Fair Is The Great Attraction Today IRISH SINN FEIN ACCEPTS INVITATION TO CONFER ON PEACE

Irish Sinn Fein Approve Sending of Plenipotentiaries to Inverness and Nominate 5 Irish Leaders

GLASGOW, Sept. 14.—The appointment of plenipotentiaries to meet at Inverness with British representatives to discuss the question was approved by Dail Eireann at today's session. Indicating their approval the Dail makes the announcement plenipotentiaries have been appointed "in view of a possible conference with representatives of the British Government." The plenipotentiaries are Arthur Griffith, Michael Collins, Robert Barrett, Eamon Duggan and George Gavin Duffy.

COLONEL PECK AND ELECTION

Unionist Member Returns to City
But Noncommittal on Forth-coming Contest.

If the Unionists have any plans for the retaining of Skeena constituency in the forthcoming federal election they are not, as yet, giving out announcement as to the line of action they will take. Col. C. W. Peck, the present member, whom it is generally understood, can have the nomination if he wants it, returned to the city last night after an absence of some months during which time he visited England in command of the British Canadian Rifle Team. It had been expected that some announcement regarding the election would have been made on his return but this is evidently being delayed for a few days for Col. Peck was noncommittal on election matters when seen by a News representative this afternoon.

Glad to Be Home.

"British Columbia is the best country in the world and the more I go abroad the more I love it," said Col. Peck branching off on to another topic. "The people are better off and they are more contented here than anywhere else. I am glad to be home."

When in London Col. Peck had lunch with Hon. T. D. Pattullo, provincial minister of lands, S. J. Crowe, federal member for Burrard, F. C. Wade, B. C. agent and Sir Arthur Currie, he declared. "He is the best agent-general the province ever had in London. He remarked specially to me of the excellence of 'Resources,' Weston Coyne's magazine. He said it was the best thing he received of its kind from the province and he uses it widely."

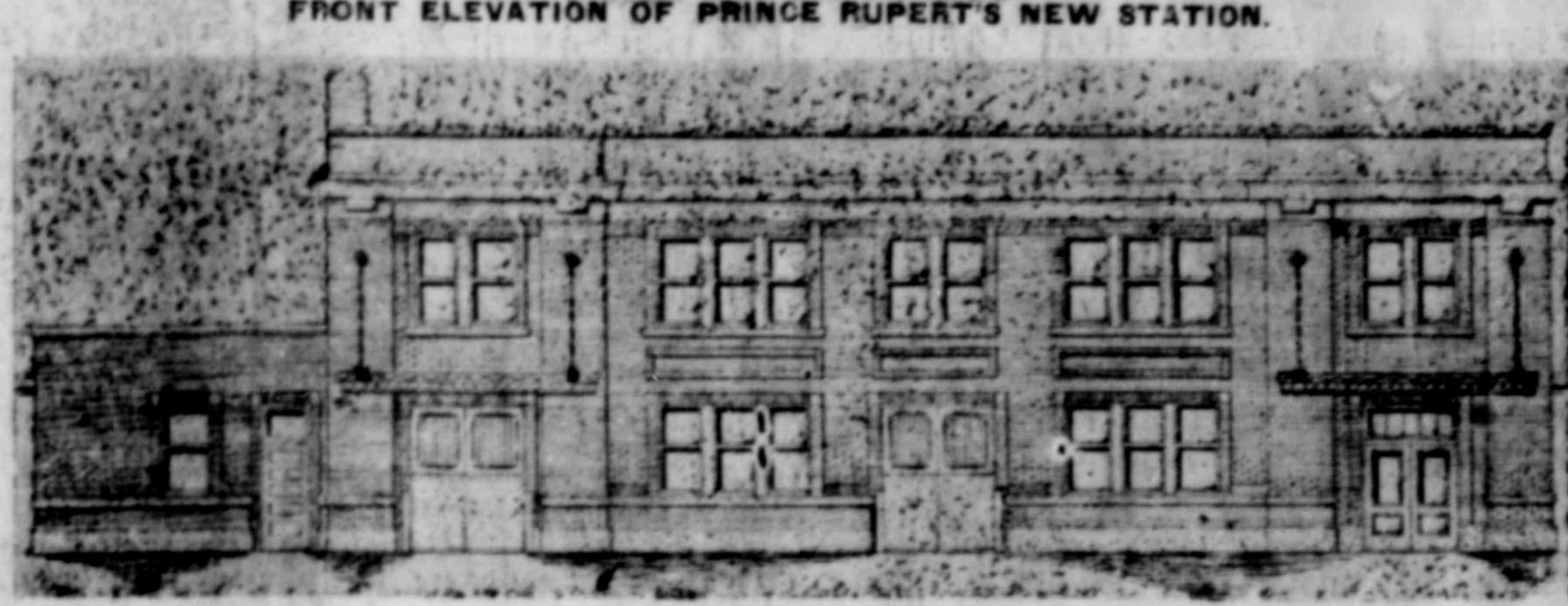
Not Talking Politics.

