President of Canadian Labor Here

INTERIOR TOWN HAS STRONG INDICATIONS OF BEING REAL OIL CENTRE

International Unions Will Bring World Peace Declares Tom Moore, Speaking in City

"One great reason why there will always be peace between the United States and Canada is because the workers of the two countries understand each other," declared Tom Moore, president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, in addressing a meeting of local trades and labor men in the St. Andrew's hall last evening. "They know each other's troubles and needs and the growth of the international movement will increase this understanding and will largely be responsible for a permanent peace between the two countries. The extension of the scope of the unions will lead to the same peaceful results over the entire world."

Some smaller factions are urging conditions that would cause war and such a one is the Third International of Moscow. This organization believes that all the brains are centered in Moscow and has set down a list of nine rules to which all must subscribe.

The numbers of these factions are not great but the advocating of their theories may retard the progress of the world. Two years ago a similar movement started in Canada but we find today that its members are in the minority like they are in Prince Rupert.

Winnipeg Meeting.

"At Winnipeg recently they showed their conception of the freedom of speech which to them means the expression of nothing but their own views. I think that it is better that any policy get the search light of publicity—that is my idea of the freedom of speech. In the Winnipeg meeting there were not more than 300 or 400 persons out of the gathering of 2000 who were supporters of the policy of the One Big Union. An analysis of the entire situation in Winnipeg shows that the International is the much stronger movement and is just as sound and strong now as it ever was."

The One Big Union was started because some workers thought that the International was too slow and too reactionary. They broke away in the hope that they would reach a point beyond where we were leading them. The great mass, however, remained with us and we still have most of the workers in our ranks. There will always be some dissatisfied minorities and it is well that there should be. It takes the idealists and the theorists to balance with the reactionaries."

Stronger Than Ever

Mr. Moore stated that his main business on his trip was to get at first hand an idea of the conditions in the West. Some people believed that it was easy to handle the unions of Canada, but the country was geographically so wide in extent that it was not so. The International movement was stronger today than it ever was before and now represented some thirty-eight million workers in forty-two different countries.

William Tilden

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One of the chief duties of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada was the co-ordination of the different parts of the Dominion and the holding of conventions where recommendations for legislation could be brought forward. The organization had already accomplished much along these lines and was striving for more still. As yet the union men had not made their entry into the legislative halls to any great extent and it was only through these congresses that they were able to advance their wants towards having legislation enacted. They had obtained results in the provisions for free education, measures against infant mortality, improvements in the compensation laws. At

LORD BYNG GOVERNOR

Appointment Officially Announced at London.

LONDON, June 2.—The appointment of Lord Byng of Vimy as governor-general of Canada in succession to the Duke of Devonshire was officially announced today.

The Duke of Devonshire will return to England soon and the new governor-general will arrive in Canada this fall to take his post.

OTTAWA, June 3.—An address to the Duke of Devonshire on the occasion of the approaching termination of his office as governor-general was passed unanimously by the House of Commons today. The motion for the address was moved by the Premier and seconded by Hon. W. L. McKenzie King, leader of the opposition.

OFFICERS ARE KILLED AMBUSH

Civilians Were in Action in Ireland Last Night—Two Parties Attacked.

DUBLIN, June 3.—Four constables were killed and five wounded in an ambush by two hundred civilians this morning in Kyleberg Cross, County Tipperary.

CORK, June 3.—District Inspector Stevenson, a police sergeant and four constables were killed and four officers were seriously wounded when a police patrol was ambushed by one hundred armed men at Carrow Kennedy, near here last night.

WILLIAM TILDEN WINNING TENNIS

Hard Court Matches on at St. Cloud, France

ST. CLOUD, France, June 3.—The American mixed tennis team composed of Arnold Jones and Miss Edith Sigourney was eliminated in the hard court tennis tournament today.

William Tilden, of Philadelphia, world's grass court singles tennis champion, was advanced to the final round in the world's hard court championship by defeating Nicholas Mishu, of Roumania.

SETTLEMENT OF COAL STRIKE IS REJECTED

LONDON, June 3.—The executive body of the striking coal miners today finally rejected the government's proposals for a settlement of the coal strike.

