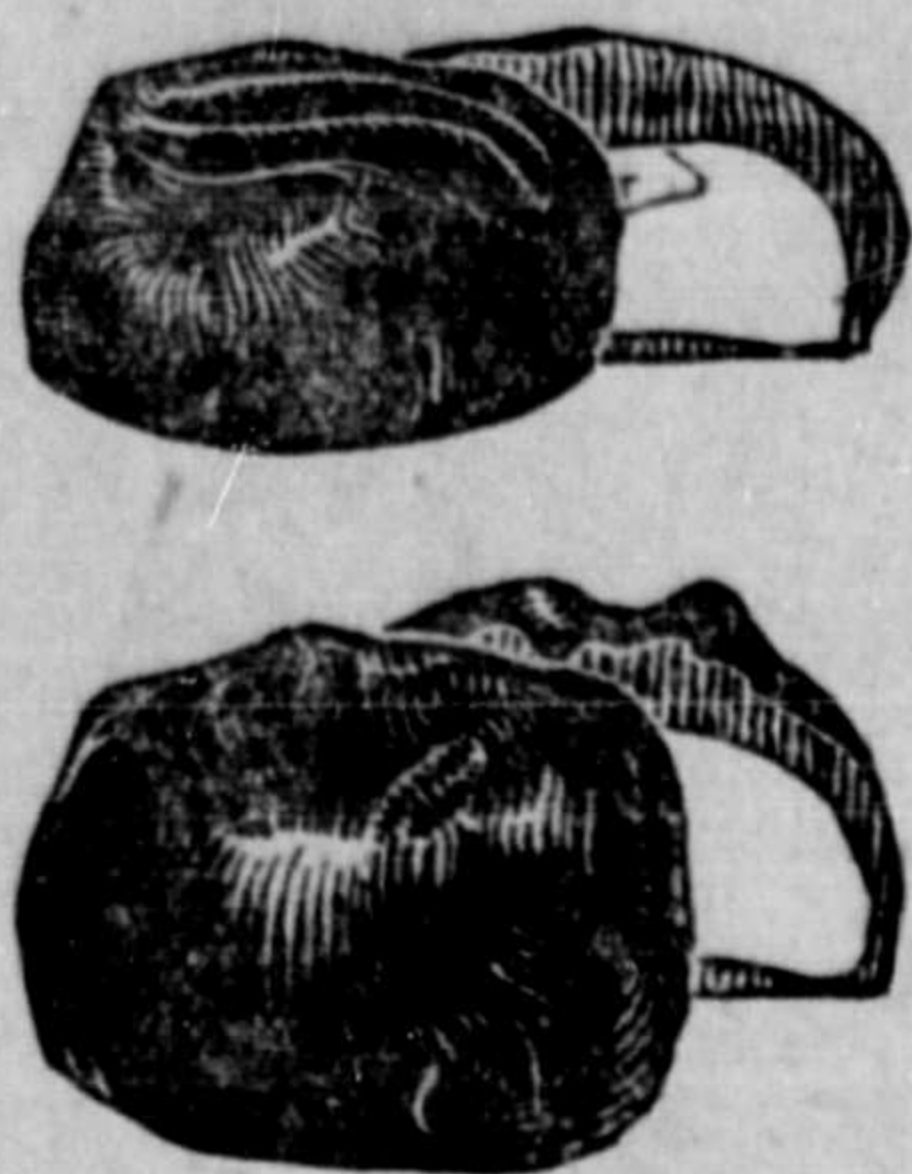

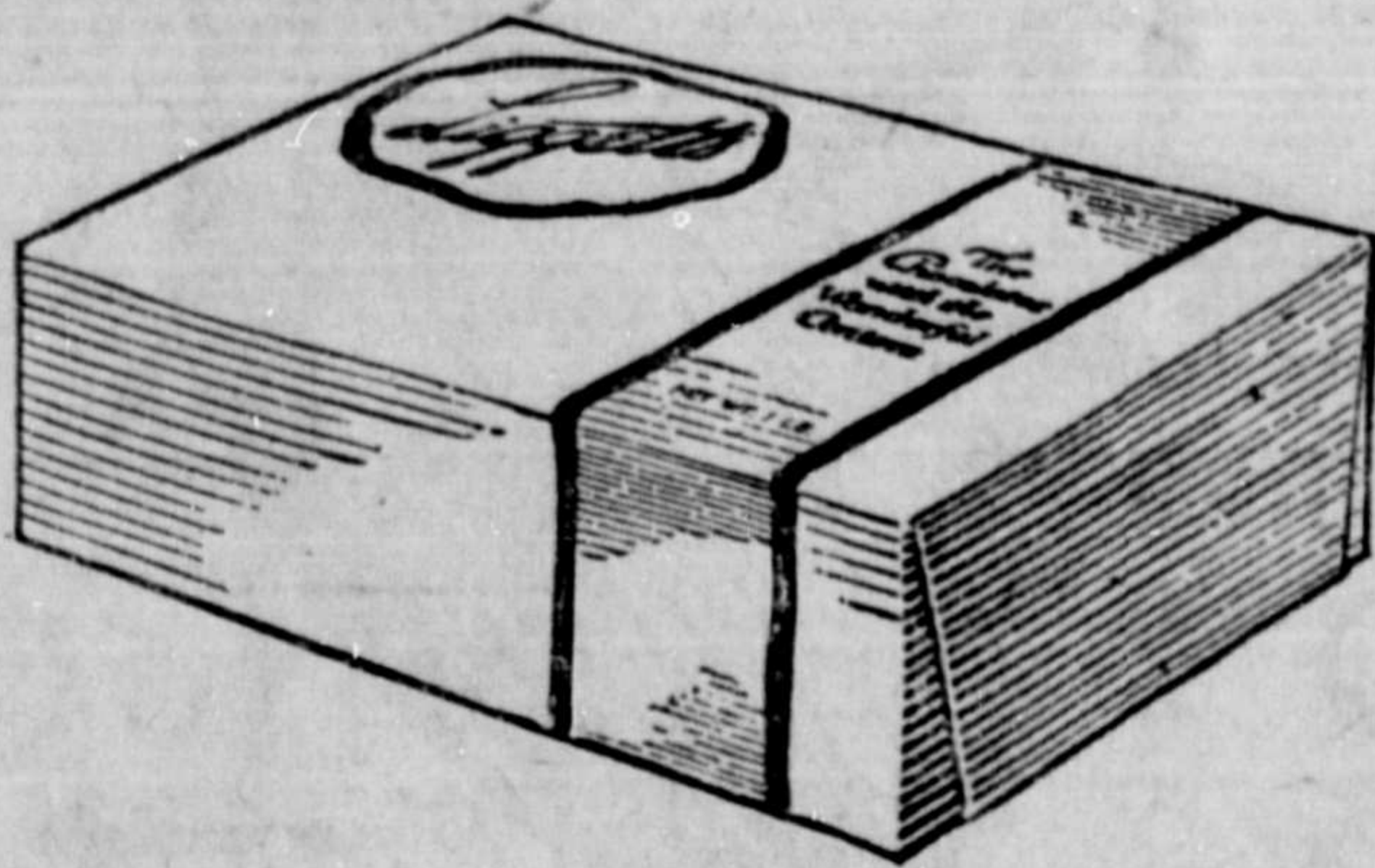

**ONTARIO GOES INTO BANKING**

Bill Introduced into Legislature of That Province Provides of Rural Credits

**PROPOSAL TO PAY ON DEPOSITS 4 PER CENT.**

TORONTO, Mar. 7.—The Minister of Agriculture has introduced into the Ontario Legislature three bills designed to provide for both short term and long term rural credits. In general, these proposed measures resemble the Manitoba Rural Credits Act, 1917, the Manitoba Farm Loans Act, 1917, and the Provincial Savings Act (Manitoba), 1920, but they depart from the legislation of the sister province in important provisions.

The Ontario Farm Loans Bill would authorize provincial incorporation of farm loan associations in any part of Ontario, with one-half the capital in every case subscribed by thirty or more individual farmers, each of whom must have subscribed to one share (\$100) of stock; one-quarter the capital subscribed by the local municipality and the remaining one-quarter of the capital subscribed by the Government of Ontario. In Manitoba such participation by the municipality and by the province is permissive and voluntary only; in Ontario it will be compulsory if the bill is enacted in its present form.

**Will Make Loans**

The bill contemplates that such associations should receive applications for loans from individual members and that, as loans be approved by the local associations, the money should be borrowed on the collective liability of all the members. The rate of interest payable by the borrower must not exceed 7 per cent., and one-seventh of such interest must be paid to the local association to help to defray expenses, pay dividends of not more than 6 per cent on the paid up capital, and build up a reserve. Loans must mature on or before December 31 of the year in which they are made, but would be renewable at the discretion of the directors of the local association, apparently without reference to the lender. The association would have a lien on all property purchased in part

or whole with the proceeds of any such loan and, by filing a certificate, would thereby obtain a lien on all the personal property of the borrower. The bill would empower the Provincial Government to lend money to any farm loan association and to enter into agreements and guarantees with banks, loan companies or other corporations to secure funds for financing such associations.