Col. Peck reached Canada on August 26 and since that time has visited Montreal, Ottawa and Winnipeg also going for a two days fishing trip to the Nipigon Lakes. He saw Premier Meighen only for a few minutes since his London speech and then they did not talk of politics.

Col. Peck expects to go to Victoria next week in connection with regimental affairs regarding the Sixteenth Canadian Scottish, he being commanding officer of the reorganizing unit. He will be gone only a few days and will then return to Prince Rupert.

Better Exhibition Than Ever Before Staged This Year

The 1921 exhibition is characterized by a greater appearance of permanence than has ever accompanied an exhibition in the past. This is noticeable both inside and outside the exhibition hall. On the inside commercial booths have been erected, and these will in future not be shifted and changed as has been done in previous years. The outside presents the first attempt at a "midway" for sideshow concessions. These are now located in a permanent and convenient position at the rear of the building.

As far as exhibits are concerned, their range is wider than ever. Exhibitors of the past have increased their entries and many new people have their articles on the tables. Livestock and poultry have never been in the past all that might have been desired either in quality or quantity but this year there is

an increase in number noted and the quality is infinitely better. The Naas River exhibits are something new and indicate a wealth in that section that is not generally known.

Every feature of the exhibition this year is more elaborate than ever in the past and already it promises to be an outstanding success. Certainly each and every person who has in the past had anything to do with the Northern B. C. Agricultural Association and its affairs may feel proud of the 1921 exhibition and the great progress and growth that it manifests since the beginning some ten years ago.

There are so many departments of the Exhibition that it might be described that it is a difficult matter to do justice to them all. Many of them that will receive little more than passing mention are worthy of note. There are a great number of interesting things to be seen at Agricultural Hall this week and a lot of attractions, besides educational and advertising features.

In the agricultural section, the exhibits of F. W. Bohler of Kitsumkatum, stand out. This pioneer supporter of the fair is here again this year with a bigger exhibit than ever and a much superior one. Many local exhibitors have contributed in a smaller way.

Fancy work is attracting a lot of attention. There is some really splendid work which has involved hours of time. Photography has a larger number of entries this year. The cut flower section is a good one. In the household lines there are possibly not so many entries as there have been in some fairs of the past but there is some excellent production of the household on exhibit.

The Indian Section is as always a center of attraction. The handicraft of the natives is featured and it is an education in itself. The school exhibits are not large, owing to the fact that school has been opened only a week.

IMPORTER IS AT ESQUIMALT

Arrived at Victoria Yesterday With
a Six Degree List and
Crew Aboard.

VICTORIA, Sept. 14.—Emerging from the fogbound Pacific, the Canadian Importer, once given up for lost, with a six-degree list, defiantly lumped into port yesterday with her crew of undaunted Britishers still at their posts of duty.

Captain Bissett said the cause of the leak will not be definitely determined until the vessel is dry docked.

OTTAWA WILL DEFEND RIGHT OF TAXATION

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—The announced action of the British Columbia Government for a declaration that the Dominion government shall not impose duties on liquor imported into the province, will be defended by the Dominion government.

The British Columbia statement of claim has been received here.

WIFE GOES TO HIS AID

Mrs. Arbuckle Leaves Today
for San Francisco to
Help Roscoe.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—Mrs. Roscoe Arbuckle left New York today for San Francisco to help her husband if possible, although she has been separated from him for five years. They had agreed to disagree, she said, but remained friends. She will be in 'Frisco early in the week and will at once get busy on the case.

MINER KILLED.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Sept. 14.—Joseph A. Laubner, one of the best known mine owners in the Willow Creek district, has been killed in a cave-in.