Disturbances on Surface of Burns Lake Caused by District's Oil Deposits

BURNS LAKE, B.C., June 3.—All preparations have been made for commencing oil boring on the banks of the lake here. Forty-three claims have been staked in the neighborhood but it remained for a local syndicate to undertake boring operations. The drill has been placed in position and the only thing keeping work from starting is the fact that the licenses have not yet been issued. As the advertising has been recently completed it is probable the necessary licenses will be issued soon.

A few days ago Gustave Gervais saw a waterspout on the lake, caused, it is thought, by an explosion of gas beneath the water. Explosions such as these have been seen and heard often and it was several of these four years ago that drew particular attention to the oil possibilities of the place. At that time the report of the explosions was very distinct and the water was thrown far into the air.

The boring operations here are to be undertaken by a syndicate of nine persons each holding a claim. The members of the syndicate are Donald M. Gerow, the organizer, R. H. Gerow, John McLean, Jno. Gunderson, Frank Warren, Pier Warren, Mrs. P. Warren, Mrs. D. M. Gerow and Mr. Thompson of La Pas. All the people here are talking oil and there seems every prospect that work will be pushed ahead. Locations for three holes have been arranged.

BRITAIN MAY HELP TO EXTRADITE BERGDOLL

American Slacker Escaped to Germany on Canadian Passport Papers.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Great Britain may assist the United States in obtaining the extradition of Grover Bergdoll, the American slacker, because he escaped to that country on a Canadian passport.

ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP SHIP

Irish Republicans Would Have Destroyed British Warship.

GORK, June 3.—The Republicans attempted last night to blow up the British destroyer Trentham in the Hambleton Repair Yards. The boat was but slightly damaged. As a result of the affair all the employees of the yard were paid off and an investigation is being made with a view to definitely placing the responsibility.

FLEET IS LEAVING FOR HALIFAX NOW

Aurora and Patrician Leave Today and Patriot on Monday.

VICTORIA, June 3.—The battleship Aurora and the destroyer Patrician, of the Canadian squadron, leave here today on their return to Halifax. The Patriot, still undergoing repairs, will leave on Monday, overtaking the others at Panama.

KING'S BIRTHDAY.

Today is the fifty-sixth birthday of King George V., the sailor king of England. The day is being celebrated by all the public institutions including post office, schools and government offices and many of the private offices are closed for the day. DOMINION TAX ON LIQUOR IS TO BE TESTED

Farris Will Start Test Case to Prove Application on B.C. Liquor Board.

VICTORIA, June 3.—D. W. de B. Farris, attorney general for the province states that it is intended to proceed at an early date with a test case in connection with the imposition of the federal taxes upon liquor brought into the province of British Columbia. This will be in order to ascertain the application of legislation that is being brought in at Ottawa in connection with the budget and the extension of taxes resulting from it. There is a heavy tax on liquor which will increase the price that will be charged by the provincial liquor board if the test case is unsuccessful.

MAY DELIVER BEER DIRECT

Liquor Board May Risk That Method—Demanding Higher Quality.

VICTORIA, June 3.—The brewers of the province and the members of the Liquor Board have been conferring on the plans that will be adopted in supplying the people with liquor when the new act comes into force on June 15.

Although the Liquor Board will not deliver whiskey to the homes on account of the additional cost, they will likely risk having beer delivered that way, the breweries making the deliveries direct to the homes of the consumers.

The Board agreed in the policy of demanding a higher quality of beer than was ever before sold in the province. This will tend to do away with all "home brew" and secret competition.

MISS CECIL LEITH IS GOLF CHAMPION

Won Open Tournament at Turnberry Links, Scotland, Today.

TURNBERRY, Scotland, June 3.—Miss Cecil Leith retained the title of champion woman golfer of Britain by defeating Miss Joyce Wethered, the runner up, in the open golf tournament.

Tom Moore a Real Leader.

Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, who addressed a meeting in this city last evening, bore out, at that meeting, his reputation of being a man of moderate and reasonable views. Nevertheless he is a man whose heart and purpose is wrapped up in the welfare and advancement of the workers and producing class to perhaps a greater degree than the idealists and theorists whose usefulness to the cause they profess to represent is hampered to a great extent by the impossibility of the schemes they advance. Tom Moore seems to have something practicable and reasonable to offer when he advances a proposition for the betterment of the worker. A man holding such ideas as he does is far more likely to meet with practical results than the man who proposes to upset the whole scheme of the nation's existence in a single day. Legislation of recent years has proven that it is such men who have had more effect with the legislators of the country.

Men of North Should Know First Aid.

Lives are continually being lost in this north country that could be saved if the simplest devices of first aid were known and applied. In many cases great distances intervened between camps where men are engaged in hazardous industrial pursuits and posts where medical aid is available. It is especially important, therefore, that a knowledge of first aid should be acquired by the common workman. It is easily obtained and the occasion might arise at any time where it would save life. Government legislation has been passed whereby certain protection is given against accident by the presence of "first aid men" in logging and construction camps where there are a large number of men employed. No legislation can, however, be enacted that will offer safeguards to all. A man never knows but that his knowledge of methods to combat suffocation by water or smoke, bleeding or fractures might save his own life and such a knowledge might at any time be valuable to others. Such knowledge might well be made a requirement for those employed far from medical assistance in many of the camps of the north.

Prince Rupert Free of Crime.

It is very pleasing indeed to record the lightness of criminal dockets in assize court sessions at Prince Rupert. It is said that there are a great number of rough characters in Prince Rupert and the district but they certainly do not appear in the courts. After all it does not necessarily follow that because a man is rough that he is a criminal. Often in the cruelest of rock may be found the richest of metal and so, often, in the roughest of appearance may be found the most sterling of character. In any event, the small amount of serious crime that is committed here and in the immediate vicinity is a matter of gratification. While other places have their murders and their burglaries Prince Rupert for three years has not had a session of the Supreme Court in which criminal cases figured to any noticeable degree. Mr. Justice Gregory, in opening the present session, remarked that the lightness of the docket was due partly to the frailties of a certain public institution. That loss, however, was not a very serious one and would not have made the list much larger. And that the particular loss did not involve a resident of this district but rather one of the foreign territory to the north.

PROVINCIAL ELECTION IN ALBERTA LIKELY

May Be Late This Month or in Fall.

EDMONTON, June 3.—A provincial election in the near future is looming up as a possibility, according to the Edmonton

Journal. "Rumors are now persistent, and the likelihood of another contest is being somewhat freely discussed in political circles. Late June is mentioned as a possible date, while another rumor has it that it will be held in the autumn, with perhaps a referendum on the prohibition question in the meantime," it is stated.



COL. PECK IS BACK IN TOWN

Leaves for Vancouver Tomorrow — Will be Here with Tolmie in September.

Col. C. W. Peck, M.P., V.C., arrived in the city last evening from Ottawa, having come straight through from the East with the exception of a few days relaxation spent fishing at Terrace. The colonel was met at the train by a number of veterans and the band turned out for the occasion to escort him to the Hotel Prince Rupert. In the procession also was Tom Moore, the well-known labor leader and organizer, and several prominent citizens.

Col. Peck, who leaves for Vancouver tomorrow to visit his family before sailing for England on June 16, in command of the Canadian rifle team to compete at the forthcoming Bisley meet, stated in an interview with the Daily News that he expected to be in Europe altogether about two months, part of the time being spent revisiting the battlefields of France and Belgium. He hopes to make a careful survey of many of the cemeteries where so many of the gallant Canadian boys have their last resting place, get data and records, and be assured of proper care and attention for those many hallowed spots dear to the hearts of such numbers of Canadian families. Col. Peck expects to be back in Canada by the middle of August and will at once leave for Skeena constituency, accompanied by Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture, who expects to make a tour of the West in the latter part of August, and will be in Prince Rupert with the soldier member to open the Agricultural Exhibition here in September. Colonel Peck will accompany the minister on a general tour of the constituency and the northern part of British Columbia.

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