**To Issue Bonds**  
The Agricultural Development Bill provides for creation of an Agricultural Development Board, appointed by the Government and vested with power to issue bonds to the amount of \$300,000. Such bonds, in whole or part, could be purchased by the Provincial Government with money from the Consolidated Revenue Fund. The Government could also authorize the Board from time to time to issue other debentures to furnish funds for mortgage loans and such bonds could be guaranteed by the Province. The proposed Agricultural Development Board would make loans for the purposes of acquiring lands for agricultural purposes, erecting farm buildings essential to production, or paying insurance on life or property. Loans could be issued for any period from three to thirty years and must be on the amortization principle. A loan to any one person must not exceed \$21,000 and must have as security a mortgage on at least fifty acres of land, the amount of such loan being restricted to 65 per cent of the value of the security.

**Accepts Deposits**  
The Agricultural Development Finance Bill, if passed by the Legislature, would empower the Provincial Treasurer to accept public deposits, paying thereon interest at a rate not less than 4 per cent per annum. Offices could be opened at various points in Ontario for the purpose of receiving such deposits. The Bill provides that funds raised in this way could be invested in loans to members of farm loan associations or in bonds or debentures issued by the Provincial Agricultural Development Board, or in Dominion, Provincial or Ontario municipal securities.

The three rural credit bills have been introduced following the findings of a Special Committee which reported recently on the subject. The Committee proposed that Ontario farmers organize, with private capital and under private control, a joint savings institution and land mortgage bank, that deposits be solicited from the public, that such deposits be guaranteed by the Government of Ontario, that they be made subject to withdrawal on the same terms as savings deposits in the chartered banks and that interest be paid on them at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. The Committee's plan was that such institutions should lend public deposits through the local farm loan associations to meet only so-called short-term credit requirements, and that the capital of the institution and money obtained by the sale of its debentures should be used for mortgage loans.