Fight Over Right to Tax Any Liquor Imported by Province Commenced by Attorney General

VICTORIA, Sept. 14.—Action has been instituted in the Exchequer Court for the declaration that the Dominion Government has not the right to impose a duty on liquor imported by the province of British Columbia, Farris announces.

The refusal of the customs officials to release a shipment of Scotch bought and paid for in England as a test forms the basis for the present action. The case is to be taken to the Privy Council if necessary, Farris said.

Only two provinces, Quebec and British Columbia, are importing liquor, the Attorney-General declared. "The Dominion tax, which is larger than our profits, takes the money out of these provinces for expenditure throughout the Dominion."

ARBUCKLE IS CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—An indictment charging Roscoe Arbuckle with manslaughter in connection with the death of Virginia Happe was returned by the county grand jury. The manslaughter charge will have no effect on the murder charge now pending in the justice court.

A warrant for Arbuckle's arrest on the manslaughter charge will be issued on Friday.

Effort of Anti-Spy League in Victoria
Is Frustrated.

POLICE COMMISSIONERS GUILTY OF NO CRIME

VICTORIA, Sept. 14.—The case against Police Commissioners Dr. Ernest Hall and Joseph North, charged with failing to prevent the operation of Chinese lotteries, was dismissed in the County Court yesterday.

The charge was brought by a member of the Anti-Spy League formed to fight the law and order element of the city. Before the trial the man named Fisdale, who laid the complaint, was himself arrested for leading boys into immorality.

The case arose out of a charge brought by the police commissioners against Charlie Bo, a Chinese merchant, who is alleged to have paid one of the commissioners a sum of money to get his influence with the chief of police to allow lotteries to run. Bo was arrested and the money turned over to the police. Prior to the arrest and the money turned been allowed to open in order to make a clean up and as a part of the chain of evidence against Bo.

WOMAN LABOR LEADER CHOSEN

Miss Kersten Hesselgren Holds
First Seat in Swedish Parliament.

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 13.—Miss Kirsten Hesselgren, the labor leader, was elected at Gothenburg a member of the first chamber of the Swedish Parliament. She is the first woman to hold a seat there.

BAXTER TO ENTER MEIGHEN CABINET

FREDERICKTON, N. B., Sept. 14.—Hon. J. B. Baxter, formerly attorney general of New Brunswick and now leader of the opposition in the Legislature has accepted an invitation to enter the reconstructed cabinet of Premier Meighen, it is understood.

PROPERTY NOT A CANDIDATE

Accept Permanent Position
on International Court
of Justice.

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—Charles Doherty, one of Canada's representatives on the League of Nations, has declined for unstated reasons to stand as a candidate. Mr. Doherty was recently saying he would move to London for the immediate resignation of article ten of the League of Nations which was the chief issue in the United States election. It deals with the signing of powers and others against aggression.

AL SUICIDED AFTER KILLING POLICE

MINN., Sept. 14.—Four men, who killed three members of the police force while attempting to capture him, were charged with murder in a shack when surrised this morning.

ARE ARRESTED, INCLUDING POLICE

BAY, Sept. 14.—Four men, including three members of the police force, have been arrested and \$15,000 seized as a result of a raid on the foreign exchange market.

Freight Rates Reduction For the Present Until Wages Investigation Has Reported

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—There will be no general reduction of freight rates at present. In the judgment of Carvell and commissioners, delivered this morning, they recommended a reduction of ten per cent. except in cases where rates have been lowered, as in the case of livestock and grain on the railroad. They also recommended 25 per cent. reduction on parlor car rates.

In the judgment Commissioners McLean, Rutherford and others concur. Their majority ruling is: "No immediate reduction of freight rates pending the decision of the special commission appointed to investigate the question."

As a result of their divided decision there will be no reduction of freight rates at present.

BRINGING UP FATHER

Exhibitions Now Manifest Accomplishment Instead of Possibilities as Formerly

The Prince Rupert Exhibition which was opened yesterday by Hon. A. M. Manson, Speaker of the Provincial House, marks the ninth fair in the city. Since 1913, when the first was opened at the Auditorium on Sixth Avenue by Hon. Price Ellison, then provincial Minister of Agriculture, the exhibitions have steadily grown in size and importance until now they are fixtures each year and events which are looked forward to from season to season. The Prince Rupert Exhibition is not only an event of the city, it is the gathering place of the people of Central and Northern B. C. where representatives of all parts meet and see and hear what their neighbors are doing. Perhaps this sense has not yet been fully developed but as time goes on it is surely growing.

Progress of the vast districts tributary to the city in the past ten years can well be judged by the quality and nature of the exhibits to be seen at the Exhibition. From year to year the changes may not have seemed so noticeable, but when one compares the 1913 exhibition with the one now in progress, remarkable advances both in the city and in most of the districts are emphatically marked.

Times Have Changed.

In 1913 as now, the most of the districts were represented by exhibits but then they were mainly from small garden experimental plots few and far between at isolated points in the Bulkley Valley, Queen Charlotte Islands, Bella Coola, Kitsumkalum and Lakelse valleys. Now these exhibits are from modern and extensive farms that have filled up the fertile and wide valleys. In 1913 one looked on these exhibits with wonder and amazement that such produce could be obtained. Now it is different for everybody knows without an exhibition what the valleys can do. Then the exhibition demonstrated possibilities, now it illustrates accomplishment.

First Exhibition.

It was in 1912 that the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association, which for the last decade has conducted the Prince Rupert exhibitions, had its inception. A handful of energetic citizens, imbued with the idea of illustrating and advertising the agricultural, mineral, fishing, industrial, artistic and utilitarian accomplishments of Northern and Central B. C., got together and launched the society. After months of strenuous work, most of it unrewarded in a monetary sense, the enterprise was pushed through to signal success and the first exhibition was opened on September 24 in the Auditorium. Great was the enthusiasm and celebration and every fair since has proven possibly, like the first one, Prince Rupert's greatest event of the year—the time when she entertained her visitors and the time of general reunion when every person present said "Look what we have done."

Usually Successful.

Prince Rupert exhibitions have been financial successes each year with but one exception, that being in 1919 when confronted with heavy expenditures for improvements and depending for fine weather to make the event a success, all three days of the exhibition proved the worst possible causing all games to be canceled and the fair ran into a deficit. Careful and conservative management in 1920, however, brought a good surplus and the association books again showed figures on the right side. The services of all boards and

officials in each year since the first exhibition have had their effect on the ultimate results and it would not be fair to say one exhibition was more of a success than another. In exhibition work, the concrete results of one year's fair cannot be taken as the standard to judge the success of the management of that year. Necessarily, the work of the one year has its effect on the next and the spectacular success of this or any year may have been brought about largely through the work of the committees of the previous one.

Never Missed Season.

Since 1913 each Exhibition has showed steady improvement on the one preceding it. During the war, although there were many reverses and people were busy and concerned in other matters, the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association carried on and put on its exhibitions without missing a season. Sometimes conditions were far from good but careful and untiring management always held the association alive. Now it is on a basis where there is little danger of it ever falling back for it has become an institution.

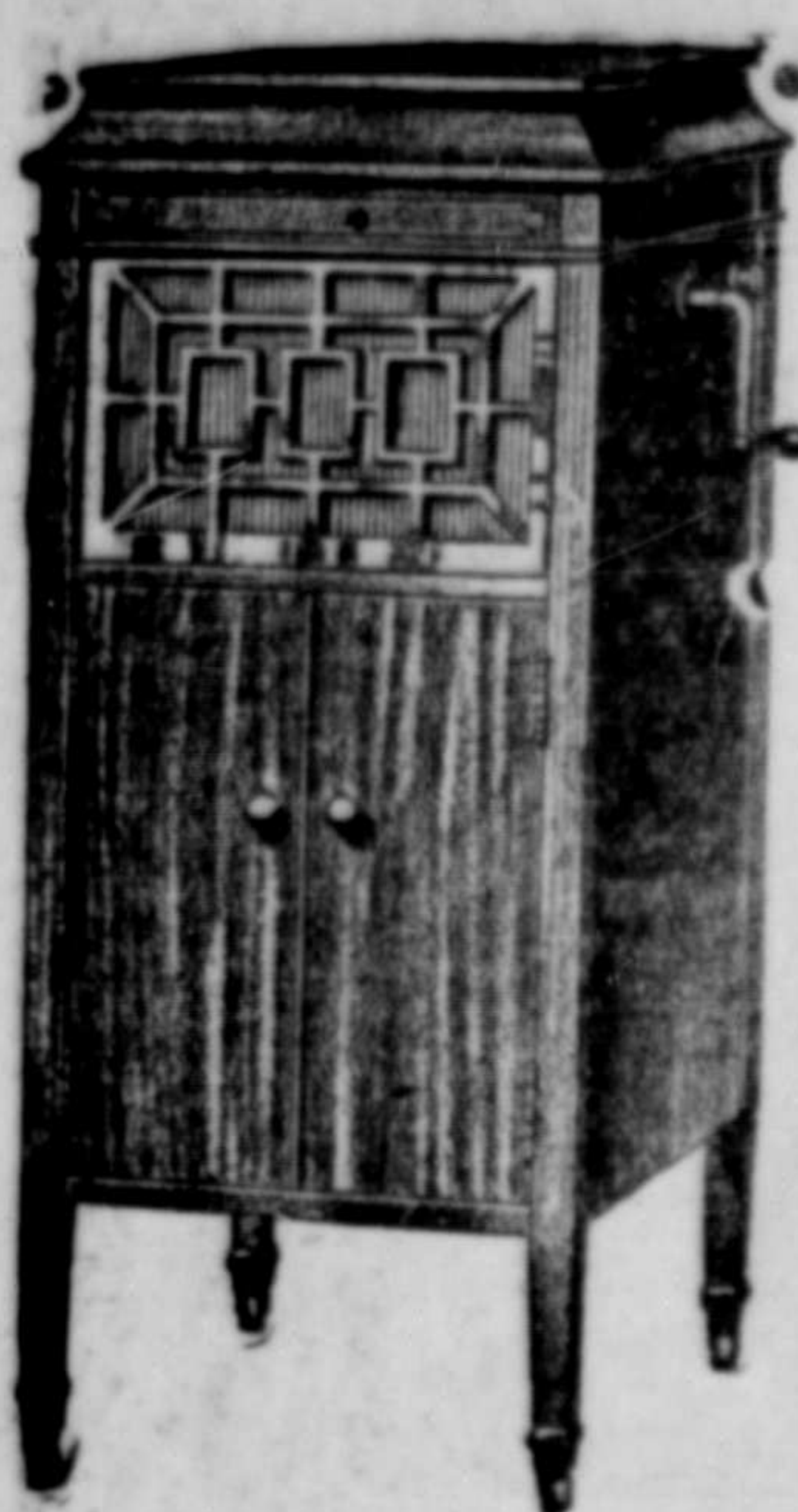

ROAD PROPOSED FROM ALICE ARM TO AIYANSH

Distance Said to Be Only 30 Miles and Market at Arm Good One.

Great interest is being taken in Alice Arm and Anyox over the proposal to build a wagon road from Alice Arm into the Aiyansh Valley, on the Naas River, says the Alice Arm Herald. Alice Arm is the natural outlet for that fertile valley, following the Illiance River pack trail for 11 miles, and then dropping down onto the Naas Valley the distance would be only thirty miles. The distance from the Aiyansh Valley to the mouth of the Naas River is sixty miles, and the road would terminate on an Indian Reserve, and only a weekly boat service is available. The distance to Terrace is seventy miles and there would be an additional haul of over ninety miles on the railroad in order to get the produce to Prince Rupert and over another 100 miles in order to get it to Anyox or Alice Arm. If the road terminates at Alice Arm the distance would be only about 30 miles, four times per week boats leave Alice for Anyox and Prince Rupert. Anyox is the natural market for the Aiyansh Valley and will take all the dairy produce, fruit, vegetables and live stock Aiyansh can produce for a long time to come.

AVERAGE PRICE OF NINE STAPLE FOODS

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—The average price of the weekly budget for a family of five persons in sixty Canadian cities covering 29 staple foods rose to \$14.41 in August compared with \$10.96 in July, according to an official announcement.

JUDGES PLEASED WITH EXHIBITS

The judges, T. M. Anderson and
W. James, last night expressed
themselves as well pleased with
the local exhibition. The vegeta-
bles and flowers, particularly
pleased Mr. Anderson, not so
much on account of any keen com-
petition, but as an evidence of
what might be done. He said
some of the flowers were really
wonderful.
Mr. Anderson had one criticism
to make and that was what he
called the lack of general interest
in the exhibit. The exhibits gen-
erally were not carefully placed,
the owners taking little pains to
see that they were shown to best
advantage. He thought there
should be more civic pride in the
exhibition. More pep and enthu-
siasm on the part of the residents
would have a marked effect in
making a good fair.
Mr. James, who judged the
poultry, said very much of it was
very good. The prize-winning
birds were first-class. He strongly
urged that the poultrymen of the
city get together and study the
business, especially along the
lines of adaptation to local con-
ditions. He urged that more en-
thusiasm be shown.

FINANCING OF AN EXHIBITION

Sailing Close to Wind This
Year Owing to Increased Ex-
penditures.

The financing of the Prince
Rupert Exhibition is one of the
biggest tasks in connection with
the annual event and is one that
has to be carefully handled. It
is a very easy matter for the
Fair to show a deficit and with
a view to preventing this it is
necessary to have a capable
committee in charge to allot
moneys to the various depart-
ments and see that the expendi-
tures do not exceed the revenue.
In the nine exhibitions that have
so far been held in the city there
was only one that did not
show a surplus. From present
indications it would seem that
the 1921 exhibition is sailing
close to the wind in this regard
but this is on account of the
greatly increased number of at-
tractions that have been put on
among such as the holding of
the aeroplane flights which will
cost the association \$950 and the
baseball elimination series which
will cost well over \$700. These
are expenses that in the past
have not been incurred.

The annual statement of the
Northern B. C. Agricultural As-
sociation for the year 1920
shows a total of \$6,596.99 assets
in which is included a balance on
hand of \$242.47, value of main
building, \$4,935.37, poultry house
\$523.04, plank roads and furni-
shings, \$755.11. These property
assets of the board will be
greatly increased by a number
of permanent improvements put
in this year including sidewalk
booths and the cattle shed. At
the beginning of this year the
association had no liabilities.

Revenue Account.

The biggest item in the re-
ceipts of the association for
each year is generally the cash
donations that are collected from
the business men and public
generally. Last year these
amounted to \$3,019.85. Ad-
mission fees take second place
in the classification of revenue
and last year amounted to \$1-
537.70. The city makes a grant
of \$1500 and the provincial gov-
ernment \$500. The federal gov-
ernment gives a grant of \$200
towards the Indian Department.
Toward the prize list run into
a good deal of money but this is
covered with a surplus by the
advertising sold. Rent of
grounds and booths and mem-
bership figure further down in
the revenue list.

Expenditure.

The largest expenditure in
connection with last year's fair
was the payment of prize moneys
which totalled \$2,019.63. Sports
and attractions cost \$1,097.00.
The latter will come up closer
in value to the former this year
if it does not exceed it. Last
year the association spent \$1-
157.35 on improvements to the
building which included the put-
ting on of a new roof. Nearly
as much money, if not more, has
again been spent on the building
this season. The secretary's
salary is \$800 and wages at the
time of the fair to special help,
freight and other smaller ex-
penses further call on the fi-
nances.

The total revenue of the Agri-
cultural Association last year
was \$9,815.02 with expenditure
\$9,573.15 leaving a cash balance
of \$242.47. It will be a few
weeks after the Fair before the
standing for this year is ascer-
tained as the revenue from gate
receipts will figure largely as to
which side of the ledger the bal-
ance will be on.

The exhibition finance com-
mittee this year comprises F. G.
Dawson, (chairman), George
Bryant, S. E. Parker, John Mc-
Rae, T. W. Silversides, Harry
Love and Harry Lipsett.

FIRE BULL RIVER DESTROYED ALL OF CHINESE SECTION

River destroyed five dwellings, a
store and the entire Chinese sec-
tion of the town. The loss is es-
timated at \$30,000. It originated in
the Chinese restaurant and spread

Amateurs Did Well in Exhibit
But Not Best Work Yet.

The amateur exhibits of pho-
tographs at the fair this year
was unusually large and more
care has been taken in the mat-
ter of staging the pictures, al-
though even yet they are not
lighted so that they may be seen
to advantage in the evening.
There are some very creditable
productions, especially in sun-
sets. On the other hand some
of the exhibitors placed on view
nothing but a group of ordinary
snapshots, poorer even than the
ordinary touch-the-button ko-
daker could have done. There
was a lack of exposure such as
is usually apparent in snapshot
work and little attempt at seri-
ous composition or art photo-
graphic work.

On the whole, however, the ex-
hibit is encouraging, and doubt-
less by next year there will be
some better results. Time ex-
posures with the use of the trip-
od should become more popu-
lar if the best results are to
be obtained, especially in view of
the rather heavy foliage of this
northern country.

WONDERFUL WORK IN NATIVE HANDICRAFTS

One of the big features of this
year's fair is the very fine ex-
hibit of Indian baskets. The
largest of these is made by G.
C. Perry, Indian Agent for this
district, who has gathered to-
gether a wonderful lot of fine
specimens of Indian work from
all parts of the coast from
Alaska to Washington. They
are set out according to the dis-
tricts from which they come and
give a very fine idea of the
artistic handicrafts of the na-
tives. Unfortunately these handi-
crafts seem destined to become
a thing of the past because the
younger Indians do not take up
the work.

Other Articles.

In addition to baskets there
are ornamental totems, paddles,
ceremonial masks and gar-
ments, all distinctive of the na-
tive people of this north coast.

In addition to the basketry
and carving, there is some ex-
cellent crocheted work by mem-
bers of the Elizabeth Long
Memorial Institute at Kitimaat
and also specimens from Metla-
katla and Queen Charlotte Is-
lands, and there would have been
many more exhibits if there had
been means of transportation.

School Exhibits.

The pupils of Miss E. Clippert
of Metlakatla Indian school
have some very fine exhibits of
school work especially unique
being the painting on shells
and other color work in which
the young people excel. Other
school exhibits showing much
skill come from Essington and
Kincolth.

There are specimens of basket-
ry from Port Simpson, Metla-
katla, Naas River points, Skid-
gate, and some wonderful slate
carvings from Skidgate.
On the whole the Indian sec-
tion is excellent and puts to
shame many of the other ex-
hibitors.

GREAT FLIGHT AT ACROPOLIS

Aviator Prest, in Polar Bear,
Made First Flight over
Prince Rupert.

LOCAL MAN CONCEIVES
CLEVER LANDING DEVICE

Prince Rupert saw its first airplane flight yesterday afternoon when Aviator G. O. Prest of the Polar Bear made a spectacular and highly successful ascent over the city from the Acropolis. The plane worked perfectly and there was not a single hitch, taking off and landing being alike gracefully carried out.

Many persons were at the grounds to watch the performance at the nearby point but the flight was seen all over the city. Mr. Prest circled over the city twice and on the last one performed some stunts which proved extremely interesting and thrilling to many people of Prince Rupert who had never seen a plane in flight before. These stunts included looping the loop and nose diving, the machine looking to be at times completely upside down. The aviator certainly proved that he was a flyer of no mean skill and daring. In all, the plane was up about thirty minutes.

Off From Tennis Court.

Taking off was made from the tennis grounds and over a new roadway that had been built to the grounds. Before the western end of the ground was reached the machine was well clear of all obstacles and the rise was quickly made with the increasing speed.

In landing a new scheme that was never used before by an aviator was carried out. This was the stopping in a seine net that had been strung up at the far end of the grounds. The plane hit the ground at the near end of the park and its course was finally checked as it went into the net and came easily to a stop. This device was suggested by Ald George Frizzell. Its use will probably be reported broadcast. It certainly facilitates landing and makes it an easy matter at the Acropolis grounds. It had been thought at first that the main difficulty here would be landing, but it was proven yesterday that with the use of the net it does not require as long a field as does taking off.

Many Photos.

After the flight there were many photographers, professional and amateur, who crowded around to take pictures of the flyer and his machine. It was really a momentous day—the day of the first flight in Prince Rupert.

The Polar Bear is scheduled to give two more flights—this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon. Rain is the only thing that will prevent them being made.

AWARDED DAMAGES

Jury Grants \$3,907.50 to Mrs. Marie Simpson Against the G.P.T. Steamship Co.

VICTORIA, Sept. 14.—A verdict for damages amounting to \$3,907.50 was awarded by the special jury in the Supreme Court before which, during the past two days, was heard the action of Mrs. Marie Simpson against the G. P. T. Steamship Company for \$5,000 damages for injuries sustained by falling through a hole in the wharf of the company at Stewart, B. C. Mr. Justice Macdonald presided at the trial.

The jury's verdict, rendered after an hour's consideration, found the steamship company guilty of negligence in allowing the plaintiff to land on the wharf which was known to be dangerous, and held that the plaintiff was not guilty of contributory negligence. The judgment carried costs.
